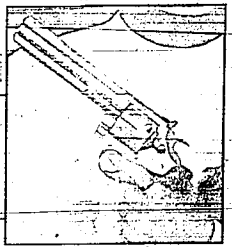

Bombing range battle may be over by the time it reaches Congress

WASHINGTON — As the political tug-of-war against military expansion in the West rages on, those fighting the proposed expansion of Idaho's Saylor Creek bombing range look to Congress as the final battleground.

But if history holds true, by the time the proposal reaches Washington, the war will long be over. Representatives from the Bureau of Land Management, congressional committees, the armed forces and opposition groups cannot recall a single instance in which

Congress rejected a request for public land by the military.

But the armed forces don't always get everything they want. In many cases, since the military gets some land, the acreage may be reduced in the face of public opposition.

"We've had some that have taken several years, but none that we've asked for that we haven't gotten," said Jack Rittenhouse, deputy for installations management for the secretary of the Air Force. "Where we have requested land I have not seen it ultimately being rejected."

For opponents to the Saylor Creek bombing range proposal — which the Air

Force wants to expand from a little more than 100,000 acres to 1.5 million acres. Congress' track record is spotty. Opponents say they're well aware that

they face an uphill struggle. But they say that as the military asks for more and more land, it could start losing its advantage in Congress.

"I think the climate in Washington is going to have to change real soon because of all the massive requests the military is making for land withdrawal," said Grace Burkowski, military projects director for Citizens' Alert, a Nevada military watchdog group. "The tide is turning."

Until now, most requests reviewed by Congress have been for renewal of leases for public lands already held by the military, according to a spokesman for the House subcommittee on National Parks

and Public Lands, which reviews such requests. But the military has begun requesting new tracts of land in Idaho, Montana, Nevada and Utah.

"What seems to be going on is a sizeable expansion of the land they want," said Jerry Sopher, a public lands expert with the Wilderness Society. "The problem is in a number of these cases their proposed expansions of land and an space conflict with very significant environmental or cultural values."

That conflict should lead to a change in Congress' reaction to military requests.

Amid parades, snow, America offers thanks

In a season of political turmoil abroad and natural disasters at home, Americans gathered to celebrate the bounty of the land on a Thanksgiving that began with the first snowstorm in the East and South.

Thousands of victims of Hurricane Hugo, Northern California's earthquake and tornadoes in the South found special reasons to give thanks as they joined with neighbors and family.

At Thanksgiving, "some people who are expecting sadness find joy and hope because people care," said Monroe Free, director of the Union Rescue Mission in Knoxville, Tenn.

"This will be a very special Thanksgiving," said President Bush in a Thanksgiving address that noted the changes in Eastern Europe.

But before our families sit down tomorrow, we will give thanks for yet another reason: Around the world tonight, new pilgrims are on a voyage to freedom and for many, said Bush, who is spending the holiday with his family at Camp David, Md.

Thanksgiving is also the sign that Christmas — and the frenzied shopping season, heralded by elaborate parades —

is ahead. High winds at Macy's 63rd annual Thanksgiving Day parade in New York grounded the larger-than-life Snoopy and Bugs Bunny balloons. The snow was the first to hit the parade since 1938.

"It's a white Thanksgiving!" cheered Nora Deledausky, 12, one of an estimated 1.8 million shivering spectators. About 55 million people also saw the parade on television.

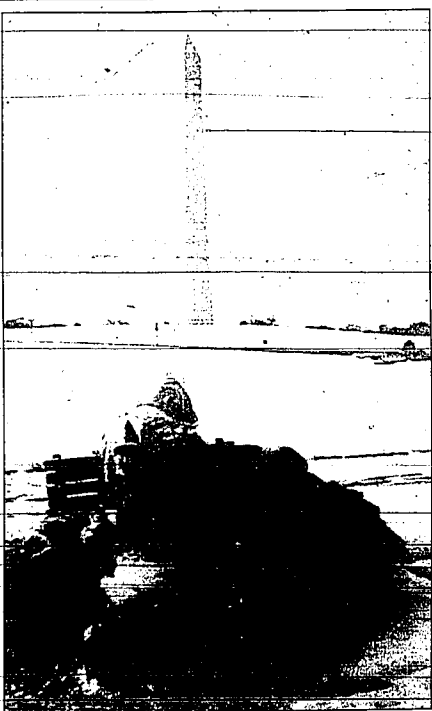
Despite record snowfall in Philadelphia, the 70th annual Thanksgiving Day parade came off, but not without a hitch. The 55-foot Humpty Dumpty balloon had a great fall when it was punctured by a light stand.

For five people, Thanksgiving was truly out of this world: Discovery's astronauts were celebrating in space with thermo-stabilized-turkey, freeze-dried vegetables and cranberry sauce.

In a fall of tornadoes, a hurricane and an earthquake, it perhaps was fitting that the first snowstorm hit the Northeast on Thanksgiving.

Up to 8 inches of snow fell on Cape Cod in Massachusetts, and 5 inches were reported at Snowshoe ski resort near Marlinton, W.Va. Baltimore residents woke up to their first white Thanksgiving since 1971.

Czechs through Prague square, demand reform

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia — About 400,000 people jammed Wenceslas Square on Thursday to demand democratic reforms, capping a week of unprecedented protest, but the military warned it stands ready to defend the achievements of socialism.

Vaclav Havel, the nation's leading dissident, told the largest rally yet to assemble in Prague: "We will never return to the old system of totalitarian rule."

Alexander Dubcek, the ousted crusader for reform, addressed tens of thousands at an anti-government rally in Bratislava, his hometown and the nation's second largest city, the state CTK news agency said.

The highly popular Dubcek led the "Prague Spring" reform movement, which was crushed by a Soviet-led invasion in 1968.

In an apparent reference to those events, he called for a renewal of society but warned protesters against making extreme demands that could have "tragic consequences."

Also Thursday, a top Communist official said the ruling party would discuss personnel changes in the leadership at a meeting of the of

Central Committee on Friday. In seven days of protests, demands have mounted for the resignation of the hard-line leadership.

Havel called on the nation's military and police forces, "to stand by the people for the first time."

But the military issued an entirely different message. "In a statement carried by CTK, it said, 'We reject the anarchy spread

by anti-socialist forces from within and without — We actively support the efforts of the Central Committee, the federal government and the majority of our working people."

It added it was "prepared to defend the achievements of socialism."

Among the top military leaders said to have endorsed the statement was Defense Minister Milan Vlachek.

Germans taste freedom in U.S. Army mess hall

WEST BERLIN — East Germans starting new lives on the western side of the Berlin Wall feasted on turkey, cranberry sauce and stuffing Thursday, joining American soldiers for a mess hall Thanksgiving dinner. "We're shutting our holiday with the East Germans," said Maj. Terrence Meehan, public relations officer for the Berlin Brigade. "We're extending the hand of friendship."

For dessert, besides pumpkin pie and hard candies, there were horns of plenty spilling over with apples, bananas, grapes and oranges set in front of a scale model of the

Brandenburg Gate behind a tiny graffiti-covered Berlin Wall.

"I never had such a nice dinner. I never saw such a variety of food," said Beate Chilla, who arrived Wednesday from East Berlin with her husband and their two young sons. "And everything's decorated so nicely for the children."

Paper napkins and tablecloths featuring orange and brown drawings of turkeys covered the mess hall tables at Andrews Barracks, a U.S. base on the southern outskirts of West Berlin.

Dozens of recent East German immigrants were bused from the city's Marienfelde reception camp to

Anti-drug flotilla studied

WASHINGTON — Defense Secretary Richard Cheney has not decided whether to accept a Navy proposal to deploy a flotilla off the coast of Colombia to catch drug traffickers, a Pentagon spokesman said Thursday.

Cheney has been briefed several times on a range of proposals put forward by the top U.S. military officials but has made no decisions on accepting any of their various suggestions, said spokesman Pete Williams.

The Los Angeles Times, citing an

anonymous source, reported in Thursday's edition that Cheney was "pretty positive" toward a Navy proposal to put an aircraft carrier battle group on a Marine amphibious task force off the Colombian coast.

"It's a done deal," according to one administration official quoted by the newspaper.

"It's got a done deal," Williams said when asked about the report.

Under the plan reported in the Times, the Navy would operate an aircraft carrier battle group of Marine amphibious task force off Colombia. Each group would be in position for one or two months.

Youngsters give up Santa easier than parents, counselor says

DALLAS — Kids give up Santa Claus more easily than their parents, says one Santa who ought to know. For seven years, Carl Anderson has taken a break from his counseling practice to play Santa. And this Kris Kringle earned a Ph.D. studying how children decide to stop believing in him.

Wide-eyed children this week watched as Anderson, 36, inspected the elaborate North Pole set at Dallas' NorthPark Center, where

he will spend the next month.

Santa, he said, teaches children an early lesson about giving, even though they are the recipients.

But when it's time to give up the belief in a jolly, old elf who travels to every house in the world on one magic night, children usually are ready, Anderson said. Children "fold us that more often they felt proud and happy and good, basically because they felt more adultlike," said Anderson, who in his research at the University of Texas three years ago

interviewed 75 9- to 12-year-olds and their parents.

"They react like differently. They feel like their baby is growing up and it's all going by too fast," he said.

Children reported that, as early as age 5, they begin doubting Santa Claus, Anderson said. By age 9, most have decided they don't believe in him. "Most kids reported at least going through two or three Christmas's of increasing doubt before they decided for themselves to no longer believe," he said. "So the first time

they heard on the schoolyard somebody say 'Santa's not real,' it didn't necessarily crush them at all."

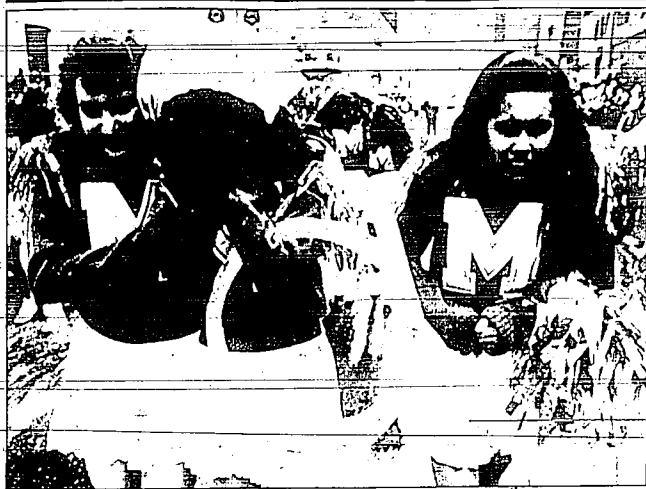
The biggest surprise of his research, Anderson said, was that children understood Santa as "something that linked generations, something that you go through initially as a child and part of one way and then later on you go through it again as a parent from the other side."

Older children often adopt a parental role by professing to believe in Santa to younger siblings, he said.

Anderson said there is no single way for children to learn Santa is a myth. He tells parents to try to find out what the child believes.

To children who declare Anderson is Santa, he gives a Santa Claus business card. "A response that keeps him from having to tell a lie."

"Often they'll give you an indication of what they're looking for," Anderson said. "They may be ... wanting to say 'Look, I'm old enough now. Let's put the candles on the table and get straight with this.'"

Record snowfall slows travel in the East to start the winter

Residents of much of the East woke up to a rare white Thanksgiving, with record amounts of snow causing traffic headaches for holiday travelers.

"We are certainly starting our winter season off with a bang," said Jim Woirner, a meteorologist in New York.

Snow fell overnight from Virginia to New England and was expected to end Thursday, although today was expected to be cold.

"All sorts of records, tons of records" were broken, said Harry Woodworth, a weather service meteorologist in Newark, N.J., where nearly 6 inches fell in less than 24 hours, breaking the Thanksgiving record of 4 inches set in 1958.

It was only the fifth time in 65 years that measurable snow fell in

Boston on the holiday. The snowfall was the heaviest on record for Thanksgiving there since 1925. New York City received its first white Thanksgiving in 51 years.

Most people already were at their Thanksgiving destinations by the time the snow hit, said Sgt. Dominick Evangelista of the Port Authority, which oversees Kennedy, La Guardia and Newark airports. There were delays at Bradley International Airport in Windsor Locks, Conn., but no cancellations.

No one was hurt in a seven-car pileup on an expressway in New York City, and Connecticut and New Hampshire police reported only minor accidents.

In the coastal town of Duxbury, Mass., police worked double-time to free families stuck in their cars.

"We can't even get the wheels out of the yard," said Patrolman Phil P. Thayer. "You come in to work on

Thanksgiving because it's part of the job, but getting caught by surprise like this sort of undermines morale. We're just gritting our teeth and trying to get through."

Thanksgiving Day high school football games were canceled in many communities. But parades went on in New York City and Philadelphia.

Six to 8 inches of snow fell along the southern New Jersey coast, and 3 to 8 inches were recorded in southern New England, where Cape Cod felt the brunt of the storm. Maryland and Delaware reported 4 to 6 inches of snow.

Up to 8 inches were recorded in two days in metropolitan New York.

A snowfall of 4.4 inches Thursday was a record for Nov. 23, breaking the 1897 record of 2.3. Thursday's snowfall was a record for Thanksgiving Day, breaking the 1938 mark of 3.9 inches.

Nation's retailers face tough sledding as Christmas nears

NEW YORK (AP) — Some of the biggest stores are in trouble. The economic expansion is looking creaky.

And social mores are calling for less, not more, conspicuous consumption.

Other than that, it's your typical post-Thanksgiving shopping season. Faced with some unusual challenges and predictions of a lackluster season, the nation's retailers are trying to add some sparkle to give Americans extra incentive to do their annual duty.

Consumers are likely to see more sales help behind store counters, special services and markdowns.

The retail industry's hopes are modest. Sales will grow just slightly more than inflation, rising by 5.5 percent after 1988's unexpected 12 percent gain, according to the National Retail Merchants Association.

"In highly competitive markets, retailers who don't jump on the price-cutting bandwagon will be left watching their customers go elsewhere."

Many companies face a cash crunch. Like Campana Corp., which is struggling to restructure its debts after buying up Allied and Federated department stores. The decision by struggling J.J. Hooker Corp. to liquidate six of its seven B. Altman & Co. stores threatens to start a price war in the Northwest.

"It's a tough environment. It's very competitive. The only thing that seem to make people want to spend money are sales or special events," said Rosalind Wells, chief economist of the National Retail Merchants Association. "That's the way that stores are generating business — by being promotional."

The situation will warm Christmas shoppers' hearts. "They should get more than inflation, rising by 5.5 percent after 1988's unexpected 12 percent gain, according to the National Retail Merchants Association."

Analyst Walter Loeb of Morgan

Stanley & Co. said he expects consumers to be the slow and shop around. "I think this is going to be a season of value-oriented buying," he said.

Not all retailers are filled with Yuletide cheer.

The outlook varies by region. Stores in the Northeast may be heading for a cheerless season, but merchants in faster growing Southwest states may have cause for celebration.

Retailers have a recurring nightmare: that season's shoppers will shy away from stores for fear of having to meet big bills later on.

It almost never comes to pass, people get sentimental around the holidays and tend to overspend.

But this year, consumers have had a hard time buying expensive goods for months, some of them because they've had it with heavy debt.

The most important reason for the slowdown in spending on costly durable goods is that the country has reached the prime pinching period of the economic cycle.

Demands have been met. Consumers already own VCRs, CD players, telegraphers and other long-lasting appliances.

Fire hits homes quake left

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Fire raged through five Victorian homes condemned after the Oct. 17 earthquake, drawing the attention of arson inspectors and causing the evacuation of 30 nearby residents.

Inspectors were investigating the fire, which raged for about three hours in the pre-dawn along a residential block that had been under an arson watch in the Mission District, said Fire Chief Fred Pivsel.

No one was injured, but five of the quake-damaged homes collapsed.

More than 130 firefighters using 26 pieces of equipment fought the flames, and evacuated about 30 residents on the block behind the fire, officials said.

Firefighters had difficulty attacking the blaze in the cracked and teetering homes, which were "red tagged," or condemned after the 7.1 magnitude earthquake that killed at least 67 people in Northern California.

Firefighters used cranes and other equipment to fight the fire.

Unreported AIDS cases may hide true situation

CHICAGO (AP) — AIDS cases, especially among blacks, have been grossly underreported in South Carolina and could be more numerous, nationwide than records indicate, researchers say.

