Dunmore—Road making and bridge building is progressing nicely—but Oh! that road between Dunmore and Frost. Wedding of Boyd Layton Campbell and Mary Maude Lockridge. Explanation of currency reform.

West Virginia appropriated \$75,000 for a suitable show at the Panama Exposition at San Francisco in 1915. However the state being a little low on funds the governor considered letting the appropriation lie in the treasury.

Deaths—Armenius Buzzard, 82. The Huntersville High News: enrollment—42; New principal Luther Flynn; Beautifying or Clean-up Day, October 10.

The following letter is from the Rev. John C. B. McLaughlin of Rehoboth, Maryland: A number of years ago, while my father, the late Dr. Henry W. McLaughlin, was still living, I asked him to recollect for me what he could recall his father having told him concerning his memories of his service as a Confederate soldier. I have three pages of typed notes as a result. The following is taken from these notes:

"Before he was 17, Andrew M. McLaughlin enlisted in a company of "mounted infantry" being raised for the Confederacy by Captain Jacob W. Marshall, (see Historical Sketches of Pocahontas County by William T. Price, pages 255 and 585). This unit was Company I of the 19th Virginia Cavalry and served under Captain Marshall...

"Andrew McLaughlin was named orderly sergeant of his company, and as such it was his duty to call the roll. He soon committed it to memory and would call the roll without reference to the paper...

It occurred to me that this bit of information might be of interest to you, in partial confirmation of the accuracy of the roster published by you recently, since it is stated that it is based on the recollections of Preston Harper and Andrew McLaughlin.

"By The President of the United States of America A Proclamation"

IT WAS ON APRIL 20, 1863, that President Abraham Lincoln signed the official proclamation putting in force the Act of Congress which made West Virginia the thirty-fifth State of the Union. He "declared and proclaimed" the Act to be in effect "from and after" 60 days from the date of the Proclamation's signing which made West Virginia's official birthday June 20.
