#### TERMS OF SALE OF THE PRESBYTERIAN BOARD OF PUBLICATION.

On all purchases amounting to \$12 or upwards, for which the cash is paid when the books are ordered, a discount of 25 per cent. shall be allowed.

On sums less than \$12 no discount is allowed, except to booksellers, ministers, and theological students of any denomination.

### PRELIMINARY NOTICE.

THE Presbyterian Board of Publication went into operation A D. 1840, and at the time of issuing the Annual Report in May 1856, had published four hundred and seven different works, exclusive of tracts and pamphlets.

The works enumerated in the following Catalogue are of every variety, from the most profound treatises in theology, to the simplest child's hymn-book and catechism. Many of them are of the highest value even to ministers, and until issued by the Board had never been republished in this country, and could of course only be had by importation, and at such prices as placed them beyond the reach of ministers of limited means.

Many of the books are also designed to enlighten and establish Presbyterians, more especially in the peculiarities of their own doctrines and polity. Where are to be found works better suited to this purpose, than Fisher's Catechism, Lime Street Lectures, Dickinson on the Five Points, The Great Supper, Matthews on the Divine Purpose, Miller on Presbyterianism, Miller on Public Prayer, Shaw's Exposition of the Confession of Faith, Green's Lectures on the Shorter Catechism, Hodge's History of the Presbyterian Church, &c.?

The Catalogue of the Board also contains a rich assortment of practical books. The Life of McCheyne has been thought, by some, to rank with those of Martyn and Brainerd, and it surely would be difficult to find a biography in which there is more of a sweet and spirit-cheering piety. Alexander's Religious Experience has been read with pleasure and profit by all denominations, while, by his Practical Sermons, he being dead still continues to preach in many a social meeting, and to teach by many a fireside. The Communicant's Companion, and Communicant's Manual, are unsurpassed in their adaptation to aid

the people of God in their preparation for the sacramental table. Alexander's Family Worship is probably the best book in this important department of family religion extant; and as for Alleine's Alarm, Baxter's Call and Saint's Rest, Bunyan's Pilgrim's Progress and Holy War, Boston's Fourfold State, Doddridge's Rise and Progress-what need is there to speak of their adaptation to alarm the careless, to call the unconverted to repentance, to explain the origin and progress of true religion in the soul, to instruct the pilgrim warrior in his journeyings and his conflicts, and to point him to his everlasting rest?

Nor have the children, the hope of the Church, been forgotten. Not less than two hundred and eight books, adapted to their wants, have been issued; and the Board have specially endeavoured to guard against such works as would tend to create a taste for novel and other fictitious reading; and also to afford such instruction, as that the children should not only

be trained up Christians, but Presbyterians.

This Board can do a work for the Presbyterian Church which can be done by no other institution. Societies of a general character are, from their very nature, prohibited from publishing anything which wears even a denominational complexion. In this day when error in every guise is so rife, and untiring efforts to proselyte from their faith, especially the young of our Zion, are made, there is an imperative necessity that our people should better understand the doctrines, history, government, and ordinances of the Church, within whose pale their lot is cast.

## ALPHABETICAL CATALOGUE.

The letter M prefixed to a book denotes that it is most suitable for a Minister's Library: C for a Congregational Library, and S for a Sabbath-school Library.

It is difficult to draw the exact line of distinction in every case, some in one class being equally suitable for another. Purchasers can make their own selection, adding or omitting as they please.

- S 1. The Way of Salvation, familiarly explained in a conversation between a Father and his Children. By the Rev. A. Alexander, D.D. 32mo. 5, 10 and 15 cents.
- An excellent little work for young persons.
- C 2. The Mute Christian under the Smarting Rod; with sovereign antidotes for every case. By the Rev. Thomas Brooks. 18mo. 25 and 30 cents. This is a well known work, by a divine of former days, and has imparted consolation to many an afflicted child of God.
- C 3. The Great Concern of Salvation. By the Rev. Thomas Halyburton, 18mo. 25 and 30 cents.
  - The praise of this work is in all the churches.
- C 4. Christian Consistency, or the connection between Experimental and Practical Religion. Designed for young persons. By the Rev. E. Mannering. 18mo. 25 and 30 cents.

Competent judges have pronounced this to be an excellent treatise.

C 5. Self-Employment in Secret, containing an Inquiry into the state of the Soul; thoughts upon Painful Afflictions; Memorials for practice. By the Rev. John Corbet. 18mo. 5, 10 and 15 cents.

This little book affords an example of the faithful scrutiny which every Christian should employ in examining into the state of his soul. (See No. 344.)

C 6. A Treatise on the Scripture Doctrine of Original Sin. With Explanatory Notes. By the Rev. H. A. Boardman, D. D. 18mo. 20 and 25 cents.

A very judicious discussion of a doctrine which all should thoroughly understand.

C 7. The Pleasures of Religion. By the Rev. Henry Forster Burder, D.D. 18mo. 25 and 30 cents.

This book forms a charming persuasive to piety, and may with profit be read by old and young.

S 8. French Protestants; or Revocation of the Edict of Nantes, and its consequences to the Protestant Churches of France and Italy; containing Memoirs of some of the sufferers. 18mo. 25 and 30 cents.

This is an interesting memorial of the sufferings of some of the pious Protestants of France, under the cruel persecutions of the Church of Rome.

M 9. The Utility and Importance of Creeds and Confessions; addressed particularly to candidates for the ministry. By the Rev. Samuel Miller, D.D. 18mo. 20 and 25 cents.

Although this treatise is designed more particularly for candidates for the ministry, all may read it with profit, who wish to see a condensed argument in favour of creeds, and a satisfactory reply to the usual objections urged against such formularies.

S 10. Life of John Knox, the Scottish Reformer. 18mo. 25 and 30 cents.

This is an abridgment of the larger work of McCrie. (See No. 178.) No Presbyterian should be ignorant of the incidents in the life of such a man as Knox. The time in which he lived; the stirring scenes through which he passed; the grace and courage with which he was endowed; and the remarkable success attending his work of reform, all point him out as a remarkable instrument in the hand of God, in building up his cause in our world.

S 11. Life of Captain James Wilson. Containing an account of his residence in India; his conversion to Christianity; his missionary voyage to the South Seas, and his peaceful death. 18mo. 20 and 25 cents.

The perils through which Captain Wilson passed; the sufferings he endured; his remarkable conversion; his entire devotion to the cause of God, especially in the work of missions, all tend to impart intense interest to this narrative.

C 12. Letters to an Anxious Inquirer, designed to relieve the difficulties of a friend under serious impressions. By the Rev. T. Charlton Henry, D. D., with a Biographical Sketch and Portrait of the author. 18mo. 35 and 40 cents.

This is a valuable help to persons whose inquiry is, "What must we do to be saved?" Many are awakened, who eventually relapse into indifference, and this unhappy result is often attributable to injudicious counsel. Although the pecu liarities of all cases of serious concern cannot be embraced in a work of this kind, yet we have no doubt, that all anxious inquirers may find much in these letters to suit their case.

S 13. A Threefold Cord; or a Precept, Promise, and Prayer from the Holy Scripture for every day in the year. 32mo. 15 and 20 cents.

This is a neat pecket volume, and may be useful not only for daily reference, but as affording a daily exercise for the memory of young persons. (See Nos. 314 and 315.)

M 14. The Duties and Responsibilities of the Pastoral Office. Being an abridgment of the REFORMED PASTOR, by the Rev. Richard Baxter. 18mo. 25 and 30 cents.

The Reformed Pastor, by Baxter, has always been regarded as an inestimable rade mecum for elergymen In its original form it is too diffuse and voluminous, and it is believed, that the abridgment in the present edition, instead of injuring, will greatly promote its usefulness. We do not exaggerate, when we say, that it is inimitable for its pungent appeals to conscience and useful directions, and should not only be read, but read frequently, by all who bear the pastoral office.

C 15. The Offices of Christ, abridged from the original work of the Rev. George Stevenson, by the Rev. William S. Plumer, D. D. 18mo, 20 and 25 cents.

Mr. Stevenson has treated this important subject with much ability, and the abridgment, which does not interfere with the language of the author, preserves the substance and spirit of the original work.

C 16. The Divine Purpose, displayed in the works of Providence and Grace. In a series of twenty letters addressed to an inquiring Friend. By the Rev. John Matthews, D. D. 18mo. 25 and 30 cents.

These letters by the venerable Dr. Matthews, of Indiana, have passed through several editions. They illustrate the doctrine of the divine decrees in the most pleasing and forcible manner. (See No. 216.)

M 17. Presbyterianism the Truly Primitive and Apostolical Constitution of the Church of Christ; and INFANT BAP-TISM Scriptural and Reasonable, and Baptism by Sprinkling or Affusion the most suitable and edifying mode. By the Rev. Samuel Miller, D. D. 12mo. 40 cents.

As tracts, these excellent treatises have been extensively read; they are now bound in a handsome volume.

C 18. The Spirit of Prayer. By the Rev. N. Vincent. 32mo. 15 and 20 cents.

This may safely be pronounced to be an admirable treatise on Prayer, which, although bearing some of the traces of an old fashioned style, is full of the most impressive and instructive matter.

20. The Constitution of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, containing the Confession of Faith, the Catechisms, and the Directory for the Worship of God; together with the Plan of Government and Discipline. 18mo. 371/2 cents.

This is a new stereotype edition, and has been carefully revised; the Scripture references have been put in larger type, and the amended rules have been added. It is both a correct and cheap edition.

C 21. A Guide to Christian Communicants, in the exercise of Self-Examination. By the Rev. William Trail. 32mo. 10 and 15 cents.

The Christian who will faithfully apply the rules here recommended for selfexamination will soon be able to converse with his own soul, and to ascertain its true state.

C 22. A Friendly Visit to the House of Mourning; by the Rev. Richard Cecil. 32mo. 10 and 15 cents.

Cecil is a charming writer. This treatise from his pen may be applied as a healing balm to the afflicted heart.

23. Discourses on Regeneration, abridged. By the Rev. Stephen Charnock. 12mo. 65 cents.

This, like all Charnock's works, is scriptural, discriminating, and highly instructive.

C 24. Love to Christ, chiefly extracted from the "True Christian's Love of the unseen Christ." By Thomas Vincent. 32mo. 15 and 20 cents.

The Christian and unbeliever will find in this book the most pathetic and forcible appeals to stir up in their souls true love to the Saviour. 3 \* 29

### S 25. The Life of Major-General Andrew Burn, of the Royal

Marines. With a likeness. 18mo. 25 and 30 cents.

The blography of General Burn is instructive. He narrates with great simplicity and piety the dealings of the Lord with his soul. His profession of religion under inadequate impressions; his subsequent apostasy; the dreafful effects on his character, produced by a residence in France; his subsequent deliverance; his true conversion, and his steadfast piety to the close of a protracted life, are topics which will all furnish food for serious reflection.

#### S 26. Life of Lieutenant-Colonel Blackader. Born 1654-Died

1729. 18mo. 20 and 25 cents.

This biography, like the preceding, furnishes strong proof that divine grace can sustain the soul and preserve Christian consistency of character in the most untoward situations of life. Burn and Blackader, in those two schools of vice, the British navy and army, were pleasing examples of the truth and power of true religion. Blackader, as a brave soldier, exposed to innumerable perils in some of the bloodiest battles which have afflicted humanity, never seemed to forget that his dependence was in God. Let those who excuse their negligence on the ground of want of opportunity for cultivating religious principles, real this memoir, and see how piety can be cultivated in the most unpropitious situations.

## S 27. Life of the Rev. George Trosse, of Exeter, England. 18mo. 20 and 25 cents.

The subject of this memoir, in his youth, was licentious and profligate in the extreme, but when renewed by the grace of God he became equally conspicuous for his holy and useful life. The narrative is highly interesting.

## C 28. Scripture Portions for the Afflicted, especially the Sick, with reflections from various authors. 18mo. 25 and 30 cents.

The design of this little book is sufficiently indicated by its title. The reflections, suited to the afflicted, are selected from a great variety of the best and most approved divines. It is an excellent little manual for a sick chamber.

#### S 29. The Destruction of Jerusalem, an irresistible proof of the Divine origin of Christianity. 18mo. 20 and 25 cents.

It is impossible, as we think, to read this treatise without being struck by the proof which it affords of the truth of Christianity. The predictions of Christ in relation to the overthrow and final destruction of Jerusalem, were so minutely fulfilled, even his enemies being the witnesses, that the conviction cannot be resisted, that he was the Great Prophet. The prediction and fulfilment are so associated, and the details are so thrilling, that young persons will regard this book as a very attractive one.

# C 30. The Christian's Great Interest; or the trial of a saving interest in Christ, and the way to attain it. By the Rev. William Guthrie, minister at New Kilmarnock, Scotland, 1605. With an Introductory Essay, by the Rev. Thomas Chalmers, D.D. 18mo. 30 and 35 cents.

A work of such established character as this needs no special commendation from us. Although the style is old, the matter is so rich as amply to reward a perusal. Guthrie should not merely be read once, but be the day-book of those who wish to try whether they have a saving interest in Christ.

#### C 31. The Life of Andrew Melville, the Scottish Reformer, Abridged from McCrie's Life of Melville. With an engraving. 18mo. 20 and 25 cents.

The Life of Melville, by McCrie, is in two octavo volumes, and contains a vast deal of matter uninteresting to the general reader. This judicious little abridgment will be read with ease and pleasure, particularly by the young.

#### S 32. The Lives of the Patriarchs. 18mo. 30 and 35 cents.

This is a book designed chiefly for Sunday-school scholars, and is well adapted to secure the attention and inform the mind. It is illustrated with various engravings.

33. An Exposition of the Epistle to the Romans, in the form of questions and answers. By the Rev. J. J. Janeway, D.D. 18mo. 10 cents.

To those who wish to study this important Epistle, and especially to Bible classes, this will be a very valuable aid.

C 34. A Blow at the Root of Antinomianism. By the Rev. John Flavel. 32mo, 10 and 15 cents.

A capital refutation of the odious doctrine that believers are freed from the moral law as a rule of life.

C 35. The Fulfilling of the Scriptures, for confirming believers and convincing unbelievers; by the Rev. Robert Fleming. 18mo. 45 and 50 cents.

Fleming has long been known for the rich and scriptural instruction which his book affords. It may be regarded as affording a strong proof of the truth of the Scriptures.

M 36. The Lime Street Lectures; a Defence of the important doctrines of the gospel, in twenty-six sermons, by several eminent divines. 8vo. \$1.25.

The Lime Street Lectures have long been regarded as a standard work on Calvinistic theology. They have different degrees of merit, and yet are all characterized by forcible arguments in the illustration and enforcement of the great doctrines of grace. The elergyman's library cannot be complete without this book, and the intelligent layman should be acquainted with its contents.

C 38. A Series of Tracts, on the Doctrines, Order, and Polity of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, embracing several on practical subjects, in eight volumes. 12mo. \$4.00.

These tracts have been before the Church in a separate form, and many of them have been widely circulated, and extensively useful. They are now collected in seven neat duodecimo volumes.

39. The Form of Government, the Discipline and Directory for Worship of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America. 18mo. 25 cents.

Published in a separate form, for the convenience of those who wish it for easy reference, and to carry with them to ecclesiastical judicatories. With a complete index.

40. The Larger Catechism of the Westminster Assembly; with proofs from the Scriptures. 18mo. 10 and 15 cents.

The Larger Catechism is usually bound up with the Confession of Faith, and is seldom found in a separate form; but as advanced classes may wish to commit it to memory, as a more full summary of divine truth than the Shorter Catechism, it has been bound in a neat little volume for their use.

41. The Psalms and Hymns, adapted to public worship, and approved by the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America. 64mo., 24mo., 18mo., and 12mo., various prices.

The Board are always prepared to supply the demand for the Psalms and Hymns now in use, in bindings suited to every taste.

C 43. The Return of Prayers. By Thomas Goodwin, B. D. 32mo. 15 and 20 cents.

Goodwin was a popular writer in his day, and although his style is somewhat antiquated, it is sufficiently expressive of the sterling and pious thoughts of the eminent author. This treatise is a beautiful illustration of Psalm lxxxv. 8, in which the author discusses, in a comprehensive way, a subject but too little considered—the answer of prayer.

C 45. Sketches of Church History; comprising a regular series of the

most important and interesting events in the History of the Church, from the birth of Christ to the nineteenth century. By the Rev. James Wharey. 18mo. 35 and 40 cents.

A succinct, but very satisfactory sketch of events in ecclesiastical history, and particularly suited to the edification of those who have not the opportunity of perusing larger histories. Every Christian should at least feel interest enough in the history of the Church of former ages, to become familiar with the contents of this volume. It is an abridgment of Mosheim.

C 46. The Life of the Rev. John Owen, D. D. abridged from Orme's Life of Owen; and the Life of the Rev. John Janeway, in one volume. 18mo. 30 and 35 cents.

A comparatively small volume, but embracing the leading events in the livos two of the most heavenly-minded men that ever fulfilled the earthly pilgrimage. The writings of Owen are familiar to every theological student; Janeway was less learned, less known through the press, but kept equal pace with him in that growing conformity to the image of Christ which makes a heaven on earth. The heart is improved by the perusal of such biographies.

C 47. The Life of the Rev. Richard Baxter, abridged from Orme's Life of Baxter. 18mo. 25 and 30 cents.

Who has not read Baxter's Call to the Unconverted, and the Saint's Everlasting Rest, by the same author? And who that has read these, has not felt a desire to become personally acquainted, as it were, with the author? Biography affords the necessary introduction, and we may here see the author practically illustrating in his own life, the principles which he taught to mend the hearts and reform the lives of others.

C 48. The Christian Education of the Children and Youth in the Presbyterian Church. By the Rev. Samuel Miller, D. D., and the Rev. J. J. Janeway, D. D. 18mo. 15 and 20 cents.

This neat and useful little volume treats of a subject of unspeakable importance, and furnishes most valuable hints both to pastors and the heads of families, to whom it is earnestly recommended.

C 50. Memoir of the Rev. John Rodgers, D. D. Late pastor of the Wall Street and Brick churches, in the city of New York. By the Rev Samuel Miller, D. D. With a beautiful mezzotint likeness. 18mo. 30 and 35 cents.

This Biography has peculiar interest for the clergy and members of the Presby-brian Church. Its subject was an eminent minister of the gospel, and one of the fathers of the Presbyterian Church as now organized. The biographer has succeeded in giving a very pleasing portraiture of the truly excellent and exemplary man who held so prominent a place in the Church in the day in which he lived, and has interspersed his narrative with sketches of character, and historical events of great interest.

C 51. The Mystery of Providence, &c. By the Rev. John Flavel, A. D. 1677. 18mo. 30 and 35 cents.

Flavel is so well known as a writer, as to need no commendation; and this is by no means one of his least esteemed works. The doctrine of the divine providence is ably unfolded.

C 52. The Life of the Rev. Philip Henry; by his son, the Rev Matthew Henry. 18mo. 30 and 35 cents.

This is among the best biographics extant. Philip Henry was great in goodness, is well as in knewledge, and his equally eminent son, the Commentator, has done instice to his memory.

C 53. Memoir of the last illness and Death of William Tharp Buchanan, Esq., of Ilfracombe. By the late William Shepherd, Esq., of Ilfracombe, Devon. 18mo. 20 and 25 cents.

Mr. Buchanan died in his youth, and a peculiar interest is thrown about his

character from the circumstance, that grace converted him from being a sceptic, into an humble follower of the Lamb. The process by which the great change was effected, is given in detail by his dear friend and biographer, who was called to follow him to eternity before these memorials were published. Let the young, and particularly young men, be induced to read this narrative.

C 54. An Essay on the Warrant, Nature and Duties of the Office of RULING ELDER in the Presbyterian Church. By the Rev. Samuel Miller, D. D. 18mo. 35 and 40 cents.

This is probably the fullest, as we believe it to be the best, treatise written on the subject. The Warrant is clearly made out, and the Duties forcibly stated. No Ruling Elder should be ignorant of this book; and indeed every Presbyterian should feel sufficient interest in the peculiarities of his own Church, to desire to know the Scriptural Warrant of one of its principal officers.

