



Dear Sir:

Reference is made to your letter of May 28, 1934, advising that Mr. Walter Winchell was leaving for Los Angeles on May 29th, and would stop at the Ambassador Hotel. In Mr. Dunn's absence, I contacted Mr. Winchell, whom I had previously met at New York, at the Ambassador Hotel on June End upon his arrival there.

I had quite a conversation with Mr. Winchell about things in general, and I am sure you will be pleased to hear that he expressed great satisfaction with, and was very enthusiastic about, the treatment accorded him by the personnel of the New York, Detroit and Chicago Division Offices.

He spoke very highly of you, and particularly seemed to take a great deal of pride in a letter which he received from you recently in connection with his application for appointment as a Lieutenant in the Naval Intelligence, which letter he showed me.

Mr. Winchell expects to remain in Los Angeles until the end of August, and has rented a bungalow, Repose No. 1, at the Ambassador Hotel. For your information, his unlisted, private telephone number at the bungalow is EX-position 1506. He was given the telephone number of the office, as well as my home telephone number, and has agreed to keep in contact with me. Mr. Winchell feels perfectly safe, and did not desire me to arrange for any protection, promising to notify us immediately should he receive any threats.

I am keeping in close contact with Mr. Winchell, and, as a matter of fact, he visited the office today, turning over some information relative to the Mazi movement.

Mr. Walter Winchell, who, as I have already advised you, is stopping at the Ambassador Hotel in this city, informed me Saturday that he had accepted an offer to appear in person at a San Francisco

Theatre for one week, commencing June 22, 1934. Upon completing that week in San Francisco, he will return here and remain at the Ambassador Hotel until the first part of September, when he will return to New York.

Mr. Winchell has been advised by friends of his that one an attorney at San Francisco, has stated he will "beat up Winchell" because the latter at one time mentioned over the air that Inez. Norton, formerly Arnold Rothstein's girl, was engaged to be married to

Mr. Winchell is somewhat apprehensive because of these rumors and has intimated to me that he would desire to have an Agent with him at San Francisco during the time he is there. He mentioned the fact that Mr. J. J. Waters of the Division was with him in Detroit and Chicago at the time he was appearing in person in those cities. I assured Mr. Winchell that the Division would see that appropriate arrangements were made for his protection in San Franciaco, but did not commit myself on the subject of having a Division Agent with him constantly in that city.

Please advise whether you desire to have an Agent with Mr. Winshell constantly at San Francisco, and if so, whether you wish an Agent assigned to this office to proceed to San Francisco for that purpose, returning when Mr. Winchell does, or whether you wish to have an Agent of the San Francisco Division Office pick up Mr. Winchell on his arrival there. Mr. Winchell intends to leave Los Angeles about June 19th or 20th.





VE61 1 1 135 U.S. LINA Status JUSTICE Dear Mr. Hoover: FILE I had quite a long visit with Walter Winchell last night; in fact, I did not leave him until about 4:00 o'clock He told me how pleased he was at the reception this morning. which he received from you and stressed the point that you gave him considerable time, notwithstanding the fact that you were tremendously busy. He praised you highly for the attitude which you assume against gangsters and other so-called "gorillas". and he said that he wanted you to get in touch with him should you visit New York. He was also quite impressed with Mr. Tolson. Winchell was particularly pleased with the action which you took concerning his application for appointment to the Naval Intelligence, and feels quite certain that he will receive his commission within a short period of time, now that you have taken such an active interest in it. - For your general information, I am attaching hereto copy of a memorandum which was sent through by Walter

Winchell relative to the Silvershirt organization in California. As I related to you over the telephone, I had quite a conference with the last evening and endeavored to pacify her over a period of approximately four and one-half

to pacify her over a period of approximately four and one-half hours. She seemed to be obsessed with the idea that, regardless of the identity of the agent, the one who had started the investigation and who was familiar with all angles of the case should be permitted to follow it through to its conducton. She felt that the arrest of Monnier was merely incidental and that he was merely a tool being used by other members in a conspiracy. She was quite nervous and at times became quite excitable. I talked Mr. John Edgar Hoover, Washington, D. C.

