## Castro Halts Small Refugee Boats in Advance of Airlift

KEY WEST, Fla. (AP) — Cuban Prime Minister Fidel Castro halted small boat sailings as of midnight tonight — in advance of a refugee airlift — and the Coast Guard geared to help hundreds of Cubans expected to rush embarkation before the deadline. "They are on their way," a Coast Guard spokesman said. Waves 10 feet high were reported in the Florida Straits which separate Cuba from the United States.

## Helicopters Destroyed By Mortars

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — U.S. Marine patrols went on the hunt for the Viet Cong around Da Nang and Chu Lai today after Communist mortars and suicide squads destroyed 39 helicopters and two bombers in simultaneous attacks on the two Marine centers in central Viet Nam. Another 21 helicopters were damaged. The Marines reported they killed 39 guerrillas and suffered only light casualties during the two attacks just before midnight. It was the third sabotage raid on the Marine air and infantry complex on the coast of central Viet Nam.

# Woman Fights Mandatory Lunch Plan

**CHESTER, Pa. (UPI)**—Mrs. Charles C. Steward files a pack charge for her two children to eat at school and doesn't feel the school should pay for it. The school board is equally adamant that the children should eat in the cafeteria—**for 35 cents.**

The Steward children, Charlon Jr., 13, and Peggy, 8, were suspended for three days Tuesday because they brought lunch to the Chester Township School and failed to pay 35 cents for a cafeteria meal. Mrs. Steward filed Wednesday and will hire an attorney to fight the suspension.

Robert F. Russell, school board president, said the board recently adopted a policy giving four choices for participation in the school lunch program.

The choices were: Eat a cafeteria 35-cent lunch; lunch in the cafeteria and pay 35 cents anyway; eat lunch at home; be suspended.

"It's not that we can't pay 35 cents," Mrs. Steward said. "But the children should have the right to take their lunches without paying for food they don't even eat."

Russell said the board policy was adopted because to qualify for federal funds, total student participation was needed.

He took parents to task, saying, "I feel sorry for the children."

But Dr. Neal V. Musmanno, deputy superintendent of the state department of instruction, said Russell's interpretation of the federal requirement was "totally inadequate . . . grossly in error."

He said the requirement is only that lunches "be made available" to every student.

"We intend to fight this," Mrs. Steward said.

# Idaho News

**FINDING HOMES**  
**POCATELLO (AP)**—In the past two weeks the City of Pocatello has managed to find new homes for about 81 former residents of the Ross Park Zoo. They include about 25 chickens, 30 ducks and a goat.

The city is still trying to unload about a dozen chickens. The animals are being moved out of the zoo at the request of the Pocatello Zoological Society, which has been delegated by the city to manage and develop the zoo. The society does not want domestic animals to be in the same area as wild ones. The reasoning is that the domestic animals carry parasites which are harmful to the wild animals.

The goat and poultry was given to various rural residents in the area. Anyone wishing to claim any of the chickens still left may call at the municipal building.

**MEETING SCENE SET**  
**BOISE (UPI)**—Sun Vioy will be the scene of the 1965 National Press Women's convention, officials of the State Department of Commerce and Development were told Wednesday.

Idaho Press Women's Association president Ann Adams said dates for the convention will be June 17-23.

Mrs. Adams said she will soon appoint committees to plan the convention.

**NEGLIGENCE RULED**  
**GRANGEVILLE (AP)**—A coroner's jury ruled a Grampian, Pa., man negligent Wednesday in the accidental shooting of his brother-in-law in a big game hunting trip here Oct. 8.

Killed was Jefferson Thomas, 55, of Grampian. The coroner's jury ruled Harry C. Hutton, also of Grampian, negligent in failing to identify his target before shooting.

Hutton told authorities he was waiting for a wounded animal to work its way down a hillside and fired when he saw a black object step into the open.

Thomas, wearing a black jacket, was found dead less than 10 feet from where a moose he had wounded had died.

**WEISBERG BID IS LOW**  
**SPOKANE (AP)**—A Spokane construction firm's bid of \$2,148,782 is apparently the lowest received for construction of a dam on Mann Creek and other work, according to the Bureau of Reclamation.

The bureau said the bid—from Murphy Brothers of Spokane—was one of 11 received from as far away as Minnesota.

Work includes construction of an earth fill dam and realignment of 2.8 miles of Mann Creek and Monroe Roads through the dam's reservoir area.

**FINANCING DECIDED**  
**POCATELLO (AP)**—A committee of community leaders agreed at their initial meeting that construction of a new convention center and athletic stadium here could best be financed by bond issue.

The bulk of their work will be to decide how the bond issue should be organized and to investigate planning details of the proposed complex.

**RENEWAL RECOMMENDED**  
**POCATELLO (AP)**—A federal urban renewal official has predicted Pocatello's downtown area will steadily deteriorate if urban renewal steps are not taken.

"Physical deterioration cannot be ignored," said John Baldwin. "I predict the problem is going to get worse. And the downtown businessmen are the ones who are hurt when the shoppers start leaving."

