MAJOR GENERAL JOSEPH R. DeLUCA

Major General Joseph R. DeLuca is Director of Budget, office of the Comptroller, Headquarters U.S. Air Force, Washington, D.C.

General DeLuca was born in Greenville, Pa., on Sept. 3, 1918, and graduated from John Hay High School, Cleveland, Ohio, in 1936. He attended the Professional School of Accounting and Finance, Cleveland, Ohio, and in 1938 became an instructor there in accounting, auditing, economics and taxes. He attended Cleveland College, Western Reserve University, Cleveland, Ohio, in 1946; received a bachelor degree in business administration from the University of Maryland, in 1962, and a master's degree in international affairs from George Washington University, Washington, D.C., in 1963.



General DeLuca entered military service in the Army Air Corps as a private in February 1942. After attending Officers Candidate School, Miami Beach, Fla., he was commissioned a second lieutenant in the Army Air Corps Reserve in December 1942. He then served with the 307th Service Group, Air Depot Training Station, Will Rogers Field, Okla., and later became Commanding Officer, Recruit Training Detachment, Woodward, Okla.

He was transferred to Barksdale Field, La., in May 1943, and assigned to the 44th Service Group as operations officer. He was assigned in June 1943 as air technical supply officer and statistical officer with the 43d Air Depot Group, Air Depot Training Station, Albuquerque, N. Mex. He accompanied the organization to England in September 1943 and was subsequently assigned to the Third Tactical Air Depot, Eighth Air Force.

During the remainder of World War II, he served as a supply officer in the Eighth Air Force and later, as Deputy Chief of Supply for the Ninth Air Force Service Command in the European Theater of Operations. He participated in the Central Europe, Northern France and Rhineland campaigns.

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General DeLuca returned to the United States in August 1946 and reverted to inactive duty in November, but was recalled in March 1947 and attended the Aviation Ordnance Course, Lowry Field, Colo. In May 1947 he was assigned as accountable supply officer of the 4145th Army Air Forces Base Unit (Air Base), Air Materiel Command, Holloman Air Force Base, N. Mex., and later was Director of Supply. In August 1949 he joined the Supply Division, Headquarters Air Materiel Command, Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Ohio, where he filled various policy, requirements, and distribution assignments.

In November 1952 General DeLuca was assigned to the Office of the Secretary of Defense in Washington, D.C., where he served as a member of the Planning Staff to the Director, Defense Supply Management Agency, and in October 1953 became Chief, Office of Cataloging. In December 1953 he became Acting Staff Director, Cataloging Division, Office of the Director of Cataloging, Standardization and Inspection, Office of the Assistant Secretary of Defense (Supply and Logistics), and in April 1954 he was appointed Staff Director. He was graduated from Air War College, Maxwell Air Force Base, Ala., in June 1957. He then was named Director of Supply, Headquarters Air Materiel Forces, Pacific Area, Air Materiel Command, at Hickam Air Force Base, Hawaii.

He returned to the United States in October 1958 to become Chief, Analysis Staff, Armed Forces Supply Support Center, Washington, D.C. In June 1961 he became Deputy Director of the Supply Support Center, which became a part of the Defense Supply Agency. He was assigned as Deputy Executive Director of Logistics Plans and Systems, Defense Supply Agency, in January 1962 and four months later was named Director, Office of Supply Management Policy, Office of the Assistant Secretary of Defense (Installations and Logistics). As an additional duty, he was appointed cost reduction coordinator for the Department of Defense in September 1963. General DeLuca was named Deputy Commander of Ogden Air Materiel Area (AFLC), with headquarters at Hill Air Force Base, Utah, in August 1964.

He came to Headquarters Air Force Logistics Command, Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Ohio, in August 1965 as Deputy Director of Supply, and in August 1967, was named Director of Supply (title was changed to Deputy Chief of Staff, Supply). In August 1969 General DeLuca was assigned as Commander of Advanced Logistics System Center (ALSC), and assumed duties as Deputy Chief of Staff, Comptroller, in February 1970.

