### Cheat Mountain

The Rev. W. W. Sutton, now of Buckhannon, sends us the following write-up about the beginning of lumber operations on Cheat. Mr. Sutton will be 84 on March 21 and he wants to set the record straight on some items.

During the season of 1900 the Greenbrier Division of the C.&O. Railroad was finished as far as the new town of Cass and the mouth of Leatherbark Creek. The trains began to run, according to Rev. Wm. T. Price's account, about the 23rd of October. I had worked some around Cass in the fall and helped George Oliver on Deer Creek cut a large field of corn. Lester Burner, of near Durbin, who was cookeeing around among lumber jobs, told me that the first meal served in the new camp number 1 at Cass was served on the Fourth of July. I worked a few days on the dam they were trying to construct. It never served its intended purpose.

I am writing things here because I was a part of it and know whereof I speak. On the 7th of November I was taken for better or for worse by Sadie F. Ervin, the daughter of Preston C. Irvin and wife, Margaret Irvin. I knew then that I would have to get a steady job and make good.

Holidays over I headed for Cheat Mountain on the first day of January 1901, went to work for Boss Edward Hunter the next day, which was January 2. I ask Mr. Hunter if he could give me a job on skidways, and the next day was assigned with Henry Galford. We were working on the first skidway built on that mountain.

When I was climbing the mountain the afternoon of January 1, I met the first train of logs on trucks that came off that place. Jake Galford and his brother Allen had charge of the train. They had the job for several years. The first logs were sent down to the mill which was just getting started.

The West Virginia Spruce Lumber Company had a big contract to supply pulp timber for a big paper company at Covington, Virginia. Soon coal car gondolas were sent up to get logs to send to the paper mill, and that was some hard job to load into those gondolas—logs of all sizes, usually 16 feet long and less.

About the middle of February, 1901, the necessary complement of teams and men were on hand and the lumber job was in shape to carry on. I was working steadily at Camp Number 2, first camp on top of Cheat Mountain and observed everything, even the poor grub which the cook tried to feed us. While at this camp I worked with three of the Galford men, Henry, Charlie and George.

About September 1901 the smallpox epidemic broke out and they talked of putting the fellows in a pest house. I had Dr. Arbuckle vaccinate me, then picked up my extra shirts and walked off for home. Over near Green Bank I met Dr. J. P. Moomau and he advised

me what to do, and I did it and after I got well enough I went back to work.

Mr. Hunter kept promising us to be patient, they would get some larger flat cars to load for the pulp mill at Covington, but it was slow coming. When I went back to work following the Christmas holidays, I decided to see George Blackburn at Camp Four and let the old gondolas be awhile. That morning, January 1 1902, Blackburn saw me and asked me if I would head a cutting crew. I agreed. Some of the men who worked with us I shall name for the reader: Will Wooddell and Ed, his brother, from Elk; Dorsey McCarty, Amos Kelley, James M. Workman, and Charley Tacy, the big bear hunter that died recently—all good fellows. I have watched and noted the passing of many of them.

That three months, January to April 30, was bad winter. We waded snow sometimes waist deep. Morgan Rader was filing saws for Jud Tabor at Camp number Three. He told Tabor that he was going up to Blackburn's camp to see Wallace Sutton. He said we should have Sutton here. Mr. Tabor told him to bring him, and we'll put him to work in the morning.

By this time the company had larger flat cars on hand, cars that measured 35 feet in length, good substantial cars, air brakes and all, this was a delight compared to the first we used. By this time there were five Camps and plenty of men. The Cheat Mountain Operation was bustling with activity. By midsummer they brought in the steam loaders, which was some improvement over the old way but I learned the "Cant-hook" way and liked it.

Toward fall I began to plan to go to school to study for the ministry. We spent four years at Tennessee Wesleyan College. Upon returning and stopping at Cass I saw an old buddy and friend, Burl Adams, standing on the platform. He was one of the best buddies on loading logs I ever had. I saw him as we were breaking down logs from a skidway while loading get a bone broken below the knee of the left leg. There he was and one arm gone. He said, "Sutton, you see I have had some more bad luck." My heart ached for that old friend.

He told me one day that he had a sister in the Nunnery of the Roman Catholic Church. We all are human and inclined to genuine sympathy; may it ever be so.
