FACTS FOR YOUR VISIT TO DISNEYLAND

Location: "The happiest place on earth" is located on Harbor Blvd. in Anaheim, about 35 minutes southeast of downtown Los Angeles. Take the Santa Ana freeway to Anaheim, exit at Harbor Blvd. or Katella Ave., and follow the signs to Disneyland.

Operating Hours: Open daily thru Sept. 17. Summer hours beginning June 17, thru Labor Day, 8 a.m. to 1 a.m. Park operating hours subject to change without notice. See For Further Information below.

Admission and Ticket Book Prices: For families, we recommend Disneyland Ticket Books for maximum thrills and enjoyment. Two types are available: the "BIG 11," which includes admission and a choice of 11 Disneyland attractions, and the "DELUXE 15," which includes admission and a choice of 15 Disneyland attractions. For the short-time visitor, we recommend the Guided Tour, which features a two-and-a-half hour tour of Disneyland and admission to seven Disneyland attractions. For "lets-just-go-in-and-walk-around" visitors, we recommend General Admission Tickets, which include admission to any of Disneyland's "lands" and free attractions.

All over America people are stepping back to a time when dancing was very special. And that's good, because gliding cheek to cheek across the floor to an old-fashioned tune can be positively therapeutic in the treatment of the blots. Who can be grouchy when they're dancing?

To those who crowd the Plaza Gardens' floor each summer to dance to the Big Band sounds, touch dancing

was never far away. During the 60's when the old sounds had almost faded into a memory, fans had very few places to go listen, let alone dance to them. That was when couples came to Disneyland to swing to the music of Kenton, James, Herman, Crosby, Brown, Benke, Rich, Martin, Rich and Basie—the Who's Who in Big Bands. Jitterbuggers flocked to the familiar red and white canopied, open-air pavilion for a sentimental journey into the swinging 40's. The "Tug" and "twist" came and went like passing fancies. The "Balboa," a legacy from the old Rendezvous Ballroom, was notably compatible with the



invincible sounds of Stan Kenton. Then came a new sound, rock 'n' roll, offering a different tempo altogether. And with it, many local dance halls and ballrooms all but disappeared into musical oblivion. But the Carnation Plaza Gardens at Disneyland continued to offer a roster of big-name bands and a fun, open-air location where one could still enjoy a fast foxtrot on a warm summer evening.

The current dance revival has opened up all manner of dance floors — for disco, Latin, waltz and even Charleston aficionados. Hollywood's Stardust Ballrooms, Myron's in Los

Angeles, and the Golden West in Norwalk are all familiar names to those who are serious about dancing. In Avalon, on Catalina Island, the old Casino features big bands on various summer weekends.

But it's to the Plaza Gardens that young and old alike return time after time, year after year, to listen and dance to their favorites, as they did this past Easter when Stan Kenton and his orchestra entertained springtime guests. And the summer of '78 will be no different, for those signed for the season include the best of the best: Woody Herman, Les Brown, Louie Bellson, Freddy Martin, Buddy Rich,

Bob Crosby, Count Basie, Les Elgart and the Glenn Miller Orchestra conducted by Jimmy Henderson. For the smaller fry, Disneyland has designed a new dance area at the Space Stage in Space Mountain, where popular groups like Papa Doo Run Run will provide danceable music of a different beat.

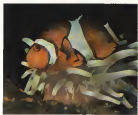

Winchester MYSTERY HOUSE

What motivated Sarah Winchester to employ carpenters and other craftsmen to continue building, expanding and remodeling her 160-room Victorian mansion for 38 years? No one seems to know the answer in this bizarre tale of the widow of the famous Winchester rifle manufacturer's son, whose driving force urged the incessant building to a house rambling over many acres in all directions. Some say that spirits of the people slain by the rifle governed her life. After all, there is a soance room in the heart of the mysterious house. Others contend Sarah was an artistic, architectural genius. For there were beautifully hand-carved wood-burning fireplaces, along with exquisite Italian marble wash basins, modern plumbing, intricate parquet flooring without nails, ornate fixtures and Tiffany windows displayed in this uncanny labyrinth of architectural eccentricity.