He told Chamber of Commerce members here downtown merchants would lose their customers to shopping centers if they don't spruce up their business district.

**RESERVOIRS OVERSTORED**  
**IDAHO FALLS, Idaho (AP)**—Area reservoirs are still storing much more than they were a year ago, the water report of Henry C. Eagle, Snake River District watermaster, showed Wednesday.

Water content of area reservoirs in one foot with year ago comparisons showed Jackson Lake, 640,230 and 584,800; Grassy Lake, 8,640 and 10,399; Pallasades (usable) 1,144,000 and 800,800; Island Park 95,000 and 67,190; American Falls 1,001,000 and 462,000; and Lake Walcott, 88,780 and 90,200.

**TAKING BIDS**  
**BOISE (AP)**—The Bureau of Land Management announced Wednesday it is taking bids for plowing and seeding of government lands about eight and twelve miles Southwest and South of Oreana.

Wheatgrass seed will be furnished but the contractor must furnish labor, supervision, equipment and supplies, the bureau said. Bids will be opened at 1 p.m. Nov. 4, at the bureau's service center in Portland.

**BRIDGE CLOSED**  
**GRANGEVILLE, Idaho (AP)**—The Harper River bridge to the northeast of here has been closed to truck traffic for at least two days while engineers test damage from a logging truck mishap Wednesday.

Roy W. Jump, state maintenance engineer, said the top of a heavily loaded truck hit the main span on the bridge on State 12 over the South Fork of the Clearwater River.

Jump said the aged bridge is safe for lighter auto traffic but tests will be needed to determine if it still is safe for truck traffic.

**RAILROAD SUED**  
**BOISE (AP)**—Eighty Harcourt residents suing the Union Pacific Railroad for damage during flooding in 1962 and 1963, asked for more time Wednesday to answer a wealth of detail requested by the railroad.

The residents asked U. S. District Court to give them until Nov. 10 to answer the questions. They charge that location of railroad beds and tracks in the area aggravated damage to their property during the flooding.

The railroad has asked details on how that flooding compared to other years, if hydrology surveys were ever made, specific damage, specific location of damaged property and 41 other questions.

We tried it following the lead of Norma Bidwell, Canadian housewife who's been roasting while-rolling all summer.

Mrs. Bidwell, food editor of the Hamilton Spectator, said: "My husband scoffed the first time I handed him a three-pound foiled wrapped package of raw meat and said, 'We'll cook it under the hood.'"

## E. T. Waters Is Top Hope for Demo Post

**BOISE (AP)**—Boise businessman E. T. Waters has emerged as a top contender for interim state Democratic chairman when Floyd J. Walker's resignation becomes effective Saturday.

Four top Idaho Democrats have endorsed Waters' appointment to the interim position at a meeting of the State Democratic Central Committee Saturday afternoon.

The endorsements came on Wednesday from former State Chairman John Walters and George Greenfield, former National Committee woman, Mrs. Bert H. Miller and former State Treasurer Mrs. Myrtle Beatty.

Walters had been considered a possible candidate for the interim appointment. Other possibilities mentioned are Wayne Fuller, a Caldwell lawyer, and Charles Bilyeau of Pocatello, an Idaho State University faculty member.

But Fuller and Bilyeau are expected to wait and make their bids next spring for permanent state chairman to be selected by the state Democratic convention.

Walker has not denied reports he is resigning the party position to begin organizing a drive to put a Democrat in the governor's office in the 1968 elections.

There is speculation Walker hopes to organize a slate of candidates with himself running for governor.

But Walker denies he has decided his plans and says he will not run for any office "just for the exercise" — indicating that if he runs he will be convinced he has a good chance of winning.

## Stowaway Group Pushes Workshop for Handicapped

**BOISE (UPI)**—A committee to bring a workshop type industry for physically and mentally handicapped to Boise was formed Wednesday despite strong objections.

A group of 20 persons representing various governmental and charitable organizations voted to seek establishment of a "goodwill industry workshop" to train handicapped people in southwestern Idaho.

Salvation Army Maj. Edward Scripps voiced opposition to the plan. He said the organization would be in direct competition with the Salvation Army, which has done much of the same kind of rehabilitation in Boise for the past 70 years.

However, the meeting elected a committee headed by Rev. Dwight Williams of the Hillside Methodist Church.

About 100 handicapped persons who could not obtain regular employment in private industry would be used in the project.

The Idaho Department of Employment has said federal aid is available on a matching basis for the project.

## Quake Predicted For Denver Area

**DENVER (UPI)**—Maurice W. Major, professor of geophysics and a seismologist at Colorado School of Mines, predicted Wednesday the Denver area would have a relatively large earthquake.

Major, in a speech before the Denver Civitan Club, said it was just a matter of time and circumstances that big earthquakes go along with minor tremors.

He said the Denver area north-east of Denver had experienced several hundred quakes a year since the summer of 1952, and some months there were as many as 70.