M 55. Miller on the Christian Ministry, or the Primitive and Apostolic Order of the Church of Christ Vindicated. By the Rev. Samuel Miller, D. D. 12mo. 60 cents.

It is a characteristic of this author, that when he addresses himself to a work, he comes well prepared; and if sound arguments, based on incontrovertible facts, can satisfy the mind of an inquirer, he is not likely to lay down one of Dr. Miller's books dissatisfied. This work is an admirable vindication of the order of the Presbyterian Church, and a most satisfactory refutation of the claims of diocesan Episcopacy.

M 57. The Constitutional History of the Presbyterian Church, in the United States of America. By the Rev. Charles Hodge, D. D., Professor in the Theological Seminary at Princeton. Two volumes bound in one. 8vo. \$1.75.

This work should find a place in the library, not only of every minister, but of every Presbyterian family. As an authentic history of our Church it is invaluable.

S 59. Labourers in the East; or Memoirs of Eminent Men, who were devoted to the service of Christ in India; containing abridged biographies of the Rev. Dr. Buchanan, the Rev. Henry Martyn, and the Rev. David Brown. With an engraving. 18mo. 35 and 40 cents.

This is a charming little book, in which the examples of three eminently pious servants of Christ are set forth in so attractive a manner as can scarcely fail to awaken the desire to go and do likewise. It has a neat wood-cut as a frontispice, representing Henry Martyn, sick by the way side, shortly before his translation to that home where the inhabitant shall not say he is sick.

S 60. Voyages to and from the Cape of Good Hope; with an account of a journey into the interior of South Africa. By the Rev. John Campbell. Intended for the young. With several engravings. 18mo. 30 and 35 cents.

Our young readers would be much pleased to accompany Mr. Campbell through a wild part of Africa, to visit the different Missionary stations. The dangers he escaped, the difficulties he surmounted, and the various incidents of his journey, are sufficient to keep the attention engaged.

M 62. A Discourse concerning the Holy Spirit, wherein an account is given of his name, nature, personality, dispensation, operations, and effects. Also the nature and necessity of gospel holiness, and the difference between grace and morality. By the Rev. John Owen, D. D. With a portrait of the author. 12mo. 75 cents.

As a profound theologian, an excellent scholar, and an humble and devoted Christian, few men have equalled the great John Owen. All his works bear the traces of his great mind and pious affections, but some of them have always been the peculiar favourites of the religious public, and among these his work on the Holy Spirit occupies a high rank.

S 63. History of the Inquisition, from its establishment to the present time. By William Sime. With two engravings. 18mo. 25 and 30 cents.

Many large works have been written on the Inquisition, but a portable volume, containing all the principal features of its history, has been needed. The present volume is derived from the most authentic sources, and may be relied on for its general accuracy. When it is seen what unspeakable iniquity has been perpetrated under the name of religion, and to what cruel measures Popery has resorted to abridge human liberty and enslave conscience, every Protestant must love his religion better, and thank God more devoutly for the benefits of the Reformation.

C 65. Life of Philip Melancthon, the German Reformer. With an engraving. 18mo, 25 and 30 cents.

The mild and profoundly learned Melancthon was Luther's right hand man in the Reformation. The aid he furnished in the spread of the glorious work was acknowledged by his great coadjutor, and should be appreciated now. Timidity and boldness were singularly united in his character, and he seemed to be admirably qualified to fill the place which he occupied by the side of his more impetuous leader, and in a most critical period of the Church.

C 66. Human Nature in its Fourfold State. By the Rev. Thomas Boston, late Minister of the Gospel at Ettrick. 12mo. 50 cents.

This has always been a favourite work with the readers of old-fashioned religious books, and we hope the number of those who love such reading may be indefinitely multiplied. Boston is a sound and instructive writer, and every page of his book contains the true spiritual riches. When the reader becomes used to his style, which a little practice will effect, he will not be willing to part with Boston, as he follows him in his description of the fourfold estate of man.

S 67. The Duty of Children to Love and Seek Christ. By the Rev. Duncan Grant, A. M., Minister of Forbes. 32mo. 15 and 20 cents.

This is an excellent little work for children, written in a very pleasing style suited to their capacities.

S 68. Life of Ulricus Zuinglius, the Swiss Reformer; with a Biographical Sketch of John Ecolampadius. With an engraving. 18mo, 20 and 25 cents.

The virtues of this spirited and undaunted Reformer will always be held in grateful remembrance by the Church of Christ. In the prominent traits of his character, he was not the inferior of Luther, and he was decidedly more enlightened on some of the great points in controversy. There are stirring incidents in his life, which will add interest to the perusal. Geolampadius, a sketch of whose life is appended, was the worthy, pious, learned, and efficient coadjutor of Zuinglius.

S 69. Missionary Records. Northern Countries. With an engraving 18mo, 30 and 35 cents.

These records of the self-denying efforts of the Moravian Missionaries in Greenland. Labrador, Asiatic Russia, and Siberia, possess deep interest for the religious reader who wishes to note the progress of true religion. Young readers will be attracted by the incidents, which are often of the most exciting nature, and the oldest Christians might learn a lesson of patience and faith in the humble piety and uncomplaining endurance of the servants of God whose labours are here recorded.

C 70. The Force of Truth, an authentic narrative. By the Rev. Thomas Scott, D. D., with a Recommendatory Letter, by the Rev. Samuel Miller, D. D., to which are added eight Letters addressed to Dr. Scott, by the Rev. John Newton. 18mo, 25 and 30 cents.

The Force of Trutt is a narrative of the methods adopted by divine Provilence to bring the mind and heart of an unconverted minister, from a state of carnal security and gross error to the knowledge and acknowledgment of the truth as it is in Jesus. Those who have made Scott's Bible their daily companion, will read this narrative with much advantage. The value of this edition is greatly enhanced, not only by the recommendatory letter, but by having, for

the first time, associated with it the Letters written by the eminently pious Newton to Dr. Scott, about the period when his mind was beginning to inquire for the truth.

M 73. Records of the Presbyterian Church in the United

States of America; embracing the Minutes of the Presbytery of Philadelphia from A. D. 1706 to 1716: Minutes of the Synod of Philadelphia from A. D. 1717 to 1758: Minutes of the Synod of New York from A. D. 1745 to 1758: Minutes of the Synod of New York and Philadelphia from A. D. 1758 to 1758. 8vo. \$1.50.

In the publication of this volume, a desideratum has been accomplished. The early records of the Church which were in danger of perishing, are thus permanently preserved; and although the work consists of the minutes of ecclesiacial bodies, yet it furnishes much valuable information of the early history of the Church. No Presbyterian clergyman should consider his library complete without this volume.

C 74. Thoughts on Religious Experience. By the Rev. Archibald Alexander, D. D., late Professor in the Princeton Theological Seminary. 12mo. 55 cents.

These views of experimental religion, coming as they do from a venerable and experienced father in the Church, possess much value. The high estimation in which they are held, may be judged from the fact, that when many of them were first published in a religious newspaper, they were most extensively copied by papers of different denominations, in various parts of the country. They are written in a plain and familiar style, and are pervaded by the kindly and amiable spirit of the author. The volume is a neat one, and is adorned by a portrait of the author, expressly engraved for this work.

C 76. History of the Covenanters in Scotland. By the author of the History of the Reformation, &c. 2 vols., 18mo. 70 and 80 cents.

Presbyterians should make themselves acquainted with the prelatic persecutions of their Scottish forefathers, during the reigns of the 1st and 2d Charles, who were alike tyrants of the worst grade. The patient endurance, the uncompromising principle, and the unaffected piety of those men, however caricatured by novelists and misrepresented by interested historians, will be perpetuated as an instructive example to remote generations. These two volumes embrace the material facts and narratives of much larger histories.

M 77. The Church of Rome, the Apostasy; and the Pope, the Man of Sin and Son of Perdition. By William Cunninghame, Esq., of Lainshaw, in the county of Ayr. To which is added, Antichrist, a Sermon by the Rev. Hugh M'Neile, A. M. 18mo. 45 and 50 cents.

This volume contains two distinct treatises by different authors, but relating to the same subject. It deserves a place by the side of the other works published by the Board on the subject of Romanism. The proof that Popery is the Antichrist of Scripture, the Man of Sin, and the Son of Perdition, is full and satisfactory, and cannot be evaded by all the artifices of Jesuitical commentators.

M 78. The Articles of the Synod of Dort. Translated from the Latin, with Notes. by the Rev. Thomas Scott, D. D. To which is added, An Introductory Essay, by the Rev. Samuel Miller, D. D. 12mo. 50 cents.

Next to the Westminster Assembly of Divines, there have been few ecclesiastical bodies whose history is more interesting than that of the Synod of Dort. It is essential to a full understanding of the controversy between Calvinism and Arminianism. This account, translated by Scott, is the best and most authentic; and it is enriched by the Introductory chapter by the Rev. Dr. Miller.

C 79. The Chief End of Man. An Exposition of the First Answer to the Shorter Catechism. By the Rev. John Hall. 18mo. 20 and 25 cents.

The answer to a single, but a very important question in the Shorter Catechism, affords the theme of this little volume. The chief end of man is very fully and luminously illustrated, and the author has succeeded in compressing much instruction into a small space.

C 80. Dickinson on the Five Points. The Scripture Doctrine concerning some important points of Christian Faith: particularly, Eternal Election, Original Sin, Grace in Conversion, Justification by Faith, and the Saints' Perseverance. Represented and applied in five Discourses. By Jonathan Dickinson, A.M., formerly Minister of the Gospel at Elizabethtown, New Jersey. 18mo. 30 and 35 cents.

The doctrines in controversy between Calvinists and Arminians form the subject of this book, and the name of the writer, who was decidedly one of the greatest theologians of his day, will be a sufficient guaranty for the ability with which the doctrines of the Bible are maintained in opposition to Arminian errors.

M 81. The Doctrine of Justification by Faith, through the imputation of the righteousness of Christ, explained, confirmed, and vindicated. By the Rev. John Owen, D. D. 8vo. \$1.30.

The cardinal doctrine of justification by faith is elaborately and learnedly treated in this volume. To the student of theology, who wishes to obtain clear and farreaching views of the gospel scheme, this work will be invaluable.

C S2. Familiar Letters to a Gentleman, upon a variety of seasonable and important subjects in religion. By Jonathan Dickinson, A.M., late Minister of the Gospel at Elizabethtown, New Jersey. 12mo. 60 cents.

This is eminently a practical treatise, in which the pious writer, in a series of familiar letters, obviates the objections which arise in the carnal mind to the religion of the gospel, and leads the inquirer to an intelligent reception of the truth as it is in Jesus. It is particularly appropriate for the relief of those who are troubled with sceptical doubts on religion.

S 83. Eastern Manners, illustrative of the Old Testament History. By the Rev. Robert Jamieson, Minister of Currie. With engravings. 12mo. 35 and 40 cents.

Whatever tends to illustrate and explain the Holy Scriptures should be highly esteemed. Historical facts and incidents, and oriental customs and manners, throw light upon Scripture, as well as confirm its truth. This has been successfully done by the little work before us, which will be alike valuable to the Sabbath-school and the family.

M 84. Discourses on Christ Crucified. By the Rev. Stephen Charnock, 1564. 18mo. 30 and 35 cents.

The labours of Charnock have long been appreciated for their evangelical tone and their practical character. This volume contains a valuable extract from his works in relation to the redemption of man by the blood of the Cross.

M 86. Lectures on the Shorter Catechism of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America. Addressed to youth. By the Rev. Ashbel Green, D. D. With a beautiful likeness of the author. 2 vols. 12mo. \$1.40.

There are few works which present a more condensed and yet satisfactory illustration of the doctrines of the Preslyterian Church, than these Lectures of the venerable Dr. Green. Founded on the Westminster Assembly's Shorter Catechism, they bring every point distinctly before the mind, and at once explain, prove, and enforce it. The work is an acquisition, particularly to the youth of the Church.

M 87. Edwards on Baptism. Candid Reasons for renouncing the principles of Anti-Predobaptism. Also, A Short Method with the Baptists. By Peter Edwards, several years Pastor of a Baptist Church at Portsea, Hants. 18mo. 25 and 30 cents.

The author of this volume was once a Baptist clergyman, strongly attached to his peculiar sentiments, and as strongly prejudiced against the doctrine of infant baptism. Possessing, however, a vigorous mind and an honest intention, he examined the subject thoroughly, and the result was a conviction that his former position was untenable. Confining his attention in this essay to a few

principal topics, he has produced an argument of unusual power and conclusiveness. It cannot be overcome, and all attempts hitherto employed to set it aside have been feeble.

C 88. The Christian's Scripture Directory. By the Rev. John Willison, A.M. Together with RESOLUTIONS. By the Rev. Jonathan Edwards. 32mo. 5, 10 and 15 cents.

A valuable and instructive collection of pious thoughts and reflections, by an eminently good man; to which are appended the Resolutions adopted by Jonathan Edwards for the direction of his religious life.

M 89. Institutes of the Christian Religion. By John Calvin.

Translated from the original Latin, and collated with the author's last edition in French, by John Allen. 2 vols., 8vo. \$3.00.

This masterly performance of the great Calvin is so well known already, and its reputation is so thoroughly established, that we need only say, that this edition has been prepared with unusual care, and it is believed to be the cheapest, as well as the most correct, ever published in English.

C 90. Immanuel; or True Religion a living Principle in the minds of Men. By the Rev. Samuel Shaw, A.M. 18mo. 25 and 30 cents.

This is a treatise by an old writer revived, and slightly abridged, which displays all that richness of scriptural illustration and deep insight into the human heart, so characteristic of the practical writers of a former age.

S 91. Missionary Tales for Little Listeners. By M. A. S. Barber. With engravings. 18mo. 25 and 30 cents.

Whatever may tend to engage the attention of youth to the cause of missions, should be regarded with favour. This collection of missionary incidents will have this tendency, and will form a valuable addition to every Sabbath-school library.

S 92. Traditions of the Covenanters; or Gleanings among the Mountains. By the Rev. Robert Simpson, Sanquhar. (See Nos. 188 and 189.) 18mo. 25 and 30 cents.

The sufferings of the Covenanters of Scotland, should be kept in grateful remembrance by every Presbyterian. Their love to God and their attachment to the polity and doctrines of Presbyterianism, were fully evinced in the sacrifices they endured rather than abandon them. The author of this little book has rescued many interesting incidents of their history, hitherto preserved only by tradition.

C 93. The Scripture Doctrine of Sanctification stated and defended against the errors of Perfectionism. By the Rev. W. D. Snodgrass, D. D. 18mo. 20 and 25 cents.

This is a well written and very discriminating treatise on the doctrine of Sanctification, particularly in relation to its perversion and abuse by modern Perfectionists. It would be a good antidote to circulate where that pestilent heresy prevails.

C 94. The Christian's Portion; or the Charter of a Christian. By the Rev. R. Sibbes, D. D. 1638, 32mo. 10 and 15 cents.

Another valuable little treatise of an old writer revived. A little practice in reading these old writers, will confirm the opinion that "old wine is best."

C 95. The Life of the Rev. James Hervey, M.A., Rector of Weston Favel. And the Life of the Rev. Augustus M. Toplady, Vicar of Broad-Hembury. 18mo. 30 and 35 cents.

The eminent picty of these two distinguished divines is generally known. Although in the English Established Church, they were free from exclusiveness, not in bondage to forms, and strongly Calvinistic in their doctrines. These memoirs form a volume of truly designtful biography for the edification of all true Christians.

C 96. The Nature, Power, Deceit, and Prevalency of Indwelling Sin in Bellevers. By the Rev. John Owen, D. D. 18mo. 30 and 35 cents.

Owen is a heavy writer in many respects, and his style is uncouth, but all this is compensated by his critical knowledge of the Scriptures and his deep acquaint-ance with the workings of the human heart. This is not the least valued of his many practical works.

C 98. An Historical Sketch of the Protestant Church of France, from its origin to the present time, with parallel notices of the Church of Scotland, during the same period. By the Rev. John G. Lorimer, Glasgow. 12mo. \$1.00.

This is a volume embracing much, and to most readers, hitherto inaccessible information respecting the early French Protestant Church, in the season of its glory, in its dreadful persecutions, its unhappy decline, and in its present state of comparative revival. The author at the same time has collaterally embodied a history of the Scotch Church, which in its earlier history had many points of similarity with the French Church, although in the result so much more highly favoured. The volume is rich in materials, and will be highly valued by the lovers of ecclesiastical history.

C 99. History of the Progress and Suppression of the Reformation in Spain in the Sixteenth Century. By the Rev. Thomas McCrie, D. D. 12mo, 65 cents,

We have been accustomed to regard Spain as almost a blank in the moral world, on which the light of truth had never shone; but in earlier times, before it was completely subjugated to Popery, it possessed the truth, and even at the period of the great Reformation, it struggled to emancipate itself, and was enriched by the blood of martyrs. Dr. McCrie, so well known as the Biographer of Knox and Melville, has rendered a valuable service to the Church by his researches in Spanish and Italian History, and by the publication of his two admirable volumes on the Suppression of the Reformation in Spain and in Italy.

100. Questions on the Confession of Faith and Form of Government of the Presbyterian Church, with a selection of Scripture Proofs: Designed for the Instruction of Classes in the Doctrines of said Church. By the Rev. Henry R. Weed, D. D. 18mo. 10 cents.

These, as the title imports, are questions adapted to bring out to the notice of a learner, all the points embraced in the Westminster Confession of Faith. We can scarcely conceive of a more important, and we might say imperative, duty of a Presbyterian pastor, than to bring up his flock in a thorough knowledge of the standards of the Church. It would prove a bulwark against heresy.

- C Nos. 101 to 112.—The British Reformers. A valuable series of twelve volumes, embracing the Lives and Writings of the British Reformers, under this general denomination, is now brought before the American public through the liberality of an esteemed friend to the Presbyterian Board of Publication. #### 112. Fox, Bale, and Coverdale.

The best and most striking works of these eminent servants of God are here brought together, and the reader has the high privilege of holding converse with such men as Wickliff, Tindal, Latimer, Hooper, Bradford, Cranmer, Knox, Becon, Jewell, and many others. The republication of these volumes must be regarded as peculiarly seasonable at a time when Popery appears to be reviving, and every watchman on the walls of Zion should be conversant with them.

C 113. The Book of Popery. A Manual for Protestants. Descriptive of the Origin, Progress, Doctrines, Rites and Ceremonies of the Papal Church. By Ingram Cobbin, M. A. 18mo. and cents.

The design of this volume is to give a clear and succinct history, or rather description of Popery. All the peculiarities of that great and monstrous system are presented, and technical matters explained, so that to most readers it would be an excellent book of reference, when they might wish any matter relating to Popery explained to them.

114. Plain Catechetical Instructions for Young Communicants, designed to assist them in forming Scriptural views of the Lord's Supper, with an address to young persons not yet Communicants, and a few meditations and helps for self-examination. By the Rev. John Barr, of Glasgow. 18mo. 10 cents.

This is a well written and instructive little work, which will be found particularly serviceable to young communicants.

M 117. A Treatise on the right use of the Fathers, in the decision of Controversies existing at this day in Religion. By John Daille, Minister of the Gospel in the Reformed Church of Paris. With a Preface by the Rev. G. Jekyll, LL. B. Second American edition. 12mo., pp. 416. Price 80 cents.

A valuable and learned work, which should be found in the library of ministers of all Protestant denominations.

M 118. History of the Progress and Suppression of the Reformation in Italy, in the Sixteenth Century. Including a Sketch of the History of the Reformation in the Grisons. By the Rev. Thomas Mc Crie, D. D. 12mo. 75 cents.

Even Italy, the principal seat of Antichrist, once partook of the light of the Reformation, but having put away that light from her, she is sunk into gross arkness. The excellent author of this history, displays in it the same research and accuracy, and the same bold and spirited style which characterize his other writings.

C 121. Narratives of Revivals of Religion in Scotland, Ireland, and Wales. 18mo. 30 and 35 cents.