For whatever reason it was built, the Winchester Mystery House remains a fun adventure...with its doors opening into solid walls, steps leading to nowhere and cupboards with but one-half inch of

storage space! According to ghost-lovers, these unwelcome guests dearly love to vanish up chimneys. Mrs. Winchester provided them with fifty of the popular spook escapes. She also provided a sophisticated bell tower to toll the hour of midnight, because everyone knows that spirits do not appear before that witching hour. Some of Sarah's inventions were far ahead of her time: an intercom system to contact her servants, burglar-proof window catches, and even a patented molded wash tub.

Now recognized as a California State Historical Landmark, this former private residence is in the process of complete refurbishing and meanwhile, is open daily for all to see and admire. It's location? 525 Winchester, San Jose.



Red & White Fleet HARBOR TOURS

Motorist visitors to San Francisco seldom have the time to appreciate the skyline view of this marvelous city or its bridges because they're too busy driving. A pleasant alternative is to board a sleek cruise ship at Fisherman's Wharf whose journey will guarantee you a view of the city that you simply can't see from anywhere else.

The Red & White 800-passenger vessels sail out into the Bay beneath the Golden Gate Bridge, past Angel Island and Alcatraz, under the Oakland Bay Bridge and alongside the downtown wharf and business areas. There are frequent daily departures (weather permitting)



SANTA'S VILLAGE in Scott's Valley.

Where else but in Santa's Village could children expect to be visited by Santa on any summer day and on weekends and holidays during other seasons? Mrs. Claus is there too, baking fresh sugar cookies, and elves and helpers are on hand to entertain.

This whimsical family amusement park is located 7 miles north of Santa Cruz on Highway 17—just down the road a few miles from Roaring Camp & Big Trees Railroad. In a redwood forest setting, guests enjoy 15 attractions, including antique cars, a miniature train ride and bobsled roller coaster. On Santa's Petting Farm, children pet the animals roaming freely in the area. Guests are greeted by Santa each morning before he is transported to his North Pole house in his reindeer-powered sleigh.

If you can survive riding forwards and backwards to a 142 foot peak on The Tidal Wave, turn two complete upside-down barrel rolls on the Turn of the Century, sit at ease on the third highest wheel on the Sky Wheel; and squeal with pleasure at the 70-degree banking turns of Willard's Whizzer, then you're bound to have a

The 49 acres of Frontier Village Amusement Park had their beginnings as the estate of the late California Congressman Hayes, who planted rare and exotic trees and shrubs. Today the flora of the Park is undisturbed to preserve its natural beauty and to add to the atmosphere of "frontier" days.

Frontier Village is geared mostly toward elementary school children and families, with 16 exciting rides and 28 attractions to keep them entertained. A fast roller-coaster treat is called the Apache Whirlwind. There's an authentic stagecoach ride, antique wooden Indian war canoes and Kitty Hawk Airplanes.

There are hourly gunights, stunt shows and big hugs from a bear named "Theodore." There's a General Store and other shops on Main Street and plenty of "good grub" wagons located throughout the Village. You can fish for your dinner in a stocked trout pond. Or picnic in a secluded tree-shaded area.

The Village is open weekends and holidays (except Thanksgiving and Christmas) during the school year, and daily during summer. It's located on Monterey Road, (State Highway B2) in South San Jose.



MARINE WORLD, AFRICA USA

South of the San Francisco Airport on the Bayshore Freeway (U.S. 101) near Redwood City, is an attractive combination of marine and zoo-type shows and attractions. Marine World, Africa USA. Killer whales, dolphins, seals and birds perform live in spectacular shows...topped off by an outstanding water ski and boat show.

Summer vacationers enjoy the new novel playground for youngsters, the "Whale of a Time Playground." Kids also have a whale of a time submerged in a cage full of ping pong balls.

The most popular stars of the bayshore playground are, of course, the killer whales. A scenic Boston Harbor background provides the setting for their ingenious antics. Jungle beasts too, perform seemingly impossible stunts.

In addition to providing wholesome family enter-

tainment, Marine World, Africa USA is dedicated to the preservation of a wide spectrum of endangered animal and mammal life. Year 'round, it is open weekends and most weekdays.



