


FIG. 2-HAG FOR SEEDS.

Many of them, however, will surent before the expiration of thot period and these should be removed and a record kept of them. Some seeds of course start more easily than other kinds. The following periods may be stated as the limits required for the permination of good seed of the kinds named: For cereals, pears, beans, vetches, sunflower, buckwhent, clover, corn and cow peas, ten days; for serra-delin, beet balls, ryo grasses, timothy, tobacco, Lespedeza and other field and vegetable seeds not named, 14 days; grass seeds are slow to start, and for ali

grass seeds are slow to start, and for all grasses except tye grass and timothy, from 20 to 24 days may be required. Kentucky bluegrass and Bermuda grass are very slow to start. The periods recommended ore thuso adopted by the United States deportment of ogricul-ture in its seed tests. If the seeds are good and fresh, most of them will spront in less than holf the time al-iowed for the test. It is essential, of course, to see that there is never a nck of moisture for the seeds, and that he cloths ore never ollowed to become iry. It is also advisable to snak the seds during the first ten hours by put-eg enough water in the pan to touch the bottoms of the lugs; this will has-

A few of the inner husks were left ou the ear to mark it for saving, when put-ting the corn in the crib. When all the seed was collected, the ears were braided luto large bundles and hung up 15 dry, out of the reach of indee or rats. The account rule of selection was more useful than the first. He chose only the ears set close to the stalks, having short footstalk and a small or medium sized shank at the end of the cob. 



CHEAP STRAW BARN. Affords Winter Panicotton from

The illustration Fig. 1 gives the cheapest form of straw barn as altached to main barn, and having shed roof. This is the form generally adopted and provides both "covered barn-yard" and "straw loft." The roof of straw barn will necessarily have to be with very little pitch and is usually made of metal. Were we to build over again we would make the covered bara-yard and straw barn in the form of a wing extending off from main bara, and have public roof making chilge san



height as main bara. This would add very much to capacity of the straw loft and give better opportunity for venti-latian, as well as to provide for more pltch to the roof. Fig. 2 represents interior of main