to her alone, and inquired as to whether she had any criticism to offer concerning the activities of any of the agents assigned to the case. She stated that she was quite pleased with the services performed by all agents with whom she had come in contact but that she felt that the agent who had instituted the investigation, should be permitted to follow it through. I explained to her the administrative setup of the Division, the necessity for having a mobile unit inasmuch as our organization was comparatively small and that we had a large volume of work to perform, and cited to her many instances where it became necessary to almost instantly assign agents to "special assignments". I told her that all of the details which and any of the other agents, had gathered while engaged on the investigation, had been properly recorded and that any agent reviewing the file could therefore readily become acquainted with all the facts. My efforts to pacify here were unsuccessful, and I finally departed at about 10:00 P. M., at which time she told me that she very much appreciated the efforts of the Agents and the Division, but that she felt that inasmuch as could not be reassigned to complete the investiga-Agent tion, she would not call upon us for any further assistance or convey any additional information which she might obtain. However, I left the telephone numbers of Agents McGrath, Soucy and myself with her so that in the event it became necessary for her to communicate with a representative of this Division, she could readily do so. stated that 11 necessary, she would see President Roosevelt to have Agent reassigned to finish the investigation which he started.

Agent Geraghty informed me today that he had seen Mr. Frank Walker, and that Mr. Walker told him that he had conferred with Messrs. A second and second who had informed him that the local leaders were quite concerned about not receiving any patronage and had openly declared that unless same were forthcoming shortly, they would not support Governor Lehman for re-election. Mr. Geraghty told me that he requested Mr. Walker not to ask for any further postponement in his transfer and that he would leave for El Paso on September 10th. He indicated that Mr. Walker informed him that possibly, at a later date, he will be able to obtain for Mr. Geraghty an appointment in the Department of Justice at Washington.

The other day I received eletter from Walter Winchell which among other things contained the following comment concerning yourself - "I think he's a swell fellow myself and I have had several phone conversations with him and we write to each other a great deal. It was through him that my application for lieutenancy in the naval intelligence was not stalled." I thought you would be interested to know that apparently he is a real friend of yours but I hesitated to send such a personal comment to your office. Incidentally I have noticed that he invariably refers to the organization as the "Department of Justice". I feel that the type of material he is printing about us is very desireable and the Division should profit by it. In view of the fact that Frank Fay is undoubtedly on rather intimate terms with him I think it might be tactfully explained to him that our organization is the Division of Investigation. Knowing him as 1 do I believe he would appreciate being a little more accurate as being right is somewhat of a fetish with him. Reference is made to your letter of November 8, 1934, transmitting an enonymous letter received by Mr. Walter Winchell, together with the envelope in which it was enclosed, bearing the postmark New York, New York, 11 P.M., November 8, 1934.

The letter and envelope have been examined in the Division's Laboratory and three fragmentary latent fingerprints have been found on the letter. These three latent fingerprints have been compared with the fingerprints of Mr. "slter Vinchell, Miss Ruth Cambridge and Miss Rose Bingman which were previously submitted in connection with the sase entitled Letters to Mr. Walter Winchell from "The Phenton Reporter" and one of the latent prints was found to be identical with the left thumb impression of Mr. Winchell.

One of the two remaining intent fingerprints was of sufficient characteristic detail to permit sourch through the single fingerprint file, but no identification was affected. The other intent fingerprint despite its fragmentary nature will be of value for comparison with the fingerprints of any suspects or fingerprints submitted for elimination.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

While talking with Mr. Fay last night, he advised that during his conversation with Walter Winchell. Winchell had advised that he is now going to write a Sunday column for the Mirror, and all of the other papers who carry his column on week days, and who publish Sunday papers, will carry that column also. The column is to be called "New York Heart Beets". Winchell told Mr. Fay that he would like to give the Division a boost in his column on Sunday after next; that he desired to make statements under a heading, "Things I Never Knew Till Now"; that he does not desire numerous statistics, figures, etc. but wants something of human interest, for example, data such as the West Brothers Chart - "They look alike but their fingerprints are different". Winchell also referred to the Fleagle Case, which chart he had seen on the wall of the New York Office. Mr. Fay stated Winchell had mentioned Scotland Yard, and made reference to the number of men required to cover Greater London, etc. and their limitations, and then cited a comparison with that by stating that the Division covers the entire country with a handful of men. Mr. Fay asked that the data to be given to Winchell be forwarded to New York as soon as possible.





