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PREFACE

Under the authority contained in Section 5 of the Act of February 27, 1901, creating the Alabama Department of Archives and History, this volume has been prepared and published. The Section is as follows:

"An official and statistical register of the State of Alabama shall be compiled every two¹ years by the Director, to contain (1) brief sketches of the several state officials, the members of Congress from Alabama, the Supreme Court Judges, the members of the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of Alabama; (2) rosters of all State and County officials; (3) lists of all institutions, with officials; (4) State and County population statistics; and (5) miscellaneous statistics; and said register shall be published in an edition of one thousand copies for free distribution, the printing and binding hereinbefore provided."


The object of the publications is to present in statistical form the details of the organization of the State government, lists and sketches of officials, and such miscellaneous data on the State and its affairs as may be of helpful service. All names and dates are drawn from as authoritative or official sources as possible; no facts not believed to be reliable have been admitted. Because of an initial delay in publication, it was determined to delay longer following the death of the late Governor Lurleen B. Wallace. An effort was made to include all administrative changes in various State departments and institutions through June 30, 1968. Thus the information may be considered exactly current as of July 1 of the same year.

The Director is indebted to many people for the information supplied, but most notably to Mrs. Mabel Amos, Mr. J. Stanley Frazer, Mr. McDowell Lee, Mr. John Pemberton and members of their staffs. To secretaries to various state officials who patiently compiled biographical data I am particularly grateful. Mr. John K. Danziger, Miss Patricia Sweet, and Mrs. Annie Lee Mills of the Archives staff have toiled long over preparing the copy and checking the proof with meto them my thanks.

Throughout the country books of this character are regarded as of first importance. It is hoped that this volume will prove not only of immediate use and value, but that it will be a permanent contribution to the official literature of Alabama. The last issue was published in 1963. 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INTRODUCTION

STATE NAME

The etymology of the word or name Alabama has evoked much discussion among American philological students. It was the name of a noted Southern Indian tribe, whose habitat, when first known to Europeans, was in central Alabama. The greatest river in the State received its name from this tribe, and from the river, in turn, the name of the State was derived. The tribal name Alabama is spelled in various ways by the early chroniclers, Spanish, French and English, some of which forms are here given: Alabama, Albama, Alebamon, Alibama, Alibamo, Alibamou, Alibamon, Alabamu, Allibamou. The name first occurs in three of the chronicles of DeSoto's expedition, of 1540, written Alibamo by LaVega, Alibamu by the Knight of Elvas, and Limamu by Ranjel. In the last form the initial vowel is dropped, and in both the last two the first "m" is used for "b", an interchange of these two consonants being common in Indian languages. The name, as recorded by these chroniclers, in this case, was the name of a subdivision of the Chickasaws, not the historic Alabamas of later times.

The popular belief, which is engrafted in a number of current histories and geographies, is that Alabama signifies, "Here we rest." This very pleasing etymology, during the fifties of the last century, obtained a wide currency through the writings of Judge A. B. Meek. But the very first account of the origin of the name as far as is now known, is contained in an issue of the Jacksonville Republican, Jacksonville, Ala., July 27, 1842. Whether Judge Meek himself was the author of this etymology, traced back to this source, is a question as yet unanswered.

As to the Muscogee origin of the name, thorough experts in that dialect have confessed their inability to find in it any word or phrase similar to Alabama and meaning "Here we rest."

But the problem is not hopeless. According to the recent investigations of Indianologists, the tribal name, Alabama, must be sought in the Choctaw tongue, as it was not uncommon for tribes to accept, as a national or tribal name, an appellation bestowed upon them by some contiguous tribe. The late Rev. Allen Wright, a highly educated Choctaw, translates the name as "Thicket-clearers," compounded of "Alba," a thick or mass of vegetation, and "amo" to clear, to collect, to gather up.

H. S. Halbert by independent study, about the same time, arrived at the same conclusion as that given by Mr. Wright, and translates the name as "Vegetation-gatherers," that is, gatherers of vegetation in clearing land for agricultural purposes. The word "alba" means such small vegetation as herbs, plants, shrubs and bushes, which were gathered in clearing land, and the word can be applied collectively to a thicket. Hence the translation as given by the Rev. Allen Wright and that of Mr. Halbert practically agree. The passive voice of amo is almo. In elaborating his views in defense of his position, Mr. Halbert gives two examples of Choctaw local names, "Kantak almo" and "Oski almo, meaning respectively, "China brier there gathered, and Cane there gathered." If the tribes or clans living at these localities had received special names from their avocations, they would have been known as Kantakamo and Oskamo, just as the noted Indian tribe in the pre-historic past could well have received the name Alba amo by fusion of vowels Albamo, from some neighboring Choctaw-speaking tribe, not yet emerged from the hunting into the agricultural state.

Confirmatory of the position of Rev. Allen Wright and the independent conclusions of Mr. Halbert, the definitions of "alba" and "amo" in Rev. Cyrus Byington's "Dictionary of the Choctaw Language" are given below. The manuscript of this work, prepared prior to 1856, has been published by the Bureau of American Ethnology, under the editorial direction of Dr. John R. Swanton and Mr. Halbert. The words and their definitions are as follows:

"alba, n., vegetation; herbs; plants; weeds.

"amo, v. t. pl. to pick; to pull; to trim; to mow; to reap, Matt. 6:25; to cut; to clip; to gather, Luke 6:44; to cut off; to crop; to rid; to shear; to slip; panki an aiamo, gather grapes of, Matt. 7:16; shumati akon aiamo, gather of thistles; tabli, sing.

"amo, n., a gatherer; a picker; a shearer."

It is an interesting fact that the late Dr. Albert S. Gatchet's, *Creek Migration Legend*, p. 85, accepts the etymology of Rev. Allen Wright as above set forth.

Dr. Wm. S. Wyman, of Tuscaloosa, one of the best known students of the State, inclined to the belief that the word means *Mulberry people* He says that on the oldest French maps the Alabama river is called "Coussa," from which he conjectures that the name Alabama was first given to it by the French, after they built Fort Toulouse in 1714. He says further that in Tristan de Luna's time (1559) the river was sometimes called "Olibahah," or "Ullibali," which is pretty close to the French form, "Alibamon," or "Alabamo." In the language of the Alabama tribe he says that "Ullebehalli" means *Mulberry* people.

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Inquiry among the early Indians themselves appears to have been without results as to the meaning of the word. Gen. Thomas S. Woodward in his fascinating book *Reminiscences of* the Creek or Muscogee Indians, p. 12, says "I had heard Col. Hawkins say in his time, that he had made every inquiry in his power to ascertain if Alabama had any other meaning than the mere name of an Indian town, but never could, unless the name—as it was possible—might be the Indian corruption of the Spanish word for good water, though he doubted that."

Discarding then, "Here we rest" as something philologically untenable but retaining it as something that may hold its own in the realm of poetry and romance, we may look forward with confidence to the investigations of scholars which may fully solve the mystery of the name. And until supplanted by something upon which not a shadow of doubt may rest, we may for the present be content with the "Vegetation-gatherers," who in their aboriginal field-making, were surely and necessarily "Thicket-clearers."

The suggested etymology may be thought a trifle prosaic as compared with the romantic expression, heretofore associated with the Indian ana-basis from the west, but in truth it is quite as poetic, besides, it far more nearly represents the character of Alabamians, both in the past and in the present era of growth, when with uplifted aspirations and clear vision they are opening the way to newer ideals and the development of the best in life and human endeavor.

STATE BOUNDARIES

Alabama is bounded on the north by Tennessee, east by Georgia, south by Florida and the Gulf of Mexico, and west by the State of Mississippi. The several sections of the Code of Alabama, 1940, containing a description of the State boundaries, with reference to the decisions of the courts thereon from the Code of Alabama, 1923, are as follows:

Tit. 55 § 16. (85) (83) (623) (12) (16) (15) Boundaries of State—The boundaries of this State are established and declared to be as follows, that is to say: Beginning at the point where the thirty-first degree of north latitude crosses the Perdido river; thence east to the western boundary line of the State of George; thence along said line to the southern boundary line of the State of Tennessee. Thence west along the southern boundary line of the State of Tennessee, crossing the Tennessee river, and on to the second intersection of said river by said line; thence up said river to the mouth of Big Bear Creek; thence by a direct line, to the northwest corner of Washington county, in this State as originally formed; thence southerly along the line of the State of Mississippi to the Gulf of Mexico; thence eastwardly, including all islands within six leagues of the shore, to the Perdido river; and thence up the said river to the beginning.

Note.—A strip twelve miles wide on the northern part of the State was ceded by South Carolina to the United States, and then granted to the Mississippi Territory.

§ 17. (86) (84) (624) (13) (17) (16) Boundary Between Alabama and Georgia—The boundary line between Alabama and Georgia commences on the west side of the Chattahoochee river, at the point where it enters the State of Florida; from thence up the river, along the western bank thereof, to the point on Miller's Bend, next above the place where the Uchee creek empties into such river; thence in a direct line to the Nickajack.

(Clay's Digest, p. 48, par. 9) In Howard v. Ingersoll, 17 Ala. 780, the boundary of the State, it was held commenced at a low-water mark, on the west side of the Chattahoochee river, from the point where it enters the present State of Florida, to the "great bend" next above the place where the Uchee creek empties into the said river. In other words, low-water mark on the west side of the Chattahoochee river was the line which separated the jurisdiction of the State of Alabama from the State of Georgia. On writ of error to the Supreme Court of the United States, the decision was reversed, a majority of the court holding that the boundary line between the two States, was not low-water mark on the west side of the Chattahoochee river, but a line running up the river on and along its western bank, and that the jurisdiction of Georgia extended to the line which is washed by the water wherever it covers the bed of the river within its banks. The permanent fast land bank governs the line. From the lower edge of the bank the bed of the river commences, and the jurisdiction of Georgia extends to the lower edge of the bank on the west side of the river. Nelson and Grier, JJ., dissenting, held that the true boundary line between the States of Georgia and Alabama, was not a line drawn on the bank or bluff of the river, at high-water mark, but the line marked by the permanent bed of the river, by the flow of water at its usual accustomed stage, and where the water will be found at all times in the season, except when diminished by droubht or swollen by freshet.-Howard v. Ingersoll, 13 Howard 381.

The boundary line between the States of Georgia and Alabama depends upon the construction of the following words of the contract of cession between the United States and Georgia, describing the boundary of the latter, namely: "West of a line beginning on the western bank of the Chattahoochee river, where the same crosses the boundary between the United States and Spain, running up the said river, and along the western bank thereof."—State of Alabama v. State of Georgia, 23 Howard U. S. 505.

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Boundaries of Mississippi Territory, Toulmin's Digest, p. 76; territory ceded by Georgia, Toulmin's Digest, p. 77; territory called Alabama; Toulmin's Digest, p. 78. (Aiken's Digest, p. 29, par. 4; p. 30, par. 6; Clay's Digest, p. 47, par. 4; p. 48, par. 6.)

"It is the opinion of this court that the language implies that there is ownership of soil and jurisdiction in Georgia, in the bed of the river Chattahoochee, and that the bed of the river is that portion of its soil which is alternately covered and left bare, as there may be an increase or diminution in the supply of water, and which is adequate to contain it as its average and mean stage during the entire year, without reference to extraordinary freshets of the winter and spring, or the extreme drought of summer or autumn."—It.

The western line of the cession on the Chattahoochee river must be traced on the water-line of the acclivity of the western bank, and along that bank where that is defined; and in such places on the river where the western bank is not defined, it must be continued up the river on the line of its bed, as that is made the average and mean stage of the water, as that is expressed in the conclusion of the above recited paragraph."—Ib.

By the contract of cession, the navigation of the river is free to both parties.—Ib.

§ 18. (87) (85) (625) 14 (14) (18) (17) Boundary Between Alabama and Florida.—The boundary line between Alabama and Florida is the line commonly known as the "mound line," or Ellicott's line," as distinguished from a "blazed line," known as the "Upper" or "Coffee line," commencing at a point on the Chattahoochee river, near a place known as "Irwin's Mills;" and from thence to the Perdido river, marked the whole distance by blazes on the trees and by mounds of earth, at distances of about one mile.

§ 18 (1). Same; at mouth of Perdido river and adjacent thereto.—The state of Alabama hereby ratifies, confirms and adopts the recommendations of the joint committee heretofore appointed by the governor of Florida and the governor of Alabama to locate and mark the boundary line between the said states at the mouth of Perdido river and adjacent thereto, said committee consisting of Honorable Richard W. Ervin, Honorable Richard H. Simpson, Honorable Philip D. Beall and Honorable F. C. Elliot, all on the part of the state of Florida, and Honorable Earl M. McGowin, Honorable W. C. Pruett and Honorable William N. McQueen, all on the part of the state of Alabama. (1953, p. 547, 1, appvd. Aug. 28, 1953.)