Of 153 AIDS cases that should have been reported to South Carolina authorities from January 1986 through June 1987, 62 — or 40 percent — went unmentioned, according to a study in Friday's Journal of the American Medical Association.

"It underreporting to the degree observed in this study is widespread in the United States, current estimates regarding the extent of the epidemic should be viewed with caution," the researchers said.

"It is unclear if the present findings apply to other states, although it seems reasonable to assume that similar underreporting may exist elsewhere."

Researchers led by a physician with the state's Bureau of Preventive Health Services discovered the omissions by examining records of nearly 600,000 discharges from non-government hospitals in South Carolina.

They identified AIDS cases by matching symptoms reported on the discharge records with classification guidelines developed by the national Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta.

One of the researchers identified as AIDS were then compared with those reported to the state's AIDS case registry, said Dr. George Conway, an epidemiologist who led the study.

Ninety-one of the 153 individual cases, or 59.5 percent, were properly reported, the study found.

Conway said there is no way to calculate the extent of underreporting of AIDS cases.

Attendants abandon airline strike

MIAMI (AP) — Eastern flight attendants said Thursday they are dropping the strike. They are abandoning an 87-month-old strike, leaving the Machinists to negotiate.

Eastern said the workers won't necessarily get their jobs back.

"It is regrettable that they didn't come to this conclusion earlier," Eastern spokeswoman Karen Cerensak said. "They didn't, so we had to go out and hire permanent replacements."

After some late-night telephone conference calls Wednesday, the 6,000-member flight attendants union followed the Air Line Pilots Association in deciding to return to work while the 8,500-member Machinists union remained on strike.

"It was extremely difficult," said Maurice Carter, vice president of Transport Workers Union Local 523. "We were difficult because we wanted to be sure that we were doing what was best for our members and because we do believe in the principle of union solidarity."

The pilots union reached its decision after President Bush's 11-hour veto of a bill to create a congressional advisory commission on Eastern, which filed for Chapter 11 bankruptcy reorganization five days after the strike began March 4.

"We have essentially had an atomic bomb dropped on the working man... The working people have been betrayed by your president," Eastern pilot Michael Donovan said.

Charles E. Bryan, Machinists District 1100 president, said the union action was an effective setback but that the mechanics and other ground-service workers he leads can still wage an effective strike.

Members at the union local across the street from Eastern headquarters chanted "Strike! Strike! Strike!" late Wednesday.

Dan Hanson, an 11-year Machinist, said: "As long as Frank Lorenzo is at the helm, I'll never go back to work. There's no future with the man. The man doesn't treat his people right." Lorenzo is chairman of Eastern parent Texas Air Corp.

Fuel barge drifts near Valdez

JUNEAU, Alaska (AP) — An unmanned barge carrying 5 million gallons of jet fuel drifted for three hours near the site of the Exxon Valdez spill before a tug roped the vessel Thursday, the Coast Guard said.

At one point, the 300-foot barge drifted within 42 miles of a reef but did not run aground, Guard spokesman Ted French said.

The barge broke loose from a tug in stormy weather Tuesday afternoon 20 miles south of Cape St. Elias in the Gulf of Alaska, near the entrance to Prince William Sound.

Coast Guard officials said they do not know why the barge broke free.

A tug skipper reported the incident to the Coast Guard in Valdez.


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HUD scandal simmered long and low before reaching the national spotlight

One of the most popular phrases in the newspaper business is, "We had it." When a competitor beats you on a big story and your editor demands to know where you've been napping for the past few days you pull out an old clip, point to a vague phrase in the 67th paragraph and say, "Gee, boss, we had it."

As the scandal at the Housing and Urban Development Department continues to unfold, the conventional wisdom is that the press took an eight-year snooze while the HUD treasury was being raided, and that this was emblematic of the Fourth Estate's larger failure to spotlight much of the wrongdoing during the Reagan years.

The reality is far more interesting. As one of the few Washington reporters assigned to cover HUD as a regular beat from 1982 to 1984, I spent much time churning out stories of chicanery that in many ways foreshadowed the avalanche of sleaze to come. But most of these pieces were met with a collective yawn by the political and journalistic establishment — for reasons that help explain why some scandals permeate the national consciousness and others fade like yellowed newspaper files.

The scope of misfeasance and malfeasance ultimately revealed at HUD this year has surprised even me. But the most casual Washington Post reader in the early 1980s could have seen that the agency under Secretary Samuel R. Pierce Jr. was riven by incompetence, favoritism and influence-peddling. We may not have "had it" all, but we had a juicy chunk of it.

One assistant secretary resigned after ordering subordinates to type and proofread his privately

published book. The director of labor relations resigned after disclosures that he rarely enforced the labor laws. An undersecretary had to repay \$3,000 for improper use of government cars. A deputy undersecretary resigned after disclosures that he had earned \$145,000 by peddling books and tapes on how to get rich in real estate.

There was more. Several GOP insiders, including a top Reagan campaign aide, were given a no-bid contract to buy seven New York-area housing projects. The District of Columbia's calamitous Bates Street townhouse project led to several indictments. The Memphis housing agency used HUD money to speculate in risky, short-term bonds. Boston politicians used HUD grants to finance a small army of patronage.

When I left HUD beat in 1985, no one was assigned to take my place for the rest of the Reagan presidency. The job, to be honest, was fairly low on the career ladder. A big newspaper sometimes resembles a firehouse, and there were bigger blazes to battle. Congress and the Justice

Department had other priorities. There was nothing to "drive" the story.

The reason that the current HUD scandal exploded onto the nation's front pages can be summarized in two words: James Watt. The disclosure that the former interior secretary had made \$300,000 by placing a few phone calls to top HUD officials on a developer's behalf added a delicious element...hypocrisy...that helped the scandal reach a critical mass.

Had the greedy consultants been a bunch of nameless Joe Blows, I believe the HUD mess would have received far less coverage. Think for a moment: How many millions can you name in the huge savings-and-loans collapse?

I was recently stunned to see that my 1984 story about string-pulling for a HUD grant in Manchester, N.H., had been resurrected on the front page of the Boston Globe.

At the time, however, no one else ever bothered to read it.

The early HUD scandals never took center stage because they were largely overlooked by President Reagan's deep cutbacks in federally subsidized housing, a pocketbook issue that riveted the attention of most mayors and governors.

Only in 1989 does the HUD scandal dovetail neatly with the reigning political consensus that untold billions were lost or looted while Reagan was in the saddle.

Priorities a factor in education performance

The issue is the poor performance of high school grads relative to those in other nations. Why do we compare so poorly?

Studies are showing that broad societal priorities are a factor. In the United States, teen-agers are distracted by other influences that diminish their interest in school. Parents and other adults foster this dissuasion. Schooling today should be a deadly serious business, yet we trivialize it. We do not respect and reward our system or our teachers as much as citizens do in other lands where young people are becoming better educated. We'd better wake up.

U.S. needs to be weaned from 'power-high'

The thrill of exerting world power isn't all that's behind the formidable U.S. defense machine, but it's one factor in keeping it intact. In the next few years, unless U.S. leaders remain blind to warning signals, that power-high may have to come down.

One obvious signal, of course, is the cut in Soviet defense forces this year. Long promised by (Soviet President Mikhail S.) Gorbachev, it appears that a 1 percent cut has already occurred and that cuts will increase next year.

But the ledger has the same columns the world around. Soviets can't afford to wage the cold war any longer, and the United States can't either. Watching the Soviets face facts in red and black ink should prompt Americans to do the same.

It's hard to find a time in U.S. history when there were more urgent crises in housing and education. The drug trade has thrust an unprecedented challenge on our society.

Solving these will require wholesale budget changes that far exceed simply meeting Gramm-Rudman requirements: They demand nothing less than a revised set of national priorities.

At a time when Europeans are looking beyond immediate political changes and talking about long-range goals, so Americans should be assessing where we want to be in five years, and 10, and 20. Our world position then is likely to be determined by our domestic and economic health — at home.



Women far from being helpless victims in abortion issue

One casualty of the recent elections that should go unmentioned is the anti-abortion activists' portrayal of the American woman as helpless victim.

The strength of the abortion-rights vote, a reaffirmation of women's ability to make responsible decisions, has sent a powerful message to Republican politicians.

But there is also a message here for activists of the far who have sought similar advantage in portraying women and other subjects of organized concern as passive dupes of forces beyond their control.

The recent transformation in the image of the abortion patient in right-to-life ideology has been striking. No longer is she a selfish monster rejecting her true vocation of maternity; instead, in a view embraced by George Bush during his presidential campaign last year, she is a passive victim,

coerced or fooled by the new villain of the piece, the doctor.

The anti-abortion activist you are likely to see on TV these days is not an old-fashioned housewife or an austere man of the cloth, but a poised young female professional, speaking in quasi-feminist language. Yes, women have many problems in this society, but abortion is the wrong solution; instead, we need tougher laws to combat job discrimination, more generous maternity leave, more funds for day care. It's enough to send shivers down any right-wing spine.

And there are victims to display, women who have had an abortion, and repented.

What does one say to a woman who declares-as did, in a TV debate, Olivia Gans

of American Victims of Abortion — "My child died because of Roe v. Wade."

One can say, in all due respect — as did an opposing panelist — that to have an abortion was her own choice. To paraphrase the notorious National Rifle Association, Roe v. Wade does not terminate pregnancies; women terminate pregnancies.

"It was a choice I was forced to make," retorted Gans, with Orwellian logic, "because of the pressure of the abortionists."

No doubt women like Gans feel that they have been victimized by abortion. But if, no matter how worthy of compassion, does not justify grappling with their guilt by denying other women the right to make the same choice. There are probably quite a few women who regret their motherhood just as bitterly.

It is also possible that some doctors and

nurses in abortion clinics do apply more or less subtle pressure on some clients — probably not out of the dark venal motives alleged by the anti-abortionists but out of concern for what they perceive as the woman's own good. (Faced with a pregnant 14-year-old, perhaps a drug user, with no job or marriage prospects, wouldn't you if you were not against abortion in principle try to sway her toward it?)

However, such pressure is anything but the rule. At many clinics, 40 percent of women who come for counseling opt to carry their pregnancies to term.

Feminists rightly outraged at this portrayal of women as helpless things who need to be protected from their decisions undoubtedly fail to recognize their part in creating this demeaning female image.

Too much of their rhetoric has depicted

women as victims of male oppression, "conditioned" and "forced" — especially if they make choices unpalatable to the movement. An anti-pornography ordinance drafted by radical feminists included a section on "coercion into pornography."

Pro-choice forces need also to recognize that the further advanced a developing life is, the more uneasy most people feel about its termination. Feminists ought to do more to promote responsible use of contraception and a view of abortion as a last-resort safety net, not a routine form of birth control.

A million and a half accidents a year are just too many.

Swing of abortion pendulum gives Americans hard choices

WASHINGTON — In retrospect, it now appears that the Supreme Court pulled a fast one with the Webster decision.

By suggesting that the right to decide about abortion belongs to the people, through their legislatures, and not to the courts, the Supreme Court has forced the entire citizenry to think again about the meaning of the American experiment. Early results have been surprising.

For one thing, the balance of fear has shifted. Formerly, the Supreme court, in Roe v. Wade, had taken (improperly, most jurists think) an absolutist position. It permitted constitutional protections for the life of the unborn to be abridged, seemingly at will. Again, this was not the case for citizens who had qualms at one point or another were united in common protest. Among them were not many journalistic literati or Hollywood glitterati; they were mostly common people, and they won some

great victories.

After Webster, however, many diverse groups on the other side, no longer able to hide behind the absolutist Roe v. Wade, began to have the larger fear: that too many restrictions on abortion would be voted up. So they, in turn, have united politically.

With a quite brilliant tactical sense, moreover, this alliance began to display the conservative, anti-big-government rhetoric of Ronald Reagan and Thomas Jefferson. "Get the government off our backs," they began to shout; "Women, not big government, should decide."

Why should all citizens be concerned about the substance — and therefore the conduct — of this debate? Because what is at stake is an understanding of the American experiment itself. "We hold these truths to

be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness." When the fundamentals of what we stand for as a people are in question, all are threatened, but few more so than those concerned with public policy, whose entire way of life depends upon the peaceableness of this regime.

Within "the truths," we hold, moreover, there is a certain built-in tension: it is the direct collision of the right to liberty with the right to life. For those who hold that "the right to life" is not endowed in infants in the womb, that conflict dissolves liberty takes over. For others, the "right to life" is halted at "the right to life," and the latter takes over.

It is a great mistake to hold that this difference is solely "theological," a matter of "faith" (you have yours, I have mine). It involves, rather, a fundamental difference between the American experiment. Does that experiment entail an ever more inclusive advance in who may be entitled to rights: blacks, Indians, women, immigrants, the unborn? The "pro-life" forces at first had great strategic success in taking over the historically liberal (more inclusive) vision of

The advance of scientific evidence in recent years has also favored the right to life. There is now no scientific doubt that what is aborted is not "part of a woman's body." It has, rather, an autonomous genetic code of its own; it is an amenable, but in its natural — unless aborted — development. None of this is a matter of faith or theology.

Nonetheless, thanks to the Supreme Court, our whole people must now decide whether or not to grant this new individual human inclusive standing among Americans — entitled to the constitutional protection of its government. Our people must declare who exactly we will count as "one among us," or exempt from our protection.

For all this, the decision regarding the court will no longer permit us to escape this agony. The people must decide. In deciding this question, we decide what sort of people we intend to be. Beneath the passions all feel, beneath the slogans, beneath the turmoil, we the people must now stand before "the law of nature and nature's God," and say what we think we are. We will be passing judgment less on the unborn than on ourselves.

No sort of issue is more difficult for majorities to decide. To respect the rights of minorities whose profoundest judgment is

different from our own cannot be easy. Perhaps for this reason the Supreme Court's decision in Webster to trust the fundamental principles of federalism is safest for the republic.

Probably no one will be fully satisfied. Still, a tolerable peace for the consciences of all may be wrested from our national variety.

If we set out to slide the two most absolutist positions — the approximately 10 percent who believe that abortion should be legal under all circumstances and the approximately same number who believe it should be legal under none — polls show that the vast majority of Americans want liberty for abortion in some cases but respect for the life of the unborn in others. Slowly, by trial and error, and perhaps in a wide variety of local solutions, we should be able to arrive at a tolerable peace.

This peace, however, would also entail not asking citizens whose consciences would be violated to pay taxes to fund at public expense a practice they abhorred.

Those who believe in the morality of abortion should be willing to raise funds for it voluntarily, without coercing the consciences of their fellow citizens.

Thanksgiving eve speech quiets accusations of timid policies

WASHINGTON — President Bush's Thanksgiving-eve speech appears to have quieted criticism that he has been too timid in the face of changes in Eastern Europe while also reassuring those who feared a free-wheeling superpower summit next week.

"Though there will be no surprises sprung on our allies, we will miss no opportunity to expand freedom and enhance the peace," Bush said of his upcoming first meeting as president with Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev.

"And to those who question our

prudent pace, they must understand that a time of historic change is no time for recklessness," he said.

While praising Gorbachev and offering him the hand of partnership, Bush made clear his agenda for the Dec. 23 meeting with Gorbachev of the Mediterranean island of Malta: It is the Soviets, not Westerners who must keep moving.

He said the Kremlin "has made progress," but still had room to improve, urging Gorbachev to curtail military aid to Cuba and Nicaragua.

House Speaker Thomas S. Foley,

D.Wash., previously had criticized Bush as being "too detached and too calm, too relaxed about things that are truly exciting."

Foley recalled that when Solidarity leader Lech Walesa appeared last week before a joint meeting of Congress, "there was a sense of electricity in the chamber, of enthusiasm, and celebration and excitement."

After Bush's speech Wednesday night, Foley applauded the president for echoing those feelings.

"Democrats now expect the president to approach these historic issues with determination and prudence," Foley said on Cable News Network.

In his speech, Bush said he will seek Gorbachev's "assurance that this process of reform in Eastern Europe will continue."

He did not mention requests from the Soviets and Poland for American economic advice and assistance but did say he had sought a meeting with Gorbachev to forge "a new partnership."

"As we begin the next decade, I am reaching out to President Gorbachev, asking him to work with me to bring down the last barriers to a new world, with a new Europe, rising on the foundations of democracy," he said.

