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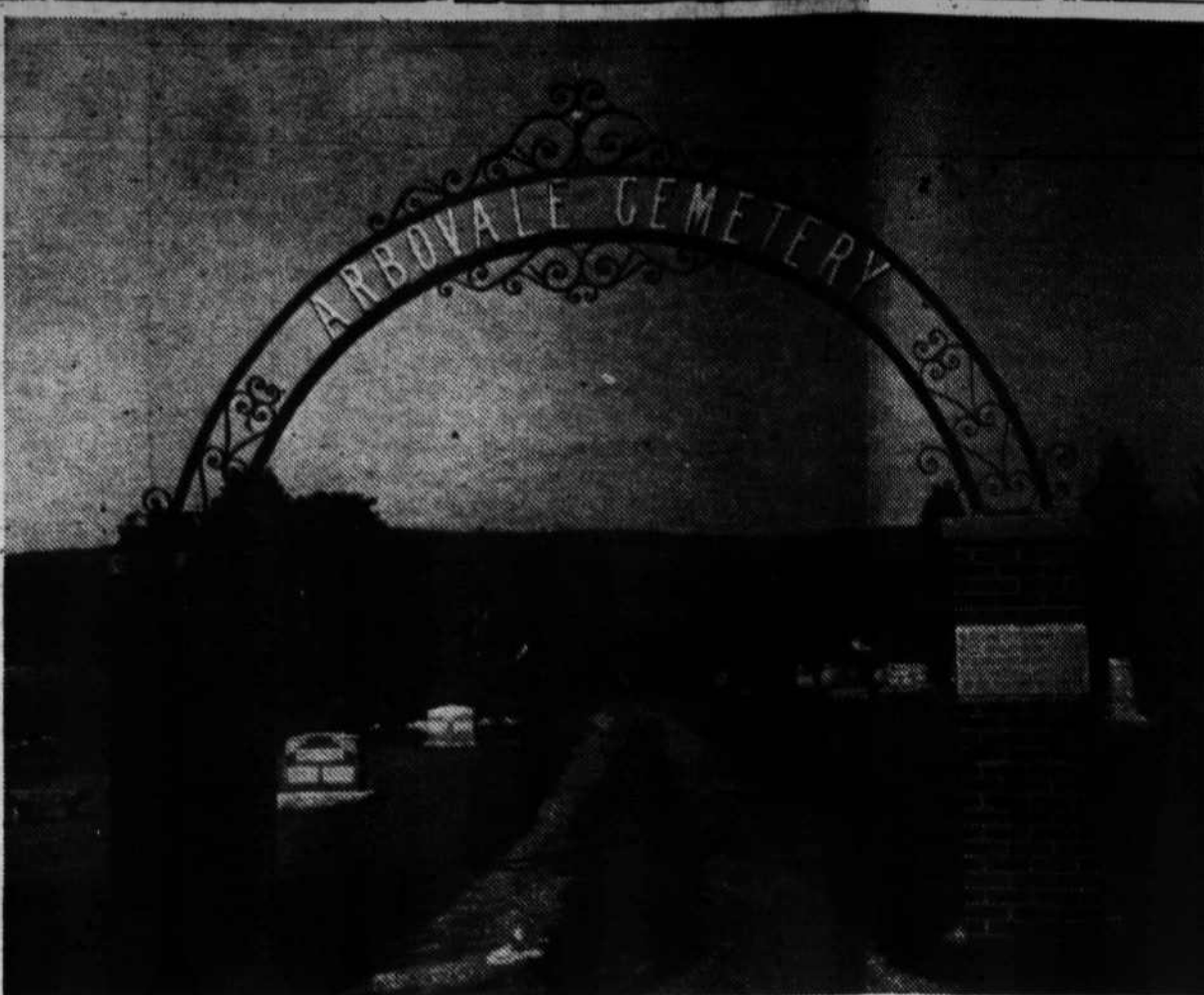
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Memorial Archway

This archway at the Arbovale Cemetery was erected "In memory of Clarence E. Flynn, whose unselfish devotion to the welfare of Pocahontas County has given him a lasting place in the hearts of our people." Mr. Flynn organized the Arbovale Cemetery Association on May 6, 1949, and was elected first president, Clarence Sheets vice-president; Mrs. Nettie Sheets, secretary; Roscoe Brown, treasurer. After the death of Mr. Flynn, April 19, 1956, Delbert Gillispie was elected president and continues to hold that office at this writing, with June Riley, secretary, and Mrs. Nettie Sheets, treasurer. The first trustees of the association were: Tilden L. Brown, Delbert Gillispie, W. Clyde Gillispie, Howard Hevener, and Adolphus Shears.

From the writings of Roscoe Brown, the oldest part of the cemetery was known as the yard of the Old Log Church, located S. W. of the Hanrahs lots. In the old Augusta County Land Grant Book we find a grant issued to James Rucker for 120 acres, this tract of land situated on Hospital Run in the month of June 1780. Bath County records show that William Dysard came into possession of this land September 7, 1800, then to Jacob Rumbaugh, thence to Jacob Gillispie 13 acres. This embraces the first addition. On June 4, 1812, Jacob Rumbaugh conveyed to James Tallman 107 acres. This embraces the old part. The title for the first part for the duration of 19 years rested in James Tallman until July 5, 1831. On that date he conveyed to Benjamin Tallman, George Burner and James Wooddell, trustees of the Deer Creek Union Congregation and their successors forever, by metes and bounds;



one acre, one road, and 31 poles. This lot was for the old Church and was called the Meeting House thereafter. Although the deed was made in 1831, the cemetery and church were there prior to that date, according to figures probably about the year 1804. Many traditions give the idea it was erected in Indian times. The old people used to say there were loop holes in the sides of the Meeting House for defense from the Indians. This was the first church erected in the eastern end of Pocahontas County, denomination—Methodist and Presbyterian. It was of medium size, stood East and West, fronting to the East. The pulpit was very high and the gallery was carried to the near center of the building, making a room for a congregation on the upper floor and one on the first floor. There was a little controversy over the Methodist Mourner's Bench, and the Presbyterian Anxious Seat. After the erection of Liberty Church, and the Methodist Church at Green Bank, people went back to hold camp meetings; the last one in 1858. When the Confederate soldiers were camped on Top Allegheny 1861, they came down and removed all the ceiling to ceiling winter cabins. The old church stood until the year 1866 when it was blown down by a windstorm. Adam Arbovale (for whom Arbovale was named) and his wife, Clarissa, were buried near the spot where the old church stood. That was the custom in those days. A tall marker with the name Cunningham stands approximately where the front door was located.

Another deed book records March 8, 1883, James Tallman Executor of Jacob Gillispie conveyed 13 acres to James K. Ryder; he to Rebecca Monroe; she to James W. Gillispie; he to Patrick Bruffey; he to James Bruffey; he to David Maupin; he on December 1, 1885 to Adam Arbogast 52 acres of the 120 acres. At his death this came into possession of Christopher and Rachel Arbogast, then to O. Glen Arbogast. The cemetery association purchased the addition on the South from Glen in 1954. Another addition on the West was purchased from the National Radio Astronomy Observatory in 1962. This last addition was previously owned by Moro Beard.

On April 20, 1952, Mr. Flynn set up a plan for a permanent maintenance fund. The Finance Committee must invest all money received from whatever source, in good securities; and that no portion of this fund shall be used, except the interest therefrom, and that all interest and dividends be used solely for upkeep and maintenance of the Arbovale Cemetery Fund.