§ 18 (2). Same precise location.—In accordance with the recommendations of the said joint committee, the boundary at the location referred to in section 18(1) of this title shall be as follows, to-wit:

The middle of the Peridido river at its mouth, as defined by the constitutions of the states of Alabama and Florida, is at latitude 30° 16' 53" north and longtitude 87° 31' 06" west as the control point; That the boundary line at the mouth of Perdido river is fixed, as nearly as may be, in the axis of the mouth of said river, passing through the control point and running north and south and having as its northern terminus a point of latitude 30° 17' 02" north and longtitude 87° 31' 06" west, and as its southern terminus a point 1,000 feet due south of the control point;

That from the northern terminus of the boundary line at the mouth of the river, the boundary up the lower portion of said river be a straight line to a point at latitude 30° 18' 00" north, longtitude 87° 27' 08" west, thence by a straight line to a point in the center line of the Intracoastal Canal at longitude 87° 27' 00" east;

That the seaward boundary between Florida and Alabama extends from the south end of the boundary line at the mouth of Perdido river, thence south 0° 01' 00" west to the seaward limit of each respective state;


And shall be deemed, taken and declared, and hereby deemed, taken and declared to be the boundary line between the states of Florida and Alabama, at the mouth of the Perdido river and adjacent thereto, and shall be deemed and taken as such by the authorities and people of this state, upon the adoption and ratification thereof by the state of Florida. (1953, p. 547, 2, appvd. Aug. 28, 1953.)

§ 18 (3). Same; when effective.—The secretary of state shall transmit a duly certified copy of sections 18(1)-18(5) to the governor of the state of Florida and the governor of Alabama, whenever officially advised that the state of Florida has ratified, confirmed and adopted the recommendations of the joint committee aforesaid, shall make proclamation of that fact including in such proclamation the boundary as set out in section 18(2) above, and proclaiming that henceforth the said boundary shall be taken by all the authorities and people of this state as the true and only boundary between the states of Florida and Alabama at the mouth of the Perdido river and adjacent thereto. A copy of said proclamation shall be published one time in a newspaper published in Montgomery, Alabama, and in such other newspapers of the state as the governor may direct. Failure to publish such proclamation shall in no way affect the validity and effectiveness of sections 18(1)-18(5). (1953, p. 548, 3, appvd. Aug. 28, 1953.)

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§ 18 (4). Same; consent of congress requested.—The congress of the United States is petitioned to give its consent to the settlement and location of the above described portion of the common boundary between the states of Florida and Alabama, pursuant to clause 3, section 10, article 1 of the Constitution of the United States, as soon as the state of Florida has ratified, confirmed and adopted the recommendations of the joint committee aforesaid. The secretary of state of the state of Alabama shall transmit duly certified copies of sections 18(1)-18(5) to the presiding officers of the senate and house of representatives of the United States and to the several senators and representatives from the states of Alabama and Florida to the congress of the United States, who are hereby petitoned to take such action as they deem proper to procure the consent of the congress of the United States to this compact or agreement between the states of Alabama and Florida. (1953, p. 548, 4, appvd. Aug. 28, 1953.)

§ 18 (5). Same; individual rights not affected.—Nothing contained in sections 18(1)-18(4), nor any operations of the provisions of said sections, shall prejudice the rights or claims of private individuals to any of the lands herein involved. (1953, p. 548, 5, appvd. Aug. 28, 1953.)





STATE CAPITOL

During its existence as a Territory and State, since March 3, 1817, Alabama has had several capitals. St. Stephens was designated in the act creating the Territory as the temporary seat of government, and there the two sessions of the Territorial legislature were held. The first Constitutional Convention was held, in accordance with the enabling act, in Huntsville in 1819, and the first session of the State Legislature was also held there.

The Territorial Legislature, however, had chosen Cahaba as the site for the capital of the State, and the second session of the Legislature was held there in 1820. Cahaba was designated as the seat of government in the Constitution, but the Legislature was required at the session of 1825-26 "to designate by law (to which the executive concurrence shall not be required) the permanent seat of government, which shall not thereafter be changed." Cahaba proved to be a very poor and injudicious selection, owing to health conditions, and to its situation, being subject to overflow. In 1826 Tuscaloosa was chosen as the location of the capital, and there it remained until the session of 1845-46. At this time, after a sharp contest between many rival towns, Montgomery was selected. The session previous had proposed a constitutional amendment, striking out the section permanently locating the seat of government, and this amendment had been adopted at the polls.


In selecting Montgomery the Legislature expressly provided by act that the State should be put to no expense in securing lands or in the erection of a capitol building. The citizens of the town at once organized, under the leadership of Col. Charles T. Pollard, Col. A. J. Pickett and others, secured the site, and began the erection of a buildng. Bonds for \$75,000.00 were issued by the municipality to pay for construction. These bonds were taken up by local real estate dealers and by local capitalists. The plan of the new capitol was drawn by Stephen D. Button; and the contractors were Messrs. B. F. Robinson and R. W. R. Bardwell. It was completed and occupied by the Legislature at its session of 1847-48, the first session held in Montgomery. On December 14, 1849, during the second session held in Montgomery, the building was destroyed by fire. On February 11, 1850, the Legislature made an appropriation of \$60,000.00, with which the central section of the present building was erected substantially on the foundations of the burned structure.

During the administration of Gov. William H. Smith several improvements were made, which added convenience and beauty to the lower floor of the building.

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From the time of its completion in 1851 until 1885 no increase in its capacity had been made. In the latter year, Feb. 17, the Legislature made an appropriation of \$25,000.00 for "needed enlargement." This expenditure resulted in the erection of the rear extension.

In 1903 the Legslature appropriated \$150,000.00 with which the South end of the Capital Square was purchased and the South wing erected in 1905-06; and in 1911 an appropriation of \$100,000.00 was made with which a North wing was added. STATE SEAL



GREAT SEAL OF ALABAMA


Used for the first fifty years of the State's history. Readopted as the Great Seal of Alabama by the Legislature of 1939.

When William Wyatt Bibb in 1817, was appointed Governor of the newly created Alabama Territory by President Monroe and opened Territorial offices in St. Stephens, he realized commissions that the and other State papers which he issued needed an official seal. Under law of Congress a **Territorial Governor was** authorized to select a design for a seal. Governor Bibb realized that no design would be more effective than a map of the State showing its noble river courses. He therefore had a seal made carrying that design. Around the map which also showed the States bounding Alabama, were the words "Alabama Executive Office." No other Department of State used that seal in any way whatever.

In 1819 when Alabama became a State, the Territorial seal was designated by the first Legislature as the State Seal, and was in use for fifty years. In 1868, the Reconstruction Legislature, made up in large part of men from other States who had come to Alabama as "Carpetbaggers" to take over the affairs of the State, after the War Between the States, and partly of Negroes who had been put in the Legislature by these out-of-State men, the beautiful old seal which was definitely an Alabama emblem was abolished. These "Carpetbag" members of the Legislature who abolished the State's significant old seal desired to brand the people of Alabama who had so lately been in arms against the Union with a United States emblem. The Legislature therefore had a new seal made. It consisted of the shield of the United States seal and on the shield was an eagle. In the beak of the eagle was a scroll on which was written the words "Here We Rest." An Alabama author many years before had written an Indian legend which he later declared was purely fictious, to the effect that the Indian word "Alabama" meant "Here We Rest." Later students of the subject declared that Alabama meant "This is a goodly land, here we will make our home." Around the new emblem were placed the words "Alabama Great Seal." This Great Seal was used for seventy-one years to authenticate official documents by the Governor and the Secretary of State. Many officials used it as the letterhead of their stationery.

When the Legislature of 1939 assembled, a Bill was introduced to restore the original seal as the Great Seal of Alabama. This movement had been sponsored by the Alabama Division, United Daughters of the Confederacy, and there was not a dissenting vote, when the Bill came up for action, either in the Senate or the House. Governor Frank M. Dixon approved the new law and the Secretary of State at once had a new Great Seal engraved. Once more the people of Alabama have a Great Seal that carries its own State map showing its magnifcent rivers. At the time Governor Bibb first designated this executive seal there were no good roads in Alabama and all heavy shipping was done by the rivers. Nothing was known about the use of waterfalls for the manufacture of hydro-electric power. Today our great cities and our farm homes are lighted with the power of our rivers. Great industrial enterprises are carried on with electicity from that power. The same Legislature that passed a law restoring the map of the State as the Great Seal also passed a law providing for a coat-of-arms. Instead of the people of Alabama having to defend the phrase "Here We Rest" which implied to some that our people were lacking in energy and industry, we now have a proud motto on our State coatof-arms. The English translation of the motto is "We dare defend our rights."

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Since the beginning of recorded history distinguishing symbols have been used by nations, tribes, families and chieftains. Authors of Roman and Greek history have described the devices on the shields of heroes. These devices were also preserved in pictures and an antique vases. The ancient Chinese Empire was represented by the five-clawed dragon, and the Emperor of Japan by the chrysanthemum. Notable clans in the oriental world as well as in Europe are signalized by heraldic emblems. When the Spaniards invaded Mexico, Indian chiefs bearing shields and banners met them. Indeed, the eagle on the present banner of Mexico is perhaps a copy of the eagle that was carved over the palace of Montezuma. There was not an Indian tribe in the Western world that did not have its tribal totem poles, many of which are still preserved in museums. Often these heraldic tribal or family symbols were tattooed or painted upon the bodies of the tribesmen. Heraldic designs in Western Europe are traced back to the dark ages. The tournament laws of Henry, the Fowler, required that contenders in the tournament should show four generations of arms-bearing ancestors.

No State in the Union has a more historically significant coat-of-arms than Alabama now boasts. The Bill to legalize a State coat-of-arms was introduced in the Alabama Legislature of 1939 by Hon. James Simpson, of Jefferson County, and was passed without a dissenting vote by both Houses. The coat-ofarms consists of a shield on which appears the emblems of the five governments that have held sovereignty over Alabama, either in whole or in part, for four hundred years-Spain, France, Great Britain, the United States, the Confederacy and again the United States. This shield is supported on either side by eagles, symbolic of courage. The crest is a ship of the model of the ships in which Iberville and Bienville sailed to our country from France and settled the first colony of white men in the Mobile Country in 1699. The ship as the crest of the shield is also significant of the fact that Alabama is a maritime State. The motto beneath the shield in Latin is "Audemus jura nostra defendere." Beneath the motto is the State name-"Alabama."

The original design of the Alabama coat-of-arms was made in 1923 by B. J. Tieman, of New York, a distinguished authority on heraldry, at the request of Mrs. Marie Bankhead Owen, Director of the State Department of Archives and History. A few years later Mrs. Naomi Rabb Winston, of Washington, D.C., painted the completed design in oil. Mrs. Owen selected the motto which was put into Latin by Professor W. B. Saffold, of the University of Alabama. It was through the influence of Mrs. Juliet Perry Dixon, wife of Governor Frank M. Dixon, that official action was taken by the Legislature.

STATE FLAG

The flag of the State of Alabama was adopted by Act of February 16, 1895, introduced into the House of Representatives by Hon. John W. A. Sanford, Jr., then a member from Montgomery county. See Acts 1894-95, p. 719. The following is the statutory description, taken from the Code of Alabama, 1907, vol. 1, section 2058 and 2059:

"2058. (3751) Flag of the State.—The flag of the State of Alabama shall be a crimson cross of St. Andrew on a field of white. The bars forming the cross shall not be less than six inches broad and must extend diagonally across the flag, from side to side."

2059. (3752). When Displayed.—The flag of the State shall be hoisted on the dome of the capitol when the two houses of the Legislature are in session, and shall be used by the State on all occasions when it may be necessary or customary to display a flag, except when, in the opinion of the governor, the national flag should be displayed."


From the foregoing description, and from local inquiry as to the form of design submitted in connection with the original bill, the flag was intended by the Legislature to preserve in permanent form some of the more distinctive features of the Confederate battle flag, particularly the St. Andrew's cross. This being true, the Alabama flag should be square, and in all of its lines and measurements conform to the well known battle flag of the Confederacy.

On referring to the regulations governing the Confederate battle flag, it is found that it must be forty-eight inches square, with the arms of the cross eight and one-half inches wide over all, that is, the blue arms with the white border. The law providing for the Alabama State flag merely declares that the arms shall not be less than six inches broad, with the further provision that they must "extend diagonally across the flag from side to side." The latter is intended to mean that the bars must cross each other at right angles, and that the ends of the bars must divide equally at each corner. In the event a larger or smaller size should be desired, the measurements increase or diminish proportionately.

The regulations for the battle-flag also provide for a border of one and one-half inches. Therefore, the proper size for the Alabama State flag would be fifty-one inches square over all, with the arms of St. Andrew's cross eight and one-half inches wide over all, extending diagonally across the flag from side to side, the ends of the bars dividing equally at each corner. Under an Act approved September 26, 1923, the flag of the State, as well as the flag of the United States, is required to be displayed every day on which school is in session, at all schools in the State which are supported even in part by public funds. The Act does not intend the flag to be displayed on the walls of the building, but the State Superintendent has ruled that it shall be hoisted on a pole provided for this purpose. Section 4 of the Act requires the School Board of the county to furnish and pay for the several flags used in the county. Hon. George W. Randall, Senator from the Eighteenth District, is the author of the latest Act.

