

After a first burst of activity, in which they were publicised as America's saviours from gangdom, little has been heard of the progress of the much-boosted, much-filmed "G-men" (Federal police agents) organised and headed by Washington's Edgar Hoover

Washington's Edgar Hoover.

After they had been equipped with weapons equal to those used by the gangsters, big things were expected of them. They carned much praise as the alleged slayers of John Dillinger, former Public Enemy Number One, but it was not long before whispers began to be heard that credit was due, not to Hoover's "G-men" but rather to the efforts of an ordinary Chicago "cop."

Since that date, the whole of the United States has been wondering why, apart from a few comparatively unimportant and easy captures, the Federal "dicks" have been unable, for instance, to trail present Public Enemy Number One, Alvin Karpis, crack sub-machine gun operator, bank robber and reputed slayer of a number of people.

For two or three years now, gangster Karpis has been at large, but apart from occasional newspaper reports, which always turn out to be false, to the effect that the slayer has been located in a farmhouse, is surrounded and about to give in, he appears to have gone his quiet way unchecked.

Last week, in Washington, G-man Hoover had a new excuse to offer for

the failure of his tough young men. In the days before they were equipped with sub-machine guns, automatics, tear gas bombs and fast automobiles, he was able to point out that they hadn't a chance against the enemies of society. Now that have these and other armaments and still do not meet with much success,

he has had to think up another. It came last week thus:

"It has been learned that 'certain equipment' in firearms affording a greater velocity and greater penetration power than the current type is being manufactured for the use of gangsters.

"It is such a menace that millions of dollars' worth of equipment purchased by the law-enforcement agencies in this country, including our department—such as bullet-proof vests and shields used in approaching houses during raids—will be absolutely useless against the high-powered equipment and ammunition about to be put on the market.

"We have found that in the eastern quarter a number of underworld characters have special armoured cars. We recently seized one in Boston. It is completely armoured, and was made so that the rear window could be opened and machine guns pushed through to fire at pursuing cars. These cars are not only steel in construction, but they also have armoured glass that will resist even machine gun bullets."

Continued Public Protector Number One: "The Federal agents ('G-men') are experimenting with new equipment, including a powerful type of armoured car to be used in the war against the most desperate and heavily-armed criminal gangs."

Not so easily impressed by G-man Hoover's fireworks, a number of people recalled that as long ago as 1930, Alphonse Capone, then Underworld King, now languishing in the island prison of Alcatraz (Cavalcane, February 22, see Crime) for income-tax evasion, had just such a car as Hoover described, and that Federal agents had, during the six succeeding years, had plenty of time to secure similar weapons.

Sharp critics went even further to say that Hoover's present move was merely another red herring to throw off the scent a number of keen-nosed officials who see in the Department of Justice only a new and brilliant way of wasting

public money.

Meanwhile, in the Underworld, Anna Sagen, "the woman in red," former "moll" of the late John Dillinger, created a sensation (1) by returning to America from Czechoslovakia, her native country, whither she fled after betraying the Public Enemy to Chicago policemen (CAVALCADE, February 8, see Foreign Affairs, Czechoslovakia), (2) by revealing for the first time how she "informed" on the King of Crime. She did this in order to avoid deportation back to Czechoslovakia.

"I first met Dillinger 10 days before his death," she told New York police.

"He was introduced to me as Jimmy Layrange." I discovered who he was

Lawrence. I discovered who he was one day when he was reading a newspaper and showed Polly Hamilton, a friend of mine, a picture, saying, 'They've put me somewhere else to-day.' I looked at the picture. It was

"I got scared and went to Police Ser-"I got scared and went to geant Martin Zarcovitch. I also mentioned my deportation trouble. 'We will take care of that,' he said. I told him Dillinger would probably take me to a movie on Sunday night. I would wear a hat if we were going any distance, and would be bare-headed if we were going to the Biograph Cinema, where Dillin-ger's favourite film star, Myrna Loy, was appearing.
"We went to the Biograph Cinema,

and when we came out I was shoved aside and shooting started. I had no idea they were going to shoot Dillinger like that. I thought they were going to arrest him."

Anna Sagen has now appealed to Sec-retary of Labour Florence Perkins to reconsider the decision to deport her once more.





MEMORANDUM FOR MR. TOLSON

Walter Winchell, in his broadcast on the Jergens' program last night, January 3, 1937, made, approximately, the following remarks concerning the Bureau:

Tacoma, Washington-The police and G-Men announce nothing new in connection with the Mattson kidnaping case. It is feared that the child may have been killed despite the assurance in the first ransom note that the child was safe as it will be recalled that the same assurance was made in one of the Lindbergh ransom notes. The child was kidnaped one week ago today.

Bulletin-The G-Men have personally taken over the Mattson kidnaping case in view of the fact that one week has elapsed since the kidnaping and the presumption is now that it is a Federal violation.

Lindbergh--It is surprising that so many newspaper editors were fooled on the report concerning the turning-up of goldbacks, claimed to be part of the ransom money in the Lindbergh case. This report should have been found to be erroneous on the face, in view of the fact that there were no goldbacks used in any of the ransom money but there were gold seals. One of the witnesses for Hauptmann at his trial was trapped on the same question when he stated that he had seen a number of goldbacks in the possession of a suspect.

Questions and Answers-The News Week Magazine is reported to have based the report that J. Edgar Hoover, Director of the G-Men, was resigning from what I said in one of my previous broadcasts. I did not say that J. Edgar Hoover was resigning but that it was feared that he ker have fired and the Chief Postal Inspector assigned to take his place. Mr. Hoover has held his position for nineteen years and I think you will agree with me that the American people will have much to worry about if such an act takes place. RECORDED

As I told you on the phone, I am indeed grateful to you for the comments which you made in your solumn; "Portrait of a Father Talking to Himself." The column appeared in full in today's issue of the Washington Herald and at the same time there appeared on the editorial page the inclosed editorial entitled "G-Men and Critica." I have been told that this editorial will no doubt be carried throughout the country in the Wieserst papers. You cortainly made a succinct and pertinent ebservation upon the factors existing at present in the Mattson case and those which may develop. Of course, all of the persons in the FBI are giving everything in them to bring about an early solution of this case but we recognise the fact that it may be one which will require a long, long pull, but the perpetrator of the crime will inevitably be apprehended.

The factor, however, which makes me burn more than anything else is the sincere belief that this crime - and I have no doubt several others of similar character which may follow - can be traced directly to certain activities and forces which have been at work for some time in trying to belittle, ridicule and sneer at the "G-Men." There are sertain writers of sline solumns suffering from mental halitosis and sertain editorial writers who have an aggrevated case of mental diarrhea that regurgitate their own filth and must tear down something which was gradually growing to be a restraining influence on the criminal of the underworld. The criminal morons can only be held in check by fear and a respect for a certain and vigorous apprehension and punishment. I know that instances have arisen when certain criminals whom we have apprehended have had in their possession alippings of the articles and columns written by some of the above-alluded-to coyotes. Now, of course, there is a marked chance of the same, but they have not denied or change their views.