In the Grime Laboratory of the Federal Bureau of Investigation at Mashington, there is utilised an X-ray machine which permits an object enclosed in a container to be seen withothe maked eye without opening the container. This filturoscope is used in the Grime Laboratory in conmection with the examination of suspected packages, particularly where it is felt that the package might contain explosives or some type of a bomb which might be exploded when the package is opened. Some time ago, a high Government official received a package, and, suspecting its contents, asked the F.B.I. to examine it. The X-ray machine showed the package to contain a gavel which had been sent to the high efficial by a well-meaning constituent.

Since the passage of the Federal Kidnaping Statute in June, 1932, the F.B.T. has conducted investigation in a total of 53 kidnaping cases. All of these cases have been solved. One hundred and twenty persons have been convicted and 24 are avaiting trial. The sentences imposed total 4 death, 24 life, and 1706 years.

Congress has recently approved a bill granting \$5000 to each of the widows of 5 Special Agents of the F.B.I. who have lost their lives in the last 2 years. Unfortunately, Special Agents and other employees of the F.B.I. do not have retirement or pension benefits, and the compensation available to beneficiaries in case of death, or to employees in case of total disability, is entirely inadequate. The widows of several of the Special Agents who have lost their lives have been given employment in the F.B.I. in order to assist them in maintaining themselves and their families.

There are ever 5,200,000 sets of fingerprint records on file in the F.B.I. at Washington. An average of 3700 additional is being received each day from almost 4000 contributing police depart ments and other law enforcement officials throughout the country, and from 68 foreign countries. The foreign countries forward to the W.B.I. the fingerprints of Americans arrested abroad, and in turn the F.B.I. ferwards to foreign bureaus the fingerprints of mationals of their countries arrested in the United States. Nach day approximately 300 fingerprint cards are received of citizens who desire to record their prints and those of their children in the 7.B.I. files, for protection purposes in the event of kidnaping, emesia or disappearance. A special civil fingerprint card for use in filing individual prints can be secured by writing to the Director of the F.B.I. at Washington, and local police departments are always willing to assist citizens in daking fingerprint impressions. The civil records are kept entirely separate from the erisinal files, and the civil collection includes the fingerprints of such notable as John D. Rockefeller, Jr.; Attorney General Homer S. Cummings; Secretary of Commerce Daniel C. Roper; Colleen Moore, motion picture actress; Courtney Ryley Cooper, the author; Walter Winchell; Joseph B. Poinderter, Governor of Namaii; Countess Estelle Bernadotte of Sweden and her two shildren; and A. J. Drexel Biddle, Jr., Minister to Moreny.

The intensive training of the Special Agents of the F.B.I. at Washington now includes a complete course in physical training and empert instruction in the art of jiu jitsu. Each Special Agent is required to qualify each month in the use of every type of weapon employed by the F.B.I., including the pistol, shotgun, gas gun, sub-machine gun, and high-powered rifles. Police departments usually require their men to take this training course each year.

The modern method utilised by the gangster criminal to record his killings is illustrated in the case of Charles "Pretty Boy" Floyd, who was killed by Special Agents near Clarkson, Ohio, October 22, 1934. Examination of Floyd's watch, chain and sharm disclosed groups of 10 notches out into the patch crystal, the soin charm and on the works of the watch inside the case, the number of motches corresponding with the number of men reported to have been killed by Floyd.

The fingerprints of no two persons have over been found to be the same, even in the case of identical twins. The Hilton sisters, known as the "Siamese twins", who have been physically joined together since birth, are remarkably alike in appearance. An examination of their fingerprints, however, shows that the prints are not only different in characteristic details, but are so dissimilar that the elassification formulas are different. The fingerprint elassification of Deigy Hilton is:

Each month the F.B.I. at Washington locates an average of 450 fugitives from justice through checking fingerprints forwarded to the Bureau by police officials throughout the sountry. The only cost to a police department of being advised as to the whereabouts of a fugitive wanted by the department is the cost of a collect talegram forwarded to that department by Director Hoover at Washington. Of the 3700 fingerprints received by the F.B.I. each day from law enforcement agencies, every other record is identified with a previous criminal history. This information is supplied to the police department which has the eriminal in sustody, and that department is mapt advised thereafter of all arrests of the criminal in any part of the world. Judges make use of the information in the possession of the F.B.I. in sentencing persons whose claims of being first affenders are refuted by the previous eriminal records disclosed by checking their fingerprints at Mashington.