A history of God's merciful and marvellous work in the conversion of sinners must always be interesting to the true Christian. These narratives are authentic, and display the operations of the Holy Spirit in a manner so striking as to call forth the prayer, "Lord, revive thy work!"

S 122. A Selection of Passages of Scripture for Young Persons to commit to Memory. By the Rev. Wm. Brown, M.D. 32mo, 15 and 20 cents.

This volume is composed entirely of Scripture passages, arranged under different heads. The matter is precious, while the arrangement is very judicious.

C 123. Dying Thoughts, or Meditations on Death and Heaven. By the Rev. Wm. Crawford. 18mo. 35 and 40 cents.

An admirable volume, rich in thought and pious feeling. The author was an estimable divine, who, being long apparently on the borders of the grave, made death and eternity the principal subjects of his thoughts and public preaching. This book will prove a real friend to the devout reader. (See No. 295.)

C 124. Private Thoughts on Religion, and other subjects connected with it, by the Rev. Thomas Adam, with a sketch of his life. 18mo. 30 and 35 cents.

These thoughts evince a profound acquaintance with the word of God and the workings of the human heart. Very much is compressed in few words. There is no dilution, but much concentration of thought. No Christian can read the volume without instruction, and, we might say, spiritual improvement.

125. An Exposition of the Epistle to the Hebrews, in the form of questions and answers, designed for Sabbath-schools and Bible Classes. By the Rev. J. J. Janeway, D. D. 18mo. 15 cents.

An excellent exposition of a difficult, but truly delightful portion of God's word. In a simple and familiar style the author has brought out the true meaning of the epistle. It may be strongly recommended to teachers of Bible Classes.

C 126. The Almost Christian Discovered; or the false professor tried and cast. By the Rev. Matthew Mead. 18mo. 25 and 30 cents.

This work is so well known as a standard book of practical dijinity that it needs no commendation. It is pungent, searching, and to those who have but a name to live, a fearful detector of a false profession.

C 127. A Guide to Acquaintance with God. By the Rev. James Sherman, Minister of Surry Chapel, London. 32mo, 15 and 20 cents.

To become acquainted with God is the highest duty and privilege of man, and the judicious advice of those who have gone before in the acquisition should be highly prized. Mr. Sherman may be safely recommended as a friendly guide, who will point to God and lead the way.

M. 128. Popery and Protestantism. Dialogue between a Popish Priest and an English Protestant: wherein the principal points and arguments of both religions are truly proposed, and fully examined. By Matthew Poole, Author of the Synopsis Criticorum. 18mo. 25 and 30 cents.

Matthew Poole is the author of the Dialogue, and his name is a sufficient guaranty for the manner in which the work is executed. No one can carefully read it without obtaining a clear comprehension of the general principles of this great, and, at the present day, agitating controversy.

S 132. The Missionary in the Wilderness, or Grace displayed among the Heathen. 18mo. 20 and 25 cents.

David Brainerd is the missionary, and this little volume is composed of extracts from his diary. Every memorial of this precious saint should be highly esteemed by the church and to the young especially we commend his example.

C 133. The English Martyrology, abridged from Fox. By Charlotte Elizabeth. 2 vols. 12mo. Embellished with eight beautiful engravings. \$1.00.

The history of the martyrs should be familiar to every Protestant. A know-ledge of the circumstances of the lives and deaths of those who died for Christ's sake, is calculated to render the truth for which they died dear to every Christian's heart. We need not say that these volumes are deeply interesting, and that they have been prepared for the press by a skilful hand.

C 134. The Communicant's Companion; or Instructions for the right receiving of the Lord's Supper. By Matthew Henry; with an introductory Essay by the Rev. John Brown, of Edinburgh. Embellished with a portrait. 12mo. 50 cents.

This work is so well known for its excellence as to need no commendation. It is rich in thought, in Christian experience, in instruction. Let every Christian read and study it. It is adorned by a portrait of the author, expressly engraved for this work. (See No. 246.)

© 135. The Trial of the Witnesses of the Resurrection of Jesus, with the Sequel of the Trial. By Thomas Sherlock, D. D. Bishop of London. 12mo. 45 cents.

The fabric of the Christian system rests upon the truth of Christ's resurrection; and in this little work the evidence in support of this great fact is ingeniously set forth under the forms of a jury trial. The Sequel was called forth by an attack on the former work, and is now, we believe, for the first time published in this country. Both together form an excellent body of evidence in proof of the truth of Christianity.

C 136. The Rise and Progress of Religion in the Soul, illustrated in a course of serious and practical addresses, suited to persons of every character and circumstance, with a devout meditation and prayer added to each chapter. By Philip Doddridge, D.D. Embellished with a portrait. 12mo. 50 cents.

The praise of this work is in all the churches, and there are very few uninspired compositions which have been so extensively blessed in the conversion of souls to God. Those who are without God and without hope, should be earnestly persuaded by their religious friends to read this volume. The portrait of the author is beautifully executed.

C 137. The Lives of the British Reformers. With twelve portraits. 12mo, \$1.00.

It is a natural desire to know something of the private life and personal history of those justly celebrated men whose labours were so instrumental in promoting the great work of the Reformation. To gratify this desire, the lives of some of the most eminent of the British Reformers have been collected in the present volume. The religious reader cannot be disappointed in its contents. It is adorned with twelve beautiful portraits.

S 138. Remarkable Places mentioned in the Holy Scriptures. 18mo. With engravings. 20 and 25 cents.

An excellent little work for Sunday School Libraries, and intended for general perusal. The reader will find in it descriptions, derived from distinguished modern travellers, of some of the most remarkable places mentioned in the sacred volume. It is embellished with several very good cuts.

C 139. The Book of Poetry, prepared for the Presbyterian Board of Publication. 12mo. \$1.25.

The minor poems which compose this volume are from various sources, and many of them possess great merit as compositions, as well as for their expression of devout feelings. It is superior in its mechanical execution, and is illustrated with several exquisite wood engravings. The lovers of sacred poetry cannot fail to find in it much to gratify their taste and improve their hearts.

C 140. Calvin and his Enemies. A Memoir of the Life, Character and Principles of Calvin. By the Rev. Thomas Smyth, D. D. 18mo. pp. 180. Price 30 and 35 cents.

This is a new, revised, and enlarged edition of this excellent work, which has long been on the Catalogue of the board. Dr. Smyth has availed himself of new sources of information as to the character of Calvin, not accessible until within a few years past. It will be found a most valuable contribution to the cause of truth in vindicating the character of one of the greatest and best men who ever lived, from the malignant calumnies of those who hated and slandered him, because they hated the truth which he so ably defended.

C 141. Evidence of the Truth of the Christian Religion, derived from the literal fulfilment of Prophecy; particularly as illustrated by the History of the Jews, and by the discoveries of recent travellers. By Alexander Keith, D.D. With steel and wood engravings. 12mo. 60 cents.

This work has gone through various editions both in England and in this country, but the present has the last improvements from the author's hand. As an illustration of the prophecies, it possesses deep interest and strongly engages the

attention. It has such an established reputation that it needs no commendation from us. This edition is beautifully printed, and embellished with steel and wood engravings.

S 142. Scenes and Adventures in Africa, collected from Moffat's Missionary Labours in Africa. 18mo. 20 and 25 cents.

Full of incident and adventure, the Scenes in Africa is likely to be a very popular book with young readers. The title indicates the source whence the materials have been derived. Several of the scenes are illustrated by excellent wood-cuts.

C 145. Annals of the Persecution in Scotland, from the Restoration to the Revolution. By James Aikman, Esq., author of the History of Scotland, &c. Embellished with Engravings. 2 vols. 12mo. \$1.00.

This work is not only particularly seasonable, but presents a mass of facts relating to the early persecution of the Presbyterians in Scotland, which will awaken thrilling interest in the bosom of the reader. We know few works issued of lato years from the press which are so deserving of the consideration of the Presbyterians of America as this. Its value is greatly increased by its engravings.

C 146. Evidences of the Authenticity, Inspiration, and Canonical Authority of the Holy Scriptures. By the Rev. Archibald Alexander, D. D. Embellished with a portrait of the author. 12mo. 55 cents.

This is one of the most complete and conclusive demonstrations of the divine origin of the Scriptures extant. Its wide circulation cannot fail to retard the spread of infidel principles.

C 147. The Pilgrim's Progress, by John Bunyan. Most carefully collated with the edition containing the author's last additions and corrections. With explanatory notes by Thomas Scott, D.D., and a life of the author by Josiah Conder, Esq. Embellished with twenty-five engravings. \$1.50.

All have heard of the Pilgrim's Progress, and no book perhaps has been more generally read. The present edition is the most beautiful which has ever proceeded from the American press. The style of the typography is unsurpassed, and the engravings are of the first order for beauty and finish. Considering the great expense incurred in preparing this work, it is one of the cheapest books of the age.

M148. The Necessity of Reforming the Church, presented to the Imperial Diet at Spires, A. D. 1554. To which is added, a Paternal Admonition by Pope Paul III. to the Emperor Charles V., and Remarks on the Paternal Admonition by John Calvin. written in Latin, and now first translated into English by H. Beveridge, Esq., Advocate. 18mo. 30 and 35 cents.

This admirable treatise from the pen of Calvin is valuable, as exhibiting the views of the great Reformer on the grounds of the necessity of a Church reform in hir day. It has lost none of its interest by the lapse of time.

S 149. The Prophet Daniel, considered in a series of Lectures for a Sunday-school, translated from the French. Illustrated with wood engravings. 18mo, 35 and 40 cents.

This is designed as a Sunday-school book, and as an assistant to the teachers of Bible classes. For this it is well suited by the simplicity with which it treats a very difficult subject.

S 150. Addresses to Children, 32mo. with a wood-cut. 10 and 15 cents. A peculiar talent seems to be necessary in addressing the understandings and nearts of children, and the author of the present little volume possesses it in no ordinary degree. The addresses may be used by parents and Sabbath-school teach-

S 151 The Huguenot Galley Slaves, a story for the young. By the Rev. C. G. Barth, D. D. translated from the German. 18mo. with woodcuts. 15 and 20 cents. This story, a narrative of facts, has all the elements necessary to interest the young. The sufferings and endurance of the persecuted French Protestants are strikingly portrayed, and afford an example of what every follower of Christ should be willing to encounter, when fidelity to his Master requires it.

S 152. Kind Words for his Young Friends. By Uncle William. 18mo., with wood-cuts. 20 and 25-cents.

A very engaging book for young readers, in which many useful lessons are taught in a simple and natural manner. It has several good illustrative cuts.

S 153. The History of Celestine Darscott, the Blind Woman of Paturages, with a wood-cut. 32mo. 15 and 20 cents.

The subject of this narrative was a convert from Popery, and her faithful attachment to the truth subjected her to many trials, which she bore with exemplary fortitude. Poor, blind, and often destitute of the necessaries of life, she still found religion to be a source of unfailing comfort. Her story is deeply interesting.

C 154. The Only Rule of Faith. An Exposition of the Second Answer of the Shorter Catechism. By the Rev. John Hall. 18mo. 20 and 25 cents.

The author in illustrating the answer to the Second Question in the Shorter Catechism, has furnished a well-digested treatise on the value of the Bible as the only true and infallible rule of faith. The excellence of this little volume will be appreciated by the intelligent reader.

S 155. Missionary Sketches for Children. Eight wood-cuts. 32mo. 10 and 15 cents.

We are of opinion that this will be a very popular little volume with young readers. It embraces a number of very interesting facts relating to missions among the heathen, and is well illustrated with cuts.

S 156. Short Miscellantes for Young People. Fine wood-cuts, 32mo. 10 and 15 cents.

A very good book for young readers, and suitable, like several of the preceding, for Sabbath school libraries. It is, as its title imports, a collection of entertaining little narratives, which will be read with pleasure and without fatigue.

S 157. Examples for Youth; or Conversations on the Lives of Christians eminent for Early Piety. Wood-cut. 32mo. 15 and 20 cents.

This pretty little volume is composed of conversations, into which are introduced sketches of the lives and deaths of some of the most eminent Christians, both male and female, making for young readers an instructive volume of biography.

S 158. Another Lily Gathered. Conversion of James Laing. By the Rev. R. Murray McCheyne. 32mo. 5 and 10 cents.

We have seldom read the memoir of a young Christian which pleased us as much as this. It contains a beautiful illustration of the efficacy of Divine grace in enlightening the mind and sanctifying the heart. We earnestly commend its perusal to the young.

S 159. Children coming to Christ, and Lambs of the Flock. By the Rev. R. M. McCheyne. 32mo. 5 cents.

This carnest exhortation to children to come to Christ, is by the same author as the preceding, and it should often be read to children by their parents and teachers.

S 160. The Life of John Howard, the Philanthropist; embracing an account of his great and successful labours in meliorating the condition of prisoners in European gaols. 18mo. 20 and 25 cents.

Howard is known to all as the great philanthropist who spent most of his life in visiting prisons and hospitals with the benevolent desire of alleviating the misc-

ries of their unhappy inmates. Humanity owes a debt of gratitude to this good man; and we think his memoir can scarcely be read by any one without imbibing some of his excellent spirit.

- S 161. Some Particulars of Samuel Wyke Kilpin. Written by his father, Rev. S. Kilpin. 32mo, 5 cents.
  - A delightful little memoir, illustrative of youthful piety.
- C 162. Memoir and Remains of the Rev. Robert Murray McCheyne. By the Rev. Andrew A. Bonar. With an Introductory Letter by the Rev. Samuel Miller, D. D. 12mo. 60 cents. With a portrait.

The Rev. R. M. McCheyne was a young Scotch clergyman of great abilities and eminent piety. His brief life was most laboriously and usefully spent in the service of the gospel, and few have instrumentally accomplished more than he in the same period of time. His memoir is rich in instruction; and to ministers of the gospel it may be specially recommended as one of the best adapted books to encourage and enforce ministerial faithfulness.

M 163. Fisher's Catechism. The Westminster Assembly's Shorter Catechism Explained, by way of Question and Answer. By Several Ministers of the Gospel. 12mo. 60 cents.

In relation to a book so generally known, we need only say that Fisher's Catechism is one of the most complete compends of sound theology extaut, and well adapted to direct the studies of theological students, Sabbath-school teachers and others.

S 164. The Pious Shepherd, or Life and Character of James Wait. By the Rev. Robert MacLaurin. 32mo. 15 and 20 cen's.

A very pleasing and instructive narrative of the dealings of Providence in the life of an humble Scotch shepherd.

S 165. Little Mary, or the Infant School Child. Woodcut. 32mo. 3 cents.

Very little children may love and obey the Saviour, and of this Little Mary was an example.

S 166. The Letter. A True Story. Wood-cut. 32mo. 3 cents.

This little volume contains a remarkable account of a little German boy who in distress thought he might communicate his feelings to Christ in a letter, which he accordingly wrote, and which received an answer, although not in the way he expected.

C 167. A Letter on Conversion to God. 32mo. 3 cents.

This is an excellent little book for young or old, giving an account of the author's conversion to God.

C 168. Hints on Self-Examination. By the Rev. Hugh Stowell, A.M. 32mo. 3 cents.

These brief hints on self-examination may be profitably referred to for daily use, in trying the frame of our hearts.

S 169. The Flag Sergeant, or the Life, Adventures, Repentance, and Death of James Wooley. By the Rev. R. Knill. Wood-cut. 32mo. 5 cents.

In the account of James Wooley, the flag sergeant, we see that under the most unfavourable circumstances of a military life, religion may transform the most dissolute men into humble Christians.

S 171. Evenings' Entertainments, or a Country Visit. Embellished with fourteen engravings. Square 16mo. 45 and 50 cents

A volume for young readers, rich in entertainment, and embellished with choice engravings. Various subjects in natural history are treated in a style calculated to interest and engage the attention, and to impress the mind with a sense of the divine wixdom.

M 172. Old and New Theology; or an exhibition of those differences with regard to Scripture doctrines which have recently agitated and now divided the Presbyterian Church. By James Wood, D. D. 12mo. 60 cents.

To those who would know the true grounds on which the Presbyterian Church was recently divided, this volume is essential. It embraces, in a condensed form, the conclusive evidence of the actual existence of the errors which produced the schism.

S 173. Scripture Natural History; containing a description of quadrupeds, birds, reptiles, amphibia, fishes, insects, molluscous animals, corals, plants, trees, precious stones, and metals, mentioned in the Holy Scriptures. Illustrated by engravings. 12mo. 55 and 60 cents.

As its title imports, this book contains a fund of information which will be very acceptable to the intelligent reader of the Bible. It indeed throws much light on the sacred volume, and its numerous and beautiful cuts furnish material aid to the student of the natural history of the Bible.

C 174. Narrative of a Mission of Inquiry to the Jews from the Church of Scotland in 1839. With numerous engravings and maps. 12mo. 75. cents.

The delegates selected for this mission were, by their learning and piety, admirably qualified for their work, and the volume which they have produced is one of profound interest. Not only is the information which they give of the scattered tribes of Israel of great value, but their incidental observations on manners and customs, tend in a pleasing way to illustrate the sacred Scriptures. The maps and plates give additional value to the volume.

S 175. The Brothers and Sister; or grace illustrated in the conversion and happy death of Isaac M., Abraham, and Almira Rowe. By their pastor. 32mo. 5, 10 and 15 cents.

A neat little volume, containing notices of the life and decease of three young persons, whose distinction it was that they remembered their Creator in the days of their youth.

C 176. Reflections on the Illness and Death of a Beloved Daughter. By the late Rev. George Lawson, D. D., Selkirk. 32mo. 10 and 15 cents.

The deep conscientiousness and tender affection displayed in these Reflections may well be commended to the notice of Christian parents. In contrast with the anxiety of most parents for the temporal prosperity of their children, the author of these Reflections seemed wholly absorbed in desires for the eternal welfare of his child.

C 177. Rills from the Fountain of Wisdom; or the Book of Proverbs arranged and illustrated. By William M. Engles, D. D. 12mo. 45 cents.

This volume is designed to aid the reader of the Book of Proverbs in deriving from it the lessons of wisdom which it is so eminently calculated to inculcate. The periodical press has spoken of it in terms of high commendation.

M 178. Life of John Khox, containing illustrations of the history of the Reformation in Scotland. With biographical notices of the principal Reformers, and sketches of the progress of literature in Scotland during the sixteenth century, and an appendix consisting of original papers. By Thomas McCrie, D. D. Svo. \$1.50.

This is the full and unabridged life of the great Scottish Reformer, which is not only indispensable to the student of ecclesiastical history, but which affords the most agreeable information and entertainment to the general reader. The volume is a beautiful octavo, and is embellished with two admirable portraits.

C 179. Memoirs of the Life and Character of Mrs. Sarah Savage, eldest daughter of the Rev. Philip Henry, A.M. By Sir J. B. Williams, LL. D. F. S.A. With a recommendatory Preface by the Rev. Wil-

liam Jay, of Bath. To which are added, Memoirs of the Life and Character of Mrs. Ann Hulton, and Mrs. Eleanor Radford, daughters of the Rev. Philip Henry, A. M. By their brother, Matthew Henry, V. D. M. 18mo. 45 and 50 cents.

The family of Philip Henry might well be styled the holy and happy family. The children truly walked in the footsteps of their pious parents. Their virtues are pleasingly portrayed in these memoirs. The subject of the principal memoir was a woman of vigorous mind, sound discretion, and eminent piety.

C 180. Christ All in All to Believers; or what Christ is made to believers, in forty real benefits. By the Rev. Philip Henry. 18mo. 45 and 50 cents.

A work of sound practical divinity, in which the glorious traits of the Redeemer's character are set forth in a plain, scriptural way. The Christian may be much edified in the perusal of this volume, in which the author portrays the character of one who was to his own soul the "chief among ten thousand."

C 181. The Internal Evidence of the Holy Bible, or the Bible proved from its own pages to be a Divine Revelation. By J. J. Janeway, D. D. 12mo. 55 cents.

