Laying of a Corner Stone.

On Sunday, July 9, 1893, the cornerstone of a house of worship, now being erected near Driscoll, by the Lutheran church, was laid by Rev. J. F. A. Lautenschlager, with the most befitting and impressive ceremony. After this solemn service was ended, and the corner stone, which contains the Holy Bible, the unaltered Augsburg Confession, Dr. Martin Luther's smaller Catechism, the Lutheran Hymnal and a copy of the Minutes of the Lutheran Standard, of the Joint Synod of Ohio, and other tracts, placed in order. The congregation repaired to the grove near by where a stand and seats were arranged, to hear the address which was delivered by Rev. L. from Isaiah 28, 16. The speaker called attention to, and emphasized the importance of Christian people every where and at all times to be the servants of the Lord. He showed how just necessary and salutary it is for the people of God in every day life to begin, prosecute and end all their actions and transactions in the name of the Lord Jesus. Then he showed how much more necessary it is in the erection of a house of God, that it be begun and completed in the name of the Lord who is the true, precious and sure cornerstone of the Christian faith and hope.