THE WAX MUSEUM at Fisherman's Wharf in San Francisco

At the foot of Mason on Jefferson at Fisherman's Wharf is one of the most astounding exhibits in the world of the ancient art of wax sculpture...with over 225 famous figures on display. For history and horror buffs, there are renowned personalities depicted in wax in settings of Royalty, U.S. Presidents, Feared Leaders and the chilling Chamber of Horrors. Settings for each group create a mood...from gruesome guillotine beheadings to the unmasked Phantom of the Opera.

Popular with the small fry are various realistic scenes starring movie stars in categories such as "Cowboys" and "Bad Men."

From methods still held secret by the famed Tussaud family, the amazingly lifelike wax figures in this Museum are constructed in London.

The Wax Museum remains open daily for those who would like to admire an atrocity as old as medieval times.



ROARING CAMP & Big Trees Railroad

For the pure pleasure of being outdoors beneath the bluest of skies, breathing pure mountain air, and in the company of giant California redwoods...so tourist adventure can delight the senses more than an historic steam train excursion aboard the Roaring Camp and Big Trees Narrow-Gauge Railroad. This unique and entertaining six-mile, hour-long journey takes its passengers through mighty redwood forests into the West's glorious past on brightly colored boxcars.

At Roaring Camp, you park your car some distance away from the nostalgic "village" area and walk across a picturesque covered bridge. You'll pass a tiny schoolhouse (in use), and go to the Western "street" on which the train station, General Store and Red Caboose Saloon are situated. In keeping with the 19th century atmosphere, the streets and paths are dirt (meticulously groomed), a definite aesthetic touch in this age of cold concrete.

As to the train ride itself chugging, twisting and turning up a steep grade, a tiny 1890 vintage locomotive takes you through forests of redwoods towering hundreds of feet above, sometimes obliterating the warm sunlight. At the Bear Mountain summit, passengers may disembark for hikes and picnics and await a later train for Roaring Camp. Passengers also leave the train and enter a cathedral-like setting in a grove of giant redwoods where the handsome conductor discourses upon the history of the coastal trees. During the ride, interpreters aid the conductor in explaining the history of the narrow-gauge

railroad to group visitors from foreign countries.

Upon your return to the Camp, an old-fashioned chuckwagon steak Bar-B-Q is served under the trees. Reservations must be made in advance.

The commanding forests, panoramic views, friendly staff, and unique train journey all contribute in making a family visit to Roaring Camp something special. Trains depart daily, except Christmas Day. Their mailing address: Felton, Santa Cruz County, California 95018.



SANTA CRUZ BEACH/BOARDWALK

Somehow, old-fashioned amusement park rides such as roller-coasters, bumper cars and merry-go-rounds always seem to be more fun when they're near the beach. This is the way it is at the Santa Cruz Beach and Boardwalk, surrounded by surf and boasting a sparkling mile-long beach.

Today's seashore playground is a far cry from the bath houses of 1880. Even so, there are still 50 of the original hand-carved horses on the merry-go-round which was first built in 1911.

There are 19 major rides plus kiddie rides, arcades, refreshment stands, restaurants, shooting galleries, an indoor miniature golf course and the Cocomat Grove Ballroom, showcase for many big name bands.

The entire family will find fun and wholesome entertainment at the Santa Cruz Beach and Boardwalk on winter weekends, Easter and other holidays and daily during the summer. ♡

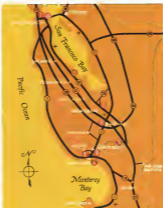

SUMMER MOVIE FARE

The Jungle Book

Upon its original release in 1967, Walt Disney's "The Jungle Book" was heralded as a new dimension in animated musical comedies. The summer of 1978 will see this exciting Technicolor adventure as your favorite theatre again.

"The Jungle Book" was inspired by Rudyard Kipling's "Mowgli" stories and concerns a boy who wants to live his life in the jungle among the animals he loves. In no other Disney animated features have the personalities of its principle voice talents influenced the development of its characters so perfectly. Featured are

Phil Harris as Baloo, the happy-go-lucky bear; Sebastian Cabot as Bagheera, the sly panther; Louis Prima as King Louie the Most, the addled ape potentate; George Sanders as Shere Khan, a sophisticated tiger; heavy; Sterling Holloway as Kaa, the sneaky snake; J. Pat O'Malley as the pompous elephant Colonel Hathi; and Bruce Reitherman as Mowgli, the man-cub.

