**Visiting Season**

Over 500 visitors representing 15 states have visited the Pocahontas Historical Museum and most of them have expressed themselves as very pleased with it. Remind visitors of this and our many other attractions — better still, take them.

The Museum is open 10 to 4 each week day and 1 to 5 on Sunday. In the front room is a shop, with West Virginia items for sale, including the famous Blenko glass, the Pocahontas Indian Doll clothed in native-tanned deerskin, deerskin gloves made by Kerth Snyder of Arbovale, wood plaques, salad sets, etc. made by county artisans including some of rhododendron wood, quilts, rugs, aprons, honey, post cards note paper with West Virginia scenes, the famous W. & W. chocolates of The Green brier fame with Centennial scenes, books, Centennial plates, plaques, tiles, mugs, keys, cups etc. Mrs. Kerth Nottingham is in charge of the Museum and Shop this summer.

Admission charges to the museum are 35 cents for adults 25 for those 10 to 16 years of age, children under 10 admitted free when with their parents, families \$1. Members of the Historical Society are admitted free of charge.

The National Radio Astronomy Observatory again has regular guided tours for the summer months. These are free and begin at 2 p. m. each afternoon Wednesday through Sunday.

The Cass Scenic Railroad is proving to be a real attraction. It runs Wednesday through Sunday, each day at 11:00, 1:00, and again at 3:00. Adults \$2 and children \$1.

In twelve days of operation 931 adults and 361 children have ridden the Cass Train. An easier way to visit the famous Hills Creek Falls has been made by the Forest Service. A trail has been made to the three falls from Route 39 on Kennison Mountain.

Cranberry Glades, Droop Mountain Battlefield, Pearl Buck's birthplace (though not open to the public can be seen from road). Fish Hatchery, Buckskin Council Reservation, Watoga, Seneca, Camp Pocahontas Top of Allegheny battle field, Traveler's Repose the list can go on and on. And everywhere there is beauty. See, know and show your county.

Eday Community is again a blue ribbon group in the Community Action Program.

Four communities, Pleasant Dale in Upshur County, Browns Halleck in Monongalia, Montana in Marion, and Good Hope in Harrison received the top purple ribbons and \$125 each. The Community Action Program is the former County Life Program and is co-sponsored by the Cooperative Extension Service of West Virginia University, Monongahela Power Company and Upper Monongahela Valley Association.

**Stony Bottom**

A good while back I received a letter from Earl Bailey, of Covington Motor Company, Inc., Covington, Virginia, who formerly lived at Stony Bottom. He has a deed dated 1795 made in Augusta County and signed by Governor Brooke of Virginia, covering a tract of land on the Greenbrier River at Stony Bottom. He was under the impression, like most people, that the name Stony Bottom was a more recent name and that it had been called Driftwood in the early days.

According to post office records, the post office of Driftwood was established on May 6, 1886, with James Barnett as postmaster. It was discontinued May 15, 1902. The postoffice of Stony Bottom was established December 28, 1901, with Washington K. Moore as postmaster.

Driftwood was an appropriate name because the curve in the river caused the "drift" where logs, fence rails, etc. piled up. Stony Bottom is logical also for the flat bottoms are covered with stones. Because of its use in a deed in 1795 Stony Bottom is evidently the older name.

In April Ernie Ford saluted Stony Bottom on his television show and contacted the State Department of Commerce for some history. Hulett Smith dug up the fact that "Seldom Seen" was chosen for the name in 1880, then changed to Driftwood. Smith concluded that with his mentioning of the town maybe it could be renamed "Often Seen".

If anybody has any knowledge of the early use of the name Stony Bottom, we would be glad to hear it.
