work was done by muscles of human beings and work animals. Energy for muscles came from food and fodder. Food and fod-
der caught the rays of the daily sunshine. They required acres of ground. Hence land had value as means to secure energy from the sun for work. The growing of foodstuffs and the

manual labor. In fact. the value of commodities was largely determined by the amount of labor necessary to produce them. This was relatively large. By thrift and economy goods