STATE FLAG



Until the State seceded from the Union, Alabama used the United States flag on all formal occasions. However, when Secession the Convention met Montgomery in in 1861 and voted to withdraw from the Union a flag made by ladies the of Montgomery was presented to the by Convention one of the dele-This flag gates. became the first flag of the State.

On one side of the flag was the Goddess of Liberty holding in right hand her unsheathed an sword; in the left a small flag with one star. In an arch above this figure were the words -Independent Now and Forever.

On the reverse side there was a large cotton plant in full fruit and flower, with a rattle snake at the roots about to OFFICIAL AND STATISTICAL REGISTER

spring into action, signifying the danger of treading upon the rights of the people. Beneath the cotton plant are the Latin words: Noli Me Tangere, which means "Tread not on me." This flag floated over the dome of the Capitol for the day, but on account of the inclement weather was lowered and placed in the Governor's office for safe keeping. There it remained until taken by a Federal soldier with Wilson's raiders at the end of the War Between the States. For many years this flag reposed in a museum cabinet in Des Moines, Iowa, labeled as a "Captured Confederate Battle Flag." When the facts were brought to the attention of the Governor of Iowa in 1938, the Legislature of that State voted to return this flag to the State of Alabama. It was brought to Montgomery accompanied by three members of the Legislature of Iowa as a Guard of Honor. and presented with solemn ceremonies to Governor Frank M. Dixon, in the presence of a joint session of the Legislature. This flag was called the "Secession Flag of Alabama" or the "Flag of the Republic of Alabama."

The next flag that floated over the dome of the Capitol in Montgomery was the Confederate "Stars and Bars." After the defeat of the Confederate Army (1865) which was fighting for Independence, this flag was supplanted on the dome by the United States flag.

STATE FLOWER


A bill introduced in the Legislature, 1927, by Representative T. E. Martin, of Montgomery county, making the Goldenrod the State Flower, became a law September 6, 1927.

House Bill 24, of the regular session of 1959, approved August 26, 1959, amended Section 8, of Title 55, of the Code of 1940, to read: "The camellia is hereby designated and named as the state flower of Alabama."

In view of the fact that the Act does not specify which camellia, the particular variety cannot be officially designated. An effort has been made to determine the intent of those who sought to fix the camellia as the State flower, the Alabama official colors being red and white, it has been suggested that a red camellia be the official flower. Until some designated botanical species is officially fixed the State flower is therefore the red camellia.







THE STATE TREE

The "Southern Pine" was specified as the State Tree of Alabama by the Legislature of 1949, but Mr. Hugh Kaul, of Birmingham, who introduced the Bill said the Long Leaf Pine was meant. There are twelve species of pines that grow in the Southern States, the long leaf, the slash pine, the loblolly and the short leaf are known as the "big four." But the Long Leaf was meant by Mr. Kaul to be the State Tree of Alabama.

STATE BIRD

The yellowhammer is the State bird of Alabama. A Bill introduced in the Legislature, 1927, by Representative Thomas E.



Martin, of Montgomery County was passed by the Legislature and approved Governor by Bibb Graves, September 6, 1927. The reason the yellowhammer was selected as the State bird was because the State has been known as the "Yellowhammer State" since the War Between the This nick-States. name was applied to the Confederate soldiers from Alabama due to an episode that occurred during the war itself. A company of young cavalry soldiers from Huntsville, under command of Rev. D. C. Kelly, who later became a Major under Gen. Bedford Forrest, arrived at

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Hopkinsville, Ky., where Gen. Forrest's troops were stationed. The officers and men of the Huntsville company wore fine new uniforms, whereas the soldiers who had long been on the battlefields of the Confederacy were dressed in faded, worn uniforms. On the sleeves, collars and coat tails of the new cavalry troop were bits of brilliant yellow cloth. As the company rode past Company A, Will Arnett who was a great humorist, cried out in greeting "Yellerhammer, Yellerhammer, flicker, flicker!" This greeting brought a roar of laughter and from that moment the Huntsville soldiers were spoken of as the "yellowhammer company." The term quickly spread throughout the Confederate Army and all Alabama troops were referred to unofficially as the Yellowhammers.

When the Confederate Veterans in Alabama were organ-

ized they took pride in being referred to as the "Yellowhammers" and wore a yellowhammer feather in their caps or lapels during the reunions.

It was very gratifying to the old soldiers when the yellowhammer was adopted as the State bird. They said that the bird with its grey feathers and yellow patches with polka dots like bullet shots on its breast and a red bandana on his neck was a very proper selection as the State bird.

STATE FISH

By House Bill 742, of the regular session of 1955, which became Act No. 564, approved September 9, 1955, the tarpon was designated as the official Salt Water Fish of Alabama.

STATE MINERAL

The 1967 Session of the State Legislature passed Senate Bill 81, which became Act 503, adopting Red Iron Ore, with the scientific name of Hematite, and the chemical formula of Fe^2o^3 , as the State Mineral.

STATE EXECUTIVE MANSION

Until the purchase of the stately Governor's mansion, the Chief Executive resided in a mansion which was purchased by the State for that purpose in 1911. That residence was erected in the City of Montgomery at 702 S. Perry Street in 1906 by Moses Sabel and cost the State \$46,500.00, including sundry furnishings. The State had never previously owned an official residence for the use of its Governor. A commission of seven members was provided in the Act authorizing the purchase of the mansion, including the Governor, Secretary of State, Attorney General, Director of the Department of Archives and History and three other citizens. The first to occupy the mansion was Governor Emmett O'Neal. He was succeeded by Governors Charles Henderson, Thomas E. Kilby, William W. Brandon, Bibb Graves, Benjamin M. Miller, Governor Graves again, Frank M. Dixon, Chauncey Sparks, James E. Folsom.

In October 1950, the State commission authorized to acquire land in proximity to the Capitol, consisting of Governor James E. Folsom, Attorney General Albert A. Carmichael and Supreme Court Justice Joel Brown, purchased from the heirs of the late General R. F. Ligon, his former home at 1108 S. Perry Street, only a few blocks away from the existing mansion. The purchase price was \$100,000.00, including some furnishings but the final cost for renovating the property and additional furnishings totaled \$230,000.00, which was paid by the Capitol Building Commission and an additional appropriation by the Legislature in June 1951. The new mansion is a very handsome building, in the Greek style with large columns at the front and very spacious inside with two pairs of winding stairs in the front

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hall leading to the floor above. At the rear of the mansion there is a large and beautiful formal flower garden, one of the best landscaped in the city. It extends through the block to Court Street, surrounded by a high ornamental wall.

Governor Folsom did not move into the new mansion as he preferred remaining where he had been during the first years of his term of office. The newly elected Governor, Gordon Persons and family were the first to occupy the former Ligon home as a Governor's mansion, moving in on the day of his inauguration, January 15, 1951.

The old mansion was used as State offices until May 14, 1959, when it was sold to the Montgomery Academy.

STATE SONG

The words of "Alabama," the State song, were written by Miss Julia S. Tutwiler, a distinguished educator and humanitarian. It was first sung to an Austrian air but in 1931 through the interest of the Alabama Federation of Music Clubs, a tune written by Mrs. Edna Gockel Gussen, of Birmingham, was adopted by the Legislature as the official State song. The Bill was introduced by the Hon. Tyler Goodwyn, of Montgomery, and was approved by Governor B. M. Miller.

The inspiration for writing the poem "Alabama" came to Miss Tutwiler after she returned to her native State from Germany where she had been studying new educational methods for girls and women. She found the people of Alabama greatly depressed due to Reconstruction conditions following the War Between the States. She recalled that in Germany patriotism was kept aflame by spirited songs. She thought that it would be helpful toward restoring the spirits of her own people to give them a new patriotic song; so she wrote a fatherland song for us and called it "Alabama." The substance of the song is that we live in a land of wide rivers that have beautiful Indian names; that many flowers bloom in Alabama to make the land bright with color and sweet with perfume. She recalled to our minds the fact that orange trees grow on ur seashore and that on our fertile land grows snowy cotton for our clothes and golden corn for our food; that inside the earth are mines of coal and iron and quarries of marble. But best of all she emphasized the fact that the people of Alabama are brave and true.

LURLEEN BURNS WALLACE, was born September 19, 1926, at Foster, Tuscaloosa County, Alabama, daughter of Henry Morgan and Janie Estelle (Burroughs) Burns of Greene County; granddaughter of Morgan and Ida Ann (Stewart) Burns of Knoxville, Alabama, and

Dr. Stone became state Superintendent of Education for the term 1967-1971, having been elected in 1966. In 1947 he was president of the Alabama Education Association. In 1956 he was delegate to the Democratic Convention (State at large). In 1968 he was elected a presidential elector. He is a member of Phi Delta Kappa, Kappa Delta Pi, and Kappa Phi Kappa professional fraternities and Delta Chi social fraternities. Dr. Stone is the author of Eighty-three Case Studies of Dekalb, County High School Students, 1939, Preventive Medicine in Schools, 1940, Mr. Stone Goes to Europe, 1950.

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CHAPTER ||

SENATORS AND REPRESENTATIVES IN CONGRESS

SENATORS

JOSEPH LISTER HILL, of Montgomery, was born December 29, 1894, in that city. He is the son of Dr. Luther Leonidas and Lillie (Lyons) Hill, the former a native of Montgomery, an eminent physician and surgeon, having been the first American surgeon successfully to suture the human heart and was also author of numerous surgical articles. He is the grandson of Luther Leonidas and Laura (Croom) Hill, the former a Methodist minister of Montgomery, and Mark and Amelia (Horsler) Lyons, of Mobile, the former a business man and officer in the Confederate Army. Senator Hill received his preparatory education in the Starke University School of Montgomery and graduated with the A.B. degree in 1914 at the University of Alabama, having been first president of the Student government plan of that institution, and that summer he took a course at the University of Michigan. The following year he received the degree of LL.B. at the University and in 1916 the same degree from Columbia University.

He practiced the legal profession in his native city after graduation until July, 1923, except during the period of World War I, when he served as First Lieutenant of the 17th Infantry Regiment and the 71st U. S. Infantry Regiment. He was President of the Montgomery Board of Education from 1917 to 1921 and was elected to Congress from the Second Alabama District in 1923 and was re-elected in 1924, 1926, 1928, 1930, 1932, 1934, 1936, and 1938; appointed to the United States Senate on January 10, 1938, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation¹ of Senator Hugo L. Black, for the term ending January 3, 1939; re-elected on November 8, 1938 for the term ending January 3, 1945; re-elected for terms ending 1951, 1957, 1963, and 1969. He is a Democrat, Methodist, 32nd Degree Scottish Rite and Knight Templar Mason, Knight of Pythias, Woodman of the World, Praetorian and Eastern Star.

Married: February 20, 1928, at Columbus, Ga., Henrietta Fontaine, daughter of William H. and Etta (Copeland) McCormick of Eufaula.

Children: 1. Henrietta Fontaine; m. Charles C. Hubbard. 2. Luther Lister; m. Catherine Gore.

JOHN JACKSON SPARKMAN, Democrat, of Huntsville, was born December 20, 1899, near Hartselle. He is the son of Whitten Joseph and Julia Mitchell (Kent) Sparkman, the former also a native of near Hartselle who for more than a quarter of a century served as deputy sheriff; grandson of Lewis Sparkman and wife, a Miss Copeland, of near Hartselle, who removed from Tennessee in 1858, and of William Franklin and Susan Caroline (Teague) Kent, of Hartselle.

Mr. Sparkman was educated in the public schools of Morgan County, and received the A. B. degree, 1921, LL.B. 1923, and M.A., 1924. He remained at the University as student secretary of the Y. M. C. A. until 1925 when he began the practice of his profession at Huntsville. At the same time he taught part time in Huntsville College. He served as United States Commissioner, 1930-1931, and became a member of the firm of Taylor, Richardson and Sparkman in the latter year. He was elected a member of Congress, November 3, 1936, took his seat on January 1, 1937, and was re-elected 1940, 1942, 1944 and 1946, and resigned to enter the Senate having been elected to succeed the late John H. Bankhead. He was re-elected for the terms ending January 1955, 1961, 1967, and 1973. He served as a member of the Students Army Training Corps until his discharge, December 12, 1918, was the first, Reserve Officer commissioned by the University of Alabama, holding a commission since May 13, 1921, and is now a retired colonel, Army Artillery. He is a Democrat, a Mason, a Methodist, Woodman of the World, Eastern Star, member of the American Legion, Kiwanis Club, Alabama State Society of Washington, Phi Beta Kappa Honorary society, Pi Kappa Alpha college fraternity, Phi Alpha Delta legal fraternity, trustee of Athens College, Athens and Blue Ridge Association, N. C.

Married: June 2, 1923, at Albertville, Ivo, daughter of Dr. William Pressley and Annie (Young) Hall of that place. Children: 1. Julia Ann m. Admiral Tazewell T. Shepard, Jr., formerly of Mobile; grandchildren: Tazewell Taylor Shepard, III.

On August 19, 1964, the Alabama Legislature in special session passed the following act redistricting the State of Alabama which was necessitated by the loss of one representative on the basis of the 1960 Federal Census.

