## AMERICAN GENEALOGY.

GABRIEL LUDLOW married on Easter-Monday, April 5th, 1697, Sarah, daughter of the Rev. Joseph Hammer, D. D., deceased, chaplain to His Majesty's forces in the Province of New York, in America. Gab. Ludlow, one of the first vestrymen of Trinity Church, New York, in 1697; his son

WILLIAM LUDLOW married to Mary Duncan the 10th of August, 1731; their son

GABRIEL WM. LUDLOW married August 28th, 1764, to Cornelia, daughter of Charles Crooke, who was the son of John Crooke, one of the first vestrymen of Trinity Church, New York, in 1697. Charles Crooke was vestryman of Trinity Church, New York, in 1731; he married, August 18th, 1722, Anneka, daughter of Anthony Rutgers. Gabriel Wm. Ludlow's son

CHARLES LUDLOW, was the father of Cornelia Ann and Elizabeth.

CORNELIA ANN and ELIZABETH were the sole survivors of Gabriel Wm. and Charles Ludlow, vestrymen of Trinity Church, New York; Elizabeth now alone survives.

All the Ludlows were High Churchmen, and worshipped in Trinity Church, New York, and there lie buried.

CORNELIA ANN LUDLOW was born June 13th, 1788, married to John Abraham Willink, May 2d, 1816. Her husband, J. A. Willink, died May 31st, 1852. He was the son of Wilhem Willink, an eminent banker and financier of Amsterdam in Holland, who was an early friend of the American Republic; who also rendered service by making the first loan, and was one of the original holders in the property of the Holland Land Company.



## MEMOIR.

CORNELIA ANN was of a lovely, amiable disposition, refined and accomplished; her early days were under the immediate, affectionate supervision of her fond parents; she yielded implicit obedience to their direction, and cheerfully submitted to their guidance. Thus her days passed on in quiet and uninterrupted happiness, until her father was removed from her by death in 1814. The loss of so kind a parent was keenly felt. In time she became a faithful, loving wife, to one who was devotedly attached to her. In the confidence and affection of a united family her life glided smoothly along. Now she was called to mourn the loss of an aged, pious mother, who departed full of faith in the merits of her Saviour and Redeemer. A little while and the beloved partner of her bosom was taken from her. She bowed in submission to the will of God; her widowed heart withdrew her from the pomps and vanities of the world; in retirement she indulged in those sympathies with which nature and education had so well endowed her. She had been early trained in the love of God. She was baptized, confirmed, a partaker of the Holy Communion, and married in *Trinity Church*, New York. Strongly attached to her Church, she had listened to the teachings, and partaken of the ministrations, of the first four Bishops of the Diocese of New York. It is a fruit of their early instructions, germinating in the warmth of her heart, that she had long felt a desire to promote the education of young men for the Church. In furtherance of this idea, the training of young men for the ministry of the Church—the *Episcopal Church*—she, with her sister, determined to erect this Hall, now to be named “THE LUDLOW AND WILLINK HALL;” the corner-stone of which is to be laid this 13th day of June, 1866, the anniversary of the birthday of Cornelia Ann, who departed this life November 18th, 1865.

It devolves upon her surviving sister to fulfil and carry out the design. May God give her grace and strength to accomplish it.
