SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The twelve months of 1963 reflect another normal year of Town activities and affairs. In general, all business was conducted in the regular manner and there were no unusual or outstanding events to report. The Town General Account shows a small balance of \$66.12 at the end of the year.

Special expenditures made during the year concern the purchase of the John Deere Tractor-Loader for \$5,616.00, the Town's share of \$836.40 for the paving of the parking lot, and the Pine Hill Fire cost of \$2,753.63. We have already received reimbursement for the major portion of the Pine Hill Fire cost from Rutland Town and the State. All other expenses on the General Account conform to the budget established at the beginning of the year.

During the year we received a petition that the present Town Dump location constitutes a health hazard and that it be moved. This matter is under study not only by the Selectmen but also by the Vermont Department of Health, Bureau of Environmental Sanitation. We expect that a decision on this matter will be reached during 1964.

Like everything else, our Town affairs and needs are changing. New requirements; demand for more and better service; improvements and general maintenance of our equipment and highways continue to make steadily increasing demands on our budget which in turn requires higher taxes. To try to contain such increasing costs, we have initiated ways and means for better financial control, better planning and closer relations with local, county, State and Federal agencies and individuals. All citizens can help this effort through careful consideration before any requests are made for change or special service.

HIGHWAY COMMISSIONER'S REPORT

1963

The winter of 1962 and 1963 was one the old folks tell about when there was very cold weather, ice and plenty of snow. Still with this bad winter the Highway Department ended the season with a balance of \$346.00.

State Aid Tarring

Our State Aid tarring work was on West Street from McGarry's store to Mead's railroad crossing and about a third of a mile on Route number 3 from Grove Street to the Village line.

The sidewalk of Meadow Street was rebuilt with hot mix as well as the sidewalk on Warner Avenue. On South Street we re-laid the marble sidewalk from the marble bridge to the Marble Town Inn and most of the slabs were replaced. The expense to the Town for this work was for labor only.

Equipment

Our equipment has been very well maintained and all is in good condition except the sidewalk snow plow and tractor. This equipment has been in service for some time and it will need to be replaced.

May I express my sincere thanks to the people of the Town and Village of Proctor for their cooperation and the Town employees for a good job well done.

ANNUAL TOWN REPORT, 1963

This is a report to the people of Proctor describing the health services which they have received during 1963 (October 1, 1962-September 30, 1963). These services have been planned carefully so that maximum benefit may be gained from each tax dollar. For instance, one clinic may serve many towns if the number of patients is small. On the other hand, when a service is needed in a town, we make every attempt to provide it. The understanding of how your health department serves your town is valuable information for you to have. Any time which you spend studying this report will be most well spent.

I invite you to discuss this report with your friends and health officer, and I would welcome any impressions which you care to forward to me.

VERMONT DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL WELFARE

MONTPELIER, VERMONT

This twenty-eighth in the series of annual reports submitted to the people of Proctor presents tabulations for the calendar year 1963. In the Department of Social Welfare's program of assistance to the aged, blind or disabled 30% of the costs of hospital and physician services, as well as the excess over \$80.00 per month in Nursing Home care, are assessed against the town of settlement of the recipients of such care. Participation charges incurred by your community during the past year for each of these types of care were as follows:

Nursing Home Care	\$393.00
Hospitalization Services	\$237.90
Physician Services	\$14.70

Under similar settlement provisions town participation in the program of Aid to Families with Dependent Children is at the rate of one-eighth the assistance grants while costs incurred for the care of Committed Children are borne equally by the local and state agencies. Charges assessed against your community for the former amounted to \$326.26 and for the latter \$50.73 for the year just closed.

During 1963 assistance was granted to 7 residents in your community under the Aid to the Aged, Blind or Disabled program. Direct money payments to these persons were financed entirely out of state-federal funds. Among the other programs financed from these same sources were Services for the Blind, Adoption Services and Medical Aid for the Aged. While no town-by-town records are compiled for these categories, their benefits were available to all qualified residents.

HEALTH OFFICER'S REPORT

Each year the President of our country delivers a State of the Union message. I am sure that this report will not shatter or even nudge the most sensitive seismograph, but there are some things that are of importance to the people of Proctor.

Health wise, we have had about an average year. We have had the usual visitors: measles, mumps and chicken pox, with the latter much in evidence last spring and this fall; also, an occasional case of scarlet fever appeared. To all who remember the twenty-eight days of quarantine for scarlet fever, how wonderful it must be to know that with antibiotics scarlet fever is merely a pest rather than a disaster.

