## GWC All-American Is Pro Choice

John Drew, Gardner-Webb's All-American basketball player, became the second youngest player in the National Basketball Association when he recently signed a five-year contract with the Atlanta Hawks.

Drew, 23, had completed his sophomore year and the first term of summer school at GWC when the signing was announced. He had applied for a hardship draft to the NBA, and was picked by the Hawks in the second round. Drew reportedly signed a multi-year no-cut contract, although the Hawks declined to release actual terms.

Drew averaged 24.4 points his freshman year and 22.9 his sophomore year with the Bulldogs, and made the decision to become a professional after careful consideration of his future prospects.

GWC Coach Eddie Holbrook, Drew's close mentor, said he greatly regrets that Drew will be leaving the Boiling Springs Northwestern. Holbrook said, "I think he made the right decision," considering the possibilities of an injury, changes in the pro basketball scene, etc.

"It's a dream come true," Drew said at an Atlanta news conference where he, Holbrook and team officials were on hand for the announcement. "I thank God and Coach Holbrook... I'm very happy to be here and I'm glad to be with the Hawks. I regret leaving Gardner-Webb, but it was a step I figure I had to take considering the future."

The six-foot, six-inch forward from Hybart, Ala., was described by the Hawks as "a great all-around player who jumps and shoots exceptionally well."
