

The four points upon which the Commissioners agree are first, that there should be a State board of equalization which should be a review board with power coustize assessments either by equalize assessments either by re-ducing or increasing; second, that the Legislature should provide for a maximum tax rate; third, that all railroad property should be as-sessed by a State Board: fourth, that all second class railroad prop-erty should be assessed by a State Board, and that the assessment should be included in the ratables of the localities in which the prop-erty should be found to be located, this second class property to pay rethis second class property to pay tax at the local rates and for the benefit of the localities in which it should be situated. The only point upon which the Commissioners dif fer materially is on the question of taxing the main stem, or first class property of the railroads. TAFT SEES IN RELIGION FOE TO WAR REACTION

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Exhorts Unitarian Workers in \$3.-000.000 Drive to Place Church Among Militant Faiths.

William Howard Taft, addressing more than 300 workers in the Unitarian religious and educational campaign and drive for \$3,000,000 at a luncheon yes-terday at the Hotel Astor, exhorted them "to go forward and to take our place in the militant religions and show to the world the faith that is in us by our missionary work in the fields where we ought to succeed."

The reaction following the war, ex-President Taft said, has developed "a frightful lack of scriousness, extrava-gance, luxury and a turning again to the things of the world in a way that, in phases of it, is most discouraging. But," Mr. Taft added, "it is only temporary, I am convinced." "It is only getting over something in a way of the fullness of heart and soul that poor human nature cannot stand too long," he continued, " there has to be a

a way of the fullness of heart and soul that poor human nature cannot stand too long," he continued, " there has to be a little reaction from it. But the lessons of the war nave not been lost. It is now, when there is danger that they may be lost, that we need this forward march, this movement in the interest of re-ligion, to stir the indifference and iner-tia of men who have left the church on the excuse that they do not believe in. "Education is an essential basis for successful popular government, and it is predicated on the assumption that with education men will make good clitzens, will see clearly what the public interest is and will use their influence and vote and activities to promote that interest. 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
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



To Robert S. Prichard:

As you may readily suppose, the subject of your letter is one in which I am much interested. You are considering the all important subject of a personal consecration to the great work of missions among the heathen, and you 'wish to know the difficulties and count the cost.' The one great difficulty with a young man called of God to preach the gospel, especially if he has talents and ambition, is the difficulty of attaining a state of perfect resignation to the will of God. This involves the crucifying of all ambitious feelings, the turning of the back upon all posts of honor, ease, and affluence, and the marching, if he believes Christ commands it, into the darkness of heathenism, there to labor and die for the glory of God, leaving his names and honors entirely in the hands of him whom he has served. This is the one dif-ficulty that confronts you now. This overcome, all other difficulties will vanish as soon as they are approached. The language is a great trial, but it can be mastered by any one having an ear capable of distinguishing and imitating the musical sounds. The question of climate need give no difficulty, for there is every variety of climate in China that is to be found in America. It takes no more faith to be a missionary than it does to be a faithful minister at home. You will not have, it is true, the moral support of sympathizing Christian friends, as you would in the States, and this is a sore trial to a lone miss-The life of a missionary is one of incessant labor ionary. and care. He must work at the language certain hours, preach at certain hours every day, and twice as many on The case of Judson, to which you referred, is Sundays. the exception and not the rule as regards the sufferings of a missionary. I have heard and read much about the peculiar trials and sacrifices of a missionary, but I have never experienced them or known, personally, others to do so. The qualifications of heart, mind, and body deemed necessary for a good minister at home are just the qualifications I know of required for a good missionary to the heathen. nothing 'peculiar' to suggest. Let me urge you, therefore, to strive to overcome 'the first great difficulty' to which I have referred. Success in this is as essential to the usefulness of a minister at home as for a missionary abroad. Dismiss, as far as possible, the associations which may have had some influence upon your feelings, ask the Lord, with a full determination to follow the directions of the Spirit, where he will have you labor, and then be honest with yourself, following the guiding of the Spitit, without regard to the wishes and expectations of your friends. I am not prepared to advise you with reference to another year at the University. It would seem unnecessary. A knowledge of medicine might be useful at some stations where there are no physicians. But I am inclined to think, from my own observation, that men who take a partial course in medicine

rarely ever practice enough to give them confidence in themselves or to secure the confidence of others. I do not think that mixed professions work well. A year or two at the Greenville Seminary would, doubtless, be very serviceable and desirable. May the Lord of the harvest guide you aright and direct you into that field where you will in the highest degree promote His glory.--"Yates the Missionary pp



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
