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### A Letter from the President...

Dear Alumni:

It is only now that I can share with you that in February 1995 I announced to the Trustees my intention to resign no later than June 1996. I remain humbled and grateful for their expression of support.

1 want to thank each of you personally for the contributions you have made over the years and continue to make to the College and to its growth. The interdependence of Brooklyn and Patchogue, Arts and Sciences and General Studies, is essential to the identity of St. Joseph's College, New York. Such success as we have had has been the product of collaborative effort.

Sheila Baird, as Chair of the Board of Trustees, will appoint a search committee including faculty and administration, which by the end of the process will recommend candidates to be presented to the full Board. Both education law and tradition vest the responsibility of appointing the President in the Board of Trustees. You should have every confidence that the Trustees will seek the person best able to lead the College into the future.

With this letter go my deepest gratitude for your support over the past twentyseven years and my prayers for each of you and for the College.

Since the '80s Connie has served on many boards

#### related to her field of art, including those of the Staten Island Symphony, the Snug Harbor Cultural Center, and the visual arts committee of the Newhouse Center for Contemporary Art. She has also served as vice president of the Staten Island Council on the Arts. During the Koch Administration she was a Staten Island representative to the Commission on the Status of Women of New York City, which was involved in developing educational materials for the Women in History Month celebration. Connie says, "It was my pleasure to speak to the schoolchildren on Staten Island and to encourage the young girls to be whatever they wanted to be — no profession was closed to them — they could soar to new heights. I tried to impart some of the confidence that was given to me by St. Ioseph's."

"St. Joseph's prepared us for a life of caring, love and commitment," says Connie. "I strongly believe that the education I received at Saint Joseph's was far superior to the education received by many today. Where today does the student have to conduct research for a thesis as we did at St. Joe's for our bachelor's degree? We were educated completely — mentally, spiritually, physically and socially. It was this education that provided me with the ability to research, educate and reach the community through lectures on art and the original print, which I conducted at the gallery and the public library. It was a hard climb but twenty years later we are still surviving as a small business — the backbone of the American work force."

Connie lives on Staten Island with her husband, Philip. She has two children, Philip James, 32, and Nicole, 29. She enjoys gardening, swimming, biking and walking the beach at their summer home in Westhampton. Her business keeps the whole family busy, and all spend a great deal of time together at work. Newport, where they are based, is the B&B capital of America, "and one of the prettiest places I've seen," Barbara says. The business was established in 1984, and the Wakefields purchased it in 1990. Since then they have expanded their territory to include New England and Great Britain. In January, their first licensed reservation service, owned by Barbara's cousins, will open in Phoenix. They plan to expand throughout the United States.

"The B&B business is usually a family affair, and we are no exception," says Barbara, whose daughter, Amanda Wakefield Carson, also works in the business. "It's a great life, hectic and intense, certainly never dull. We are on the telephones 12 hours a day, seven days a week, taking reservations from people all over the world."

At SJC, Barbara was a member of Chapel Players and the yearbook. She says, "The education I received at SJC continues to influence my life and my work. Standards were high. My faith was strengthened and my knowledge of Catholicism deepened. Because SJC was a small college, there was always a comfortable feeling of belonging. My years at SJC gave me confidence to take over a struggling business and transform it from the third-largest reservation service in Rhode Island to the largest reservation service in New England."

She recalls, "A few of us out-of-state students shared an apartment on Clinton Avenue, and once in awhile S. Joan de Lourdes and S. Virginia Therese would drop in for a visit. Life was good, we had happy times, and New York was a wonderful campus. So I have fond memories of my years at St. Joseph's College for Women, as it was then. It was an extraordinary and brilliant group of women who taught me and opened my mind — S. Joan de Lourdes, who always was able to inspire me with het vibrant method of teaching history; S. Teresa Marie, who gave me a fine appreciation for English literature which is still with me; the intelligence and elegance of S. Joseph Damien, S. Virginia Therese, and S. Joseph Immaculate. I thoroughly enjoyed my years at SJC, and I am grateful for that happy and rewarding time."

