Bonus and Club Updates for 2006





#### New Agent Bonus:

The New Agent Bonus qualifications will change slightly for 2006 and new Agents will now be eligible to receive a bonus for the \$4,000 level in their first two months from their contract date rather than only in their code month. The second qualification level will increase from \$6,200 to \$6,300. All other qualifications will remain the same — Agents contracted in their first eight months are eligible for a bonus based on increasing percentages of Net ALP produced if the Agent meets the required Net to Gross requirement. Starting in the ninth month, an Agent is eligible for the Retention Bonus. Also, Agents can qualify for a supplemental bonus after the ninth (or 12th month) if their Four-Month Retention equals 68 percent or higher.

#### Retention Bonus:

Producers can earn a Retention Bonus based on Net ALP produced for the month, provided they have a 68 percent or higher Four-Month Retention starting in their ninth month. Also, all MGAs with a 65 percent contract or higher must qualify beginning at the \$7,500 or higher production levels.

In 2006, the Retention Bonus is increasing the minimum production requirement from \$6,200 to \$6,300 of Net ALP. However, it will allow that production level to qualify with a 68 percent Retention rather than 69 percent. The A&H portion of this bonus will continue and the qualifier can earn a portion of the A&H bonus with \$6,300 of production or higher rather than \$7,000.

#### President's & Founder's Club:

New perks have been added to the club qualifications for the President's Club and the Founder's Club. Therefore, we are pleased to announce we will be adding an additional bonus for both President's Club and Founder's Club qualifiers.

For each successive *President's Club* qualification, a qualifier is eligible for a 10 percent increase on the \$1,000 bonus. For each *Founder's Club* qualification, a \$500 bonus will be added.

Also, the *President's Club* minimum production requirement is increasing to \$105,000. All other requirement will for both bonuses will remain the same.

#### BR Bonus:

This bonus is available to the immediate up-line Manager of any Agent who is in their first six months with the Company. This would be the level two person in the Agent hierarchy. The bonus is equal to 100 percent of the New Agent Bonus that an Agent earns during their first six months. MGAs are also still eligible for the bonus on Agents they personally train.

#### Leadership Bonus Now the New "MGA Bonus:"

In 2006, the *Leadership Bonus* will become the the *MGA Bonus*, and SAs and GAs will no longer be eligibile to receive the monthly bonus. Other changes include the elimination of the requirement that an MGA have two Agents who earn a bonus in their first six months.

For this new bonus, MGAs are eligible to receive a bonus equal to the percent of the monthly Net ALP on each Producer under the MGA who have met minimum production requirements and a Retention and/or Net to Gross requirement. However, MGAs can now qualify for 75 percent of the monthly bonus with one code in the month and 100 percent with two codes, and is available on all personal production of Individual Producers, SAs, or GAs coded under their hierarchies. Please note that a new code is still considered a new Agent with \$1,000 of Gross ALP and there is now no maximum number of Producers on which an MGA can receive a bonus. Also, any bonus recipient will be considered a qualifying Agent in 2006 — whether they qualify at the \$4,000 or \$6,300 level.

#### Regional General Agent Bonus:

The basic requirements for the Regional General Agent Bonus will remain the same for 2006.

For each new MGA (coded on an MGA contract December 2004 and after) coded under an RGA, the RGA is eligible for a monthly bonus equal to 10 precent of the MGA Bonus earned by the MGA. The RGA must have the required quality factor (Retention or Net to Gross) to be eligible for the bonus. RGAs are eligible for the bonus for as long as they continue to manage the MGA.

#### Public Relations Bonus:

A new *Public Relations Bonus* will be taking effect Jan. 1, 2006 for PR Reps in their first year (based on Cards). The Card accumulations are from their contract date, and to be eligible, the Representative must reach the Card Credit levels within the first 12-months from their contract date.

Also, starting Jan. 1, 2006, a new bonus for PR Representatives will be implemented which will pay a bonus for each original Card Credit they generate. A PR Representative will be eligible, regardless of whether they normally receive a bonus on Cards or Groups, to receive a bonus of \$1.50 for each original Card credited during the calendar month.

A monthly bonus is also available on Cards or Groups generated year-to-date (we will default to Card qualification unless a PR Rep elects to receive a bonus on Groups). This bonus will be determined monthly on the Cards or Groups credited year-to-date from Jan. 1, 2006 through the end of the monthly bonus period being evaluated.



# The Power of Thinking Big

We had the opportunity to sit down with one of our new up and coming SGAs, Chris Hernandez, to find out what has made him a great success. He shared with us — and now you — some great insights and perspectives on how he works his business and makes his business work for him. Here is what he had to say:



- 1. How do you feel about the opportunity of becoming a new SGA?

  Honestly, the first month I was dazed and confused. But now, I feel absolutely excited.

  This is what opportunity unlimited is all about!
- 2. To what do you attribute your success?

  I attribute my success to three things. First, being determined to succeed with the understanding that I might fail time to time along the way. . and making sure that I "fail forward." Second, I was fortunate enough to learn from Scott Smith who knew how to implement systems and work the numbers. He also taught me the power of loyalty. . . if you're loyal to your Agency then they will be more likely to reciprocate. Third, my parents taught me that you only have one chance at life. . . so make it count!
- 3. How do you motivate your Managers and Agents?

  I imagine I have similar bonuses that a lot of SGAs have, such as the money draws, auctions, give aways, trips, dinners, etc. But I also found that you need to know where your Agents and Managers want to go so you can help them get there. If every day they are closer to where they want to be, then they will stay motivated. I believe it is also important to communicate with your Agency and show them that you care!
- 4. What are your future plans to grow and build your Agency?