"The Jungle Book" was three-and-a-half years in the making, involving 322,000 drawings made by 70 animators. At an average output, it would have taken a single artist 16

years to supply all the animation done for the movie. "Jungle Book" was Disney's 17th fully animated feature and at the time of its original release, marked the anniversary of the release of the first all-cartoon picture, "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs." The colorful cartoon was directed by Wolfgang Reitherman and written for the screen by Larry Clemmons, Ralph Wright, Ken Anderson and Vance Gerry. Richard M. and Robert B. Sherman composed five and Terry Gilkyson an additional song for the movie. George Bruns composed the background score.

Jim Macdonald

A Man with Sound Ideas



He stands there, in his handsome white hair and semi-Dali mustache, looking for all the world like a concert musician... except that the instrument he's playing is an odd-looking contraption comprised of a wood frame supporting a tight rosined string which is anchored in an old coffee can over which a drumhead has been stretched. He passes an old hair bow across the string, playing the thing as if it were a fine cello, and out of it come the sounds of doors creaking, rocking chairs rocking, or frogs "riveting." With the help of a high-frequency oscillator, he can even play a recognizable tune like "Down By the Old Mill Stream."

Jim Macdonald is indeed, a musician and a magician—he must be both in order to produce the innovative sound effects used over the past 44 years at Walt Disney Productions. In his long career with the

film studio, Macdonald (yes, it's spelled with a small "d"), has served as a one-man Sound Effects Department, an inventor/engineer of note, and also as the high-pitched voice of Mickey Mouse! It's possible that any Disney movie you have ever seen has Jim's stamp on the sound track somewhere in the film.

In Sound Studio "C," surrounded by a mishmash of Rube Goldberg gadgets he has made by hand, Jim reflects upon the original sound effect for which each of the individual devices was intended. Here's the sound of Mickey's car—it looks like a big truck spring and half a trombone. It is Over there's a steel rim, about 36" in diameter, on which there are heavy springs in a box mounted on roller skate wheels which is pulled round and round to sound exactly like a railroad car speeding down the tracks.

The late producer Bill Walsh requested of Jim a sound to represent a wheel rolling off Herbie, the VW, for the movie "The Love Bug." A simple inflated balloon, with a 8.8 inside, rotated close up to the microphone gave the desired effect. Another simple sound...the breaking up of a wooden berry basket to simulate falling trees and timber.

Barrels filled with Mexican peas sound like a heavy rainstorm. But for more complicated falling water sounds, Jim employs an elaborate concoction of pipes and valves through which real water flows.

The outboard motor sound of Evinrude, the lovable dragon fly in the current Disney release, "The Rescuers," was created by Jim from rubber tubing and a covered wire spool. For animal sound situations involving everything from angry bears to alligators, Jimmy growls through an

old-fashioned lamp chimney.

The simple sounds of footsteps of some cartoon character in an animated film require tedious hours of Jim doing the walking for the character on some surface relative to the story. The actual film is projected on a screen ahead so that Jim can time his actions with those of the characters. Here, Jim's former experience as a musician and drummer (he played with the famous firehouse five) definitely come into play, since his timing must be no less than perfect for multi-track film editing.

Another sign of Jim's musical genius is what appears to be five huge brake drums, mounted on a heavy platform. Unknown to the casual observer, they have been finely tuned by Macdonald, and the church bell chimes he coaxes from these drums would put a sophisticated cartoon to shame.

Can a shimmering spider web make a sound? "When Walt Disney said it should, you made it have a sound," says Jim, pointing to the wind chimes he created from scrap duraluminum.

All work and no play could make Jim a dull boy...but watching him at work, you just know that life is never dull for this master of the art of sound effects. For recreation, he and his wife Bobby and their three cats set sail for Catalina or southern waters on their 42' motor sailer. Or they spend quiet days in their second home near Big Bear Lake.

Emotion is what Walt Disney films are all about. An artist in his own right, Jim Macdonald contributes considerably to that hallmark of quality with the most unusual conglomeration of gadgets ever devised by man. ♡

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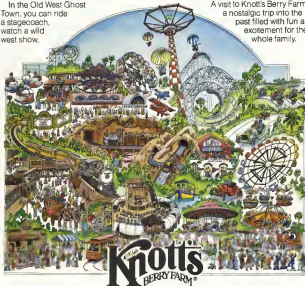