### Excerpts from S. Mary Florence Burns' Speech at S. Irene Veronica Van Westering's Retirement Party

S. Irenc came to SJC in 1950 as Assistant Registrar. Among her responsibilities was keeping attendance records. (We are talking about the wonderful days when students were required to attend class and when faculty were required to turn in daily attendance reports.) S. Irene early on became famous for the diligence with which she pursued those records and the consummate diligence with which she pursued faculty members who failed to deposit them.

The Assistant Registrar was also responsible for Admissions, and in that tole, and later, as Director of Admissions, S. Irene demonstrated how student-centered she was. Her



tion to the men's basketball team as chief booster was perfectly natural. In these last years, when it became

later devo-

necessary to satisfy federal regulations, she accepted the responsibility of Compliance Officer. We knew that she stood for due diligence long before the Federal Government invented the term.

Throughout her career, however, she has remained student-centered, a people person. When word of her retirement spread, a number of faculty and staff spoke openly of their varied associations with S. Irene, and wanted to let her know how much they love her.

So today's reception has grown into

> a real party, in which a number of people have asked to express special appreciation for S. Irene. After all, she is the only person who has ever retired from St. Joseph's College at the age of 92.

About her interest in the students. When I was still the Dean and involved with decisions about keeping or dismissing students with academic problems, S. Irene spoke to me at the end of a semester about one of her boys — that means one of the basketball players. I told her he had done poorly again and I really felt we would have to let him go. S. Irene looked at me and spoke clearly and firmly. "Sister Mary Florence, I want you to pray to our Blessed Mother. She will tell you what to do. And she will tell you that Jim is a wonderful boy and that you should keep him." In fact, somehow, we kept him and his story had a happy ending. And I do not doubt that S. Irene deserves the credit. t's tough and somewhat humbling to prepare to write about integrity. Especially if you are of a certain brooding, frish temperament, you wonder about that one slightly exaggerated deduction on your income tax return; you recall that seriously overdue library book; you wince at the memory of every promise not 100% fulfilled — "Trust me, kids, we'll positively go to Great Adventure next week."

Listen to the language we often use to describe integrity. "She doesn't just talk the talk, she walks the walk." "He's a man of his word." "She practices what she preaches." "With him, what you see is what you get; it all hangs together." But what makes it all hang together for such persons? assumed I was insulated.

If money might let you down and shrink your soul, there's always the pursuit of power and influence. Yet these leave us even more vulnerable, subject to the whim of the electorate, the board of directors, the stockholders, the party bosses: "What have you done for us lately?"

Disappointed by power? Then perhaps we should just strive to be happy. That sounds simple enough, right? But such a frontal assault on happiness is paradoxically likely to fail. Eastern thinkers have known this for millennia. More recently, Mihaly Csikszentmihalyi, a psychologist at the University of Chicago, has devoted his career to the study of what he calls the conditions of optimal experience. "You cannot reach happiness by conmeaning as simplistic, primitive, a vestige of unsatisfied infantile longings. I urge you to challenge such glib skepticism. A truly spiritual life is no cop-out — in fact, such a commitment will demand much of you. Some days, indeed, you'll wish you hadn't signed on.

I close with the words of someone whose credibility along these lines eclipses my own, Sr. Ita Ford, one of the Maryknoll nuns murdered by right-wing Salvadoran forces back in December, 1980. You may not agree with her politics or her theology but no fair-minded person can doubt that she gave herself over to a matter of transcendent and ultimate concern. She wrote this advice to her 16-year-old niece three months before her own martyrdom:

# INTEGRITY

By Paul F. Ginnetty, Ph.D.

The illustrious Protestant theologian Paul Tillich proposes that there is an inborn, constitutional hunger to discover and commit to a "matter of ultimate concern," something that grounds one in a reality bigger, older and more enduring than one's own ego and transient pursuits. The question becomes how imaginative, courageous and open we are in that quest. Do we search until we find something worthy of our devotion? Or do we settle for something lesser which, while it does for the moment organize our daily strivings, leaves us less than who we might have become?