Section 1. Code of Alabama 1940, Title 17, Section 425 is amended to read as follows:

"Section 425. The State is hereby divided into eight congressional

districts as follows: The first district shall be composed of the counties of Mobile, Washington, Choctaw, Clarke, Monroe and Wilcox. The second district shall be composed of the counties of Baldwin, Butler, Conecuh, Covington, Crenshaw, Escambia, Lowndes, Montgomery and Pike. The third district shall be composed of the counties of Barbour, Bullock, Chambers, Coffee, Dale, Geneva, Henry, Houston, Lee, Macon, Russell and Tallapoosa. The fourth district shall be composed of the counties of Autauga, Dallas, Elmore, Coosa, Clay, Randolph, Cleburne, Calhoun, Talladega and St. Clair. The fifth district shall be composed of the counties of Shelby, Bibb, Perry, Marengo, Sumter, Greene, Hale, Chilton, Pickens and Tuscaloosa; also, all that territory in Jefferson County in Precincts 33 and 53, as such precincts were constituted on August 1, 1961. The sixth district shall be composed of all that part of Jefferson County not included in the fifth district as aforesaid. The seventh district shall be composed of the counties of Lamar, Fayette, Marion, Franklin, Walker, Winston, Cullman, Blount, Marshall, Etowah, DeKalb and Cherokee. The eighth district shall be composed of the counties of Colbert, Lauderdale, Lawrence, Limestone, Morgan, Madison and Jackson."

Section 2. Code 1940, Title 17, Section 426 is amended to read as follows:

"Section 426. Each congressional district described in the preceding section is entitled to elect one representative in the Congress of the United States, who shall be chosen by the qualified electors of the district at the general election in 1964, and every two years thereafter."

WILLIAM JACKSON EDWARDS, III, of Mobile, born September 20, 1928, Birmingham, son of William Jackson and Sue (Fuhrman) Edwards; grandson of William Jackson and Ella (Oden) Edwards of Birmingham, and of George James and Lillian Fuhrman of Birmingham.

Congressman Edwards attended Edgewood Grammar School and Shades Cahaba High School, Homewood, Alabama. He graduated from the University of Alabama in 1952 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Commerce and Business Administration and in 1954 with the Bachelor of Laws degree. He practiced law in Mobile, 1954-58. In 1958 he joined the legal department of Gulf, Mobile, and Ohio Railroad, Mobile, Alabama. In 1964 he was elected to the United States House of Representatives, 89th Congress, from the First District of Alabama. He was re-elected to the 90th Congress. He serves on Merchant Marine and Fisheries Committee, including Merchant Marine, Coast Guard and Oceanography Subcommittees. He serves on Government Operations Committee, including Executive and Legislative Reorganization Subcommittee, and the Legal and Monetary Affairs Subcommittee on which he is the ranking Republican. He was president, Student Government Association, University of Alabama, 1952-53. He held membership, while at the University of Alabama, in Omicron Delta Kappa and other college honoraries, and was selected for Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities. In 1964 he was chosen one of Outstanding Young Men in America by the United States Junior Chamber of Commerce. He served in the United States Marine Corps, 1946-48 as corporal, and 1950-51 as sergeant. He is a Republican and Presbyterian.

WILLIAM LOUIS DICKINSON, of Montgomery, was born June 5, 1925, in Opelika, son of Henry Kline and Bernice (Lowe) Dickinson; grandson of William Frances and Ophelia Dickinson of Opelika and of Harry Foster and Nesba (Stowe) Lowe of Opelika. William Frances Dickinson practiced law in Opelika and was a member of Board of Examiners, Alabama Bar Association for thirty years. He served as a Major in the Confederate States Army. Henry Kline Dickinson served as Mayor of Opelika for twelve years.

Congressman Dickinson graduated from Opelika High School in 1943 and entered the United States Navy in June, 1943. He was released from service in February 1946 and entered the University of Alabama. In 1950 he graduated with the LL.B degree. He practiced law from 1950 to 1958 at which time he became judge of the Fifth Judicial Circuit. He served until 1963. He is presently a Major in the United States Air Force Reserve. He is a Mason, member of the Elks, and Sigma Alpha Epsilon social fraternity. He is a Republican and Methodist.

GEORGE WILLIAM ANDREWS, JR., Democrat, of Union Springs, was born December 12, 1906, at Clayton, Barbour County. He is the son of George William and Addie Bell (Kine) Andrews, of Barbour County; grandson of J. Z. and Mary Jane (McRae) Andrews of Clayton, and of Tom and Bell (Vining) King of Eufaula. George W. Andrews, Sr., was County Solicitor of Bullock for fifteen years and an early practitioner at Union Springs. Congressman Andrews was educated in the schools of Union Springs; graduated from the University of Alabama with a Law degree in 1928, and practiced at Union Springs. He served as Circuit Solicitor from the Third Judicial Circuit from 1931 to 1943. He had service in World War II, as Lt. Jr. Grade, U.S. Navy, on duty in the Hawaiian Islands. He was elected a member of Congress to serve out the unexpired term of Hon. H. B. Steagall, and elected to a full term for the 80th Congress; re-elected for the 81st, 82nd, 83rd, 84th, 85th, 86th, 87th, 88th, 89th and 90th Congresses. Congressman Andrews is now serving as chairman, Legislative Subcommittee and sitting on

J. ED LIVINGSTON, of Tuscaloosa, Chief Justice, was born March 17, 1892, at Notasulga in Macon County. He is the son of James Cooper and Stella Elizabeth (Burks) Livingston, of Macon County; grandson of William Taliaferro and Mary Ann (Cooper) Livingston and Charles Henry and Mary Catherine Burks, of that county. William Taliaferro Livingston was born in South Carolina in 1808, and came to Harris County, Georgia, with his parents. He settled in Macon County, Alabama, about 1840. He was twice married. Charles Henry Burks was the son of Charles S. and Elizabeth (Armstrong) Burks, the former a

Baptist minister. Charles H. served in the Confederate Army. Chief Justice Livingston attended the public schools of Macon County and Alabama Polytechnic Institute, and took his Law Course at the University of Alabama, getting his degree there in 1918. He was admitted to the bar in 1919, was instructor at the University of Alabama from 1922 to 1940, when he was elected Associate Justice of the Supreme Court; was reelected in 1946; appointed Chief Justice on Feb. 28, 1951, reelected 1952, 1958 and 1964. He was Chairman of the National Conference of Chief Justices for 1962-63. Chief Justice Livingston is one of five brothers who served in World War I. He is a Democrat, a Methodist, a Mason, an Elk, a member of the Phi Delta Phi, and the Phi Gamma Delta, college fraternities.

Married: December 27, 1913, at Notasulga, Marie, daughter of James Anthony and Ella (Trammel) Wise of LaFayette, Chambers County. Children: 1. Willard Wise, married Ann Key Murphree; 2. Edwin Burks, married Louise Runge.

THOMAS SEAY LAWSON, of Greensboro, Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, was born May 3, 1906, Greensboro. He is the son of Lewis Joshua and Amy (Seay) Lawson, the former a native of Greensboro who served for a number of years as mayor of that place, was president of the Peoples Bank, and was a member of the State Senate; grandson of Lewis Joshua and Alice (Reid). Lawson, of Greensboro, and Thomas and Clara (de Lesdernier) Seay, of Greensboro, the former governor of Alabama, 1886-90.

Justice Lawson was educated in the public schools of Greensboro, attended Southern Military Academy at Greensboro, received the degree A.B. from Davidson College, Davidson, N.C., and the degree of LL.B. from the University of Alabama, 1929. He entered the practice of his profession at Selma in the latter year and later continued at Greensboro. He was appointed assistant attorney general, January, 1931, was nominated attorney general in May, 1938, and elected in November, 1938. He received the Democratic nomination in May, 1942, as an associate justice of the Supreme Court of Alabama and was elected to that office in November, 1942. In October, 1942, he was appointed by Governor Frank M. Dixon to the vacancy on the Supreme Court caused by the resignation of Judge Thos. E. Knight, and in January, 1943, began the six year term as Associate Justice to which he was elected: re-elected 1948, 1954, 1960 and 1966. In June of 1943, he entered the United States Navy as Lieutenant (j.g.) and remained in the Navy until October of 1945, being discharged with the rank of Lieutenant, after having served for a number of months aboard the U.S.S. MASSACHUSETTS in the Pacific Area. He is president pro tempore of the Board of Trustees of the University of Alabama. Member Judicial Council, Member University of Alabama Law School Foundation, Sigma Alpha Epsilon social fraternity, Omicron Delta Kappa (honorary) fraternity, The Newcomen Society in North America. He is a Democrat and a Methodist.

Married: November 30, 1932, Montgomery, Rose, daughter of Mayor William Adams and Julia (Scott) Gunter, of that city. Children: 1. Thomas Seay, Jr. m. Sarah Clayton; 2. Jule Gunter m. Clifford Lanier, Jr.

ROBERT TENNENT SIMPSON, of Florence, was born September 2, 1893, at that place. He is the son of Robert Tennent and Nellie (Moody) Simpson, the former a native of Florence, who served for nine years as solicitor of Eleventh Judicial Circuit; grandson of Judge Robert Tennent and Martha (Collier) Simpson, the former a native of Florence, graduated from Princeton College in 1857 with the degree of A.B., and received the honorary degree of Master of Arts from this college in 1887, graduated from Cumberland University with the degree of LL.B., in 1859, went to Arkansas to practice, returned to Florence, enlisted in April, 1861, in Company H., Fourth Alabama Infantry Regiment, C. S. Army, later, September, 1861, commissioned second lieutenant, First Alabama Battalion Artillery; promoted to first lieutenant of this battalion, adjutant of post at Fort Morgan, adjutant general of Liddell's brigade, captain in Sixty-third Alabama Infantry Regiment, captured at Blakeley, April 9, 1865, taken to Ship Island, paroled at Meridian, Miss., May 10, 1865, represented Lauderdale County in 1882 in the Legislature, State senator in 1884, appointed to board of convict managers in 1890, returned to the Legislature in 1902, and on November 8, 1904, was elected an associate justice of the State Supreme Court; and also grandson of Dr. Henry A. and Virginia (Ellis) Moody, the former a native of the New England States, captain in charge of scouting in the Confederate States Army, practiced his profession at Florence from 1900 until 1905, became instructor of materia medica and therapeutics at the Medical School of the University of Alabama, Mobile, until his death in 1913, and was one of the founders and organizers of the Southern Medical Journal.

Judge Simpson was educated in the public schools of Florence, attended Florence Normal School (now Florence State College) from which he was graduated in 1911. Received the A.B. degree in 1915, and the LL.B. degree in 1917 from the University of Alabama. On May 11, 1917, he entered Officers' Training School, Fort McPherson, Ga., commissioned first lieutenant of Infantry September, 1917, detailed adjutant of First Battalion, 327th Infantry at Camp Gordon, Ga., appointed regimental adjutant in October, 1917, transferred to Camp Upton, N. Y., April 18, 1918, arrived in France on May 10, 1918, commanded First Battalion, 327th Infantry in Meuse-Argonne offensive, October 9-20, 1918, promoted captain in November, 1918, served in engagements at Flirey Sector, June, 1918, Lucey, Marbache, Saint Mihiel offensive, September 12, 1918, Meuse-Argonne offensive, September 28 to October 30, 1918, received Brigade Citation and Silver Star for bravery November, 1918, and discharged from duty at Fort Oglethorpe, Ga., April 14, He began May, 1919, the practice of his profession with his 1919. father until he became solicitor of the Eleventh Judicial Circuit in December, 1929. On February 12, 1940, he was appointed by Governor Frank Dixon as one of the judges of the Court of Appeals. He was elected to the Court of Appeals in November, 1940, serving to 1944, when

he was elected to the Supreme Court, completing the unexpired term of his predecessor. He was re-elected in 1948 to the same position, which he still retains.

He is a Democrat, a Presbyterian, a Mason, Elk, member of W. O. W., Odd Fellows, Knights of Pythias, American Legion, 40 and 8, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Disabled American Veterans, National Sojourners, Military Order of World Wars, Sons of the American Revolution, Sons of Confederate Veterans, American and Alabama Bar Associations, Sigma Alpha Epsilon college fraternity, Sigma Delta Kappa legal fraternity, Phi Beta Kappa honorary fraternity, Unity Literary Club, Knife & Fork Club, and Montgomery Country Club. Awarded Cross of Military Service by United Daughters of the Confederacy, October, 1963.

JOHN LANCASTER GOODWYN, of Montgomery, Associate Justice, was born October 13, 1903, at Montgomery. He was the son of the late Robert Tyler and Jessie Dora (Lancaster) Goodwyn of Montgomery, and the grandson of Albert Taylor and Priscilla (Tyler) Goodwyn, of Robinson Springs, and of Judge John A. and Dora (Lett) Lancaster of Wetumpka.

Judge Goodwyn was a graduate of the Barnes School for Boys of Montgomery, and received an A. B. degree from the University of Alabama in 1925. He received his law degree at the University in 1926. He began the practice of law in Montgomery that same year and practiced there until he entered the Armed Forces in World War II. He served with the 31st Infantry ("Dixie") Division and Headquarters 6th Army, from November 1940 to March 1946. He served as Mayor of Montgomery from June 1946 to January 1951, at which time he joined Governor Persons as his Legal Advisor and served in that capacity until October 1951, when he was appointed a member of the Supreme Court. He was elected to a six year term in 1952 and re-elected in 1958 and 1964. Justice Goodwyn died April 22, 1968.

