On the road Thanksgiving Day alone part of life for truckers

EDEN — On a cold, blustery Thanksgiving Day, there's no better place to share the holiday meal than at home, among friends and family.

Just ask Lloyd Jobe.

Jobe, 58, spent Thanksgiving at the Traveler's Oasis Truck Plaza off Interstate 84, some 1,200 miles from his home in Battle Lake, Minn.

"This isn't a bad place to spend Thanksgiving," Jobe said Thursday afternoon as he polished off the remains of his free dinner. "But if I had a choice, I'd rather be home."

Jobe, a trucker, didn't have a choice. Highway rules don't allow extra-wide loads, like the cargo of scale modules he was taking from Columbus, Ohio, to Everett, Wash., to travel on holidays because of the heavier-than-normal traffic.

Jobe had hoped to deliver his cargo earlier this week so he could make it home in time for Turkey Day. But after reaching Omaha last Friday, he ran into a heavy snowstorm that set him three days behind schedule.

So, when he arrived at the Traveler's Oasis Wednesday afternoon, Jobe figured he might as well camp there until this morning, when he'll hit the highway again.

"It isn't bad," he said again, "but time goes by very slowly."

Judging by the license plates in the parking lot, people from as far away as Delaware, Pennsylvania and Georgia spent at least part of their Thanksgiving at the

Food, parades, thanks mark holiday for many Americans

Not everyone had a good day — Kermit the Frog sprang a leak and wilted.

The six Atlantis astronauts were awakened by a recording of turkeys squawking and gobbling, followed by Jimmy Buffet's tune "Cheeseburger in Paradise," in which he sings: "Tryin' to amend my carnivorous habits."

"We hope you liked our turkey music," Mission Control said. The shuttle's pantry had no room for a 20-pound turkey, but the astronauts did have a choice between "thermostabilized" or precooked, turkey with gravy and dehydrated turkey tetrazzini.

The holiday felt all too familiar to some of the 850 servicemen and servicewomen sent to the U.S. Navy base at Guantanamo, Cuba, to help thousands of Haitian refugees.

"I left Thanksgiving week last year to go to Saudi Arabia," said Sgt. Stephen Boesch, 23, an intelligence analyst in the 96th Civil Affairs Battalion at Fort Bragg, N.C.

While soldiers and sailors were far from home, Thomas Sutherland got to spend Thanksgiving with his family for the first time after six years as a hostage in Lebanon.

"We really do want to give thanks to everybody, all of America for the reception we've had, for a homecoming like this beyond all possible expectations," Sutherland said Wednesday from a daughter's house in Berkeley, Calif. He spent Thursday in private.

Turner planned a quiet day with his family in Boise, Idaho, his mother said. And Edward Tracy ate turkey dinner at the Veterans Administration Medical Center in Boston, where he has been since his captors freed him in August. Tracy has a history of hospitalization for psychological disorders.

Elsewhere in Boston, 11 immigrants prepared a Thanksgiving feast for about 175 homeless men at The New England Shelter for Homeless Veterans.

"This holiday is really a special time for us to say thank you to the Vietnam veterans who fought for democracy for the Vietnamese people," said Vietnamese immigrant Hanh Tran, 41. "This is a day we thank Americans for letting us stay in America."

President Bush delivered a broadcast Thanksgiving Day message, focusing on the ailing economy.

Gadhafi spurns demand for bombing suspects

ROME — Libyan leader Moammar Gadhafi ridiculed charges that Libya carried out the bombing of Pan Am Flight 103 and said in a television interview Thursday he would not surrender two Libyans accused of the attack.

"The evidence against Libya is less than a laughable piece of a fingernail," Gadhafi said in an interview with the Italian-owned network Telemontecarlo.

"They affirm that they have decisive

evidence against Libya and enough ... this is disinformation and deceit of public opinion." We are asking that these investigations not be closed and we challenge them to produce evidence against Libya," he said.

The United States and Britain demanded Wednesday that Libya turn over two intelligence agents — Abdel Basset Ali Al-Meghanni and Lamem Khalifah Fhimah — who have been indicted in the December 1988 bombing that killed 270 people.

Britain and the United States were joined by France, which has charged four Libyans in connection with the 1989 bombing of a French jetliner, in demanding that Libya commit itself to stop terrorist actions.

Libya has repeatedly denied any involvement in the destruction of Flight 103 over Lockerbie, Scotland, or in the bombing of the French UTA flight 772 that killed 170 people over Niger.

"Libyan law, like the law of any other country, does not permit the delivery to

Lawyer claims Air Force, air guard acted illegally

TWIN FALLS — The Air Force and the Idaho Air National Guard have illegally separated environmental reviews to reduce apparent effects of proposed changes, a Boise attorney charges.

Not so, says the Air Force.

The air guard in September found the change at Boise's Gowen Field from reconnaissance aircraft to air-to-ground attack planes would have "no significant impact."

But the guard's environmental assessment leading to that conclusion was insufficient to support such a finding and should be withdrawn, according to Boise attorney Murray D. Feldman.

Changes in the air guard's operations at Gowen Field should be considered in the same environmental impact statement as changes proposed for Mountain Home Air Force Base, he said.

"The Gowen (environmental assessment) is legally insufficient and cannot form a basis for the finding of no significant impact based on the proposed action," Feldman wrote to the air guard.

Feldman represents the Greater Owyhee Legal Defense — a coalition of environmental groups that include the Idaho Conservation League, the Committee for Idaho's High Desert, the Idaho Wildlife Council, Idaho Rivers United, the Sierra Club, the Wilderness Club and the Foundation for North American Wild Sheep.

Feldman's interpretation of the National Environmental Policy Act would require the air guard to withdraw its assessment and its "finding of no significant impact" and conduct a more thorough environmental review, he said.

The change at Gowen Field, in fact, should be considered in the same impact statement as the Air Force's proposed changes at Mountain Home, along with effects of a proposed bombing range in southwestern Owyhee County, Feldman said.

The Air Force proposes to establish a composite wing of 64 or 76 planes, to consolidate aircraft over Owyhee County and to consider the suitability of a bombing

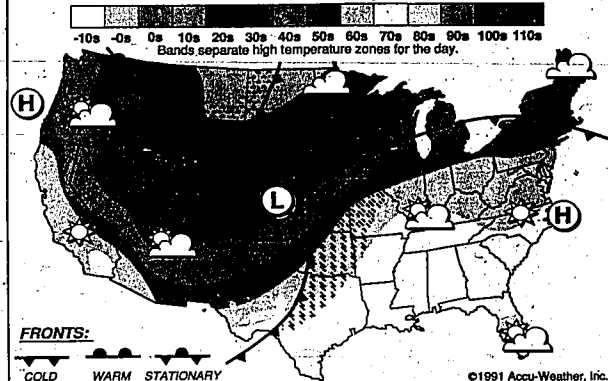

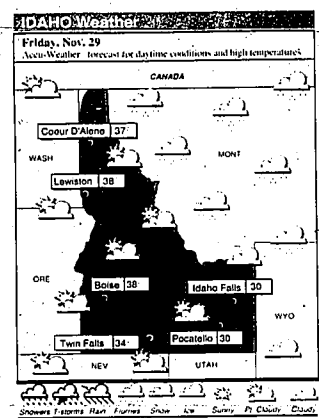

Weather summary

A break between storms brought a little sunshine to the Gem State by about noon Thanksgiving Day, but not for long.

The National Weather Service says a broad area of clouds moved down across the border from Canada into the Idaho panhandle. The storm system with those clouds spread light snow from north-to-south over the state.

The storm was expected to move out of Idaho Friday morning.

Temperatures statewide Thursday afternoon were mostly in the 30s except low 40s in the summer spots. Warmest were Boise and Mountain Home with 41 degrees.

The warmest temperature in the state Thursday was 49 degrees at Payette. Stanley reported the coldest at 4 degrees below zero.

Elsewhere in the nation Thursday, the highest temperature was 86 degrees at Laredo and Pecos, Texas. The lowest was 12 degrees below zero at West Yellowstone, Mont.

Snow, freezing rain extend from Rockies to Great Lakes

Snow and rain spread across the north-central section of the nation on Thanksgiving Day, and a new snow storm was developing over the Rockies.

A mixture of freezing rain, sleet and snow extended across the northern half of the Plains to the Great Lakes along the north edge of a storm front curving through the central Plains and the middle Mississippi Valley.

Waterloo, Iowa, got half an inch of snow during the morning, just enough to push its total for the month to a record 15.4 inches, up from the 15.0 inches in November 1934.

Snow associated with a storm system developing over the central Rockies fell over parts of Wyoming and Colorado, and the snow was expected to spread into the Upper Midwest on Friday. Sheridan, Wyo., received 2.3 inches of snow during the night into Thursday morning.

A snow advisory was in effect through Friday for the northern and central Rockies in Colorado.

Winter storm watches were posted for Friday for south-

Atlantis crew ducks junk, dines

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — Atlantis' astronauts steered out of the way of a chunk of Soviet rocket Thursday, becoming the second shuttle crew in three months forced to change course because of space junk.

The six astronauts settled down to a Thanksgiving turkey dinner following the orbiting maneuver.

Shuttle commander Frederick Gregory veered out of the path of the rocket debris late Thursday afternoon, about 10 1/2 hours before the two objects were to have passed in space.

The crew of the last shuttle flight, in September, had to dodge a Soviet Cosmos rocket part. It was the first time in the 10-year-old shuttle program that astronauts had to move their ship to avoid orbiting debris.

"It's not like this was due to any increase in the amount of (space junk) traffic. It was just sheer coincidence that we've had two of them together," said NASA flight director Phil Engelauf.

NASA rules stipulate that the shuttle fly no closer than 1.3 miles above or beside another orbiting object, or 3.1 miles behind another object. Atlantis would have been 3.3 miles behind the Cosmos booster if the shuttle had not detoured, but now was expected to pass no closer than 35 miles, Engelauf said.

Jobe took in the Bears-Lions football game in the Traveler's Oasis truckers' lounge before coming down for supper, and he said he'd probably spend the rest of the day in front of the television.

Each year, the truck stop gives truckers' free dinners on Thanksgiving. By 2 p.m. about 20 truckers had availed themselves of the complimentary turkey, stuffing, yams and other traditional fare.

"It's a nice thing for them to do for those of us away from home," Jobe said. "I really appreciate it."

Over at the Petro 2 near the interchange linking I-84 and U.S. 93, Manfred Lange was also spending his holiday within sight of a prostitute.

Lange, from Harmony, Minn., was taking time out from his Spokane-to-St. Paul run to update his paperwork and partake of some holiday cheer.

"I doesn't bother me," Lange said of being on the road; "it'll be nice to be home, but this is part of the job."

Indeed, last week was the first time Lange had been home in two months, and that was just for a few days.

Lange, a trucker for 32 years, drives for Cenex, delivering supplies throughout the Northwest and the upper Midwest. He's familiar enough with the route that the waitresses and cashiers along the way are like old friends.

"I like to talk a lot, and I pretty much know who I'll see around here, so it's not too bad," he said.

Lange's plan for the rest of the day was to finish his paperwork, have his Thanksgiving dinner at Petro 2, then get some sleep in his truck before heading out to Blackfoot, and eventually home, early this morning.

As for a handful of truckers and other long-distance travelers, business at the truck stop was pretty slow, cashier Sheila Smith said.

"A lot of the guys are telling us, 'Two hours and I'll be home,'" Smith said. "They just want to come in, fuel up, eat and get going. Pretty much all we're doing today is decorating for Christmas."

Victims of Flight 103 and disclose all it knows about the attack, including the names of those responsible.

The U.S.-British statement Wednesday did not mention specific sanctions if Libya rejects the demands or specify a deadline for compliance. However, a British official in London, speaking on condition of anonymity, said: "We are thinking in terms of weeks, not months."

Possible sanctions include cutting air links with Libya and an international oil embargo, although officials acknowledge it would be difficult to get United Nations approval for an embargo. The United States, which bombed Tripoli and Benghazi in April 1986 in retaliation for a terrorist attack, has not ruled out military action.

France sought Thursday to step up the pressure on Libya to cooperate on the UTA bombing.

"On Lockerbie, the Libyan news agency JANA said Thursday that Libyan Supreme Court Justice Ahmad Tabir Al-Zawhi, who is heading a Libyan investigation into the bombing, has asked U.S. and British authorities for access to all documents relating to the charges.

Gadhafi also insisted in the interview that evidence be shown to a third party and, if Libyan involvement in the bombing is shown, he said, "Libya will take on its responsibilities."

Britain indicated that would not be acceptable.

"The proper outcome is a trial where the crime took place. We made our position quite clear. We expect Libya to comply in full," said a Foreign Office spokesman in London, speaking on condition of anonymity.

Gadhafi also suggested that one of the indictments was a case of mistaken identity, and that Libya could not identify the individual who has been charged.

range proposed by Gov. Cecil Andrus.

Considering these issues separately constitutes an "impermissible segmentation of the overall Air Force proposal that masks the true environmental impact of the proposed actions and prevents the public and agency decision makers from obtaining full disclosure of the environmental impacts of the proposed actions," Feldman wrote.

The 1991 Base Realignment and Closure Commission report makes clear that the "Gowen Field conversion is simply one component of the overall proposals for changes in Air Force operations in Idaho," he added.

Federal law requires that related actions be considered in the same environmental impact statement.

"But instead of separating impacts, we've included it all into one document," said Lt. Col. Tom Bartol of Norton Air Force Base in California, who is in charge of developing the Air Force's environmental impact statement.

He maintains that the Gowen Field changes are indeed a separate action that already has been completed.

"That's stretching things pretty far to think this is all one action," Bartol said this week. The conversion is not part of the Air Force proposal, he said.

Even so, the impacts of the conversion are considered in the Air Force impact statement, Bartol said. The Air Force admits that operations at Gowen Field will increase use of the Air Force's Sawyer Creek Bombing Range in eastern Owyhee County, and that increase forms the basis for the Air Force considering a new bombing range proposed by Andrus in the southwestern part of the county.

But the Air Force does not consider the proposed Big Springs Bombing Range as necessary to establish the composite wing at Mountain Home, Bartol said.

The governor's proposal would enhance our training opportunities," he said.

But Air Force officials acknowledge that the F-4G jets moving to Gowen Field and the change in the Idaho air guard's mission will contribute to the need for additional training range space in Idaho.

"The F-4s are one of the drivers" for considering the additional range space, said Lt. Col. Jim Cooper of Mountain Home Air Force Base before a recent hearing on the Air Force's environmental impact statement on its own proposals.

Because Gowen Field planes use Air Force training ranges and increase the need for additional range space, the two issues cannot be separated, Feldman asserts.

"The Air Force's current Gowen Field (environmental assessment) represents an impermissible attempt to segment out one portion of the larger, overall Air Force proposals in Idaho that are designed to carry out the recommendations of the Base Closure and Realignment Commission," he wrote.

Bush laments 'bitter session' of Congress, seeks accommodation

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush said Thursday that he'd rather fight to create jobs than do battle with Congress over economic policy at a time "when people are hurting" across America.

In a Thanksgiving television address produced by the White House, Bush showed no inclination toward any special December congressional session to deal specifically with the nation's business woes.

"Congress left town after a particularly bitter session," he said in the speech released by the White House the morning after Congress adjourned for the year. "We now have a few weeks in which elected officials can cool off and hear from the people they serve."

