



DR. IRENE WAKEHAM

Dr. Irene Wakeham was born in England in 1912 to missionary parents. A year later her family moved to what is now Andrews where in 1934 she received her Bachelor's degree in English.

For the next 13 years Dr. Wakeham taught in several academies including Hawaiian Missionary and Loma Linda Academies. While teaching at the Loma Linda Academy she received her Masters degree in French from the University of Southern California in 1939.

In 1946 Dr. Wakeham traveled to the Philippines where for the next 24 years she worked as an educator, teaching and encouraging young students and at the same time falling in love with them and their culture. While based in the Philippines Dr. Wakeham returned to the states and studied at Stanford University where she received her Doctorate degree in Linguistics in 1965. She returned to the Philippines to continue her labors there. In November of 1970 Dr. Irene Wakeham left the Philippines and in January of 1971 she came to the small black college in Huntsville, Alabama—Oakwood.

For five years Dr. Wakeham has been a member of Oakwood's faculty and head of the Department of English. Unfortunately for us, however, Dr. Wakeham is leaving Oakwood College to be with her 96 year-old mother in California. Though we will miss her greatly, she deserves her forthcoming retirement. Some day when she retires from the education business, she will have experienced induction into the Andrews Hall of Fame, Outstanding Educator of the Year, Who's Who of American Women Award, and listing in World Who's Who of Authors. She has also had three books published and her biography will soon be published in the DICTIONARY OF INTERNATIONAL BIOGRAPHIES.

Though Dr. Wakeham will be taking all these experiences with her, she will be leaving behind thousands of young people influenced by her care and eagerness for them to learn.

Dr. Irene Wakeham is truly a person who loves people. Her years of service and grand accomplishments have proven her loyalty to the world of education. Oakwood is proud to be able to say that we have known her and through our knowledge we love her. For this reason the staff of the Acorn proudly dedicates this yearbook to Dr. Irene Wakeham.












U.S.M. OFFICERS INAUGURATION

















1974-75 Lyceum Series

In a very lively and inspirational performance the Brothers appealed to young and old alike with their varied repertoire of music.




















BIBLE CONFERENCE-"1974"


David Trusty opened the program by presenting a bouquet of roses to Rence Wagner, Sophomore representative from the U.S.M.

This building was erected in 1909 under the inspiration of Mrs. E.G. White, who called for the expansion of medical work among Negroes in the south. It was dedicated as a sanitarium and nurses training center under the direction of Dr. M.M. Martinson.

In 1938 it was remodeled as a home for Elder James L. Moran, the first Black president of Oakwood College. Between 1944 and 1965 it was the residence of Dr. Eva B. Dykes. The academy young men used it as a dorm for

East Hall now houses the Quin-C Center, the Public Relations office, the Publishing Industry and the Health Center.
