Burr Valley School.

The following is a report of the
Burr Valley school, which began
on January, 28th, 1907 and closed
June, 21st, 1907.

Pupils enrolled, boys 6, girls 5

Number of days present, boys
585, girls 294. Number days ab-
sent, boys, 3, girls, 20. Total days
present and absent, boys 588, girls,
320. Average daily attendance,
boys, 6, girls, 3. Average daily
absence, 0. Per cent of daily at-
tendance, boys, 99, girls, 92. Per-
cent of daily absence, boys, 1,
girls, 8. There are only 6 boys
enrolled in this school and three
of this number were never absent
or tardy, and the other three were
absent one day each. The ones
who were never absent or tardy are
Alfred Dean, Dewey Burr, and
Ernest Burr, and the ones who
were absent one day are Silas De-
n, Dewey Smith and John Crouse.

The girls did not attend as well
as the boys, though their attend-
ance was very good for a school
taught at this time of year.

The patrons of this school are
interested in the education of their
children, and will also cause a
teacher to enjoy life, whose lot it
may be to fall in with them.
