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
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

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PREFACE

The present attempt at a Local Bibliography is the outcome of twelve years' collection and study of the subjects which lie within its scope. The Rev. David Imrie, of Free (now United Free) St. Andrew's Church, Dunfermline, has given much attention to a similar project for a period of twice this duration,—from the time, indeed, that he came to Dunfermline in 1876,—with the natural result that he has brought together a very fine local library (now placed in the Dunfermline Archæological Museum), including many items which it would be practically impossible to duplicate. The compiler of this list wishes prominently to acknowledge his indebtedness to Mr. Imrie for the free communication of much acquired knowledge, and also for the assistance given by sympathy in pursuit, often shown in a very practical form.

This list is in reality merely a catalogue, and as such (like a dictionary) will furnish proverbially dry reading. Foot-notes have been freely added, containing the outlines of such information as could be gathered from authentic sources, in regard to the authors named,—particularly so

in the case of those who are no longer with us.

The contents being, as has been said, merely a catalogue, require all the more attention by way of preface. And a more promising field, in capable hands, could scarcely be desired in that respect. The district included is, roughly speaking, the West of Fife,—from Burntisland to Kincardine, east and west, and from Cleish to the Forth, north and south. Culross and Kincardine are really in Perthshire (although for more serious purposes than the present included in Fifeshire), while Cleish, I now in the county of Kinross, was formerly in Fife.

Within the above district it is nothing less than surprising to find that, whether from birth or domicile, so many eminent writers can be claimed;—even after making allowance for exceptional cases such as King James VI. of

It must be admitted that the somewhat arbitrary inclusion of the parish of Cleish is due to the former existence there of the interesting Blairadam private press.

Scotland (for more than occasional residence), Rev. Robert Moffat, D.D., the African missionary (for a year at Donibristle), Rev. George Skene Keith, D.D. (who lived only eight months after being inducted parish-minister of Tulliallan), and perhaps especially, the Rev. Charles Rogers, D.D., so copious a writer, who, for less than a year, held the charge of the North Parish, Dunfermline, and was afterwards, for a similar period, assistant at Ballingry. The inclusion of these, as of others, may seem to invite criticism. It can only be replied that the difficulty was recognised, and an endeavour made to meet it, by transferring these names (with a very few exceptions, such as James VI.) into an Appendix C, which comprises authors who were not natives of the locality, and whose connection therewith was not more than comparatively transitory.

No items are included with regard to King Robert the Bruce other than those relating to his Tomb and reinterment, although his son (afterwards David II.) was born at Dunfermline in 1324, and the town (or rather the Palace, if it then existed) was at that period a Royal residence, in more than empty title. King Charles I. (like his father, King James) has also presented a real difficulty as to treatment, since the subject could, at will, be almost indefinitely expanded. Still, he takes precedence as Dunfermline's most conspicuous native, and whatever were his faults (a question not very germane to our standpoint of Literature), it will now be generally acknowledged, speaking candidly and in measured terms, that he was treated by his opponents with—to say the very least—unwarrantable barbarity. Cromwell and his apologist, Milton, with all extenuations, do not clear themselves from this charge.

The West of Fife has certainly contributed its share towards the formation of the national character, and possesses many links connecting it with the Ecclesiastical and Civil

history of our country.

The very earliest local author, whose name definitely appears in these pages, ¹ is Walter Bower, Abbot of Inchcolm, who wrote a continuation of Fordun's Scotichronicon, and died about the middle of the fifteenth century. Not fifty years later, we have the first thoroughly-vouched author who belonged to Dunfermline itself,—Robert Henryson,

notary, and apparently also schoolmaster in the "auld grey toun,"—to whom we are indebted for the Testament of faire Creseide, a sequel or supplement to Chaucer's famed Troilus and Cressida, as also for Robene and Makyne (the earliest specimen of Scottish pastoral poetry), in addition to other separate works. Henryson died about the year 1506, and the sixteenth century naturally brings a larger store of Prominent among these are the brothers Adam and Henry Blackwood, both of whom all authorities agree in stating to have been born at Dunfermline, although, as is mentioned in the notes under their names, the locality is thus perhaps too precisely defined. There seems, however, to be not the slightest doubt that they were born in the immediate neighbourhood, and probably this is all that can be now said. In regard to these and many other early writers, it has often been very misleading to find every available authority agree in a certain definite statement, while, after all, the testimony is by no means independent, but in each instance gathered from the self-same source, if not even by percolation from that source after having been filtered upon the way through successive books of reference. Of the works of Henry Blackwood it has not been found possible to locate any existing specimen, although, fortunately, the writings of his younger brother, Adam (Queen Mary's chivalrous defender), if decidedly scarce, are not altogether beyond reach. It is interesting to note the connection of these Blackwoods with the ancestry of the Marquis of Dufferin and Ava, who has most kindly rendered assistance upon this special point.

About the same period, we have the Rev. Robert Pont, born at Shiresmill, the author of several separate items, and also a contributor (upon chronology) to the preface of the famous Bassandyne Bible, the first Bible printed in Scotland. As is incidentally mentioned, yet another local man, George Young, servant to the Abbot of Dunfermline, was engaged in the revision of the proofs of this important

work.

Towards the close of this (the sixteenth) century come the names of two interesting personages,—the Royal author, King James VI., who, at the age of eighteen, published The Essays of a Prentise, in the Divine Art of Poesie (1584), afterwards followed by numerous other volumes,

poetical, theological, and political; and the Rev. David Fergusson, parish-minister of Dunfermline (as it is stated, a personal friend of his King), who only published two sermons in his lifetime, but also left a valuable collection of Scottish Proverbs, not printed until more than forty years after his death. The Rev. David Fergusson is again represented in this catalogue in the persons of his son-in-law, the Rev. John Row of Carnock, and of his grandson (also the Rev. John Row), minister of Aberdeen, and a noted Hebrew scholar. Both of these Rows shared in the production of a Historie of the Kirk of Scotland, which indeed is said to have been founded, as to its earlier years, upon papers left by Mr. Fergusson.

It is unnecessary in this place to recount the names of our other sixteenth-century authors, and still more so, to follow the same course with those of times which more

nearly approach the present.

Some notice, however, must be taken of the prominent part which the West of Fife has played in the Ecclesiastical History of Scotland, and especially during the earlier years of what has been, until quite recently, the United Presbyterian Church. This, under the name of the Associate Presbytery, was founded as a Secession from the Establishment (upon the vexed question of patronage) by the Rev. Ebenezer Erskine (of Stirling) and three other parishministers, at Gairney Bridge, Kinross-shire, 5 Dec. 1733. The Rev. Ralph Erskine (brother of the real originator of this Secession, and senior parish-minister of Dunfermline from 1716) did not formally join the new movement, in which he afterwards became a leading light, until Feb. 1737. Ten years later, in 1747, occurred "The Breach," when the new Church divided itself into the "Original Associate" (or Burgher) and the "General Associate" Anti-Burgher) Synods upon the lawfulness of taking the Burgess Oath, which had been imposed by Parliament in The separate congregation of Anti-Burghers in this 1745. district had at first its place of meeting in Cairneyhill, although by the year 1789 the Dunfermline members built for themselves a new church in Chalmers Street.

In 1752 (or, more strictly speaking, in 1761, when the Presbytery was formed) another Secession from the Establishment was founded by the Rev. Thomas Gillespie of Carnock (with two other parish-ministers) under the name of the Relief Church. The primary cause of this separation was the forced settlement of the Rev. Andrew Richardson

in the parish of Inverkeithing, although why the new Seceders did not join with the Burghers (or Original Associate Church) does not now, to an outsider, seem very clear; except that the Relief Church held most tenaciously to the principle of Establishment, and indeed "did not consider themselves as Seceders," to quote their own ex-

pression.

In 1799-1806 took place a further division within the Original Secession; in 1799 among the Burghers, and in 1806 among the Anti-Burghers; viz., the "New Lights" and the "Old Lights." This, in the case of the Original Associate (Burgher) Church, was caused by an "Explanatory Statement" issued by its Synod in 1797, giving a new explanation or interpretation of certain tenets. The subject is a most intricate one, but it would appear that the "Old Lights" (locally the "Auld Lichts") were the more conservative section who maintained their principles,—to the very letter,—as formulated by the Original Secession of 1733. This "Old Light" Kirk was in a decided minority, and never (as a body) conformed to the United Secession or to the later United Presbyterian Church; its much larger portion, indeed, re-uniting with the Establishment in 1839. A remnant exists independently to this day (presumably a combination of "Old Light" Burghers and Anti-Burghers) as a small sect under the name of the "United Original Seceders" or "Original Burgher Secession," with four presbyteries and some twenty congregations, two of the latter being in Ireland.

To return—after this digression upon the "Auld Lichts" and "New Lichts," an abstruse subject which it was perhaps rash to attempt,—the division between the Burghers and Anti-Burghers over the Burgess Oath was healed (so far as the "New Lights" were concerned) in 1820 by a combination under the name of the United Secession Church;

There was yet another controversy between "Lifters" and "Non-Lifters" in the Anti-Burgher Church, upon a point of Ritual observance, which resulted, in 1785, in the separation of three congregations of "Lifters,"—at Kilmaurs, Falkirk, and Leith.

The "Original Burghers" or "Auld Lichts" built in 1800 a small chapel in Canmore Street, Dunfermline, upon the site now occupied by the (United) Free Abbey Church, and had two ministers in succession,—Rev. John Campbell (ordained Sept. 1806, d. Jan. 1810, in his twenty-eighth year), and Rev. William Dalziel (Oct. 1815-1843);—in 1839 united (under Mr. Dalziel) as a quoad sacra charge into the Established Church. (As to Rev. John Campbell, see a pamphlet under Patton, David).

while with 1847 came a further union, when the Secession and Relief Churches coalesced into one United Presbyterian Church, which consistently maintained its original protest against lay patronage. In addition to this, Voluntaryism had, from the time of the "General Associate" or Anti-Burgher Synod, gradually acquired a hold upon the U.P. Church, which, in Oct. 1900, amalgamated with the Free Church into the United Free Church of Scotland. At the date of this most recent Union, Dunfermline had four strong churches of the U.P. and three of the Free Church.

With a record of Secessions such as this, none will be surprised that the literature of Dunfermline and of its immediate neighbourhood,—especially for the hundred years commencing about 1733,—is largely, or even mainly, composed of sermons and religious treatises, together with an abundant leaven of controversy upon ecclesiastical differences. An exceedingly large proportion of the names of authors herein noted are those of ministers of religion,

representing creeds of almost all shades.

Our list sweeps its net far, and includes, in addition to divines by the score, "all sorts and conditions of men"; —kings, nobles, warriors by land and sea, celebrities in politics, law, medicine, and science, and men of almost every occupation down to the humble hawker (once a Culross collier) who wrote, and sold from door to door, his own "Life, Adventures, and Experience," in addition to

making verses "on any subject, if employed."

A catalogue of this nature can offer no pretence to be exhaustive, and notwithstanding every care which is exercised, must necessarily contain errors of omission,—and even errors of commission. The former, indeed, must be numerous, so obscure is the veil which, without a doubt, hides many who would gladly be welcomed as ranking within the present scheme. Such has been proved to demonstration by the casual way in which the names of various local authors have been disclosed, thus leaving the assurance that patience, combined with opportunity, could yet add many to the list.

In the attempt to cover a period of five hundred years, with references to almost an equal number of individual authors, it may well be understood that some of these last must come into a category to be classed (from the standpoint of local connection) as distinctly "doubtful." In all such cases this has been duly recognised in the foot-notes. A few other instances occur where the link, although certainly

existent, may not be a very close one. These have generally been dismissed, but it was thought advisable to include brief notices of some important authors who come into this class, among whom may here be mentioned Bishop Hacket of Lichfield and Coventry (apparently a near connection of the Pitfirrane family); the Moultries of Rescobie; and the Welwoods of Touch, Garvock, and Pitliver. No attempt, however, has been made to include the works of such writers in the catalogue, but merely a record of their names and connection with its more immediate scope.

Dunfermline is not lacking in local Histories, of which we have Patton's (rather a jeu d'esprit than a serious work), Fernie's, Mercer's, Chalmers', and Henderson's. Of these, by far the most valuable is Chalmers', which, the more it is scrutinized, the more it shows the marks of painstaking and accurate research. It is to be regretted, however, that this author, when issuing his second volume in 1859, did not incorporate the first volume (of 1844) into a revised edition by combining both. The second volume resolves itself into a running commentary upon the first, with the result of making each less useful. At the same time it is hardly possible to give too much credit to Dr. Peter Chalmers for what he achieved.

A brief notice of Dunfermline printers is annexed, from which it would appear that specimens of local typography may be expected to exist from so early a date as 1762. About that period there were certainly several booksellers in the town, as is evidenced by the imprints upon some of Ralph Erskine's sermons; but at the present day no specimen of Dunfermline printing seems to be known anterior to the year 1800.

The compiler must express his sincere thanks to the numerous correspondents who have given him ready and cordial assistance. Information has had to be sought (and obtained) from many places, including our South African and Australian Colonies. Acknowledgment has already been rendered to the Rev. David Imrie, and (not to attempt to enumerate others) very special thanks are also due to Mr. John B. Mackie, now of Middlesbrough, who has given invaluable aid and encouragement. The wood-cut by David Patton, facing p. 228, is included through the kindness of Mr. James Adams.

² GAVIN BEUGO "had a bookshop and small printing press "in the Collier Row, afterwards in the High Street " (east of the Cross) as early as 1762," (Henderson's Annals, p. 477).

"MR. CRERAR, Bookseller and Stationer, High Street, "bought a large Dutch Printing Press, and com-"menced printing," 1783, (Ibid., p. 512, also Chalmers' History, vol. i., p. 548).

> [Of neither of the above is any work known to survive].

¹ This list is confined to Dunfermline and Charlestown. formerly existed private presses at Blairadam and Burntisland, (see under Adam, Rt. Hon. William; Burntisland; and Forbes, Rev. George Hay; all in the main catalogue following). At Kincardine there has been at least one printer by trade, and another who seems to have been an amateur. Lochgelly has now two newspaper and jobbing presses, and Burntisland two of the latter and minor class.

² M'Kerrow (in his History of the Secession Church, 1845 edition, p. 144) mentions a Gavin Beugo, probationer in the Established Church, as joining the Secession, July 1739. This was evidently the Gavin Beugo (named in Rogers' The Book of Robert Burns, vol. i., p. 35, as "a licentiate of the church, resident in Edinburgh") descended from a Linlithgow family, and father of John Beugo, who is well known as the engraver of Nasmyth's portrait of Burns.

There was also a James Beugo, bookseller in Dunfermline from at least 1729-1752, (see later, under Dunfermline,—Printed For; and Erskine, Rev. Ralph), no doubt identical with the Ruling Elder of the same name who represented Dunfermline in the Associate Synod of

same name who represented Dunfermline in the Associate Synod of Sept. 1746, (Acts and Proceedings of the Associate Synod, 1747, under

The Rev. John Beugo, from Dunfermline, was ordained minister of the Secession Church at Dunning, Aug. 1780, and d. Oct. 1805, in his sixty-second year, (Mackelvie's Annals and Statistics of the United Presbylerian Church, p. 616). An Act of Parliament, 1811, mentions a house on the north side of the High Street, Dunfermline, "belonging to the United Para Ministry of the Lorente "Office of the Lorente of the Lo to the Heirs of the late John Bewgo, Minister of the Gospel," (Hen-

derson's Annals, p. 573).

In 1835, James Beugo and Alexander Beugo were manufacturers in Dunfermline, (The Dunfermline Register, 1836), and there was a James Beugo of 69 High Street in 1858, (Dunfermline Monthly Adver-

- ANDREW ANGUS, merchant, commenced printing in 1802 "with a small printing-press made under his directions by a townsman," (Henderson's Annals, p. 549: see postea, p. 85, Abridged History of the Society of Gardeners, 1816).
- ^a John Miller, 1804-1834; afterwards John Miller and Son, 1835-ca. 1863. Mr. Miller commenced printing in the house at the south-west corner of Abbey Park Place in 1804, (Henderson's Viagraphia, p. 3), but afterwards removed to Bridge Street, where the bookshop and Circulating Library existed until about the year 1863. John Miller d. March 1852, aged seventy-four. From about 1812-1850 his was a very active press.
- DAVID PATTON, from 1810-1826, (Henderson's Annals, pp. 569, 653), had a press at which he printed "many little books," including at least five of his own authorship, (see under his name, 1811-ca. 1822).
- JAMES LOTHIAN, teacher, Charlestown (b. at Dunfermline), "invented and constructed a small printing press,

'Chalmers' History, vol. i., p. 548, notes instead, "Mr. George "Angus, of the Post-office, who commenced printing in 1802, but dis"continued it about 1833." George may have preceded Andrew, but nothing bearing his imprint is known to the present compiler; "A. Angus" even being represented by a single item.

It seems evident that John Miller was nearly related to another contemporary printer of the same surname,—George Miller of Dunbar and Haddington, (imprint G. Miller, 1811; George Miller & Son, 1813; this latter upon the title-page of "The Cheap Magazine," a monthly very similar in character to the "Cheap Tracts," 1826-1829, issued by John Miller of Dunfermline: and indeed George Miller printed a series of twenty "Cheap Tracts," Dunbar, 1802-1803). One of John Miller's publications,—Johnstone's "An English Collection, &c.," 1812,—bears the imprint "Sold by . . . G. Miller & Son, Haddington"; and two others,—"Persecution of Protestants," 1816, and R. K. Douglas' "A Concise History of the Bible," 1817,—were "sold by G. Miller, Dunbar."

George Miller was an author, having written his "Latter Struggles in the Journey of Life, &c." (Edin. 1833), besides two volumes entitled "Popular Philosophy," &c., Dunbar, 1826. He was born, Jan. 1771; opened a Circulating Library at Dunbar, Nov. 1789 (the firm-name being at that period J. & G. Miller); and individually there started in 1795 the first East Lothian press, which he afterwards removed to Haddington, ca. 1805-1810. He appears to have continuously resided at Dunbar, which was still frequently used as his imprint.

- "which had a peculiarly powerful motion. The press was used privately for printing elementary school-books... for the general use of the school and the village," (Henderson's Annals, p. 580). In 1813 he left for Alloa, of which town he was the first printer, and where he became, in 1841, editor and proprietor of the Alloa Advertiser. D. July 1862, aged eighty-one. - WILLIAM MELDRUM, teacher, Nethertown, was also a printer from 1813-1844, (Henderson's Annals, p. 582; and Chalmers' History, vol. i., p. 549). See postea, pp. 79, 85 (1815-1823); also p. 166 (1830-1836); and sundry other items which are noted as of doubtful origin, 1818-ca. 1832.
- WILLIAM LIDDELL was a local printer from 1833-1835, in which year he left the parish, (Chalmers' *History*, vol. i., p. 549). See postea, pp. 76, 85, 109, 217 (1833-1834).
- ¹ J. G. HENDERSON. See *postea*, p. 81 ("To the Manufacturers of Dunfermline," ca. 1839).
- ² WILLIAM CLARK, 1840-1868; WILLIAM CLARK & Son, since 1869; have continuously done a large printing trade during the past sixty years.
- THE "PRESS" OFFICE was founded in April 1859, and has done much work. Since the year 1866 its imprint has been variously "Press" Office, "Saturday Press" Office, and A. Romanes, the last-named being the proprietor during that period, until his death in Sept. 1900.
- Andrew Ker, bookseller, Moodie Street, published an Almanac annually for fifteen or twenty years, commencing in 1863. He also issued, in 1868, two or three numbers of a small newspaper—"The Rock." Mr. Ker has latterly been manager of Mr. Romanes' book-shop in High Street.

¹ Probably identical with the "J. Henderson" noted upon the same page as the printer of "Tables of Prices, &c.," 1837.

William Clark, the founder of this business, had his shop at 46 High Street in 1838. He d. June 1871, in his seventy-fifth year; his eldest son (and namesake) d. Dec. 1900, in his eightieth year.

- JOSEPH HENDERSON was a printer at the Cross, High Street, from about 1867-1875. See postea, p. 86; and p. 180.
- DAVID THOMSON, 27 Chalmers Street, printed for a short period ca. 1880. See postea, p. 112,—the re-issued "Dunfermline Monthly Advertiser"; and p. 200, under MACDONALD, James.
- "DUNFERMLINE CITIZEN" OFFICE, Chalmers Street (L. MACBEAN), from about the year 1885. The newspaper is printed at Kirkcaldy, but some minor work is executed at Dunfermline.
- DAVID WATT, Queen Anne Street, has had several presses at work, commencing about 1895; chiefly upon commercial work. See *postea*, pp. 56, 72.

BOOKSELLERS.

The Laing Collection of MSS. in the University Library, Edinburgh, includes (Item 752) "Account books of Booksellers in Dunfermline, 1770."

During the half-century previous to this date the names of several Dunfermline booksellers are to be noted:—

Mrs. Meldrum, 1724-1728. Robert Beveridge, 1729. James Beugo, 1729-1752. John Horn, 1764.

(See under DUNFERMLINE,—PRINTED FOR; and ERSKINE, Rev. Ralph).

In 1835, John Davidson and James Bonnar were book-sellers in Dunfermline, (The Dunfermline Register, 1836). J. Davidson, 12 High Street, advertised the sale of his stock in Jan. 1838; he was an auctioneer in 1839, and d. Dec. 1859. James Bonnar was of 67 High Street in 1845, and left Dunfermline six years later. W. Main was a bookseller at 17 High Street in 1842, (Monthly Advertiser); and William Ross, 121 High Street, was selling off in 1862, (Ibid.) John Henderson, bookseller, 51 High Street, published the Dunfermline Chronicle, of which the first number appeared 22 April 1853. This newspaper was printed in Edinburgh, and existed for about three years. Mr. Henderson had no press, but a number of books and pamphlets were printed for him, although no details are obtainable. See also note under his son's name, Henderson, William.

EXPLANATORY NOTE.

WHERE an author's name is enclosed within curved brackets, the work is anonymous; and when square brackets are used, the item is not by the person mentioned, but is either concerning him or bears special reference to his writings,—e.g., by way of reply.

Italics in the titles of main entries denote cross-references. In such cases the same item may be noted under two (or more) headings, but invariably it is fully catalogued in one place only.

Dashes are used to repeat an author's name, whether in the outer column or in the body of the entry itself.

With regard to the *orthography*, it seems hardly necessary to refer to the fact that some of the title-pages of works included in this catalogue are embellished by spelling of an arbitrary, or even of an eccentric, character. It has been the compiler's endeavour always to follow the exact titles, *verbatim et literatim*.

Great difficulties have naturally arisen over the system to be adopted for indexing. Briefly stated, authorship (when strictly local) has been first considered; secondly, subject; and lastly, failing these qualifications, the fact of emission from a local press.

Of many of the works catalogued the compiler does not possess a copy; but of these there are very few indeed which do not occur either in the Museum of the Dunfermline Archæological Society, in the Advocates' or Signet Libraries, or in that of the British Museum.

Where sise is not stated (and is known) the volume is in octavo or under.



The family of Blacater or Blackadder, of Tulliallan, was an offshoot from the famous one of that name in Berwickshire, and it would appear that the estate was acquired through the marriage of a Blackappear that the estate was acquired through the harriage of a black-adder with Elizabeth Edmonstoune, the heiress of Tulliallan, who became mother of Sir Patrick Blackadder, and of Robert Blackadder, first archbishop of Glasgow (Culross and Tulliallan, vol. ii., p. 320). It was Archbishop Blackadder who erected in 1503 St. Mungo's Chapel at Culross, of which scanty ruins still remain (ibid., vol. i., p. 91), while it is probable that a still locate chapel marked the same site, the

traditionary birthplace of St. Mungo or Kentigern.

The Marquis of Dufferin and Ava traces his descent to John Blackwood—of the Fifeshire family of that name, and perhaps a cousin of Adam Blackwood—who was born during the reign of Queen Elizabeth, and emigrated to Ireland. The heartiest acknowledgments are due by the compiler to his lordship for the most ready and kindly assistance rendered both upon the subject of pedigree and the collation of the printed works of Adam Blackwood, as also for permission to quote this interesting extract from one of his letters:—

"I am sorry to say I am not entitled to claim a direct descent from so distinguished a bearer of our name, nor have I been able to verify by any authentic record in what relation my ancestor, who emigrated to this country about the same time that Adam Blackwood went to Poitiers, stood towards him. The tradition in the family is that he was a cousin, but this is mere conjecture. That they were of the same house, however, is proved by the fact that my ancestor, who came over here during James the First's reign, bore the same arms as Adam, but with two mullets and a crescent, instead of one mullet and a crescent.

"The last of the French Blackwoods was a certain Mlle. Scholastique de Blackwood, who died in France, an old maid, in 1837; but there are a good many descendants of Adam in the female line still extant in France, and with these I have been in very friendly communication."

"I may at once mention that I have a duodecimo copy of the "Sanctarum Precationum Procemia; and, what is even more interest"ing, I have the autograph manuscript of these prayers. These


"prayers and poems are written on the fly leaves at the beginning and at the end of a Livre d'Heures given to Adam Blackwood by

"Mary Queen of Scots.
"Many many years ago I went to Dunfermline to see what records there were of the Blackwood family, but unfortunately there "was a great gap in the archives just at the time we are speaking of.
There was one notice, however, which has always puzzled me, of a "'Blackwood of Blaikwode,' implying that there must have been some small policy belonging to the family in the 15th or 16th centuries; "but I have never been able to localize it."

In the Retours (Inquisitionum ad Capellam Domini Regis retornaturum . . . Abbreviatio), under Inquisitiones Speciales, County of Fife, are registered the successions of

of Fite, are registered the successions of
John Blackwood (heir to his father, Thomas, Jan. 1623),
James Blaikwode (heir to his father, Adam, Dec. 1624), and
Adam Blaikwoode (heir to his father, James, April 1626);
all as portioners of Wester Coldrane, Eister Cowdrane, and Eister
Collindrane, respectively. In the same archives, under date July 1628,
occurs the name of James Hopburne of Cowcairnye (Cockairney) "cum
postestate effodiendi glebas in maresia vocata Mos de Coudrane."
Coldrane, Cowdrane and Collindrane are without doubt to be identified with Coldrain of the present day, in the united parish of Fossoway and Tullibole, where, some two miles south-west from the town of Kinross, are no fewer than four places of that name, viz., East, Mid, and West Coldrain, and also Wood of Coldrain; while, a little to the south of them, lies the Cockairney above mentioned. There were formerly several mosses adjoining—one of them "The Moss of Coldrain." It is highly probable that these Blackwoods were of the same family as Adam Blackwood, our author, and that in Coldrain is to be found the seat of their patrimony. It is a curious coincidence that the surname of the present tenant of West Coldrain is *Blackwood*.

Fossoway and Tullibole are now in Kinross-shire, but at the period in question it is evident that part at least of Tullibole lay within Fifeshire. The two parishes were united ca. 1614, and it is noteworthy that the county of Kinross contained only three parishes until its enlargement in 1685, (Sibbald's *History of Fife*, p. 105), when Cleish and Tullibole were annexed to Kinross-shire.

The Rev. James Blair was born at Cairneyhill in Sept. 1797, and early in life joined the Baptist Church, in which he afterwards became an outstanding preacher and evangelist. For several years he was engaged as a teacher in Ardrossan, Arran, Kilwinning, and Saltcoats, successively. At Saltcoats he was ordained to the ministry in March 1829, and remained there as pastor until his removal in the same capacity to Ayr (ca. 1837-1840) and subsequently to Dunfermline (ca. 1840-1844) whence he was appointed in Oct. 1844 as an itinerating evangelist throughout Scotland. From 1848 to 1851 he was settled at Stirling, and for the next four years at Dundee, whence he retired to Bridge of Allan in 1855.

'Of John Blair not much is known. He is understood to have been a native of Fifeshire, and with more certainty, to have received his education at Dundee as a schoolfellow of Wallace, to whom he afterwards became chaplain. He was a Benedictine monk of Dunfermline, adopting "in religion" the name of Arnold, and is said to have also written "De Liberata Tyrannide Scotia," of which, however, no trace seems now to remain. The "Relationes" themselves were first printed in Sir Robert Sibbald's "De Gestis Gulielmi Vallæ, Scotiæ olim custodis, Collectanea varia," Edin. 1705. The objection has been made that these Relationes run too much upon the lines of Fordun's Scotichronicon, but, beyond a doubt, such a work by Blair did exist; and it seems fully more reasonable to suppose that Fordun should have followed Blair (if the writings of the latter were accessible) than that an unknown later author of the Relationes simply copied Fordun. And this the more especially, since "Blind Harry" expressly acknowledges his "Life and Acts of Sir William Wallace" (in Scots metre) to have been founded on a Latin version by Blair.



The existence of this pamphlet is known only from an advertisement in the *Dunfermline Journal* of Jan. 1843, and from a lawsuit raised in that year by Mr Brown against the printer. About ten years ago, too many "original" MS. copies of the Mock Poem were offered for sale. One of these, (Part I.), in the writer's possession, certainly bears every appearance of being in a contemporary hand, and it is possible that the little volume was so popular that manuscript copies were made after the first edition became exhausted. S. C., who wrote The Life of Lady Halket, 1701, (postea), is not improbably to be identified with this Samuel Colvil.



Son of the *fourth* Robert Colvill of Cleish, who was created first Lord Colville of Ochiltree in 1651, and died at Crombie in 1662. The Rev. William Colvill became parish-minister of Cramond in 1635, being in 1639 translated to Trinity College, Edinburgh, and again in 1641 to the Tron Kirk, upon a re-arrangement of charges. 


This monk embraced the Protestant faith and became an eminent preacher. He was successively minister at Hailes (now Colinton), Leith, Edinburgh (ca. 1573), and Montrose. His daughter, Elizabeth, married James Melville, the diarist. No printed works by this Rev. John Durie are known, but in the next generation there was another of the same name (perhaps a descendant of the above) who, between



Dury or Durie is a very old Dunfermline family, being, it is understood, the ancient possessors of the lands of Durie (near Leven in Fife), and of whom Abbot George Durie was a representative.



Several (perhaps all) were written in collaboration with various composers—as to the musical department—and, without doubt, the above-noted (most of which are in the British Museum Library) form but an incomplete list.







¹ William Ged, the inventor of stereotype printing, seems to have been born at Dunfermline in or about the year 1690, a member of the old family of Ged of Baldridge. About 1758, his sisters the Misses Ged, two elderly ladies, opened a Day and Boarding School in Dun-Ged, two elderly ladies, opened a Day and Boarding School in Dunfermline, but not finding their venture to prosper, soon removed it to the Lawnmarket, Edinburgh, where they were patronised chiefly by Jacobite families, (Chambers' Traditions of Edinburgh, edition of 1825, pp. 48, 49). The estate of Middle Baldridge, "commonly called Mounthooly," and the Mason-lands adjoining, were in possession of the Ged family for only about ninety years, being acquired in 1634 by Robert Ged "of Geddismylne" (Burntisland), who seems to have died between April and Sentember 1642. The name of his wife was Euphemia Orrok. and September 1642. The name of his wife was Euphemia Orrok, evidently a sister of Isabella Orrok, who had married the Rev. John Michaelson (or Mitchelson) of Burntisland. The eldest son of Robert Ged and Euphemia Orrok was William Ged, whose wife was Anna Stewart, "daughter of Margaret Napier, Lady Rosyth, and sister of James Stewart of Rosyth." In Dec. 1663, Robert Ged was served heir to his father, William Ged, in the lands of Middle Baldridge and Ged's to his tather, William Ged, in the lands of Middle Baldridge and Ged's Mill, &c. (Inquisitiones, Fife, No. 950). Finally, in Nov. 1721, Robert Ged, grandson of the above Robert Ged, sold Middle Baldridge to Henry Welwood, younger of Touch. It is to be noted that, according to a sasine of 16 March 1657, a then Robert Ged of Baldridge and "the corn mill of Kinghorn Wester, alias Geddis-mylnes," had at least four children, John, "Alexander, Euphame, and Beatrix Geds," and was father-in-law to Robert Welwood. Middle Baldridge was thus owned in succession by five (or perhaps six) of the Ged family. It is owned in succession by five (or perhaps six) of the Ged family. It is said that the last Ged of Middle Baldridge nearly ruined himself in unsuccessful search for coal, although his successor in the estate, Henry Welwood, had a very different experience in a similar quest, (Chelward History)

(Chalmers' History, vol. i., p. 41).

In 1699 Robert Ged, junior of Baldridge, was a Bailie of the Regality of Dunfermline. Before 1583 there was a John Ged, of the Mill of Kinghorn-Wester (Burntisland), and in 1608 a Robert Ged of "Geddis Milne" (Registrum de Dunfermelyn), a place-name to this

day preserved at Burntisland.
The Dunfermline connection of William Ged (goldsmith and stereotype printer) seems to be generally admitted, although the links are incomplete as regards absolute proof. Mrs. Ged (said to have been the last of the family) died in June 1821, in her ninety-third year (Henderson's *Annals*, p. 609). Our William Ged was by trade a goldsmith in Edinburgh, and first attempted stereotyping in 1725. Four years later he entered into a London co-partnership together with William Fenner (stationer), Thomas James (type-founder), and John James (architect), in order to work the new process. In 1731 the company obtained a privilege to print Bibles and Prayer-books for Cambridge University, but owing to divided interests among the partners themselves, and to

jealous opposition by their workmen, this project came to utter failure. Two Prayer-books (one of single and one of double column) which had been completed about the year 1732, were both condemned; the copies already printed to be destroyed, and the plates broken up. It seems probable that another Prayer-book (octavo and of larger type), printed partly from Ged's plates and partly from ordinary type, must have shared the same fate. A Bible and a Grammar are also mentioned. Copies of any of the above seem to be entirely unknown, although a "specimen" page of one of the Prayer-books is in the writer's possession. If complete copies exist, they will bear date 1732 or 1733, and will probably have the imprint of John James and Company, or of William Fenner. 

It has not been found possible to prove his pedigree, but the fact of vol. i. being dedicated to the Hon. James Bruce of Broomhall, Fifeshire, seems to point to a local connection on the part of the author, while other indications show that he was related to the Pitsirrane family. Vol. i. (pp. 17 to 20) contains the epitaph (with some detailed biographical notes) of John Hacket, D.D., Bishop of Lichfield and Coventry (b. Sept. 1592, d. Oct. 1670), who was almost certainly a scion of the Halketts of Pitsirrane, although his works are not entered in this catalogue since he seems to have had no personal connection with the district, but was born in London, the only son of Andrew Hackett "of Pitsirrane" (or more correctly "of the family of Pitsirrane"), senior burgess of Westminster (Walcott's Life of Bishop Hacket, pp. 6 and 147, also Dict. of National Biog.) Even more significant is the occurrence in the same Epitaphs (vol. ii., p. 214) of an inscription "Designed for a Monument in Scotland,"—"To the immortal Memory of Sir Peter Halkett, Baronet, of Pitsirrane," Colonel in the British Army, who was killed in July 1755 in action against the French and Indians

near Fort du Quesne, on the River Monongahela, (North America). John Hackett, our author, was apparently son of John Hackett of London (d. June 1755), whose epitaph is also given in vol. i. (p. 122), and who may very possibly have been a descendant of Bishop Hacket, one of whose sons was Sir Andrew Hacket, Knight, of Moxhall in Warwickshire. In any case, the dedication of vol i. furnishes at least a semi-local connection.

Patrick Halket received from his father, George Halket of Pitfir-

rante, a charter of the lands of Lumphinnans before 1600, and was the founder of the English family of Halket "of Moxhall," being perhaps the grandfather of Bishop Hacket, (Chalmers' History, vol. i., p. 294).

There is also a volume entitled A Narrative of the Expedition which sailed from England in 1817, to join the South American Patriots, by Lieutenant James Hackett, London, 1818, but the author has not been identified been identified.



Lady Halket's father, Thomas Murray, was tutor to Prince Charles (Charles I.), 1605-1621, and at a later period her mother became sub-

governess to two of King Charles' children.

The earliest mention of Pitfirrane seems to be in the Registrum de Dunfermelyn, p. 268, where, in April 1360, Margaret, widow of Sir Robert de Meygners (Menzies), Knight, grants to the Monastery of Dunfermline "pro salute anime mee antecessorum et successorum mee successorum et successorum meorum" her whole lands of Pethfurane. In 1399 Philip de Halket, laird of Ballingall and Lumphinnans, received from his cousin, William de Scot de Balwearie, a charter to one-third part of the lands of Pitfirrane (Chalmers' History, vol. i., pp. 189 and 293); and in 1437 is recorded a dispute between David Haket of Lunfennen and the Monastery of Dunfermline as to the boundaries of Pitfirrane (Registrum de Dunfermelyn, p. 285). Reg. Mag. Sig. (14 Oct. 1472) records a grant from



James III. to "Willelmo Haket de Petfurane, et heredibus ejus" of the lands of Petconochy. The Reg. Privy Council (9 Feb. 1566) mentions "Adame Halkheid, . . . quha wes slane at the Feild of Flowdoun" (1513) as having been long in "possessioun of the landis of Petlevir and Braidley," evidently under a tack from the Prior and Convent of Dunfermline. It would appear that the family of Halket had owned Ballingall and Lumphinnans for some time before they acquired Pitfirrane. Ballingall seems to have been an estate lying mid-way between Falkland and Strathmiglo.

The first baronet (1662) of Pitfirrane was Sir Charles Halket, step-

The first baronet (1662) of Pitfirrane was Sir Charles Halket, stepson of Lady Halket the authoress. Members of the family were frequently provosts of Dunfermline from 1584 to 1760 (Henderson's Annals).

The spelling of the surname has been strictly followed according to its use at the various periods,—Haket, Halkheid, Hacket, Hackett, and Halket, but now Halkett.


During the next twenty years Dr. Henderson travelled almost continuously on evangelistic tours through Denmark, Sweden, Iceland, and Russia. In 1825 he returned home, and his sphere of labour was then removed to London, where he became Theological Tutor or Lecturer in Missionary Colleges, first at Hoxton (1826-1830) and afterwards at Highbury (1830-1850), in addition to having much literary work always on hand. In 1852 he was appointed pastor of Sheen Vale Independent Chapel, but resigned the charge next year on account of failing strength. He d. May 1858.

A sincere respect for Dr. Henderson's life and labours must be the



Henryson's works are amongst the very earliest and rarest of Scottish printing. Of "Orpheus the Kyng" only one copy (and that imperfect) is known to exist. No doubt "The Testament of Cresseid" and "The Morall Fabillis" were also issued from the same press. Of "The Testament of Cresseid" there is proof of the existence in 1585 of three copies of some earlier edition; while the "Confirmations of Testament." ments" of Edinburgh booksellers also show that Henry Charteris held in stock 545 copies in 1599, and Robert Smyth 1638 copies in 1602,—probably of the 1593 edition, of which only a single specimen is now traceable, that in the British Museum. Robert Smyth had also 743 copies of the "Fabilis of Isope," an edition now totally unknown.— (see Dr. Laing's Memoir, as above, pp. 259 and 264).

for a short period (ca. 1776-1780) in the Duke of Buccleuch's Regiment of South Fencibles, After this, he (accompanied by his three successive wives) led a most nomadic life, wandering over the length and breadth of England as a hawker of broadsides and chap-books, very many of them of his own composition. Indeed, from incidental mention made in the fifth edition of his "Life, Adventures, and Experience" (192 pp., Nottingham, 1825), it appears that he carried only a small stock, and was in the custom of frequently reprinting at the various towns which he visited, including Falkirk, Berwick, Newcastle, Hull, Leeds, Nottingham, Northampton, Briefel, Gospot, and London, all of which tingham, Northampton, Bristol, Gosport, and London, all of which places are specially noted in this regard, while Leicester ought perhaps to be added. His connection with Culross was evidently brief, probably

only from about 1781 to 1783; it may have been the original home of his first wife, Mary Thompson. In any case, the fact of a hawker having issued a chap-book from "Cuross, 17782," is interesting in more respects than one.

David Love seems finally to have settled at Nottingham, where he was living in 1824. Appended are the titles of four of his productions, quoted from the catalogue of the British Museum Library. The presumptive dates of two are corrected in accordance with the internal evidence afforded by his "Life."

Dunfermline with Malcolm Canmore (III. of Scotland), who at Easter 1070 married the Princess Margaret. She had a great influence with her husband, and did much to civilise Scotland—then in a semi-barbarous state—besides building Dunfermline Abbey, and re-founding Iona. She d. (three days after Malcolm III.) in Edinburgh Castle, 16 Nov. 1093, and was buried in Dunfermline Abbey before the Altar of the Holy Cross. She was canonized by Pope Innocent IV. in 1251, and about the same date her remains were, by order of Alexander III., removed "in choro supra majus altare," in which position (immediately outside and to the east of the present church) is still to be seen her tomb, an immense slab of blue limestone.





The Battle of Pitreavie, or "of Inverkeithing," as it is otherwise known, was fought upon the low ground between these two places on Sunday, 20 July 1651. The above print of official despatches, from Cromwell and others, dated 21 and 19 July, shows that the "Protector" was not present, (it is to be noted that he does not write as an eyewitness in his despatch of Monday, 21 July, addressed to the Speaker, from Linlithgow), but that the Parliamentary forces were led by Major-General Har(r)ison, with Colonels Okey, Overton, Daniel, West, &c., and the Royalists by Major-General Sir John Brown, Colonel Scot, and Colonel Buchanan. There had been a preliminary engagement on the morning of the previous Tuesday, when Overton captured the Fort at North-Queensferry "with five great Guns, and in a Bay neare it four ships laden with Coales, and Salt; in some other Forts neare it we tooke as many Ordnance as made up those five to be seventeen, which were planted by the Fyrth side to gall our ships." The Battle of Pitreavie appears to have been an easy victory for the Parliamentary troops;—"the Major Gen: with about six Regiments in all; of Horse, "Foot, and Dragoones marched out, and placed his Foot obscure on the side of a hill, and advanced further towards the enemy with his "horse, who also were on their march towards him, with full resolution to engage; there were some small charges with parties, but the Major Gen: retreated to his foot, using that onely as a meanes to draw them forward; and being come to his foot, each in Battalia

"charged other, the hottest service was between the left wing of ours, and the right wing of theirs, where Col. Okey commanded the Major Generalls Regiment of horse, and part of his owne, where the service was very hot at the swords point, and specially with Col: Okeyes men, who had the left to the left, and were very hardly put to it, both in front and flanck, but were seasonably relieved by Captain Bramstons Dragoones, who gave very good fire on the enemy, and to good purpose, the businesse began about three in the afternoone, and continued in its heat a quarter of an hour. Our Word was Providence, theirs Scotland, it seemes they were sensible that Scotland lay at this bout much at the stake; Their Army is retreated over Sterling, & ours on the advance, the Lord make you and us humble and thankfull. The horse being beaten, their foot presently threw away their arms; . . . our men had the pursuit of them for six miles, their number was about 5000, like to ours; they were their picked men both horse and foot, there were about 2000 of them slaine, and seven or eight hundred taken." It is added, "the most of their foot are High-landers," which, from other information, is quite accurate, the Clan Maclean of Duart being largely represented.

Henderson, in his Annals, p. 325, states that the Battle of Pitreavie lasted for eight hours, and that the Highlanders made their final stand under the walls of Pitreavie Castle. It may be incidentally noted that the erection of the old castle or house of Pitreavie dates only some twenty years previous to the battle,—say from ca. 1630-1640.

St. Cuthbert's, which indeed it seems doubtful if he had really left. From 1572 to 1584, a Senator of the College of Justice. D. May 1606, and was interred in St. Cuthbert's Church, Edinburgh.

He was thrice married (first to Catherine, daughter of Masterton

of the Grange), and his eldest son, Timothy (b. ca. 1560, d. ca. 1630), became minister of Dunnet, and was an accomplished mathematician and the first projector of a Scottish Atlas, which was issued by Blaeu in 1654: (it may here be noted as probably more than a simple coincidence, that a family of Blaw was distinctly associated with Culross from about the time of the Reformation). The Bassandyne Bible has another connection with the West of Fife apart from Pont's "Calendare." The printer (Arbuthnot), upon application to the General Assembly of 1575, received the assistance of George Young, servant to the Abbot of Dunfermline, to correct the proofs and to help him generally. It would appear also that George Young became, in a way, the successor of Arbuthnot, after whose death (Sept. 1585) he obtained full right to Arbuthnot's privileges, (Dobson's History of the Bassandyne Bible, the First Printed in Scotland, with Notices of The Early Printers of Edinburgh, Edin. 1887, pp. 110 and 159).

George Thomson took great pains in superintending the issue of this volume, although his assistance is not acknowledged in the work itself, nor is the fact even named in Mrs. Grant's Memoir, published by her son in 1844. This latter omission was keenly felt by Thomson, (Hadden's Life of George Thomson, pp. 34-39).

This is the later title, in a reprint of 1809. The earliest title, of 1793, mentions neither Kozeluch, Haydn, nor Burns; indeed, Haydn's first contribution of Airs to Thomson was in 1800. According to Hadden's Life of George Thomson, p. 87, the new edition (of the first five volumes) was of 1839, but it seems evident that the reprinting was gradual. This, with all the following items, are of course merely published and edited by Thomson.

It was Bishop Percy, in the second edition of his Reliques of Ancient English Poetry (1765), who first announced Lady Wardlaw as the anonymous authoress of Hardyknute,—an identification which is

now universally admitted.

