Adapting To & Surviving Change

Before I get into my comment this month, I think now is a good time to express my thanks for all you do for American Income and National Income. I really wanted to take this opportunity to let you know I admire your dedication, commitment, and perseverance in all that you do — we are a success because you are a success.

The past several years I have made reference to many topics — from family anecdotes to art and culture; I have incorporated all of them in one way, shape, or form into my speeches and my monthly magazine comments.

Having said that, I watched a movie recently that reminded me of our field force. The name of the movie is Eight Below. The movie takes place in Antarctica, the coldest continent on Earth reaching almost 50 helow in the dead of winter. This frigid land is only bearable for visitors, mostly scientists, in the summer months. This is where the movie starts. It is late January, early February, and summer in the Southern Hemisphere is coming to a close. The setting is the American substation in Antarctica. The team stationed there is facing a fast approaching storm — early, but it's the first one of the winter — and the team is required to evacuate the station. The window of opportunity for evacuation is small, leaving them no time to properly close the station and forcing them to leave eight working sled dogs behind.

This is where the story evolves as one man struggles with leaving his team — his dogs — behind. Finally after an intense struggle and much persuasion, he is able to return to the substation 175 days later. To this man's surprise — he was prepared for the worst — he finds six of his eight dogs have survived with very limited resources in the rugged, non-hospitable Antarctic environment.

I believe this story correlates to our field force for two reasons.

First, this is a great story of survival, beating the odds to make it in a hostile and inhospitable environment. Though we do not work in such an environment, there are times when it seems we have very limited resources — especially time — with which to do what we need. Given this, it is amazing that together we have beat the odds and made American Income and National Income the Company we want it to be — and we continue to do this every day. We all face challenges and obstacles, and our field force above all has managed that with ease and grace making your individual and collective success your own.

The second reason is that there seems to be a strong correlation with the main character. He took what was most important to him and put it above all else. He took a risk to get back to his team. That same tenacity and drive which shows through this character can be applied to our field force. In the end, I know you have combined beart and passion with dedication, by knowing what you want and then going out and getting it!

Surviving is really all about adaptation. We all must adapt and move forward to beat the odds. I speak of adaptation and survival because, though not directly related, we all survive, incorporate, and adapt on a daily basis. Effective Jan. 1, 2006, to be eligible for bonuses and featured in Spotlight, Producers must meet the required Retention or the minimum Net to Gross. Net to Gross varies based on bonus guidelines. The rates listed below are for Spotlight recognition only. Net to Gross is used only during the Producer's first eight months.

Get Your Materials Reviewed

Our Company policy requires all materials your Agency may be using, if not provided by AIL or NILICO, to be forwarded to our office for review. All lead letters must be approved prior to mailing.

In addition to lead letters, any forms used, presentations, phone scripts, or letters sent to a policyholder regarding AIL or NILICO should be sent to Home Office for review. Once we complete the review, we will send you approval confirmation.

"Code of Ethics" Addition

A "code of ethics" document has been part of the Canadian set-up kit for some time. It basically describes ethical practices — things the Agent should and should not do when selling insurance.

Some states are now implementing requirements that this type of document be provided to Agents. This document also serves to remind Agents that business absolutely must be conducted in an ethical manner. Therefore, a "code of ethics" document has been added to the set-up kit for all U.S. Agents.

Transmitting Business to Home Office

It is important to use a transmittal sheet and complete all of the requested information such as Agent name, Agent number, SGA name, and state when sending new business to the Home Office.

- New Agents should use a TBA transmittal sheet in order to get the information to Agency quickly for processing. A TBA sheet should also be used when an Agent contract is attached.
- End of Month or End of Quarter business should be listed on an End of Month Transmittal.
- List all applications on the transmittal, each on a separate line:
- * Combo applications list every sale on a separate line. Life, accident, hospital, and cancer should each be on their own lines.
- When you have a rider addition, check the "add-on conversion" hox on the transmittal and make sure to write "Add On" or "Conversion" on the top of the application.
- "If you have an ALT-XPL, write "ALT/XPL" beside the name on the transmittal and at the top of the application. Also, put an "X" in the last column of the transmittal to indicate "ALT-XPL."
- If you have an ALT-DCL write "ALT-DCL" beside the name on the transmittal and on the top of the application. Put a "D" in the last column to indicate "ALT-DCL."
- If you have a controlled business application, write "Controlled Business" at the top of the application and put a "C" in the last column of the transmittal to indicate controlled business.
- Use every line on the transmittal. Do not skip lines between the applicant's names.
- Use one staple to hold a family's business together.
 Everything required for the applications such as questionnaires, CWA checks, and voided checks can be held with just one staple. Please do not staple the voided check to the back of the application.

Andy Stern President SEIT

Andy Stern, President of SEIU, has been unanimously elected to the Labor Advisory Board.

Service Employees International Union (SEIU) has become the largest health care union, including hospitals, nursing homes, and home care; the largest property services union, including building cleaning and security; and the second largest public employee union.

Andy Stern began his union career in 1973 as a state social service worker and rank-and-file member of SEIU Local 668. He became the first elected full-time president of the local when he was 27, and two years later in 1980 was named to the union's International Executive Board. In 1984, he began overseeing the organizing and field services programs, and in 1996 was elected SEIU's International President.

Andy is determined to build a truly global union designed to meet modern challenges and help ensure workers, not just CEOs, benefit from today's global economy. His philosophy has led SEIU to abandon the traditional local and regional approach to organizing in favor of a 21st century, industrybased global model that works with unions in other countries that share common employers. He envisions partnerships between multinational companies and labor to raise wages and standards for workers, while helping businesses become more competitive in America and internationally.

An aggressive advocate for a health care system that helps U.S. companies compete worldwide while providing quality, affordable coverage to every American, Andy Stern has also invited business leaders to partner with SEIU in the national political arena to establish a more efficient, cost-effective model to replace our ailing employer-based structure. His commitment to the issue also led Stern to create SEIU's Americans for Health Care project, a grassroots network to make health care a top political priority in key states across the country.

We welcome Mr. Stern to the Labor Advisory Board and are looking forward to a long and prosperous partnership for many years to come.



2001 (SO) Charges What This Means for You

What does it mean "2001 CSO Changes?"

We have been working on adjusting our policies for the new mortality tables. These adjustments will allow for more competitive rates for non-smokers. These changes have become necessary because every 20 years or so, industry standard mortality tables used to compute policy reserves, cash values and other factors change. These changes require companies to readjust these factors in accordance with the change in the mortality table, and thus, requires the company to refile life products with state departments of insurance. This refiling process allows the department of insurance to review the adjustments and approve the changes made.

Guaranteed Insurability Option

In addition to the 2001 CSO changes, we are also pleased to announce the increase of the Guaranteed Insurability Option Rider from \$15,000 to \$25,000. This rider has no death benefit itself. but guarantees the insured the right to buy additional whole life insurance coverage on future option dates without evidence of insurability (no medical history questions required when the options are exercised) for up to \$25,000 each option date. The option dates occur at age 25, 28, 31, 34, 37, and 40. These dates can be advanced at first marriage and birth or legal adoption of a child. The rider can only be attached to whole life insurance policies. With six option dates, the increase of permanent coverage could be up to \$150,000 without evidence of insurability. The cost of the rider will be issue ages 0 to 17 at 21.67 per month, and 18 to 37 at \$3.34 per month. This is an excellent rider to add to all juvenile sales as it allows the insured the opportunity to on the option dates without evidence of insurability.  a profession, business successes, etc.