General DeLuca assumed duties as Director of the Budget, Office of the Comptroller, Headquarters U.S. Air Force, Washington, D.C., in July 1971.

For his outstanding contribution to Air Force logistics management, General DeLuca was presented the Eugene M. Zuckert Management Award by Dr. Harold Brown, Secretary of the Air Force, on October 28, 1968. He directed the implementation of advanced techniques utilizing electronic data processing, high speed communications, and airlift of critical items which enabled the Air Force to meet increased supply demands of Southeast Asia within manpower and budgetry constraints. His military decorations and awards include the Distinguished Service Medal, Legion of Merit, Joint Service Commendation Medal, and Army Commendation Medal.

General Deluca is married to the former Doris Colleen Hays. They have eight children: Pat B., Joel R., Kathy D., Barbara C., Teresa M., Michael J., Tina D., and Marisa J. General DeLuca's hometown is Greenville, Pa.

He was promoted to the temporary grade of major general effective Nov. 1, 1967, with date of rank Oct. 1, 1963.

General Gabriel P. Disosway Commander-in-Chief United States Air Forces in Europe

Gabriel Poillon Disosway was born in Pomona, Calif., on June 11, 1910. He was graduated from Wichita Falls High School, Wichita Falls, Tex., in 1927 and attended Oklahoma University the next two years. He entered the U.S. Military Academy in July 1929, and was commissioned a second lieutenant of Field Artillery on his 23rd birthday, June 11, 1933.

He entered the Air Corps Primary Flying School at Randolph Field, Tex. Upon completion of the course he transferred to the Air Corps Advanced Flying School at Kelly Field, Tex., graduating in October 1934. He transferred from the Field Artillery to the Air Corps, January 31, 1935.

General Disosway's first assignment was with the 55th Pursuit Squadron at Barksdale Field, La., where he served as supply officer, squadron adjutant, engineering officer, armament officer and operations officer. He was transferred to Randolph Field as a primary flying instructor in March 1938, and remained there until January 1942, serving as an instructor, flight commander and stage commander. He then went to Lake Charles Field, La., as director of Flying, and in June 1942, returned to Randolph Field to become director of Training. He was appointed commander of Bryan Army Air Base, Tex., in January 1943.

In April 1943, General Disosway went to Panama as commander of the 37th Fighter Group. He later served as air inspector and deputy commander of the 26th Fighter Command in Panama and trained the First Brazilian Fighter Group which went to Italy. In September 1944, he was assigned as commander of Ephrata Army Air Base, Wash.

In January 1945, General Disosway was transferred to China as assistant operations officer of the 312th Fighter Wing. In March 1945, he bailed out of his aircraft when it was shot down over China and was missing in action for a month. He assumed command of the 311th Fighter Group in May 1945, and in July of the same year took command of the 312th Fighter Wing. Two months later, he was named Army and Air Force Liaison Officer with the Third Amphibious Marine Corps in Tientsin, China.

General Disosway returned to the United States in April 1946 to become assistant commander at Barksdale Field. He entered the Air War College at Maxwell Air Force Base, Ala., in August 1947. On graduation the following June he was appointed Chief of the Training Division in the Directorate of Training and Requirements at Headquarters USAF, Washington, D.C.

In February 1951, he became director of Training of the Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff for Personnel at Headquarters USAF. He was named commander of Air Training Command's Flying Training Air Force, September 1, 1952, with headquarters at Waco, Tex. After nearly five years in this position, he assumed command of Twelfth Air Force, with headquarters at Ramstein, Germany, on July 2, 1957. On January 1, 1958, he became deputy commander, United States Air Forces in Europe, Advanced Operations Unit (ADVON) at Ramstein Air Base, Germany. He assumed command of the 17th Air Force in November 1959, with headquarters at Ramstein.