For some folks, it's money. And there's a lot of support for that approach. "The one who dies with the most toys wins." "I've got mine." So what if the perfect little life 1 put together is really a house of cards that can all be ended by the futures market crash, one well-placed aneurism, or, as was dramatized in a striking way some years ago in the movie Grand Canyon, by one wrong turn off the freeway which lands me and my luxury automobile in the midst of that violent "have-not" world against which I sciously searching for it," he writes. "It is by being fully involved with every detail of our lives, whether good or bad, that we find happiness, not by trying to look

for it directly." Integrity, then, is the by-product of the surrender to some overarching locus of meaning and purpose. For many, it entails some form of service, wherein my welfare is inextricably caught up with that of the poorest, the least empowered, the least educated or healthy of my fellow beings. For others the focus may be on pushing back the boundaries of ignorance, for learning's own sake as well as for the sake of others, including those you'll never meet, even people not yet born.

So let that quest for ultimate meaning take you where it will, trusting that integrity will follow. And do not be embarrassed if that process should lead you into the domain of the spiritual and even the religious.

I say "embarrassed" because some may see your search for a sacred source of "I hope you come to find that which gives life a deep meaning for you. Something worth living for — maybe even worth dying for, something that energizes you, enthuses you, enables you to keep moving ahead. I can't tell you what it might be — that's for you to find, to choose, to love. I can just encourage you to start looking and support you in the search."



tion? Well, we found out why when we took the research seminar class and had to write that huge paper and give the twenty-minute presentation. When it was over, we could see the sense of accomplishment on everyone's face.

Many of us entered the realm of the unknown when we entered the computer room. How do you turn this thing on? How come when 1 press enter nothing happens? ### Briefly describe what life at St. Joseph's was like when you were there?

When I was at St. Joseph's College, from 1924 to 1928, we were all girls, somewhat unsophisticated, with a charming air of innocence. We lived in what had been a spacious, luxurious home. Our gym class was held in the parlor, which had white woodwork and embossed velvet walls. Other classes were held in the former bedrooms.

The faculty consisted of friendly nuns from St. Joseph's, a few priests, and professors from neighboring colleges who taught music, health, speech, and other specialties.

#### Why did you choose to attend St. Joseph's?

My parents had chosen St. Joseph's College. It was the only local Catholic College. Also, my mother had been educated by the Sisters of St. Joseph, and she wanted me to have the same experience.

#### What did the majority of students study?

The majority of students of '28 took the liberal arts courses — there were few opportunities for women, and many thought a general education would serve them best. Later they majored in education to prepare for teaching, or science to prepare for nursing. The actuality was that three students entered the convent, one received her engagement before graduation and was married soon after. Most of the class prepared for teaching. The Depression started in 1929 so pertinent preparation seemed lost. However, all had high hopes that a St. \_oseph's girl was well equipped to help create a better world.

#### What was St. Joseph's greatest strength?

St. Joseph's greatest strength was in the college spirit of the early students who realized they were laying the foundation of an important institution. They supported to their best the high scholastic and moral standards set by the administration and showed their appreciation of the sound religious education.

# How well did the College prepare you what you did in life?

My education at St. Joseph's College for Women gave me a sound foundation for the examinations of the New York Board of Education, the courage to persevere in a long and difficult journey through a somewhat biased educational system, and the faith that God would see me through the worries of World War II.

#### What is your fondest memory of St. Joseph's?

My fondest memories at St. Joseph's College are of social life and extracurricular activitics. My dearest friends are those I made at the College. The time I spent with them in their homes and their summer cottages enriched my life and memories.

# What did most of your classmates do after graduation?

After graduation, members of '28 sought positions as teachers. Others found positions as salesgirls in large department stores, small shops, even the post office. Some married shortly after graduation and became involved in the



business of being wives and mothers. The New York Telephone Company provided several positions. The salesgirls became heads of departments, or buyers, even foreign buyers. The telephone girls became executives in the New York Telephone Company. One graduate became a postmaster on Long Island, some became managers of small shops. Those who matried became admirable wives and mothers.