### Varied Menus of Proposals Spice Tuesday Elections in Eight States

WASHINGTON (AP) — More than 50 proposals, ranging from a \$1-billion plan to fight water pollution in New York to a constitutional amendment to change the size of the Florida

state flag, spice next Tuesday's election menus in eight states. Florida voters will decide on 12 constitutional amendments, Texans on 10 and New Yorkers on 9 plus 4 statewide propositions. Referenda also will be held Tuesday in Kentucky, Maine, North Carolina, Ohio and Pennsylvania.

### Burley Police Planning for Halloween

BURLEY—This year on Halloween night as in years past the Burley Police Department will be out in full force, announced George E. Warrell, chief of police.

In addition to the regular force the department will be assisted by approximately 50 special officers in marked and unmarked cars, all radio equipped. Any acts of vandalism will be prosecuted in the courts, Warrell stated. There will be two judges on duty to deal with offenders.

The curfew will sound at 9:30 p.m. after which the officers have been instructed to bring in any violators. Anyone picked up on the curfew ordinance must have his parents come to the police station before he may be released.

"Halloween is no different than any other day when it comes to vandalism and violators will be prosecuted," Warrell said.

Motorists are asked to drive with extreme caution. Small children wearing Halloween masks sometimes do not see oncoming cars when crossing streets.

"Let's make this a safe and sane Halloween," Warrell urged.

Election officials in most states report little apparent voter interest even though the proposals involve hundreds of millions of dollars and affect taxes, schools, highways and medical care. Top election day interest is in the mayoral contest in New York City and governor races in New Jersey and Virginia.

One of the hottest fights is in Ohio over a proposal to raise the state sales tax from 3 to 4 per cent. Education forces sponsored the measure in order to increase state school aid. Opponents include retail merchants and labor unions.

Kentucky voters will decide the fate of the largest bond issue in the state's history — \$170 million of which \$139 million would go for highways. The issue may run into trouble as a result of substantial increases in property assessments effective Jan. 1.

Maine voters ballot on six separate bond issues which total \$27.5 million, mainly for educational institutions.

Other major monetary proposals include a \$200-million highway bond issue in North Carolina, a Texas proposal to increase state property taxes by 5 cents per \$100 valuation for college construction and three New York proposals, one a \$1-billion measure to finance a crash program against pollution of rivers and streams and the other two to extend the state's low-rent housing programs.

A number of the proposals would affect election laws.

A Florida amendment would permit non residents to vote for president and vice president if they were properly registered in their former state. Maine proposes to eliminate voting restrictions on paupers, and New York would call a constitutional convention in April 1967 on legislative reapportionment.

Texas is seeking to extend terms of the governor, other state officials and state representatives from two years to four years, while New York is attempting the same for state assemblymen and senators.

The Florida amendment would change the dimensions required by the state constitution to conform with the actual dimensions of the flags as made by manufacturers. Otherwise, Florida's state flag would be a different shape from most other flags.

## Society Head In Idaho Defends Unit

BOISE (AP)—An Idaho John Birch Society leader denied Wednesday members of the organization "fall into the category of deviant and undesirable citizens."

Jim Waite of Nampa took issue with an address by Gov. Robert E. Smylie to the Yale University Young Republican Club on Oct. 15. In the speech, the governor lumped the society with the Ku Klux Klan and the Communist Party as "extremists."

Smylie said Birch Society members could not "be followers of Robert Welch (founder and president of the society) and Republicans too."

Waite said he shared Smylie's concern about the "influence of the KKK and the Communist Party in the United States in American politics in either party."

But, he said, "the Birch Society does not support or oppose any candidate for office. We do not in any sense fall into the category of deviant and undesirable citizens. We believe in a government of laws rather than of men, in short, an adherence to the constitution of this republic."

## Bishops Are Proclaiming Five Decrees

VATICAN CITY (AP)—Pope Paul VI and the bishops of the Vatican Ecumenical Council proclaimed five decrees today. They included promises of a drastic overhaul of the government of the Roman Catholic Church and a new and friendlier approach to Jews and other non-Christians.

By almost unanimous vote the council gave final approval to the decrees, which brought to 10 the total number issued since the council first met in 1962. Six more remain to be enacted.

Pope Paul told the council assembled in St. Peter's that the decrees raised no question of changing the basic nature of the Church or reducing it to the level of secular culture.

"The question is rather to render the Church more capable of developing its mission of good in the renewed conditions of human society," the Pope said. "The Church is thinking, the Church is speaking, the Church is growing, the Church is building itself up."

He said the decrees created new obligations for Catholics and added that he hoped the consequences "would be salutary for souls and for the life of the Church of tomorrow."

The Pope said he hoped non-Catholic Christians would "wish to contemplate" the new decrees as a manifestation of his Church's "renovated faith."

He said he hoped for similar contemplation from non-Christians, especially Jews, whom he described as people "certainly not of reprobation or distrust, but of respect, love and hope."

## Johnson and Congress Don't See Eye-to-Eye on Violation

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson and Congress don't see eye-to-eye on what the President considers encroachment into his field, but no serious rupture in executive-legislative relations is expected to result.

