Dr. Curry to Preach

The Reverend Doctor George Milburn Curry, a native of Hillsboro, will preach in the new sanctuary of the Trinity Methodist Church, Charleston, on Sunday morning, April 12, at 11:00 o'clock.

Trinity Church is located at 2626 Pennsylvania Avenue. (US 119, North) two miles from the Charles on city limits. The pastor of the Trinity Church is the Reverend Harold Thomas Elmore, a native of Seebert.

Dr. George M. Curry, Associate Publisher for the Methodist Publishing House in Nashville, Tennessee, since 1938, is a member of the West Virginia Annual Conference. He served the West Virginia Conference for twenty-seven years as a pastor and district superintendent. He has been a delegate to two General and two Jurisdictional Conferences.

Dr. Curry is a graduate of Hillsboro High School, West Virginia Institute of Technology and Candler School of Theology at Emory University. He received the Doctor of Divinity degree in 1952 from West Virginia Wesleyan College.
