

"By The President of the United States of America A Proclamation"

T WAS ON APRIL 20, 1863, that President Abraham Lincoln signed the official proclamation putting in force the Act of Congress which made West Virginia the thirty-fifth State of the Union. He "declared and proclaimed" the Act to be in effect "from and after" 60 days from the date of the Proclamation's signing which made West Virginia's official birthday June 20.