The President's views were expressed Tuesday in a strongly worded statement preceding his approval of a \$2-billion rivers and harbors bill. The President didn't like a provision that could block appropriations for projects costing less than \$10 million unless they were specifically approved by Senate and House Public Works committees.

He reportedly construed it as an effort by a small group of congressmen on these committees to take to themselves the authority to say what projects should proceed, by retaining a veto power over them.

Congressional public works experts took an opposite view. They claimed the provision would expedite progress on smaller projects by not requiring them to be held back for omnibus bills which sometimes are four years apart. An anonymous but authoritative White House source said there was nothing personal in the President's attitude—that relations between him and the congressional committees were excellent.

Regardless of how well the system has worked out for other projects, the White House source said, "this administration takes a very strong stand on what it considers encroachment."

The President, he said, has no objection to Congress retaining a veto power on public works projects—as it now does on reorganization plans—but does not believe this power should be delegated to congressional committees.

A House Public Works Committee spokesman said: "What we were trying to do was to speed up work on some of these smaller projects. None of them, large or small, can be financed without authorization for an appropriation. This provision simply would be a delegation by Congress to two of its committees of the power of authorization. We are not going to quarrel with the President over procedure. We will work out some new language that all of us can live with."

Some days the success has been up to four and one-half birds per man. Tuesday it was three and one-half per hunter although it was a bad day for hunting. Overall we're very pleased. Mallard and Pintail shooting has been good but only over decoys."

He added a few geese are being taken occasionally but entirely on a hit and miss basis.

"We had four Trumpets in there the other day shooting over duck decoys. Five geese landed in the decoys and they got every one of them. That's been the biggest single incident so far," he concluded.

### Clarke Sets Two Records In Distances

GEELONG, Australia (UPI) — Ron Clarke, Australian record-smashing distance runner, added two more world records to his list Wednesday in the 20,000 meters and the one hour run.

Clarke, battling against cold, damp weather and his own "tight" legs, covered the 20,000 meters in 59 minutes, 22.7 seconds to break the previous record set by Bill Beattie of New Zealand at 59:28.6.

Clarke continued running to complete 12 miles, 1,808 yards, one foot and 10 inches in one hour, eclipsing the mark also established by Beattie at 11 miles, 963 yards. Beattie set both records at Auckland, Aug. 21, 1963.

"I thought the records were out of the question," Clarke revealed after the race on a grass track. "My muscles began to tighten. However, the encouragement of the crowd gave me enabled me to forget my legs. The damp, cold conditions probably caused the trouble."

Clarke, concluding a brilliant year, also holds the world record at three, six and 10 miles and at 5,000 and 10,000 meters.

"I feared at the outset that the unfavourable weather conditions would once again hamper my attempts despite the fact I felt very fit," said Clarke, who had failed in previous attempts at the records.

Clarke consistently turned in lap times of between 68 and 70 seconds for the first six miles. He ran again for most of the race, as has been customary in his recent tests.

### Sestak Is Key to Bills' Rush Defense

NEW YORK (AP) — It has been 16 games since the opposition scored a touchdown along the ground against the Buffalo Bills. One of the big reasons is the play of Tom Sestak, the Bills' big defensive tackle.

Sestak was at it again last Sunday, stopping the Denver Broncos when the chips were down. For his performance against the Broncos, the Associated Press named Sestak the Defensive Player of the Week in the American Football League.

In the first period of Sunday's game with Denver, Sestak blocked a six-yard field goal attempt by Gary Kroner. All day long it was Sestak bounding the ball carriers and the quarterback.

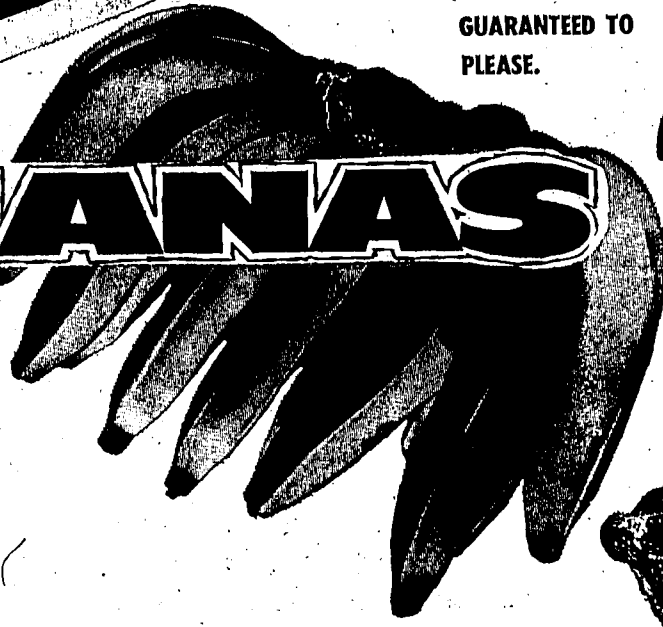

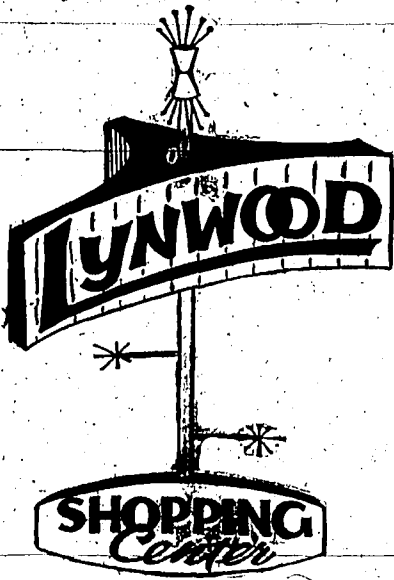

Common Grammatical Errors Are Discussed

Every man to his taste, I say  
And every rule has its rule to play.  
With every always use his, her, its,  
And save grammarians' needless fits.