Teaching was the most common career pursued by the graduates of 1928. I secured a position at Erasmus Hall High School in Brooklyn and was off to a most successful and satisfying future. I continued to receive assignments until the regular examination was given for men and women in New York City High School. When I had passed that I was appointed (after waiting seven years for the City of New York to amass enough money to pay regular teachers) to Andrew Jackson High School in Cambria Heights, where I remained until I retired.

In the meantime I had acquired my M.A. in public law from Columbia University and completed the course work for the Ph.D. in history. I was too busy to write my thesis and thus never did obtain the actual Ph.D. degree. However, I did receive an Mrs. when I was married to Theodore Amery and was thereby endowed with the rights and privileges of having two fine sons and five devoted grandchildren.

# Describe the typical St. Joseph's student; their goals, ambitions, etc.

The typical student of 1928 was modest, ambitious, right-living, a Catholic girl with hopes of finding a place in a society where wisdom, integrity and courage would help her to pursue a useful and happy future. With the help of St. Joseph's College, most of '28 acquired these attributes and achieved their goals.

### Who made the greatest impression on you while at St. Joseph's?

The teacher at St. Joseph's who made a great impression on me was Sister Gerardus, head of the history department; she made me realize that history was not a series of names, dates, and events, but a living account of all that man has ever done, thought, heard, and dreamed. Good men make good history.

Similarly, my history at St. Joseph' is not merely a series of names, dates, and events but rather lasting memories of life-long friendships, dedicated educators and special times.

#### Briefly describe life at St. Joseph's College.



Every student who passes through her classroom leaves with a clear understanding of the assignment, the tools needed to do the job and finally, an enthusiasm to get things done.

Several years ago, the teacher recognized an exceptional student. She nurtured that student and developed in her all the skills she would need to accomplish great things. Today, the student has learned her lessons well. As Sister Elizabeth Hill prepares to assume the duties of the Presidency, we thank Sister George for many things, but especially for taking the time to TEACH.

She and her fiance, John Fortier, then went to Nova Scotia to take part in the development of the Fortress of Louisbourg National

Historical Park, an 18th-century French site at Cape Breton Island. They were married in 1965 and remained with the park till 1983. # A Ministry in Brazil

My first assignment when I arrived in midwestern Brazil thirty years ago this

June was to set up a training center for adults in the diocese of Jatai, which had three parishes and two priests in an area the size of New York State. It was a success from the start, with meetings and courses to develop the people of the diocese not only in the first rudiments of our faith, but also in the art of living. One of the most popular courses was "Human Relations at Work and in the Family."

We eventually established five such centers, while I worked on my second assign-

ment—setting up day nurseries, two full-time and two half-time. But my greatest challenge has been running the diocesan Children's Pastoral Program, originally suggested by UNICEF to the Conferencia Nacional dos Bispos do Brasil (CNBB) as a way to combat the high mortality rate among children up to six years old caused by malnutrition. This condition was chronic among poor people living on the periphery of the cities. The program focused on pregnant women as well.

This well planned, well run program, relying on a veritable army of 800 volunteers, has produced incredible changes. The diocesan coordinator travels throughout the diocese with her team of specialists not only to conduct training, but also to listen and answer questions on health, nutrition, child rearing and other subjects.


In the diocese of Jatai, there are now 25 parishes, 26 priests, 50 religious sisters and more than 100 chapels/community centers in strategic locations.

Twenty-two of the 25 parishes have firmly implemented the Children's Pastoral Program. Every diocese in this vast country, which is a continent within a continent, now has the Pastoral de Crianca, as it is called in Portuguese. It has transformed the lives of trainers as well as trainees, providing hope for the new millennium.

And yes, all of the cities are now connected by paved toads and buses, and we have e-mail and the internet, fax machines, cellular phones, a

TV station, and a diocesan radio station.