The author of this volume has supplied a desideratum, in presenting in one view the internal evidence of the truth of the Holy Scriptures. Regarding the Bible as it is, he has shown from its structure, facts, teachings, and tendencies, that it is a revelation from God. A perusal of it may serve to confirm the faith of the Christian, as well as to shake the confidence of the sceptical.

M 182. Christian Theology, translated from the Latin of Benedict Pictet, Pastor and Professor of Divinity in the Church and University of Geneva. By Frederick Reyroux, B. A. 12mo. 60 cents.

Pictet was a native of Geneva, and a professor of Theology in that city. He enjoyed a high reputation for learning and picty, and published various works which were highly esteemed. His "Christian Theology" is a work of merit, and may be read with advantage either by the student of Theology, or the private Christian.

M 183. A History of the Work of Redemption, containing the outlines of a Body of Divinity, in a method entirely new. By the Rev. Jonathan Edwards, President of the College of New Jersey. Accurately copied from the third American edition, without abridgment. 12mo. 60 cents.

The high estimation in which President Edwards's work on Redemption has always been held, has led to the publication of this full, correct, and unmutilated edition. It presents a judicions, solid, and scriptural view of the great work of Redemption, and is perhaps the best adapted of all the author's admirable productions for general usefulness.

S 184. Watts's Divine and Moral Songs, with eleven beautiful engravings. 18mo. 20 and 25 cents.

A neat and prettily illustrated edition of a very popular book for children. The Divine Songs are widely known, and to render them still more attractive to children, illustrative anecdotes and engravings are added.

S 185. Learning to Feel. With twenty-three fine engravings, 18mo. 25 and 30 cents.

It is the object of this little book to direct and regulate the kindly and benevofent emotions of the youthful heart. It cannot fail to please and benefit young readers.

S 186. The Miracles of Christ, with explanatory observations and illustrations, from modern travels. With fifteen wood engravings. 18mo. 30 and 35 cents.

The author of this volume has succeeded in presenting the miracles of Christ in a form at once so simple and forcible, as to impress the minds of youth with their truth and greatness. The engravings are of a superior character.

C 187. Meditations of a Christian Mother, or a practical application of Scripture to the circumstances of herself and her children. 18mo. 20 and 25 cents.

This charming little volume may be safely recommended to the frequent perusal of Christian mothers, who will find in it many thoughts which will prove comforting to them amidst the various anxieties to which the parental relation subjects them.

- S 188. Traditions of the Covenanters; or, Gleanings among the Mountains. Second Series. By the Rev. Robert Simpson. 18mo. 30 and 35 cents.
- S 189. Traditions of the Covenanters; or, Gleanings among the Mountains. By the Rev. Robert Simpson. Third Series. 18mo. 25 and 30 cents.

These volumes comprise the second and third series of those interesting sketches which exhibit the sufferings of the Presbyterians of Scotland, which, in former times, they were called to endure for conscience sake. (See No. 92.)

S 190. Lives of Remarkable Youth. 18mo. 20 and 25 cents.

Nothing proves more stimulating than example, and it may be hoped that the sketches contained in this volume, of youth remarkable for piety and attainments, will awaken in the minds of young readers a sincere desire to follow in their footsteps.

S 191. Little Willy—a widowed mother's memorial of a beloved child. With an introduction, by the Rev. William Jay. 32mo. 5 and 10 cents.

"Little Willy" is the authentic memoir of a dear child, upon whose infant heart the Holy Spirit impressed his seal, and who was early taken from the sorrows of this world to the joys of heaven. He was a grandson of the Rev. William Jay.

An admirable system of theology, in which is condensed the substance of ponderous tomes.

C 199. Bound Tracts on Popery. 18mo. 45 and 50 cents.

For contents see Tracts on Popery.

C 200. Sick Room Devotions, or Devotional aids for the Chamber of Sickness. 32mo. 15 and 20 cents.

This little manual has been spoken of by many as the very kind of volume which clergymen and pious friends have long desired to have, for the purpose of leaving with the sick in their visitations. It is of convenient size, and printed on large type. Its contents are prayers, meditations, scripture promises, dying sayings, lynns, &c.

C 201. A Christian Companion for the Chamber of Sickness. By a Minister. 18mo, 30 and 35 cents.

This volume is a suitable companion for the former, but is constructed on a different principle. It is more didactic in its character, and may be read with great profit.

S 202. Learning to Think. 18mo. With many engravings. 25 and 30 cents.

One of an agreeable series of little books, which are directly adapted to youthful minds. (See Nos. 185 and 210.) The author has shown a happy faculty in engaging the attention of the young, and blending amusement with instruction.

S 203. Our Father, or Considerations relating to the Lord's Prayer. By the Rev. Joseph Alden, D. D. 18mo. With an engraving. 20 and 25 cents.

This is an explanation and illustration of the Lord's Prayer, in language suited to the capacity, and calculated to engage the attention of children.

C 204. Salvation, or the Sinner directed in the Way of Life. By the Rev. W. J. McCord. 18mo. 15 and 20 cents.

The way of salvation is here unfolded with great simplicity and earnestness. Christians might accomplish much good by distributing such a book among their irreligious neighbours. It has been republished by the London Religious Tract Society.

- S 205. Anecdotes Illustrative of a Select Passage in each Chapter of the Old Testament. By John Whitecross. 2 vols. 18mo. 60 and 70 cents.
- S 206. Anecdotes Illustrative of Select Passages in each Chapter of the New Testament. By the same author. 18mo. 30 and 35 cents.

The design of these two works is to illustrate a select passage from every chapter in the Old and New Testaments, by an appropriate anecdote. They afford most agreeable reading, and often associate with the text some impressive and awakening facts.

207. An Exposition of the Acts of the Apostles, in the Form of Questions and Answers. By J. J. Janeway, D.D. In two parts, 24mo. 20 cents.

Dr. Janeway's questions on Romans and Hebrews, have already met with the approbation of those who have used them; and those on the Acts are not inferior to them in the importance of the facts and doctrines which are brought under riew.

C 208. Christ and Antichrist, or Jesus of Nazareth proved to be the Messiah, and the Papacy proved to be the Antichrist pro-

dicted in the Holy Scriptures. By the Rev. Samuel J. Cassels. 12mo. 70 cents.

An excellent work, and particularly seasonable. The style of the author is very pleasing, and his positions are very clearly demonstrated. The identification of Popery with the Antichrist, is complete and satisfactory. At the present time, when the man of sin is emlarging his borders, every friend of Christ should know the marks by which he is to be distinguished.

C 209. The Three Questions; or, What am I? Whence came I? Whither do I go? 18mo. 20 and 25 cents.

An impressive and powerful appeal from one, who having escaped from the horrors of scepticism, evinces his anxiety to warn others, and to direct them in the peaceful and secure paths of religion.

S 210. Learning to Act. Illustrated with engravings. 18mo. 25 and 30 cents.

The author of "Learning to Think," and "Learning to Feel," here shows his young readers the importance of "Learning to Act." What has been said in commendation of the first two, applies with equal force to this last in the series

S 211. Interesting Narratives, or Religion the Great Concern. 18mo. with an engraving. 30 and 35 cents.

A collection of authentic narratives, designed to display at once the power and importance of religion, as exemplified in the conversion of sinners, and the fearful consequences of neglecting and postponing attention to the concerns of the soul.

C 212. Secret Prayer, and its Accompanying Exercises; intended to assist young persons and others in acquiring devotional habits, without the aid of written forms. By the Rev. James McGill, Lochmaben. 18mo. 30 and 35 cents.

This work may be confidently recommended as one of the best treatises on the subject extant. It is not coldly didactic, but is pervaded by a spirit of enlivening piety. There are few Christians who might not receive essential benefit from a careful perusal of it.

C 213. The Obligations of the World to the Bible; A series of Lectures to Young Men. By Gardiner Spring, D. D., New York. 18mo. 65 cents.

The subject is confessedly important, and the manner in which it is treated, places the author among the first rank of American writers.

C 214. Memoirs of the Rev. John Newton, formerly Rector of St. Mary, Woolnoth, &c., with selections from his Correspondence. 18mo. 35 and 40 cents.

As John Newton was among the most useful and distinguished ministers of the gospel, so his early life was most remarkable. Rescuel from the deepest degradation of sin, he rose to be one of the brightest monuments of divine grace. This memoir of him is much more complete than those which are more commonly known. With a mezotint likeness.

M 215. An Exposition of the Confession of Faith of the Westminster Assembly of Divines. By the Rev. Robert Shaw, Whitburn, 12mo. 60 cents.

Such a work as this has long been a desideratum. It is ably executed, and presents a brief, but yet very satisfactory exposition and enforcement of the doctrines of the Presbyterian Church. The American edition has been carefully revised and adapted to the circumstances of the Church in this country.

C 216. The Great Supper; or an illustration and defence of the leading doctrines of grace; in three discourses on Luke xiv. 16-24. By the Kev Ashbel G. Fairchild, D.D. 18mo. 25 and 30 cents.

An admirable popular defence of the Calvinistic system, in which the most plausible objections of Arminians are satisfactorily confuted. The adaptedness of this book for general circulation has been amply attested by its large sale, and the general favour with which it has been received.

S 217. Recollections of Marion Lyle Hurd, in a letter from her father, the Rev. Carlton Hurd. With an Introduction by the Rev. Asa Cummings, 18mo, 20 and 25 cents.

This is the memoir of a very remarkable child, whose intellectual faculties were unusually developed, and whose heart was imbued with strong religious feelings. A beautiful portrait adorns the volume.

S 218. The Power of Instruction, or **The Guilty Tongue**. By the author of the "Last Day of the Week." 18mo. with an engraving, 20 and 25 cents.

A pleasing and very forcible illustration of the evils of the tongue, in which the taste of young readers is consulted, and their attention kept fully awake.

C 220. Zion's Pilgrim, or the way to the Heavenly Canaan, familiarly illustrated. By the Rev. Robert Hawker, D.D. 18mo. With an engraving. 20 and 25 cents.

In this old, but valuable book, the author has with admirable tact, in a series of graphic and interesting scenes, illustrated the temper and conduct of the pirm to Zion. The reader will find nothing dry or tedious, but entering into the spirit of the author, will be carried onward pleasantly, while he finds himself edified.

S 221. Elizabeth Bales: a pattern for Sunday-school Teachers and Tract Distributers. By J. A. James. With an engraving. 18mo. 15 and 20 cents.

In this charming little memoir, an example is presented of the good which may be accomplished by the humblest and most obscure of Christ's disciples. Poverty and lowly station were no impediments in the way of Elizabeth Bales, who had the willing heart and the constraining love of Christ to urge her on to efforts for the spiritual welfare of others.

C 222. The Saints' Everlasting Rest; or a Treatise on the blessed state of the Saints in Heaven. By Richard Baxter. Abridged for the Presbyterian Board of Publication. 12mo. 50 cents.

Few books have been so extensively read, or have produced such decided effects as Baxter's Saints' Rest. No Christian should be without it, who desires to make sure progress to heaven, and refresh himself with its joys in anticipation. This is a new abridgment of the original work, and, in all respects, superior to that which has hitherto been in use.

S 223. The Three Blind Women. 32mo. with an engraving, 5, 10 and 15 cents.

A small volume, in which some incidents in the Christian experience of three women afflicted with blindness are presented. Such afflictions are often blessings in disguise.

C 224. A Call to the Unconverted. By Richard Baxter. With an Introductory Essay by Thomas Chalmers, D. D. 18mo. 20 and 25 cents.

The Call to the Unconverted has, in many instances, proved a most effectual call, and many will have reason for eternal thanksgiving that this book was placed in their hands. Christians would be doing a truly benevolent work by presenting copies of this book to all their unconverted neighbours.

C 225. An Alarm to Unconverted Sinners, in a serious treatise by the Rev. Joseph Alleine. 18mo. 20 and 25 cents.

This is of the same general character as the preceding work, in which a faithful alarm is sounded, and the perilous condition of the unregenerate sinner is unfolded, while he is directed to the only way of escape.

C 226. Thoughts on Family Worship. By the Rev. James W Alexander, D. D. With a mezzotint plate. 12mo. 50 cents.

A truly admirable treatise, full of instructive remark, given in the best style of the author, who has few equals in the easy, graceful manner of communicating to others the stores of his own richly-furnished mind. The subject treated is one of incalculable importance to families, the virtue and happiness of which cannot be secured without a recognition of God in daily worship. This volume, from its first publication, has been unusually popular.

C 227. The Holy War made by Shaddai upon Diabolus for the regaining the metropolis of the World, in the losing and taking again of the town of Mansoul. By John Bunyan. 8vo. \$1.50.

The Holy War would have rendered any man popular who had not first written the Pilgrim's Progress; and, although it is undoubtedly inferior to that master performance, it has intrinsic merits as an allegory, and deserves to be much more generally read than it is. This edition is a very fine one, and is enriched by admirably executed pictorial embellishments.

228. A Manual of Devotion for Soldiers and Sailors, comprising: 1. Forms of Prayer, public and private. 2. A compend of Bible truth. 3. The Assembly's Shorter Catechism. 4. Selections of Psalms and Hymns. 12mo. 65 cents.

Such a work as the Soldier's and Sailor's Manual has long been a desideratum. No classes of men have greater temptations or fewer religious privileges than these, and yet none have been more neglected. Few seem to care for their souls. The Manual is well adapted to interest and enlighten them, and its excellent materials in prose and poetry make it one of the very best books, next to the Bible, which can be placed in their hands.

C 229. The Christian Soldiers; or the triumphs of grace in the army. 18mo. 25 and 30 cents.

A series of pleasing sketches tending to show that, under circumstances apparently the most unpromising, the grace of God may most effectually work in transforming and sanctifying the human heart. A midst the noise and dissipations of a camp, the Spirit of God may display the power of his presence by restoring the wanderers to the fold of Christ.

MI 230. Essays on Happiness, Christian Piety, Prejudices against the Gospel, and the Scripture doctrine of grace. To which is added the celebrated sermon on Glorying in the Cross of Christ. By the Rev. John McLaurin, of Glasgow. 12mo. 50 cents.

The Essays of McLaurin have elicited the praise of the most competent judges for their vigour of thought, depth of penetration, and logical arrangement. A fine tone of evangelical sentiment pervades them; and he that will read them carefully, and study them thoroughly, will find his own mind enlarged and invigorated.

M 231. The Harmony of the Divine Attributes, in the contrivance and accomplishment of man's redemption. By William Bates, D. D. 12mo. 55 cents.

A solid and instructive volume, in which the grand features of the gospel scheme are forcibly presented. While man, on the one hand, is exhibited in his guilt, ruin, and impotence, the grace and power of God in redemption are magnified. We need searcely say that this is a book not to be lightly read and laid aside, but to be seriously studied and pondered.

S 232. Naaman and Elisha, or the Nobleman's visit to the Prophet.

By Joseph Alden, D. D. 18mo. 15 and 20 cents.

The interesting narrative of Naaman's visit to Elisha, and the miraculous cure of his leprosy, are, in this volume, made the basis of some excellent and appropriate reflections.

S 233. Minor Characters of the Bible. By the Rev. John Hall. 18mo. 20 and 25 cents.

The author has evinced a pleasing skill in making even those whose names are but incidentally introduced into Scripture, minister to our instruction. The thought is happily conceived, and very judiciously enlarged upon.

C 234. The Divine Commendations of Abraham; or, Parental Duties, and the blessing resulting from their faithful performance. By the Rev. Thomas Houston, of Knockbracken. 18mo. 25 and 30 cents.

A reprint of a recent foreign work, and well adapted to the present times. No duties are more solemn and momentous than those resulting from the parental relation, and if, either through ignorance or neglect on the part of parents, their children are suffered to grow up without being surrounded by the holy influences of religion, their ruin is almost certain, while fearful guilt rests on the authors of their being. Parents should make themselves acquainted with this book.

S 235. Short Texts in Short Words, for daily use and learning to read; all the words being of one syllable, or not more than six letters. 32mo. 5 and 10 cents.

These short texts, in short words, arranged under different heads, and for different months in the year, form a golden little volume for the pocket.

C 236. Comfort for the Heavy Laden. By William Cowper, minister at Perth. With some notice of the author. 18mo. 15 and 20 cents.

Although this book was originally printed more than two centuries ago, it exhibits the vicisitudes of Christian experience in the present day, and may be usefully consulted for advice and counsel by the heavy-laden.

C 238. Daily Bread, consisting of extracts in prose and verse, from eminent divines, for every day in the year. 18mo. 30 and 35 cents.

Many persons excuse their neglect of religious reading from want of time. Here is a book which will, in a measure at least, remove this ground of apology; for surely, no one can be so absorbed in lawful occupations, as not to have time to read the text, the verse, and the reflection which are here assigned to every day in the year.

C 239. A Memoir of Mary Jane Graham, late of Stoke Fleming, Devon. Abridged from the memoir written by the Rev. Charles Bridges, M. A. 18mo. 25 and 30 cents.

Miss Graham was a young lady of remarkable intelligence, as her writings amply prove; and her memoir is deeply interesting, as exhibiting the struggles of her mind in divesting itself of erroneous views, and attaining a just comprehension of that glorious system of truth, in the full conviction of which she enjoyed a firm and settled hope of eternal life.

S 240. Walks of Usefulness in London and its environs. By the Rev. John Campbell. 18mo. 25 and 30 cents.

Very agreeable reading, and, withal, an example of the way in which the Christian may make his ordinary walks minister to his own improvement and the welfare of his fellow-men.

S 241. Old Anthony's Hints to Young People, to make them both cheerful and wise. Embellished with six engravings. 18mo. 20 and 25 cents.

We are very sure that our young readers will be delighted to hear Old Anthony. Surrounded by his youthful listeners, his great object is to blend instruction with amusement, while every object around him seems to suggest some pleasing lesson. It has numerous cuts.

S 242. A New Token for Children. 18mo. 25 and 30 cents.

Janeway's Token for Children has long been a favourite book, and the present volume is on the same plan, with still more remarkable instances of early plety. It should be placed in the hands of all children.

C 243. Brief Memoirs of the Pious. 18mo. 30 and 35 cents.

Nothing seems better to illustrate the power and excellency of true religion than the devout and consistent lives and peaceful deaths of those who have come

under its influence. Hence, biography has always been a favourite department of Christian literature. The brief memoirs in this volume cannot fail to be acceptable.

244. The Book of Proverbs. 64mo. 15 cents.

A beautiful pocket volume, enriched with the words of heavenly wisdom.

245. The Book of Psalms, translated out of the original Hebrew 32mo. 20 cents.

Another beautiful miniature volume, containing the prose Psalms, which, like the preceding volume, forms a good travelling companion.

C 246. The Communicant's Manual; or a series of Meditations designed to assist Communicants in making preparations for the Holy Supper. By J. J. Janeway, D. D. 18mo. 30 and 35 cents.

A very judicious treatise on the Lord's Supper, with all necessary directions and aids for a safe and profitable participation. The Christian communicant would consult his own comfort by having this manual always at hand.

C 247. The Causes and Cure of Scepticism. 32mo. 10 and 15 cents.

A small volume, and exceedingly well adapted to be placed in the hands of young men as a preservative against the insidious approaches of scepticism.

C 248. Annals of the Poor. By the Rev. Legh Richmond, A.M., late Rector of Turvey, Bedfordshire. A new edition, enlarged and illustrated with engravings. 12mo. 50 cents.

The Annals of the Poor, written in the graceful style of the excellent Legh Richmond, has become so generally known as to need no recommendation. It may be truly said of this edition, that it is more complete than any extant, and unsurpassed in the beauty of its typography and embellishments.

S 249. Men and Scenes before the Flood. By the Rev. Willis Lord, D. D. With plates. Square 16mo. 25 and 30 cents.

One of the neatest publications of the Board, in which the author has skilfully adapted his instructions to the youthful capacity. The topics introduced are the Creation, Garden of Eden, Adam and Eve, Birth of Abel, Enoch, Noah and the Flood.

S 250. Madagascar and its Martyrs. A book for the young, with engravings. 18mo. 20 and 25 cents.