House Speaker Thomas S. Foley, in an escalating war of rhetoric over who's to blame for hard times, had exhorted Bush to send an economic

growth package to the Capitol immediately. Members of the House and Senate would be poised to return early next month to consider such a plan, said Foley, D-Washington.

But Bush said in the speech that he still prefers to offer his ideas in late January, when he gives his State of the Union address to a joint session of Congress and the nation.

"I will ask Congress to lay aside election-year politics at least long enough to enact a common-sense series of economic growth measures," he said.

Bush, who is expected to officially declare his candidacy for re-election to a second term early next year, also said that he would "ask politicians to restrain their personal ambitions at least long enough to get the job done. Afterward, the normal election-year battling can resume."

Bush's holiday remarks were contained in a television tape produced by the White House and made available by satellite to TV stations around the country. Radio stations were able to broadcast the audio from the tape.

In the speech, the president paid tribute to the servicemen and women who served in the Persian Gulf War and recalled his visit last Thanksgiving with troops deployed in the sands of Saudi Arabia.

"We stood up to aggression" against Kuwait, he said. "And when our men and women returned home,

remember how we felt proud, excited and confident, even relieved — all because we knew that we did the right thing."

"But Bush focused most of his speech on the ailing economy at home and talked of the letters of praise he's been getting from people thrown out of work."

"Well, I do understand. I am concerned," he said. "And I want to help. I know that for a person out of a job, the unemployment rate is 100 percent."

Bush said at the beginning of this year he had asked Congress "to pass an important series of initiatives to boost our economy," and lamented that lawmakers "did not send me a comprehensive package of economic growth measures."

The centerpiece of the Bush growth package is a proposed reduction in the rate of taxes Americans pay on capital gains — the money

earned on the sale of investment assets such as real estate, stocks, bonds and so forth. He believes that lowering this tax rate would encourage investment and result in creation of new jobs.

The House and Senate adjourned Wednesday evening until Jan. 3, but their members were put on notice if they could be called back earlier, if necessary to weigh economic growth or tax legislation. The House Ways and Means Committee opens a series of hearings next week on rival Republican and Democratic tax plans.

Congress keeps diverting campaign money

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress resumed a perk this week, voting to continue — temporarily — the right of senators to use campaign funds to pay for official duties.

But lawmakers insisted the practice will end May 1.

Year-old legislation would have ended the practice Jan. 3, making Senate policy compatible with House ban on use of campaign mon-

ey for official purposes. Senators pleaded for more time — and got it — when an extension was inserted into an emergency spending bill that passed Congress on Wednesday. The practice remains legal until May 1.

The chairman of the Senate and House appropriations subcommittees for the legislative branch both went along with the extension dur-

ing conference committee deliberations. But they insisted there will be no new deadlines.

"I said all right (to the extra four months) but no more extensions," commented Rep. Vic Fazio, D-Calif., chairman of the House legislative branch subcommittee.

Fazio said the House has been riddled for quite some time about the Senate practice, which permits use of campaign money to help run offices, furnish them, lease cars for senators and pay for newsletters to constituents.

The anger spilled over in October 1990, when senators complained about the cost of taxpayer-financed mass mailings by House members. The House members retorted that senators had lower costs because they subsidized their mailings with campaign money.

Compromise legislation placed restrictions on House mailings and imposed a prohibition on the Senate use of campaign money for official expenses. The House sought to impose the ban immediately, but the Senate pleaded for time to implement the change — and was given until Jan. 3, 1992.

Law requires living will information be given out

WASHINGTON (AP) — Many Americans are uncomfortable talking about death, especially their own.

But a new law that takes effect Dec. 1 will try to change this attitude and get more people to consider the medical treatment they would want if unable to communicate their wishes.

The law will require providers in the federal Medicare and Medicaid programs to inform adult patients about their state rights to accept or refuse medical treatment — and to prepare a living will or similar advance directive. Providers also must document "in the patient's records" whether they have such a document.

The statute applies to hospitals, nursing facilities, hospices, home health care programs and health maintenance organizations.

"They will not be told they must have one, but they will be told that if they choose to have one they can," said Pamela Rouse, executive director of Choice in Dying, a national, nonprofit, right-to-die organization.

"We hope many of them (hospitals and others) will use this as the beginning of a conversation," she said.

An advance directive is the general term for a written statement that is prepared in advance of a serious ill-

ness and sets out how people want medical decisions made if they become unable to communicate their wishes.

This directive commonly becomes a living will, which stipulates the kind of life-prolonging medical care someone desires. Another form is a durable power of attorney for health care, which designates someone to make health related decisions for a patient unable to do so. Laws regarding these directives vary from state to state.

Without an advance directive, medical decisions — such as whether to continue life-support systems — are left to a patient's family, physician and hospital and sometimes to a judge.

Currently, one in four American adults has an advance directive, according to Rouse's group, which is a merger of Concern for Dying and Society for the Right to Die.

Most people who have been involved in educating hospitals and others about the new law expect the number to increase further. Rouse says the new law "is going to have a really major impact. It's going to make advance directives a common language" in a society where people "really have a hard time discussing" death.

Cost of HIV infection, AIDS will exceed \$5 billion, study shows

NEW YORK (AP) — The nation's medical bill for treating people with AIDS or AIDS virus infection will reach \$5.8 billion this year and will almost double to \$10.4 billion in 1994, a federal study estimates.

The study is the first national estimate to consider not only people with AIDS, but also other people infected with HIV, the AIDS virus, said author Fred Hellinger.

Projected totals included \$7.2 billion in 1992 and \$8.7 billion in 1993. By comparison, Hellinger noted the annual cost of treating cancer was estimated at \$35.3 billion.

He said his forecasts are underestimates

because they exclude several expensive medications approved since he did the calculations, as well as unapproved drugs and services, such as counseling, not covered by insurance or Medicaid.

Hellinger is director of the division of cost and financing at the federal Agency for Health Care Policy and Research. He presents his estimates in the fall issue of Inquiry, a journal dealing with health care organization, provision and financing.

In a telephone interview, Hellinger said a recently proposed change in the federal definition of AIDS would not affect his overall

estimates, although it would shift some costs from HIV treatment to AIDS treatment.

Hellinger based his estimates on information from a variety of sources, including Medicaid studies in several states and research at treatment centers.

For treatment of AIDS, he calculated a cost of \$4.4 billion this year, based on an annual treatment cost of \$32,000 per patient.

The estimate assumes averages of 1.6 hospital days per year at 15 days per stay, and \$1,000 a day for time in the hospital. It also assumes that outpatient costs comprise 25 percent of the total calculated cost of care

for an AIDS patient, an assumption Hellinger called conservative.

Treatment of HIV infection without AIDS this year was estimated at \$1.4 billion. The number covers only people actually receiving treatment for HIV infection, rather than the cost of treating every infected person. An estimated 1 million Americans are infected.

On the basis of reports from a variety of treatment centers, Hellinger estimated that two people with HIV receive medical care for every AIDS patient under care.

He set the average annual cost of HIV

treatment this year at \$5,150 per patient. That assumes that at any one time, 30 percent of such patients are receiving AZT to suppress the virus and 30 percent are taking aerosol pentamidine to forestall a potentially lethal pneumonia. The cost of AZT was estimated at \$2,700 a year and aerosol pentamidine at \$3,000 a year.

The estimate also includes annual costs of \$500 a year for other drugs, \$700 for visits to medical offices and clinics, \$800 for laboratory tests, \$200 for other outpatient expenses and \$1,240 for inpatient hospital care.

Fortune's Mob 50 fall to time, courts

NEW YORK (AP) — The war on crime and Father Time have decimated Fortune magazine's list of the nation's biggest Mafia bosses.

Five years after they were selected, most of the Fortune 50 are out of business — in jail, in retirement or in the ground.

According to an Associated Press survey of law enforcers and other experts, only eight of the 50 are still pursuing an unfettered life of crime. Twenty-three are serving prison terms, most of them long; nine are retired or inactive; six are dead; three are on bail; and one is a fugitive and possibly dead.

In 1986, 27 of the 50 men Fortune selected for their "wealth, power and influence" were free, and six others were out on bail. They also were five years younger; the average age of the 44 living members of the Fortune 50 is 69 and 17 of the bosses are over 75.

The old saw that "no one retires from the mob" is wrong: 85-year-old Anthony "Big Tuna" Accardo (No. 2 on the Fortune list), a one-time pal of Al Capone, winters in Palm Springs and summers on an estate outside Chicago.

Similarly comfortable is 87-year-old Vincent "Jimmy Blue Eyes" Alo, (No. 23) an associate of the legendary Meyer Lansky, who lives in Miami following a lucrative career in casino gambling and money laundering.

The retired also include two seminal mafiosi: Joseph Bonanno (No. 14), founder of the New York crime family that bears his name, and Carlos Marcello (No. 16), boss in New Orleans for almost a half century.

Bonanno and Marcello both served time; Bonanno, 87, was released at age 82, the 81-year-old Marcello less than a year ago.

"I'm retired. I'm happy. Everybody's been nice to me," Marcello said after his release.

The most dramatic departure from the list was made by John "Johnny Doe" DiGirollo (No. 39), a reputed member of the Genovese family, whose body was found in a New Jersey river three years ago.

Others went quietly. Chicago boss Joseph Ferriola (No. 20) died following his second heart transplant, and Tampa boss Santo Trafficante (No. 15) succumbed after triple bypass surgery.

Then there's Angelo "Little Angie" Tuminaro, the alleged head of the "French Connection" heroin ring. The former Luchese family member has not been heard from in more than six years; he would be 86 if he's still around.

Six of the top 10 are serving 100-year sentences, including the No. 1 man, 80-year-old former Genovese boss "Fat Tony" Salerno.

Former Boston underboss, Genaro Angiulo (No. 34) works in the clothing room at Leavenworth.

Firm will pay wetlands fine

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. (AP) — One of the state's agribusiness leaders has agreed to pay \$680,000 in fines and costs for digging 22 miles of canals without a permit in wetlands near Lake Okechobee.

Lykes Bros. Inc. "made a colossal snafu" in 1989 when the excavations, said company attorney Buddy Blain.

A helicopter survey by the South Florida Water Management District discovered the digging.

The district ordered Lykes to plug the newly dug canals with earthen dams and worked-out restoration plans to mute the effects.

"We were able to turn an environmental disaster into environmental success," said water district Executive Director Tilford Creel. "Today, we will not tolerate violations of this kind to our wetlands."

Navy plans nuclear testing despite fading threat from Soviets

WASHINGTON (AP) — In the two years since the Navy announced plans to put a nuclear blast simulator off the Albatross coast, the Cold War has ended, the Soviet Union has broken apart and President Bush has declared the end of global war over.

But that hasn't slowed the Navy's plans to mount the device on a barge in the Gulf of Mexico. Over the next 20 years, it would fire pulses at passing Navy ships to determine if their electronic systems can survive a nuclear explosion in space. This is a dinosaur of the Cold War era, says Andrew Kimbrell, a lawyer for the Washington-based Foundation

on Economic Trends, which has been waging a legal battle against the project. "And unfortunately, it's a very expensive and potentially hazardous dinosaur."

The final environmental impact statement on the project was released earlier this month and now the final decision is up to Secretary of the Navy Lawrence Garrett III.

The Electromagnetic Pulse Radiation Environmental Simulator, or EMP II as the project is commonly called, can create an electromagnetic field similar to what would be generated on Earth by a nuclear explosion in space.

The pulser is surrounded by a cone of antennas 150 feet high and emits an electromagnetic pulse (EMP) that lasts just 10 billionths of a second.

The Navy plans to fire the pulse at passing ships to test the effectiveness of their electronic system protections. The first tests are scheduled for November, 1992 on the cruiser USS Anzio.

Development and construction of the barge has cost \$60 million and the Anzio tests are expected to cost another \$11 million.

Capt. William Mahew, manager of the

Empress II program, acknowledged in a recent interview that the program would likely come under increasing scrutiny as defense budgets are cut. But he argued that it still is needed.

"Although the Soviets appear now to be a kinder, gentler nation—they still have a tremendous capability, out there and they haven't fallen off yet much," Mahew said.

He also said the Navy had used the program to devise protections against electromagnetic interference from ships operating near each other.

The Navy's final environmental impact statement on Empress II does not address whether it's still needed in light of the diminished threat of nuclear war. Kimbrell said that omission is a critical failing.

"It seems to me it's incumbent now on the Navy to say what validated threat scenario they are imagining and how does this program address a real, validated threat," he said.

The Navy turned to Gulf of Mexico site — 26 miles south of Mobile Bay — after environmental groups persuaded Congress to prohibit the tests in the Chesapeake Bay, the Navy's first choice.

Pasadena fires worry residents

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — Wind-driven flames in the brush-covered hills ringing the Rose Bowl threatened expensive homes for a couple of hours Thursday and some residents were briefly evacuated.

Wind gusting to 40 mph spread flames over 10 acres before they were extinguished at midmorning, about 75 minutes after the first alarm, said fire Inspector Brian Jordan. "The fire's out and we are in the mop-up stages," he said.

Blustery wind, low humidity and the approach of a sixth drought year have kept the region particularly vulnerable to fire for the past week.

Two of the 200 firefighters battling the blaze suffered minor eye and ankle injuries, Jordan said. No buildings were damaged.

About 100 residents in the La Canada Flintridge area at the western edge of the fire fled their homes briefly at the urging of the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department.

They returned within an hour, however, and a Red Cross shelter set up at La Canada High School wasn't used, said Beth Cooper, a spokeswoman for the Pasadena chapter of the American Red Cross.

For well over an hour, helicopters bombarded the fire with water as it approached \$1 million-plus ridges. The cause of the fire was not immediately determined. Three miles away in South Pasadena, another morning brush fire threatened homes but was quickly extinguished when it still covered only a half-acre. "We jumped on it," said Fire Chief Jim Parker. It wasn't known if the fire was ignited by hot embers from the Pasadena blaze.

On Thanksgiving eve in San Bernardino, firefighters surrounded a brush fire that burned 127 acres in the San Bernardino National Forest and briefly forced the closure of a state highway.

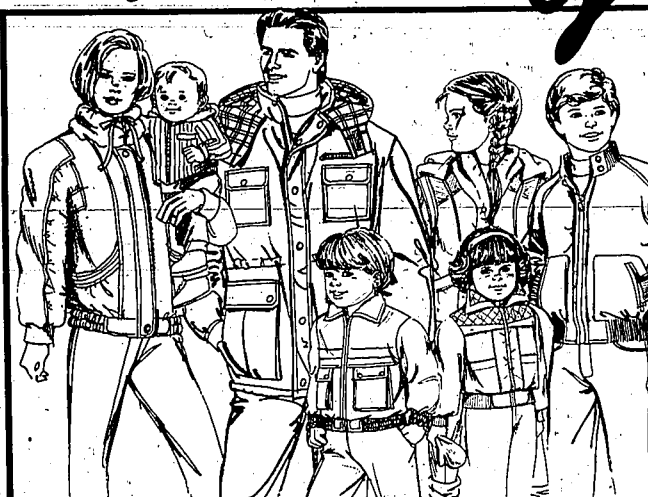

Wrangle over dates confronts Israel with conference dilemma

JERUSALEM — For decades, Israel has accused its Arab foes of boycotting negotiations.

Now it is risking an embarrassing reversal.

The United States has invited the belligerents to negotiate in Washington on Wednesday, Syria, Lebanon, Jordan and the Palestinians say they're coming. Israel wants a delay of five days.

Israel has put itself in a tight spot. If it shows up Wednesday, critics will call it a humiliating climbdown. If it doesn't come, it will be accused of blocking peace efforts.