While some critics had focused on what they viewed as Bush's timidity,

others had expressed worries that his first meeting as president with Gorbachev might resemble the 1986 summit at Reykjavik, Iceland.

Unexpectedly, President Reagan and Gorbachev used that occasion to discuss eliminating their entire nuclear arsenals. In the end, they parted angrily over the U.S. Star Wars program.

Sen. Charles Robb, D-Va., said Bush "kept expectations about where they ought to be ...

"I was concerned at Reykjavik because it seemed to me that ... Gorbachev and President Reagan had somehow become involved in a higher stakes poker game than I thought they ought to be at that particular point," said Robb.

In his address, Bush said the events in Eastern Europe still have not removed "the invisible walls of suspicion ... doubt ... misunderstanding and miscalculation" between East and West.

This is a first meeting — a time for exploration. It is not a time for detailed arms control negotiations, best left for next year's summit," he said, referring to a meeting scheduled in the United States next spring or summer.

Reaffirming the need of the United States to move in step with its allies in the North Atlantic Treaty Organization, Bush said he would travel straight from Malabar NATO headquarters in Belgium.

Budget reductions may force military to re-think strategy

Navy faces cutback to pre-Reagan size

WASHINGTON — The Navy, in a step that would virtually erase the effects of the Reagan administration's naval build-up, has proposed reducing its fleet of aircraft carriers from 14 to 12 if the service is required to cut \$60 billion from its budget in three years, defense officials said.

In a meeting with Secretary of Defense Richard Cheney Tuesday, Trost warned that the smaller fleet would force the United States to revise its naval strategy.

The Navy has also proposed mothballing its four World War II-era battleships as part of a budget-cutting exercise. It said that if further reductions were demanded, it will have to consider the early retirement of its first nuclear-powered aircraft carrier, the Enterprise.

The Navy's proposal is part of a package of savings designed to cut \$180 billion from the Pentagon's 1992-1994 budget blueprint. Cheney, citing congressional pressure to reduce the deficit and a changed military situation in Eastern Europe, asked each branch of the military to draw up the contingency plans early last week.

Adm. Carlisle A.H. Trost, the chief of naval operations, has called aircraft carriers "the backbone of the Navy." The loss of two carriers would end the service's eight-year bid to build a fleet capable of carrying a war into Soviet harbors.

In issuing orders for the services to draw up budgetary contingency plans, Cheney did not tell the services what military missions they would be expected to accomplish. In the absence of such guidelines, Navy officials have said they were uncertain which of its forces to cut.

"You give the Navy a mission and they can tell you how many ships

troops — including a division in Europe. The Air Force has proposed slowing down production of the B-2 bombers and putting some B-52 bombers and Minuteman 2 missiles into early retirement.

Some lawmakers, reacting to news of Cheney's effort to recast the Pentagon's 1992-1994 budget blueprint, echoed the Navy's concern.

Strategy considerations have been "not nearly enough" of a factor in the current budget deliberations, Sen. John McCain, R-Ariz., said. "It seems to me a reevaluation of our roles, missions and commitments is necessary to find out what these national security issues are," McCain said. He thought Cheney should "start there and shape a defense establishment around that conclusion, instead of

(issuing) across-the-board proportional cuts to all three services."

McCain said the carriers are essential, but he added that if their mission focused primarily on regional disputes in the future, a fleet of 12 would probably be sufficient.

The details of the military services' proposals to Cheney's directive began surfacing as Cheney fought budget battles on several fronts. Under a compromise measure supported by the White House and key lawmakers, the Pentagon's 1990 budget now appears headed for reductions of about \$2.35 billion as a result of the Gramm-Rudman-Hollings deficit-reduction law.

At the same time, Cheney is haggling with Richard Darman, director of the White House Office of Management and Budget, over the size of the 1991 budget. Darman is seeking a reduction of \$10-20 billion from the Pentagon's planned \$311 billion budget submission.

Defense officials, meanwhile, defended Cheney's directive as a shock strategy designed to force fundamental decisions from cautious military services.

"By quickly forcing this out of the system, you begin to see what the services' priorities are," said Pentagon spokesman Pete Williams.

"Our feeling is that these are pretty honest attempts" by the services to respond to forthcoming budget reductions, he added.

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Discovery departs in night launch on secret defense mission

Crew launches secret payload before dinner

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — Discovery's astronauts reportedly put a spy satellite in orbit Thursday to complete the main task of their secret mission.

That was before they ate a Thanksgiving meal of irradiated turkey and freeze-dried vegetables.

There was no official confirmation from NASA or the Pentagon, but sources close to the project said the 2½-ton, \$300 million payload was released from the shuttle's cargo bay about 10 hours after Wednesday's dazzling nighttime liftoff.

The sources, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said the satellite was capable of monitoring Soviet missile tests and eavesdropping on military and diplomatic communications in the Soviet Union and other countries.

They had no information on how well the satellite was operating. A similar satellite was launched by a shuttle crew in 1985.

A military-imposed news blackout surrounding most of the flight will lift briefly Thursday evening when NASA announced that the shuttle would land Sunday night at Edwards Air Force Base, Calif.

"Mission Control" commentator Billie Deason said Discovery is scheduled to return to Earth at about 8:02 p.m. MST.

"The crew is doing well and the orbiter continues to perform satisfactorily," she said in the brief status report.

The five crew members, meanwhile, continued to whirl around the Earth, their words heard only in secure control centers in Houston and Sunnyvale, Calif.

Because of the nighttime launch, the astronauts were to have slept until

early afternoon EST, and then were to have celebrated Thanksgiving with a feast of turkey, vegetables and cranberry sauce.

With the satellite deployed, the crew could turn attention to experiments for the "Star Wars" missile defense system and other military projects.

The commander is Air Force Col. Frederick D. Gregory, and his crew is made up of Air Force Col. John Blaha, the pilot, and three mission specialists: Navy Capt. Manley Carter Jr., Staff Sgt. Masgrave and Kathryn C. Thornton.

A blazing 700-foot tail of engine fire illuminated the night as Discovery darted toward orbit Wednesday. The sky was so clear people at the launch site could see the exhaust for 7½ minutes, out to a distance of more than 600 miles.

"It was 100 times brighter than a star," said Glennia Milberg a TV reporter in Miami, 200 miles south of the launch center. "It looked like a Roman candle."

The shuttle's ascent provided a spectacular view over a large part of Florida, but clouds obscured the visibility for the rest of the Southeast.

It was the third after-dark liftoff in 32 shuttle missions, and the time was dictated by the secret cargo and its mission.

The satellite was to be maneuvered into a stationary orbit 22,300 miles above the equator, with line-of-sight to the Soviet Union, China, the Middle East, Africa and all of Europe.

The flight is the fifth shuttle mission dedicated solely to the military. The Pentagon said the secrecy is necessary to make it more difficult for the Soviets to track the shuttle and learn its purpose.

America struggles to spare ozone

Finding a substitute for CFCs will require refitting some industries

WASHINGTON (AP) — General Motors is trying to stuff a bigger air conditioner into its cars, while American Telephone & Telegraph is revising decades-old assembly line practices.

The changes come as industry, under pressure from government and environmentalists, seeks to eliminate the use of chlorofluorocarbons, the "one-time wonder" chemical that has been destroying the Earth's ozone layer.

But the task is more complicated than simply replacing an old chemical with a "new one," government and industry experts say.

"The transition is going to take time. We're talking about retrofitting not one industry, but several industries," says F.A. (Tony) Vogelsberg, environmental manager for the Freon Division at Du Pont, a major producer of CFCs.

CFCs, discovered in 1928, help cool houses in the summer and keep them warm in the winter. They are used to make the foam cushions on couches, in pillows — even in stuffed toys.

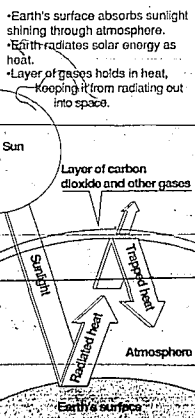
Without them, refrigerators would not cool; radios, televisions, stereos or home computers might not work as well; and items from coaxial cables to mailed Christmas gifts might not have as much packaging protection.

But CFCs also have a dark side: When they float 10 to 30 miles above the Earth to the stratosphere, their chlorine component eats away at the ozone shield that protects against the sun's cancer-causing ultraviolet rays.

Industrial nations want to ban all CFC production within the next decade. But while a half-dozen or more replacements are under study, they all have some drawbacks and no single substitute is expected to be found.

"I don't think there's going to be a substitute that is going to be given an A-plus on all [areas of concern],"

said Eileen Clausen, director of atmospheric and indoor air programs at the Environmental Protection Agency. "We're going to have to make some tradeoffs."

The EPA is examining the array of substitutes, mainly a family of chemicals called HCFCs, to determine whether they are toxic or pose other health concerns and how significantly they harm the environment. The HCFCs also deplete ozone but much less severely.

"We clearly do not want to blunder along and create a new health or environmental problem

while solving the ones that we targeted," said Charles Elkins, whose EPA office is reviewing the potential toxicity of some CFC substitutes.

Every year more than 2 billion pounds of CFCs are produced worldwide, a third of them in the United States.

The United States banned use of the chemical in aerosol cans in 1978, four years after the first concerns about the ozone layer were raised. Still, the operation of more than \$135 billion worth of equipment nationwide is dependent on CFCs.

Industry turned to CFCs because they do not burn or corrode metal, pose no direct health hazards to workers and hold heat and cold, making them ideal insulators.

That was before their threat to the ozone layer was understood.

Half of the ozone over Antarctica was destroyed during September and October 1987, causing a hole in the Earth's protective shield that closes and reappears with the seasons. Severe destruction of the ozone layer is believed to be occurring over the South Pole again this year, according to scientists. They say the conditions for ozone destruction are present over the Arctic, although no massive loss of ozone has been observed there.

Several large corporations have announced plans to end their reliance on CFCs, some by the early 1990s. These include such giants as AT&T, IBM, Boeing and General Electric.

"We have used CFC solvents and cleaners for so long they're almost ingrained in the manufacturing process," says David Chittick, vice president for environment and safety at AT&T. Nevertheless, AT&T hopes to end all uses of CFCs by 1994.

The major automakers are developing substitutes and are designing new air conditioning units to accommodate the changeover, probably in the mid-1990s.

But the new air conditioners will

be less energy efficient and require larger compressors, experts say. "We feel we can do it without any dramatic effects on the look or design of the car. It's going to be difficult though," says Tom Simonetti, a GM spokesman.

Congress is considering legislation calling for the elimination of CFCs by the year 2000 and at least 20 states are reviewing proposals aimed at curbing CFC pollution. Vermont has banned the use of CFCs in auto air conditioners after the 1994.

Du Pont has spent more than \$100 million on research for CFC substitutes and estimates it will spend as much as \$1 billion to build production plants and to cover other costs during a 10-year transition period. ICI Americas, another major manufacturer, also has spent \$100 million in CFC replacement research.

ICI recently announced plans to begin production of a substitute cooling agent by 1992 at a new Louisiana plant.

But developing of substitute chemicals will not be enough. As much as 30 percent of today's CFC demand will have to be eliminated by conservation and recycling, government and industry experts say. Major appliance manufacturers as well as automakers recently have supplied their repair shops with equipment to capture CFCs rather than let the old coolant vent into the air.

But EPA and industry officials acknowledge that routine venting of old CFCs is still widespread.

Shift to new manufacturing procedures or altogether new technology could account for a 30 percent reduction in CFC demand, especially in the electronics industry, the experts say.

But some critics say that industry is slow to accept new technology. "What we're facing is inertia," says Marc Goldberg of Cryodynamics, a New Jersey-based company that is producing a refrigeration system using helium as a cooling agent. The system is being marketed primarily for commercial uses. The major automakers have expressed little interest.

5th body discovered in murder case

CHILLICOTHE, Mo. (AP) — A corpse weighed down with a concrete block was pulled from a well on a farm, bringing to five the number of bodies discovered in a murder investigation focusing on an elderly couple.

The body taken from the 28-foot well near Ludlow on Wednesday was that of a man 25 to 30 years old, but the identity and cause of death were not immediately known, the Livingston County coroner's office said.

The discovery came in the seventh week of an investigation into the disappearance of drifters hired to work for Ray and Eyce Copeland, a farm couple from nearby Mooresville. Copeland is 75, his wife 68.

12 workers hurt in oil rig explosion

GALVESTON, Texas (AP) — An explosion on an oil rig in the Gulf of Mexico early Thursday injured 12 workers, one seriously, authorities said.

"Everything's secure, there's no blowout, there's no pollution, anything like that," said Marshall Ballard, president of Penrod Drilling Co. "There's no one missing, there's no one unaccounted for, there's no one dead, there's no fire."

The workers were taken by helicopter to John Sealy Hospital in Galveston. Seven workers were treated and released and four were listed in fair condition with cuts

and burns, hospital spokesman Ritek Smith said. One was listed in serious condition.

Captain-Marvel-comic-creator dies

GAINESVILLE, Fla. (AP) — Charles Beck, the comic book artist who created Captain Marvel, the superhero who came to life at the word "Shazam," has died. He was 79.

Beck, who died Wednesday at Shands Hospital, first drew the "world's mightiest mortal" nearly 50 years ago.

Marines call off search for lost crew

WASHINGTON (AP) — Both crew members aboard a carrier-based Marine helicopter that crashed and sank in the Mediterranean Sea during a night exercise were declared dead Thursday and the Navy and Marine Corps called off a 20-hour search for them.

The search for the AH-1T Cobra helicopter and its pilot and co-pilot was called off at 10 a.m. EST Thursday, said Capt. Elizabeth Kerstens, a Marine Corps spokeswoman.

Capt. Kerstens said the cause of the crash was not immediately known but that an investigation into it has begun.

The pilot was identified as Capt. Todd O. Travis, 29, of Glasgow, Ky.; and the co-pilot-gunner was Capt. Michael W. Vidusek, 28, of Naperville, Ill.

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Soviets spend billions on huge aid program for Afghanistan

KABUL, Afghanistan (AP) — The Soviet Union is conducting one of the largest aid programs in its history to support the guerrillas in Kabul, transporting billions of dollars in weapons, food and fuel to the war-torn nation.

Beginning at least one year before the Red Army withdrew in February 1989, the operation has brought hundreds of thousands of tons of commodities to Afghanistan, the state-run press has reported.

An additional \$3 billion in military

aid, including advanced weapons, is supplied annually, Eastern European diplomats said.

The United States gives the anti-government guerrillas an estimated \$500 million worth of arms a year. "If we didn't have food from the Soviet Union, we would starve," says Massuma Esmaty Wardak, president of the Afghanistan Women's Council. "We have no one else to turn to."

The massive operation indicates the commitment Moscow has made to the Kabul government, which came to

power in a bloody Communist coup in 1978. Soviet troops arrived the following year to prop up the falling Marxist regime.

After the Red Army ended its decade-long military intervention in February, Western diplomats predicted a quick victory for the guerrillas. But Kabul didn't fall. The rebels failed to unite, and Soviet aid gave the government the firepower and food it needed.

"The West underestimated the Soviet commitment. Everyone thought

the Red Army was retreating and had lost the war," said one diplomat, who has been counting transport planes and trucks for the past nine months. "Only now do we know how serious the Russians really were."

For their aid, the Soviets get a phantasmagorical government in its southern border that helps offset neighboring Iran's Islamic fundamentalism and Pakistan's pro-Americanism.

In late October, the Daily Payam, official organ of the ruling People's Democratic Party of Afghanistan,

published an unusually detailed account of Soviet aid.

From February to August, it said, 266,544 metric tons of Soviet goods crossed through the border town of Hayratan.

Among the goods, more than 39,000 tons of fuel, 82,000 tons of wheat, 1,000 tons of cooking oil, 900 tons of sugar and 540 tons of flour rolled into Afghanistan on more than 21,000 Soviet trucks, the newspaper said.

The United Nations says another 220,000 tons of Soviet-supplied flour,

some of it purchased from the United States and Australia, is in the pipeline.

Also since February, 168,750 tons of goods have arrived in Kabul aboard 6,750 Soviet transport planes, diplomats said.

Diplomats estimated that only recently the airlift contained 25 percent weapons and 35 percent food. But Afghan officials reportedly have asked that the food portion be raised to 40 percent in view of the coming winter and the country's serious transportation problems.