This volume possesses a thrilling interest, as showing the change of character wrought in savages by the power of the gospel, and the readiness with which they offered up their lives rather than deny the name of Jesus.

M 251. Thoughts on Public Prayer. By the Rev. Samuel Miller, D. D., of Princeton. With a portrait. 12mo. 60 cents.

This, as the last literary effort of a man greatly beloved in the Presbyterian Church, whose usefulness has been extended through a long series of years, will be generally acceptable. On the abuses and right performance of public duties it contains many excellent hints, the result of long experience.

S 252. The Little Italian Boy. By Cousin Mary. 18mo. with an engraving. 10 cents.

A very pleasant and agreeable little book for young readers. ,

S 253. The Providence of God displayed in a series of interesting facts. 18mo. 25 and 30 cents.

An excellent collection of anecdotes, illustrative of a particular, overruling Providence, the perusal of which will tend to deepen the impression in the serious mind, that the world is under the direction of a vigilant Providence, and not a blind chance.

C 254. Is Christianity from God? or, a Manual of Christian evidence for Scripture readers, City Missionaries, Sunday-school Teachers, &c By the Rev. John Cumming, D. D. 18mo. 35 and 40 cents.

In a very pleasing style, the author presents a summary of the most striking evidences that the Christian religion, so far from being a cunningly-devised fable, is manifestly a revelation from God. If such books were put into the hands of our youth, they would be in comparatively little danger of being seduced by a soul-destroying infidelity.

S 255. Poor Blind Sally. By the Rev. Joseph Warren, Missionary in India. 32mo. 3 cents.

An affecting account of an East India woman, poor and afflicted in this world, but rich in faith.

C 256. Converse with God in Descriton and Solitude. By the Rev. Richard Baxter. 18mo. 20 and 25 cents.

Any one who knows the character of Richard Baxter is aware that he held much sacred and sweet converse with God, and could therefore speak from experience, when pointing out to others the method of attaining converse with God, when, left alone by the visitation of death among our friends, affliction creates a solitude, around which God alone can throw rays of light and cheerfulness.

S 257-258. Conversations of a Father with his Children. Series 1st and 2d. 18mo. with engravings. 50 and 60 cents.

If these two volumes were submitted to the judgment of almost any of our young friends, we could readily anticipate their verdict. They would with one voice pronounce them "first rate." The family scenes, the amusements of the younger members, their readiness to receive instruction, their happiness in their father's society, are all skilfully depicted, and mixed up with the most agreeable entertainment.

C 259. The Saint and the Sinner. By the Rev. William S. Plumer. D. D. 18mo, 10 cents.

A neat little volume, in which the character and condition of the saint are contrasted with those of the sinner.

S 260. The Bedfordshire Tinker; or, The History of John Bunyan. Written for young children by E. G. Sargent. 18mo. with an engraving. 15 and 20 cents.

The Bedfordshire Tinker was no less a personage than John Bunyan, the author of the celebrated Pilgrim's Progress. This is a brief sketch of his wonderful life, during which he was rescued from the deepest profligacy and degradation, to be made an eminent minister of the Gospel, and one of the most famous among authors.

S 261. Plain Thoughts about Great and Good Things, for Little Boys and Girls. By the Rev. William S. Plumer, D. D. 18mo. with an engraving. 20 and 25 cents.

A very agreeable miscellany, into which the author has introduced a great variety of subjects, and treated them in a familiar and pleasant style.

S 262. Story of the Samaritans. 18mo. with cuts. 10 cents.

Young readers of the Bible often meet with notices of the Samaritans; and, in this little volume, a kind friend has brought all the particulars of their history together, from which they can learn more about them.

C 263. The African Preacher; an authentic narrative. By the Rev. William S. White, of Virginia. 18mo. with two engravings. 20 and 25 cents.

This is one of the most engaging narratives ever published. The African Preacher was a Virginia slave, upon whose mind, without the aids of education, God poured a celestial light, which enabled him to comprehend the great truths of the Bible, and into whose heart he infused a holy love for religion. The best educated persons delighted to listen to him and learn wisdom from his lips.

C 264. Cardiphonia; or, the Utterance of the Heart, in the course of a real correspondence. By the Rev. John Newton. With an Introductory Essay by David Russell, D. D. With a portrait. 12mo. 60 cents. A capital volume, embracing many of the instructive letters of that eminently good man, John Newton, in whose conversion and subsequent history, the grace of God was wonderfully exhibited. Cardiphonia means "the utterance of the heart;" and such the book really is. The portrait of Mr. Newton is finely executed.

S 265. Scripture Lessons in Verse; or, the Principles of Religion in plain and easy verse, for the use of children and youth. By the Rev. Philip Doddridge, D. D. Square 16mo. with an engraving. 15 cents.

Youthful readers, who are fond of poetry, and who can more readily commit it to memory than prose, will find here the great principles of religion in plain and easy verse, written especially for them by the pious and learned Dr. Doddridge.

C 266. The Christian's Daily Walk, in holy security and peace. By the Rev. Henry Scudder. 12mo. 60 cents.

Solid instruction forms the staple of this volume. It was written two hundred years ago, and received the commendation of such men as Dr. Owen and Mr. Baxter. To those whose taste has not been vitiated by the light and frothy literature which is but too common in the present day, the Christian's Daily Walk will prove an acceptable companion.

C 267. Practical Sermons: to be read in families and social meetings. By Archibald Alexander, D.D., late Professor in Princeton Theological Seminary, With a portrait. 8vo. \$1.25.

The aged and venerable Dr. Alexander, who as a teacher always secured the love of his pupils, and as a preacher was always esteemed and admired, placed the Christian community under lasting obligations, by permitting this choice selection from his sermons to be published. They are characterized by simplicity, profound knowledge of the human heart, vigorous thought, and sound evangelical sentiment. The volume is beautifully printed, and adorned with a portrait which has the merit of being a correct likeness.

C 279. Pious Meditations and Devout Breathings. By the Rev. Joseph Hall, D. D., Bishop of Norwich. 18mo. 25 and 30 cents.

Bishop Hall was a great and good man, who left behind voluminous writings. The selections in this book are made from his devotional writings, and the style is only so far changed as to make it intelligible in modern times. The thoughts are striking, and bear evidence that he was a man who conversed much with God and his own heart, and whose knowledge of the Holy Scriptures was profound.

- S 280. The Shepherd Boy of Bethlehem, William and his Dog, Profane Swearing, and The Sailor Boys of Eimeo. 18mo. 10 cents.
- S 281. The Story of William Tyndale, My own Bible, and The Ungrateful Child. 18mo. 10 cents.

This is a continuation of the Africaner series of juvenile books. Each volume has a beautiful wood-cut.

C 282. The Spiritual Garden, or Traits of Christian Character Delineated. 18mo, with a handsome wood-cut. 25 and 30 cents.

This volume is composed of a number of valuable Tracts by the Rev. James Hamilton, the Rev. H. F. Burder, and the Rev. R. M. McCheyne. It comprises the Vine, the Cedar, the Palm, the Olive, the Church in the House, the Government of the Thoughts, the Government of the Thoughts, the Government of the Tongue, Remember Eli, or a Solemn Call to Parents, and a Pastor's Inquiries; all interesting, practical, and instructive. Here is a Garden containing trees, "good for food, and pleasant to the eyes, and to be desired to make one wise."

C 283. Bethany, or the Sickness, Death, and Resurrection of Lazarus, by the Rev. R. M. McCheyne. 18mo. with two engravings. 15 and 20 cents.

This like everything else from McCheyne's pen, breathes a sweet spirit of gentle, humble piety. We have not here the bold and manly logic of Paul, nor the ardent and sometimes impetuous fervour of Peter; but we have a tender, confiding John, pouring out in unaffected terms his love for the Master on whose bosom he leans, and his yearnings of heart that all should love such a Master, and that loving him they should love one another. All who are familiar with the writings of this youthful messenger of God, may readily imagine how he would deport himself when in company with Jesus, Mary and Martha, at the tomb of Lazarus.

C 284. The Redeemer's Legacy, or Peace from the Saviour's Hands and Side. By the Rev. W. J. McCord. 18mo. 15 and 20 cents.

This volume is highly practical and suggestive. The writer's aim is to remove the darkness and doubts with which the minds of many sincere Christians are disturbed, and to administer to all such that peace which the Redeemer has left as a legacy to his faithful followers. It is rich in themes of consolation and encouragement to God's afflicted, tempest-tossed people.

C 285. The Anxious Inquirer after Salvation directed and encouraged. By John Angell James. 18mo. 20 and 25 cents.

A work, the merit of which has been well attested. It has gone through various editions, and has been singularly useful to those whose attention has been awakened to the great concern of salvation. We cordially commend it to the anxious inquirer, in connection with another book of similar character found on this catalogue, viz.: Henry's Anxious Inquirer. (No. 12.)

C 286. Prize Essays on the Temporal Advantages of the Sabbath, considered in relation to the Working Classes. Containing Heaven's Antidote to the Curse of Labour, by John Allan Quinton, Journeyman Printer; The Torch of Time, by David Farquhar, Machinist; and The Pearl of Days, by a Labourer's Daughter. 12mo. with nine beautiful engravings. 50 cents.

The importance of the subject the peculiarity of the authorship, the style of publication, and the cheapness of the volume, render this one of the most attractive books ever published by the Board.

S 287. A Bible Dictionary, adapted for the use of Bible Classes, Sabbath Schools, and Families. 12mo, 50 and 55 cents.

A work of this kind, which should contain all that is needed to illustrate Biblical Geography, History, Biography, and Antiquities, and at the same time exhibit the doctrines of the Bible as laid down in our standards, has long been a desideratum in our church. It is hoped that this attempt to supply the want, which is the fruit of much study and labour, will prove generally acceptable, and highly useful to parents and children, teachers and pupils. It has been brought up to the present stage of geographical and archæological discoveries, a large amount of information is imparted in a very few words—all extraneous and irrelevant matter being omitted, and instead of the unseemly and unartistic wood-cuts, with which many of the Bible Dictionaries are disfigured, this work is enriched with a set of maps, with coloured tracings, in the best style of steel engraving. No family should be without such an aid for understanding the meaning of the Scriptures. To the Sabbath-school Library it will be an invaluable addition.

C 288. An Affectionate Address to Mothers. By the Rev. Daniel Baker, D.D., of Texas. 18mo. 10 cents.

A most important subject is here presented, in a form which cannot fail to interest and profit those to whom it is addressed.

C 289. The Christian Philosopher Triumphing over Death; or, A Narrative of the Closing Scenes of the Life of William Gordon, M. D., F. L. S., of Kingston-upon-Hull. By Newman Hall, B. A., with a lithographed likeness. To which is added, A Memoir of Dr. John D. Godman, by Dr. Thomas Sewall, 12mo. 50 cents.

The former part of this volume is a reprint from the Sixth English edition. It exhibits one of the most remarkable dying scenes of a Christian which we have ever read. "The pains, the groans, and dying strife" which so often characterize the closing scenes, even of the believer, were strangers to the death-bed of Dr. Gordon, while peace, joy, and triumph through the blood of the Lamb marked his chamber as the "robing-room of heaven."

The Memoir of Dr. Godman, which is appended to this edition, is scarcely less

interesting, though better known, having been published as a Tract by the Ameri-

can Tract Society.

S 290. My Own Book, or select Narratives and Instructions suitable for Youth, square 16mo. with many engravings. 30 and 35 cents.

An attractive volume, full of entertainment for the young. It is addicated to his "own dear children" by the compiler, an affectionate father, who devoted some midnight hours to compiling it for their instruction and amusement. The variety of interesting incidents, and the handsome illustrations, make it appropriate as a gift book for children.

C 291. Memoir of Mrs. Agnes Andrew, of Paisley, illustrative of the Triumphs of Faith in Humble Life. By the Rev. Peter Mearns, Coldstream, 18mo, 20 and 25 cents.

A simple and touching portraiture of pious poverty, struggling on in the midst of the most adverse circumstances, and under the weight of heavy afflictions. Professing Christians, in all conditions of life, may read with great profit such annals of the poor.

C 292. The Bruised Reed and Smoking Flax: to which is added a Description of Christ. By Richard Sibbes, D. D. 18mo. 30 and 35

This is a flagon of old wine, that has lost nothing in the keeping. It is an elabo rate exposition, after the old Puritan method, of Matt. xii. 20, in which the infir mities and frailties of Christians are described under the image of the bruised reed and smoking flax, and the tenderness of Christ in dealing with these weaknesses very touchingly and beautifully set forth. Baxter mentions this treatise as one that contributed very greatly to lead him to Christ.

C 293. Moriah, or Sketches of the Sacred Rites of Ancient Israel. By the Rev. Robert W. Fraser, M. A. 12mo. with two engravings. 60 cents.

This work is admirably adapted to extend a knowledge of the Levitical institutions, and to excite a deeper interest in reading the Old Testament. In a very graphic and popular style the author has described the ritual of the Old Testament, whilst its spiritual meaning is brought out, the typology is interpreted, and a most interesting representation of evangelical truth is exhibited in an earnest and heartstirring manner.

C 294. The Three Last Things, or Death, Judgment, and Eternity, by the Rev. John Hambleton, M.A. 18mo. 20 and 25 cents.

This is a solemn and earnest presentation of those august themes, Death, Judgment, and Eternity, called by the old divines novissima—"last things." They are handled in a manner calculated to make a deep and permanent impression on the mind of the reader.

# C 295. Light and Support for the Dark Valley. 18mo. 15

This is a little hand-lamp for a pilgrim who expects to go down into the dark and lonely valley that lies before him, and our highest praise of it is to say, that the light by which it gilds that gloomy gorge, is a light borrowed from the gospel. This is faithfully and earnestly presented as a light to our feet and a lamp to our path, not only in life, but in death.

S 296. The Ragged Scholars, Perils in the Desert, and the Avenger Stayed. 18mo. with an engraving. 10 cents.

A pleasant little volume, containing three interesting narratives calculated to please and profit youthful readers.

S 297. A Visit to the Holy Land, the Young Jewess, the Red Berries, and the Twins. 18mo. with several engravings. 10 cents.

Several charming little narratives, suited to engage the attention and improve the minds of the young.

C 298. Lessons of Life and Death, a Memorial of Sarah Ball, who died in her 18th year. By Elizabeth Ritchie. 18mo. 20 and 25 cents.

This is a graceful and touching tribute to a very lovely character. She was an English girl, who manifested perhaps a precocious development of both mind and heart, and, like such rare and exotic growths, was early transplanted to heaven. The book describes her childhood, her conversion, her spiritual conflicts, her intellectual and Christian character, and the triumphant exercises of her dying hours.

M 299. The Life of Ashbel Green, V. D. M., begun to be written by himself in his 82d year, and continued to his 84th. Prepared for the press by the author's request, by Joseph H. Jones, D. D., pastor of the 6th Presbyterian church, Philadelphia. 8vo. with a portrait, \$1.35.

No minister of the Presbyterian Church has ever been for so long a time and so extensively related to her history as the subject of this memoir. Many of the events familiarly detailed in this autobiography are connected with the most important periods in the existence of the country and the Church. No minister's library should be without this volume, and the low price at which it is offered places it within the reach of all.

M 300. The Canon of the Old and New Testament ascertained; or the Bible complete without the Apocrypha and unwritten Traditions. By Archibald Alexander, D. D. A new edition revised for the Presbyterian Board of Publication. 12mo. 70 cents.

This admirable summary, so long and most favourably known, both in Europe and America, has become the property of the Board of Publication. So excellent a standard book is regarded as quite an acquisition to the catalogue. Several valuable additions have been made in this edition.

S 301. The Brazen Serpent, or Faith in Christ Illustrated. By J. IL. Jones, D. D. 32mo. 5, 10, and 15 cents.

Although this book was written for children, it may be perused with profit by all. It exhibits in a plain, but very striking manner the plan of salvation, and contains more doctrinal and practical Christianity than is to be found in some ponderous tomes.

#### S 302. Sarah Lee and Susan Grey. 32mo. 3 cents.

This is a book for children in ballad verse, intended to illustrate the nature of real conviction for sin by a simple and touching narrative.

#### S 303. Sermons to Young Children. 32mo. 5, 10, and 15 cents.

We have here a neat little volume of ten sermons, averaging less than eight small pages each. The style is sufficiently simple to suit the comprehension of young children, and at the same time is free from the "baby-talk" so often resorted to by those who attempt to make such books, and which is just as offensive to sensible children as to sensible older persons.

# C 304. Considerations for Days of Adversity. 32mo. 5, 10 and

The author of this excellent little book has well fulfilled the precept, "Remember them that are in adversity." These "Considerations" will be found seasonable, and highly consolatory to afflicted souls.

C 305. Letters to the Right Rev. John Hughes, Roman Catholic Bishop of New York, by "Kirwan." 18mo. Three parts in one. 35 and 40 cents.

These letters have been translated into French, Spanish, Italian, German and Tamul; and are perhaps doing as much service as any other such instrumentality in preparing the way for the spread of Protestantism. Few works on this great controversy are better adapted for popular effect than these terse, Junius-like letters of "Kirwan," (Rev. N. Murray, D. D.)

# S 306. Pictorial First Book for little Boys and Girls. Square 16mo. 25 cents.

This is a choice little book for children who are just being initiated into the mysteries of spelling. The lessons are well selected and arranged, and the illustrations are very beautifully executed. It will be a most acceptable offering to the children of the Church, and it is hoped may have a happy influence in interesting them in other publications of their own Board.

- S 307. Still Happy in Jesus, or the Dying Hours of Emily F——, a Kelso Sabbath scholar, aged 14. By Jane Catharine———. 18mo. 10 cents. This is a record of the dying experience of a Sabbath scholar, and is full of the breathings of youthful piety.
- S 308. The Labourer's Daughter, or Religious Training in Humble Life. An autobiographical sketch. By the author of the "Pearl of Days." 18mo. 10 cents.

A beautiful sketch of domestic piety that should be widely circulated. It exhibits the advantages of religious training in humble life, showing at the same time what humble piety may do to promote the glory of God and the good of fallen man. (See No. 286.)

C 309. It is I, or the Voice of Jesus in the Storm. By Newman Hall, B. A. 32mo. 10 and 15 cents.

A little volume rich in consolation for afflicted, tempest-tossed souls. It is by the author of "The Christian Philosopher triumphing over Death." (See No. 289.)

- C 310. Come to Jesus. By Newman Hall, B. A. 22mo, 10 and 15 cents. An earnest and affectionate enforcement of the gracious invitations of the gospel, to those who are oppressed with a burden of sin and sorrow.
- C 311. The Life of Col. James Gardiner, who was slain at the battle of Prestonpans, September 21, 1745. By P. Doddridge, D.D. 18ma with a beautiful portrait. 25 and 30 cents.

This intensely engaging memoir, comprising the remarkable conversion, highly consistent Christian character, and melancholy death of a brave soldier, is so well known as to need no recommendation. The public will be pleased to learn that a new edition, with a fine portrait, is now accessible.

M 312. A Collection of the Acts, Deliverances, and Testimonies, of the Supreme Judicatory of the Presbyterian Church, from its Origin in America, to the present time, with Notes and Documents explanatory and historical: constituting a complete illustration of her polity, faith, and history. By the Rev. Samuel J. Baird. 8vo. pp. xxii, and 856. Price

This work contains a full exhibition of all that the Church has, either by precedent or act decided, upon the principles of her faith and order, and the rules of her discipline; the whole condensed to the smallest possible dimensions. No minister or session should be without it.

S 313. The Works of Creation Illustrated. With many engrayings, square 16mo. 70 and 75 cents.

Here is the blending of natural science and religious truth, in a way that is eminently fitted to enkindle in the youthful mind the spirit of devotion. The illustrations, which are exceedingly well done, are not only grateful for the eye to behold, but useful for the mind to contemplate.

- C 314. Green Pastures, or Daily Food for the Lord's Flock. By the Rev James Smith. 32mo. 25 cents.
- C 315. Still Waters, or Refreshment for the Saviour's Flock at eventide. By the Rev. James Smith. 32mo. 25 cents.

