## Thirty-five Grads Already On The Hill

### Large Number of Last Year's Class Already Transferred To Big U. T.

From information received by the registrar's office last Thursday, thirty-five of last year's sophomores have already had their credits transferred to Knoxville, one has had credits transferred to U. T. School of Nursing and fourteen of the graduates are teaching this year.

Five of last year's sophomores have enrolled at West Tennessee State Teachers College in Memphis, two have gone to Mississippi State College and three are now employed at the Junior College. Others are variously occupied.

The University of Tennessee Junior Vols, defending Mississippi Valley Conference champions, are gradually rounding in shape for their opening skirmish of the 1937 season next Friday night with Northwestern Mississippi on the local gridiron.

Forty candidates have been practicing for the past ten days on fundamentals and team offense. This year's club, while riddled by graduation, bids to be better than the average. The team is well supplied with punters, passers and adept receivers. The line will average around 170 pounds while the backs will tip the scales around 155 pounds.

The coaching staff will continue the Neyland system, which was introduced at the Junior College by Coach Derryberry three years ago.

The school authorities are glad to announce that the football schedule has been changed so that the games will be played on Friday night instead of Saturday afternoon. This was done to give the business men an opportunity to see the games.