Thatcher, Bush to talk during visit

LONDON (AP) — In talks with President Bush today, Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher likely will have serious support for her view that however dramatically Europe is changing, the NATO alliance should not lower its guard.

Mrs. Thatcher visits the United States once a year on the average, and this 24-hour trip was arranged weeks before the political picture in Europe was transformed by the opening of the Berlin Wall.

But the visit to Camp David now takes on added significance, given the West's need to formulate a united response to the changes. It comes eight days before Bush's summit with Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev. A summit of the 12-nation European Economic Community states follows on Dec. 8.

Mrs. Thatcher told reporters as she left for the airport: "I'm delighted with his (Bush's) speech last night."

She was referring to Bush's televised address to the nation Wednesday night in which he praised Gorbachev's reforms, urged him to "bring down the last barriers" and end the Cold War, and promised to support the reforms in Eastern Europe without taking adversarial advantage of them.

After several meetings with Gorbachev, Mrs. Thatcher is effusive in her praise, lauding him as a reformer of courage and vision. But she is also cautious about his chances of completing the revolution he has unleashed.

Therefore, she continues to advocate a strong NATO and opposes any changes in the present lineup of NATO and Warsaw Pact forces, lest they become ammunition for Gorbachev's hard-line foes.

She reiterated this stance in her legislative program for 1990, which pledged Britain to uphold its NATO obligations and "sustain the United Kingdom's contribution to Western defense by maintaining adequate and effective nuclear and conventional forces."

Giving her view of European events, she said: "Times of great change are times of great uncertainty, even danger."

Red Square pilot jailed after stabbing

HAMBURG, West Germany (AP) — Mathias Rust, imprisoned for more than a year after flying a single-engine plane past Soviet air defenses and into Moscow's Red Square, was jailed Tuesday after the stabbing of a young nurse.

Rust, 21, turned himself in more than two hours after fleeing the Hamburg-area hospital where he was working as an orderly under the federal Civilian Service, a pacifist alternative to compulsory military service in West Germany, police said.

According to police, Rust pulled an 18-year-old student nurse into a hospital changing room, and after locking the door behind them attempted to rape her.

When she resisted, she was stabbed twice in the stomach, police said.

Rust fled the hospital after 2 p.m. but called police at 4:30 p.m. and was then taken into custody. He was not immediately charged.

Authorities declined to provide other details.

Bomb kills guerrilla

SANTIAGO, Chile (AP) — A 16-year-old who was said to be a leftist guerrilla was killed by the bomb he was planting at a municipal building, police said Thursday.

The young man was slightly injured in the Wednesday night explosion in Conchalí, a working class district in northern Santiago.

The injured man had been one of the dead youth were members of the Manuel Rodriguez Patriotic Front, a leftist urban guerrilla band.

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Island nation of Malta readies for U.S.-Soviet summit meeting

VALLETTA, Malta — Like many entrepreneurs on this minnow of a Mediterranean island, Michael Z. Tabona intends to make the most of next week's unprecedented visit from the superpowers.

Along with packing his chain of hotels and restaurants with visiting officials and journalists, Tabona plans to rent out his small fleet of photo-bottom boats to television and photo crews wanting a closer look at Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev and President Bush when they meet at sea Dec. 2-3.

"The way," he says with a shy smile, "they can see the Libyan submarines underneath."

His joking proposal gets a big laugh from a table of fellow businessmen. Even so, he's quick to add, "Of course, Libya doesn't really have any subs, does it?"

It does, actually, and Tabona inadvertently reveals a concern of many Maltese that the long shadow of their willful, unpredictable neighbor to the south, Libyan Col. Muammar Gadhafi, will somehow cross their rare day in the sun.

Christian Democrat Prime Minister Eddie Fenech Adami, who has cultivated American friendship



and evasions, Malta's rightful place as within Western Europe, takes pains to show how he has loosened political and military ties with Libya since taking over from the Socialists in May 1987.

Yet the Libyan question won't go away, and officials here appear wearily resigned to the fact, especially when up to 1,800 journalists are expected to descend for the summit. Complicating

matters is the leftist opposition's invitation to a Libyan "peace delegation" to join its parade of nuclear warships like the ones on which Bush and Gorbachev will meet.

Few observers expect any overt action from Gadhafi — or anyone else — in the face of massive air and ground cover; an embarrassing gesture or remark is more a possibility. Officials claim they have no special concerns about the thousands of Libyans who flock to Malta each month, or over the fact that the Libyan capital of Tripoli is just 40 minutes away by air.

Still, the Maltese government's fledgling anti-terrorism force and intelligence unit are cooperating closely with U.S. and Soviet counterparts on security preparations, and official words of assurance have the ring of an invocation: On this overwhelmingly Roman Catholic island, you can almost see the Maltese mentally crossing themselves as they weigh the whims of Gadhafi, much as they are praying for clear weather.

"It would be a certifiable act of madness to try and disrupt this meeting," says Maltese President Vincent "Census" Tabona. Adds a fellow official: "Of course Gadhafi

would like to upstage everybody. That's in his character. But he knows — or should know — that neither superpower, especially not the Soviets, will take kindly to any of his tricks."

Worries about Libyan decorum, however, seem mostly abstract as this miniature state confronts the mammoth task of hosting a superpower confab.

"They're going to be taxing every resource they have to pull this off, but I think they're really determined to do it," says one Western diplomat. "They've been out of the mainstream for quite a few years and this is a big chance at center stage."

Of course, Malta is accustomed to visitors. During the 2,000 years before it won independence from Great Britain in 1964, just about every great regional conqueror swept through, from the Phoenicians to the British; leaving its stamp on the language and culture of the Maltese archipelago and its 350,000 residents.

Twice Malta has occupied the strategic center of international cataclysms: In 1565, when the Knights of Malta held off a fierce siege by the Ottoman Turks to defend Christianity in Europe; and during World War II, when Maltese

bravery under devastating German and Italian bombing helped the Allied comeback — prompting Franklin Roosevelt to declare the island "one tiny bright flame in the darkness."

Roosevelt was the last U.S. president to visit here, when he met British Prime Minister Winston Churchill in 1945 en route to the Yalta summit, and the jeep he drove is enshrined in Malta's war museum. No Soviet leader has ever visited this island.

In peacetime, then, next month's summit is "the biggest thing to ever hit us," says an agency owner David Moore. "We're proud about it."

Visiting journalists alone will outnumber the island's modest army by about 3 to 1. Thousands of hotel rooms have been snapped up and hundreds of temporary phone lines are going in to accommodate these modern invaders.

Putting Malta under the relentless spotlight of world media may expose some flaws, but it will also, as Moore enthuses, "be worth billions in terms of publicity. ... It will finally put us on the bloody world map."

Each U.S. network has reserved its backdrop for summit coverage — typically harbors with colorful

fishing boats and spectacular medieval fortifications built by the Knights — to bring Maltese panoramas into living rooms everywhere.

Sun and sea, people and history, are the only real resources of this limestone outcropping, and hopes are high that the summit will boost tourism, Malta's blossoming offshore banking initiative and investment.

Profit schemes abound: The U.S. Embassy keeps getting calls from a man offering his catamaran to shuttle officials from the U.S. carrier. Bookmakers are taking bets on where the ships will anchor (government officials now expect them near Marsaxlokk Bay on the island's southeastern corner.)

Beyond the commercial aspect, the Maltese government sees the superpower visit as vindication of its more moderate political course: Maltese politicians of both parties also hope that peace in the Mediterranean will be on the agenda.

"It proves our policies are working, that Malta's image is no longer tarnished," says the prime minister, Fenech Adami. "Our country has refound its credibility. ... Gone is the confrontation and tense

Indian elections see alleged voting fraud

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — Officials threw out thousands of parliamentary election ballots Thursday as the governing party and the opposition traded charges of fraud, voter intimidation and ballots that left 48 people dead.

The election commission also ordered an investigation into charges of widespread vote-rigging in the constituency where Prime Minister Rajiv Gandhi is seeking re-election on the ticket of his Congress Party.

The opposition's plank has centered around the 45-year-old prime minister's alleged corruption and ineptitude.

Anand Sharma, the Congress Party's chief spokesman, labeled the opposition charges as "another orchestrated drama to malign the prime minister" and "a smokescreen to cover the brutal and ferocious assaults" by the opposition.

Among those injured in Wednesday's violence was Sanjay Singh, opposition leader and Gandhi's campaign manager in the December 1984 elections.

He defected to the opposition two years ago with his wife's uncle and the man expected to become prime minister if the opposition wins, Vishwanath Pratap Singh.

According to the National Front, Sanjay Singh was wounded during a riotous Wednesday dining festing.

Security forces, meanwhile, braced for more violence in the eastern two federally ruled territories that vote Friday, the second of the three day polls.

Authorities fear violence in northern Bihar, an impoverished state with a reputation for corruption and "fragile democracy."

At least 92 people, including three independent candidates, have been killed since elections were announced Oct. 17, the ninth since India won independence from Britain in 1947.

Gandhi appealed to Indians to refrain from violence in the final two days of voting.

The National Front, a loose-knit coalition of five opposition parties, accused Gandhi and his Congress Party of engineering the violence.

"His intentions are most suspect and he is up to all kinds of mischief, including murder — of individuals and democracy," said Yashwant Singh, a spokesman for the Janata Dal (People's Party), the main force in the National Front.

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Korean admits to errors

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — Former President Chun Doo-hwan, in self-imposed exile at a Buddhist temple after resigning in disgrace a year ago, said Thursday he engaged in some "trial and error" while in office but denied harming South Korea.

Chun spoke at a ceremony marking the first anniversary of his exile at the Baekdam Temple on the east coast. It was his first public appearance since he went into exile Nov. 23, 1988.

During the one-hour ceremony, Chun, who has converted to Buddhism, consecrated "sarin," a relic of Buddha, and spoke to about 5,000 people.

Chun, who stepped down in February 1988 at the end of his seven-year term, went into rural exile nine months later after apologizing for corruption and misdeeds committed under his administration.

He surrendered about \$24 million in unused political funds.

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — A monument to Vladimir I. Lenin in the town of Nowa Huta was splashed with paint and set ablaze on the eve of the visit to Moscow by Prime Minister Tadeusz Mazowiecki, a newspaper reported Thursday.

The act was carried out by teenage members of the anti-communist Federation of Fighting Youth movement, the newspaper Zycie Warszawy quoted a government spokesman as saying.

"This act of vandalism, carried out on the day... before — Premier Mazowiecki's trip to Moscow, creates the traits of a political provocation and deserves condemnation," the spokesman said.

The youth tried to douse the inflammable liquid on the monument.

Disciplinary investigation opened on ex-East German leader

EAST BERLIN (AP) — East Germany's Communist Party has opened a disciplinary investigation against former leader Erich Honecker and expelled one of his former top lieutenants from the party, state-run television said Thursday.

Guenter Mittag, Honecker's former economic adviser, was thrown out of the party, the announcement said. Last month, he lost his seat on the ruling Politburo along with Honecker.

East German officials already have said a parliamentary commission was looking into charges of misuse of power and corruption against Honecker and his inner circle.

The brief TV account did not specify the grounds for the inner party disciplinary proceedings, which can result in various sanctions ranging from a rebuke to expulsion from the party.

A later dispatch from the official news agency ADN said doctors had decided that Honecker was too ill to make any statements in the proceedings. Honecker, 77, has had severe medical problems since a gall-bladder operation this year.

In an interview with West Germany's ARD-TV, Communist Party chief Egon Krenz said he had talked several times to Honecker by telephone and that the former leader "accepts that he is largely responsible for this situation" — a reference to East Germany's political crisis.

Krenz also said Honecker was too ill to make any public statements.

The West German newspaper Bild reported Wednesday that Mittag, 63, was interrogated for 14 hours last week about reports he stashed hundreds of millions of marks in Swiss banks.

On Oct. 18, Honecker was replaced by Krenz after the worst crisis in the nation's 40-year history and the exodus of tens of thousands of East Germans dissatisfied with Honecker's years of stringent rule.

A special Communist Party congress next month is expected to make more changes in the East German leadership. Krenz is expected to meet with Chancellor Helmut Kohl of West Germany after that.

The East German government announced earlier Thursday it will send security agents into stores frequented by foreigners as part of a major effort to stop the smuggling of goods over the newly opened borders.

The new measures will particularly affect Poles, who have been pouring into East Germany and buying up subsidized items to resell in their shortage-plagued homeland.

Since East Germany opened its borders Nov. 9, the Communist government has been wrestling with a growing black market and smuggling on a scale not seen since before the Berlin Wall was built in 1961.

Government spokesman Wolfgang Meyer announced the anti-smuggling measures at a news conference and said they will take effect Friday.

The new measures do not address the smuggling of East German marks, but Meyer

ruled out devaluing the currency to make smuggling less attractive.

The Communist Party newspaper Berliner Zeitung estimated that 3 billion East German marks have left the country through travels to the West. At East Germany's official exchange rate, that equals \$1.6 billion.

The outpouring of goods to both the West and neighboring Poland has led East German news media to warn of a "sellout" of the nation.

Meyer said the crackdown will include restricting sales of certain goods, such as some clothes and foods, to East Germans and to foreign workers living in the country.

Most Polish people traveling between West Germany and West Berlin won't be allowed to stop in East Germany, he said.

Polish premier arrives in Soviet Union

MOSCOW (AP) — Polish Prime Minister Tadeusz Mazowiecki, the East bloc's only non-Communist head of government, arrived in Moscow Thursday night hoping to place relations with the Soviet Union on an equal footing.

More than 40 years of Communist rule in Poland ended in August when the Polish parliament elected Mazowiecki, a former Solidarity trade union editor and close adviser to Lech Walesa, to lead the new government.

Rare stamps stolen from U.S. dealer

ZURICH, Switzerland (AP) — Thieves have stolen a briefcase containing stamps worth \$31,000 from a U.S. dealer, police said Thursday.

Warren Chi-Hoa, 41, of Los Angeles, had placed the briefcase on a chair while eating at the cafeteria in Zurich's main railway station Tuesday night. He discovered the case was missing as he was about to leave after the meal, police said.

The case contained two albums of ancient Chinese stamps, and 40 envelopes bearing other rare specimens. About \$1,500 in cash and an air ticket from Zurich to Los Angeles via New York also were stolen.

No trial to be heard on ferry disaster

BRUGES, Belgium (AP) — A court has decided no trial will be held in Belgium on the 1987 Zebrugghe ferry disaster that killed 193 people because the ship and all its victims were British, officials said Thursday.

Judge Arthur d'Hoest had been working on the case for two years and will turn over thousands of pages of his work to British officials, said spokesman Fitty van Belle.

Court proceedings have opened in Britain against the owners of the capsized Herald of Free Enterprise, and seven employees. A trial in Britain could start early next year.

The Bruges court based its decision not to pursue a trial in Belgium on a 1961 international treaty stipulating that trials in such disasters can be held in the country of the ship's flag.

Mourners pay respects to Franz Josef II

VADUZ, Liechtenstein (AP) — Grieving residents filled the narrow streets of Liechtenstein's capital Thursday as the tiny principality paid its last respects to Prince Franz Josef II.

Franz Josef, who ruled for 31 years, died Nov. 13. He was 83. Prince Hans Adam II, who succeeded his father as head of state, led mourners, including European royal families and government leaders, at the 90-minute funeral in the small St. Florin Roman Catholic church in Vaduz.

Dubcek back in limelight after 2 decades

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia (AP) — Alexander Dubcek, whose brand of "socialism with a human face" was crushed in the 1968 Soviet-led invasion of Czechoslovakia, is back in the limelight drawing cheers from hundreds of thousands of countrymen.

His public endorsement of the nation follows months of increasing outspoken criticism of the leadership that ousted him from the Communist Party 19 years ago.

Working as a low-level employee of the state forestry services, he remained for a long time in virtual seclusion, living with his family in a hillside house overlooking the Slovak capital of Bratislava.

Permanent police surveillance of his house was lifted after a 1987 visit to Czechoslovakia by Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev, whose perestroika, or restructuring, program largely follows the lines of Dubcek's ill-fated "Prague Spring."

Slowly and cautiously, Dubcek has prepared a return to public life and perhaps even to a leading role, although he has kept silent as to his plans.