These two little diamond volumes contain a text, a verse of a hymn, and a brief remark, for the morning and evening of every day in the year. They are literally spiritual crumbs.

S 316. Ears of the Spiritual Harvest, or Narratives of the Christian Life. 12mo. with two beautiful engravings. 45 cents.

A series of interesting and affecting narratives, which exhibit the lights and shades of Christian character in the various walks of life.

S 317. My Father's God, a testimony for Religion, addressed especially to the children of pious parents. 18mo. 15 and 20 cents.

This book is full of kind instruction to youth who have been piously trained, but whose steps have gone aside from the commandments. We commend its perusal to all such, and especially to those who, like the prodigal son, have strayed far from their father's house.

C 318. Universalism False and Unscriptural; an Essay on the Duration and Intensity of Future Punishment. By A. Alexander, D. D. 18mo. 20 and 25 cents.

An admirable little work, from the pen of one of the most esteemed fathers in the Presbyterian Church, which should be put into the hands of the young as an antidote to that poisonous error which holds out the lure that men may partake of the pleasures of sin without fear of punishment. It is at once a brief and conclusive argument on the subject.

S 319. The Cripple—the Mountain in the Plain—and To a Boy anxious about his Soul. With an engraving. 18mo. 10 cents.

This little volume contains a touching narrative of an afflicted youth, seeking an interest in Christ. Also an allegory, entitled "The Mountain in the Plain," by the Rev. James Hamilton; and a letter by the Rev. R. M. McCheyne, "To a boy anxious about his soul."

© 320. Confessions of a Convert from Baptism in Water, to Baptism with Water. 18mo. 25 and 30 cents.

This is a small but exceedingly interesting work by one, who having been reared under Baptist influences, undertakes, having himself discovered the truth, to ex-

pose the bigotry, ignorance, sophistry, and narrow-mindedness of certain classes of that persuasion. The work is small and adapted to common readers, and portrays an accumulation of facts, that cannot fall to exert a healthful influence in correcting evils and errors which are prominent, spreading, and destructive of much good.

M 321. Biographical Sketches of the Founder and principal Alumni of the Log College, together with an account of the Revivals of Religion under their ministry. Collected and edited by Archibald Alexander, D. D. 12mo. 55 cents.

This volume contains narratives of the times, and the men who were connected with the early history of Presbyterianism in New Jersey. The work is popularly known as the "Log College"-deriving its title from Mr. Tennent's School at Neshaminy, at which most of the earlier members of the Presbytery of New Brunswick were educated.

C 322. The Converted Unitarian, a short Memoir of E-Ea patient sufferer, who entered into rest, August 13, 1825. 18mo. 20 and 25

This is a short memoir of E. E., who, in the furnace of affliction, was brought to see her sandy foundation as a Unitarian, and to lay hold of Christ as freely offered in the gospel. The work is instructive and interesting to all, and peculiarly adapted to correct the error into which the subject of the memoir had fallen.

S 323. Pictorial Scenes and Incidents, Illustrative of Christian Missions. Square 16mo. with thirteen beautiful wood engravings. 30 and 40 cents.

This cannot fail to be a very attractive book to the young; while it is calculated to excite in them gratitude for their privileges, and sympathy for the deluded and depraved heathen.

S 324. The Child's Poetical Keepsake. Square 16mo. with superior engravings. 45 cents.

The wood-cuts of this volume are exquisitely delicate and beautiful. The poetry is very well selected for the class of readers for whom it is designed. This volume will probably be a favourite gift-book for all holidays for some time to come.

S 325. Early Religious History of John Barr, written by himself, and left as a legacy to his grandchildren. To which is added a sketch of his character by a grandson. 18mo. 15 and 20 cents.

The subject of this autobiography was one of that numerous class of American Presbyterians whose lineage is to be traced to the north of Ireland. The narra-tive is a simple statement of his Christian experience, and of God's dealings with him in the earlier part of his life. Mr. Barr was a pious and intelligent North Carolina farmer.

S 326. The Flower Transplanted, The Blind Boy, and Little George. 32mo. with an engraving. 5, 10 and 15 cents.

Sweet memorials of infant piety, peculiarly attractive to youthful readers, and gratifying to the advanced Christian, as exhibiting the tender care of the Good Shepherd for the lambs of the flock.

S 327. The Short Prayer and the Text of Easy Words. 32mo. with an engraving. 5, 10 and 15 cents

Two interesting narratives, exhibiting the power of divine grace, and the peculiar methods by which souls are sometimes brought under its influence.

S 328. The Well Watered Plains, or instructive lessons from the History of Lot. By the Rev. H. N. Brinsmade, D. D. 18mo. with three beautiful engravings. 15 and 20 cents.

Here the striking incidents in the History of Lot are interwoven with judicious and foreible instructions, calculated to touch the heart, and mould the conduct 6

both of young and old. Much taste is displayed in the numerous and appropriate poetical quotations interspersed through the book.

M 329. Letters on Clerical Manners and Habits, addressed to a Student in the Theological Seminary at Princeton, N. J. By Samuel Miller, D.D. A new edition, revised by the author. 12mo. with a portrait of the author. 65 cents.

Every candidate for the ministry, and every minister of the gospel, of whatever denomination, should read carefully, and ponder seriously, the lessons of wiedom contained in this volume. Those who had the happiness to enjoy the instructions or the familiarity of the venerable author, know that his own mind and manners furnished the model which he has here so forcibly and affectionately recommended to others.

- C 330. Letters to the Aged. By A. Alexander, D.D. 18mo. 15 and 20 zents.
- S 331. Counsels of the Aged to the Young. By A. Alexander, D. D. 18mo. 15 and 20 cents.

These two volumes are extracted from Dr. Alexander's work on "Religious Experience," (No. 74.) so well known and highly valued, both in this country and in Great Britain. They are full of instruction, and are beautiful specimens of the earnest and affectionate spirit, and of the clear, simple, and attractive style of the venerated author.

C 332. An Earnest Search for Truth, in a series of Letters from a Son to his Father. By the Rev. S. A. Lowry, 18mo. 20 and 25 cents.

The author was once in the ministry of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, who have adopted a system of doctrines which professes to hold a middle ground between Calvinism and Arminianism. He here gives his reasons for adopting, in full, the system of doctrines contained in our Confession of Faith.

It is well worthy of perusal by those who have doubts as to the scriptural character of those doctrines which ignorance and prejudice brand "as the horrible

dogmas of Calvinism."

C 333. An Affectionate Address to Fathers. By the Rev. D Baker, D.D., of Texas. 18mo. 10 cents.

Plain truths earnestly enforced—an excellent counterpart to the "Address to Mothers," No. 288.

S 334. The Youth's Gleaner, or ripe fruits of Piety, gathered and garnered for the Board of Publication. 18mo. with two wood engravings. 30 and 35 cents.

This is one of the most interesting miscellanies that the Roard has published. It consists chiefly of sketches of character, religious and irreligious, from the highest rank in life to the lowest. It cannot fail to give pleasure, and at the same time afford profit, to readers both young and old.

S 335. The Eastern Traveller, or descriptions of places and customs mentioned in the Bible. By John Macgregor, M. A. 18mo. with several engravings. 15 and 20 cents.

We know no book of the size that contains so many passages of Scripture illustrated in a familiar manner by references to what travellers observe at the present day in the East.

C 336. Letters from a Father to his Sons in College. By Samuel Miller, D. D., with a portrait. 12mo. 60 cents.

These letters contain just such counsels, warnings and instructions as a pions and prudent parent would wish to put into the hands of a son at the most critical period of his life.

S 337. The Youth's Visitor. Selections in Prose and Verse, chiefly from the "Sabbath School Visitor." Square 10mo. with engravings. 40 and 45 cents.

S 338. Bible Rhymes, or Sketches of Scripture History in Verse. Selected and arranged for the Presbyterian Board of Publication. 18mo. with numerous engravings. 25 and 30 cents.

This volume contains ninety-seven pieces of poetry on Scripture facts, from the Old and New Testament. It is a good companion for No. 265, which treats of Scripture doctrines in verse.

S 339. The Bible-the Book of the Lord, or the divine Authority of the Sacred Scriptures, addressed especially to the Young. 18mo. with an engraving. 10 cents.

This is a small, but most valuable publication, which ought to be found in every Sabbath-school, and every family in the land, as may be seen by the following titles of the chapters:—I. The Bible shown to be useful. II. The instruction of the Bible suited to our wants. III. The Bible has all the profis which a book coming from God might be expected to have. IV. Testimonies in favour of the Bible.

S 340. Sabbath-day Readings, or Children's Own Sabbath Book. By Julia Corner. Square 16mo. with several beautiful engravings. 60 and 65 cents.

These Readings are chiefly on Scripture History, in prose and verse. It is one of the most attractive books for youth on the catalogue.

C 341. Daily Readings. Passages of Scripture, selected for social reading, with applications. By Caroline Fry. 12mo. 60 cents.

This is a casket filled with gems of thought and piety. Like the holy book whose truths it is designed to elucidate and enforce, it may be read and re-read with un diminished interest.

C 342. Patience. By James W. Alexander. 18mo. 10 cents.

This excellent little book was originally written as a pastoral gift to an esteemed friend, who had been more than two years confined to her dwelling by a dangerous, lingering, and sometimes exceedingly painful malady. It brings out the subject of which it treats with great simplicity and directness, and is well fitted to act as a cordial to a wounded spirit.

C 343. A Manual on the Christian Sabbath, by John Holmes Agnew, with an Introductory Essay, by the Rev. Samuel Miller, D.D. 18mo. 25 and 30 cents.

This is a very seasonable publication, in these days of Sabbath desecration. Every reflecting man, whatever be his politics or religious connection, must admit that the temporal as well as the spiritual welfare of our country is intimately connected with a due observance of the Sabbath. The points discussed in this volume, are, 1. The institution of the Sabbath. 2. Perpetual obligation of the Sabbath. 3. Change of day. 4. Utility of the Sabbath. 5. The duties of the Sabbath.

C 344. Evidences for Heaven, written in the year 1650, by Mrs. Thomasen Head, for the benefit of her children. 18mo. 15 and 20 cents.

Mrs. Head was a native of England, but was living in Ireland in the time of the dreadful massacre of the Protestants there. She was disciplined in the school of affliction, and came out a bright scholar, qualified to teach others the way of the Lord in truth. This little book is rich in Christian experience and real heart-religion.

S 345. Grandmother's Parable, or the Young Pilgrims-The Snakebite, and Feeling and Principle. 18mo. with an engraving. 15 cents.

An attractive little book for the young, in the Bunyan style.

S 346. The Waterloo Soldier: or the Early Life and Closing Days of Farquhar Mackay. By Colin A. Mackenzie. With an Introduction by the Rev. W. M. Hetherington, LL. D. 18mo. 20 and 25 cents.

This is a memoir of a Highland soldier, the vicissitudes of whose life displayed, for a period, the malignity of sin, and ultimately the triumph of grace, both in himself, and through his instrumentality in many others.

An admirable help to parents and teachers in instructing their infant charge.

We have here a simple, engaging and instructive exhibition of grace in convincing of sin, working faith, promoting activity in doing good, and taking away the sting of death.

The hynns are numerous, well chosen, and simple. The merest child can appreciate them. The wood-cuts are the very best of the class, and will please the eye of even practised judges in such matters. It deserves, and will no doubt receive, a wide circulation.

C 350. Baker on Baptism, A Plain and Scriptural View of Baptism. By the Rev. Daniel Baker, D. D., of Texas. 18mo. 20 and 25 cents.

This little volume cannot but be popular, especially in the South and Southwest, where Dr. Baker's evangelical labours have been so much blessed. It fully answers to its title—it is plain and scriptural.

C 351. The Grace of Christ, or Sinners Saved by Unmerited Kindness. By William S. Plumer, D. D. Written for the Board of Publication. 12mo. 75 cents.

This work is of a practical, not a polemic character, designed not for the few, but for the masses. Its chief object is to lead men to the foot of the cross, and encourage them to make Christ all and in all.

"Fear not" is a fervent, simple and affectionate endeavour to remove the awakened soul's distrust of God. "Rest in Christ" is a similar attempt to confirm the soul in a believing repose upon the Lamb of God.

C 383. Mary Searching for Jesus. By Rev. James Drummond. 18mo. pp. 32. Price 10 cents.

This is an interesting little work, founded upon Luke ii. 40—52, and makes an ingenious use of Mary's search for her son Jesus, and final discovery of him in the temple, to press home upon its readers the all-important duty of seeking and finding Jesus as a Saviour.

C 384. A warning Cry from Niagara. By the author of "Come to Jesus, &c," 18mo. 10 cents.

The author has seized upon the thrilling incident of a man discovered some years ago, in the midst of the roaring rapids of Niagara, to illustrate the awful danger of the unconverted sinner, and the power and love of the Redeemer.

C 385. Memoirs of Rev. Walter M. Lowrie, Missionary to China. Edited by his father. 12mo. pp. 485. Price 70 cents.

This is an abridgment of the larger memoir of this devoted missionary, which was published shortly after his death. The Church of Christ in these latter days has perhaps produced few choicer and lovelier spirits than was that of Walter M. Lowrie. Although cut off from life by the hand of violence when in only his twenty-ninth year, he lived long enough to do great good, and long will be continue to speak, although dead.

S 386. Sketches of the Presbyterian Church, containing a brief summary of arguments in favour of its primitive and apostolic character, and a view of its principles, order and history, designed especially for the Youth of the Church. By the Rev. J. E. Rockwell. 282 pp. 18mp. with four engravings. Price 25 and 30 cents.

This work originally appeared in the form of letters in the Sabbath-school Visitor, and its publication in book form was loudly urged by many parents and Sabbath-school teachers. It promises to be a work of permanent value and interest to the youth of our church.

S 387. The Lily among Thorns, and Old Gabriel. 32mo. pp. 64. Price 5, 10 and 15 cents.

This little volume contains two interesting delineations of personal piety. The first and longest of these is an account of a Scotch woman, who, when a little girl, was by God's wondrous providence and grace, rescued from gipsey associates to become a shining and useful Christian, to the end of a long life, and amidst severe poverty and suffering exemplifying and adorning the gospel of her Saviour.

S 388. The Bohemian Martyrs, or sketches of the lives of John Huss, and Jerome of Prague. 96 pp. 18mo. with an engraving. Price 15 and 20 cents.

This is a valuable accession to the Sabbath-school library, worth a score of fictitions tales. It exhibits examples of heroic devotion to the truth, worthy of the imitation of youth.

C 389. Monitory Letters to Church Members. 12mo. pp. 161. Price 40 cents.

This excellent work is from the pen of an able, accomplished, and experienced author and pastor. Every page bears the marks of a warm heart, a cultivated taste, and an elevated piety. It is composed of twenty-two letters, each of which forms a complete chapter, and is addressed to some one class of defective Christians. They breathe the spirit of true Christian affection, and fidelity to the souls of those whom they aim to bless.

C 390. The Perseverance of the Saints. 78 pp. 18mo. price 15 and 20 cents.

An earnest scriptural and logical argument in defence of a precious doctrine, which it is strange that any believer in the divine faithfulness should ever be disposed to deny. In clearness and force of reasoning, kinduess of spirit, and conciseness of style, it is a model for doctrinal writers.

#### 391. The Gospel and Epistles of St. John. 64mo. 20 cents.

This is a beautiful little miniature volume, and suitable for a present, or to be carried in the pocket as a vade mecum.

C 392. Adam and Christ, or the Doctrine of Representation stated and explained. By E. C. Wines, D. D. 71 pp. 18mo. Price 15 cents.

This little work explains and defends in the most lucid and convincing manner, the doctrine of vicarious obedience and suffering, which lies at the foundation of the Scribture plan of salvation.

M 393. Minutes of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States, from A. D. 1821, to A. D. 1836, inclusive. Prepared by the Editor of the Board. 498 pp. 8vo. Price \$1.65.

The original edition of these Minutes being exhausted, and no second edition published, they have for many years been quite inaccessible to the great body of ministers and people. Hence the call for this new edition, which contains the Minutes in full, with a condensed summary of the voluminous statistical tables of the original Minutes. This volume will be valuable as a work of reference, and as exhibiting a consecutive history of the proceedings of our highest judicatory.

C 394. On Temptation and the Mortification of Sin in Believers: By the Rev. John Owen, D. D., 12mo. pp. 306. with a portrait.

The nature of the contents of this volume can be test exhibited by setting forth in full the separate titles of the two treatises, which are as follows: I. Of Temptation, the nature and power of it, the danger of entering into it, and the means of preventing that danger: with a resolution of sundry cases thereunto belonging. II. Of the Mortification of Sin in Believers; the necessity, nature, and means of it: with a resolution of sundry cases of conscience thereunto belonging.

C 395. The Christian Ministry not a Priesthood: A Sermon preached at the opening of the sessions of the General Assembly of the Pres byterian Church, in Nashville, Tenn., on Thursday, May 17, 1855, by the Rev. Henry A. Boardman, D. D., the Moderator of the previous Assembly. Published by order of the Assembly. 18mo. pp. 84. Price 15 cents.

The clearness and simplicity of its argument, the gracefulness of its diction, the truthfulness of its statements, the fervour and power of its appeals, and its special adaptation to meet and refute some of the most insidious and fashionable errors of the day, combine to make this a highly valuable contribution to our religious literature.

396. What is Presbyterianism? An address delivered before the Presbyterian Historical Society. By Charles Hodge, D. D. 18mo. Price 15 cents

This is a very able and instructive discourse of its learned author, who, if any man, may be supposed to be fully competent to pronounce upon the characteristic features of that system of church order, which we believe to be founded in the word of God.

C 397. Memoirs, including Letters and Sclect Remains of John Urquhart, late of the University of St. Andrews. By William Orme. With a prefatory Notice and Recommendation, by Alexander Duff, D.D. LL. D., 12mo. pp. 420. With a portrait. Price 65 cents.

This volume contains an interesting memoir of a young Scottish student of remarkable talents, attainments, and picty. At a very tender age he devoted himself to the work of preaching the gospel to the heathen, but owing to various obstacles, his intentions were never carried out. From the age of twelve years onward he was a fellow-student and intimate associate of the present distinguished

missionary, Dr. Alexander Duff, who has revised the work; and written an introductory essay on the life and character of his friend.

S 398. Life Sketches from Scottish History, or brief biographies of Scottish Presbyterian Worthies. Compiled for the Board of Publication. 18mo. pp. 144. With an engraving. Price 20 and 25 cents.

This little book consists of about twenty biographical sketches of Scottish martyrs and other worthies, drawn up in such a manner, and abounding with such facts and anecdotes, as must make the book interesting both to the youthful and the adult reader.

C 399. Sermons and Essays by the Tennents and their Contemporaries. Compiled for the Board. 12mo. pp. 374. With a portrait of the Rev. Gilbert Tennent. Price 70 cents.

This volume originated in a plan of the late Dr. Archibald Alexander, and was intended by him to be a kind of a supplement to his "Log College." He did not, however, live to execute his design, which has now been carried out by one of his younger sons. The great docttines of divine sovereignty, justice, wisdom, and mercy; of predestination, regeneration, and kindred topics, are handled with a power and unction rarely seen in later productions. Brief biographical notices of the writers are prefixed to their several writings.

S 400. Learning to Converse. Revised by the Editor of the Board. 18mo. pp. 180. With engravings, Price 25 and 30 cents.

This little volume is from the same pen as "Learning to Think." "Learning to Feel," and "Learning to Act." all of which have been favourites with the young people, eyer since they were issued.

C 401. The Portfolio of Entertainment and Instruction. Compiled by the Editor of the Board. Quarto. Price \$1.50.

An elegant gift-book, suitable for every season. Its materials, its style of binding, and its eagravings, furnish a very unusual exhibition of richness, good taste, and artistic skill. The engravings, which are ten in number, will bear the most critical examination, and cannot fail to be admired for their beauty.

M 402. A Method for Prayer, with Scripture Expressions to be used under each head. By the Rev. Matthew Henry, author of the Commentary. 18mo. pp. 273. Price 30 and 35 cents.