Yossi Sarid, a left-wing opposition lawmaker, envisioned a scenario Thursday in which all the Arabs are at the table, under the gaze of TV cameras, and only Israel's chair is empty.

"It would not only be a terrible shame, but irreparably damaging to Israel's image," he said.

The request for a delay was accompanied by Israel's insistence that the talks be staggered so that it negotiates with Arab delegations sepa-

rately. Israel also repeated its demand that the Arabs agree, as a sign of good faith, to move the talks speedily to the Middle East or nearby.

These requests — Israel insists they are not conditions — appear to stem from a combination of damaged pride and suspicion that the Arabs are using the Americans to avoid genuine peace talks.

"We have to pull from the hearts of our Arab partners the belief that the American government is on their side and wants to hold negotiations that are a cover for American pressure on Israel," said Yossi Ben-Aharon, director of Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir's office.

Israeli officials say the delay is needed simply for preparation. Israeli newspapers are calling it "muscle-flexing" — a show of pique over the way Washington brusquely issued the invitations last Thursday without consulting Shamir to confer with President Bush.

"It was definitely necessary to make clear to the Americans that al-

though Yitzhak Shamir is short, he does not necessarily fit into George Bush's pocket," the daily-Maariv editorialized.

But while a compromise may be found on the timing, the substantive issue is the where and how.

Israel wants the talks split because it doesn't want to face a phalanx of Arab delegates.

"Experience has shown that under these circumstances, the lowest common denominator prevails, the extreme position takes over, and the chances of true negotiations are diminished," said Wednesday's commentary on the delay.

Israel thinks it can make progress with the Jordanian-Palestinian delegation, and doesn't want the headline Syrians interested in the background.

"The Arabs are interested in talking with us and conducting direct negotiations, but rather in talking with the U.S. and through them to try and exert pressure on Israel," it said.

Therefore, Israeli officials say, they have to head off such pressure at the outset.

Provisional government sets election in Haiti for January

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti (AP) — The interim government on Thursday scheduled Jan. 5 elections for a successor to ousted President Jean-Bertrand Aristide, defying other countries pressing for his reinstatement.

Jean-Jacques Honorat, the interim prime minister, said on state-run radio that an Electoral Council would be set up by Dec. 5 to organize the balloting scheduled for one month later.

The decision to hold an election follows: the collapse of talks last weekend in Cartagena, Colombia between Haitian lawmakers and Aristide, who was ousted by the military in a Sept. 30 coup.

After his ouster, the 34-nation Organization of American States, including the United States, approved economic sanctions that included an embargo to press for Aristide's reinstatement.

On Wednesday, officials disclosed that a Liberian-registered tanker had arrived with a shipment of desperately needed fuel. The 80,000 barrels of heavy oil and 30,000 barrels of gasoline will meet the country's needs for two weeks, they said.

Nevertheless, the embargo has crippled the economy of Haiti, the most impoverished country in the Americas, and led thousands of Haitians to flee in fragile boats.

Paul Lantier, a Haitian economist at the University of Puerto Rico, predicted that the scheduling of elections would lead to further foreign condemnation.

"This is a solution for a disaster," he said. "This is one way to kill the democratic process."

During the Cartagena talks, Aristide sought an accord naming him as

Haiti's only legitimate president. The legislators favored a general word pledge to restore democracy.

The interim government and the army accuse Aristide of abusing power, authoritarian rule and inciting mob violence.

In setting an election date in defiance of international pressure for Aristide's reinstatement, Honorat said the provisional government was merely abiding by the constitution.

Haiti's 1987 constitution stipulates that a government set up in the absence of an elected president must call a new election within 90 days. The military installed Honorat's interim administration on Oct. 8.

Aristide would be barred from the election under a constitutional provision preventing a president from succeeding himself.

Meeting the election timetable, however, may prove difficult.

The Dec. 5 deadline allows only one week for setting up the nine-

Cambodian prince signs accord to protect Angkor temples

PARIS (AP) — Prince Norodom Sihanouk, Cambodia's interim president, signed an accord Thursday in Phnom Penh that brings the Angkor temple complex under international protection.

Sihanouk signed the World Heritage Convention during a meeting at his palace with Federico Mayor, director general of the U.N. Educa-

tional, Scientific and Cultural Organization, the agency announced in Paris.

The ruined palaces and temples of Angkor have remained a symbol of unity for Cambodia's people during two decades of civil war and stand as a testament to the country's golden age 800 years ago.

Mayor is on a three-day visit to Cambodia, marking the country's return to international recognition since four warring parties signed a peace accord in Paris last month.

The World Heritage Convention places Angkor under United Nations protection through UNESCO. The convention lists 337 sites in 73 countries.

Report: U.S. removes weapons

SEOUL, South Korea (AP)— The United States has begun withdrawing its tactical nuclear weapons from South Korea and will finish by year's end, a report said Thursday.

It is hoped that the U.S. withdrawal will pave the way for North Korea to allow inspections of its nuclear facilities.

On Monday, the Communist North appeared to drop its longstanding refusal to do so, saying it would allow nuclear inspections when the United States "begins to

withdraw" its nuclear weapons from South Korea.

At the same time, however, it also said that direct talks should be opened with the United States to discuss—simultaneous—parallel inspections of suspected nuclear weapons sites in both Koreas.

The United States, closely allied with Seoul, has been reluctant to deal directly with North Korea, with which it has no formal ties.

The United States fought on South Korea's side in the 1950-53 Korean War, and keeps 40,000 troops in

South Korea under a mutual defense treaty.

The Yonhap News Agency, quoting an unidentified Seoul government official, said the United States would complete withdrawal of its nuclear weapons from South Korea by the end of this year. "All procedures would be completed before President Bush's trip (to Seoul Jan. 5-7)."

On Sept. 27, Bush announced that the United States would withdraw all land and sea-based tactical nuclear weapons worldwide.

Washington to pay Iran \$278 million in compensation

THE HAGUE, Netherlands (AP)— The United States has agreed to pay Iran \$278 million to compensate for weapons withheld to protest the holding of hostages in the U.S. Embassy in Tehran in 1979, an official said Thursday.

The settlement stemming from the U.S. Foreign Military Sales program clears the decks for resolution of a multibillion dollar

claim for weapons ordered and paid for by Iran, but never delivered because of the U.S. arms embargo.

Iran has estimated its Foreign Military Sales claims at up to \$11 billion, a figure U.S. officials at the Iran-United States Claims Tribunal contend is exaggerated.

The final negotiations on the settlement coincided with last week's release of two hostages.

China denounces boycott of its toys

BEIJING (AP)— China on Thursday denounced U.S. groups urging a boycott of Chinese-made toys and denied their claims that child labor is used.

"Some recent outside reports on the so-called fact that China used child labor to manufacture toys for export were totally unfounded," Foreign Ministry spokesman Wu Jianmin told a weekly briefing.

"The employment of child laborers is illegal in China."



Spent fuel at INEL won't go anywhere soon

TWIN FALLS — The fate of tons of spent nuclear fuel stored at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory is uncertain.

The Idaho Chemical Processing Plant at INEL — which converts the spent fuel to liquid, extracts still-usable uranium and turns the waste into laundry soap-like granules — has been closed since July 1989.

Parts of the plant are operating again, but the section that dissolves spent fuel in acid still is out of action and the facility's future is under review by the federal Department of Energy. If the chemical plant is not reopened, spent fuel now stored at INEL would remain there indefinitely.

Meanwhile, spent fuel continues to pile up. The facility is operated for the Energy Department by Westinghouse Idaho Nuclear Co. and processes naval reactor fuel. Because of security restrictions, INEL

officials say they can't reveal how much spent fuel is available in the huge pools of water in which the spent fuel is stored until it can be processed.

Nor will they disclose how much fuel still is coming in or how long it will be before the storage facility is full.

Though repairs to the plant have been completed, it still must pass an Energy Department readiness review, INEL spokesman Brad Bugger said this week.

Energy Secretary James Watkins has ordered the department to "clean the slate and take a look at every aspect of INEL," DOE spokeswoman Stephanie Hanna said this week. That review includes the continued processing of spent fuel at the chemical plant.

The department is reviewing INEL and other nuclear weapons production facilities in light of the nation's needs for its weapons production complex in the next century and President Bush's initiative for nuclear arms reduction, Hanna said.

It's not the first time the Energy Department has

questioned the need for the continued reprocessing of spent fuel at INEL.

Uranium recovered from spent fuel at INEL is used in the fabrication of fuel for three reactors at the Savannah River Site in South Carolina, which produces nuclear weapons material. Those reactors, however, remain out of commission, shut down because of safety concerns. It's unlikely that all three would be restarted.

Unless or until those reactors are restarted or the department finds another use for the highly enriched uranium produced from spent fuel at INEL, there is little need for the product of continued reprocessing.

And until the chemical plant's dissolution and extraction processes are restarted, spent fuel already at INEL — or shipped there in the future — would remain in Idaho in long-term storage until a federal repository can be built.

Besides naval fuels, INEL receives a small amount of



Federal cases guarantee certain rights

BOISE — David Toner wasn't sure about his constitutional right to a jury trial when he looked into the eyes of his jurors.

He and his wife, Susan, were suing a major pharmaceutical company in federal district court. Their 1984 lawsuit revolved around a technical discussion of one of the company's vaccines.

"I was concerned whether we had expertise to do it," Toner said. "Basically, I don't think we did."

The Cassia County couple's son, Kevin, had been paralyzed from the neck down after receiving a diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis vaccination, commonly known as a DTP shot.

Jury trials, with six-member juries, are guaranteed in federal civil cases by the Seventh Amendment to the U.S. Constitution. Idaho and all other states have similar provisions in their constitutions that guarantee the right to a jury trial in state civil cases.

Juries decide facts. When two private parties disagree on the facts and can't talk out a solution to a dispute, juries step in and determine who is right.

"In one form or another, juries have been doing that for 1,000 years.

The citizens selected at random to sit on a jury and sort out the facts are "the jewel in the crown of democracy," 5th District Judge Daniel Hurlbutt says.

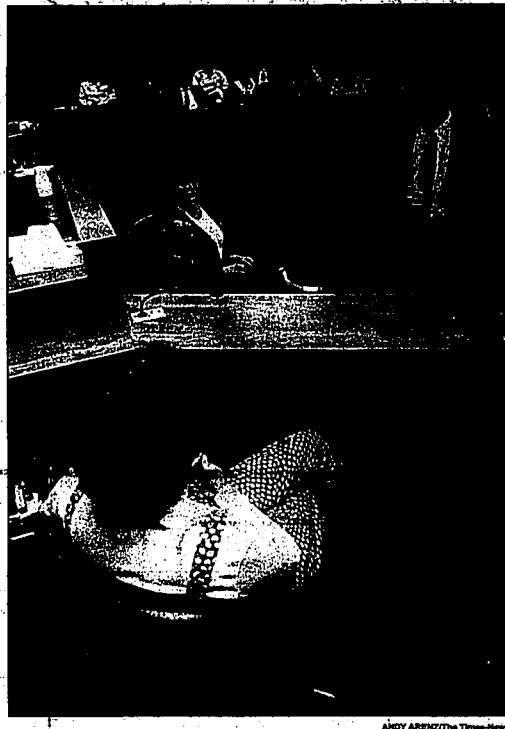
"There's a no more democratic way to decide critical questions," Hurlbutt said.

The Toners sat through a 10-day trial, involving testimony from a dozen or more expert witnesses. They claimed that Lederle Laboratories of Pearl River, N.Y., made a conscious choice not to use a safer method of purifying its vaccine.

"Realistically, our chances were slim and none when we started out," Toner said.

When they decided to sue, they wanted more than financial security for their Kevin. They hoped that arguing their case in the glare of the public eye would prompt Lederle to improve its vaccine.

Lederle and other vaccine-makers have

steadfastly maintained that the DTP vaccine has saved thousands of lives and is safe. The vaccine is given during infancy, when children are prone to neurological problems from a variety of causes.

In other words, vaccine makers argue, any disorders children may suffer later in life are probably unrelated to the vaccinations.

"But the Toners broke ground. After three hours of deliberation, the six jurors awarded the Toners \$1.13 million — the first time a vaccine company had lost a lawsuit over its DTP vaccine.

"I think (the jury) understood the technical issue well enough that they were satisfied on what we were saying," Toner said. "I think they settled the case on a

Verdicts not etched in stone, jurors discover

HAILEY — Thirteen weeks of work disappeared in one day for juror Brian Ward.

Ward was the jury foreman on Idaho's longest civil trial. After a 13-week trial in 1989, he and his fellow jurors held West. One of the jurors for a failed mushroom farm north of Bliss.

In September, however, the Idaho Supreme Court overturned the verdict and sent the case back to the trial court. The Supreme Court overruled several decisions made by 5th District Judge James May, who presided over the trial.

"I'm just disgusted with the process because it's out of control," Ward said. "You just don't go in there and take people's time away and throw it all away."

What started out as a \$2.2 million foreclosure action turned into a lawsuit against the bank. The mushroom farmers spent \$3.8 million in attorneys' fees to win \$5.6 million in damages and to get out of repaying the loan.

"It seems as though you go out and get a jury trial, and this is what it is all about," Ward said. "And then because of some procedural error the whole thing gets thrown out."

The U.S. legal system is full of checks and balances. Opposing lawyers argue different points of view. Judges rule on procedural matters. Juries are limited to deciding facts disagreements.

And appellate courts can overturn almost everything, Ward thinks, at least in his case, there could be more respect for the jury's decision.

One of the points that the Idaho Supreme Court picked out when overturning the mushroom case was the order of witnesses. Judge May ruled that the debtors could present their case first, the reverse of what usually happens in foreclosure cases.

The Supreme Court disagreed. "How could it make any difference who goes first?" Ward asked.

Work on 93-30 junction due to start next year

TWIN FALLS — Work to improve the intersection of U.S. Highway 30 and 93 will begin in 1992, with Highway 30 between Twin Falls and Filer to be widened soon after, according to a member of the Idaho Transportation Board.

But don't look for the long-awaited Highway 93 bypass anytime soon, Twin Falls attorney Leon Smith said this week.

The board recently moved the 93-30 project up on its list of priorities, Smith said.

"Money for the 93-30 intersection and road improvements comes from the federal government and essentially has been locked in," said Loren Thomas, district engineer for the transportation department. The alternate route likely will be federally funded, too, but Thomas would not speculate when that might happen.

The Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce is anxious to see the Highway 93 bypass built to ease the growing burden on Blue Lakes Boulevard North, a traffic snarl some business owners say is discouraging shoppers from patronizing businesses along the boulevard.

In his year on the transportation board, Smith has viewed road projects throughout Idaho and said few rated higher on his list of priorities than the work on the 93-30 intersection and the widening of Highway 30-west of Twin Falls.

Safety concerns, convenience, the narrowness of Highway 30 and the presence of telephone poles close to the highway are some of the reasons the intersection and road need to be improved, he said.

"By 1992, we should be doing some improvements on the intersection," he said.

junction also likely will start in 1992, Thomas said.

The intersection work will include either installing a traffic signal or building an overpass with on- and off-ramps, Thomas said.

"This should completely eliminate a conflict at the intersection," he said.

The overpass might run east to west over Highway 93, or over Highway 30, Smith said.

Widening Highway 30 will include putting in a center turning lane, Thomas said.

