The windows sere frequently made or preceed paper and the banches were made of split logs, with pins bored in for loga. The students, patrons and teachers maintained the schools, and the tuition was paid by the patrone of the achool on a per capies besis. It is true that the early schools were prirete in neture, and show were peid for by a group of femilies who were willing to pay for the tuition end were interested in school activities. The corly settlers were enrious that their children learn to read, erite, cipher and reed the Bible. In all the old schools the first thing in the routine of the work was to reed a chapter in the Bible and reside the Lord's Freyer in unison, which was a part of the day's program.

The early schools were called subscription or school