The gifted author of this well-known treatise says, "A golden thread of heart-prayer must run through the web of the whole Christian life," and he has opened a rich mine from which to draw the material for the precious filament. A study of the topics, and the copious array of Scripture passages under each, as furnished in this volume, would greatly tend to give richness and variety to this fundamental part of our devotions.

S 403. The Child's Story Book. By Cousins Martha and Mary. 18mo. pp. 119. Price 25 and 30 cents.

An inviting, entertaining, and instructive book for children and youth. It contains twenty-three short narratives, and is illustrated by a number of woodcuts.

C 404. A Glance Backward at Fifteen Years of Missionary Life in North India. By the Rev. Joseph Warren, D. D. 12mo. pp. 256. Price 65 cents.

This sketch of missionary life in a distant but important field, will be read with deep interest by the many friends of missions. The habits, customs, prejudices, &c., of the people to whom the bread of life is to be given, the difficulties and hardships which the missionary has to encounter, his disappointments and successes, all are narrated with the truthful simplicity of one who has experienced what he describes, and who has toiled fifteen years among the Hindoos to gather them into the fold of Christ. The reader who takes it in hand for perusal, will be loth to lay the book down until he has finished it.

C 405. Wanderings of a Pilgrim. By D. A. Harsha, author of "Immanuel's Laud," &c., &c. 64mo, pp. 116. Gilt edge. Price 25 cents.

This is an admirable little book, containing a series of chapters, practical and experimental, on the Christian's pilgrimage through the wilderness, and across the Jordan of death. It is full of rich scriptural instruction, encouragement, and consolation for all who are striving to enter the heavenly city.

S 406. Aunt Sarah's Stories. By Minnie Woodruff. 18mo. pp. 55. Price 10 cents.

A beautiful little book, printed in a large fair type, and containing several pretty stories, adapted to benefit and amuse Sunday-school and other children.

C 407. God's Word to Inquirers. Compiled by the Rev. J. II. Bocock. With an Introductory Notice, by the Rev. W. S. White, D. D., of Lexington, Va. 32mo. pp. 56. Price 10 ceuts.

This is a judicious and well arranged compilation of Scripture, adapted to instruct the religious inquirer's mind, upon those great and vital subjects about which it most concerns him to have clear and scriptural views. This little manual will meet a want of which many a pastor has been deeply sensible.

C 408. Plantation Sermons, or plain and familiar discourses for the instructions of the unlearned. By the Rev. A. F. Dickson, of Charleston, South Carolina. With an Introduction by the Rev. J. L. Kirkpatrick, D. D. Price 40 cents.

These are what they profess to be, plain and familiar discourses for the unlearned; and remarkably well fitted to be used, as they were designed to be. on our Southern plantations. They may be read with advantage by all, for there is nothing colloquial or vulgar in them, while they have a peculiar adaptation to the unlearned. We regard the volume as an acquisition to our Board of Publication, and especially commend it to our Southern ministers.

C 409. An Explanation of the Assembly's Catechism, by the Rev. Thomas Vincent. 18mo. pp. 364. Price 40 and 45 cents.

This little volume, although somewhat quaint and antique in its style of composition, contains a rich and clear exposition of divine truth. Pastors, Sabbathschool teachers, and others, may find in it a valuable helper in their attempts to expound and illustrate the Shorter Catechism. So long ago as the year 1772, the old Synod of New York and Philadelphia was engaged in the gratuitous distribution of religious books to poor congregations, and "Vincent's Catechism" was one of the short list the Synod authorized to be procured and distributed.

S 410 Lizzie Ferguson, or the Sabbath-school Scholar. A Narrative of Facts. Written for the Presbyterian Board of Publication. By S. S. Egliseau. 18mo. pp. 180. Price 30 and 35 cents.

This is an extremely well written juvenile book, by one who possesses the happy faculty of imparting the most wholesome lessons in that familiar and affectionate way which children love.

C 411. The World and its Influences. By W. M. E. Price 20 and 25 cents.

A seasonable and faithful warning against the deceptive and destructive influences of the world, polished in style, scriptural in sentiment, affectionate and faithful in its warnings and exhortations.

C 412. The Sower and the Seed. By John Hall, D. D. Price 20 and 25 cents.

This is a plain and practical exposition of our Lord's parable of the sower. It is worthy of an attentive and prayerful perusal. Hearers of the word, who complain that they are not benefitted by preaching, and are ready to blame the preacher rather than themselves, may here find the cause of their unfruitfulness under the means of grace.

S 413. Ellen Sinclair, or the Earnest Inquirer. A true narrative. 18mo. pp. 36. Price 10 cents.

This is a singularly beautiful and touching narrative of the religious experience of an intelligent young lady. It is wholly free from exaggeration and sentimentalism. The simple and unaffected language in which she relates the way in which she was led to the cross is well adapted to attract and captivate the reader, and to make her story useful to those who may be seeking to secure an interest in Christ and his great salvation.

C 414. The Wedge of Gold, or Achan in El Dorado. By Rev. W. A. Scott, D. D. Price 40 cents.

In these times, when the love of money is working so perniciously to the interests of true religion, he does a good service who sets this gross form of idolatry in its true light. Such a service the author has rendered in this volume. The brief history of Achan furnishes a subject of profitable study, and the important lesson which it is so well suited to teach, is presented in a familiar and interesting manner in this little volume.

S 415. Little Nelly, and the Dying Irish Girl. 18mo. pp. 144. Price 20 and 25 cents.

Two narratives in one volume, both exhibiting the peace-giving power of the gospel of Christ, in contrast with the insufficiency of Papal delusions to purge the onscience from the guilt of sin. They will be found among the best of the issues of the Board.

S 416. Backbiting Reproved, The Visit, and other Sketches. By Charlotte Elizabeth. 18mo. pp. 144. With four engravings. Price 20 and 25 cents.

Here we have the common sin of evil speaking viewed in a scriptural light.— The subject is presented and carried out in a pleasing interview between a cousin and two sisters.

All who wish to understand and shun this wide-spread and peace-destroying sin, would do well to read this interesting little volume.

S 417. Daniel Baker's Talk to Little Children: By Daniel Baker, D.D. of Texas. 18mo. pp. 68. With three engravings. Price 15 cents.

This little volume is made up of nice stories for little children, which are well adapted to awaken a deep interest in the minds of the young readers. Dr. Baker's style is much like Peter Parley's, and will do much to impress young minds and hearts with religious sentiments and affections.

S 418. The Paradise of Children. An address to Boys and Girls. By Rev. N. Morren. Minister of the North Parish, Greenock. 18mo. pp. 72. Price 15 cents.

The foundation of this address is Zech. viii. 5—"The streets of the city shall be full of boys and girls playing in the streets thereof." In his remarks the author spiritualizes the passage, and having made this city stand for the heavenly Jerusalem, he first shows that there are children in heaven: and then, that all the children in heaven are happy; and then, how may children get to that happy city. It is, in every respect, an excellent address. All, young and old, may read it with pleasure and profit.

S 419. Little Kadore, the Royal Beggar Boy; and Maurice Sullivan. 18mo. pp. 36. Price 10 cents.

Little Kadore was a little boy of Tangier, Morneco; and Maurice Sullivan, an Irish boy of Ballybunnion, Co. Kerry. They are interesting, instructive, and truthful stories.

S 420. The Transformed Island. A story of the South Seas. 18mo. pp. 72. Price 15 cents.

This little book records events of a most remarkable character—the settlement of the uninhabited island of Pitcairn by a band of mutineers, about the year

1790—the reduction of their number, by violence and dissipation, to two persons, with a group of children that had been born of English fathers and Tahitlan mothers—the conversion of John Adams, one of the surviving two, by reading a copy of the Scriptures that happened to be taken to the Island by the mutineers, and a most happy and astonishing change in the physical, moral, and spiritual condition of the whole company; so that in the year 1852 it was settled by an honest, industrious, and intelligent people walking in the fear of the Lord, and loving one another with pure hearts fervently. It is a very interesting and instructive narrative.

S 421. Petra, or the Rock City and its Explorers, with plan of the City, and Engravings of the Monuments. 18mo. pp. 79. Price 15 and 20 cents.

The reader will find here a very minute and interesting account of this wonderful city of ancient Idumea, and in it see a most remarkable verification of the prophecies of God respecting it. It contains some very handsome engravings, illustrating different parts of the city.

S 422. Sabbath-school Theology; or Conversations with a Class. By John Hall, D. D. 18mo. pp. 94. Price 15 and 20 cents.

The "theology" of this little book is sound, Scriptural, and well adapted to the minds of children. It embraces some of the most important points of our holy religion. It would be well if all Sabbath-school teachers would instruct their classes in theology after the manner of this book.

C 423. Death-Bed Triumphs of Eminent Christians, Exemplifying the Power of Religion in a Dying Hour.——12mo, pp. 191. Price 40 cents.

In this volume we have the dying testimony of quite a number of eminent christian men. to the truth and power of religion. The reading of the dying experiences of these christians will teach the true believer to contemplate death, as one of them expressed it, as a great blessing—as the messenger sent to release us from earth and introduce us to beaven.

S 424. William Bartlett, or the Good Son; The Contested Seat; Lessons of the Stars; and, Who is the Happiest Girl? 18mo. pp. 108. Price 15 and 20 cents.

An interesting volume, containing several narratives of an excellent and impressive religious character. William Bartlett was a good son to his widowed mother. He laboured hard to support her, and to obtain an education for himself and his brother.

S 425. Learn to say No; or, the City Apprentice. Written for the Board of Publication. 18mo. pp. 122. Price 20 and 25 cents.

A record of the actual experiences, temptations, difficulties and dangers of one who is now a Presbyterian minister in the West, while, in early life, an apprentice in an Eastern city. This book would be invaluable as a gift to an apprentice, or to any lad away from his parent's roof, and would impressively show him that the only safety lies in abiding firmly by sound religious principles.

S 426. Footprints of Popery; or, places where Martyrs have suffered. 18mo. pp. 177. Price 25 and 30 cents.

This volume contains, in the form of a very interesting conversation between an aged man and a youth, a most interesting account of the cruel deeds of Popery in England. It is illustrated by a large number of wood cuts.

S 427. Rhymes for the Nursery. 18mo. pp. 91. Price 20 and 25 cents.

A republication of a capital little English work, containing about sixty beautiful pieces of poetry, adapted to the minds of little children, and containing excellent lessons for their infantile minds, conveyed in the most impressive and attractive method of instruction.

S 428. Select Stories for Little Folks. Compiled by Addie. 18mo. pp. 216. Price 30 and 35 cents.

This is an offering from a little girl of thirteen, who has collected and arranged in this little book, forty nice stories, well adapted not only to interest, but to profit her readers.

429. The Child's Scrap Book. Compiled by the Editor. 18mo. pp. 144. Price 20 and 25 cents.

Another book for the young, comprising over twenty valuable lessons, most judiciously selected.

430. A Day with the Haymakers. Written for the Board of Publication. 18mo. pp. 72. Price 15 cents.

A sprightly little book, in which ordinary incidents in country life are made a vehicle for conveying many important lessons.

S 431. The First Sabbath Excursion, and its Consequences. 18mo. pp. 72. Price 15 cents.

A solemn warning to boys against the small beginnings of a life of transgression against God's holy law.

432. Kenneth Forbes; or, Fourteen Ways of studying the Bible. 18mo, pp. 336. Price 35 and 40 cents.

This excellent volume is designed to lead children to an intelligent and careful study of God's holy word, and to show them that that blessed volume can well reward such study. It possesses sterling value.

433. Gems from the Coral Islands. Western Polynesia. Comprising the New Hebrides Group, the Loyalty Group, and the New Caledonia Group. By the Rev. William Gill, Rarotonga. 12mo. pp. 232. Price 60 cents.

This volume may be confidently commended as containing an intensely interesting record of missionary labours, trials, and successes in that part of the Pacific indicated by the title. It is written by one who has himself been more than seventeen years engaged in the work about which he writes. The volume is issued in beautiful style, and is illustrated with many wood cuts.

434. Gems from the Coral Islands; or Incidents of Contrast between Savage and Christian Life of the South Sea Islanders. By the Rev. William Gill, Rarotouga. Eastern Polynesia, comprising the Rarotouga Group, Penrhyn Islands, and Savage Island. 12mo. pp. 285. Price 75 cents. With illustrations.

This volume like the above, is filled with most interesting accounts of the wonderful works of God, and triumphs of his gospel, in that distant and until lately debased and savage portion of the world. No one can read these two books on Polynesia without finding his interest in the work of missions increased, or without becoming more hopeful in regard to the future and rapid progress of the gospel.

435. By whom is the World to be Converted? or Christians Christ's Representatives and Agents for the Conversion of the World. By the Rev. Thomas Smyth, D. D. Published by request of the Synod of South Carolina. 18mo. pp. 108. Price 20 and 25 cents.

This is an admirable discourse, replete with the enlarged spirit of the gospel, and enforcing with great felicity and fulness of illustration, the teachings of the New Testament on the stewardship of Christians, and the value of labour for Christ in its reflex influence on the individual character.

C 436. Faith and Works; or the teaching of the apostles Paul and 7 73

James on the doctrine of Justification perfectly harmonious. By L. H. Christian, Pastor of the North Presbyterian church, Philadelphia, 18mo. pp 138. Price 20 and 25 cents.

This is a clear and instructive little volume on a point of scriptural teaching which has perplexed and troubled not a few. Mr. Christian's style is lucid, and his reasoning close and convincing. The volume is a real addition to the rich stores of scriptural instruction already issued by the Board.

#### C 437. The Classmates, or the College Revival, by a Presbyterian minister. 18mo. pp. 203. Price 25 and 30 cents.

An admirable little volume, for the usefulness of which we entertain the highest hopes. It narrates the means by which a youth in college, of pious parentage, but somewhat inclined to skepticism, was finally led to cordial and experimental acceptance of the gospel, and to a consecration of himself to God's service. The value of the book is increased by the fact, that the trains of incident and conversation were all a part of the actual experiences of the writer.

# C 438. Domestic Duties, or the Family a Nursery for Earth and Heaven. By the Rev. Rufus W. Bailey. 18mo. pp. 120. Price 20 and 25 cents.

The duties of Husbands and Wives, of Females, of Parents and Children are here stated and enforced in a style at once attractive and forcible.

#### S 439. Ella Clinton, or by their fruits ye shall know them. By Cousin Martha. 18mo, pp. 206. Price 25 and 30 cents.

This is an engaging story of an orphan girl, early deprived of a pious mother, and thrown on the care of a well-meaning but harsh tempered aunt. It shows the advantage of true religion in bearing her up under her trials, and making her an instrument of good to others.

## S 440. Lessons for the Little Ones. By a Teacher of Infants. 18mo. pp. 180, with engravings. Price 25 and 30 cents.

These lessons, derived from Scripture, are full of interest for juvenile readers. The language is simple and the incidents striking. They would be admirable, if read as addresses to a youthful class.

## S 441. Gleanings from Real Life. By S. S. Egliseau, authoress of "Lizzie Ferguson." 18mo. pp. 180. Price 25 and 30 cents.

It might be enough for this interesting volume to say that it is from the same pen as sweet "Lizzis Ferguson." It consists of fourteen sketches, drawn from real life, all exhibiting the beauty of godliness.

### S 442. Annie Grey, and other Sketches. By Olive. 18mo. pp. 72. Price 15 cents.

This little volume contains seven short, but interesting sketches, intended especially for little girls, simple, natural, and instructive.

#### S 443. Children of Abraham, or Sketches of Jewish Converts, being in part a sequel to "Leila Ada." 18mo. pp. 120. Price 20 and 25 cents.

This volume contains sketches of the lives, and especially of the dying scenes of six converts from Judaism, and one unconverted Jewess, by way of contrast. The readers of "Leila Ada," will be pleased to learn something more about her cousin Isaac, who stood by her so nobly at the time of her fiery trial.

### C 444. The Life of Mrs. Sherwood, author of Henry Milner, Little Henry and his Bearer, &c. Abridged for the Board. 12mo. pp. 152, with a portrait. Price 45 cents.

The name of Mrs. Sherwood has long been a household word among pious parents and children, yet it is but lately that the public have been put in possession of her personal history and experience. None can rise from the perusal of this interesting volume without the conviction that the subject of it was raised up to to a great work in the cause of the religious instruction of the young.

C 445. A Spiritual Treasury for the Children of God; consisting of a Meditation for the morning of each day in the year, upon select texts of Scripture. Humbly intended to establish the faith, promote the comfort, and influence the practice of the followers of the Lamb. By William Mason. 12mo. pp. 510. Price 70 cents.

This is a reprint of a volume long and well known to God's people, as one of the best books of devotional reading to be found in the English language. It is redolent with the very savour of the gospel. We hardly know how any Christian could read every morning one of Mason's sweet meditations, without being enlightened, comforted, strengthened, and sanctified thereby.

C 446. A Spiritual Treasury for the Children of God; consisting of a Meditation for the evening of each day in the year, upon select texts of Scripture. By William Mason. 12mo. pp. 508. Price 70 cents.

This is an old and precious work in a new and inviting dress—a work of such a character as led the excellent William Romaine to say, in an address to the reader in regard to it: "I have found a sweet savour of Jesus's precious name, free grace, and perfect salvation in these meditations; and therefore I am persuaded it will be doing thee great service to recommend them to thy perusal." This book should find its way early to a place by the side of the Bible in every closet of the land.

S 447. The Bishop and the Monk; or, Sketches of the Lives of Pierpaolo Vergerio and John Craig, converts from Popery. 18mo. pp. 166. Price 20 and 25 cents.

These are very interesting and instructive sketches of the lives of an Italian bishop and a Scotch monk, during the time of the Reformation from Popery, They strikingly illustrate the power of truth to free the soul from the darkest system of superstition and bigotry. These sketches are principally taken from McCrie's History of the Reformation in Italy and in Scotland. The work is calculated to have a good influence upon the minds of the young.

S 448. Isabel, or Influence. 18mo. pp. 155. Price 20 and 25 cents.

This is a true narrative, well told, and illustrating the important principle of the influence which may be exerted even by the humblest in doing good. It is embellished with two fine wood cuts, and will be found suitable for the Sabbathschool library, or indeed for children's reading anywhere.

S 449. Little Talks for Little Folks. Written for the Presbyterian Board of Publication. 18mo. pp. 72. Price 15 cents.

An Amirable little volume for the little folks. Its lessons are conveyed in a sprightly and pleasing manner, but are full of weighty and important instruction for every youthful reader.

C 450. What is Faith? By the Rev. R. H. Beattle. Published by request of the Synod of New York. 18mo. pp. 102. Price 15 and 20 cents.

The substance of this little volume was originally delivered as a discourse before the Synod of New York. Hence their request for its publication; a request which will give weight and confidence to its teachings on the important subject indicated in its title, throughout the bounds of the Presbyterian Church. It is now reduced to the book form.

C 451. The Holy Life and Triumphant Death of Mr. John Janeway, Fellow of King's College, Cambridge. By the Rev. James Janeway. 18mo. pp. 166. Price 20 and 25 cents.

This is a striking narrative of one who lived only twenty-four years on earth, yet attained to a singularly exalted piety, and departed in triumph to his heavenly home. It will afford a rich treat to all whose taste can relish the examples of God's eminent saints, and the records of their spiritual exercises.

C 452. Gems of Thought; being Moral and Religious Reflections from Matthew Henry and others. Selected by Harrison Hall. 32mo. pp. 128. Gilt edge. Price 25 cents.

This is a gem of a book, highly suggestive, and admirably fitted in its exterior for the pocket or the work-basket, and in its contents, for the understanding and the heart. Many of these thoughts are from more modern authors than Henry.

C 453. Our Friends in Heaven; or the Mutual Recognition of the Redeemed in Glory demonstrated. By the Rev. J. M. Killen, M. A., Comber, 12mo. pp. 225. Price 45 cents.

This is a book for those whose friends, though once on earth, have now "passed into the heavens." The subject of which it treats must ever prove intensely interesting, so long as death continues to desolate our hearts and homes. The author has constructed a scriptural argument on the subject which leaves nothing to be desired by those who are satisfied with a "Thus saith the Lord."

