

The New York Post carried a laudatory article on March 17 in which it mentioned the origins and promotion of "WE SHALL OVERCOLE" and stated that the six verses most frequently sung were arranged by four singers who contribute their royalties to the civil rights movement. ure to fill out the forms on Feb. 19 meant that scores of arrested persons had to be freed by the prosecutor be-cause cases could not be made without the name of the arresting officer and other information.

During an hour of questions and answers with the students, Wilson's assurances that misconduct by individual policemen would not be tolerated met derision and disbelief from a majority of the group. Afterwards though, as Wilson talked with about 50 of the students on the auditorium's stage, there was more agreement on the difficulties he faces in controlling the ac-


tions of all of his men. Some students said they thought policemen might volunteer for civil disturbance



I believe that history will prove our military action in Vietnam to have been comparable in callousness to the foreign intervention in the Spanish Civil War -- which intervention we, as a nation, viewed with horror and alarm.

The war in Vietnam is the largest pattern in a fabric of national and international events demanding our attention. Only by speaking out can we hope to affect the course of events to which we now seem irrevocably committed.

I believe that each of us shares in the responsibility of bringing the full weight of public opinion to the attention of our elected representatives.

If the tide of events cannot be altered by the efforts of an involved public, then the very tenets of our democracy shall have been lost.