He was a Democrat, a Presbyterian, a Mason, and a member of Sigma Alpha Epsilon College Social Fraternity, Phi Delta Phi Legal Fraternity, Omicron Delta Kappa Honorary Fraternity, American Legion, and Veterans of Foreign Wars.

Gallion. PELHAM J. MERRILL, of Heflin, Associate Justice, was born December 1, 1907, at Heflin and is the son of Walter Benjamin and Lilla Belle (Jones) Merrill, the former born in Franklin County, Georgia, later moving to Edwardsville, Alabama, member of the State Senate, 1911-15, Representative in Legislature from Cleburne County, 1943-47 and Circuit Judge, 7th Judicial Circuit, 1947-53; grandson of James Benjamin and Elizabeth (Faver) Merrill, the former Captain in the Confederate Army, and of James Wiley and Martha (Hughes) Jones, of Jones Mill, now Frisco City, Alabama, the former representing Monroe County in the Legislature of 1911-15.

Judge Merrill was educated in the grammar schools at Heflin and graduated at the Heflin High School, at the age of fourteen. He graduated at the University of Alabama, A.B., in 1926, at age eighteen and took his LL.B. degree at the University, 1934. He taught and coached at West Blocton, Alabama, 1926-31. He entered the practice of law at Heflin in 1934 and maintained his office there until 1953, when he was elected Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, except that he served in World War II from June 1942 to February 1946. In 1945 he was promoted to Major in the Air Corps. He retired as a Colonel in the Air Force Reserve on June 30, 1967, at which time he was awarded the Judge Merrill served in the Legislature from Cleburne Air Medal. County, 1936-38, 1946-50, 1950-52, and in 1949 and 1951 was Speaker pro tem of the House of Representatives. In 1947, while in the Legislature, the Press voted him the most resourceful member of the House; and in 1951, the Press voted him the most effective member of the House.

JAMES SAMUEL COLEMAN, JR., Associate Justice, was born June 8, 1906, at Mobile, son of James Samuel and Mary Belle (Peteet) Coleman, the former editor of the Greene County Democrat for thirtyseven years, 1910-47; grandson of Thomas Wilkes and Frances Jane (Wilson) Coleman, of Eutaw, the former a Confederate veteran, Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of Alabama and Chairman of Committee of Suffrage and Elections of Alabama Constitutional Convention of 1901, and of James Monroe and Mary Jane (McConnell) Peteet, of York, the former also a Confederate veteran; great-grandson of Samuel James Wilson, a veteran of the War of 1812, and two ancestors, Charles Coleman and John A. McConnell, served as soldiers of the American Revolution.

Judge Coleman was educated in the public schools of Eutaw and at Marion Institute, graduated at the U. S. Naval Academy, 1927, and also attended the University of Alabama Law School. He was admitted to the Alabama Bar in 1934 and entered the general practice of law at Eutaw. He was elected to the State Senate for the 1946-50 and 1954-57 terms, elected to the Supreme Court for the 1957-63 term, and was reelected for the 1963-69 term. He served on active duty in the U. S. Naval Reserve from June, 1942, to December, 1945, as a lieutenant commander He is a Democrat and a Presbyterian and member of Veterans of Foreign Wars, American Legion and Lions Club. He was elected "Outstanding member of the 1955 Regular Session" of the Senate and "Best Parliamentarian" by the 1955 Capitol Press Corps.

Married: September 17, 1933, at Birmingham, Eleanor Ruth, daughter of Lawrence Henry and Eula (Leavell) Montgomery, of Eutaw, the former serving as Probate Judge of Greene County from 1928 until his death in 1956. Eleanor Montgomery Coleman was elected Probate Judge of Greene County in 1958, took office January 1959, and served until her death, October, 1959. Judge Coleman married Mary Ruth (Morgan) Hobbs February 20, 1965. Children: 1. James Samuel, III.

ROBERT BERNARD HARWOOD was born in Eutaw, Alabama, 4 June 1902, his parents being Bernard and Helene (Braune) Harwood. Upon the election of his father as judge of the then Sixth Judicial Circuit of Alabama, the family moved to Tuscaloosa in 1910.

He attended public and private schools in Tuscaloosa, and the Staunton Military Academy. He is a graduate of the University of Alabama, A. B., 1922, LL.B., 1926, and did post-graduate work at Harvard Law School. LL.M., 1932.

Judge Harwood engaged in private practice of law in Tuscaloosa 1926-31, and 1932-33.

In 1926, he was elected to a four year term as Representative from Tuscaloosa County in the Alabama Legislature; from September 1933 to September 1935, he was Assistant United States Attorney for the Northern District of Alabama; from 1935 to 1942, Professor of Law, University of Alabama; in May 1942, he received the nomination of the Democratic Party as Attorney General of Alabama. He entered military service in September 1942, and was elected Attorney General in the general election in November 1942, taking military leave from such office. Returning from military service (Captain and Major, J.A.G.D.), he assumed his office as Attorney General on 1 September 1945. Upon the death of Judge James Rice, he was appointed to the Court of Appeals of Alabama on 10 October 1945, and was Presiding Judge of that court for seven years. In 1962, he was appointed and subsequently elected to the Supreme Court of Alabama.

Judge Harwood is an Episcopalian; a member of the Delta Kappa Epsilon (social); Phi Delta Phi (legal); Omricon Delta Kappa (honor-

ary) fraternities, the Montgomery Country Club, and The Thirteen.

NOBLE HARRIS SEAY, of Montgomery, Reporter of Decisions of the Supreme Court and Court of Appeals, was born January 19, 1890, at New Albany, Miss., is the son of the late George Lynnfield and Lillian (Bagley) Seay, both of Talladega County, Ala., but later living in Sheffield, Colbert County, Ala. He is a grandson of John Loving and Elizabeth (Thompson) Seay and of Henry and Mary Ann (English) Bagley all of Talladega County. He is a descendant of Abraham de Saye (Seay), a French Huguenot, who emigrated to Virginia about 1700.

Mr. Seay was educated in the common schools of Sheffield and at Birmingham College (now Birmingham-Southern College). ANNIE LOLA PRICE, presiding Judge of the Alabama Court of Appeals is a native of Cullman, Alabama. She attended Athens College and business school in Birmingham and studied law in the offices of Judge Joel B. Brown and Judge A. A. Griffith. She was admitted to the bar in 1928 and engaged in private practice until 1935 when she was appointed Court Reporter by Circuit Judge Griffith. Maritime Commission, Washington, D.C., 1940-41; assistant general counsel, War Shipping Administration, Washington, D. C., 1942. He was associated in the private practice of law with Carl W. Bear, in Montgomery, 1942-43 and was general counsel for the Department of Industrial Relations, 1946-49, and maintained a private practice at Montgomery, 1949-56. He was elected as Judge of the Court of Appeals, 1956, and re-elected 1958 for the term beginning January 1959 and 1964 for six years beginning January 1965. He served as Lieutenant, active U.S. Naval Reserve, 1943-46. He is a Democrat and a Presbyterian.

CHAPTER IV LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT

REPRESENTATION

The legislative power of this State shall be vested in a Legislature, which shall consist of a Senate and a House of Representatives.—Constitution, 1901, Sec. 44.

Until the Legislature shall make up an apportionment of Representatives among the several counties, as provided in the preceding section, the counties of Autauga, Baldwin, Bibb, Blount, Cherokee, Chilton, Choctaw, Clay, Cleburne, Coffee, Colbert, Conecuh, Coosa, Covington, Crenshaw, Cullman, Dale, DeKalb, Escambia, Fayette, Franklin, Geneva, Greene, Lamar, Lawrence, Limestone, Macon, Marion, Marshall, Monroe, Pickens, Randolph, St. Clair, Shelby, Washington, and Winston, shall each have one Representative; the counties of Barbour, Bullock, Butler, Calhoun, Chambers, Clarke, Elmore, Etowah, Hale, Henry, Jackson, Lauderdale, Lee, Lowndes, Madison, Marengo, Morgan, Perry, Pike, Russell, Sumter, Talladega, Tallapoosa, Tuscaloosa, Walker and Wilcox, shall each have two representatives; the counties of Dallas and Mobile shall each have three representatives; the county of Montgomery shall have four Representatives; and the county of Jefferson shall have seven Representatives.— Ibid. Sec. 202.

Until the Legislature shall divide the State into Senatorial districts, as herein provided, the Senatorial districts shall be as follows:

First district, Lauderdale and Limestone; Second district, Lawrence and Morgan; Third district, Blount, Cullman and Winston; Fourth district, Madison; Fifth district, Jackson and Marshall; Sixth district, Etowah and St. Clair; Seventh district, Calhoun; Eighth district, Talladega; Ninth district, Chambers and Randolph; Tenth district, Tallapoosa and Elmore; Eleventh district, Tuscaloosa; Twelfth district, Fayette, Lamar and Walker; Thirteenth district, Jefferson; Fourteenth district, Pickens and Sumter; Fifteenth district, Autauga, Chilton and Shelby; Sixteenth district, Lowndes; Seventeenth district, Butler, Conecuh and Covington; Eighteenth district, Bibb and Perry; Nineteenth district, Choctaw Clarke and Washington; Twentieth district, Marengo; Twenty-first district, Baldwin, Escambia and Monroe; Twenty-second district, Wilcox; Twenty-third district, Dale and Geneva; Twenty-fourth district, Barbour; Twenty-fifth district, Coffee, Crenshaw and Pike; Twentysixth district, Bullock and Macon; Twenty-seventh district, Lee and Russell; Twenty-eighth district, Montgomery; Twenty-ninth district, Cherokee and DeKalb; Thirtieth district, Dallas; Thirty-first district, Colbert, Franklin and Marion; Thirty-second district, Greene and Hale; Thirty-third district, Mobile; Thirty-fourth district, Cleburne, Clay and Coosa; Thirty-fifth district, Henry.—Ibid. Sec. 203.

The county of Houston was created by act of the Legislature, approved February 9, 1903. Under the operation of Section 50 of the Con-

stitution of 1901, the county was allowed one representative, making a total membership of one hundred and six in the Legislature of 1907. The new county is included in the 35th Senatorial district.

Because of a suit filed in the United States District Court for the Middle District of Alabama, Northern Division, alleging violation of Section 198, 199 and 200 of the Alabama Constitution, by M. O. Mims et al. against Mrs. Bettye Frink et al. the hearing for which was set for July 16, 1962, the Alabama Legislature in Extraordinary Session passed on July 12, 1962 a proposed constitutional amendment (Senate Bill 29, known as the "67-Senator Amendment"), reapportioning the State Legislature, which was to be subject to ratification by the people of Alabama at an election to be held in November, 1962. On the same date the "Crawford-Webb Bill", (House Bill 59) became law. Its purpose was to comply with the federal constitutional requirement as laid down in Baker v. Carr, 369 U.S. 186, in the event that the "67-Senator Amendment" was not ratified by the electorate or was ruled unconstitutional by the federal court. The United States District Court held that neither the "67-Senator Amendment" nor the "Crawford-Webb Act" met the necessary constitutional requirements. In its decree the Court, basing its decision upon sections of each of the aforesaid acts, ordered the reapportionment of the Alabama Legislature for the election in November, 1962. The decree filed July 25, 1962, states in part:

It is the further ORDER, JUDGEMENT, and DECREE of this Court:

(1) That the membership of the House of Representatives for the State of Alabama, effective on the day after the general election to be held in November, 1962, be and the same is hereby apportioned as follows:

The County of Jefferson shall have and elect seventeen representatives; the County of Mobile shall have and elect eight representatives; the County of Montgomery shall have and elect four representatives; the Counties of Calhoun, Etowah, Madison and Tuscaloosa shall each have and elect three representatives; the Counties of Dallas, Lauderdale, Morgan, Talladega and Walker shall each have and elect two representatives; and the remaining counties of the State of Alabama shall each have and elect one representative.

(2) That the Senate of the State of Alabama be and the same is hereby apportioned as follows:

(4) That the officials heretofore elected to either the House of Representatives or the Senate for the State of Alabama from counties and/or senatorial districts that are herein altered, changed or eliminated, shall continue to serve as such elected officials until the expiration of the terms of office of said senators and representatives on the day after the general election to be held in November, 1962.

(5) That the seats—both in the House of Representatives and the Senate for the State of Alabama—that are herein ordered to be eliminated, not be refilled after the present terms of office, of said presently elected officials to said offices, expire in November, 1962.

#### **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT ELECTIONS**

#### CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT ELECTION DECEMBER 10, 1963

#### **PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 1**

Shall the following be adopted as an Amendment to the Constitution of Alabama?

"The Legislature shall have power to levy and provide for the collection of taxes for state purposes on net income of corporations, from whatever source derived, for the calendar year 1963, or for any fiscal year beginning in the calendar year 1963, and each year thereafter, at a rate not exceeding five percent. However, all federal income taxes paid or accrued within the taxable year by corporations shall always be deductible in computing net income taxable under the income tax laws of this state, provided that in the case of foreign corporations the amount of federal income tax deductible shall be in proportion to income derived from sources within Alabama, to be determined in accordance with such laws as the Legislature may enact." (Under the provisions of Act No. 91, Second Special Session 1963.)