"Every member of the Giants have their hearts set on meeting the Chicago Bears next winter."

That is a television sportscaster talking, a man whose knowledge of the attitude of the New York Giants football squad may get him an A-plus, but whose knowledge of grammar is zero-minus.

During political conventions, when radio and television put forward their best brains, this rule takes a pitiful beating: "Every delegate from the 50 states of the union has their minds made up at this point in the proceedings." This observation is a little better, grammatically, than the sportscaster's, so give him zero-plus.

Our rhyme states the rule and gives two examples. The first two lines are the examples and the third line is the rule.

Look at it this way, and the wisdom of the rule becomes clear. What word can you always supply after every? Single. Every (single) is singular. The word everyone even contains the word one. Now let us reconstruct what the sportscaster said:

"Every member (singular so far) of the Giants have (first mistake: should be has) their (second mistake: should be his) hearts (third mistake: one heart to a customer, so it should be heart) . . ."

The rest of the sentence is fine. The whole sentence should now read: "Every member of the Giants has his heart set on meeting the Chicago Bears next winter." And that political states of the Union has his mind made up."

In general, the word all and the word every mean the same thing. To be precise, however, the word all stresses the group, the collectivity; the word every stresses every single one that makes up the group. Even here, however, you can be trapped. Most people know the opening line of Caesar's military diary, his Gallic Wars: "All Gaul is divided into three parts." In this case the word all is singular because it modifies a singular noun, Gaul. But you most certainly have heard the likes of "All California have their eyes on their favorite son" (three mistakes) or "All California has their eyes on their favorite son" (two mistakes). It should be, as you know, "All California has its eyes on its favorite son."

A word, before we sum up this very simple rule, about television and radio broadcasters. It is only natural that these talented men will make a grammatical slip now and then. When they slip, it is invariably when they are talking without a script.

Newspapermen don't appear to slip, and that is because their material goes through editors and rewrites men who are on continual watch against spelling, grammatical and other kinds of errors. Radio and television people don't slip either after editors have gone over the script carefully before air time.

Getting back to the homework, however, the easiest way to avoid this most common of all grammatical pitfalls is to memorize the verse above.

Simply remember that every means each one of the whole. It is singular, and so every other part of the sentence that depends on every or refers back to every must be singular.

Nuclear Exposure Link Probed

WASHINGTON (AP) — Government scientists reported Wednesday night they are trying to determine if there is a link between nuclear fallout and preliminary evidence of unexplained wart-like formations in thyroid glands of young peo-

ple in two towns near above-ground test sites. The Public Health Service said one inquiry involves 70 children and youths at St. George, Utah, which has experienced the nation's record exposure to radioactive fallout from the Nevada atmospheric tests

in Nevada. The other involves 25 young-ster at Safford, Ariz., generally considered to be about average for the country from the standpoint of radiation exposure from the Nevada atmospheric tests.

St. George, in Utah's Washington County, is about 200 miles from the test site. Safford is several hundred miles farther away. Such above-ground tests are now banned by the limited test ban treaty. U.S. Surgeon General William H. Stewart cautioned at a news conference that it's not yet possible to assess the medical significance of the findings.

He said such nodules — if proved present — could be associated with several thyroid conditions, ranging from nontoxic goiter to malignant or benign tumors, and that such abnormalities can result from natural causes. But officials of the service told newsmen: "We're interested, we're concerned — and we are going to pursue the matter as fast as we can to find the meaning of it."

They also said the report is being issued at this time so that people in the two communities will "not get overly alarmed" once they realize that nodules can be associated with conditions other than cancer. FOR PAST-BELLING RESULTS USE TIMES-NEWS WANT ADS