Returning to the States on June 1, 1960, General Disosway was assigned duty as Senior Air Force Member, Military Studies and Liaison Division, Weapons Systems Evaluation Group, Office of the Secretary of Defense (Research and Engineering). He was promoted to lieutenant general on June 28, 1961 and on July 1, 1961 was assigned as vice commander, Tactical Air Command with headquarters at Langley AFB, Va. General Disosway became deputy chief of staff, Operations, Headquarters USAF, on November 1, 1962. This position was redesignated as deputy chief of staff, Programs and Requirements on February 1, 1963.

On August 1, 1963, he was promoted to general and assigned as commander-in-chief, United States Air Forces in Europe with Headquarters at Wiesbaden, Germany.


A command pilot, General Disosway has received numerous awards and decorations including the Distinguished Service Medal, Legion of Merit with two Oak Leaf Clusters, Bronze Star, Air Medal, Chinese Cloud and Banner, Chinese Glorious Tripod and Brazilian Southern Cross.

General Disosway makes his home at Wiesbaden with his wife, Dorothy Ford, and son, John Ford. A daughter, Judith, is married to Dr. W.R. Hanna and resides in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

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Lt C. RISTIAN F. DRAYER - WHO WAS HE?

While this base was abuilding - 1957-38 - one man stood out as the most prominent of all. He was an impressive looking, clean cut soldier - a 1st Lieutenant, West Point graduate, by the name of Christian F. Dreyer.

Lieutenant Dreyer came to MAD as an assistant to the Constructing Quarternaster Col Hugo E. Pitz on 25 August, 1937. Colonel Pitz had major r sponsibilities elsewhere, leaving Lieutenant Dreyer in charge of the work at SAD most of the time. Later, 22 July 1938, Lt Dreyer was made Construction Quarternaster. He was the most familiar figure on the base throughout the greater part of the building period. It was his responsibility to make sure that the contractors did their work properly. In this he was capable as he knew engineering well.

The civil service employees of the base, growing from about 50 to near 100 during this time, had great respect for Lieutenant Dreyer. They consisted of inspectors, laborers, clerks, guards, and a few skilled craftsmen.

After the death of Capt John A. Austin, the first Counanding Officer of SAD, Lieutenant Droyer assumed com and - a position which he held for 3 days only - 23, 29, and 30 October 1938 - until a regular replacement for Captain Austin arrived. This replacement was Maj Charles M. Savage. Lieutenant Dreyer holds the distinction of serving the shortest period and of having been the only lat Lieutenant Commanding Officer of SAD.

The Official Army Roster of 1948 shows that on 22 August 1944 Christian F. Dreyer became a Colonel, AUS. He is still active with a permanent rank of Lt Colonel.

BRIGADIER GENERAL CHRISTIAN F. DREYER JR.

Brigadier General Christian F. Dreyer Jr. is commander of the 601st Tactical Control Wing, Sembach Air Base, Germany. The Wing operates a tactical air control system providing surveillance and command and control of United States and other North Atlantic Treaty Organization aircraft within the European theater. He assumed command of the 601st on June 15, 1981.

General Dreyer was born March 23, 1934, in San Antonio, Texas, and graduated from St. Johns College High School, Washington, D.C., in 1952. He attended Virginia Military Institute under the Air Force Reserve Officers' Training Corps program, and in 1956 received a bachelor of science degree in civil engineering and a commission as a second lieutenant. He completed his master of science degree in electrical engineering at the University of Arizona, Tucson, under the Air Force Institute of Technology program in 1963. General Dreyer graduated from the Industrial College of the Armed Forces, Fort Lesley J. McNair, Washington, D.C., in 1973.

He entered pilot training in August 1956 and received his wings at Laredo Air Force Base, Texas, in December 1957. After completing fighter-interceptor school at Moody Air Force Base, Ga., in June 1958, General Dreyer was assigned to the 93rd Fighter-Interceptor Squadron, Kirtland Air Force Base, N.M., where he flew F-86s from June 1959 until March 1960. He was the Air Force inspector for the construction of 20 family housing units at a remote radar site, Winslow Air Force Station, Ariz. He returned to Kirtland Air Force Base where he flew modified B-57 air sampling aircraft for the 4526th Test Squadron. From 1961 to 1963, he attended the University of Arizona.