#### **PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 2**

Shall the following be adopted as an Amendment to the Constitution of Alabama?

"The State of Alabama is authorized to become indebted for improvements at the Alabama State Docks and the refunding of State Docks revenue bonds, and in evidence of the indebtedness so incurred to issue and sell, in addition to all other bonds of the State, interest bearing general obligation bonds of the State not exceeding ten million dollars (\$10,000,000) in principal amount. The full faith and credit and taxing power of the State are hereby pledged to the prompt and faithful payment of the principal of the bonds and the interest thereon. The Alabama State Docks Department (which term as used herein shall be construed to include any other agency of the State that may succeed to said Department's functions) shall pledge and use so much of the revenues derived from its seaport facilities as may be necessary to pay at their maturities the principal of and interest on said bonds, and may pledge, agree to use, and use so much of said revenues as the said Department with the approval of the Governor may determine shall be necessary or desirable to build up and maintain reserves for the payment of said principal and interest and for the maintenance, replacement and improvement of its seaport facilities." (Under the provisions of Act No. 224, Regular Session, 1963.)

#### **PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 3**

Shall the following be adopted as an Amendment to the Constitution of Alabama?

"Section 181. The following persons and no others who, if they are citizens of the United States over the age of twenty-one years and have the qualifications as to residence prescribed in Section 178 of this article, shall be qualified to register as electors provided they shall not be disqualified under Section 182 of this Constitution; those who can read and write any article of the Constitution of the United States in the English language which may be submitted to them by the board of registrars, provided, however, no persons shall be entitled to register as electors except those who are of good character and who embrace the duties and obligations of citizenship under the Constitution of the United States and under the Constitution of the State of Alabama, and provided further, that in order to aid the members of the boards of registrars, who are hereby constituted and declared to be judicial officers, to judicially determine if applicants to register have the qualifications hereinabove set out, each applicant shall be furnished by the board of registrars a written application form and a sealed examination, which shall be uniform in all cases with no discrimination as between applicants. The form and contents of such application form and sealed examination shall be prescribed by a state board of examiners for voter registration to be by the Legislative Council of Alabama, appointed which application shall be so worded that the answers thereto will place before the board of registrars information necessary or proper to aid them to pass upon the qualifications of each applicant, and which examination shall be graded by the state board of examiners

for voter registration which must certify to the several boards of registrars of the state whether or not each applicant, who shall be designated by number only, has passed or has not passed the examination. The examination shall be provided and shall be administered as provided for by the Legislature. Provided, in no event shall the intelligence level required of the applicant for registration be less than that required to serve as a member of the armed forces of the United States as determined by written examination. The application shall be answered in writing by the applicant in the presence of the board without assistance, and there shall be incorporated in such answer an oath to support and defend the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of the State of Alabama and a statement in such oath by the applicant disavowing belief in or affiliation at any time with any group or party which advocated the overthrow of the government of the United States or the State of Alabama by unlawful means, which answers and oath shall be duly signed and sworn to by the applicant before a member of the county board of registrars. Such application and written answers of the applicant thereto shall be filed with the records of the respective boards of registrars and such examination shall be filed with the records of the state board of examiners.

"The board may receive information respecting the applicant and the truthfulness of any information furnished by him. Provided further, that if solely because of physical handicaps the applicant is unable to read or write, then he shall be exempt from the above stated requirements which he is unable to meet because of such physical handicap, and in such cases a member of the board of registrars shall read to the applicant the questionnaire and oaths herein provided for and the applicant's answers thereto shall be written down by such board member, and the applicant shall be registered as a voter if he meets all other requirements herein set out." (Under the provisions of Act No. 417, Regular Session, 1963.)

#### **PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 4**

Shall the following be adopted as an Amendment to the Constitution of Alabama?

"Section 1. It is hereby proposed that the seventy-sixth article of amendment to the Constitution of Alabama as submitted by Act No. 570, H. 873, Regular Session 1949, and proclaimed ratified December 21, 1949, be amended to read as follows:

"This amendment shall apply in all counties except Mobile and Jefferson Counties. The term "public hospital purposes" as used in this amendment shall be construed to include the acquisition by purchase, lease, or otherwise, and the construction, equipment, operation, and maintenance of public hospital facilities. The term "public hospital facilities" as used in this amendment shall be construed to include public hospitals, public clinics, public health centers, nurses' homes and training facilities, and related public health facilities of any kind.

"If a majority of the qualified electors of any county in the state, except Mobile and Jefferson Counties, who participate in an election held therein pursuant to the provisions of any amendment to the constitution heretofore adopted shall vote at such election in favor of the levy and collection of a special county tax within the limitations provided in such amendment, for any one or more of the purposes included within the meaning of the term public hospital purposes, the proceeds derived from the tax authorized at such election, may be applied for any one or more of the purposes for which said tax may be so voted. Whenever the tax shall be voted the governing body of the county may anticipate the proceeds therefrom for any one or more of the purposes for which the tax shall be voted by issuing, without further election, interest bearing tax anticipation bonds, warrants, or certificates of indebtedness of said county payable solely from and secured by a pledge of not exceeding 75% of the annual proceeds from said tax received by the county.

"The governing body of each county in which the said tax may be voted shall have the further power to designate as the agency of the county to acquire, construct, equip, operate and maintain public hospital facilities any public corporation or commission heretofore or hereafter organized for hospital purposes in the county under any general or local law heretofore or hereafter enacted by the Legislature. When a public corporation or commission shall be so designated, the proceeds of said tax thereafter collected shall be paid over to it and shall be used by it for any one or more of the purposes for which the tax shall have been voted; provided, that payment of the proceeds of said tax to said public corporation or commission shall be made only to such extent as will not result in the impairment of the obligation of any contract theretofore made with respect to said tax. Said public corporation or commission may anticipate the proceeds from said tax so required to be paid to it by issuing, for any one or more of the purposes for which the tax shall have been voted, the bonds, warrants, or certificates of indebtedness of said public corporation or commission, and may pledge for the payment of the principal thereof and interest thereon not exceeding 75% of the annual proceeds from said tax so paid to it.

"Each county in which the tax shall be voted, and in the event a public corporation or commission shall have been designated as the agency of such county pursuant to the provisions hereof then said public corporation or commission shall have the power to contract with any other county or similar public corporation or commission with respect to the acquisition by purchase, lease, or otherwise, and the construction, equipment, operation, and maintenance of public hospital facilities outside of the county and within any zone or region of which the county may be a part, and which may have heretofore been established or may hereafter be established for public hospital purposes by the Legislature or by any agency designated by it, the obligations of such contract to be payable solely out of the proceeds of said tax; provided, that the proceeds of said tax shall not be used outside of the county for any purpose for which the proceeds could not be used in the county, and shall not be used with respect to public hospital facilities located outside of the county if the tax is voted specifically for public hospital facilities located in the county.

"No securities issued or contracts made by a county under the authority of this amendment, which are payable solely out of the proceeds of said tax, and no securities issued or contracts made by any such public corporation or commission, whether or not issued or made under the authority of this amendment shall be construed to be bonds of the county or of a political subdivision thereof within the meaning of Section 222 of the Constitution, or construed to create or constitute an indebtedness of the county within the meaning of Section 224 of the Constitution. Said securities shall be construed to be negotiable instruments notwithstanding the fact that they may be payable solely from a limited source. All pledges of said tax and all contracts made with respect thereto pursuant to the provisions of this amendment shall take precedence in the order in which they are made and shall create a charge on the proceeds of said tax prior to the expenses of operating and maintaining any public hospital facilities.

"In each instance in which a special county tax for any one or more of the purposes included within the meaning of the term public hospital purposes has heretofore been authorized at an election held in a county pursuant to the provisions of any amendment to the Constitution heretofore adopted, all provisions of this amendment shall be applicable in said county to the same extent as if said election had been held after the adoption of this amendment." (Under the provisions of Act No. 420, Regular Session 1963.)

#### **PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 5**

Shall the following be adopted as an Amendment to the Constitution of Alabama?

"Notwithstanding any other provision of this Constitution, the Legislature may hereafter, by general law, provide for the promotion of the production, distribution, marketing and use of poultry and poultry products. The Legislature may provide for the promotion of poultry and poultry products and the poultry industry by research, education, advertising and other methods, and the Legislature is further authorized to provide means and methods for the financing of any such promotional activity by prescribing a procedure whereby producers, owners or growers of poultry may by referendum held among such producers, owners or growers of poultry in this State levy upon themselves and collect assessments, fees, or charges upon the sale of poultry and poultry products for the financing of any such promotional program or activity in cooperation with processors, dealers, handlers and other buyers of poultry and poultry products. Provided, no assessment levied hereunder shall exceed one cent (1c) per hen or other domesticated fowl or any other classes of poultry sold by producers thereof. The Legislature is authorized to make provisions for non-payment and for the refund of assessments levied upon owners, producers or growers of poultry to any such person who does not desire to participate in the promotional program. The Legislature shall provide for the collection and distribution of assessments or charges authorized hereunder and to provide penalties for failure to make such collection and distribution of assessments. The Legislature shall provide for the designation of a nonprofit association or organization organized for the promotion and betterment of poultry and poultry products in Alabama to administer and carry out such promotional program which shall include conducting elections or referendums among producers, owners or growers of poultry. The Legislature shall further provide for the deposit, withdrawal, disbursement and expenditure by the designated association of any funds received subject to the supervision and control of the activities authorized herein by the Department of Agriculture and Industries and the State Board of Agriculture and Industries. Assessments, fees or other charges collected as authorized by any legislative act adopted under authority hereof shall not be considered as a tax within the meaning of this Constitution or any Any uniformity requirements of thereof. this provision Constitution shall be satisfied by the application of the program upon poultry and poultry products." (Under the provisions of Act No. 262, Regular Session, 1963.)

Shall the following be adopted as an Amendment to the Constitution of Alabama?

"The Legislature may, by general or local laws, fix, alter and regulate the costs and charges of court and the fees, commissions, percentages, allowances, and salaries, including the method or basis of their compensation, to be charged or received by the judge of probate, sheriff, circuit clerk, register of the circuit court, tax assessor, tax collector, or any other officer of Marshall County, and may place any of such officers on a salary and provide that the fees, commissions, percentages, and allowances collected by such officers shall be paid into the county treasury from which their salaries shall be paid. The compensation of such officers shall not be increased or diminished during their terms." (Under the provisions of Act No. 225, Regular Session, 1963.)

#### **PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 7**

Shall the following be adopted as an Amendment to the Constitution of Alabama?

"In addition to all other purposes for which the county board of education or any city board of education in Coffee County is authorized by law to issue and sell warrants payable out of the proceeds from any special school tax or special tax for educational purposes generally, duly levied pursuant to this Constitution or amendments thereto, the county board of education of Coffee County or the city board of education of any city in such county is authorized to issue and sell warrants payable out of the proceeds of such special taxes for the purpose of refinancing any deficit created by proration of school funds prior to June 1, 1963. Before any warrants are issued hereunder the existence of such deficit and the amount thereof shall be determined by the state department of examiners of public accounts and certified to the board of education desiring to issue the warrants. All warrants issued hereunder shall be issued, sold, redeemed and otherwise handled in the same manner and upon the same terms and conditions as warrants issued pursuant to Article 4, Chapter 10, Title 52, Code of 1940." (Under the provisions of Act No. 88, Second Special Session, 1963.)

"The proceeds of said tax shall be used exclusively for constructing and improving school buildings and acquiring sites therefor in the School Tax District of the City of Huntsville, Alabama." (Under the provisions of Act No. 418, Regular Session, 1963.)

#### PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 10

Shall the following be adopted as an Amendment to the Constitution of Alabama?

"(1) Marion County shall have full and continuing power and authority notwithstanding the provisions of Sections 94, 215, 222 and 224 of this Constitution, to do and perform any act and to

engage in any activity that municipalities in said county are authorized to do, perform and engage in under the provisions of the amendment to this Constitution that was proposed by Act No. 1 adopted at the Second Special Session of 1950 of the Legislature of Alabama (commonly referred to as Amendment LXXXIV), including specifically, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the power to become indebted and in evidence thereof to issue bonds, warrants and other securities of said county for any of the purposes for which municipalities may issue securities under said amendment, and the power to levy ad valorem taxes in said county to pay the principal of and interest on said securities; provided, that the total principal amount of said securities at any time outstanding shall not exceed fifty per cent of the assessed valuation of the taxable property in said county as assessed for state taxation, and the taxes so levied shall not exceed two per cent per annum of said assessed valuation; and provided further that said county shall not exercise any of said powers unless and until a majority of the qualified electors of said county voting at an election held for such purpose shall have approved the exercise by said county of said powers, which election shall be called by the governing body of said county and held as nearly as may be practicable in accordance with the general laws of the state at the time in effect pertaining to the election on the issuance of county bonds. Said election may be held at any time and if at said election a majority of the electors voting thereat do not approve the exercise by said county of said powers, another election may be held hereunder at any time and from time to time thereafter. If at any such other election a majority of the qualified electors of said county voting at such election shall approve the exercise by said county of said powers, said county may thereafter, from time to time and at any time and without the necessity of any further election, exercise any or all of said powers as its governing body may deem advisable." (Under the provisions of Act No. 226, Regular Session, 1963.)