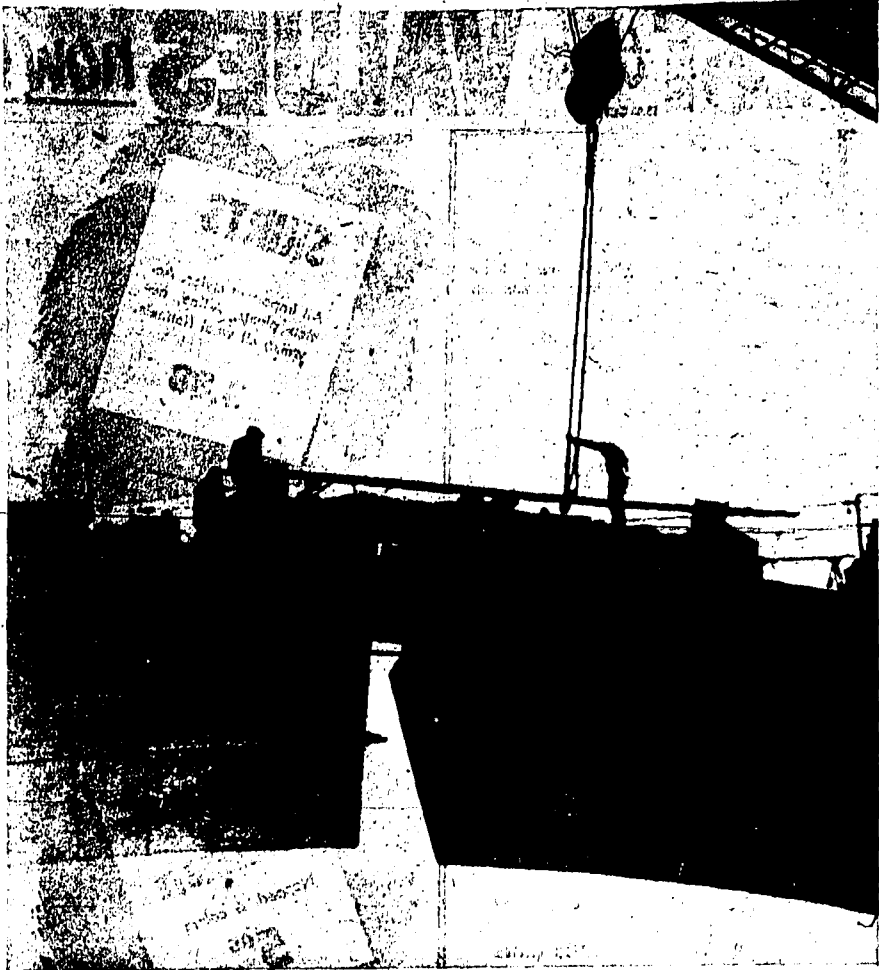

### Video Tape Aids Teachers And Students

STANFORD, Calif. (UPI) — Stanford University is giving prospective teachers a look at problems of the classroom by paying students to criticize their teaching performances.

It's all part of a program called "micro-teaching," which consists of giving trainees the opportunity to conduct classroom lectures for small groups of students. At the same time, the performance is recorded on video tape. When the lecture is over, the students rate the teacher's effectiveness, and the trainee's colleagues criticize the video tape. "Micro-teaching breaks down the complex art of teaching into

segments so that learning becomes easier for the beginner," said Dr. Dwight Allen, co-director of the project. The course is now in its fifth year. Comparisons in past years have shown that students who had participated in the program perform better as teachers with less hours of training than other groups receiving traditional instruction.

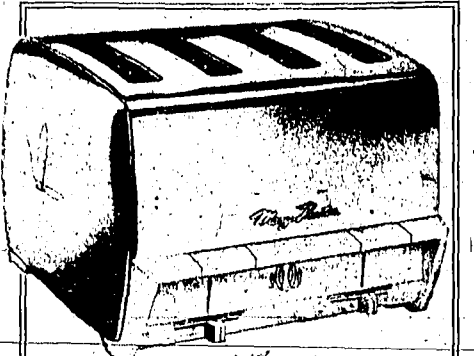

### Law Enforcement Unit to Give Ideas in 18 Months

HARRISBURG (AP) — Miss Genevieve Blatt reached between the knickknacks and piles of working folders on her desk and picked up a book on crime. The President has asked us to provide answers as to why the crime rate has increased so dramatically in recent years, the State's Secretary of Internal Affairs said.

Miss Blatt, who also sits on the State Pardons Board, was referring to the President's Commission on Law Enforcement and Administration of Justice, to which she has been appointed.

The commission has 18 members, all well versed in the problems of today's society.

For instance, there's the Mayor of New York, the president of Yale University, the chief of the San Francisco police force, a former U.S. Attorney General, and the executive director of the Urban League.

The commission met with President Johnson Sept. 8-9. Also present were U.S. Atty. Nicholas Katzenbach and FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover.

"As a member of the Pardons Board I must recognize capital punishment. But if I were a legislator, I'd vote to abolish it. It doesn't deter, and there are too many chances for error."

She said that by error, she meant the execution of an innocent person and the execution of some who are more guilty than others.

One of the toughest subjects the commission will face, Miss Blatt said, is that of race relations.

"Racial tensions are a fact of life that have to be recognized," she says. "There's an eternal problem of government to keep a balance between the rights of the individual and the rights of society. There is no right to violence."

Miss Blatt explained the panel has a life span of 18 months. "We will make recommendations as soon as we come up with them. We're not going to

wait 18 months before we do something."

### Time Lapse

## Trips Could Be Issue if Smylie Campaigns

BOISE (UPI) — More and more it appears that Gov. Robert E. Smylie's extensive travels will be an issue in the next campaign if, as expected, he seeks re-election.