His name has been chanted by hundreds of thousands of demonstrators in the pro-democracy rallies that began Nov. 17 and seem to have become a fixture in Czechoslovakia.

The European Parliament has awarded him its 1989 Sakharov Peace Prize, saying he "symbolizes for all Europeans our best hopes for peaceful reform in Eastern Europe." He is expected to enter the prize in Strasbourg, France, in December.

A trip to Italy to receive an honorary doctorate a year ago was Dubcek's first voyage abroad since

he returned from a brief spell as ambassador to Turkey in 1970, shortly before his expulsion from the party along with half a million others.

Milos Jakeš, the current Communist Party leader, oversees those purges.

Dubcek was barred from traveling again to Italy earlier this year to attend the Italian Communist Party congress, where he could have met one of the leading Soviet reformers, Alexander N. Yakovlev.

Hungary made the startling move of broadcasting a lengthy interview with Dubcek in April on state-run TV. The broadcast prompted a formal protest from Prague to its Warsaw fact ally.

"Society is trembling in the clutches of hopelessness," he told the party's Politburo in a nine-page letter leaked to the media in August, telling the leadership it would lose power unless it changed course.

"Do not leave the removal of deformations of the past to either justified pressure or chance," he said, anticipating growing demands for reform.

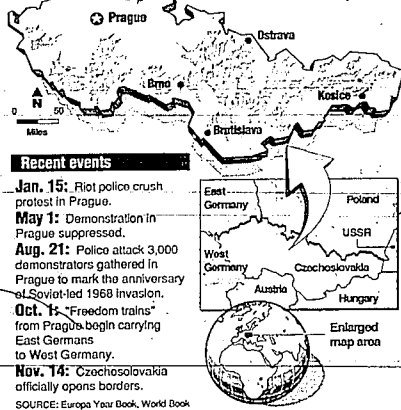
In September, he sided for the first time publicly with human rights activists in demanding the release of two dissidents accused of anti-state activities. One has since been released and the other was acquitted of charges against him but remains jailed pending a prosecution appeal.

And early this month, Dubcek's role in the "Prague Spring" was given favorable footage on Soviet TV. Included was an interview in which he spoke of "very sad recollections" about the crushing of the reforms.

"Public involvement is critical to the success of the oversight program at INEL," David L. Humphrey said. Humphrey was appointed by Gov. Cecil Andrus to coordinate an INEL oversight program mandated by the Legislature.

"I need to find out what the public is

thinking about the INEL situation," Humphrey said in a phone interview from his Boise office this week. "We cannot function without some input from the public."

Humphrey, deputy director of the Department of Health and Welfare, will present plans for INEL monitoring and oversight at a Twin Falls meeting from 7 to 9 p.m. Nov. 30 at the Canyon Springs Inn.

Other meetings will be in Idaho Falls, Boise and Moscow.

Officials will present a summary of current monitoring and the status of a

comprehensive oversight program emphasizing public health and environmental protection.

Presentations will include information about the federal Energy Department's "five-year plan" for cleanup at department sites, and about an interagency agreement mandated by INEL's inclusion on the Superfund National Priority List. The agreement involves Idaho, INEL and the Environmental Protection Agency.

Officials also will explain a monitoring agreement signed last year by Andrus and INEL Manager Don Otte. Health risks,

existing monitoring and possible gaps in the self-monitoring now done by government contractors at INEL also will be discussed, Humphrey said.

Some of the experts who will accompany Humphrey include Lee Caldwell, the attorney general's office, who will cover the state's legal and regulatory authority and gaps in that authority.

Hydrogeologist Dr. Warren Barrish will discuss groundwater issues.

The meetings were planned "so the

Fashion boom

More women are buying guns, for sport as well as for safety

TWIN FALLS - The latest fashion accessory comes in a variety of styles, colors and calibers.

According to gun stores, manufacturers and the National Rifle Association, women are a major market for handguns, and not just in major urban centers.

"Right now, the women are having a love affair with guns," said Bill Leedom, a salesman at Red's Trading Post in Twin Falls. "There are a lot of women buying guns today, a lot."

According to Ed Klecka of the NRA, 12 million to 15 million American women own handguns, and there's a potential market of 9 million more. An NRA study found that 17 percent of all pistol owners in the nation are women, up from 10 percent five years ago.

Red's sells a variety of handguns designed for women. The silver Loren 25-caliber semiautomatic has a pink plastic grip. Smith & Wesson's LadySmith is a .38 revolver with a rosewood grip, glossy blue, or frosted steel finish and burgundy carrying case.

Aside from "pretty" designs, the guns are lightweight and smaller, made to fit into a woman's smaller hand, or into a purse or pocket. Leedom said many women prefer the semiautomatics because the triggers are easier to pull and they fire more quickly.

John Cox, who owns the Rupert Trading Post with his wife, Dorothy, said the number of guns he sells to women has increased steadily over the past five years

to about 20 a month. He sells mostly handguns but also a few rifles and shotguns.

"A desire for safety in a threatening environment has spurred the increased sales. Women buy guns to protect their homes and to take traveling, even just commuting to or from work late at night," Cox said.

Some women "have had some problem that has frightened them," he said. Others have been abused. Most are single women, although sometimes, boyfriends or husbands accompany women to the store to explain how the guns work and help them choose.

But guns aren't necessarily the best self-defense tool for women, Cpl. Karen Trent of the Buhl Police Department said.

Not only is carrying a concealed weapon - in a purse, for example - illegal in Idaho, Trent said, but unless a woman is thoroughly trained and confident that she could shoot an attacker, the weapon could be taken away and used against her.

Twin Falls County Sheriff Jim Munn agreed.

"I don't distinguish between a man or a woman in the use of a gun," Munn said. Twin Falls is safe, he said, and there's no need for anyone to use a gun for protection.

Trent recommends carrying mace, which is legal, or taking a martial arts course for self-defense.

"But in Idaho, where many women grew up with fathers and brothers who hunted, many women enjoy guns for sport, not safety."

Wendell voters face levy to pay for school repair

WENDELL - Voters in the Wendell School District will be asked in January to pass a \$98,000 supplemental levy to pay for a new boiler and for heating system repairs at the high school.

The funding is also needed to comply with a federally required asbestos abatement management plan and to replace a section of leaking roof at the high school gymnasium.

The one-year levy would cost taxpayers about \$1.37 per \$1,000 of assessed market

property value, Superintendent Larry Manly estimated. He suggested Jan. 9 as the day to vote.

After an inspection in August, the district's insurance company said it would stop covering the school's boiler, which expires this week, accepted Drake Plumbing and Heating's bid of \$47,700 - the lowest of three bids to replace the boiler. A contract with the Boise firm is contingent on passage of the supplemental levy and also on installation negotiations.

Replacement of the school's boiler will require the additional expense of some heating system repairs and alterations,

Manly said. Asbestos-covered pipes is a specialty job and new pipes must be installed.

"We may end up with \$65,000 in the boiler (installation) before we're done," trustee Clarence Spinks said.

The board was unsure about exact figures but was pressed to set the levy and advertise it for the required three weeks before Drake's bid expires in mid-January.

Also, the roof of the high school gymnasium is leaking and must be repaired immediately to prevent further damage, Manly said.

He advised the trustees to set the levy

amount as low as possible and leave other school needs to be met by priority as the budget allows. Storage, room for maintenance supplies, replacement of old wiring, new thermostat, radiator repair, and fire alarm systems and new sprinkler pipes will have to wait, he said.

"The levy should not be sky-high at this point," Manly said.

The trustees agreed \$98,000 would cover at least the boiler installation and asbestos removal costs. Anything left, they said, could be used for roof repair.

Sparks said it is important for the levy to

Holiday campaign pushes for bicycle safety

TWIN FALLS - When Dr. Jack Trotter fell off his 10-speed while cruising a county road, he fractured his collarbone and injured his shoulder, but his helmet saved him from more serious injuries.

"I'm sure I would have had a serious head injury if I had not had the helmet," the Twin Falls pediatrician said. "I really planted it. I speared the ground."

The helmet ended up with a groove carved from the right temple area to behind Trotter's ear. The emergency room physicians who treated Trotter were impressed; he bought a helmet for himself that afternoon.

Now Trotter wears a helmet every time he goes bike riding, and he's backing a holiday campaign encouraging the use of bicycle helmets among the Child Life Program at Magic Valley Regional Medical Center are kicking off the campaign today, on the biggest shopping day of the year.

The message?

Tips on buying a helmet

Here's a list of things to keep in mind when buying a bicycle helmet for your child, according to the Child Life Program:

- Look for an American National Standards Institute or Snell Memorial Fund stamp of approval.
- Helmets that do not carry these labels may not adequately protect your child.
- A good-fitting helmet should sit level on top of the head and not rock

forth back and forth or from side to side.

- The helmet should not be too tight. Most helmets come with different-sized foam pads that can be inserted to fit the child's head.
- The helmet should cover the child's forehead and not slide back when worn.
- Helmets include adjustable straps to position the helmet properly and keep it secure.

When you buy a bike, buy a helmet too. "We're not trying to scare kids into buying their holiday budgets," said Dr. Paul Miles, another local pediatrician working with the local Child Life Program. "But we are asking them to protect their children while they ride. Kids shouldn't die from falling off their bikes, and through this campaign we can make a difference."

Every day, one child dies and another 1,000 are rushed to the emergency room because of bike crashes, according to the Consumer Product Safety Commission. Children aged 6 to 12 sustain the most

injuries from the wheels and head injuries are involved in 75 percent of all bike-related deaths.

Miles describes helmets as the "vacaine against child cyclist deaths."

Bike helmets can prevent 85 percent of all head injuries in bike crashes, according to a study published in The New England Journal of Medicine.

Mathews said bike retailers do most of their business this time of the year, and that many youngsters will get bicycles for Christmas.

The Consumer Product Safety Commission, however, says a bicycle should never be a surprise for children on Christmas morning. A bike should be a gift from parents, not from Santa Claus, because Santa Claus can't take the child shopping to see if the bike is the right size and the helmet fits.

But parents can still surprise their kids by leaving an IOU or a symbolic miniature bike, the commission says.

Rupert hopes to halve cost of sewer project

RUPERT - The city hopes to cut in half the costs of a project to renovate its sewer system.

The City Council this week voted to reject all the bids it received for work on its sewer treatment plant. The bids came in \$500,000 more than the \$450,000 Region IV grant the city expects to

receive for the project.

Mayor Bill Whitton said that state and federal officials have assured him the city will retain the grant regardless of what it decides to do about the bids, but the officials suggested that the council rebid the project.

Among the ways to reduce costs might be using an above-ground mainline pipe from the treatment plant to the lagoons rather than the underground mainline

suggested in the project plan, which would cut about \$83,000 off the cost.

The city could also lease some equipment, thus spreading the costs out over a period of time, Whitton said.

"There are a lot of little things to fine tune to bring the cost down," Whitton said. The council voted to ask engineers to redesign the project to make it less costly. Officials hope the project will be ready to rebid by Dec. 19.

Last month, the city received a Region IV grant for \$450,000 to upgrade and increase the capacity of its secondary sewer treatment plant. The project - to add larger pumps and pipes to move treated water from the plant to the holding lagoon - is one of three the city has planned to upgrade its sewer system.

In other matters, the council decided to begin work to annex some areas in the

Russian refugees grateful as they celebrate first Thanksgiving

Sponsors help immigrants become accustomed to life in Idaho

BOISE (AP) — Two families of Russian refugees are celebrating their first Thanksgiving in Idaho, happy to be together and grateful to be in America.

"We are thankful that we can live, that we have food and a house, and for American people who help us, and for the president," said Adam Fedorchuk.

Both families were required to sell their Soviet citizenship for the equivalent of \$500 in order to leave the Soviet Union. They were not allowed to take any possessions except for clothing and small personal items.

"We came to be in America forever," Adam said. Vala plans to serve her own Thanksgiving feast, with turkey and Russian golubitsi, or cabbage. The men might even watch football.

The Fedorchuks and the Petrichuks were sponsored by Central Assembly Christian Life Center in Boise. Sponsors provide temporary housing and food and clothing for one month, and help locate jobs and permanent housing for the refugees.

The Fedorchuks arrived in Boise in January from the Soviet Ukraine. As Soviet Pentecostals, a Christian denomination, they faced religious persecution in the officially atheist nation.

The Fedorchuks — Adam and Valentina, have three daughters: Alla, 23; Galina, 14; and Irina, 21; and three sons, Andrey, Pavel, 13; and Sergei, 9.

"I am thankful to (Soviet leader Mikhail) Gorbachev for letting us go, and to (President) Bush for adopting us," Adam said. In five years, the Fedorchuks and the Petrichuks will be eligible for green cards, giving them permanent resident status. Until then, they can remain and work in the United States as refugees. They plan to become American citizens as soon as possible.

"The greatest thing for me is to be able to stand there and see families brought together," said Tudor Cushman, director of SOAR. "When they met at the airport, Andrey put his arm around (his cousin) Sergei and said, 'This is my best friend.'"

BOISE (AP) — Motorists have two orange and white reminders that Idaho 21 is closed by snowslides with the Idaho Department of Transportation's new avalanche gates on the mountain road.

But it allows the state to collect an additional \$2,000 if the dealership breaks any more regulations within the next year.

Publisher plans Utah book fix; Idaho waits

BOISE (AP) — A textbook publisher plans to correct Utah copies of a textbook that depicts coyotes as harmless to sheep, and Idaho officials hope the same will happen next year in the Gem State. "We're just real pleased to see that going on in Utah," said Stan Boyd, executive director of the Idaho Wool Growers Association.

However, in Idaho, the English books will not come up for review by the state Board of Education until 1990, according to Gravelle Reddingham, curriculum coordinator for the Idaho Department of Education. By that time, he said, the company probably will have a revised textbook. "It's really off the wall," he said. FOXBORO, Mass. — The New England Patriots say they would be interested in drafting record-setting University of Idaho quarterback John Friesz in the first round of next spring's NFL draft.

The Patriots will definitely draft a quarterback. The problem is that there aren't any blue-chip quarterbacks coming out of college next spring. "We won't take a quarterback in the first round if he's not a first-round guy," said Dick Steinberg, New England's director of player per-

sonnel. Friesz is the player most consistently mentioned as having pro possibilities. Everyone seems to agree that the lanky, 6-foot, 4-inch, 216-pound senior from Coeur d'Alene has a National Football League arm, but he is not mobile. "We've got to get a quarterback somewhere," said Steinberg, who is also trying to arrange a trade for an established NFL quarterback like Steve Walsh of Dallas, Jim Everett of the Los Angeles Rams and Bobby Hebert of New Orleans.

One of the major reasons the Patriots take a 4-7 record into Sunday's game in Los Angeles

against the Raiders is the problem they have had at quarterback.

Tony Eason failed and is now with the New York Jets. Doug Flutie failed and is now hurt on the Patriots bench. That leaves Steve Gronin, a 26-year-old with a history of injuries, and Marc Wilson, a soon-to-be 33-year-old, who has barely played in two years.

"It makes a lot of sense to try and look around and see what's available next year in the draft for free agents (or) trades," said Patriots coach Raymond Berry.

The draft is a more likely avenue, Steinberg said. **See FRIESZ on Page B7**

position." The specific hurdle that CSI must climb is placing first in the northern division of the Region 18 regular season standings. That would mean having the regional finals on the local floor.

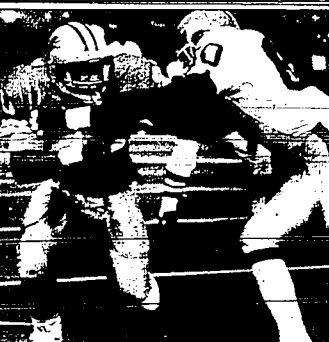

Rookie Sanders moves Detroit past Cleveland in 13-10 victory

PONTIAC, Mich. — Barry Sanders has brought a little gladness to an otherwise dismal season for Detroit Lions.

Sanders, gaining 145 yards Thursday, ran his rookie-season rushing total to over 1,000 yards, and Eddie Murray kicked two field goals to lead the Lions to a 13-10 upset over the Cleveland Browns.

The loss, which snapped the Browns' unbeaten streak at five games, dropped Cleveland (7-4-1) to second place in the AFC Central Division behind the Houston Oilers. The injury-riddled Lions (3-9) remained at the bottom of the NFC Central.