The city or the governing body thereof may borrow money and pledge to the payment of any bonds, warrants, notes or other obligations or evidences of indebtedness the annual proceeds from any special tax or taxes and to obligate itself irrevocably to continue to levy and collect such taxes annually until such obligations or evidences of indebtedness are paid in full, and may pledge thereto any rental or sales proceeds of property leased, or sold by it." (Under the provisions of Act No. 259, Regular Session, 1963.)

Shall the following be adopted as an Amendment to the Constitution of Alabama?

"The legislature may from time to time by general or local laws, fix, regulate and alter the fees, commissions, percentages, allowances, and compensation, and the method or basis of fixing the compensation to be charged or received by the judge of probate, sheriff, tax assessor, tax collector, clerk of the circuit court, and register of the circuit court of Baldwin County, and may put such officers on a salary basis and provide that the fees, commissions, percentages, and allowances payable to such officers according to law shall be paid into the county treasury. The legislature may in like manner also provide for consolidation of the offices of tax assessor and tax collector and require that the duties of those officers be performed by a single officer or county department, and may regulate and alter the term of any county officer." ## CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT ELECTION November 30, 1965

In pursuance of Section 285 of the Constitution, and in compliance with the laws pertaining to elections in the State of Alabama, the following amendments to the Constitution of Alabama are proposed to be submitted to the qualified electors of the State at a special election to be held on November 30, 1965, which is the date of the election ordered to be held by the Legislature of Alabama, and I request that you cause said proposed amendments to be placed upon the ballots to be used in said election on Tuesday, November 30, 1965:

#### **PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 1**

Shall the following be adopted as an Amendment to the Constitution of Alabama?

"The State of Alabama is authorized to become indebted for improvements at the Alabama State Docks and in evidence of the indebtedness so incurred to issue and sell, in addition to all other bonds of the State, interest bearing general obligation bonds of the State not exceeding three million dollars (\$3,000,000) in principal amount. The full faith and credit and taxing power of the State are hereby pledged to the prompt and faithful payment of the principal of the bonds and the interest thereon." (Under the provisions of Act No. 39, First Special Session 1965.)

#### **PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 2**

Shall the following be adopted as an Amendment to the Constitution of Alabama?

"1. The following persons, and no others, who, if they are citizens of the United States over the age of twenty-one years and have the qualifications as to residence prescribed in Section 178 of this Constitution, as amended, shall be qualified to register as electors provided they are not disqualified under Section 182 of this Constitution: Those who can, except for physical disability, read and write any article of the Constitution of the United States in the English language, and makes proof of the same in such manner as may be prescribed by the legislature. The legislature shall enact general registration laws whereby upon personal application a voter may be registered and his registration continued so long as he shall remain qualified to vote from the same address, and may provide by law for ascertaining by proper proofs, the citizens who shall be entitled to the right of suffrage.

"2. Article VIII, Section 181, of this Constitution, as amended, is hereby repealed." (Under the provisions of Act No. 239, First Special Session 1965.)

#### **PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 26**

Shall the following be adopted as an Amendment to the Constitution of Alabama?

"To authorize any municipality in Marion County that has may hereafter issue securities pursuant to the issued or amendment to the constitution proposed by Act No. 1 enacted at the Second Special Session of 1950 of the Legislature of Alabama to issue refunding securities, to invest (under certain conditions) the proceeds from the sale of such securities pending need therefor in certain specified investments, to issue securities for the combined purpose of refunding other such securities and of acquiring, constructing, extending or improving industrial or manufacturing plants or properties, to pledge certain revenues and taxes for payment of any such securities and to mortgage certain properties as security therefor; to provide that any securities issued by a municipality pursuant to said amendment may be general obligations of such municipality or may be limited as to the source of their payment; to provide that revenue bonds issued by a municipality under the provisions of such amendment shall not be considered indebtedness of such municipality for certain constitutional debt limit purposes; to specify and provide a limit upon the amount of indebtedness, other than that evidenced by revenue securities, that a municipality may incur under the provisions of said amendment; to specify that certain securities for which payment has been provided in a certain specified manner shall not be considered indebtedness of such municipality for certain constitutional debt limit pruposes; to require an election in any such municipality as a condition precedent to its exercise of powers thereunder, except that if a majority of those voting in any such municipality on the question of the adoption of said amendment vote in favor thereof no further election in such municipality shall be required; and to grant to the Legislature the power to adopt laws in furtherance of the purposes of said amendment, notwithstanding any contrary provisions of Section 104 of the Constitution of Alabama." Shall the following be adopted as an Amendment to the Constitution of Alabama?

"The Legislature may by general, special, private or local laws authorize the formation in any manner of a public corporation for the development of Bear Creek, its tributaries and watershed, for the purposes of navigation, water conservation and supply, flood control, irrigation, industrial development, public recreation, and related purposes, and may authorize the counties of Marion, Colbert, Franklin and Winston and all municipalities lying within Marion, Colbert, Franklin and Winston Counties to donate or contribute public funds to such public corporation and may authorize such public corporation to enter into contracts with the United States of America or any agency thereof, and with the several states or political subdivisions thereof, and with other public or private corporation organized within any of the several states, for the development of the Bear Creek watershed, and may authorize such public corporation to acquire by purchase, construction, lease, gift, condemnation, or otherwise property of any kind, real, personal or mixed, to mortgage or sell its property and to issue revenue bonds and other revenue securities payable solely out of revenues accruing to such public corporation, and may exempt such public corporation from all taxation in the State of Alabama, and may grant such public corporation all other powers and privileges which may be necessary and proper for the full development of said Bear Creek watershed. The provisions of Sections 106, 222 and 225 of the Constitution of Alabama shall not apply to any public corporation which may be organized pursuant to enabling legislation herein authorized or to any revenue bonds and other revenue securities at any time issued by such public corporation. Such public corporation shall be deemed a political subdivision of the State of Alabama. Nothing herein shall authorize any such public corporation to engage in or finance, directly or indirectly, the production, transmission, or sale of electric power. The area comprising the Bear Creek watershed shall include such land defined in enabling legislation herein authorized as shall lie within the counties of Marion, Colbert, Franklin and Winston." (Act No. 470, Regular Session, 1965.)



If a majority of the qualified electors of Mobile County participating in the election on the adoption of this amendment shall vote in favor thereof, then the approval of this amendment expressed by said vote shall of itself authorize the special tax and in that event no additional election by the voters of Mobile County shall be required to authorize the levy of the special tax." 

# PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 1

Shall the following be adopted as an Amendment to the Constitution of Alabama?

"In addition to any taxes now authorized or that may be hereafter authorized by the Constitution and laws of Alabama, the governing body of Franklin County shall levy and cause to be collected annually a special district tax, not exceeding 50 cents on each 100 dollars assessed valuation of taxable property in Districts One, Two, and Three of Franklin County, Alabama, to be used exclusively for public hospital purposes (as the term 'public hospital purposes' is defined in Amendment LXXVI to the Constitution proposed by Acts of 1949, Page 897, submitted December 13, 1949, and proclaimed ratified December 21, 1949) within said Districts One, Two, and Three; provided that the time during which such tax is to continue and the purpose thereof shall have been first submitted to a vote of the qualified electors in Districts One, Two, and Three of Franklin County and voted for by a majority of such electors voting at such election. The governing body of Franklin County may call an election at any time, and it shall be the duty of such governing body to call an election to be held within ninety days after receipt by it of a petition signed by not less than 5% of the qualified electors of said Districts One, Two, and Three, requesting that such election be called. The governing body may call such election to be held at the same time that this Amendment is submitted to the electors of the State for ratification and such election shall be effective to require the levy and collection of such tax in the event that this Amendment shall be ratified. The notice of such election, ballots to be used at such election and procedures for holding and determining the results of such election shall be prescribed by the governing body of Franklin County. No election shall be held hereunder within one year from the date of the last election so held." (Under the provisions of Act No. 13, Special Session, 1966.)





# PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT ELECTION DECEMBER 5, 1967

# PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 1

Shall the following be adopted as an Amendment to the Constitution of Alabama?

"The State of Alabama is authorized to become indebted and to sell and issue interest bearing bonds, in addition to all other bonds of the state, in an aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$15,000,000. The proceeds derived from the sale of said bonds shall be used solely for the purpose of paying the expenses incurred in the sale and issuance thereof and for the acquisition, and improvement of mental health facilities, construction including (a) improvements to the existing state hospitals for the mentally ill known as Bryce and Searcy Hospitals and to the existing state facilities for treatment and care of the mentally retarded known as Partlow School, for which improvements not exceeding \$3,000,000 of the proceeds from the said bonds may be used, (b) acquisition by construction and otherwise of one or more new state facilities and regional centers, or either, for treatment and care of the mentally retarded, for which purpose not exceeding \$9,000,000 of the proceeds from the said bonds may be used, and (c) acquisition by construction and otherwise of regional and community-based mental health centers and regional and community-based centers for treatment and care of the mentally retarded, for which purpose not exceeding \$3,000,000 of the proceeds from the said bonds may be used; provided, that bond proceeds may be used for a center referred to in the foregoing clause (c) only if a portion of the cost of that center is to be paid out of funds supplied by federal grant or by contribution of local political subdivisions or other local sources, or by both federal grant and such contribution. The improvement of a facility shall be deemed to include the renovation, modernization, remodeling, and equipment thereof and the construction of additions thereto; and the construction of a facility shall be deemed to include the acquisition of real estate sites and equipment therefor. Said bonds shall be sold only at a duly advertised public sale or sales, upon sealed bids or at auction, to the bidder whose bid reflects the lowest net interest cost to the state for the bonds offered for sale, and shall be sold at not less than their face value plus accrued interest thereon. Said bonds shall be direct general obligations of the state and for the prompt and faithful payment of the principal thereof and interest thereon the full faith and credit of the state are hereby irrevocably pledged. In addition thereto, there is hereby specially and irrevocably pledged for payment of the principal of and interest on said bonds, pro rata and without priority of one bond over another by reason of prior issuance or otherwise, that portion of an additional privilege and license tax on the sale, storage, use, consumption, or delivery of cigarettes, levied by an act adopted at the 1967 Regular Session of the Legislature of Alabama, that was appropriated in the said act to the purpose of acquiring and constructing mental health facilities in the state. The said special pledge shall create a charge on the tax proceeds herein specially pledged prior to all other charges or expenses for any purpose. The bonds issued under this amendment and the income therefrom shall be exempt from all taxation in the state. The Legislature shall adopt appropriate enabling legislation to carry out the intent and purpose of this amendment." (Act No. 273, Regular Session, 1967.)

### **PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 2**

Shall the following be adopted as an Amendment to the Constitution of Alabama?

"The State of Alabama is authorized to become indebted for acquiring, providing, constructing, developing, and equipping state parks and park facilities, and in evidence of the indebtedness so incurred to issue and sell, in addition to all other bonds of the State, interest bearing general obligation bonds of the State, not exceeding forty-three million dollars (43,000,000) in principal amount. The proceeds from the sale of any such bonds shall, after payment of the reasonable and necessary expenses of their issuance, be set aside in the state treasury in a special trust fund designated "State Parks Bond Proceeds Fund" and shall be disbursed therefrom on order of the Director of Conservation, approved by the Governor, for payment of costs of acquiring, providing, constructing, developing and equipping state parks and park facilities; provided, that any proceeds held in the State Parks Bond Proceeds Fund for more than thirty days shall be invested in securities which are direct and general obligations of the United States of America. The said bonds shall be direct general obligations of the state, and for the prompt and faithful payment of the principal thereof and interest thereon the full faith and credit of the state are hereby irrevocably pledged. In addition thereto, there is hereby specially and irrevocably pledged for payment of the principal of and interest on said bonds, pro rata and without priority of one bond over another by reason of prior issuance or otherwise, so much as may be necessary for said purpose of that portion of an additional privilege and license tax on the sale, storage, use, consumption, or delivery of cigarettes, levied by an act introduced at the 1967 Regular Session of the Legislature of Alabama as Senate Bill 280, that was appropriated in the said act to the development of state parks and state park facilities. The said special pledge shall create a charge on the tax proceeds herein specially pledged prior to all other charges or expenses for state park purposes or any other purposes whatever." (Under the provisions of Act No. 272, Regular Session, 1967.)

# **PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 3**

Shall the following be adopted as an Amendment to the Constitution of Alabama?