S 454. Apples of Gold; or a Word in Season to Young Men and Women. By Rev. Thos. Brooks, Author of the "Mute Christian," &c., &c. 18mo. pp. 288. Price 30 and 35 cents.

A rich treasury of precious truths, in a quaint, but highly interesting style, with historical illustrations.

S 455. In Doors and out of Doors; or life among the Children. By Mary McCalla, author of "Pictorial Second Book." Square 16mo. pp. 183. Price 35 and 40 cents. With 5 coloured engravings.

This will prove to be an agreeable and useful volume for juvenile readers. The chapters are well written and convey much useful religious instruction. The coloured engravings add much to the attractiveness of the book.

C 456. Our Theology in its Developments. By E. P. Humphrey, D. D., Pastor of the Second Presbyterian Church, Louisville, Ky. 18mo. pp. 90. Price 15 and 20 cents.

This book contains a sermon preached before the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in 1852. The object of the writer is to set forth the tendencies of the system of doctrine and polity taught in the Confession of Faith. This he has done in seven particulars, which he has illustrated and enforced in a manner clear, forcible, and conclusive. It is well worthy of a careful perusal.

C 457. Faith, the Principle of Missions. By Thomas Smyth, D. D., of Charleston, S. C. 18mo, pp. 70. Price 15 cents.

This title exhibits, at a glance, the vast importance of the subject here discussed, and the well-known name of the author will be a sufficient guaranty for the ability and practicalness of the discussion. This little work deserves to be carefully perused by every minister of the gospel, and, indeed, by every private Christian too.

S 458. Aunt Ruth; or Persecuted not Forsaken. By the Author of "Ella Clinton." 18mo. pp. 237. Price 30 and 35 cents. With engravings.

This volume is from the same agreeable and useful pen as Nos. 461 £512. It gives much interesting information respecting the persecutions in Madeira, and those more recently experienced by the Madiai family in Italy, and draws therefrom such scriptural lessons as should be impressed upon the minds of the young in view of the facts related.

S 459. The Little Girl's Treasury of Precious Things. Compiled by Annie Brooks. 18mo. pp. 168. Price 25 and 30 cents.

What interests one little girl will almost always suit another. The materials

for this book, gathered by a little girl in the course of her own reading, will, no doubt, be found interesting to others of her age who give it a perusal.

S 460. The Little Boy's Treasury of Precious Things. Compiled by Addie. 18mo. pp. 238. Price 30 and 35 cents. With engravings.

Another little volume compiled for juvenile readers by a little girl of thirteen years, the same from whom recently proceeded the "Select Stories for Little Folks." These short tales have been judiciously selected and arranged, and are well adapted to do good.

S 461. Marion Harvie, a tale of Persecution in the seventeenth century. By the author of "Ella Clinton," and "Aunt Ruth." 18mo. pp. 279. Price 35 and 40 cents. With several engravings.

A very interesting narrative, illustrative of the sufferings of the people of God in Scotland in the seventeenth century. It is well adapted to give an insight into the temper and spirit of those who suffered so terribly for Christ's sake, and to make its readers thankfully rejoice that they live at a time and in a country where God has restrained the wrath of the wicked, and given to his people outward peace.

S 462. The Evening Visit. Written for the Board of Publication. 18mo. pp. 84. Price 15 and 20 cents.

A little book soon read, but containing matter to be often and much thought of.

C 463. Meditations in Sickness and Old Age. By Baptist W. Noel, M. A. 18mo. pp. 114. Price 15 and 20 cents.

This little volume richly deserves the attention of the sick and the aged, It will bring sweet and useful thoughts to their minds, and carry consolation and hope and peace to their hearts. It is now republished by the Board, at the suggestion of a pasfor in one of our large cities, who has long circulated it among his people to their great advantage. It discourses in a fresh and vivid style upon heaven, and the needful preparation and evidences for it.

C 464. The Elect Lady; a Memoir of Mrs. Susan Catharine Bott, of Petersburg, Va. By A. B. Van Zandt, D. D., of New York. 18mo. pp. 196. Price 25 and 30 cents.

This memoir of one who was eminent for her piety and usefulness, will be welcomed by multitudes in Virginia, who have already known or heard of her. And when the book comes to be known throughout the Church, it cannot fail to be welcomed everywhere. It holds up to view a model of Christian energy and humility.

C 465. The Refuge, by the author of the Guide to Domestic Happiness. 12mo. pp. 227. Price 40 cents.

This book is designed and admirably adapted to benefit young ladies. It was originally written for the instruction of "Lavinia," a young lady of one of the first families of London, who, possessing a complete education, great personal and mental attractions, and receiving the lowly homage of the fashionable world, found herself still unhappy. By the faithful instructions addressed to her by a Christian friend, and which are contained in the chapters of this book, she was led to "The Nefuge," and secured peace and joy in believing on Jesus. The book is commended to all, and especially to all female readers, who have vainly sought for solid happiness in the pleasures of this life, and who are willing to learn how to secure such happiness in looking to Jesus Christ.

C 466. Daughters at School, instructed in a series of letters. By the Rev. Rufus W. Baily. 12mo. pp. 252. Price 40 cents.

It is not often that the anxieties of a parent for his children are more earnestly expressed, or more wisely directed than in the book before us. In a series of 7 \*

affectionate and faithful letters to his motherless daughters while at a boardingschool, a good man gives most important counsels for their highest good in temporal and spiritual things, for time and for eternity. Every young lady in the forming period of her life, should have this book with her Bible in her closet, and often in her hand, for the oughtful and prayerful reading.

C 467. Thoughts on Prayer: Its duty—its form—its subjects—its encouragements—its blessings. By Jonathan Greenleaf, Pastor of the Wallabout Presbyterian church of Brooklyn, New York. 12mo. pp. 156. Price 55 cents.

This is the work of a venerable man, whose ministry God has greatly honoured, and who husbands time, occasionally, to instruct a larger audience through the press, than can be addressed from the pulpit. The volume will be found replete with rich attractions and instructions, for the spiritually-minded Christian.

M 468. An Exposition of the Epistle of Saint Paul to the Philippians. By the Rev. Jean Daille, Minister of the French Reformed Church at Charenton, A. D., 1639. Translated from the French by the Rev. James Sherman, Minister of Surrey Chapel, London. Octavo, pp. 479. Price \$1.15.

This is the republication of a work by the eminent author of "The Use of the Fathers," (already republished by the Board.) and of several other learned volumes. It has heretofore been known to a very limited extent in this country, but will, now that it has been reproduced by the Board, be found to be a volume of very great value and usefulness. Its clear and impressive exhibitions of divine truth cannot be too highly commended both to the clergy and laity. It will, however be especially invaluable as an addition to the Minister's Library.

M 469. An Exposition of the Epistle of Saint Paul to the Colossians. By the Rev. Jean Daillé, Minister of the French Reformed Church at Charenton, A. D. 1639. Translated from the French, by F. S. Revised and corrected by the Rev. James Sherman, Minister of Surrey Chapel, London. Octavo pp. 696. Price \$1.50.

Sound, lively, faithful, earnest, and affectionate, Mr. Daillé was eminently fitted to be the expositor of the Pauline epistles. There is, in his work, a rich vein of the purest evangelical doctrine, exhibited with all the fervour of eloquence which was so prominent a characteristic of the author. We here see the most decided Calvinistic doctrines in union—as they are ever found when received by a true faith—with the highest morality. Its definitions of terms are clear, its reasonings close, its defence of the truth strong, and its unction of Christ sweet and refreshing.

S 470. Lucy Dunlevy, a sketch from real life. By S. S. Egliseau, author of "Lizzie Ferguson," and "Gleanings from Real Life." Square 16mo. pp. 156. Price 30 and 35 cents.

An interesting volume for juvenile readers. The book is wrought from the simple records of the life of a lovely child, nurtured with tender care, and repaying affection with overflowing affection again, but called to fill an early grave. The author of this volume holds the pen of a graceful and very pleasing writer, and is so using her gifts as to make them a source of blessing to thousands of youthful readers. This book contains many valuable lessons for the young, skilfully interwoven with the simple thread of the biography.

Two more small volumes for the instruction of children in the ways of truth and piety.

C 473. Memoir and Select Remains of the Rev. John Brown, Minister of the Gospel, Haddington. Edited by the Rev. Wm. Brown, M. D. 12mo. pp. 227. Price 40 cents.

The name of John Brown of Haddington is a bousehold word in the evangelical family. As a zealous preacher, an able expositor of Scripture, a faithful teacher, and a man of God, the world has not often seen his equal. This volume, prepared by one of his sons, gives an interesting sketch of his character, and a useful selection of his writings.

S 474. Tales in Rhyme for Girls. By Old Humphrey. 18mo. pp. 119, with many engravings. Price 20 and 25 cents.

Here is a volume for our young friends, which contains both "rhyme" and "reason."

- S 475. Annie Lee, a story illustrating the first petition of the Lord's Prayer, "Hallowed be thy name." 18mo. pp. 92. Price 15 and 20 cents.
- S 476. Blind Ruth: or, How may I do good? Illustrating the second petition of the Lord's Prayer. 18mo. pp. 100. Price 15 and 20 cents.

S 481. Peace in Death, exemplified in Youthful Believers. By the author of "Little Kadore." 18mo. pp. 60; with an engraving. Price 15 cents.

This little volume contains an account of four pious children who loved the Saviour, and found him to be a very present help in the time of trouble. It is written in a simple, engaging style, and is not a book to make one sad, but rather sheds a cheerful light on a subject not naturally attractive.

S 482. Seenes in Chusan or Missionary Labours by the Way. 18mo. pp. 246; with three spirited engravings. Price 30 and 35 cents.

Those who have read "Learn to say No." (and those who have not, have a treat in reserve,) will be glad to have another book from the same pen. In the present work, the author gives a series of sketches of scenes and characters, with which he was conversant, during his residence in Chusan, chiefly among the British officers and soldiers stationed at that post.

S 483. The best Lesson, and the best Time to Learn it. By a Presbyterian Minister. 18mo. pp. 117; with an engraving. Price 20 and 25 cents.

This book is a series of familiar conversations between Mr. and Mrs. James and their children, on subjects of the highest importance, interspersed with interesting narratives. "The best lesson" is the fear of the Lord, and "the best time to learn it" is childhood. The form into which it is cast, avoids that dry, didactic method, which rather revolts than attracts children. It is from the pen of a gentleman who takes a deep interest in the cause of the preparation of young men for the gospel ministry.

S 484. Lena Leslie, or the History of an Orphan. By a lady of Kentucky. 18mo. pp. 108; with an engraving. Price 20 and 25 cents.

This is a tale of touching interest, and can hardly be read without stirring up the fountains of feeling within. The scene is in the South.

M 485. The Marrow of Modern Divinity. In two parts. Part I.

The Covenant of Works, and the Covenant of Grace. Part II. An Exposition
of the Ten Commandments. By Edward Fisher, A. M. With Notes, by the
Rev. Thomas Boston, Minister of the Gospel, Ettrick. 12mo. pp. 370. Price
80 cents.

This is an old book, which has been reproduced by the Presbyterian Board. It is through discussion of the great doctrines of salvation, as opposed to Antinomianism on the one hand, and Arminianism on the other, and is withal eminently practical. The notes of Boston are an invaluable addition to it, illustrating and defending the views of the author.

S 486. The Stevenson Family; or Lessons on the Beatitudes. Written for the Board. 18mo. pp. 144. Price 20 and 25 cents.

These are familiar fireside conversations on a very important and interesting portion of divine truth. Did parents more generally thus fulfil the divine injunction, "Thou shalt talk of these words when thou sittest in thine house," how much more frequent would be the instances of intelligent piety among the children of Christian households!

C 487. Christ in the Desert; or. The Tempter Foiled. By the Rev. Henry Moore Parsons. 18mo, pp. 129. Price 20 and 25 cents.

This little volume contains, as its title indicates, an exposition of our Saviour's temptation in the wilderness. It will be found sound in doctrine, evangelical in spirit, and every way well adapted both to enlighten and excite pious emotions in the reader. The theme is in itself deeply interesting, and it is handled in a clear and convincing manner. It will be found well worthy of perusal.

C 488. The Sailor's Companion; Or, A Book of Devotions for Seamen in Public and Private. 12mo. pp. 263. Price 50 cents.

This work is adapted to render a much needed aid to pious shipmasters and others who attempt to conduct religious services at sea. It contains, 1. Two brief forms of service on ship board on the Lord's day, and a service for funerals. 2. Eighteen selections of Scripture suitable for use in said services. 3. Thirteen short practical discourses for the same purpose. 4. A second part for more private uses, containing a scripture answer to the inquiry, What is religion? brief expositions, prayers for various occasions, and friendly advices to sailors.

C 489. Scripture Baptism, its Mode and Subjects. By Ashbel G. Fairchild, D. D. Author of "The Great Supper." 18mo. pp. 204. Price 25 and 30 cents.

This little volume contains a lucid, foreible, and popular argument on both branches of the Baptist controversy. Without making any parade of learning, the fruits of ample study, as well as of careful thought, are brought to bear upon the theme. The book will make itself felt wherever works of this description are needed.

C 490. The Efficacy of Prayer. By the Rev. John C. Young, D. D., late President of Centre College, Danville, Kentucky. 18mo. pp. 63. Price 15 cents.

The wide-spread reputation of President Young, his recent decease, and the warm affection entertained by multitudes for his memory, will combine with its intrinsic value to make this treatise on "the Efficacy of Prayer" acceptable to the whole church.

S 491. The Great Reformer; or, Sketches of the Life of Luther. By the Author of "The Claremont Tales." 18mo. pp. 117. Price 20 and 25 cents.

This little volume is chiefly drawn from D'Aubigné's History of the Reformation. It is a very readable and instructive outline of Luther's life, and is well adapted to attract and inform juvenile readers. It is designed as an addition to the Board's Sabbath-school Library.

- S 492. Grains of Gold, suited to enrich Youthful Minds. 18mo, pp. 260. Price 30 and 35 cents. With engravings.
- S 493. Pictures of Truth, portrayed in Pleasing Colours. 18mo. pp. 264. Price 30 and 35 cents. With engravings.

These two books are compilations made for the Board, containing some of the choicest narratives to be found in our religious periodical literature. They will be found highly attractive to the young.

C 494. Not a Minute to Spare. By S. C. 18mo. pp. 104. Price 15 and 20 cents.

This is a very simple but useful collection of thoughts and incidents, showing how we may and ought to have many minutes to spare to attend to the interests of our own souls, and to work for Jesus. We commend it to those who are so absorbed in worldly things, or so wrapped up in their own selfishness, that they rob God, their fellow-men, and their own souls, and have neither time nor inclination to subserve the great end of their being.

S 495. Talks about Jesus. 18mo. pp. 67. Price 15 cents.

A good, simple, evangelical book for children, setting before them the lovely character of the Saviour as a Pattern, in his meckness, obedience, love, self-denial, diligence, readiness to forgive, and in his life of prayer. It is suited to the capacity of very young children.

C 496. The Valley of Achor; or, Hope in Trouble, and The Cross Providences of God ordered in Wisdom and Love. By the Rev. S. S. Sheddan. 18mo. pp. 50. Price 15 cents.

These treatises will be found well adapted to excite the graces of faith, submission, hope, and love towards God, in every reader, especially in those who are called to suffer under the smitings of their heavenly Father's hand.

S 497. Little Bob True, the Driver Boy. By the author of "Stories on the Petitions of the Lord's Prayer." 18mo. pp. 252. Price 30 and 35 cents. With engravings.

This is a valuable addition to the Sabbath-school Library, from the pen of a lady who has already made valuable contributions to this class of religious literature. It is the history of a canal boy, showing how a poor, destitute orphan can be happy himself, and do good to others when under the influence of true religion.

C 498. Only Believe; or, The Sure Way of Peace. By the Rev. Alfred Hamilton, D. D. 18mo. pp. 50. Price 15 cents.

A brief, lucid, and scriptural exhibition of just what a sinner is called on to do, who desires to secure his peace with God. It is prepared by a pastor who has felt the need of such a little tract to put into the hands of inquiring souls. If pastors, and laymen too, would distribute this tract widely, it could not fail, by the blessing of the Holy Spirit, to lead many precious souls to the possession of peace in Jesus Christ.

S 499. Bridget Sullivan; or the Cup without a handle. 18mo. pp. 80. Price 15 and 20 cents.

This is a story of Ireland, in the days of the famine, and of the workings of the Bible. It is interesting, and will be a welcome book in the Sabbath-school library.

S 500. The Highland Glen; or Plenty and Famine. Founded on Facts. By Matilda Wrench. 18mo. pp. 54. Price 15 cents.

A story of thrilling interest, showing how faith can sustain the soul, even under such fearful privations and sufferings as those which attended the famine of 1847, in the Western Highlands of Argyleshire in Scotland. It is well adapted to excite a feeling of compassion for the needy, and to lead to the exercise of self-denial for their relief.

- S 501. Fanny the Flower Girl; or Honesty Rewarded. By Selina Bunbury. 18mo. pp. 48. Price 15 cents.
- S 502. Ragged Tommy; or the Boy and the Bishop. 18mo. pp. 36. Price 10 cents.

These are valuable additions to our Sabbath-school literature, exhibiting in attractive narratives, the value of religion to the young.

S 503. How to Die Happy. Written for the Board of Publication. By the author of "Learn to say No," and "Scenes in Chusan." 18mo. pp. 101. Price 15 and 20 cents.

This little book, although written in a sprightly and most attractive style, treats of one of the most solemn and important topics which can engage the attention of any reader. It was prepared with special reference to the young, but it has much that is full of good for the sick bed and the dying hour of any person. It is illustrated by several instances of holy living and triumphant dying in the faith and nope of the gospel.

S 504. Sketches for You. By S. S. Egliseau, author of "Lizzie Ferguson," "Gleanings from Real Life," and "Lucy Dunlevy." Square 16mo. pp. 232. Price 30 and 35 cents.

This is another delightful little volume from a pen which has before delighted the juvenile readers of the Board's books. In a collection of twenty-four well-told stories, a very neat and pleasant book is here provided. Each has a good moral, and the reading of such works will go far towards fostering a taste for reading in the minds of the young in our day. It is a good Sabbath-school and family book.

C 505. The Divine Life: A book of facts and histories. By the Rev. John Kennedy, M. A., F. R. G. S. 12mo. pp. 384. Price 65 cents.

This book is a valuable contribution to the religious literature of the church and of the times. It will speak to the heart of God's people as long as there is a true church on earth. Its principal topics are—the nature, origination, providential occasions, and true means of the Divine Life. It will be found rich in important suggestions to the believer. Each chapter is both illustrated and fortified with choice incidents from the lives of many eminent saints. No Christian will peruse it without intense interest, and no one should rise from its perusal without being wiser and better than before.

C 506. The Model Merchant; or Memoirs of Samuel Budgett, 12mo. pp. 187. Price 40 cents.

We can cordially commend this memoir of a most remarkable man to all our readers, and especially to those who are engaged in business. They will learn the secret of Mr. Budgett's rapid rise from comparative poverty to great wealth; and they will also see how a business man can and ought to carry his Christianity always with him, and exert an influence for good on all who come within the sphere of his influence. It has been abridged for the Board by Mrs. S. A. Myers, from the original Memoir, by the Rev. Wm. Arthur.

S 507. Pride; or Six Months at my Uncle's in New England. 18mo. pp. 80. Price 15 and 20 cents.

An excellent hook for the young; exhibiting the pains, the hatefulness, and the cure of pride. The narrative is interesting, and the style pleasing. It is worthy to be placed in every family, and in every Sabbath-school.

C 508. Ye will not come; or the Sinner without excuse. Written for the Board, by a Disabled Minister of Bethel. 18mo. pp. 36. Price 10 cents.

As the title indicates, this is an attempt to reach by the press those whom the author can no longer address from the pulpit, and to convince delaying sinners that if they do not come to Christ, the fault is their own. It is an earnest, pungent, but affectionate appeal.