"With all the players stuck together with tape, with gum and with glue, this shows that our program has come a long way," Detroit coach Wayne Fontes said. "We wanted to keep the ball on the ground and keep their offense off the field."

"Barry showed the country today that he should be

rookie of the year." It was the first time this season anyone had rushed for 100 yards against the Browns.

Cleveland entered the game with the second-best defense in the AFC and had allowed an average of only 95.8 yards rushing.

Sanders, who now has 1,016 yards for the season, is the first Lion to gain 1,000 yards since Billy Sims ran for 1,040 yards in 1983. Sanders, who carried 28 times Thursday, also is only the third Detroit player ever to crack the 1,000-yard mark.

The other two also were Heisman Trophy winners. Sims did it three times and Steve Owens did it once.

"Sanders is back on track," Cleveland coach Bud Carson said. "He proved it today. We had him hemmed up a thousand times. More than anyone, he was responsible for them getting on the board."

Sanders said he was encouraged by Sims, his boyhood hero, during workouts last summer.

"Billy Sims was one of the more amazing backs to

"I told Zendejas it was no big deal and I was just doing my job," Small said. "Coach Ryan is a god, honest coach and he doesn't pay anybody for that."

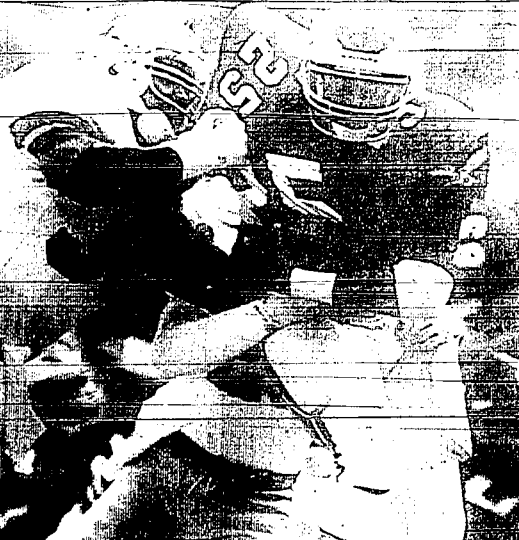

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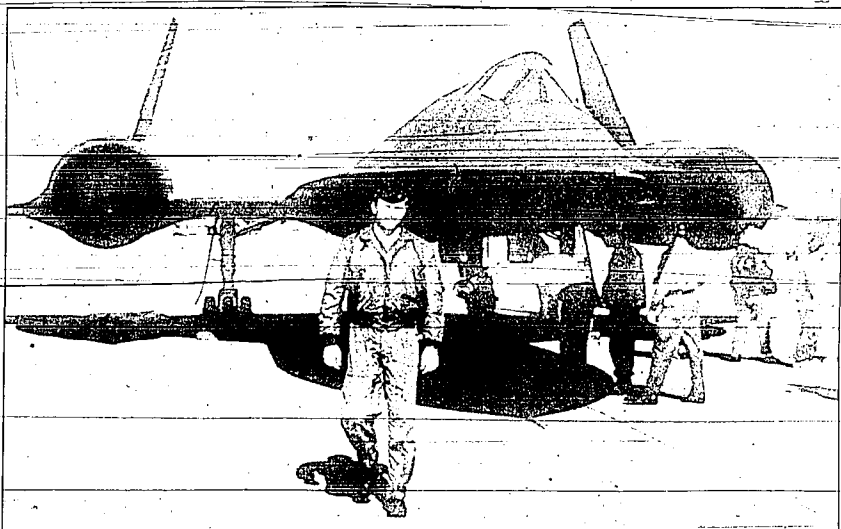

Budget cuts shoot down spy jet

BEALE AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. — Crews of the SR-71 Blackbirds bade farewell Wednesday to their spy jets.

The planes were shut down by budget cuts after dodging attackers at the edge of space for 24 years by flying faster than speeding bullets.

"It feels like a death in the family," Maj. Don Watkins, an SR-71 pilot, said after a news conference announcing that Tuesday marked the final operation of the highest-flying and fastest airplane, which can photograph a license plate from more than 15 miles up.

Col. James Savarda, commander of the 9th Strategic Reconnaissance Wing, said the "emotional end to an era in aviation history," came

when President Bush signed a budget measure detaching more than \$200 million for the SR-71, the nation's original stealth aircraft.

Savarda would not rule out that the decision could leave a gap in the nation's spying capabilities during some future crisis, but he said budget cuts have forced the military to rely solely on satellite surveillance and the much slower and lower-flying U-2 spy plane.

Critics of the SR-71, including top Defense Department and Air Force officials, have said such jets provide adequate spying capabilities.

Defenders of the Blackbird, including the State Department and CIA, contend that satellites are being shut down and are not as versatile as the plane, which has overflowed crisis hotspots since its introduction in January 1966.

Nearly three decades after the first SR-71 prototypes were built by Lockheed, the twin-engine planes based at Beale Air Force Base, 110 miles northeast of San Francisco, still hold world records for speed and altitude.

The Blackbird also has fascinated air show audiences. Its dagger shape, black and sinister, resembles a ship out of the movies. Its unusual form has been used on the cover of numerous aviation books.

The SR-71's top capabilities remain secret, but the Air Force says it flies higher than 85,000 feet at more than 2,100 mph — an over three times the speed of sound. That's roughly 33 miles a minute.

Pentagon cuts could reap U.S. 'peace dividend'

WASHINGTON — Military cuts planned by the Pentagon could mean that the United States will reap a substantial "peace dividend" that would soon lead to a healthier overall economy and higher living standards, according to a number of economists and public officials. If military outlays are indeed reduced significantly, these experts say, it could be one of the most positive developments to hit the U.S. economy in years.

Never mind about the short-term rise in unemployment that would likely occur as troops are laid off and defense plants closed; "the transition should be manageable," said Charles L. Schultz, a former chairman of the Council of Economic Advisors.

What is important, Schultz said, is that sizable reductions in military outlays would help shrink the federal budget deficit significantly — a development that would almost certainly bring interest rates down as the government's need for borrowing diminished.

"We could have more housing and more investment. Think what lower interest rates would mean to the financial markets, to the Third World debt problem. A defense cut of \$100 billion would do incredible things," Schultz said.

Alternately, some of the money that is currently being spent on tanks, ships and missiles could be channeled into education, drug treatment and other programs that improve people's lives. Either way, the bottom line is the same, said L. Don Phillips, an economist at Washington Analysis Corp., an economic consulting firm. "Having a lower Soviet threat," he said, "means you can have a higher standard of living."

Lee and other analysts caution, however, that it is far from clear that the "peace dividend" will actually prove to be of its expected size.

In the first place, the cuts that Defense Secretary Richard B. Cheney and other administration officials reportedly are discussing may be less significant than they appear on the surface.

Administration officials have said the Pentagon chief is weighing the possibility of up to \$180 billion that would be spread over fiscal years 1982, 1983 and 1984. That looks like a deep cut in a military budget that currently totals about \$300 billion a year.

But the "cut" would not be a cut in the ordinary sense. Rather, it would represent a reduction from the Pentagon's projected buildup, which is based on the politically unrealistic assumption that Congress will allow military outlays to rise at the inflation rate plus 1 or 2 percent a year for the next five years. So even if the administration did propose a \$180 billion "cut" for the 1982-84 period, that would probably translate into a Pentagon budget that continues to grow, albeit at a pace somewhat below the rate of inflation.

Moreover, Congress itself may balk at the sort of savings the administration is said to be considering.

The battles that took place on Capitol Hill this year to preserve funding for aircraft "are nothing compared to the fights that are going to occur when the secretary has to make recommendations on bases to be closed and weapons systems to be terminated and assembly lines closed down and untrained and non-maintained personnel to be laid off," said Stephen B. Bell, former staff director of the Senate Budget Committee.

Fear, futility fall in Eastern Europe's autumn of reform

Inhibitions leave as people take to the streets knowing they won't be alone

LONDON — The East Germans, the Bulgarians and now the Czechoslovaks taking to the streets by the hundreds of thousands during this remarkable autumn in Eastern Europe are trampling beneath them the twin pillars of 40 years of Communist rule in the region: fear and futility.

The marchers represent both cause and effect, with the success of each demonstration further allaying fear of reprisals and encouraging more thousands to take part next time. Also, television footage of protests in one East European country is today far more likely than previously to be seen in another, multiplying the impact of any demonstration by "internationalizing" it.

As a result, each new mass protest accelerates the political chain reaction whose blinding speed has already left long-time students of the region aghast.

"We have to adjust our sights or buy a new pair of glasses, because this is amazing," Vlad Kucin, a senior analyst at Radio Free Europe in Munich, said. "People smelled change in the air," added George Schepflin, lecturer in East European politics at the London School of Economics. "And then all the inhibitions and all the fears left. They realized it's OK to take to the streets, because they won't be alone."

More than that, said Jacques Rupnik, a senior fellow at the Center for International Affairs, Foundation Nationale des Sciences Politiques in Paris, fear has switched sides in Eastern Europe. With little genuine popular support, the hard-line regimes in East Germany, Czechoslovakia and Bulgaria have long been fragile. So, Rupnik noted, once the population begins to believe that there will be no Soviet invasion and that their own security forces will not shoot them down in the street, the fear switches from the society to the people in power. This is what we're seeing now in Prague.

Repeated use of deadly force to put down unauthorized outbreaks of public dissent — in East Germany in 1953, Poland and Hungary in 1956, Czechoslovakia in 1968, and Poland again in 1970, 1976 and 1981 — made fear the ally of Communist regimes.

Analysis

And even when fear began to lose its power, such as in Solidarity-led Poland, there remained a sense of the futility of protest. But now, with the Solidarity coalition government in Warsaw and with Hungary preparing for the region's first free national elections in 40 years, the sense of futility has given way to a dominant theory of regional reform.

The Hungarians credit the Poles for the first major political breakthrough, winning government agreement to share power with Solidarity. That proved that Moscow was willing to put up with more far-reaching political reform than most in the region had dared hope.

"Budapest, in turn, helped force East Berlin's hand by punching the first symbolic holes in the Iron Curtain and then opening its borders to East Germans fleeing to the West.

Thousands left through Hungary, then through Czechoslovakia — and thousands more demonstrated for change at home.

A key element of Stalinist-style totalitarianism was the isolation of individuals as much as possible from each other by spreading fear and mistrust, Schepflin noted. But "the moment that starts to break down, people come together again," he said.

In a European tradition dating from the French Revolution, the Communist scholar added, that means going into the streets: Wide boulevards and big squares in the Continent's major cities are made to order for such protests.

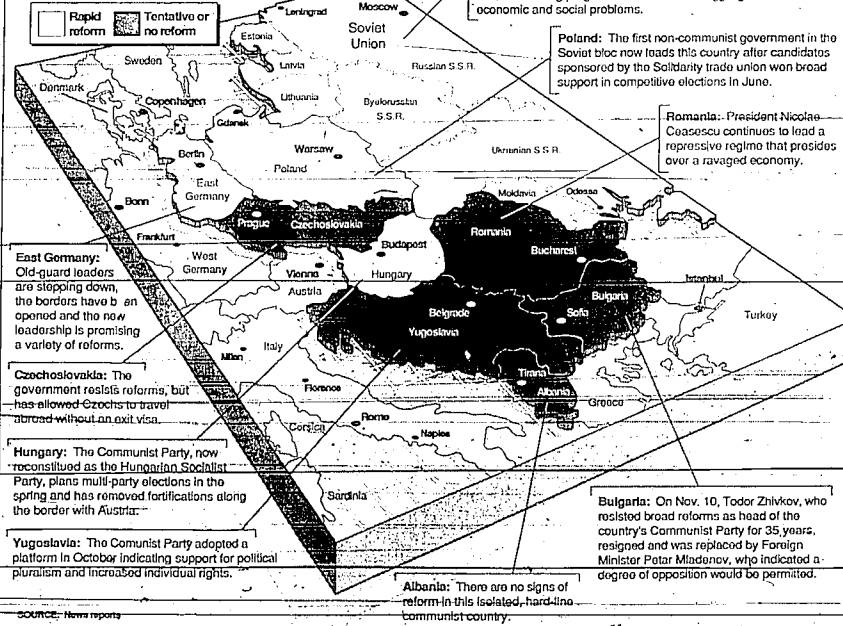
Even as postwar Eastern European regimes suppressed all forms of spontaneous public reaction, they encouraged their own carefully choreographed, "rent-a-crowd" versions for ritual homage to Communist leaders and holidays.

Now, Schepflin said, "It's a way of saying 'This is the only political mechanism available to us. We will make use of it.'"

"Perhaps the critical point was reached when East Germany began to tip," said Kucin, the Radio Free Europe analyst. What he termed the four "rejectionist countries" — East Ger-

many, Czechoslovakia, Romania and Bulgaria — "survived to a certain extent on the idea that Poland and Hungary are special. We can fence ourselves in. We don't have to imitate what they're doing. Fat lot of good it's all done for the Poles anyway."

Soviet Premier Mikhail S. Gorbachev put an end to that idea by withdrawing Moscow's support from the hard-liners, Rupnik said, adding: "He has unleashed something that he cannot control. He has destabilized the ruling elites. ... That's his main achievement."

The first to go among the four was East Germany's Erich Honecker, followed by Bulgaria's Todor Zhivkov. And their replacements added to the sense that the moment for change had arrived — that it was no longer futile to demand it.

Once the new leadership in East Germany opened its borders, effectively neutralizing the Berlin Wall, Czechoslovakia was bound to be caught up in the maelstrom, Rupnik said.

• With a Solidarity government in Poland, free elections in Hungary and

Soviet Union: The Soviets spearheaded the move towards liberalization. In partly free elections in March, Soviet citizens gave reformers a major vote in a newly expanded and more vocal parliament. President Mikhail Gorbachev is trying to keep his restructuring program on track while struggling with economic and social problems.

Poland: The first non-communist government in the Soviet bloc now leads this country after candidates sponsored by the Solidarity trade union won broad support in competitive elections in June.

Romania: President Nicolae Ceausescu is continuing to lead a repressive regime that presides over a ravaged economy.

Czechoslovakia: The government seeks reforms, but has allowed Czechs to travel abroad without an exit visa.

Hungary: The Communist Party, now reconstituted as the Hungarian Socialist Party, plans multi-party elections in the spring and has removed fortifications along the border with Austria.

Yugoslavia: The Communist Party adopted a platform in October indicating support for political pluralism and increased individual rights.

Albania: There are no signs of reform in this isolated, hard-line communist country.

Bulgaria: On Nov. 10, Todor Zhivkov, who resisted broad reforms as head of the country's Communist Party for 35 years, resigned and was replaced by Foreign Minister Petar Mladenov, who indicated a degree of opposition would be permitted.

 ...of the Hill of the sort that we haven't seen for a long time."
 Still, many budget experts said the latest developments on the defense-spending front are profoundly encouraging, especially given Cheney's apparent willingness to seriously consider eliminating a number of weapons systems.
 "We've been cutting defense spending over the past few years, but we've been doing so without really changing defense policy in any fundamental sense," said Rudolph G. Penner, former director of the Congressional Budget Office. "A large part of the savings have come from just stretching out the purchase

of weapons, and that's been very inefficient and has raised unit costs (of individual weapons). I'm very pleased that Cheney seems to be taking a rational approach to this. We engage in a lot of procurement delays as opposed to cancellations, and we really need cancellations."
 The current CBO director, Robert D. Reischauer, agreed. "No single portion of the budget is capable of completely solving the budget-deficit problem that we have," Reischauer said. "But cuts of this order of magnitude would be a major step in the right direction, and more than many people thought was possible in the defense area just a month or two ago."