The road will remain two lanes in each direction, with the new turning lane, but the curbs will be removed, a shoulder will be built and the telephone poles and irrigation equipment will be moved back, Thomas said.

To start work by 1992, the state must acquire right of way.

It is hoped that the U.S. withdrawal will pave the way for North Korea to allow inspections of its nuclear facilities.

On Monday, the Communist North appeared to drop its longstanding refusal to do so, saying it would allow nuclear inspections when the United States "begins to

withdraw" its nuclear weapons from South Korea.

At the same time, however, it also said that direct talks should be opened with the United States to discuss "simultaneous" parallel inspections of suspected nuclear weapons sites in both Koreas.

The United States, closely allied with Seoul, has been reluctant to deal directly with North Korea, with which it has no formal ties.

The United States fought on South Korea's side in the 1950-53 Korean War, and keeps 40,000 troops in

South Korea under a mutual defense treaty.

The Yonhap News Agency, quoting an unidentified Seoul government official, said the United States would complete withdrawal of its nuclear weapons from South Korea by the end of this year. "All procedures would be completed before President Bush's trip (to Seoul Jan. 5-7)." On Sept. 27, Bush announced that the United States would withdraw all land and sea-based tactical nuclear weapons worldwide.

Washington to pay Iran \$278 million in compensation

THE HAGUE, Netherlands (AP) — The United States has agreed to pay Iran \$278 million to compensate for weapons withheld to protest the holding of hostages in the U.S. Embassy in Tehran in 1979, an official said Thursday.

The settlement stemming from the U.S. Foreign Military Sales program clears the decks for resolution of a multibillion dollar

claim for weapons ordered and paid for by Iran, but never delivered because of the U.S. arms embargo.

Iran has estimated its Foreign Military Sales claims at up to \$1.1 billion, a figure U.S. officials at the Iran-United States Claims Tribunal contend is exaggerated.

The final negotiations on the settlement coincided with last week's release of two hostages.

China denounces boycott of its toys

BEIJING (AP) — China on Thursday denounced U.S. groups urging a boycott of Chinese-made toys and denied their claims that child labor is used.

"Some recent outside reports on the so-called fact that China used child labor to manufacture toys for export were totally unfounded," Foreign Ministry spokesman Wu Jianmin told a weekly briefing.

"The employment of child laborers is illegal in China."



Spent fuel at INEL won't go anywhere soon

TWIN FALLS — The fate of tons of spent nuclear fuel stored at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory still is uncertain.

The Idaho Chemical Processing Plant at INEL — which converts the spent fuel to liquid, extracts still-usable uranium and turns the waste into laundry soap-like granules — has been closed since July 1989.

Parts of the plant are operating again, but the section that dissolves spent fuel in acid still is out of action and the facility's future is under review by the federal Department of Energy. If the chemical plant is not reopened, spent fuel now stored at INEL would remain there indefinitely.

Meanwhile, spent fuel continues to pile up. The facility is operated for the Energy Department by Westinghouse Idaho Nuclear Co. and processes naval reactor fuel. Because of security restrictions, INEL

officials say they can't reveal how much space still is available in the huge pools of water in which the spent fuel is stored until it can be processed.

Nor will they disclose how much fuel still is coming in or how long it will be before the storage facility is full.

Though repairs to the plant have been completed, it still must pass an Energy Department readiness review, INEL spokesman Brad Bugger said this week.

Energy Secretary James Watkins has ordered the department to "clean the slate and take a look at every aspect of INEL," DOE spokesman Stephanie Hanna said this week. That review includes the continued processing of spent fuel at the chemical plant.

The department is reviewing INEL and other nuclear weapons facilities in light of the nation's needs for its weapons production complex in the next century and President Bush's initiative for nuclear arms reduction, Hanna said.

It's not the first time the Energy Department has

questioned the need for the continued reprocessing of spent fuel at INEL.

Uranium recovered from spent fuel at INEL is used in the fabrication of fuel for three reactors at the Savannah River Site in South Carolina, which produces nuclear weapons material. Those reactors, however, remain out of commission, shut down because of safety concerns. It's unlikely that all three would be restarted.

Unless or until those reactors are restarted or the department finds another use for it, the highly enriched uranium recovered from spent fuel at INEL, there is little need for the product of continued reprocessing.

And until the chemical plant's dissolution and extraction processes are restarted, spent fuel already at INEL — or shipped there in the future — would remain in Idaho in long-term storage until a federal repository can be built.

Besides naval fuels, INEL receives a small amount of

BOISE — David Toner wasn't sure about his constitutional right to a jury trial when he looked into the eyes of his jurors.

He and his wife, Susan, were suing a major pharmaceutical company in federal district court. Their 1984 lawsuit revolved around a technical discussion of one of the company's vaccines.

Steadfastly maintained that the DTP vaccine has saved thousands of lives and is safe. The vaccine is given during infancy, when children are prone to neurological problems from a variety of causes.

In other words, vaccine makers argue, any disorders children may suffer later in life are probably unrelated to the vaccinations.

But the Toners broke ground. After three hours of deliberation, the six jurors awarded the Toners \$1.13 million — the first time a vaccine company had lost a lawsuit over its DTP vaccine.

"I think the jury understood the technical issue well enough that they were satisfied on what we were saying," Toner said. "I think they settled the case on a

moral issue — they really felt in their heart that the company had wronged this child and were willing to punish the company."

Cases like the Toners' worry some people. Such complex and technical cases are too much for a collection of ordinary citizens, they say.

Hurlbutt doesn't agree. "This notion that somehow this world ought to be run and every dispute resolved by some expert... is authoritarian and anti-democratic," he said.

John Doerr, a Twin Falls lawyer who frequently represents insurance companies, said he has more faith in the common person than in the courts.

Verdicts not etched in stone, jurors discover

HAILEY — Thirteen weeks of work disappeared in one day for juror Brian Ward.

Ward was the jury foreman on Idaho's longest civil trial. After a 13-week trial in 1989, he and his fellow jurors held West One Bank liable for a failed mushroom farm north of Bliss.

In September, however, the Idaho Supreme Court overturned the verdict and sent the case back to the trial court. The Supreme Court overturned several decisions made by 5th District Judge James May, who presided over the trial.

"I'm just disgusted with the process because it's out of control," Ward said. "You just don't go in there and take people's time away and throw it all away."

Ward started out as a \$2.2 million foreclosure action turned into a lawsuit against the bank. The mushroom farmers spent \$3.8 million in attorneys' fees to win \$5.6 million in damages and to get out of repaying the loan.

"It seems as though you go out and get a jury trial, and this is what it is all about," Ward said. "And then because of some procedural error the whole thing gets thrown out."

The U.S. legal system is full of checks and balances. Opposing lawyers argue different points of view. Judges rule on procedural matters. Juries are limited to deciding the facts presented to them.

And appellate courts can overturn almost everything. Ward thinks, at least in his case, there could be more respect for the jury's decision.

One of the points that the Idaho Supreme Court picked out when overturning the mushroom case was the order of witnesses. Judge May ruled that the doctors could present their case first, the reverse of what usually happens in foreclosure cases.

The Supreme Court disagreed. "How could it make any difference who goes first?" Ward asked.

Work on 93-30 junction due to start next year

TWIN FALLS — Work to improve the intersection of U.S. Highways 30 and 93 will begin in 1992, with Highway 30 between Twin Falls and Filer to be widened soon after, according to a member of the Idaho Transportation Board.

But don't look for the long-awaited Highway 93 bypass anytime soon, Twin Falls attorney Leon Smith said this week.

The board recently moved the 93-30 project up on its list of priorities, Smith said.

"I pushed very hard to get it moved up. It merited special attention," he said.

But the bypass, which would extend Highway 93 north to intersect with Pole Line Road northwest of Twin Falls, is low on the Idaho Transportation Department's things-to-do list.

"This is still in the developmental stage," Smith said. "Right now that project is out past five years."

Money for the 93-30 intersection and road improvements comes from the federal government and essentially has been locked in, said Loren Thomas, district engineer for the transportation department. The alternate route likely will be federally funded, too, but Thomas would not speculate when that might happen.

The Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce is anxious to see the Highway 93 bypass built to ease the growing burden on Blue Lakes Boulevard North, a traffic snarl some business owners say is discouraging shoppers from patronizing businesses along the boulevard.

In his job on the transportation board, Smith has viewed road projects throughout Idaho and said few rated higher on his list of priorities than the work on the 93-30 intersection and the widening of Highway 30 west of Twin Falls.

Safety concerns, convenience, the narrowness of Highway 30 and the presence of telephone poles close to the highway are some of the reasons the intersection and road need to be improved, he said.

"By 1992, we should be doing some improvements on the intersection," he said.

Work to widen Highway 30 from Filer to the Highway 93

junction also likely will start in 1992, Thomas said.

The intersection work will include either installing a traffic signal or building an overpass with on- and off-ramps, Thomas said.

"This should completely eliminate a conflict at the intersection," he said.

The overpass might run east to west over Highway 93, or over Highway 30, Smith said.

Widening Highway 30 will include putting in a center turning lane, Thomas said.

The road will remain two lanes in each direction, with the new turning lane, but the curbs will be removed, a shoulder will be built and the telephone poles and irrigation equipment will be moved back, Thomas said.

To start work by 1992, the state must acquire right of way.

These projects will cost an estimated \$10 million, Thomas said. The federal government will pay 90 percent of that with the state picking up the other 10 percent, he said.

The state plans a public hearing next spring on the projects, Thomas said.

The transportation bill that Congress approved Wednesday night awarded Idaho \$750 million over five years, Thomas said. The state will get about \$100 million this year with the amount increasing in the years after that, he said.

The man was driving a pickup westbound near milepost 221 when he hit a patch of ice and snow on the highway, the officer said. The driver slid off the road, when he oversteered to get back on the highway, the truck overturned and he was ejected. Other people pushed the truck off the man. The man was conscious but incoherent when sheriff's police arrived at the scene, but died at Cassia Memorial Hospital about 2:30 a.m. Thursday, the officer said. The driver of the pickup was not wearing a seat belt, the officer said. His passenger, a 17-year-old Oregon girl, was not injured. The driver and passenger of the Tempo, both from Salt Lake City, sustained only minor injuries.

Thanksgiving marks anniversary of Wood's death

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Homicide investigators ruled — that Natalie Wood's Thanksgiving holiday drowning in the chilly Pacific Ocean was a decade ago was an accident and the case was closed. But the intrigue persists. The Oscar-nominated actress drowned Nov. 29, 1981, after a night of partying with husband Robert Wagner and "Beverly Hills Cop" star Christopher Walken on the couple's yacht anchored off Santa Catalina Island. "The only people who want to make it a mystery is the media," said Sgt. Frank Salerno of the Los Angeles County Sheriff Department's homicide bureau. "It was a tragic accident. That's all it was."

The only inquiries he's had since the actress' death have come from reporters trying to sensationalize the case, Salerno said Wednesday. Those tabloid TV shows call and want to make it a murder, and there was a tabloid in New York that wanted to make something of it," said Salerno, who investigated the death. "There's nothing to it. The actress hasn't been forgotten. Fresh flowers are left on her grave weekly at Westwood Village Cemetery, also home for the remains of Marilyn Monroe, Donna Reed, Truman Capote, Darryl F. Zanuck and Arnold Stanger. There were no plans for a public graveside memorial, and Wagner spokesman Alan Nicrobb said the family had no comment on the unhappy anniversary. "They address it privately," Nicrobb said. Wood was 43 when she slipped from Wagner's 60-foot yacht "Splendor" and drowned. Her death stunned Hollywood, where she had grown from Natasha Gurdin, 4-year-old star of "Happy Land," to a dramatic adult actress and three-time Oscar nominee for performances in "Rebel Without a Cause," "Splendor in the Grass" and "Love with a Proper Stranger."

She is probably best remembered, however, for her role as Maria in the movie version of "West Side Story" and as a 9-year-old scene-stealer in "Miracle on 34th Street." The drowning is often discussed among yacht owners at Doug's Harbor Reef resort at Santa Catalina's Ishmus, 25 miles off the Los Angeles Harbor breakwater, said a resort operator who wouldn't give her name. "Nobody here on the island has any comment to make," was the terse response from Randy Bombard, whose father runs Doug's Harbor Reef. In his book "Coroner," then-Los Angeles County chief medical examiner Thomas Noguchi described Miss Wood's final hours.

Feds consider appeal of WIPP injunction

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) — Attorney General Tom Udall said it would not be easy for the federal government to successfully appeal a court order blocking shipment of radioactive wastes to the Waste Isolation Pilot Plant. Udall said the government would have to prove U.S. District Judge John Garrett Penn abused his discretionary powers when he granted the injunction — and he said that would be difficult. Penn this week ordered the Department of Energy to put off the first shipment of wastes to WIPP because Congress had not given approval. Federal lawyers have met with officials from the energy and interior departments to consider an appeal, but Energy Department spokesmen said Wednesday no decision had been reached. State Sen. Louis Whitlock, D-Carlsbad, said he urged DOE officials to appeal immediately. "I think Attorney General Udall is crowing too soon," he said. Energy Secretary James Watkins had said repeatedly that it was important to begin a test program at the WIPP site near Carlsbad before the end of the year. The Energy Department had sidestepped Congress when on Oct. 3 it moved unilaterally to transfer the WIPP site from the Interior Department, a procedure required before waste shipments could begin.

Energy geologist to retire because of 'scientific fraud'

LAS VEGAS (AP) — A senior geologist with the Energy Department says he plans to resign early next year because he believes "scientific fraud" is being practiced in the Yucca Mountain project. Jerry Szymanski, who has worked on the project since 1984, says he will seek employment as a geological consultant. Szymanski is upset with a peer-review panel that attempted to discredit his theory that nuclear waste at Yucca Mountain could be threatened by a rising water table. "If this is responsible science, I do not wish to be involved," Szymanski said Wednesday. The geologist has argued against placement of a high level nuclear waste dump at Yucca Mountain, saying

the site is unsuitable. Yucca Mountain has been designated by Congress as the only site to be studied for the controversial dump which would store 70,000 tons of radioactive waste from the nation's nuclear power plants. Meanwhile, two leading Las Vegas television journalists may be joining in a public-relations campaign to sell the public on the safety of the Yucca Mountain project. George Knapp and Bryan Gresh announced Wednesday that they would be leaving KLAS-TV. The station speculated they had been hired to do public relations work for the project. Knapp, who also writes a column for the Las Vegas Sun, said he was not working for the nuclear industry and had no opinion on the Yucca Mountain project.

Mountain project. Knapp confessed he was negotiating with political consultant Don Williams and said he thought he could offer "a certain sanity" to the nuclear waste issue. The Yucca Mountain project is being vigorously opposed by Nevada officials, but is being backed by trade union groups who see the repository as a chance for additional construction work in Southern Nevada. Documents from the American Nuclear Energy Council indicates the nuclear industry trade organization plans to form a "Media Response Team" that would seek positive media coverage of the nuclear dump issue.

The family planned for an early "Good Morning America" television interview, and then a dinner at a local restaurant.

Suit claims 'anguish' in murder case

CALDWELL — Maria Flores, who was jailed for six days in a murder case, has filed a \$300,000 tort claim against Canyon County for unlawful imprisonment.
Flores, 43, in a tort claim filed last week alleged she suffered "embarrassment, humiliation, mental pain and anguish" when she was held for six days in the county jail, accusing of driving her sons from the scene of a murder.
Tort claims precede any court action she may chose to file. The tort claim is being reviewed by county officials.
Flores was jailed June 2 on charges of aiding and abetting first-degree murder. Juan Olvera, 17, was shot to death in a fight at the Caldwell Labor Camp. Prosecutors later dropped the charges.