The Bishop, Benedict Dominic Coscia, OFM, is my brother. Last December 12 he celebrated 35 years in this post in the Cathedral of the Holy Spirit, which was consecrated three years ago by the Papal Nuncio to Brazil.



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# Sister Mary Francis Flinn '21

## Oldest Living SJC Alumna

On our recent trip to Asia, we spent a happy afternoon with Sr. Mary Francis Flinn, RGS (Eva M. Flinn '21) at the MaryCove Centre in Hong Kong. She is 96, the oldest living SJC alumna.

Sr. Francis came from a religious family, with her brother a priest and her sister a nun. She joined the Good Shepherd sisters in 1923, an order committed to the unique worth of each girl assigned to their care, an unswerving principle of the founder, Sr. Mary Euphrasia Pelletier. The girls are assigned by the courts, and their anti-social behavior can present enormous challenges.



Sister talked of her years at St. Joseph's. Her teacher, Bishop Molloy, was highly pleased when she announced her decision to enter the Good Shepherd community. Another teacher and spiritual advisor was Father Dillon. She has traveled widely in Asia, coming to know Manila in the Philippines and Shanghai as well as Hong Kong, When the Communists took over in Shanghai in 1949, they placed Sister under house arrest, later releasing her and

sending her to Hong Kong, where she became a Superior. The house where she now lives was built under her supervision.

Sister has a keen sense of humor and her memory is sharp. With the takeover of Hong Kong by the People's Republic of China this July 1, there is uncertainty about the future role of the Sisters. "We hope and pray for the best," she says.

# Living Memorial Honors Monsignor Richard Ferris

The SJC community lost a dear friend when Msgr. Richard Ferris went home to his Lord and Savior on April 26, 1996. He served the College from 1965 to 1992, touching countless lives.

After many years of scholarship and teaching,

Father Ferris in 1989 became pastor of St. Genevieve's Church on the Rockaway peninsula. He thoroughly enjoyed his seven years in this tiny parish, where he also helped Bishop Thomas Daily with many diocesan projects, especially the daunting task of overhauling the Diaconate Program. He developed and became dean of a four-year program enabling both English and Spanishspeaking candidates to serve the church.

It is no wonder that Bishop Daily made Father Ferris a Monsignor. Regrettably, Monsignor Ferris was able to enjoy this honor for only four months. "We live to die," he once wrote. "We die to live—eternally. Death is not the end. It is the beginning of a new life that will never end. The separation from our loved ones is temporary. With God's help, one day we will be united forever, in heaven."

Comforting as these words are, I have still had difficulty accepting the fact that such a caring person is gone. After reflecting, I decided to open a crisis pregnancy center in honor of my professor, confessor, and friend, who was a holy, passionately pro-life priest. The Monsignor Ferris

Life Center, which was blessed by Bishop Ignatius Catanello, is located at 204 Beach 116th Street in Rockaway Park, Queens. It serves women of all faiths, giving them a chance to choose life when confronted with an unplanned pregnancy. The center is staffed by trained volunteers and operates with the help of private donations. It is not subsidized by the Catholic Church.

A fundraiser in the form of a dinner dance will be held on October 4, 1997 at St. Camillus Church in Rockaway. A journal with ads will be part of the fundraising effort. If you are interested in either kind of contribution, please call the center at (718) 634-BABY.

Sister George came to St. Joseph's College in 1946 and taught sociology and anthropology. She became a full professor in 1964 and Chair of the Social Sciences department in 1966 and then in

1969 became president of St. Joseph's College.

Sister George made it her goal to make changes while preserving the College's richest and most meaningful traditions. Two major decisions were made in the early 1970's-to reach out to underserved populations: the move to Suffolk County and the establishment of the Division of General Studies to serve an adult population.

# **PROFILES**

## AGNES MAHER CARR '51

As Eastern Regional Public Relations Manager at Digital Equipment Corporation in Manhattan, Agnes oversees myriad public relations activities-generating press releases and articles, interviewing executives for stories on significant wins in the acting region, as Digital's spokesperson at events; conducting press training for regional executives; and working with chambers of com-

merce and community organizations to heighten Digital's visibility.