 Kusun, who saw the incident on West German television, called it symbolic of another important element in the East European drama. "The 'internationalization' (of protests) must be taken as largely responsible for the speed with which things have happened," he said.
 Radio Free Europe, his employer, is another force for breaking down the barriers that had formerly isolated East Europeans from each other, as are other Western radio stations like the BBC, Voice of America and West Germans' Deutsche Welle.
 Radio Free Europe has been receiving a steadily increasing flow of telephone calls from East European listeners,

according to Deputy Director Robert Gillette.
 "What we've done is help contribute to this process of the lifting of fear — being able to reach out and touch the outside world with nothing happening to them," Gillette said.
 Television is also an increasingly important element. The western third of Czechoslovakia, for example, has long been able to view West German or Austrian newscasts, making them almost instantly aware of events outside the country no matter what Czechoslovak television does. But now Czechoslovaks living near the borders with East Germany, Poland and Hungary can see nearly as much on broadcasts from those nations as

well.
 "The country is surrounded by inimical TV stations," Kusun quipped.
 Elsewhere, liberalized Soviet television beamed into East European living rooms has become a force for reform. That is particularly true of Bulgaria; in addition, before he was ousted Honecker had stopped circulation in East Germany of some Soviet publications that he found too full of glasnost, or openness, for his government's tastes.
 "Euphorizing and heartening though these street politics are," the London Times cautioned Tuesday, "it is nonetheless important to recognize the limits of what has so far been achieved." While free elections have been promised, for example, they are

in all cases weeks or months away.
 East European experts agree, although they are generally optimistic.
 "In broad terms, the system has run out of steam," Schopflin said. Meanwhile, he added, the signs in East Germany, and Czechoslovakia particularly are, that the demonstrations will continue until elections are assured.
 More than 240,000 East Germans were on the streets Monday for the ninth week in a row, he noted. And in Prague, an estimated 200,000 protesters staged a fifth straight day of demonstrations Wednesday.
 "It means," said Schopflin, that "a large number of people have a steady commitment to saying: 'This is not enough. We are not satisfied.'"

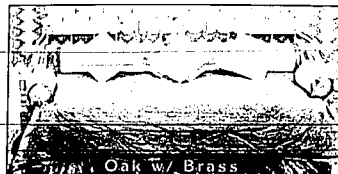
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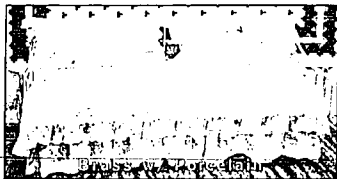

Mannen was a junior in high school when his English class read the William Shakespeare play aloud. It was the first play he'd ever read, and "it's what got me excited about being an actor in the first place," he recalls.

"I've wanted to do it for years," says Mannen, who has directed about 30 productions since arriving at CSI for the 1975-1976 school year. But he adds actors on the junior college level rarely have the experience — in drama or simply life itself — to be able to successfully undertake the demands Shakespeare presents.

The fact many two-year college students decide not to return to school in any given semester sometimes com-

plicates matters. Last spring, however, it became clear the players Mannen needed would be on hand. "My solid actors assured me they'd be back," he says. "That's when I made my decision."

A total of about 50 people are involved in the production, which opens Tuesday in CSI's Fine Arts Auditorium.

"Othello," the story of a man torn between love for his wife and suspicions of her, was written by Shakespeare in 1604, a year before "King Lear" and two years before "Macbeth." It was the 27th of his 37 plays.

As he often did, and as modern playwrights often do, Shakespeare took the basic plot of his tragedy from an Italian romance — "Il Moro di Venezia," written about 1565 by an author named Cinthio.

Playing Othello in CSI's production is Robert Henderson of Castledo, who — at 6'6" and nearly 300 pounds

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Garrison Keillor is famous for his radio show, 'A Prairie Home Companion'

Keillor returns to radio

NEW YORK (AP) — It's been more than two years since Garrison Keillor left gentle Lake Wobegon, but public radio's favorite storyteller says he's not worried about stepping up to the microphone again, even if the stage is in rough-and-tumble Brooklyn.

"I hope to become nervous, you know, at the right time. I count on it," said Keillor, who returns to the airwaves this month on a new weekly program. "But I hope that it doesn't raise the pitch in my voice. I think I'm counted on to sing bass parts."

"Garrison Keillor's American Radio Company of the Air," which premieres on public radio stations including BSU Radio Saturday at 4 p.m., will once again feature Keillor's soft voice. "I'm going to sing just ever so slightly less than people would like me to."

"But he insists the new, live show will not be a continuation or spinoff of 'A Prairie Home Companion,' which attracted 1 million listeners each week on American Public Radio.

"What I'm doing is taking 13 years of experience doing one kind of live radio variety show in one place and I'm using that to create a different one, a different one in a different place," he said in a recent interview, sitting behind a desk stacked with books at his Manhattan office.

Keillor's plans for this season's 20 shows include "classic American music of all kinds" — from Aaron Copland to Duke Ellington, country music to Broadway.

And the humorist says his monologues will return, but with less of a focus on the Midwest.

"I've a lot of things I want to talk about, some of which have to do with New York, or take place here," he said. "But I don't have any need to do a routine on New York ... tell New York jokes."

Will he be telling tales again about the Norwegian bachelor farmers, and other residents of the mythical Minnesota town of Lake Wobegon?

"I don't believe I will," he says with a smile. "Unless of course I heard something. I would pass it on." Keillor, 47, left his home base of St. Paul, Minn., with his wife for Denmark in 1987 and settled in

Manhattan later that same year. Since then, he has done occasional specials for cable television, appeared on tour with orchestras, and continued to spin yarns about the town he made famous on the earlier show and in such best-sellers as "Lake Wobegon Days" and "Leaving Home."

Keillor's return to radio was sparked, he says, by an elderly Georgia man he met during a trip last year to Gettysburg, Pa. "He said, 'When are you coming back?' And that was the first time anybody had asked me that question. 'When are you coming back?' not, 'Are you?' or, 'Why don't you ...' " He just said, "When are you coming back?" I said, "Pretty soon!"

He also received encouragement from his wife, Ulla Skerred, a career counselor. "She's a professional in this field of advising middle-aged men on their career plans," he said.

After discussions with Minnesota Public Radio, which also produced "A Prairie Home Companion," Keillor announced plans for his return in May. "I put together his company this summer after scores of auditions where he made a point of not looking at the performers."

"I wanted to find radio actors, who can also sing," he said. "And I really was bowled over by the people who I got."

The Brooklyn Academy of Music will house the show, except for two weeks next year when it travels to St. Paul.

The urban neighborhood where the Academy is located is a far cry from mid-mannered St. Paul, and Keillor expects the house to be filled with "a lot of people from Connecticut and New Jersey who will be uneasy ... thinking about the fact when the show's over, it'll be dark."

But, he says, "We'll reassure them. They'll be brave when they leave."

As for his friends back home, he suggests they wait until he's able to put them up for the weekend before they come out to see the show.

"They don't even want to know what hotel rates are, people from Lake Wobegon," he said. "I don't think they should even look into it."

Shirley Jones records 1st solo album

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — After a show business career of more than 30 years, including singing in movie classics such as "Oklahoma" and "The Music Man," Shirley Jones has released her first solo album.

The Diadem Music LP "Silent Strength" is a collection of gospel songs.

"I grew up singing Christian music," Jones, 55, said in a telephone interview from her home in Beverly Hills, Calif. "I was the youngest member of my church choir at age 6."

"It has been synonymous with my singing. It's beautiful music and this (project) was a wonderful experience."

"I've never really done a solo album. I've done the movie albums and did some things for Columbia with my husband, Jack, and of course 'The Partridge Family.'"

In 1970-74, Jones was Shirley Partridge in the popular TV comedy about a family that became successful in show business. She portrayed a widowed suburban mother and David Cassidy, her real life stepson, was Keith Partridge.

"I did 23 motion pictures and nobody knew me until 'The Partridge Family,'" she said. "But that's TV. The power of TV is the strongest power we have now. You become a friend to people. You're really not larger than life, but part of their family."

"The show had a combination of things. It had music for the time. We were a family in show business, an everyday family. Plus we had good actors. David was a teen hero and little Danny Bonaduce was a wonderful young comedian. The chemistry worked."

Her movie credits, besides "Oklahoma" and "The Music Man," include "Carousel," "Elmer Gantry" (Academy Award for supporting ac-

ress in 1961), "April Love" and "Beyond the Poseidon Adventure." Her most recent film was "Tank" with James Garner three years ago.

The Oscar, she said, changed her career. "I was considered a pretty young thing who could sing until then. After that, they said that maybe this kid can act. It opened doors for me, no doubt."

She also has appeared in several TV movies, including "The Family Nobody Wanted," "Winter, Take All," "The Orchard Children," "Last Cry for Help" and "Silent Night, Lonely Night." Most dealt with topical issues such as gambling addiction, unjust adoption procedures and teen suicide.

"Those kind of roles are wonderful to play," Miss Jones said. — She recently taped a two-hour tribute show to composer Richard Rodgers, to be broadcast on the Public Broadcasting Service next March.

Jones also sings frequently with

symphony orchestras across the country. One of her traditional songs is "You'll Never Walk Alone" from "Carousel." The song is also her solo album.

"It conveys a message to audiences of all types, whether Christian or Jewish or whatever," she said. "Those words touch people. I've been singing it even before 'Carousel.' It's been part of my repertoire for 30 years now. When I think of the words during a distressing time, it helps me through."

Among other cuts on the album, "The Music's Gotta Stop Someday" describes the emptiness of entertainment without content. The title cut "Silent Strength" is about trusting one's savior.

"We spent five hours in my living room one Sunday afternoon going through the music," Jones said. "We pored through music and talked about words and what was right for me. I wanted to do beautiful ballads with beautiful lyrics and no rock 'n' roll stuff."

She said she's at a point in her career where she accepts only projects that intrigue her. "I'm at a marvelous place in my life. I'm not driven by my career, but I never have been really. I can pick and choose. I'm able to do what I want to do which is sing, basically."

Gooding County man produces 2nd album

Former Gooding County resident and composer, Gordon Hardcastle has produced his second album titled "Where the Watergones Play."

JACKPOT — There is hardly a recording artist working today who doesn't owe a debt to Patti Page.

Aside from the fact she has sold more than 70 million records, making her the top-selling female singer of all time, Page was the very first recording artist to employ what soon became a common trick of the trade: vocal overdubs.

Page is back at Cactus Pete's this week, returning here for the first time since 1986. She is singing at 8 p.m. and 11 p.m. cocktail shows today and Saturday in the casino's Cactus Showroom. Saturday's early show is sold out, but a few tickets remain for the other performances. Call 1-800-821-1103 for information.

It was 1947, and the Oklahoma-native Page had already recorded several singles for Mercury Records, then a new label. Her manager, Jack Rael, had discovered a song called "Confess."

Page's lead vocal, but since Page had yet to strike it big as a singer, her recording budget was so small that accompanying vocalists were used on the question. She had suggested that Page sing her own back-ground vocals.

Although recording engineer Bill

Putnam told Rael it couldn't be done, Page and her manager persisted. The record was a big success, and Page had made industry history.

Calling earlier this week from her home in Rancho Santa Fe, Calif., Page said she planned to arrive in Jackpot on Wednesday and perhaps perform a little before her first show, which was slated Thursday. She said she was also hoping to enjoy Thanksgiving dinner in Jackpot with her entourage.

Page's biggest hit ever was "Ten-nessee Waltz," which started out as an "B" side to "Boogie Woogie Santa Claus" in 1950. The holiday song

stuffed, but "Tennessee Waltz" has sold nearly 8 million copies since its release, making it second only to Bing Crosby's "White Christmas" as all-time best-selling single.

For example, Mineko Grimmer's music boxes require the pouring of small-pearls-into-pyramid-shaped molds which must be filled with water and frozen. The melting-ice, when placed in the sculpture, randomly releases pebbles onto a lattice of bamboo sticks and strung piano wires creating "music."

Eddie Murphy movie a huge hit

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Eddie Murphy's first major studio production, "Harlem Nights" opened to record full weekend business of \$16.1 million and "The Little Mermaid" swam strongly past "All Dogs Go to Heaven" in the animation showdown.

"Harlem Nights," which bears the distinction of mentioning its star's name five times in the opening credits, was the third-biggest Thanksgiving-Christmas release ever, according to figures released Monday by Exhibitor Relations Co. and Entertainment Data Inc.

The biggest hit full-film, are

"Rocky IV," which debuted to \$20 million in 1985 and "Star Trek IV: The Voyage Home," which collected \$16.9 million in 1986.

Overall business for the Top 10 films was \$52 million, up 47 percent from a year ago, Entertainment Data said.

"Look Who's Talking," the lover-of-diapers comedy featuring John Travolta, Kirstie Alley and the voice of Bruce Willis, was second with \$18.5 million. Down 25 percent from a week ago, "Look Who's Talking" has nonetheless passed the \$85 million mark.

"The Little Mermaid," the Disney

film that some critics have labeled an instant classic, set an industry record for an animated film in its premiere weekend with a per-screen average of \$6,068, Disney said.

The opening weekend of \$6.1 million for "The Little Mermaid" was 50 percent better than last year's "Oliver and Co.," which went on to become the all-time top-grossing animated film with a domestic gate of \$53.3 million.

Disney said that half of the Grand film's viewers were adults and teen-agers unaccompanied by children.

The ensemble drama "Steel Dawn" finished in fourth with \$5.4 million and a strong per-screen average of \$11,303 in a somewhat limited release. The film stars Dolly Parton, Sally Field and Shirley Maerzette, among others.

In fifth was "All Dogs Go to Heaven," the new animated film from Don Bluth. Featuring the voice of Burt Reynolds, "Dogs" opened to \$4.7 million. Its per-screen average of \$2,988 was less than half of that for "The Little Mermaid."

Down the drama starring Jack Lemmon and Ted Danson fell 30 percent to sixth place on receipts of \$3.1 million. It was followed in seventh by "Prancer," the story of a wounded reindeer who may or may not be talking with a big guy in a red suit. "Prancer" crossed \$2.9 million.

"The Bear" was eighth on ticket sales of \$2.8 million; "Crimes and Misdemeanors" finished ninth with \$1.5 million; and "Staying Together" plummeted to 10th with \$939,208, down 54 percent.

'Back to the Future Part II' may be improvement on original

HOLLYWOOD — If "Back to the Future" made you bored and queasy, then the tumbling inventiveness in its sequel may come as a pleasant surprise. Of course, if you were among the 92 percent of the world who loved the ride in Dr. Emmet Brown's diabolical DeLorean back in 1985, then "Back to the Future Part II" is your oyster. Well, your hamburger with onions.

Review

If it proves anything, it's that director Robert Zemeckis ("Who Framed Roger Rabbit") is getting cooler and even more adept at controlled mayhem. Actually, "Future II" has the best moments as the Fox's best moments with live actors, crammed to the edges of the frame with nutty touches.

This is not to say that it isn't one of the year's noisiest films, nor one of the most dizzying. It not only zooms up to the year 2015, but back again to that fateful high school dance of Marty McFly's parents in 1955, then up for a while to 1985. And not 1985 as the characters knew it, but a sort of faux 1985, the Ghost of 1985-yet-to-come-in-the-worst-of-all-possible-worlds.

Now, you may whiz up and back and sideways with the ease of Isaac Asimov, but not this time traveler. So it is intriguing to report that screenwriter Bob Gale has had pity on the speedster. Why? He begins his back and forth in the Chrono-Synclastic Infundulium or whatever he has the eminent Doc Brown (Christopher Lloyd) diagram it all out on a blackboard for us. Thus, even the dimmest of us can appreciate exactly why McFly and Doc

must risk time-war whirlpool to keep their universe, and perhaps even ours, on an even keel.

It all begins with danger in the year 2015 to Marty McFly's son, Marty Jr. (conveniently played by McFly "himself," Michael J. Fox, surely one of the world's oldest high school students and one of the more bearable). Scanning the future, Doc Brown knows there is big trouble if Marty Jr. goes along with the scuzzy plans of a guy named Griff, so McFly and Brown nip up to 2015 in the gull-winged DeLorean to see if

they can change history, or future history. With them is McFly's girlfriend, Jennifer, played by the talented and, in this instance, vastly wasted Elizabeth Shue. Also wasted are the talents of "Breaking In's" Casey Siemaszko, almost unfindable here as a third mug.

"Future" ites will already be onto the fact that Griff is the son of Bill Tannen (Thomas F. Wilson, both times), who made the life of the McFly family father-George-such-a-living hell. Frankly, the braying of Crispin Glover's George McFly in

the first film made some of our lives living hell too, so it came as good news that Glover appears in the sequel only in brief silent scenes taken from footage in the first film. The grandfather George McFly is played in the year 2015 by Jeffrey Weissman.