State sues brokerage companies

BOISE — The state Department of Finance has filed a civil lawsuit in 4th District Court alleging securities brokerage companies in Florida and Colorado are violating Idaho security laws.
Finance Director Belton J. Patti said the lawsuits claim the defendants and two employees offered and sold unregistered securities in the state, conducted securities brokerage operations in Idaho without being licensed and engaged in fraud.
The defendants are Roth Securities Co., Sarasota, Fla., salesman Gary Lee Brown and the Oxford Group, Inc., and its president, Gregory Dirck Writer Jr., Colorado Springs, Colo.

Grangeville should boil water again

GRANGEVILLE — Grangeville residents are advised to boil their drinking water for the second time in about a month, and officials are stumped over the source of the contamination.
Tests have been conducted weekly since the last boil order in October. They show water samples in the north end of town have coliform bacteria contamination, said George Dekan of the state Division of Environmental Quality.

State will stop free TB test materials

BOISE — Although the number of tuberculosis cases has increased in urban areas, Idaho's numbers are small and the state no longer will distribute free TB test materials to some recipients.
Tuberculosis is a lung disease that is very treatable with early diagnosis. The state has decided to stop distributing the free materials to hospitals, nursing homes and other health-care institutions.

Simplot decides to leave dad's firm

BOISE — Scott Simplot, the youngest of the three sons of Idaho industrialist Jack Simplot, has resigned from the J.R. Simplot Co. to pursue other interests.
Simplot, 45, said Wednesday he gave up his position as vice president on Nov. 1. "I resigned for personal reasons," Simplot said.
He declined to elaborate, but said he intends to remain in Boise. Simplot did not say whether he has relinquished his seat on the company's board of directors.

Trash hauler says he's recycling items

BOISE — The trash hauler for Ada County denies that bags full of recyclable materials are routinely buried at the landfill while residents pay a recycling fee.
A local television station Tuesday night reported the blue and green trash bags intended for recyclable materials, such as grass and leaves, or aluminum cans and glass, were being buried.
Doug Lomgow, Boise-Ada Dispos-All owner, denied the allegations that his company was charging customers a monthly fee without salvaging what could be remade into new materials.
But he said some blue and green bags have been taken to the landfill on busy days before being picked up later and transported to the company's transfer station.

Official denies timber cutting appeal

COEUR D'ALENE — Environmentalists trying to stop a major timber sale east of Coeur d'Alene have stopped a second time by the U.S. Forest Service.
Bill Morden, supervisor of the Idaho Panhandle National Forests, in October denied an appeal filed by the Inland Empire Public Lands Council. It was over plans to harvest 26.4 million boardfeet of timber from the Horizon resource area starting in 1993.
Last week, the decision was upheld by James Lawrence, acting deputy regional forester. "I'm very pleased by Mr. Lawrence's decision," Morden said. "It brings to a conclusion a planning process begun over three years ago, a process remarkable for its extensive community involvement by all interests."

Officials accuse colleagues of cover-up

WALLACE (AP) — Two Shoshone County commissioners are accusing the county's top law enforcement officials and a fellow commissioner of covering up a felony crime to protect a former deputy from prosecution.
Commissioner David Dose and commission Chairman Don Hayman confronted Prosecutor Bill Seaton with the allegations Monday, the Coeur d'Alene Press reported.
They say Seaton met last month with Prosecutor Jack Rose, Sheriff Frank Crnkovich, Undersheriff Dan Schierman and Capt. Jim West to decide whether to bring charges against former Lt. Forrest "Frosty" Greenfield for stealing two sets of tires from a county garage in Osburn while he worked for the sheriff's office.
Greenfield resigned Oct. 21, shortly before admitting he took the tires, Dose said Wednesday.
Rose, Crnkovich, Schierman, West and Seaton then met and unanimously voted to not pursue grand theft charges against Greenfield, Dose said. Crnkovich and West have denied they attended such a meeting. Schierman declined to comment.

Rose and Seaton were unavailable.
Greenfield insists he did not steal the tires. "I'm sure in my mind that if they thought I'd done that, first they'd question me, then they'd prosecute me," he said. "The sheriff's office couldn't afford right now to not pursue something that's a crime."
The allegations come at a time when the sheriff's office is under investigation by the FBI for public corruption. A federal grand jury inquiry into prostitution, gambling, drug and alcohol activities in the Silver Valley has been under way since July to determine whether charges should be filed.
Federal officials have named Crnkovich and Rose as possible suspects. Both deny any wrongdoing.
"They are in the middle of an FBI investigation and this is still going on. I want the people to know where some of us stand," Dose said.
In addition to blowing the whistle, Dose said he sent a letter to the sheriff's office Wednesday demanding that an investigation into the tire theft be resumed.

Dose and Hayman also have signed a resolution that strips Seaton of his title of commissioner pro-tem and makes Dose second in command to Hayman.
"Mr. Seaton was informed that his trust level is way down," Dose said.
Dose said he was informed of the cover-up by someone employed outside the courthouse.
"I haven't talked to anybody-but David has," Hayman said. "I'm convinced it happened. I believe the research that David did pretty well confirms it."
According to a documented account by County Clerk Marcia Wingfield of Monday's confrontation, Seaton at first denied the Greenfield meeting took place, then admitted he met with the four officials to see what could be done about the tire theft. But no decisions were made about covering up the case, he said.
"Commissioner Seaton indicated that he did not make a deal with Mr. Greenfield, and told the prosecutor and sheriff that if they can't prove anything, they can't charge (Greenfield)," the document says.

Mother, sister charged with kidnapping

BOISE (AP) — A Boise woman allegedly abducted a week ago for religious degrooming has been released, while her mother and sister were arrested on kidnapping charges.
Ada County Sheriff's Department officials Wednesday said additional arrests are likely as the case unfolds. "We're looking at others," said Capt. Roy Holloway. "Within the next day or two, there will be additional arrests."
LaVerne Collins, 39, was reported missing last Wednesday. She is a long-time member of the Church Universal and Triumphant, headquartered in Montana.
On Monday, church members publicly accused the Sheriff's Department of dragging its feet on investigating her disappearance.
Mrs. Collins' mother, LaVerne Coelho of Riverdale, Calif., was arrested in Boise Wednesday afternoon after returning her daughter home. Deputy Prosecutor Roger Bourne said. She is being

held without bond and is scheduled to be arraigned Friday.
The sister, Patricia Cox, 35, of Visalia, Calif., was arrested several hours later at San Francisco International Airport after stepping off a flight from Boise. She was due to be released late Wednesday on \$25,000 bond, Bourne said. No court date has been set.
They were each charged with second-degree kidnapping, which carries a maximum penalty of 25 years in prison.
Mrs. Collins, a 15-year member of the church, on Wednesday told authorities that family and out-of-state "deprogrammers" were responsible for her week-long disappearance.
Deprogrammers are used to undo the effects of indoctrination by making people abandon beliefs or commitments.
The church is best known for its bomb shelter north of Yellowstone National Park. Its leader

claims to be able to predict future calamities, and members believe rapid repetitive chanting will undo bad karma or fate in the world.
Holloway described Mrs. Collins as communicative and in "fine" physical condition. "We're going on primarily what the victim is telling us and what evidence we've been able to gather from witnesses," the captain said.
"We went more or less on the letter of the law and what constitutes a kidnapping. And that's holding someone against her will."
LaVerne Collins is encouraging prosecution of people responsible for her alleged abduction, including immediate family members, Holloway said.
Holloway said Mrs. Collins related she was forced out of her Boise home and into a car the night of Nov. 20. She reported being moved between hotels and motel rooms, all located within 100 miles of Boise, he said.

Thanksgiving special for crippled adopted daughter of Joe Louis

LAS VEGAS (AP) — In a city where boxers enjoy megabucks paydays, the crippled adopted daughter of boxing legend Joe Louis is doted over by a guardian whose greatest fear is the day she can no longer care for the girl.

Despite the concerns and their modest existence, Thanksgiving is a special time for 15-year-old Janet

Barrow and her guardian angel, Lauretta Holmes.

It was Thanksgiving Day 1979 that Janet emerged from a three-month coma after nearly drowning in a family swimming pool. The accident — and subsequent cerebral palsy — left her brain damaged, crippled and unable to speak.

But the tragedies that left her

marred physically have failed to break her spirit.

"I think Janet is going to be here for a while," Ms. Holmes said Wednesday afternoon as she adjusted the girl's 54-pound frame in a wheelchair. "I think God is going to see to it that she's here for a while. She's a strong little girl, and she's got a will to live."

Lauretta Holmes won't tell you her age, just that she's "over 35." She was left nearly sightless by a stroke eight years ago.

She worries about the day she will be gone, and what will happen to the girl she has mothered much of the past 11 years. Her greatest dream is to have enough money that she can see Janet is properly cared for when she is gone.

She fears Janet may someday be placed in an institution "and I couldn't stand having her in one of those places."

"I just love her so much, you can understand why I worry," she says, squeezing a frail hand that reaches out to her. "I want to make sure she's cared for. Then I can go away in peace, knowing someday she will come to me."

Joe Louis died here in 1981, financially broke. He ruled the boxing world from 1937 to 1949, with many boxing purists considering him the greatest heavyweight in the history of the sport.

But he was four decades ahead of the big paydays and probably made

less in his stellar career than many boxers now make in a single night.

Ms. Holmes met Louis in 1949 and recounts playing cards with him at the Pershing Hotel in Chicago. She later moved to Los Angeles and there met Louis' future wife, Martha. She introduced the two.

The Louis' took in Janet and three brothers and sisters in the 1970s, legally adopting them in 1980.

Ms. Holmes declined to talk about the real parents of the four.

Tragedy struck in the summer of

1979 when Janet, left unattended, fell into the family swimming pool.

She was taken to a Las Vegas hospital, then later transferred to Methodist Hospital in Houston, where Joe Louis was being treated for an aneurysm. Frank Sinatra paid for Louis' trip to Houston. Ms. Holmes said Janet came out of a three-month coma Thanksgiving Day 1979.

"It was such a special day for all of us, and always will be," Ms. Holmes said. "We all had a big Thanksgiving celebration in her room."

Ms. Holmes helped raise Janet when Martha Louis suffered health problems following her husband's death. Mrs. Louis moved to Detroit in 1985 and died there last August. Janet has lived with Ms. Holmes since 1985, when she became the girl's legal guardian.

The two are struggling financially. They will be impacted Nov. 30 when Janet's Social Security payment goes up to \$559 a month.

Judge extends protesters' restrictions

BILLINGS, Mont. (AP) — A state judge Wednesday extended a court order restricting anti-abortion protesters in Montana, but a leader of the protests said it won't discourage further protests.

"With all due respect to the judge and those in authority, it probably isn't going to stop us because of our convictions," Claire Brisendine of Helena said. "I kind of doubt it's going to change much."

District Judge Robert Holmstrom of Billings issued a preliminary injunction barring protesters from blocking access to clinics providing abortions, trespassing, or harassing people entering or working at the clinics.

The injunction replaces a temporary restraining order issued Nov. 15 by another Billings judge, at the request of Intermountain Planned Parenthood and abortion-clinic operators in six Montana cities.

The abortion providers filed suit to prevent violent demonstrations like those last summer in Wichita, Kan., where thousands of anti-abortion protesters were arrested.

Last weekend in Missoula, 31 people were arrested at the Blue Mountain Clinic in Missoula. They tried to storm the building and blocked its entrance.

Brisendine, a defendant in the lawsuit, was among those arrested in Missoula and had been subpoenaed

to testify at Wednesday's hearing. She did not attend and instead joined about 30 protesters picketing a Planned Parenthood clinic in Helena.

Brisendine told The Billings Gazette that she did not realize she was subpoenaed to appear at the hearing. "I don't understand all this legal stuff, personally," she said.

She said the judge's order won't stop her and others from conducting "rescues" at Montana abortion clinics.

"If it means breaking the law to stop abortions, she said, "then that's what it takes." She said those involved in Operation Rescue are following God's laws, not man's laws.

Motorist angered by traffic hits, kills Seattle woman on sidewalk

SEATTLE (AP) — A motorist angered by blocked traffic drove her car onto a sidewalk and ran over a woman three times, killing her, police said.

Janice M. Gaston was dragged about 40 feet the first time the car hit her early Wednesday, witnesses told police. The car stopped, backed up and ran over her again, then hit her a third time, witnesses said.

The car was found several hours

later about five blocks away, police spokesman Hal Kulgren said.

Officer Jeffrey Barnes said Gaston and three other women were standing at a corner talking to a male friend whose van was blocking traffic.

A woman motorist pulled up behind the van, but the man did not move and a violent argument ensued, Barnes said.

The motorist then drove onto the

sidewalk and struck Gaston head-on, said Barnes.

Police were searching for the driver and her passenger, Kulgren said.

The young dreamer is Sarah instead of Clara. Her brother is Leroy, not Fritz. And the Land of Sweets is black-owned Yates and Milton Drug Store in this production aimed at making "The Nutcracker" more relevant to minorities.

The production, put on by the Balletnic Dance Company of Atlanta, has a cast of about 60 dancers who are black, Vietnamese, Filipino, Hispanic and American Indian. Most are ages 5 to 18. Some are experienced performers. Others are from poor neighborhoods where Balletnic dances teach.

The "Urban Nutcracker" closely follows the classic story by Russian composer Peter Tchaikovsky, but gives it a different spin.

The production focuses on the ballet's second act because it is simpler and less expensive to stage. A narrator summarizes the first act, with a brief enactment by the dancers.

The setting is an urban neighborhood, not a European mansion. The Sugar Plum Fairy is the Brown Sugar Fairy and the Cavalier is the Chocolate.

"We're just making it relate to us, to make it sound more homey," said Waverly Lucas, who co-founded the dance company last year.

"We really liked the idea of having the diversity, the colors, the different shades and sizes," said Lucas, who is black.

As in the original, Sarah's parents are throwing a Christmas party. She gets a wooden nutcracker from her godfather, a famous toymaker called Professor Isaac. Leroy breaks it when he tries to crack a huge nut.

Professor Isaac fixes the nutcracker and Sarah curls up with it under the Christmas tree. She dreams that

the nutcracker fights an army of mice to protect her. But the King Rat attacks the nutcracker and Sarah saves the toy by striking the rodent with a shoe.

The nutcracker turns into the Chocolate, who whisks Sarah and Leroy to the drug store, which sells candies, chocolate sundaes and hair pomade.

There they meet the Brown Sugar Fairy, who appears in an ice cream soda. She tells Leroy and Sarah to be good as they watch a display of sweets from thrones shaped like giant sundaes.

"Every little girl out there can say, 'That dream could have happened to

me,'" Lucas said. "It was something that had to be done, knowing the tradition behind the Nutcracker and everything."

"As artists, our world is multicultural," said Lucas' partner, Nena Gilreath. "We didn't feel it was odd or different. We thought... it would only enhance the quality of the work."

Atlanta Hawks star Dominique Wilkins helped raise money for the production through a September benefit with dancers from Dance Theatre of Harlem. Lucas and Gilreath once performed with the New York company.

Among the performers is James

Matthews, 6. He discovered ballet after watching a summer Balletnic performance featuring an Asian lead dancer, James, who is black and Asian, was immediately drawn to the star, said his mother, Teresa Matthews.

