Hogs Dying Rapidly

Frightening clouds of the latest epidemic which presented so many horrors in Wood County, this state, a disease which is killing large numbers of hogs in that section. The epidemic has gained alarming proportions and in some parts of the country a 100% death rate has been noted in the past two weeks.

It is asserted that the disease is hog cholera, but experts have had no opinion as to the disease diagnosis.

A committee has been established in the Wood County Agricultural Extension Service to prevent the spread of the disease and it is hoped that systematic vaccination can be effected. At present it is known that 1000 hogs have been killed by a number of hog farmers in Wood County, and it is believed that there many more will soon join them. It is also believed that the disease is spreading rapidly.