There was a time when the chief executive used to bluster at the mention of his many trips outside the state of Idaho. While criticism of his "across the state" attitude toward mention of them is undergoing a change.

Smylie, and those who support him, now are taking a positive approach to discussing his trips. They are pointing out that in a modern society a governor no longer can be fenced in by the borders of his state.

Not only governors but many other state officials find it necessary to travel beyond the boundaries of a state on official and political business.

Some editorial writers recently have taken this tack—contending such travels help "put Idaho on the map"—in suggesting that Smylie's travels do not constitute a legitimate campaign issue.

Opponents of the governor, however, maintain that many of his trips not only are unnecessary but costly to the taxpayers of Idaho.

In connection with his forthcoming trip to Albuquerque, N. M., for the Western Republican Conference and a journey afterward to Mexico Smylie attempted to put to rest such charges.

A news release from the governor's office stated, "the trip will be made at absolutely no expense to the state of Idaho."

This statement took some statehouse observers by surprise. While they don't quibble with the governor that somebody else may be picking up the travel expense themselves they are unable to see how taxpayers are being spared additional expense.

Whenever the governor is out of state the lieutenant governor is acting chief executive and as acting governor, the lieutenant governor receives governor pay in addition to his own salary of \$100 a month. The traveling governor also gets a salary.

Smylie will be gone from Idaho for 18 days during November on his Albuquerque-Mexico City trip. Lt. Gov. William E. Dreyfuss will receive \$41.67 per day for each of those days. So will Smylie.

Additionally, Dreyfuss gets 10 cents per mile for travel to and from his home at Craigmont. The round trip, records show, is 480 miles so that's \$48 more in cost to the taxpayers.

The lieutenant governor also gets his meals and lodging while on duty in Boise as acting governor. There is no limit on the amount he may spend although records indicate Dreyfuss has been frugal in this regard.

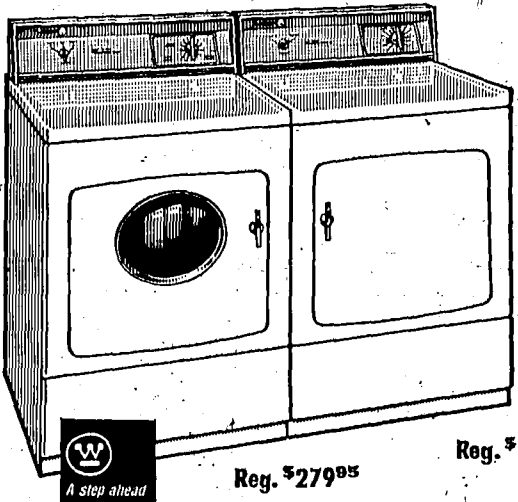

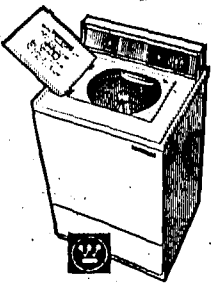

**Prepare for Halloween**

Food markets across the country are loaded to the hilt with fresh produce and sweets for the Halloween trade this weekend.

Halloween pumpkins may be smaller, wetter and more expensive this year. A rainy growing season in some areas retarded development.

Apples for bobbing, bribing, biting or baking are plentiful. So are bananas, oranges, grapes, lemons and grapefruit, pecans, peanuts and other treats needed to ward off the threats of the little goblins who will be ringing doorbells this weekend.

Production of potatoes, onions and cabbage is up about 20 percent this year, and there are big supplies of split peas. The prune supply is the best in years.

The California tomato crop is substantially larger than the pessimistic estimates last spring. Tomato juice prices, however, are up in some areas.

Meat production has been lower than last year, although it has inched up in recent weeks. Beef prices have been running higher than last year, and there may be a higher proportion of lower grades of beef at the markets in the next few months.

**Private Diets For Transfer To Viet Nam**

WORMS, Germany (AP)—A 205-pound U.S. Army private says he wants so badly to be transferred to Viet Nam that he has begun a hunger strike in hopes of speeding the paperwork.

Put. Robert J. Palmeri, 22, of Queens, N.Y., a draftee who only has been in the service for half a year, explained he felt the call to Viet Nam "because I am an American soldier."

Palmeri began his hunger strike Tuesday with the aim of calling attention of the "higher ups" to his request to serve any place in South Viet Nam "where I am useful."

He said he was not sure yet how long he would go on limiting to water.

The husky 6-footer expressed bitterness in an interview against American student demonstrations protesting U.S. involvement in the Viet Nam war.

"I resent very much what is happening around here," he said. "At my spokesman said transfer requests are sent up through the chain of command to the Department of the Army in Washington and this process can take up to three months."

Palmeri said this is not fast enough to note him. He arrived here Sept. 21 and was assigned to the 34th Transportation Battalion as a truck driver. He filed his transfer application on Oct. 7.

His battalion commander, Lt. Col. Andrew B. Wilko of Gary, Ind., said Palmeri's application was being handled "as rapidly as all the rest."

About half a dozen members of the battalion have requested such transfers.