When Film-makers' visions of the future spin of reality, familiar technology, the results are more fun than brainstorming wild inventions that take forever to understand. We might not want to live in Zemeckis and Gale's 21st century, but we can

grasp its systems quickly enough to be comfortable and even snug. In the town square, hologram movie trailers do more than put you in the picture; the ads for "Jaws 19" (directed by Max Spielberg) are enough to give you cardiac arrest. Then there's the town's retro restaurant, "Cafe 240," a sort of free-fall Cafe 50's, updated and feverishly re-created by Zemeckis.

Here, nostalgia buffs can ride Lifecycles and have their orders taken by video waiters Ronald Reagan, Michael Jackson or the Aynollah Khomeini. Inside, skateboards float magically a few feet off the ground, and Doc Brown's car is now completely airborne. As Marty browses in the window of an antique bookstore, there is even an ancient computer right next to a Sports Illustrated magazine listing the winners in every sporting event from 1950 to 2060.

That alternate becomes the "slay" prize, when first Marty, then dodging grandfather Bill in the year 2015, realize its potential as a solid gold betting parade. — If one were to

As the movie reels roll, all over the calendar, Gale and Zemeckis are prolific with throw-away sports events, almost as many as there are blatant product plugs, and a vast improvement over the sometimes skimpy invention of "Future I." There are also a few such quotes from that first film, so if you have — somehow — missed it, "Future II" will fill you in on everything but its, Culcin Klein joke. That had to do with an inconspicuous Marty being identified by his own name, as indicated by the label in his underwear. Calvin Klein. (Plus.)

Technically, the film brings multiple role-playing to new delishess:

among Fox's endearing McFlys, there is cute Madeline McFly in 2015, a role for which Fox gets a close shave and an Auburn wig. In addition to doubling and sometimes tripling his actors in the same scene, Zemeckis also folds in footage from the first movie, making the continuity between, perhaps the most heroic figure on the planet. The sheer personal pull of Doc Brown cannot be underestimated. Lloyd keeps his even when he's degrading speeches with the velocity of a railroad train. Amazing.

The film ends with a quote from its own sequel, Doc and Marty in 1985, a shockingly tacky coda to such a classic. If "Future II" had the wit and daring of some of its best moments, or of that mastery satire "This Is Spinal Tap," it would end all now, and let these quotes be from a truly excellent sequel. — One that looks a little better than "Future I" had the year's winning streak. No, as usual, we are all expected Back in the summer of 1993.

'All Dogs' is moderately entertaining animation

The following are capsule reviews of movies now showing in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and the Los Angeles Times. Opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

ALL DOGS GO TO HEAVEN (G). The animated film from Don Bluth ("The Land Before Time," "An American Tail") is only moderately enjoyable. The animation is of variable quality, the songs are eminently unmemorable, and the story is almost forgettable. But Reynolds provides the voice for Charlie, the heaven-bound nut who befriends an orphan girl, and other familiar vocal cords, including those of Dom DeLuise and Melba Moore, also make appearances.

THE BEAR (PG). Jean-Jacques Annaud's adaptation of the (1916) James Oliver Curwood novel — about a fierce grizzly who is a lovable animal — is the best of the bear flutters through the Canadian Rockies — is one family film with epic purity and power. You'd have to go back to the first half of 1979 — "The Black Stallion" — to find a more comparable. The spectacular setting — actually the Bavarian Alps — is bathed in frosty clear light, caught with glacial purity by the great cinematographer Philippe Rousselot. The story is by the Bart and Little Douce — are tremendous camera subjects and the script, by Polanski's scenarist, Gerard Brach, is full of life-embracing idealism and a touch of dark, sophisticated wit.

DAD (PG). "Dad" wants desperately to deal frankly with that part of old age that every one of us fears: intrusive medical procedures, pill-popping physicians, loss of our memories and our very thoughts, the encroachment of real or imagined terrors. The fact that all these terrors are mirrored in Jack Lemmon's performance and in the interaction between him and Ted Danson is all to the credit of director-adaptor, Gary David Goldberg, of television's "Family Ties." But also at Goldberg's door is the fact that the film eventually succumbs to a pitiful sentimentalism that its performers have gone to some lengths to avoid.

LOOK WHO'S TALKING (PG-13). Movies in which animals or babies speak their thoughts by way of voiceover rarely work, but part of the strength here is that Bruce Willis, as the sperm-fetus-baby, isn't always talking. There's enough fairy-wyby interplay between mom Kinzie Alex and sister John Travolta to the movie could conceivably work even without the baby chat. Another unexpected strength of this uneven comedy is that it's as much

from the woman's point of view as the infant's, thanks to writer-director Amy Heckerling, whose own mothering experiences account for much of the script's casual insight. **SEA OF LOVE (R).** A slick, knowing genre film made fresh and diverting by a sense of humor and the bright presence of Al Pacino, Ellen Barkin and John Goodman. Barkin deftly handles the pivotal role as a stunning Manhattan businesswoman who may also be a serial killer whom Pacino's veteran cop is pursuing. Goodman is Pacino's witty partner. Satisfying as long as you don't ask more of it than simple escape.

SHOCKER (R). An insane TV repairman covets himself, after being electrocuted for heinous murders, into the Phantom of the Airwaves. **NOW AVAILABLE**

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hopping from TV to TV, body to body. We Haven is a virtuoso of lower-case horror, and "Shocker" is crammed with bursts of macabre technique. But, unlike his original "Nightmare on Elm Street," whose dream creature he tries, dubiously, to copy, this movie lacks a taut,

compelling structure. It's so diffusely organized that, at times, it seems to be three separate movies stopped together only the last, a media-age update on "Sherlock, Jr.," has much imagination or surprise.

WORTH WINNING (PG-13). Satire rather than romantic comedy

would have been the appropriate form for this rather cruel and sexist romp in which playboy Mark Harmon takes a bet that he can get three beautiful blondes: Madeline Zima, Lesley Ann Warren and new comer Maria Holveck — to accept his proposal of marriage.

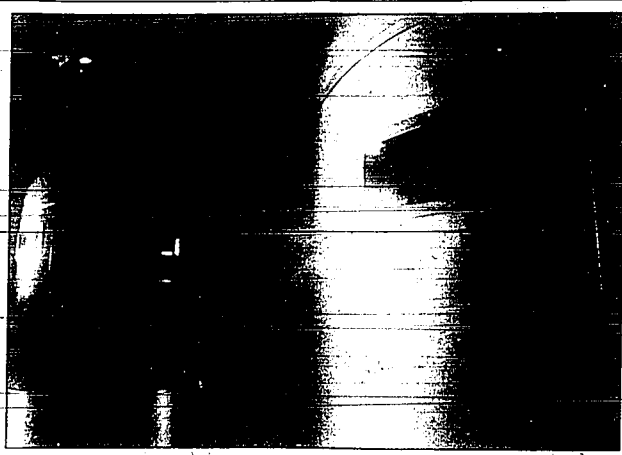

Anthis shows infrared work

TWIN FALLS — "From the Commercial/Industrial Zone," an exhibition of infrared photography by Linda Anthis opens Monday at the Sunspot Gallery. The sixteen-print display by the Magic Valley native is featured at the gallery on the campus of the College of Southern Idaho.

Linda Anthis is the photographer for the College of Southern Idaho's Public Information Office. In addition, her personal fine art photography appears in numerous regional galleries.

In this exhibition, she makes a return to infrared photography — an interest she explored at the beginning of her career 12 years ago. Infrared photography captures a combination of subject heat and light, producing distinctive images — on film — thermography; the medium is unpredictable and difficult to control.

"Linda has mastered infrared photography," says Wesley Wada, curator of the gallery. "She brings a pure vision to her works that is remarkable. A milestone of a mature photographer is the ability to distill the world at large to such clarity."

The images in the show are the surroundings of Anthis' youth, the commercial/industrial areas of

country towns. Her subject matter includes the graphic presence of stored commercial objects and industrial castoffs. All the works radiate light, giving the objects an other-worldly presence.

"Infrared imagery bridges space between factual and invented photography," states Anthis. "It demands an altered sense of seeing and rewards with a glimpse of a world of its own."

Anthis is one of the area's most active fine art photographers. She is the only Twin Falls photographer selected to the Idaho Centennial Photography Exhibition which opens in December for a two-year tour of the state. Her work has also appeared at the Boise Gallery of Art, the Boise State University Art Gallery, the Mind's Eye Gallery in Pocatello and other regional sites.

The Sunspot Gallery show runs through Jan. 18. The exhibition is located on the second floor of the Taylor Administration Building. Viewing hours are 8 a.m. through 8 p.m. Monday through Friday. The gallery is closed during school holidays.

Teleconference set

TWIN FALLS — A physical therapy teleconference, "Eccentric Muscle Action: A New Dimension in Exercise and Rehabilitation," will be offered at 7 p.m. Tuesday at the Idaho State University Residence Center, 140 Second St. E.

Eccentric muscle action, the context in which muscles absorb energy rather than acting as movers or stabilizers, has become a topic of discussion from sports arenas to clinics. The teleconference will be presented by the ISU physical therapy department and the American Rehabilitation Educational Network, a link for health care professionals involved in rehabilitation therapy. Cost is \$35 per participant for those pre-registering by Monday, \$40 per participant for on-site registration and \$8 for full-time ISU students.

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Pooches can now watch video made from dog's point of view

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — A dogged entrepreneur has produced a high-tech solution for canine owners who feel guilty leaving their pets at home alone — a videotape to entertain housebound hounds.

"Doggie Adventure," a 25-minute video for the wet-nosed set, is designed to stimulate Fido, not turn him into a couch canine. Filmed from a pooch's perspective, the tape portrays a non-stop romp through city streets, parks and a barnyard to mingle with animals. Its creator, Teresa Lutz, says dogs will snarl, howl and slobber along.

The VCR still must be turned on by humans, or activated by a timer. Writing and producing a video geared for dogs just seemed natural to Nancy Toberman, a Minneapolis businesswoman who says her recently deceased dog, Miss Piggy, was responsible for the project. The half-terrier, half-dachshund mongrel doesn't appear in the film but her bark is featured on the soundtrack.

"She's just been such a part of my life," Toberman said in an interview last week. "I guess this tape we put together is basically a biography of her."

Toberman said she is talking to some national retail outlets to try to bring the \$14.95 tape to stores by Christmas. Meanwhile, it's available by mail order.

Toberman, who runs a Twin Cities recording studio, said the idea came to her after an outing with Miss Piggy to a friend's farm two years ago. The cows sent the dog into a frenzy, and Toberman filmed the scene with his portable camera.

"Every time she sees that tape, she'd start barking furiously," he said.

Guilt also played a role in the videotape's creation.

"Many times, when we'd go out and do something and we'd tell her she had to stay, she'd have a real sad look on her face," said Toberman. "It broke your heart."

Filmed on location in Minneapolis and Hinckley, Minn., during the dog days of August, much of the tape cost about \$15,000 to produce.

Stereophonic sound gives canine viewers an earful. A collage jangles grass crunches underfoot — or, ungrassy — and water is slurped up from a dish. The crunch of dog biscuits adds to the ambience.

Toberman says a pet therapist recommended recording a variety of sounds to keep the dog's attention.

'Major Dad' confronts career officer with problems of marriage, children

Major John D. MacGillis is a conservative-minded career Marine officer and confirmed bachelor. Polly Cooper is a liberal-minded newspaper reporter and widowed mother of three daughters. They meet and, after a whirlwind romance, they marry. Can this former confirmed bachelor deal with marriage and a household of women?

"MacGillis is a man who all his life has lived by a very precise code of ethics and morals," says Gerald McRaney, who stars as MacGillis in "Major Dad," airing Mondays on CBS. "He appears to be a bit stiff until you get to know him a little better. And Polly is going to be tough and strong, but not unfeminine. She's going to be a combination of gentle strength."

The courtship was rather whirlwind, and we got right into the marriage aspect of it pretty quickly. So "Major Dad" will focus mainly on Mac trying to come to terms with his new life as a family man."

In the series, MacGillis must adjust not only to life on a stateside base but also to domesticity with wife Polly (Shanna Reed) and her three young daughters, Elizabeth (Marisa Ryan), Robin (Nicole Dubuc) and Casey (Chelsea Hertford). Mac hides his occasional discomfort be-

hind a stubborn, often gruff nature, but still manages to charm his staff and new family.

"One of the things that I found interesting was the examination of the man behind the uniform," says McRaney. "People perceive it as either tough or soft. And it's possible to be both. You can be a tough individual in combat and still be a sensitive individual when you come back home."

"A lot of the military stuff that has been done lately has mostly been all superheroes—or program-d-killor-dolite. Most of the people in the military are not Arnold-Schwarzenegger or Sylvester Stallone. They're just ordinary people doing their jobs."

McRaney's involvement in the show goes beyond filling the starring role. "I'm one of the executive producers on the show and I was in on it from the beginning," says McRaney. "I made a lot of visits to Camp Pendleton (in California). I spent time with the men in the infantry school, getting out and shooting some second unit stuff with them in the field and observing their classroom activities and field exercises."

Born in Collins, Miss., McRaney got his start in show business after moving to Los Angeles from New Or-

leans, where he was working in a professional repertory company. After six months in Los Angeles, he landed a guest role on "Night Gallery," and within two years he was acting steadily. His TV credits include movies (including "The Law," "The People Across the Lake," "A Haunting Passion," "A Hobo's Christmas" and "Murder by Moonlight") and miniseries ("Roots II: The Next Generations"). He has guest-starred on many series, including "The Rockford Files," "Gunsmoke" and "Designing Women." He starred on the CBS series "Simon & Simon" for eight seasons (1981-88).

Of "Major Dad," McRaney sums up, "When I started with the whole idea of the show, it was basically my saying to myself, 'Well, this is something I would watch.' That's the only ultimate gauge that I have over whether anything is going to be good or any fun to work on. This is going to be enjoyable."

NBC drops news event re-creations

WASHINGTON — NBC News has dropped the use of re-creations and, in the process, turned control of the one News program that employs such simulations — the magazine show, "Yesterday, Today & Tomorrow" — over to NBC Entertainment.

The announcement Monday by NBC News president Michael Gartner was greeted with relief inside the division and got a quick vote of approval from ABC News president Ronnie Arledge, who had some well-publicized trouble of his own with a re-creation on "World News Tonight"

last summer and has since for all intents and purposes banned the often-criticized practice of ABC.

Only CBS News Monday said it was planning to continue re-creations, on one of its news programs — "Saturday Night With Connie Chung."

In a statement, Gartner said, "After experimenting with re-creations in our three pilot episodes of YTT this summer, and after observing their use in the industry, we have determined that the practice can result in confusion to the viewer. Our primary responsibility at NBC News is to convey information clearly. If viewers are confused, the solution is simple

— abandon re-creations in news programming."

After YTT's three tryouts, another three programs were then announced, starting with next Tuesday's (Nov. 28) "That Show," which includes a re-creation of how the U.S. government began its witness protection program, will air as scheduled — but it will be the last with a News division connection.

Whether the Entertainment division will produce the last two scheduled versions of YTT or whether it will abandon the show title and perhaps switch to a series of specials adopting some of the short series's innovations was not known yesterday.

Leader of NBC pack squeaks past ABC miniseries 'Small Sacrifices'

LOS ANGELES (AP) — NBC's "The Cosby Show" was first again but the ABC miniseries "Small Sacrifices" ran a close second in the Nielsen ratings for the week ended Nov. 19.

Bill Cosby was at the top for the third straight week and five other NBC comedies were in the Top 10.

"Small Sacrifices," starring Farah Fawcett as an Oregon woman convicted of shooting her children so that she could be with her boyfriend, was next with the second of two parts. The first part was 12th in the previous week's ratings.

NBC won the week by a wide margin. Its average in the A.C. Nielsen Co. survey was 16. ABC was second with 13.2 and CBS was third with 11.7. The rating is the percentage of the nation's 92.1 million television homes tuned in to a program.

Fox Broadcasting Co. scored its highest average for regular programming on a Sunday with 8.1. That's topped only by a 9.7 rating for its telecast of the Emmy awards on Sept. 17. A one-hour "America's Most Wanted" special beat both ABC and NBC in the 8-9 p.m. time slot. It was 49th in the listing, but "Married... With Children" did even better as it tied for 41st place.

NBC leads for the season-to-date with 15.1. ABC is second with 13.5 and CBS third with 12.4. NBC's
