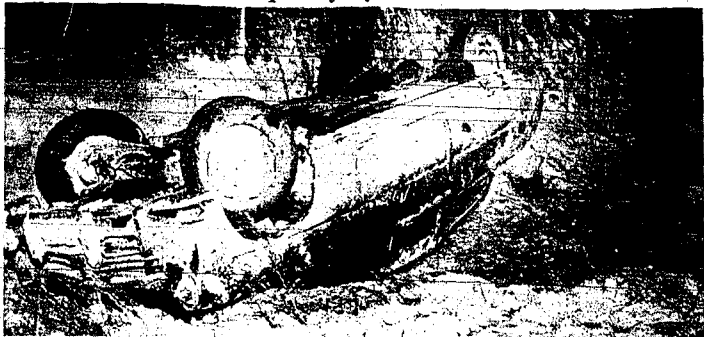

WE MUST NEVER FORGET

A remark we overheard the other day brought to our mind how casually we regard some of our great American immortals whose names are being hallowed in the great country in all the world.

It was Thursday, Feb. 22, and the one making the remark was a woman coming out of the postoffice with a large package she had in her arms.

"I might have known it was Washington's birthday," she said, "and that the postoffice would be closed."

This is not to criticize that particular woman, but because many of us would have done the same thing with about the same comment. But it does serve to remind us why great Americans like Washington were so important to us, to continue to close our post-offices on their birthdays.

PRaise for Gooding County

It's encouraging news that Gooding county has organized a Safety Council, primarily for the purpose of trying to reduce the number of traffic fatalities.

There's a crying need these days for action of this kind because Magic Valley's campaign against an ever-increasing toll of death and destruction in highway accidents has gotten off to a bad start so far in 1951.

For that reason, Gooding county is to be commended for its renewed determination to bring needless traffic deaths under greater control in that vicinity.

All the other counties in Magic Valley could well follow Gooding county's example. It should be apparent to everyone by now that in spite of all our efforts to date, even more drastic action will be necessary to check this alarming increase in highway tragedies.

So far this year there have been eight fatalities on Magic Valley's highways, compared with three such deaths for the same period in 1950.

At that rate there will be at least 60 killed on our highways before the end of the year, as compared with 43 during 1950, which was a record.

We repeat, as we have said so many times before, that's a challenge for all Magic Valley. All these lives are worth saving and it's up to every citizen in the valley to do its part.

Our law enforcement and court authorities and courts must continue to fight this menace with everything at their command and the general public must give these authorities every cooperation that has been evident up to now.

Idaho, we must remember, has the poorest record of any state in the union from the standpoint of traffic fatalities, a questionable indication of which we all should be ashamed.

This state had 73 more deaths in 1950 than in the previous year, with 238 persons killed on its streets and highways, compared to 1949. Traffic fatalities in Idaho increased 46 percent, while deaths on marked contrast to the 11 per cent average increase in the nation for 1950.

It's a condition that calls for drastic action, all up and down the line, without exception.

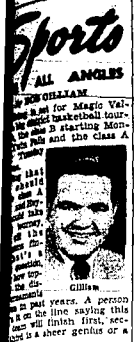

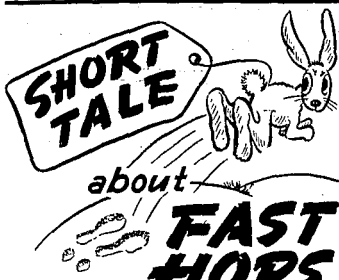

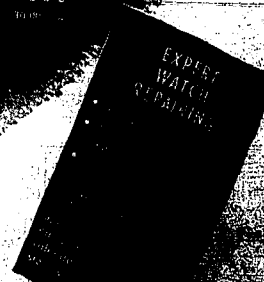

Fruit Express Firm to Build Big Ice Plant

Of interest to Magic Valley fruit growers and dealers is the announcement by Pacific Fruit Express company that the firm has started construction of a million dollar artificial ice plant at the Laramie, Wyo., refrigerator car facilities.

Plans for the project were announced by E. W. Blumner, vice president and general manager, Pacific Fruit Express in a recent joint meeting by Union Pacific and Southern Pacific railroads. Completion of the project is expected by early fall.

An important Pacific Fruit Express point on Union Pacific, the company since the war has constructed one of two of the world's largest double-deck icing platforms at Laramie. The other 100-car double deck icing platform is located at El Paso, Tex.

The new project includes the installation of refrigeration equipment in existing ice storage houses at Laramie and the erection of a one-story 86 by 180-foot reinforced concrete building to house modern ice manufacturing equipment. Newly designed ice delivery facilities for moving ice from storage rooms to the icing platform also will be installed.

The new plant will manufacture sufficient ice for the 70,000 refrigerator cars that halt at Laramie annually for reicing. The plant will have permanent storage space for 40,000 tons of ice and daily storage space for 800 tons.

Production capacity of the new plant is 400 tons daily. The company's ice requirements during the peak season in August and September exceed 1,000 tons daily.