James said he liked the dancer after watching a summer Balletnic performance. He danced the way we danced," his mother said. His brother and sister, William, 7, and Aiyanna, 10, also performed in "Urban Nutcracker."

'Addams Family' fans can pick up videos of old series

For video fans, the best thing about Paramount's "The Addams Family" movie is that episodes of the TV series are finally being released on cassette.

To capitalize on interest in the film, Worldvision has released six 45-minute cassettes, each containing two episodes of the famed black-and-white, half-hour sitcom about the comically sinister family headed by Carolyn Jones and John Astin. Each cassette sells for \$9.95.

Gary Delfiner, Worldvision's vice president of marketing, reported that the company has shipped 150,000 copies of the six cassettes, with a sizeable share going to discount stores. By Christmas, he said, the company hopes to ship an additional 100,000.

"How the movie does will affect the sale of the future tapes," he said. There are plans to release more of the 66 episodes in the winter. They will be released in the order that they appeared on TV, he said.

Worldvision, which bought the home-video rights from Orion Television a few months ago, is hoping the movie is a smash hit that will inspire a new generation of fans to watch the TV series. "It might be like 'Batman,'" Delfiner said. "The success of the movie pushed sales of the old TV product — to a lot of new fans."

The company did not have to spend money to spruce up the master prints often necessary when old TV shows are released on home video. "The masters were in great shape," Delfiner said.

Instead, it invested in duplicating at the fastest speed (SP, standard play), which results in the best possible picture. Frequently, tapes that sell in the

\$10 range are made in the slowest speed, EP (extended play), which produces an inferior picture.

Official questions showing prisoners serial killer film

WALLA WALLA, Wash. (AP) — A psychological thriller about serial killers was inappropriate for viewing by Washington State Penitentiary inmates but conformed with written guidelines for what can be shown, the prison's warden said.

"The Silence of the Lambs," which contains graphic depictions of violence, was shown four times over the prison's closed-circuit television system, officials said.

Superintendent Jim Blodgett said he believes that such movies are not appropriate for the clientele that we have," but added he probably could not have prohibited the showing of such an acclaimed film.

The state Department of Corrections has no policy on the issue, spokesman Veltry Johnson said.

John Kerwin, the prison's visual media supervisor, said he did not preview the rented videocassette — that played four times Nov. 8-11, but defended his decision to run it.

"Some of the stuff was graphic, but I don't believe it was excessive," Kerwin said. "I do believe it was a tour-de-force in acting and storytelling."

The movie stars Jodie Foster as an FBI student who is selected to interview serial killer Dr. Hannibal Lecter for clues to catch a serial killer.

Kerwin said reaction from inmates who saw the movie was positive. It is not known how many of the 2,100 prisoners viewed the film. He said he rented the video in response to requests from six inmates.

Federal courts have ruled that inmates can view films that fit commu-

nity standards. Kerwin said. Both he and Blodgett interpret those standards to include movies that play in reputable community theaters.

Although R-rated movies are shown to inmates at the penitentiary, Blodgett said he encourages the audio-visual department to select a variety of films and to minimize the frequency of the more violent ones.

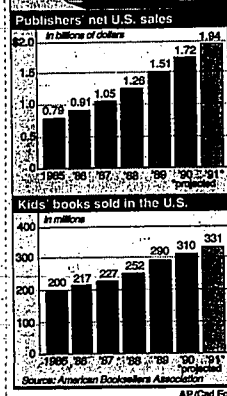

Some advice for confused children's book shoppers



NEW YORK (AP) — The bewildering many growups feel in a children's bookstore can be compared to a longshoreman in a lingerie shop: Everything looks alike, and it's hard to judge what'll suit your loved one.

If anything, shopping for children's books is more baffling than ever.

Children's publishing is in the midst of a recession-defying boom. The industry projects \$2 billion in sales in 1991, almost double levels just four years ago.

Behind the prosperity are baby boomers coming of age and having their own children, and the growing popularity in schools of "whole language" reading instruction that stresses literature.

Some 5,000 new kids' books are coming out each year, and the American Booksellers Association estimates 331 million will be sold in 1991, compared with just under 200 million in 1985.

All of this has produced a luxury — and a confusion — of choice for the uninitiated shopper.

Children's book experts and critics generally see the boom as welcome. The recently updated "Parent's Guide to the Best Books for Children" (Times Books, \$22.50) by Eden Rose Lipson, children's book editor of The New York Times, celebrates some 1,700 classic and recent titles.

But many experts warn current

best-seller lists and worry that prosperity has bred a good bit of schlock, too.

"In terms of proportion, you get more quality books for children than for adults," said Lee Galda, a University of Georgia education professor who reviews children's books for the International Reading Association.

But Galda also notes the number of books that sound as if they ought to be good, but aren't. Though Danielle Steele may be wildly successful at writing adult novels and Carly Simon a beloved songwriter, Galda, for one, is not enthusiastic about their recent efforts as children's writers.

Other experts, like Barbara Kiefer of Columbia University's Teachers College, believe that many children's books are emphasizing less on telling at the expense of story-telling.

Examples are the current hot-selling "The Berenstain Bears Don't Pollute (Anymore)" and the growing genre of books dealing with the horrors some children face, such as incest and drug addiction.

"I have to take these books seriously, but I hope the didacticism doesn't show up too much," said Nancy Needham, who reviews books for the National Education Association, the nation's largest teacher union.

One of the better authors who combines beautiful language with harsh realities like homelessness is the poet Gary Soto. His latest collection for older children, "A Fire in My Hands" (Scholastic Books, \$11.95), describes life for Mexicans in California's San Joaquin Valley.

So what tips do children's literature experts offer for anyone adrift in kid's bookland?

• Turn to the pictures first. That's what kids do, right?

• They should be as well prepared as any painting in a museum, Kiefer says.

Proof of the power of pictures is the phenomenal recent success of the "Where's Waldo?" books, in which each page challenges children to pick out the striped-shirted, stocking-capped, bespectacled hero from a seemingly impossible clutter of detail.

Probably the most reliable guide to well-illustrated children's books is the annual listing of the Caldecott Medal, awarded by a division of the American Library Association.

One frequent winner is Chris Van Allsburg, illustrator of such best-selling favorites as "The Polar Express" and "Swan Lake."

• Give a book the read-aloud test. "If you feel awkward or foolish, then it's probably not very good," Galda says.

The best children's books are literary in tone, rather than conversational, Kiefer says. Therein lies the difference between beautifully written fairy tales that have moral lessons and some current fare that tells kids why it's good to brush their teeth twice a day.

The sentences should invite children to participate with nice refrains, predictability and rhythm. The story can be sentimental, but not trite.

Timeless bedtime classics such as

"Goodnight Moon," published in 1947, have pleasing sentence structures that somehow reverberate in the brain.

"More, More, More." Said the Baby," a 1991 Caldecott "honor book" has the beauty of language and illustrations that may make it a classic as well.

• Get to know your local children's librarian. "A major part of our work is to evaluate the material that we're trying to do to promote high-quality," says Susan Rodman, executive director of the Association for Library Service to Children at the American Library Association.

Many librarians keep current listings of quality children's books. Besides the Caldecott list, the ALA has pamphlets listing the Newbery Medal winners, and also publishes an annual "Notable Children's Books" list consisting of about 60 current books broken down by appropriate age groups.

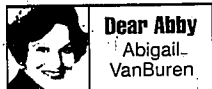
Cary Grant's 'Meditation' is as full of grace as he was

DEAR READERS: Five years ago today, Cary Grant died — just seven weeks before his 83rd birthday. Not a bad score. He couldn't have written a better ending himself.

Cary Grant was a superstar in every sense of the word. He wore his stardom with grace and dignity, and for all his fame and adulation, he remained incredibly unpolished.

In his later years, he made occasional appearances in theaters around the country, billed simply as "A Conversation with Cary Grant." He didn't need much advertising; one small ad would appear in the local newspaper, and the house was immediately sold out.

Everywhere he appeared, he received a standing ovation simply for walking out on the stage. He had no routine; he just sat perched on a long-legged stool in the center of his stage with a spotlight beamed on his famous face, and for two hours he an-



swered random questions from the audience. They loved it. And so did he.

He closed his "conversation" with a piece he called "A Meditation," saying he didn't know who wrote it, but it expressed his own sentiments about growing older. It also expresses mine. And here it is:

"Now Lord, you've known me a long time. You know me better than I know myself. You know that each day I am growing older and someday may even be very old, so meanwhile please keep me from the habit of thinking. I must say something on every subject and on every occasion. ... Release me from trying to

straighten out everyone's affairs. Make me thoughtful, but not mopey, helpful but not overbearing. I've a certain amount of knowledge to share; still it would be very nice to have a few friends who, at the end, recognized and forgave the knowledge I lacked.

"Keep my tongue free from the recital of endless details. Seal my lips on my aches and pains; they increase daily and the need to speak of them becomes almost a compulsion. I ask for grace enough to listen to the retelling of others' afflictions, and to be helped to endure them with patience.

"I would like to have improved memory, but I'll settle for growing humility and an ability to capitulate when my memory clashes with the memory of others. Teach me the glorious lesson that on some occasions, I may be mistaken. ... Keep the reasonably kind; I've

never aspired to be a saint ... saints must be rather difficult to live with ... yet on the other hand, an unlettered old person is a constant burden.

"Please give me the ability to see good in unlikely places and talents in unexpected people. And give me the grace to tell them so, dear Lord.

P.S. DEAR READERS: Many books have been written about Cary Grant, but if you want to read the only authentic history of his life and loves, get the book "Evenings With Cary Grant" by Nancy Nelson, published by Morrow. It's an absolute treasure.

"One Special Victory" (Dec. 8, NBC), about a jaded real estate salesman (John Larroquette) who tries to destroy property lost to his ex-wife in a divorce settlement and is then sentenced to 50 hours of community service coaching an adult basketball team headed for the Special Olympics Christmas Sectionals.

"Yes, Virginia, There Is a Santa Claus" (Dec. 8, ABC), a drama based on the famous New York Sun editorial from 1897. Richard Thomas, Edward Asner and Charles Bronson star.

"The Story Lady" (Dec. 9, NBC) deals with the exploitation of a charismatic widow (Jessica Tandy) with a knack for reading children's stories. Stephanie Zimbalist and Charles Durning also star.

As usual, "It's a Wonderful Life," Frank Capra's sentimental gem that stars Jimmy Stewart and Donna Reed, will be shown throughout the holidays. Among the first to air the classic fantasy-drama this season are the Family Channel on Friday and on Fox stations on Saturday.

Programming on some other stations includes:

ARTS & Entertainment: "Jesse Norman at Notre Dame" (Dec. 10), with the opera star performing a Christmas recital in Paris.

Disney: "The Boy Who Dreamed Christmas" (Dec. 10), in which a young computer buff winds up spending Christmas Eve at the North Pole; "A Big Crosby Christmas: Like the Ones We Used to Know" (Dec. 15), featuring clips from 13 vintage Crosby holiday specials.

Bond's disappearance may be temporary

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Something was missing from movie theaters this past summer. Did you spy it?

The 1991 vacation season was the first time in 14 years that James Bond was a no-show for his biennial rendezvous with the world's action film fans.

Where have you gone, Agent 007? It seems the renowned expert on beauties, martinis and intrigue has been the victim of legalistic. Last February, Albert R. "Cubby" Broccoli, producer of 16 out of 18 Bond movies and owner of the Bond property, filed suit against MGM-Pathé (formerly MGM-UA), which holds the distribution rights for Bond films.

The suit alleged MGM had caused a \$20 million loss of revenue because of "highly irregular" activities in licensing of the Bond films.

Danjaq S.A., a Swiss company controlled by producers Albert and Dana Broccoli, alleges that MGM-Pathé licensed the 007 movies at "below market value" to help finance Pathe's \$1.3 billion buyout of MGM Communications Co. last November.

But Saul Cooper, spokesman for Danjaq, says "The atmosphere has improved in the relations with MGM-UA-Pathé. There has been an open and respectful dialogue with the present management (under Ladd) whereas there was none under the previous management."

There had been talk that the movie trade might perhaps the Bond pictures had run their course. The last one, "Licence to Kill," sold \$34.6 million worth of tickets in the United States and Canada, proportionately the smallest gross of the series.

The two previous Bond movies, "The Living Daylights" and "A View to a Kill," grossed \$50 million each.

Cooper denies that "Licence to Kill" was a bust.

"It was the third biggest-grossing film internationally in 1989, making over \$100 million, not including domestic," he said. "The television rights alone were worth \$5 million."

Far from closing up shop, the Bond picture continues to plan for the future, said Cooper, although there currently is no film in the works.

"The company has not gone to sleep," he said. "After 30 years, the Bond pictures remain an ongoing process. Scripts have been prepared. Actors are always being discussed for new villains and beauties.

"People keep bringing us new gauders, like the world's smallest automobile. Stunt men drop by with ideas for giant men, which have always been an integral part of the Bond pictures."

Timothy Dalton took over the Bond role in the last two films, and he remains the producers' choice, said Cooper. There appears to be no possibility of bringing back Sean Connery or Roger Moore.

After 16 features, the works of Ian Fleming have been depleted. But that doesn't bother the producers. During most of the series, only the bare bones of the original novels were used as basis for the films, the script writers providing their own elaboration.

A new series of Bond novels, written by John Gardner, have been published and are available to the filmmakers. "We control the rights, along with the Fleming estate," Cooper says. "There is no present inclination to use them."

For three decades, the Bond movies have proved a bonanza for agent-turned-producer Broccoli. United Artists (UA) and all concerned. The trail began in 1962 with "Dr. No," starring Connery, an unknown Scottish actor, as the suave British agent.

Broccoli and his then-partner, Harry Saltzman, wisely had taken an option on all the Fleming works, and three more adventures appeared in the next three years.

As the movies grew more complex in locations and stunts, they were produced every other year. After five films, Connery left the series and was replaced by a former model, George Lazenby, for "On Her Majesty's Secret Service." The chemistry wasn't there, and Connery returned for "Diamonds Are Forever."

Connery again departed (though he made "Never Say Never Again" independently produced).

Even though four actors have portrayed him, the James Bond persona is firmly established in the minds of his film enthusiasts.

They know that he favors his martinis "shaken but not stirred," that he also likes bourbon on the rocks but never drinks to excess. That he favors fast cars such as the Aston Martin

D.B.V. and usually wears a dark-blue serge suit with a white silk shirt and black, knotted tie.

Bond never lacked for villains. They often were members of nefarious "groups" with acronyms like SMERSH and SPECTRE, run by Soviet or Chinese masterminds.

The change in international relations forced the filmmakers to seek other menaces such as terrorists and drug dealers.

What's next? With the world scene changing daily, that may be the biggest challenge facing Broccoli and company.

And with no project currently in production, Bond fans will have to wait at least another two years to find out.

Gags helps 'Addams Family' get funnier as it moves along

The rumors that Paramount was worried about its new film, "The Addams Family," were apparently unfounded. The film, based on the characters created by cartoonist Charles Addams, works.

The "Addams Family" is a send-up of those fabled cartoon characters. It was directed by Barry Sonnenfeld, who was previously a cinematographer on a number of films, including "Big."

Marc Shaiman's score is a definite asset. Shaiman has designed the sound track to underline and punctuate many of the gags, most of which work.

The sound effects are terrific, too. When Christopher Lloyd's Fester kicks his way around the halls of the Addams mansion, the exaggerated sound adds to the merriment.

