Red Shield Club Sets Christmas Party Today

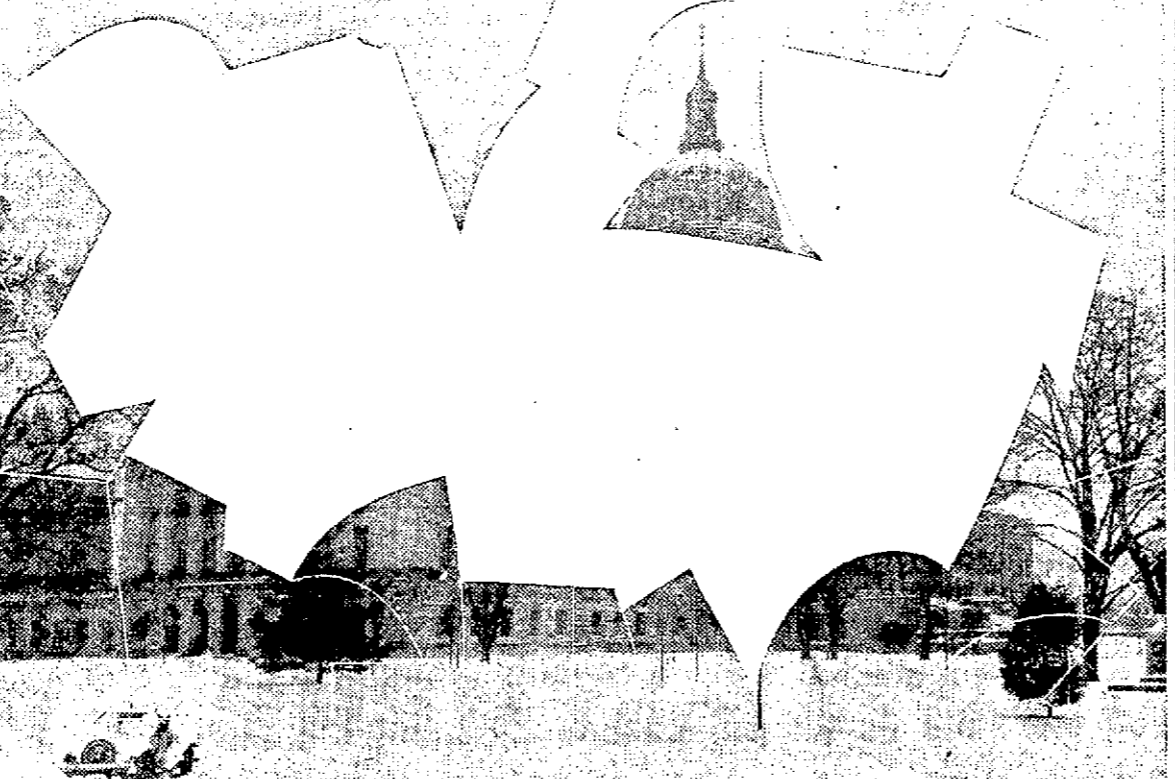
A Christmas party for the 400 members of the Red Shield Boys and Girls Club will be held at the Salvation Army Citadel gymnasium at 7 p. m. today.