  I'm opening a satellite office in El Paso, and as Roger says, "more leads and more Agents equals more production." Therefore, I'm going to get more Agents and more leads!
- 5. The theme for the November SGA Meeting was "How bad do you want it? How bad do you need it?" So, how bad do you want it? How bad do you need it?

I moved 1,888 miles two months after I moved into my first home which I spent three months renovating prior to moving in! That should be an initial indication on how bad I want it. How bad do I need it. . . well, I need it so bad that I made sure I gave props to the Vice President of the company three questions ago — just kidding. I need it as much as one needs oxygen!

6. Why do you think AIL/NILICO is unique or special?

American Income and National Income are unique because they don't have that glass ceiling that so many other careers have. As cliche as it sounds, American Income and National Income offer the sky as a limit. The more you put into your career, the more it will give back to you. I have talked to a lot of applicants in the four and half years that I have been with the Company and I have beard all the reasons that people have left their old employers. I have heard the stories about limited pay, little room for advancement, lay-offs, downsizing, lack of recognition, etc. None of these apply to the opportunity one has with American Income and National Income.

# What? It's 2006 Already?

My calendar has predicted for many days now that Jan. 1, 2006 is on it's way. Has yours?

Too often, I speak with Agents and Agency leaders about what their ambitions are for the new year, and it seems a large portion of the answers involve giant steps scheduled for February, March, or even April. It is as if playing catch-up or operating within a nine or ten-month time frame makes for a more exciting finish in some cases.

The fact of the matter is if any preparations are needed for 2006, they should be done *before* 2006 actually arrives. You may have your goals prepared for the new year, but are you prepared to have your plan of execution in place on Dec. 31, 2005?

You see, a sheet of goals is worthless without a plan of exactly how you are going to achieve them. A step-by-step, day-by-day, week-by-week game plan is the real key to achieving those 2006 goals.

Given that, just where do you stand for 2006? Setting goals is an internal completion. It's you against yourself. It's not like someone else can step in and take away your goals. But your goals certainly won't be coming to you, asking to be captured. Therefore, it is up to you to determine the goals, prepare the game plan, execute the game plan on a daily basis, determine a method to measure victory daily and to measure "plan-to-date" standings, and most importantly, create a method to keep yourself motivated.

I get frustrated when someone tells me they had a bad day. You mean all day — all 24-hours of it — was bad? And, exactly how do you pull off a bad month? A bad week? I say this because I cannot even grasp a bad day. In this business, you are really only entitled to a bad appointment. Every appointment represents another first chance, and every first chance represents a fresh opportunity and it is up to you to motivate yourself that way!

I understand the motivation part of this business can be the most frustrating, because there will be some down times when you just feel like giving up. But you know what? *Today* you don't feel like giving up! So, why not develop something right now that will help you tackle those down moments? Maybe it's a picture of your family or a picture of the car you plan to purchase. Maybe it is a photo of that next vacation spot, or maybe it's a favorite song that waits to be cued up! Whatever it is, use it and get motivated.

Going back to our 2006 goals, imagine a goal that can be measured. As an Agent, it can be an amount of Net ALP. As a Manager, it can be how many Agents that you will be adding to your team. It may be what your contract is at the end of the year or how many promotions you receive. All of these are what I call "self-contained goals." They are goals which if not achieved, you have only yourself to ask why.

On the other hand, there are goals which are not self-contained and I prefer to stay away from these type of goals because they give you minimal control over the outcome due to so many other factors tied to them. For example, what if your goal is to finish in the top ten and you are determined that you need to write \$175,000 Net ALP to be in the top ten? Now, imagine a scenario where you write \$185,000, but finish 15th. You exceeded your self-contained goal of \$175,000 Net ALP, but now you are frustrated because you didn't finish in the top ten. Tell me, would you celebrate or would you feel defeated? It has to be the most frustrating feeling to actually exceed your own expectations but not meet the goal!


Wow! With the new year approaching, there is a lot to think about — goals, game plans, execution, self-contained goals, Company goals, motivation, frustration, bad days, good days, ambitions, preparation, and family! It's all up to you; don't let the year start without you.

# A Bittle History on Boca Raton

The meaning of the name Boca Raton has always aroused curiosity. Many people wrongly assume the name is simply "rat mouth." The Spanish word boca (or mouth) often described an inlet, while raton (literally mouse) was used as a term for a cowardly thief. But the "thieves inlet," Bocal Ratones, appeared on 18th Century maps associated with an inlet in the Biscayne Bay area of Miami. By the beginning of the 19th Century, the term was mistakenly applied to Lake Boca Raton, whose inlet was closed at the time. The "s" and later the "e" were dropped from this title, yet the correct pronunciation remains Rah-tone.

The earliest known inhabitants of the Boca Raton area were the Tequesta Indians, who lived in communities near the ocean. However, the construction of the Florida East Coast Canal (today's Intracoastal) and the Florida East Coast Railway in the 1890s made the region accessible to a group of resourceful pioneers. By the early 1900s Boca Raton was a tiny agricultural community, many of the farmers specializing in pineapple cultivation.

In May 1925, the Town of Boca Raton was incorporated at the height of the Florida land boom, the town council commissioned noted society architect Addison Mizner to plan a world-class resort community. His exclusive hotel, known as the Cloister Inn, was completed in 1926 and continues its reign as a city landmark as the Boca Raton Resort & Club. Although many of Mizner's plans for the young community were squelched by the demise of the land boom in 1926, a few survive today — and his architectural style still continues to influence the city.