"The Addams Family" is also well-cast. Anjelica Huston plays Morticia Addams. Huston's fine sense of comedy exceeds here. Everything she does is understated, which is precisely the right approach to this kind of material.

Raul Julia plays Gomez, Morticia's husband. The plot involves

Fester pretending to be Gomez's long-lost brother so that he can lay claim to the Addams fortune. Gomez duels with Tully (Dan Hedaya), and at one point does a musical number with Fester. They dance

to a song called "Mamushka," which was written by Shaiman in collaboration with Betty Comden and Adolph Green ("The Will Rogers Follies"), and this, too, has been brightly staged.

"The Addams kids are played by Christina Ricci and Jimmy Workman, and while you wouldn't want to have children like this, they are funny, particularly when the girl announces the game she is about to play (she intends to execute her brother) is called, "Is There A God?"

There may be times when the humor in "The Addams Family" is a little too close to reality, but the writers always step short of repulsion.

"The Addams Family" is one of those films that gets funnier and funnier as it moves along, maybe because we become used to its humor, much of which is visual. Christopher Hart plays Thing, the hand with a mind of its own.

"The Addams Family" (rated PG-13) won't appeal to all. It's humor, admittedly, is a little dark. Well, it would have been dark a while back. Today, it is probably gray.

Sleight of hand helps Thing

LOS ANGELES — Thing greets you graciously at the door to his Hollywood garden apartment, taking care of all the amenities a visitor might expect: shaking your hand, fetching a glass of water, showing you to a chair.

With that settled, Thing proceeds to rake over the thick dark hair of the slightly tired man to whom he is attached. (That would be Christopher Hart, 30, magician.)

For a painstaking photographer, Thing dutifully assumes some of the poses that made him a star in the new movie "The Addams Family" that, in turn, has made him the hottest hand in Hollywood. Christopher Hart's right hand is responsible for some of the funniest scenes in the movie.

Fans of the "Addams Family" television series will remember Thing as the disembodied hand that lived in a box and surfaced only to hand up the mail or perform other box-bound duties.

This Thing runs up and down corridors, opens doors, sleeps on Uncle Fester's chest, plays pranks at seances and interludes come to the rescue. "Thing," says Gomez affectionately, "you're a handful!"

"I went into the audition showing them sleight-of-hand skills," says Hart. "Once they saw I could do that, they wanted to see my hand act in different ways. They said, 'Make your hand look happy, make it look sad, make it look nervous.' I did the best I could and then I got a call back."

To prepare for his call back, Hart studied cartoons and "how inanimate objects take on a humanness. He videotaped himself for hours trying different ways of walking, so to speak — gallops and trots and little funny skids."

When he went back, his little hand pratfalls tickled the audience.

He later used some of his audition moves in his scenes — like when Thing is running too fast to answer the door and skids and bounces into the door. "I knew it was a good sign when I would hear that they laughed at what I did when they saw the dailies."

Thing develops a personality of its own — kind of a frisky pup, mischievous but loyal.

"Another director might have seen Thing just as 'atmosphere,'" says Hart. Barry Sonnenfeld "really saw Thing as a full-bodied character that needed to have a lot of attention and focus."

The direction paid off. Thing

was such a hit when the movie was screened for special test audiences that the director and producer went back and added more scenes with Thing.

Hart possesses large hands with long fingers, the better for rolling coins on his fingers, pulling cards out of his hand and, if he must, pulling rabbits out of hats. That professional dexterity is one reason why magicians were called for the audition.

The stump of the hand that you see on film (Thing looks like he's been cross-sectioned at the wrist) is actually a prosthetic device that Hart wore. A squishy piece of foam rubber made to look like a cross-section of a wrist sat atop the magician's actual wrist. Makeup on the device and his hand made it look like one piece.

To create the effect of the disembodied hand often required filming the same scene twice — one with Hart's hand, the other without it. The hand is then transposed from one piece of film into the other, frame by frame.

There are occasional scenes in which Hart's hand is not playing Thing. For instance, a mechanical hand was used in the scene in which Thing is massaging Gomez's forehead.

'Family' cartoon will air on ABC in September '92

Box-office figures were released by Exhibitor Relations Co. Inc. In an animated movie debut, Walt Disney Co.'s "Beauty and the Beast" grossed \$9.6 million for third place, easily burying Universal Pictures' "An American Tail: Fievel Goes West."

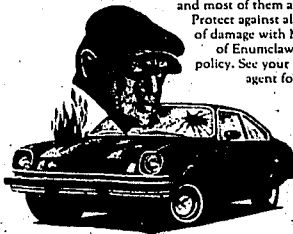

Bears turn game over to Lions

PONTIAC, Mich. — It was a game of hard hits and turnovers. It was the kind of game the Chicago Bears usually win.

Only this time it was a rare display of Chicago turnovers, and the Detroit Lions did what the Bears have become famous for. They made them pay.

The Lions took advantage of six mistakes and tied the Bears for first place in the NFC Central with a 16-6 victory Thursday.

"We played one of the better games I can remember as playing in the time I've been here," Lions coach Wayne Fontes said. "We're playing Chicago-style ball the last few weeks. We're playing very good defense, getting ahead and then seeing if the other team will make some errors."

The Lions (9-4), who have won all nine games they've played indoors this season, could produce only 208 yards on offense. But their defense intercepted four of Jim Harbaugh's passes and recovered two fumbles.

four touchdowns four days ago against Minnesota, was held by the Bears to 62 yards on 19 carries.

The last time the Lions were 9-4 was in 1970, when the team coached by Joe Schmidt finished 10-4 and lost a 5-0 playoff

game to the Dallas Cowboys. That 1970 team won its final five games to earn a wild-card berth.

"It feels good to be where we are right now," Fontes said.

"But this game puts us in the division race,

not the playoff race. We have the chance to win our division."

Men's World Cup moves to Colorado

BRECKENRIDGE, Colo. — This once-thriving gold-mining town is the setting for an invasion by Italian Alberto Tomba and other World Cup skiers seeking riches over the snow.

The men's World Cup circuit comes to Breckenridge for the first time with a giant slalom and slalom Friday and Saturday.

If Tomba is beatable, his competition has yet to prove it.

Tomba surged to giant-slalom and slalom victories at Park City, Utah, last week in the season's opening races, and seems intent on using those victories as stepping stones to two more Olympic gold medals as well as his first World Cup overall title. Under the new scoring system in effect on the tour this season, Tomba scored 100 points in each of the Park City races for a total of 200. Switzerland's Paul Accola stands second at 160 points after a pair of second-place finishes, and Italians Roberto Spangger and Konrad Ladstätter are tied for third at 60.

In fact, of the top six skiers in the overall standings, four are Italian — an unusually strong start for that team.

Cowboys cash in quarterback insurance policy

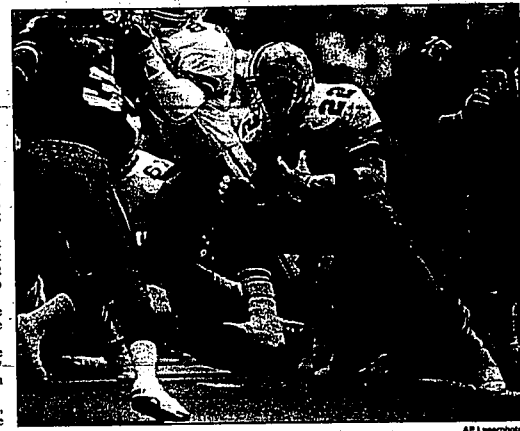

IRVING, Texas — Steve Beuerlein paid his second big dividend on Jimmy Johnson's dirt cheap quarterback insurance policy.

Beuerlein, obtained from the Los Angeles Raiders in August for a 1992 fourth-round draft pick and subbing for an injured Troy Aikman, hit Michael Irvin with a key 66-yard touchdown pass in the fourth period. It helped Dallas to a 20-10 victory Thursday over the Pittsburgh Steelers, keeping the Cowboys in the thick of NFC playoff chase.

"Beuerlein did just a great job filling in," Johnson said. "He executed the game plan, didn't make any turnovers, then hit the big play."

Aikman sustained a knee injury last week against Washington that will sideline him at least three weeks. Beuerlein came on against Washington and threw a touchdown pass to Irvin in a 24-21 victory.

"I knew the safety (Jones) wanted to put a big hit on me," Irvin said. "I just caught it and took off."

The Steelers trailed 10-0 at halftime but came back on Gary Anderson's 42-yard field goal and a 3-yard scoring run by Warren Williams with 7:54 to play.

Up to the Beuerlein-Irvin connection, the Cowboys had only a 43-yard field goal by Ken Willis in the second half. Willis missed three field goal attempts.

Pittsburgh coach Chuck Noll said the touchdown pass was "good players making a good play. It could have been a big play in the other direction."

Noll said the Steelers "had chances."

"We just couldn't make the big plays," he said. "We could make all kind of excuses about it being a short week but we won't. But our young team played hard."

Beuerlein hit 14 of 25 passes for 217 yards. Pittsburgh's Neil O'Donnell was 17 of 36 for 167 yards.

"He (Beuerlein) did a great job when you consider he couldn't even practice Monday because of his ankle," Johnson said.

Beuerlein started 15 games for the Raiders and was 8-7.

"I made some good plays and some bad plays," Beuerlein said. "You've got to remember these are the same guys who shut down Warren Moon and the Houston Oilers. They threw us some loops."

Quebec declares Olympic Stadium safe again for use

MONTREAL — Olympic Stadium, home of the Montreal Expo, was declared safe to reopen by the Quebec government Thursday.

The troubled stadium was closed on Sept. 13 when a 55-ton block of concrete dropped from its side, forcing the Expo to play their final home games on the road.

The stadium will be back in operation in time for an auto show Jan. 9, said Andre Vallerand, the cabinet minister responsible for the Olympic Installations Board that operates the facility.

The stadium was closed after the beam crashed suddenly onto a walkway. No one was injured. The stadium was already without its retractable roof, whose Kevlar fabric was damaged by high winds on June 27. The final hurdle to the stadium's reopening was cleared Wednesday when a report from an engineering firm declared the roof safe for use as long as it is regularly cleared of snow.

Lions' conquest leaves fans thinking about postseason

PONTIAC, Mich. — Even the honorable and estimable Paul Tagliabue leaves home this Thanksgiving to catch up on current events. It's unknown whether the commissioner likes so many succulent turnovers before his turkey, not that there's anything wrong with that. But he'll be a turkey to catch up on current events.

After all, what Chicago accomplishes in a short week of fractured football is too delicious for the league ever to imagine. Just when the rest of the division is playing like a side dish that's not ordered, the Bears defend a bad case of the belches and serve up a full plate of parity, the official food of the NFL.

As the stomach turns, Mike Ditka finds he can contain himself no longer. Detroit would insist that Thursday's outcome proves what they've been saying around here for years. Which is, every decade or so, the Lions not only can have a big game but win it, too. Their 16-6 conquest at the Silverdome leaves fans thinking about the postseason at a time when they are accustomed to dreeding next season.

Ditka, however, detests spreading such holiday cheer. You can see early that he has the right feeling. On the visitors' sidelines, he has more than three debates with people who are supposed to be friends. Neal Anderson gets the evil eye for zigging when he should zag. Richard Dent's efforts at assisting officials is unwelcome. And, in a virtuoso eruption, Ditka is all over special teams. Coach Steve Kozak like a chastised child.

After a cooling-off period, Ditka stems about the product all over again. The fact that a world-class game plan produces more players than ever exist in pro foot-

great-down and out in New Orleans. Only to stage a miraculous two-minute drill. The Lions seem willing to oblige early in the fourth quarter when he's nacked by George Jungiors. Harbaugh's wing is hurt, but the Detroiters are so excited, they commission 13 blue jerseys to def-

They use a timeout to organize, and Harbaugh fires 10 practice tosses by his bench. But the Bears still can't punch the ball in, and Kevin Butler makes it only 3-9.

Ditka is asked why he doesn't go for three points earlier, when the Bears are at Detroit's 1. He says he's not so sure his kicker can do the job even from there, but the alternative is grotesque. Harbaugh, trying to locate a teammate on radar, can see only Anderson.

The pass is incomplete and Anderson is ineligible, having returned from out of bounds.

All things considered, the world-class game-plan might have called for a field-goal attempt. If not for Harbaugh's sake. Whatever, the Bears would make high-wire acts by Tom Waddle, who isn't necessarily open eight times. But he snags early, open.

"Surely, Waddle does not lack what Mike Ditka brays about and begs for, focus. The Bears are hurting and fatigued and a mite flat, but the coach offers no rope whatsoever. That is his style; and that is why the Bears can overcome. Their 9-4 is still better than Detroit's 9-4, and for all the NFL's nitpicking, Detroit would be equally Chicago if immediate reinforcement rumors, Green Bay and Tampa Bay are next, and that spells breakfast of Champions.

Question: If Johnny Bailey handles a drunkstick the way he fields punts, does he deserve to death-of-punishment? Or is punishment intended for the punter who is consistently? Burp.

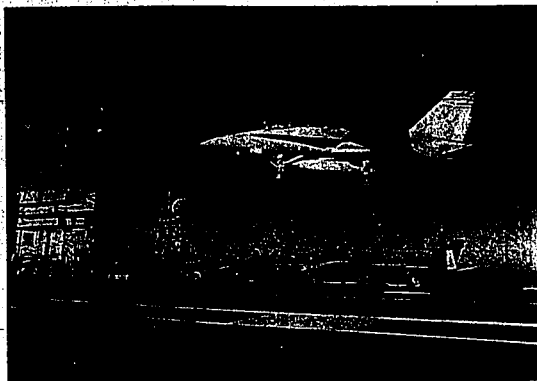

ABOARD THE USS NIMITZ — Eleven pilots from the El Toro (Calif.) Marine Corps Air Station fidgeted nervously, waiting for the sun to go down so they could show their stuff.

They had trained for years to make their first nighttime landings on an aircraft carrier, a feat even the most seasoned fighter pilots claim "can raise your heartbeat to that of a scared rabbit."

"I flew into combat 33 times in the Persian Gulf," said Navy Lt. Michael E. Lofy, 29, a member of the training contingent that accompanied the young Marine and Navy pilots to the aircraft carrier Nimitz. "The big heart rate did not come during combat over Iraq and Kuwait, but when I got back to the ship and started landing on the carrier in the dark."

Every fighter and attack pilot flying for the Navy or Marine Corps has qualified at night on a carrier — they have to make six landings at night and 10 during the day. If they can't do it, they can't fly. The joke out at sea is: "If they can't sit it down here, they can head back to land and fly for the Air Force."

But for this crop of pilots and countless others who have come before them, the challenge of landing a plane on a carrier at night is as daunting as the task is difficult. Working in darkness, the pilot has to bring in a jet at speeds that can top 150 mph and hook an arresting cable four inches off the deck in a space that is roughly 20 feet wide and 100 feet long.

Missing in any direction can mean the end of the young pilot's career. Coming up short can be fatal.

To execute the maneuver, the pilot is guided to the deck by little more than a bright beam of light and a lone landing-signal officer. That officer stands in the darkness and speaks to the pilot over a radio, helping him line up the plane with the landing deck during the last three-quarters of a mile.

That final approach "is the moment of truth," when "you totally rely on your training and yourself," said Marine 1st Lt. Tracey A. Farris, 25, of Nashville, Tenn. All sorts of dangers lurk in the darkness, pilots say. The worst mistake, and probably a fatal one, is to come in too low or too slow. That leaves the pilot short of the runway, making it almost certain that the plane will slam into the ship.