Beginning in July 1963 General Dreyer served as a project manager with the Satellite Control Facility, Los Angeles Air Force Station, Calif. He managed contract operations and equipment modification for a worldwide network of seven satellite tracking stations.

The general transferred to the 31st Tactical Fighter Wing, Homestead Air Force Base, Fla., in April 1966 as an F-100 pilot and command post controller. From December 1966 until December 1967, he served in Southeast Asia as a chief command post controller, supervising communications, command and control for the three flying squadrons of the 31st Tactical Fighter Wing, Tuy Hoa Air Base, Republic of Vietman, and flew 244 combat missions in F-100s.

Returning to the United States in 1968, he served as a program manager in the Office of Aerospace Research, Washington, D.C., until June 1970. He was responsible for developing and obtaining support for the Air Force's basic and applied research program in space, solar, ionospheric and aeronomic research.

The general was then assigned to Headquarters U.S. Air Force Washington, D.C., as a research and development funding programmer. He consolidated the Air Force's annual research and development budget and he prepared material for defense of the budget in testimony before congressional authorization and appropriation committees. General Dreyer was also responsible for daily operations of Air Force research and development appropriations.

Following graduation from the Industrial College of the Armed Forces in June 1973, General Dreyer took command of the Air Force Reserve Officers' Training Corps detachment at North Texas State University in Denton, Texas.

In August 1975 he transferred to Headquarters Tactical Air Command, Langley Air Force Base, Va., as chief, F-16 System Management Office where he helped define the requirements for a new tactical fighter aircraft.

From May 1978 to June 1981, General Dreyer was commandant, Squadron Officer School, Air University, Maxwell Air Force Base, Alabama.

General Dreyer is a command pilot with 3,000 hours flying time. His military decorations and awards include the Silver Star, Legion of Merit, Distinguished Flying Cross with one oak leaf cluster, Bronze Star Medal, Meritorious Service Medal with one oak leaf cluster, Air Medal with 11 oak leaf clusters and Air Force Commendation Medal with one oak leaf cluster.

He was promoted to brigadier general March 1, 1981, with date of rank Feb. 24, 1981.

General Dreyer is married to the former Margaret Pelham of Graceville, Fla. They have two children: Catherine A. and Christian F. III.

DREYER, 2072A, United States Air Force, The Civil Engineer, Headquarters Air Force Logistics Command, Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Ohio, effective 31 May 1961 after more than twenty-nine years of active federal service.

BRIGADIER GENERAL DREYER was born in Cranford, New Jersey, 13 October 1906. He began his military career in an enlisted status 25 May 1927; was graduated from the United States Military Academy and commissioned a Second Lieutenant 10 June 1932. In 1937 he received his Master of Science in Engineering from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. During Warld War II he served in England, Ireland and Algeria, and in July 1943 was assigned to G-4 of the Army where he served as a member of the Joint Logistics Plans Committee. July 1945 he was assigned to Headquarters Armed Forces Western Pacific in Manila, and in 1947 returned to the Zone of Interior to attend the Armed Forces Industrial College. From July 1948 to June 1954 he served in various capacities with the Headquarters Command, both at Bolling Air Force Base and in Newfoundland. From June 1954 to June 1957 he served with the Strategic Air Command and in June 1957 was assigned to Headquarters United States Air Force as Director of Real Property, Office of the Assistant Chief of Staff for Installations. BRIGADIER GENERAL DREYER was appointed as The Civil Engineer, Headquarters Air Force Logistics Command, 1 September 1959.

During his distinguished military career, BRIGADIER GENERAL DREYER has been awarded the Legion of Merit with First Oak Leaf Cluster and the Commendation Ribbon.