Buring the past 2 years, more than 2000 firearss have been stolen from Government arsenals and ermories by the eriminal element, and ever 200,000 rounds of ammunition were likewise stolen during this period. These gans include high-powered automatic rifles and machine

Hundreds of visitors daily view the exhibits on file in the office of the F.S.I. at Washington. It has been necessary to establish tours at 10:30 s.m. and 2:30 p.m. for these visitors, in order to avoid interference with the daily work. The exhibits which can be seen by the general public include weapons used by notorious criminals such as Dillinger, Floyd, Halson, and the Barrow brothers. Visitors are also shown the Fingerprint Division, and the Technical Crime Laboratory where scientific aids are used in erime detection work. One particularly interesting device shown to the visitors is a mechanical searching machine used in the Fingerprint Division which performs searching work within a period of 2 minutes, which work would consume 45 minutes if done by hand by a technical expert. It is possible to locate a fingerprint record of an individual in the great collection of ever 5,200,000 fingerprints within 2 minutes after the receipt of the fingerprint card.

The vocations and avocations of the Special Agents of the F.B.I. are, of course, frequently utilised in connection with their investigative assignments. It is rather interesting to learn that of the 620 Special Agents, 55 are proficient in one or more of 24 foreign languages, 63 are experienced farmers, 80 experienced ranchers, 47 expert horsenen, 17 were eviators, 7 were carpenters, 8 were camp directors, 3 were chanffeurs, 8 were tractor drivers, 5 were engineers, 16 were experienced mechanics, 17 were assepaper reporters, 73 were teachers, 48 were expert musicians, 5 were radio broadcasters, and 37 were bankers. The list of former occupations further includes painters, bakers, librarians, printers, salesmen, restaurant operators, miners, dock-hands, parachute jumpers, Indian experts, store keepers, seamen, pistol champions and gunnery experts.



A few days ago Special Agent T. H. Tracy of this office advised me that he was writing to you about inquiries that had come to him concerning WalterOWinchell and the fact that Winchell has made radio announcements of action taken in many matters prior to the time that such information had been released publicly in the newspapers. Tracy at that time stated that on the streets he was hearing comment about Winchell having "an in" some place, enabling him to secure this information in advance. At that time I had not heard any such comments, not even from the newspaper men who have been calling on me in the absence of Mr. Whitley.

However, on Monday, September 16, I called on General Hugh S. Johnson of the Works Progress Administration in New York City, in accordance with your instructions, and during my conference with the General and his aides, who included the General's son, Lieutenant Johnson, the latter, at the time that I again urged General Johnson to treat my inquiry as confidential, stated that Walter Winchell had announced in his radio broadcast Sunday night, September 15, that General Johnson had requested the assistance of "Secret Service men from the Justice Department", as was described by the Lieutenant. The Lieutenant went on to say that it is a well known fact that Walter Winchell has "an in" in Washington. The Lieutenant, however, did not restrict this remark to any particular Government department or bureau, but he also added that it was his understanding that Winchell had about 400 people who were gathering information for him.

I did not hear Walter Winchell's broadcast on Sunday night, nor have I heard anyone else remark about having heard anything like Lieutenant One of the stenographers in the New York Johnson attributes to Winchell. 

Last year we speat \$4,600,000 and seved in recovered property and successful suits a total of over \$38,000,000; im other words, for each dollar spont eight dollars was returned to the taxpayers or to the Government. We have solved every one of the 62 kidnaping cases which we have investigated since the passage of the Federal Kidnaping Statute. In bank robbery cases, we have out the number of bank robberies by one-half since we received jurisdiction in this type of case. We have successfully solved hundreds of extortion cases under the new statute and convictions are being secured in 95% of all cases investigated by our Agents which go to trial.







Yesterday I had the occasion of speaking before the newspaper editors of America who are in convention here in Washington, at which time I pointed out some of the things that the newspapers help us in and some of the things in which they hurt us. I pointed out, without, of course, mentioned the names specifically, how a well-known columnist had refrained from printing a truly national and international scoop on the Lindbergh case for twenty-four hours in order not to harm the investigation which was being conducted in that case.
