Today I went to our public libeary and got hold of a book containing lists of names of Germans who came to Pennsylvania during the period 1727 to 1776. I found that most of those who came over during that period were called "Palatines" because they came from the region of the Rhine.

I turned through the book page by page, looking for the names Rada baugh, Buzzard and Alt. Here is what I found:
