
"Jeepers, Creepers!"

"Jeepers. Creepers!". one of many films by photographer/naturalist A. Warren Larson, offers an intimate look into the insect world and shows the complex ecological relationships of various species to Bay Area gardens, fields and forests. Featured creatures in this entertaining and educational film will give you new insight into your own backyard biology studies. Our February meetings will be of interest to young scientists, gardeners, campers and bug buffs in general.

Larson, a retired teacher of more than 35 years, has presented slide shows and films to many group organizations including the Audubon Society, American Ornithology Union at Berkeley, garden clubs and other institutions. Larson also served as a seasonal naturalist for the Department of Recreation, Beaches and Parks, spending six summers in coastal parks. He also spent a summer working at Lassen National Forest and one at Shoshone National Forest in Wyoming.

As usual, there will be three presentations of this monthly members' meetings. Please present your membership card at the main entrance to Cowell Hall for admission to the Academy. special Exhibits

After a highly successful nine-month run at New York's American Museum of Natural History, Ice Age Art, the exhibition of the art and symbol of the last Ice Age in Europe and Asia opens February 17 and continues through August, 1979.

Ice Age Art, the first comprehensive exhibition of man's earliest art and symbol ever presented either in the U.S. or Europe, spans the Upper Paleolithic era from approximately 35,000 to 10,000 B.C. With over 200 works including sculptures and artifacts, photomurals of cave paintings, carving and engravings, the show sheds a new light on the culture and capacity of the earliest of Homo sapiens of Europe, Cro-Magnon man. Generally, our mental image of "cavemen" is one of uncouth, savage brutes, certainly not sensitive artists. But from the beautiful and sophisticated cave paintings discovered throughout Europe and Asia, and from the skilfully carved "Venus" figurines, plus many hitherto unknown symbol systems to be exhibited for the first time, it would seem that our view of Cro-Magnon man must be adjusted.

One of the highlights of the exhibit is a magnificent 26-foot painting depicting some of the lifelike bison on the famous Altamira cave ceiling in Spain, which has been called the "Ice Age Sistine Chapel" for its spectacular painted animal images. The painting will be suspended from the ceiling as it would appear to a visitor to Altamira.

Another featured exhibit on the art of Cro-Magnon man is the work of Douglas Mazonowicz, an artist with a mission. Using the silkscreen technique he has made accurate renderings in texture, size and color of prehistoric cave art and the Academy is pleased to offer a generous collection of his work in **The Hand of Man** on display in a new exhibit area in Cowell Hall.

The opening of Ice Age Art and The Hand of Man coincides with an international symposium entitled, "The Hand of Man: Origins of Art and Culture" sponsored by the Leakey Foundation to be held on February 17 and 18 at the Palace of Fine Arts. Academy members should have received a detailed brochure on this unique gathering of experts, but if you did not and would like information call 752-4642.

Members of the Academy will have an opportunity to hear more about Cro-Magnon man and the last ice age at the March meetings when Dr. Margaret Conkey will give a slide-illustrated lecture on the topic.

Man in Essence, an exhibition of photographs and art objects from aboriginal Irian by the late photographer Laurens Hillhouse, continues through March 31 in the Atholl McBean Gallery. The truly remarkable photographs, combined with the beautiful art and artifacts Hillhouse collected over the years in Irian, give you an intimate look at life in this remote region of West New Guinea. In this vast primordial swampland where animal life must be armored, camouflaged or cunning to survive, where the earth permanently remains in its infancy, incredibly, here people live.

The Farallon Islands, a stunning color photo exhibit by Tupper Ansel Blake, continues through the end of February in Hohfield Gallery I, just outside the auditorium. An exhibit featuring superb examples of ancient Peruvian weaving techniques, Peruvian Textiles: A Weaver's Art, is on view in the Patricia Price Peterson Gallery.



On Monday, February 26, Americans and Canadians will witness the last total solar eclipse visible from North America until the year 2017. The lecturers, both members of the Planetarium staff, will talk about what an eclipse is, how to view one and where to go to see this eclipse. A question and answer period will follow.

Also on the agenda is a free special eclipse show at 3:30 p.m., Monday, February 26, the big day, in the Morrison Planetarium!

Cold-blooded Vertebrates: Their Care and Maintenance

February 20-April 10 (eight Tuesdays) 7:00-9:30 p.m.

For those wishing to set-up an aquarium or terrarium of their own, this course will examine the types of equipment available to the hobbyist as well as their use for the essential purpose of proper environmental control. We will learn how to develop and provide the necessary habitat, including different foods and feeding requirements. Also, basic information will be given for disease diagnosis and treatment of fishes, reptiles and amphibians. 