Wilko told a reporter that he has not interfered with Palmeri's strike other than to direct that he be examined periodically by a physician.

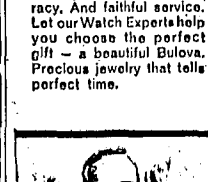
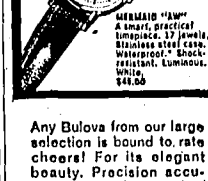
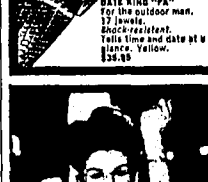

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# Studying Skills Can Be Taught Just Like Science

There are many skills involved in studying which can be taught just as science and math are taught. Too many students do not know the important techniques which would help them approach all their studies in an efficient and organized manner.

Many school systems attempt to teach these skills as a part of other subject areas. Listening is taught through the reading program. Observation is often involved with science. The use of a table of contents and index is included in the social studies course. When this approach is used, there is too of-

ten a lack of emphasis on the study skills themselves. The student is often unaware of the fact that a particular skill is involved. The result may well be a limited knowledge in the use of other appropriate situations. Study skills are applicable to all areas of learning. They are useful regardless of the particular subject matter. It would appear that greater emphasis should be given to the learning of such skills. There is sufficient material in this area so that it might be taught as a separate subject.

This is not to say that the use of those skills should be eliminated from other subjects. Act-

ally, this would be impossible as well as undesirable. Once a skill is taught, it is best reinforced and understood when it is involved in a useful exercise or operation.

It would seem that a student in the intermediate grades 4-6 should have developed a proficiency in study skills or at least should have been introduced to them. Perhaps, parents and teachers assume too much when they think that this has been done. Students who are having difficulty with their school work may need assistance in this area. Although problems appear to be related to a specific subject, further investigation might indicate a

general weakness in how to study.

Most children who receive tutoring receive it in particular

the student is an expert in shorthand. It is possible to take down key words and phrases. An outline form is an easy way to organize the notes.

This is only one example of many valuable study skills which should be taught. Such learning should not be left to chance. The study skills are too valuable a part of the learning process to be neglected.

What kinds of skills are we talking about? The techniques for taking notes on a lecture or discussion are very important. The information in the lecture is often the basis for future discussions and activities. It is necessary to review this material on many occasions including preparation for an exam. If notes are inadequate, and poorly taken this valuable material may not be available.

It is an impossible task to take down every word unless

## Injured Private: "Plastic Surgery Ain't too Bad Now"

BIEN HOA, Viet Nam (UPI)—Private First Class James Wright tried to talk but his efforts were drowned by the gurgling of his own blood.

He had been shot through the jaw with a machine gun.

The right side of his face resembled an Early American quilt. Scores of surgical stitches wove discolored patches of flesh together and crimson saliva ran from his gaping, wired mouth.

He had been a handsome kid once. Brush-headed, blue-eyed, fair of complexion. There was a girl back in Dallas, in fact, that thought he was just about the best-looking guy alive.

She wouldn't know him now.

"I guess" he had said when hit, "this ruins my beautiful smile."

Swathed in bloody sheets and clinging to life by a tracheotomy tube which allowed him to breathe through his throat, he wrote down how it happened on a pad of yellow paper. The grammar was faulty. He apologized for that.

"Can you make it out? I'm sorry, I never finished high school."

Jim Wright, 18, was a member of Company A when the 17503 (Alborne) Infantry was assigned to clear out an area in what is called War Zone D—a frightening countryside with the enemy under every rock.

As he wrote it: "We walked into an ambush. They (they Viet Cong) were in the trees and they opened up a .50-caliber machine gun which plinned our own I was scared real bad."

"After we got organized, we could see they had two .50s and two .30-caliber guns on us. We killed some of them in the trees and then my platoon started after the gun bunkers."

"But they were on a hill and the firepower was too much for us. Four of our guys got it right there. The rest of us stilled . . ."

The boy stopped writing and began to choke blood. It ran down his narrow chest before being blotted up with gauze.

"So then we regrouped," he went on, "and made another stab to get on the hill. About then I saw where one of the .30-calibers was positioned and I decided to rush it. I kept low and tried to make a small tar-

get, but they zeroed in on me. Next thing I know they hit me in the face with two slugs.

"But I didn't blink out. I knew exactly what was going on. And that machine gun was still firing up there. So, I just kept moving toward it."

"When I reached them, I dropped a hand grenade in their damn bunker. Our guys told me later I killed five of the people."

By the time they got to Jim Wright he had caught another bullet—a flesh wound in the side. In sum, he had lost two pints of blood, an undetermined number of teeth, some of his jawbone and part of a lip.

A terrible price.

But with it he purchased five enemy lives and, in part at least, a way out of hell for a company of American infantrymen.

"I ain't so bad off," he indicated. "I think they got maybe a dozen of our guys back there. So maybe I'm even lucky. At least I'm still alive."

He started to cough again and squeezed his eyes in pain.

" . . . and, anyway, they say plastic surgery ain't too bad now."
