

Prothonotary Henry S. Adams in War 1862

1. Henry S. Adams

Henry S. Adams was drafted into service at Norfolk Va. in 1862, being immediately volunteered in his brother's place, and accepted, and ordered to report to Camp Springs. On the day of his departure, he went to his brother Josiah to say goodbye. That was the last they ever saw or heard of him as he never returned from the war.

2. John R. Adams

He was drafted into the service, marched to Norfolk a distance of more than three hundred miles, served his time bravely, was honorably discharged, and walked back to his home in haste, infected with the deadly fever from which no few of the mountaineers ever recovered.

The entire family was filled with the sorrow and grief of his departure and sisters, David, Nancy and Polly died one after the other and his life the memories of this sad time ending her uneventful life.

3. William C. Adams, Captain - of Mill Point (original name - Adams, changed because of the translocation)

He was very popular with his soldiers because of his kindness to them. After the war, he went several times to the legislature, was County Sheriff, in later life died at ...

2. Daniel McCarty

Timothy McCarty had seven sons to his first wife,
Daniel, Preston, Justin, James, Thomas, and two others whose
names are not available. All of them were soldiers in the war
of 1812. Only one Daniel McCarty ever returned to Rockcastle
to live. The others either perished in the war or went to
Kentucky or Tennessee.

3. David Cooper

Took part in the affair to Coney Island near York.
Served, also, under General Harrison in the West. Took part
in battle of Tippecanoe. William Salisbury Jr. John (Little
John) McNeil and John L. Flemish were his best mates.

4. Joseph Moore of Knappa Creek

During his service he met and married Maria Gray,
whom he had settled on Anthony's Creek.

8. William Crockett, son of John Crockett of Hunterville.

Returned from the war, settled on Brown's Creek, operated a sawing machine along with his farm.

9. Jacob Price Jr.

Served under William Henry Harrison in battle of Tippecanoe. He had sons in Civil War and grandson in the Spanish American War, 1898.

10. John William Price.

A surgeon on board ship in war of 1812, stationed near Norfolk, died on board ship, and so far as is known, was buried at sea.

The following is a partial list of the soldiers of the war of 1812, who lived in what is now Pocahontas County after the said war. This region was at the time of the War of 1812, under the regime of Bath County; some of these soldiers may have lived in other parts of Virginia, but spent their lives in Pocahontas County; However these soldiers had much to do with the early development of Pocahontas County.

The four McCarty brothers who were in the war of 1812 were the sons of Timothy McCarty, the Revolutionary War Soldier; of the four brothers enlisted only one of them returned to Pocahontas County -- he was Daniel McCarty-- to live; The rest either perished in the war, or went to Tennessee or Kentucky. Their home was on the Knapps Creek near Frost Pocahontas County West Va.

John Brown not being married volunteered in his brother Josiah Browns place, was accepted, but never returned; was supposed to have perished in the war.

The following is a partial list of the Revolutionary War Veterans who lived in Pocahontas County after the Revolutionary War, and spent part of their time in the County. This region was then under the regime of Augusta County, and some of the old soldiers removed to this section from Piedmont County, after the war while Pocahontas was under the regime of Greater Bath County. However these pioneers have had much to do with the early development of Pocahontas County.
