





MGA BONUS

MGA Monthly Bonus Program Anniversary

65 Percent and 70 Percent Contracts

Master General Agents are eligible for a monthly bonus equal to a percent of the monthly Net ALP on each Agent under them who meets a minimum production requirement, a Persistency and/or Net To Gross requirement. The MGA must also meet the Persistency and/or Net To Gross requirement with a minimum number of codes to be eligible.

The bonus is available on all Personal Producers, Supervising Agents and General Agents coded under their hierarchy. There is no maximum number of people who can receive a bonus.

Below are the guidelines for eligibility, and the bonus percentages to be paid based on the contract date of each eligible Agent:

- 1. The MGA must have a minimum of three codes in a rolling three month period, to be eligible for the MGA Bonus. A code for this purpose is an Agent who has produced a minimum of \$4,000 of Net ALP within their first 60 days. For new MGAs, we will allow them to qualify with one code of \$4,000 of Net ALP. After the initial 60 days is up we will require the MGA to have three codes with \$4,000 in a tolling three month period.
- 2. The MGA and a Personal Producer must have one point above the Company's average Net To Gross and one point above the Company's average Persistency to be eligible. Net to Gross will only be used through the seventh month. After seven months, both Persistency and Net To Gross will be required.
- 3. The MGA must have a minimum of three active Personal Producers, SAs or GAs coded to them to be eligible.

4. A Personal Producer must have a minimum of \$6,000 Net ALP for the month in order to count toward the MGA Bonus.





Michael Sacco is the President of the Seafarers International Union of North America, AFL-CIO, a federation of 18 autonomous unions representing 80,000 merchant mariner, industrial, service and government workers, and others in various professions. He was elected to this position by the SIUNA executive board in lune 1988.

Mr. Sacco is also the President of his home union, the SIUNA, an affiliated Seafarers International Union Atlantic, Gulf, Lakes and Inland Waters District (AGLIWD). The district's membership is composed of mariners, boatmen and fishermen working aboard U.S. flag deep sea ships, Great Lakes vessels and inland waters and harbor boats. In November 1991, at its Nineteenth

Biennial Constitutional Convention, Mr. Sacco was elected as Vice President of the AFL-CIO, the federation of 75 national and international unions representing more than 14 million workers in the United States.

Since 1988, Mr. Sacco has served as President of the AFL-CIO Maritime Trades Department, representing 32 unions with members engaged in

shipping and maritime related trades. He was re-elected to the post during the 1997 MTD Biennial Convention.

From 1976 to 1988, Mr. Sacco directed the SIU AGLIWD Great Lakes and Inland Waters Division as Vice President, Based in St. Louis, he served as Secretary/Treasurer of the Greater St. Louis Area and Vicinity Port Council (an MTD chartered organization), and as an Executive Board Member of the Missouri State AFL-CIO.

Michael Sacco was also the Vice. President of the Seafarers Harry Lundeberg School of Seamanship from 1968 to 1978. The school, located on the grounds of the Paul Hall Center for Maritime Training and Education in Pincy Point, Maryland, prepares young men and women for a career aboard U.S. flag commercial vessels and provides upgrading opportunities to active members.

Mr. Sacco joined the SIU in 1958 and served aboard U.S. flag merchant vessels until he came ashore during the 1960s to serve the SIU in a succession of union posts, including those of Patrolman, Port Agent and Headquarters representative.

A native of Brooklyn, New York, Michael Sacco served in the U.S. Air Force from 1954 to 1958. He and his wife, Sophie, have five children.