Last fall throughout the drought our water supply continued copious and good. How many of us have been thoughtful enough to thank the people responsible for the new artesian well that has been added to our original water supply?

There seems to be some controversy regarding the Sabin-polio program. There is no doubt that it is far easier to immunize a large group with the Sabin oral vaccine. To those who believe that polio gains entry into the human body via the intestinal tract the Sabin vaccine is the answer to the problem, but it seems unfair to discredit the value of the Salk-Vaccine or to think that the five thousand shots given to the people of Proctor without charge, were wasted. Far better, to-day, "The shots plus the drops gives total, or near total protection against Polio."

Lastly, it has come to my attention through the State Board of Health, as well as the people of Newton and Garden Streets, that the burning of trash at the town dump constitutes a real nuisance. With a gyrating wind, the air over the above

mentioned streets is saturated with the stench of burning trash. It seems altogether fair and necessary that some consideration be shown these people. The problem deserves the urgent attention of the village authorities in collaboration with the authorities of the town of Pittsford.

So, until next year may I take this opportunity to wish all of the people of Proctor a healthful and happy year in 1964.

The legal voters in Town Meeting of the Town of Proctor, Vermont, are hereby notified and warned to meet at the Village Hall in the Village of Proctor, on Tuesday the 3rd day of March, A. D. 1964 at 1:00 P.M. to vote on the following matters, to wit:

1. To elect by ballot a Moderator, Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, a Selectman, and Overseer of the Poor, a Road Commissioner, a Lister, an Auditor, a First and Second Constable, a Collector of Taxes, a First and Second Grand Juror, a Town Agent, and a Cemetery Commissioner.

2. To vote on the following questions:

Shall licenses for the sale of malt and vinous beverages be granted in the Town?

Shall spirituous liquors be sold in this Town?

3. To hear and act upon the reports of the Town Officers.

4. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate money for the care and embellishment of the Riverside Cemetery, and if so, how much?

5. To see if the Town under the provisions of Section 141 of Title 22 VSA will vote to contract with the Proctor Free Library to furnish books to inhabitants of the Town free and to appropriate money therefor.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise more than twenty cents on the dollar highway tax as required by law, and to take advantage of the provisions of Chapter 1, Title 19 VSA.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise money by taxation or otherwise to pay current expenses, such State taxes as are required by law and the indebtedness of the Town.

8. To see when the taxes voted and State taxes assessed shall be payable.

9. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of Article 2 of Sub Chapter 4, Chapter 133 of Title 32 VSA, for the collection of taxes by the Town Treasurer.

10. To see if the Town will vote any compensation to Town Officers.

11. To see if the Town will vote to defray expenses of surety bonds where bonds are required by law.

12. To see if the Town will vote to concur with the Village for a joint Budget Committee.

13. Will the Town authorize the Auditors of the Town to employ the services of an accountant from the office of the Auditor of Accounts as provided for in section 1693-1697 of Title 24 VSA to conduct an audit of the accounts of the Town?

14. Shall the town vote to exempt from taxes the first \$15,000.00 or smaller amount of the appraised value of buildings used and occupied exclusively as homes, or dwelling houses that are to be constructed or put in the process of construction during the 12 months immediately following the meeting, the duration of such exemption not to exceed 3 years, to be determined by vote, with the exemption first applicable against the grand list of the year in which the vote is taken.

15. To see if the Town will vote to have the Selectmen join with the Trustees of the Village of Proctor in proposing an enabling act at a session of the legislature for unifying and consolidating the town of Proctor and village of Proctor into one municipality, by future separate votes of the voters within the Village and of the voters in the Town of Proctor outside of the Village limits.

16. To vote by ballot on the following:

"To see if the freemen will vote to accept or reject the following proposed article of amendment to the constitution of Vermont."

That section 64 of chapter II of the constitution be amended to read:

Section 64. Laws for the encouragement of virtue and prevention of vice and immorality ought to be constantly kept in force, and duly executed; and a competent number of schools ought to be maintained in each town unless the general assembly permits other provisions for the convenient instruction of youth. All religious societies, or bodies of men that may be united or incorporated for the advancement of religion and learning, or for other pious and charitable purposes, shall be encouraged and protected in the enjoyment of the privileges, immunities, and estates, which they in justice ought to enjoy, under such regulations as the general assembly of this state shall direct.

17. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