But even with such a small margin for error, the 3-year-old El Toro training group — known as VMFAT 101 — has had only one fatal accident. In that crash, a jet went down in the darkness between the California coast and San Clemente Island. That record is a credit to the pilots' training. "To reach the 'moment of truth,'" the pilots who gathered for the night landing tests already had spent more than two years flying the A-4 Skyhawk. For the past eight months, they have been at El Toro piloting the F-A-18 fighter.

As the Nimitz steamed northward about 70 miles off Baja California, Navy Lt. Mark Hubbard gave the final briefing for the night landings. Hubbard talked rapidly, sprinkling a little personal advice in between the facts and figures.

"Listen up. There will be a lot going on out there tonight," Hubbard said. Stepping and pointing to one of the pilots, Hubbard asked how he would react to one possible emergency situation.

The pilot answered promptly and crisply. Pilots say the trick to landing aboard a carrier — day or night — is to keep the nose of the plane up eight degrees and snag one of the four cables that run across the deck with a small hook that hangs under the tail of the airplane.

Social customs polarizing Kuwaitis

KUWAIT CITY (AP) — Social customs have become a postwar battleground in Kuwait, dividing those who want more personal freedom from those who fear granting it would tear at the social fabric.

The Iraqi occupation drove hundreds of thousands of Kuwaitis into exile. Those who spent the crisis in the West generally returned more liberal; those who passed the months in Saudi Arabia came back more conservative.

The split is coming more into the open.

A teen-ager scandalized some people last week by telling a television interviewer she saw nothing wrong with hanging out with boyfriends in public.

On the other side, most fourth-year students at Kuwait's medical school have boycotted classes this week because professors barred women wearing veils from their lectures.

Many Kuwaitis spent more than a year outside their country after Iraq invaded in August 1990.

The broad trend among those who spent the months in the West or those who stayed and fought is a demand to run their own lives.

Many teen-agers, for example, want to wear T-shirts or short skirts and to cruise in shiny new cars outside a waterfront strip of fast-food restaurants.

"We didn't have our freedom during the occupation, so we want our freedom now," said Hamad Qanoon, 17.

But around 300,000 refugees, the majority of those who fled, spent the war months in Saudi Arabia, where much of public life is regulated by strict Islamic rules. Thousands returned more conservative.

There has been an attempt here to

major postwar issue in Kuwait, organize a religious police group, similar to an organization in Saudi Arabia that ensures everyone obeys Islamic customs of modest dress and not drinking alcohol.

It has not caught on. When one member of the new organization told a Kuwaiti woman she should not go into a supermarket in jeans, she told him to drop dead and breezed past.

But it isn't just the liberals who sometimes defy convention. At the Kuwait University Medical School, about six women students started wearing the niqab, at least 20 inches of cloth that hooks over the nose and ears and when combined

with a head scarf, covers everything but the eyes. It is not mandated by Islamic tradition, but considered extreme modest.

University officials said the medical school's dean, Dr. Hilal al-Sayer, reissued a 1983 rule banning the niqab.

"It's completely unsanitary and unacceptable," Dr. Abdel Latif al-Badran, vice rector for the Health Sciences Center, said in an interview Tuesday.

He said the niqab also undermines doctor-patient relations.

"You cannot have a curtain between you and your patient to get the proper history and proper human

contact," he said. Most students, even those wearing smaller veils, agree with the ban in labs and clinic rounds.

"A patient should feel relaxed with the doctor," said Majda al-Qatani, 25, a student at the school, where 60 percent of the students are just some things you have to do to be acceptable."

But some criticize the total ban as an attack on personal freedom, or worse, religion. Students said all but five of the 70 students in the fourth year walked out of their classes when the professors enforced the ban Sunday.

Anguish, guilt haunts Army 'I was right after all' surgeon until he discovers ...

ATLANTA (AP) — Army surgeon Kenneth Swan said he was filled with anguish and doubt after he saved the life of a 19-year-old soldier who was horribly wounded in the Vietnam War.

More than 23 years later, he tracked down Kenneth McGarity and found a happily married family man who hopes to help others overcome disabilities such as his — being blind and having no legs.

"I found it just incredible that he could have such a positive attitude with the enormous physical damage he sustained," Swan said Tuesday. "He's been through literally hell on Earth and he had come up smiling."

"I was ecstatic that I had made the decision that made," McGarity, 43, who lives with his wife and two daughters in Columbus, 110 miles southwest of Atlanta, said he's grateful Swan was undaunted by the severity of the wounds.

"This doctor had been through the guilt trip of a lifetime," he said in a telephone interview. "He's been asking himself all this time, 'Did I do the right thing?'"

"If he hadn't stuck all the pieces back together, I wouldn't have this wonderful wife and these great children."

Swan, 57, a trauma surgeon at the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey, in Newark, visited McGarity at his home in September.

An account of the surgeon's story is published in this week's American Medical News, which is put out by the American Medical Association.

In 1968, three weeks after returning to Vietnam on a second tour of duty, the Army specialist's helicopter exploded after taking a hit from a rocket-propelled grenade.

Swan amputated McGarity's legs and supervised other doctors in trying to repair severe eye, arm and head injuries. McGarity lay on the operating table for seven hours.

"I don't recall there being much of a decision," Swan said, "I did not ponder very long whether he should live or die. I made a decision for a full-court press."

The next day, however, Swan said fellow doctors criticized his decision to save McGarity, telling him the soldier would have been better off dead.

Swan, who had been in Vietnam only four weeks and was the least experienced surgeon at the Army evacuation center in Pleiku, said he became angry and defensive.

"I was taught to treat the wounded," said Swan, who also served in the Persian Gulf War. "They still felt that we were in a position to

judge that this soldier would have rather died."

McGarity said he ran into a similar attitude from doctors at U.S. hospitals trying to help him adjust to being blind and having to use a wheelchair.

"I remember a doctor saying after he had seen me, 'Why in the hell did they let this guy live?'" McGarity said. "Most of the nurses didn't know what to do with me."

The doubts nagged Swan on and off until 1989, when he decided to find McGarity and determine if he had condemned him to a life of dependence and misery.

"I expected to find him in a VA hospital, neglected, bed sores, psychotic, pitied," Swan said.

After three years, he found a disabled veteran who has worked hard to adjust. McGarity has attended college, learned to scuba dive and wants to earn a degree to help others cope with debilitating injuries.

"It's the most dramatic event for me in my medical or military career," Swan said.

McGarity said meeting the surgeon who refused to let him die has helped him in coping with the war and his disabilities.

"I had always wondered 'who was the guy who got a hold of me off that chopper,'" McGarity said. "He had a faith. And where he had it, these others didn't."

Why do the Scandinavians love lutefisk?

WASHBURN, N.D. (AP) — The steamed-up church windows were visible a block away. It was a tell-tale sign that lutefisk, the lye-cured codfish, favored by Scandinavians, was being boiled inside.

Lutefisk (pronounced LOOT-eh-fisk) has a horrible reputation, a strong fishy odor and a somewhat wobbly texture. If it was a living, breathing person, it might feel entitled to file a slander lawsuit, based on the things that have been said about it.

But you shouldn't always believe what you hear.

Only at a Lutheran church dinner where white Scandinavian foods — mashed potatoes, lefse and lutefisk all smothered in butter — dominate the plates can lutefisk be properly judged.

Has Pastor Owen Gassedelen ever had parishioners arrive 40 minutes early to sit on hard pews waiting for his sermon? Probably not.

"Ticket-takers politely pointed folks toward the food in the church basement, where steam was pouring from boiling kettles full of the fish. The five-man cooking crew attempted to vent the strong aroma of uncooked fish straight out a window with the help of a fan.

The cooks were raving about the delicacy they were creating, all 650 pounds of it. "We haven't lost a soul on lutefisk yet," said 'Stork' Nordquist, the chief cook. "But a few have choked on meatballs."

Meatballs, a decidedly non-Nordic staple since they contain spices, were on the menu for the benefit of other ethnic groups in this town 40 miles north of Bismarck.

Over in the preparation room, Elmer and Arlene Schwarz were seated on plastic mini-chairs usually occupied by Sunday school kindergartners.

Yes, Elmer admitted, "I taste the lutefisk just to say I did it."

One diner suggested, "One thing about eating lutefisk. You can wear dirty socks and nobody'll even notice."

Lutefisk doesn't stink after it's cooked, and it looks like lots of other fish. There's no secret recipe — lutefisk is just fish, salt and water. Lye is used to preserve the fish, which is boiled thoroughly so that the chemical is removed.

South was happy when today's trump finesse worked, but the happiness quickly disappeared. East turned up with a natural trump trick, and the marked diamond shift beat the game.

Dummy's spade ace won, and a trump to South's Jack held the trick. South then cashed a top trump, getting bad news. He cashed one more trump before starting the clubs, but he was unlucky. East ruffed—the third club and switched to diamonds, four tricks going to the defense.

Perhaps you should have bid three spades over three clubs," offered South. "That would have steered me into the unbeatable no-trump game."

Can you see how to make the heart game?

When East follows low on the first trump, South should resist the routine finesse and merely cover East's trump four with his six. This loses to West's nine, but the diamond king remains free from attack. Declarer wins West's spade exit in dummy and leads a trump to his ace to reveal the position, but all is well. A low club to dummy's 10 allows South to draw the trumps by finessing, and South can claim by winners. He wins four trumps, four clubs and two spades, and East never gets the lead for the damaging diamond shift.

Judy Davis, Sam Neill team up for 2nd turn at TV movie in 'One Against the Wind'

The last time Sam Neill worked with Judy Davis was 12 years ago, in the acclaimed Australian film "My Brilliant Career." They were a lot younger then, and when they were reunited for "One Against the Wind," a "Hallmark Hall of Fame" presentation airing Sunday, Dec. 1 on CBS, Neill found that a dozen years had changed them.

"I found we worked together better this time," Neill says. "We're both more experienced. We know what we're doing now."

He laughs, then adds, "I'm not sure we knew what we were doing [in 1979]. We were both very green."

In "One Against the Wind," which is based on a true story, Davis plays Mary Lindell, an Englishwoman living in Nazi-occupied France during World War II, who mounted a continuing escape operation for downed Allied fliers. Neill plays Capt. James Leggett, her first successful escapee and later her contact back in England.

Their convivially combative relationship in the film reflects the real friendship between Neill and Davis. "We've kept in touch (over the years)," Neill says. "We have a friendly kind of sparring relationship. We usually get into an argument three or four minutes after we see each other, in the friendliest possible way."

"For at least one scene, that relaxed relationship was probably more crucial to Neill than Davis. Early in the film, Mary shaves the wounded Leggett with an ominous-looking straight razor. Recalling the scene, Neill laughs. "They assured me that it had been blunted, but you never really know, do you?"

On the whole, though, he credits Davis with what he looks upon as

surprisingly easy work. "Working opposite someone who's very good makes your life simpler than it might be otherwise," Neill says. "It's like tennis, where playing with someone good lifts your game."

"One Against the Wind" and "My Brilliant Career" share another feature: Both are period films, with all the research and extra work that entails.

"It's not that hard if you're playing someone British," says Neill, who was born in Northern Ireland but grew up in New Zealand. "There's so much about the British that seems frozen in time around 1939."

Just putting on a uniform or costume helps. "You get an immediate sense of being in another time and place," Neill says.

Neill also had a series of conversations with his father, who died two months before filming began, about the older Neill's wartime experiences.

"It wasn't until a few weeks before he died that he talked about the war, at my prompting," Neill says. "Because the real character is now dead, and I couldn't find anyone who could give me any information about him, I thought, 'Well the only British army major that I knew was my father, so I might as well base it on him.'"

With shooting beginning so soon after his father's death, Neill says, "I don't want to sound sentimental about it, but I felt that he was assisting me in some way." The actor adds that the role allowed him to pay tribute to his father's memory.

Gulf War leader will anchor CBS Pearl Harbor special

WASHINGTON — CBS News has signed Gen. H. Norman Schwarzkopf to anchor, with Charles Kuralt, its two-hour special on the 50th anniversary of the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, which CBS has scheduled for Dec. 7.

The commander of U.S. forces in the war against Iraq said he was 7 years old on Dec. 7, 1941, and playing in a friend's backyard in New Jersey when his sister rushed over with news that the Japanese had attacked Pearl Harbor.

"All day we huddled around the big old radio in the living room and listened to the reports," Schwarzkopf recalled.

David Corvo, executive producer of the special, said Menday that Schwarzkopf is a "terrific storyteller" and will narrate portions of the program.

Corvo said the bulk of the program will be a documentary, but

it will include some live segments. He expects Schwarzkopf also to explain the historical and political context of the events leading up to the attack,

which signaled the entry of America into the war against the Axis.

"He's a great student of the strategy at Pearl Harbor," said Corvo. "The general served there between 1978 and 1980."

CBS News' president Eric Ober said "General Schwarzkopf's fascinating perspective as a general, an officer who once served at Pearl Harbor and an American who remembers well the day Pearl Harbor was attacked, will help make the CBS News special a landmark program that vividly recalls the events that changed history."

HOLLYWOOD — About the time Pam Ewing stumbled out of bed to find her "dead" ex-husband Bobby in the shower, one of her "Dallas" co-stars was slowly waking up to a disturbing realization of his own.

Dack Rambo, who is 50 and single, had found himself a new foe at Southfork: the entertainment industry's bias against men suspected of being gay — and consequently men suspected of having the AIDS virus.

"We were a few weeks into the show," Rambo said, "I noticed that the story line was veering off in another direction and I thought:

"What the hell is this? All of a sudden my relationship with

Priscilla (Presley, who played Bobby's girlfriend) was going right down the tubes.

Actor Rock Hudson had just died of acquired immune deficiency syndrome, and Hollywood was still in a ruckus over his on-screen kisses with actress Linda Evans on "Dynasty," the decade's other prime-time block-

buster soap. The medical community had already established that the deadly disease was not transmitted by kissing, but unmarried male actors in their 30s and older were still suspect.

Now, six years later, has much changed? Could an actor known to have tested positive for HIV find employment?

"I think it would be pretty doubtful," said Rambo, who talked Friday about his new role as an AIDS spokesman and his old one as an actor. Rambo quit his role on the NBC daytime soap "Another World" in September, announcing that he had

recently tested positive for the human immunodeficiency virus, which causes AIDS.

"And I think people are still pretty unknowledgeable about the disease and therefore fearful of employing anybody (with HIV). There might be some parts, but I don't think you would be doing any kissing scenes."

This fall the entertainment industry had to confront AIDS after Susan Bluestein made public a book proposal that her husband, 41-year-old actor Brad Davis, had written about his life as a secret AIDS patient. Brad Davis died in September. Davis wrote that while the industry gives its support through benefits and high-profile fund raising, it fails to support actors on an individual basis. Even those rumored to have HIV.

"I think there are certain people in town — people like (Fox Inc. Chairman) Barry Diller and Hollywood Supporters — there are people I think like that who are very dedicated to helping in whatever way," Rambo said.

Hollywood Supporters is a new ad-hoc organization created to solicit funds for people with HIV in the entertainment industry.

"But, yes, there are a lot of people who pay a lot of lip service to it, who pay in terms of money but don't really put themselves out there on the line."

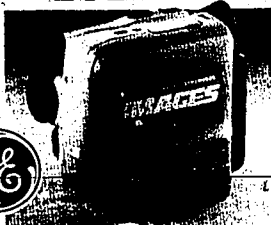
