Forget Ordinary — Think Extraordinary!

I want to take this opportunity to share my vision with the field. My purpose in doing this is to provide information which will keep everyone updated on exactly where we stand with our growth and recruiting objectives along with the efforts we have made, the effort we will need to make, and the potential we have to achieve these objectives.

Have you seen the commercial which says, "Nobody woke up today and said, I want to be ordinary?" "I want to be an ordinary teacher." "I want to be an ordinary cop." "I want to be an ordinary doctor." Nope, no one wants to be ordinary. Not me! Definitely not you!

This commercial struck home with me. The commercial's intent, of course, is to poke fun at the fact no one wants to be ordinary. but it also accentuates the fact not everyone has the potential to avoid being ordinary. This is because there are two things which will steer us away from being ordinary: our efforts, and our potential.

When I first saw this commercial, I honestly began to question if I was ordinary or if our company was some how becoming ordinary? Then I began to wonder what could be the reason that after four years of celebrating our growth we would be in the position we are now, re-evaluateing our methods? I soon realized that some of us may have actually become satisfied with being ordinary. However, let's consider for a moment what it would mean to forget ordinary and think extraordinary.

I want to go back now to the those two key components which measure success and failure, or rather separate ordinary from extraordinary - our effort and potential. As this formula will show, it doesn't matter how much you have of either without the other. Effort fails without meeting potential, and our potential cannot be realized without maximum effort.

I would like to share with you when I learned about potential. When I conched high school basketball, one year I had a team which was so good that I believed if we got past our season opening tip off tournament we probably wouldn't be truly tested until the state tournament. While it sounds like every coach's dream, there was one big concern I had at the start of the season. It dawned on me I had no idea what I was going to say to this team as we walked into the locker room twice a game for four months, knowing we would probably be up by 20 or have won by 40? Knowing this, I told the team not to evaluate themselves on the score of the game, but to look in the mirror and ask if they were meeting their own potential. I settled on telling them the score of the game would make little difference in the long run, but their success would come from putting their hearts on the floor for the entire game so they would have an opportunity to meet their individual and collective potential.

I felt this was the right concept to coach because someday there would be nothing we could do about playing against a bigger, more talented, or more experienced team, and if we lost at anytime to such a team, the only thing we would need to question was if we did the best we could have done? If our hearts and effort were there and we still lost, I believed we could walk away with our heads high. However, in order to do this, over the next four months they needed to know that the scoreboard would not determine their success or failure, but focusing in on giving their maximum effort was how they would be evaluated.

Seeing that commercial about being ordinary made me think of that team, then, it made me think about you and me, and American Income and National Income. I came to the conclusion that I won't tolerate us becoming an ordinary company, and I hope you feel the same. In fact, I won't accept ordinary, and I hope you won't either.

If we can jump from \$50 million to \$98 million and our resources haven't changed, I have to ask myself, "What has changed? What must change now to get us back on track to meet our potential?"

I believe there is no reason why we can't become a billion dollar a year company - we have that potential. To do that we need to believe that we can - no, we need to believe that we will -become the premier in-home-sales life insurance company. But, before this vision can become a reality, we must first ask ourselves, are we willing to put forth the effort, do we have the talent, and do we believe in ourselves? I believe that yes we are willing to put forth the effort, and we all know we do have the talent, but do we really believe in our potential? That answer won't be yes until we start to fear being ordinary.

You see, you need to believe in yourself before anyone else will. Just contact any member of that basketball team I told you about. They finished 26 and 0, and were the number one ranked team in New York State!

Together, let's start dreaming of what we can become. Let's pay attention and start thinking about growing by utilizing all of our non-traditional lead sources. Let's place emphasis on retaining those we code and growing a bigger, better, stronger PR team. In the end, let's fear the ordinary and start thinking about extraordinary!

If the "Good Health Statement" is not received with the request to reopen, we will ask you to submit one. Waiting for this statement delays the process at least two weeks, including your advance.

Reopening an application cannot be done in a day or two as the file must be ordered, MIB checked, and Underwriting must approve before it can be reopened. We cannot guarantee the case will be processed by end of month as we do not know what Underwriting might need for approval. However, if the reopen request is in Home Office by the 20th of the month, we will make every effort possible to have it processed by end of month.

· Get the Good Health Statement signed while you are in the home and send it with the delivery

· List all applications you wish to reopen on the

. If the application is over six months old, collect a new application and write "reopen" across the top of the application (if you don't write reopen across the top of a new application, it can be confused as new business and loaded with a new application number which can affect you).

· Reopened accident and health applications are redated with a current date which requires an endomement of the new policy date. We do not use

Living with Success and Yourself

You have worked hard, trained to become an expert on the products we offered, polished your recruiting skills, planned yourwork and worked your plan, and have finally arrived at the plannacle of success. Now, go ahead and take a bow. You deserve it!

However, it is important to realize that what you have achieved so far is the easy part. Now the real work starts! Therefore, if you thought it took a tremendous effort to achieve success, that is nothing compared to how difficult it will be for you to hang on to it.

Many of us have grown up being conditioned for rejection and learned quickly to cope with failure, but success is a rare commodity for which few are prepared. There are tons of books offering advice for getting to the top, but few offer guidance for staying on top. Most people fail to achieve success for the simple reason they are unwilling to pay the price demanded. Even fewer are comfortable living with success because they have become intimidated by the responsibility success brings — the responsibility of continuing to be successful, or continuing to grow.

Surviving success starts by being relentlessly aggressive in protecting your spirit of success. In doing that, you must first ask yourself this question, "Is there a way for me to recognize if my spirit is sliding off the slope of success into complacency, or am I maybe getting just a little bit lazy?" To answer that question, take a look at yourself and see if any of these warning signs seem to hit a little close to home:

- You may be losing your edge...when you find you are too busy to take the time for the little things you took the time for before.
- You may be losing your edge. . .when you perceive your success is predicated on what you have done rather than what you could do.
- You may be losing your edge...when getting better is not as important as keeping what you have.
- You may be losing your edge...If at first, your actions threatened competitors, and now, the actions of your competitors threaten you.
- You may be losing your edge. . . If paper work and planning become more important than the action steps taken during actual recruiting.

If any of these warning signs seem reminiscent of your attitude, then the spirit of your success may be sliding. Given this, now is the time to consider doing something about it. However, as you consider ways to protect and enhance your success, keep these three basic rules in mind:

- · Always act like a winner, but feel like an underdog.






