The population of the town of Marlinton is 1,045 according to figures given out by the census department. The population in 1890 was 171 showing an increase in population of nearly six hundred per cent. Few towns in the United States can show a more healthy increase. This is the population inside the corporate limits. There are possibly 250 more persons living just outside the corporate limits and counting the people of Campbelltown, who claim Marlinton as their place of residence, the total population of the town can be safely put at 1,500. The population of other incorporated towns in the county are Cass 496, Durbin, 890; Hillsboro 181, Seebert 190. Ronceverte has a population of 2,157 and Lewisburg 808.