There is preserved at Pitfirrane what is supposed to be the holograph MS. of *Hardyknute*. It is of folio size (in frail condition), and has all the appearance of belonging to Lady Wardlaw's time; in places there are various corrections, and especially in some lines of Stanza xviii. several words have been erased, and others substituted. This is mentioned as showing all the more probability of the MS. having been an original draft.

As this version differs from that usually printed, a verbatim copy of the first Stanza is here appended, together with the same as it appears in the early 12mo. impression, which, according to Letters from Thomas Percy, D.D., afterwards Bishop, &c., &c. (Edin. 1830), p. 4-5,

is supposed to have been the very first edition:-



According to Chalmers' History, vol. i., p. 301, the Wardlaw family received estates in Galloway from Malcolm III. in the eleventh century, but, having sided with Baliol, lost these when Robert the Bruce came to the throne. The Wardlaw of that time retained, however, the lands of Torrie in Fife, which had been a more recent acquisition of the family. Sir Henry Wardlaw of Torrie was the father of Cardinal



Walter Wardlaw (who d. ca. 1389) and the grandfather of Bishop Henry Wardlaw (nephew of the Cardinal), tutor to James I., and (afterwards) founder of St. Andrews University in 1411. The Wardlaws held, besides Torrie, much land in the neighbourhood, including Wester-Luscar, Wester-Lochore (or Inchgall), Balmule, Logie, and Pitreavie, Sir Henry Wardlaw, the first Wardlaw of Pitreavie, was born in 1565, eldest son of Sir Cuthbert Wardlaw of Balmule, inheriting the lastnamed estate and adding that of Pitreavie by purchase in 1608 (*Ibid.*, vol. i., pp. 301-303; vol. ii., p. 263; Sibbald's Fife, pp. 145-148, etc.)





The sculptured stone for which this entry is made is evidently that described in the New Stat. Acc., vol. ix., p. 239,—"In the north "part of the parish, there is a stone 10 feet high, 2½ broad, and 1 "thick, with rude figures of men and horses cut upon it, but now "much defaced, supposed to be a Danish monument." Chalmers' History, vol. ii., p. 389, explains the disappearance of this relic,—"There was not very long ago a large upright stone, with various figures on it, which stood on the side of the old high-road from "Queensferry northward, not far from the old mansion-house of "Duloch, and the west lodge of Fordel, described in the last Statisti-"cal Account of Inverkeithing Parish. But when this road was abandoned, on the new one being opened, several years since, the stone was found to be an obstruction to some field improvements, and was "removed and broken down for road metal." (!)

Her first work, "The Saxon and the Gael," published in 1814, and now excessively rare, was (according to Henderson's Annals) written during 1813 in a house in New Row, opposite the end of Canmore Street. This has often been reprinted, and is even yet issued as a standard work, existing in at least sixteen editions. In his latter years he officiated in an Episcopalian meeting-house in Edinburgh; d. in that city, 1715, (Scott's Fasti, and Chalmers' History, vol. i., p. 545).

This family was one of importance in Fifeshire during about four centuries, dating from at least 1444, but probably from a still earlier period. In the year mentioned, Richard Multrare of Markinch (and Seafield Tower) acquired a tack of a "hale quarter of thir twa Petdonyngis," &c., in Fife (Reg. Mag. Sig.), and his great-grandson, John Multrare, was killed at Flodden in 1513. The name was anciently written "Moutray," as well as in other forms (being, no doubt, originally "Multerer," or Miller), and occurs as of Seafield in 1543 (Registrum de Dunfermelyn) and of Seafield and Newton of Markinch in 1609 (Retours, Inquis. Speciales). Robert Moutray, in 1631, sold his estate of Seafield to Archbishop Law of Glasgow for 19,700 merks, and (probably in the same year) acquired instead the lands of Rescobie, near Dunfermline. (The first of the name known in Scotland was Adam de Multrere in 1292, who probably lived at Moutray Hill, now the site of the Edinburgh Register House).

James Moultrie, grandson of the purchaser of Rescobie, succeeded his father (James) in that estate in 1686 (Ibid.): he died in 1710, leaving two sons,—James (of Rescobie), and John, for a time resident at Culross, where in 1702 was born to him a son, John, who emigrated to Carolina in 1729. This John Moultrie (the emigrant, and apparently a doctor) d. 1771, having had five sons, the eldest of whom, John, came over from America in 1746 to study at Edinburgh for his degree of M.D., but afterwards held the office of Lieut.-Governor of East Florida, under the British Crown, at the time of the War of Independence. Fort Moultrie was named after his brother William, a General in the American Army. (These details are obtained partly from Historical Collections of Kinghorn, pp. 24-26, and more especially from MS. notes kindly contributed by the Rev. Walter MacLeod, Edinburgh; also from the "Rules of St. Andrew's Society, of the City of Charleston, S.C.," 1892).

In the folio description of Blairadam (The Progress of an Estate, &c.), it is mentioned that the farm and mansion-house of Woodend, in Fife, were purchased by William Adam of Blairadam in 1738, and that Woodend had previously been the residence of the "family of

Moutray of Rescobie." The estate of Rescobie was entirely relinquished by the Moultrie family in 1801.

The Rev. George Moultrie (second son of Dr. John Moultrie, Lieut.-Governor of East Florida) was father of the Rev. John Moultrie (b. 1799, d. 1874), Rector of Rugby and Canon of Worcester, who won considerable fame as a minor poet. The above entry has been made both to allow the facts of the Moultrie connection to be noted, and particularly to make mention of this author, although his descent from the James Moultrie of Rescobie (who d. 1710), while direct, is certainly remote, being of the fourth generation. The Poems of the Rev. John Moultrie have appeared in various forms, the latest and most complete edition (with a Memoir by Prebendary Coleridge) being in 2 vols., London, 1876.

in 1704 (if not earlier) they also acquired the lands of Garvock, or Garvock Wood; in 1721, those of Middle Baldridge; and in 1736 the estate of Pitliver.

It is understood that the Rev. Andrew Welwood (author of "A Glimpse of Glory," &c.) and James Welwood, M.D. (author of "Memoirs for the last Hundred Years preceding the Revolution in 1688," &c.)—sons of Rev. James Welwood, minister of Tundergarth—were descendants from this branch; as was also probably William Welwood (author of "An Abridgment of all Sea-Laws," 1613, &c.) But none of these are here definitely noted, since the exact connection cannot be proved, and may indeed be somewhat remote,—as in the case of Bishop Hacket and the Pitfirrane family. A more recent representative was Alexander Maconochie-Welwood, second Lord Meadowbank, whom see, antea.