"Section 225 of Article XII of the Constitution of Alabama shall be amended to read as follows: Section 225. No city, town, or other municipal corporation having a population of less than six thousand, except as hereafter provided, shall become indebted in an amount, including present indebtedness, exceeding twenty per centum of the assessed value of the property therein, except for the construction of or purchase of water works, gas or electric lighting plants, or sewerage, or for the improvements of streets, for which purposes an additional indebtedness not exceeding three per centum may be created; provided, this limitation shall not affect any debt now authorized by law to be created, nor any temporary loans to be paid within one year, made in anticipation of the collection of taxes, not exceeding one-fourth of the annual revenues of such city or town. All towns and cities having a population of six thousand or more are hereby authorized to become indebted in an amount, including present indebtedness, not exceeding twenty per centum of the assessed valuation of the property therein, provided that there shall not be included in the limitation of the indebtedness of such last described cities and

towns the following classes of indebtedness, to-wit: Temporary loans, to be paid within one year, made in anticipation of the collection of taxes and not exceeding one-fourth of the general revenues, bonds, or other obligations already issued, or which may hereafter be issued for the purpose of acquiring, providing, or constructing school houses, water works, and sewers; and obligations incurred and bonds issued for street or sidewalk improvements, where the cost of the same, in whole or in part, is to be assessed against the property abutting said improvements; provided, that the proceeds of all obligations issued as herein provided in excess of said twenty per centum shall not be used for any purpose other than that for which said obligations were issued. Nothing contained in this article shall prevent the funding or refunding of valid obligations existing at the time of such funding or refunding. This section shall not apply to the cities of Sheffield and Tuscumbia. The limitations specified in this section shall not be applicable to any obligations or indebtedness that may be exempted from the said limitations by the provisions of any portion of this constitution, including any amendment thereto at any time adopted." (Act No. 280, Regular Session, 1967.)

Shall the following be adopted as an Amendment to the Constitution of Alabama?

the Constitution of Alabama "Any provision or of the contrary notwithstanding, amendments thereto the to legislature may by appropriate laws authorize the state to engage in works of internal improvement by fulfilling the requirements of local contribution, participation and cooperation now or hereafter established by the United States in connection with (1) the construction and maintenance of a navigable waterway (herein called "the waterway") between Demopolis, Alabama, and the Tennessee River and (2) the implementation and maintenance of flood control projects on the tributary streams of the Tombigbee River (herein called "the flood control projects"). The legislature may by appropriate laws authorize the state to become indebted and, in evidence of such indebtedness, to sell and issue its interest-bearing bonds, in an aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$10,000,000, for the purpose of enabling the state to discharge obligations at any time authorized by the legislature to be undertaken in connection with the waterway and the flood control project; provided, that the expenses incurred in connection with the sale and issuance of the bonds may also be paid from the proceeds thereof. Bonds evidencing the herein provided for indebtedness may be issued as direct general obligations of the state, and the state may pledge its full faith and credit to the prompt payment of the principal of the bonds and the interest thereon. The herein provided for indebtedness shall not be construed to prohibit or limit appropriations from the general fund of the state which from time to time may be made for the purpose of enabling the state to discharge obligations at any time authorized by the legislature to be undertaken in connection with the waterway and the flood control projects. The legislature may by appropriate laws establish a public corporation and may confer upon it, in addition to all other necessary powers, full power to undertake the obligations that the state is permitted

under the foregoing provisions of this amendment to undertake in connection with the waterway and the flood control projects. The legislature may from time to time appropriate money from the general fund of the state to be expended by such public corporation and may also authorize the herein provided for general obligation bonds of the state to be sold from time to time under the supervision of such public corporation; provided, that all moneys received by such public corporation from the state, whether as appropriations from the state's general fund or as proceeds of the sale of the state's bonds, shall be expended, except for reasonable administrative expenses, in discharging obligations that the state is permitted under the foregoing provisions of this amendment to undertake in connection with the waterway and the flood control projects and shall have directed such public corporation to undertake in its stead." (Act No. 248, Regular Session, 1967.)

All monies derived from the sale of hunting and fishing licenses or permits; f. All monies derived from the sale of lands, timber or other natural resources owned by the Game and Fish Division of the Department of Conservation; g. All monies accruing to the game and fish fund from any other source whatsoever. No funds accruing to the game and fish fund of the State of Alabama from any source whatsoever shall be expended for any other purpose than the payment of administrative costs of the game and fish activities of the Department of Conservation and for the protection, propagation, preservation, investigation of game and fish and public use of the game and fish resources of this State." (Act No. 203, Regular Session, 1967.)

"In addition to any taxes now authorized or that may be hereafter authorized by the Constitution and laws of Alabama, the governing body of Walker County shall levy and cause to be collected annually a special district tax, not exceeding 50 cents on each 100 dollars assessed valuation of taxable property in District Two of Walker County, Alabama, to be used exclusively for public hospital purposes (as the term 'public hospital purposes' is defined in Amendment LXXVI to the Constitution proposed by Acts of 1949, Page 897, submitted December 13, 1949, and proclaimed ratified December 21, 1949) within said District Two; provided that the time during which such tax is to continue and the purpose thereof shall have been first submitted to a vote of the qualified electors in District Two of Walker County and voted for by a majority of such electors voting at such election." (Under the provisions of Act No. 5, Regular Session, 1967.)

### **PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 12**

Shall the following be adopted as an Amendment to the Constitution of Alabama?

"Shall the town of Carbon Hill in Walker County be empowered and authorized to acquire and dispose of all kinds of property, to promote the development of the town of Carbon Hill, and the location of new industries or businesses therein, to become a stockholder in any corporation, association or company, to lend its credit or grant public money and things of value in aid of individuals, firms, associations and corporations, to become indebted and issue and sell securities, to levy and collect a special ad valorem tax and to pledge to the payment of its securities the proceeds of such special tax and other incomes, to create a public

corporation or authority and to delegate to such public corporation or authority all powers or authorities granted by this amendment to such municipality, provided such action be first approved by the qualified electors of the municipality?" (Under the provisions of Act No. 278, Regular Session, 1967.)

#### **PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 14**

Shall the following be adopted as an Amendment to the Constitution of Alabama?

"In addition to all taxes now, or hereafter authorized by the Constitution and Laws of Alabama, The City of Fort Payne, DeKalb County, Alabama, shall have the power to levy and collect a special school tax up to  $7\frac{1}{2}$  mills on each dollar's worth of taxable property in the City of Fort Payne, DeKalb County, Alabama, the proceeds of which shall be used exclusively for school purposes; provided that such tax and the purpose or purposes thereof, and the times such taxes are proposed to be continued, shall have first been submitted to the vote of the qualified electors of the City of Fort Payne, DeKalb County, Alabama, and voted for by the majority of those voting at such election. The special tax provided herein may be renewed from time to time, in the manner provided herein, for such periods of time as are necessary. If any proposal to levy the taxes is defeated in any election, subsequent elections thereon may be held at any time." (Under the provisions of Act No. 282, Regular Session, 1967.)

### PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 15

Shall the following be adopted as an Amendment to the Constitution of Alabama?

"Any corporation heretofore or hereafter created in any county of the State having a population of 500,000 or more, according to the last or any subsequent Federal census, for the purpose of establishing, maintaining and operating a civic center in the municipality in which the county seat of such county is situated, shall be authorized, without the necessity of any to issue bonds, warrants or other evidences of election, indebtedness, and to pledge for the payment of the principal and interest due thereon any revenues received, or to be received, by such corporation and any tax proceeds appropriated or allocated (in whole or in part) to such public corporation by or pursuant to any act of the Legislature of Alabama or by or pursuant to any resolution or ordinance of such county or any municipality therein, any provision of the Constitution or laws of Alabama to the contrary notwithstanding. No such bonds, warrants or other evidences of indebtedness issued by such corporation shall be considered indebtedness of such county or any municipality therein within the meaning of Sections 224 and 225 of the Constitution of Alabama. The rent or rentals that the county or any such municipality may be obligated to pay under the terms of any lease between the said corporation and the said county or any such municipality shall not be considered as indebtedness of said county or any such municipality within the meaning of Sections 224 and 225 of the Constitution of Alabama.

"No tax levied by the State or any municipality or county of the State shall apply to any such corporation, unless such tax applies to the county and the city wherein the corporation is located. The word 'tax' as herein used, shall include any ad valorem tax, or other direct tax, and any excise, privilege or license tax.

"The following are hereby in all things validated and

confirmed, any provision or provisions of the Constitution of Alabama of 1901 to the contrary notwithstanding: Acts numbered 524, 525 and 547 enacted at the 1965 Regular Session of the Legislature of Alabama; Act No. 114 enacted at the Second Special Session of 1965 of the Legislature of Alabama; and all corporations established by said Act No. 547, as well as all acts done under the authority of any of said Acts, including (without limitation) the acquisition of property, the making of contracts and the incurring of obligations and liabilities. Further, that certain bill introduced in the Alabama House of Representatives on August 3, 1967 as House Bill 823, as said bill was finally enacted into law, is hereby validated and confirmed, any provision of the Constitution of 1901 to the contrary notwithstanding; provided that said bill (or a substitute therefor) is enacted by the Legislature of Alabama and is approved by the Governor (or becomes law without such approval)." (Act No. 279, Regular Session, 1967.)

### **PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 16**

Shall the following be adopted as an Amendment to the Constitution of Alabama?

"(A) The purpose of this amendment is to clarify and make further provisions regarding the public school purposes for which the following special school taxes, heretofore voted in the school district of the City of Anniston, may be applied: (1) the special annual ad valorem school tax at the rate of Fifty Cents (50¢) on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) of taxable property which was voted for public school purposes at the special election held in the said school district on March 16, 1948, pursuant to call of the said election made in that certain amendment to the Constitution proposed by Act No. 587 adopted at the 1947 Regular Session of Legislature (sometimes known as, and herein called, the Amendment 68), and which was levied by Amendment 68 for public school purposes in the said school district for a period of thirty years commencing with the tax year beginning October 1, 1947, and with the last year's tax being payable October 1, 1977; and (2) the special annual ad valorem school tax at the same rate which was voted for public school purposes at the special election held in the said school district on February 15, 1966, pursuant to call of the said election made in that certain amendment to the Constitution proposed by Act No. 72 adopted at the 1965 Regular Session of the Legislature (sometimes known as, and herein called, Amendment 232), and which was levied by Amendment 232 for public school purposes in the said school district for a period of thirty years commencing with the tax year beginning October 1, 1977, and with the first year's tax being payable October 1, 1978. "(B) In addition to the public school purposes specifically mentioned in Amendment 68, in Amendment 232, and in that

amendment to the Constitution, supplemental to certain Amendment 68, that was proposed by Act No. 1045 adopted at the 1961 Regular Session of the Legislature (sometimes known as, and herein called, Amendment 165), that portion of the proceeds from the special school tax levied by Amendment 68 in the school district of the City of Anniston that is not needed to pay debt service on bonds heretofore issued by the City of Anniston under Amendment 68 or under Amendment 165, or to comply with any other covenants contained in proceedings authorizing the issuance of the said bonds, and also the proceeds from the special school tax levied by Amendment 232, may be used to pay the principal of and interest on any securities (including, but without limitation to, warrants) that may hereafter be issued by the City of Anniston, pursuant to request by the City Board of Education of Anniston, for the purpose of (i) paying costs of acquiring, constructing and improving public school buildings in the said school district, (ii) refunding the principal of warrants or other securities issued by the said city, after the effective date of for payment of costs of acquisition, 232, Amendment construction and improvement of public school buildings, or (iii) the combined purpose of payment of such costs and such refunding. Costs of constructing a school building shall be deemed to include the costs of acquiring a site therefor. Any such securities may be either general obligations of the City of Anniston secured by a pledge of the proceeds of either or both of the said school taxes or may be special obligations of the said city payable solely out of and secured by a pledge of the proceeds of either or both of the said taxes; and any such securities shall be issued by the said city pursuant to the powers conferred on municipalities by existing statutes. Any pledges that may hereafter be made either hereunder or under Amendment 232, with respect to the proceeds from the special school tax levied by Amendment 232, shall take precedence in the order in which they are made. Any pledges that may hereafter be made either hereunder or under Amendment 165, with respect to the proceeds from the special school tax levied by Amendment 68, shall take precedence in the order in which they are made and shall be subordinate to the pledges heretofore made by the City of Anniston pursuant to either Amendment 68 or Amendment 165. If the proceeds of the tax levied by Amendment 232, should at any time be pledged pursuant to either this amendment or Amendment 232, the Tax Collector of Calhoun County shall, upon collection thereof, pay such proceeds to the City of Anniston; and until the proceeds of

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the special tax levied by Amendment 232, are so pledged, he shall pay such proceeds to the Board of Education of the City of Anniston. If pledges are hereunder made with respect to either or both of the said special school taxes, and if the governing body of the City of Anniston shall hereafter determine that the proceeds from the tax or taxes so pledged are in excess of the amount needed to satisfy the said pledges and any other then outstanding pledges made under any of the other amendments herein referred to, then the said proceeds, to the extent of the said excess, may be applied for other public school purposes in the said school district.

"(C) The provisions hereof are supplemental to Amendments 68, 165, and 232 and the powers and authority herein granted shall be in addition to the powers and authority conferred by the said amendments.

"(D) Each of the said special elections held as aforesaid on March 16, 1948, and on February 15, 1966, is hereby validated, in spite of any irregularities in connection with the giving of notice or the holding thereof or any other irregularity in connection therewith." (Under the provisions of Act No. 108, Special Session, 1967.)