Agnes' first position after college was with General Foods in New York, where she was an administrative assistant to the public relations director. When her boss became director of the Republican Party's "I Like Ike" campaign to bring General Eisenhower home from NATO to run for president, Agnes was promoted to executive assistant. She traveled to Eisenhower's hometown of Abilene, Kansas to inaugurate the successful

campaign; then, with Citizens for Eisenhower, she worked in New York and Chicago until the election. "Two historic events occurred," she recalls,

Agnes continued to work in public relations, assisting with the "Keep America Beautiful" campaign. She then returned to school, earning her MBA in 1957 from New York University's Graduate School of Business and her teaching degree in 1958. Agnes taught English and business in high schools for eight years, returning to New York to work for the American Bar Association as a public relations research member of the Commission on Malpractice, a group of a dozen insurance, medical and legal executives from across the country.

She experienced the deep satisfaction of knowing that the customer was pleased with the outcome of their work together.

Fran helps customers choose paper, type styles, ink color, and sometimes logos. She orders paper, discusses possible printing problems and makes certain that the job meets the deadline. She also creates master copies which the printer will use.

The shop prints directories and, at the end of the school year, literary books for most of the schools in Ridgefield as well as one in Wilton and one in New Canaan, which won a national award.

Fran has always believed that she can be successful at anything she attempts. Her faith in her ability was nurtured by her parents and reinforced by her SJC education, which convinced her that if she was willing to give a project her full attention, God would give her the talent to see it to a successful conclusion.

#### DEIDRE KETCHUM JERSEY '84S

Deidre is the owner of Public Images II and Meeting Details in Raleigh, NC. Her responsibilities include management, marketing and client services for the public relations and marketing communications company, which includes a meeting and events management division.

Deidre's interest in publicity and media was evident at the age of 12, when she promoted

church youth group activities. In high school, she served as publicist for the drama club and for several community groups. When her children entered school full-time, a friend suggested she take some courses at Suffolk Community College. After two years of evening classes, she enrolled full-time and transferred to SJC upon graduation.

During this time, she had been working for the Port Jefferson Record as a features reporter and theater critic. A group of local restaurant owners approached her to promote their first annual Bartender's Ball in 1981. One of them suggested that she open her own business, and the idea incubated while she completed her English thesis on Hawthorne's "Scarlet Letter." In February 1985, she opened Public Images in Rocky Point.

The company grew, serving educational and environmental organizations and the hospitality industry. She and her staff kept their clients in the news, developed collateral materials and newsletters, conducted communication audits, planned special events and provided community relations services.

In 1991, New York Telephone offered Deidre's husband early retirement. He yearned to move south so, after some tears, Deidre sold the business to a local advertising agency and in 1994, moved to North Carolina. Her one business contact in Raleigh asked her to organize a national convention for women business owners; at the same time, she ran to be a North Carolina delegate to the 1995 White House Conference on Small Business. She earned one of 28 seats by inviting delegates to "Send a Smart Cookie to Washington," enticing them with chocolate chip cookies.

When the delegates returned to North Carolina and presented the findings of their Washington conference to Governor James B. Hunt, Jr., he asked them to do for the state what they had done in Washington. The group, formally organized as the North Carolina Delegation for Small Business, with Deidre as its vice president, held a conference in April 1997. The delegation is now working with other business advocacy groups to see legislation passed on various issues.

Deidre has a particular interest in procurement, and since the White House conference, has been one of 13 small business owners to provide advice to the Executive Branch's Office of Federal Procurement Policy. Her companies, Public Images and Meeting Details, continue to promote small and medium-sized businesses, although Deidre's goal is to earn outsourced work from Fortune 500 companies.

Deidre is active with the National Association for Women Business Owners, and has served as president of the Long Island and North Carolina chapters. In 1990, the Small Business Administration named her Women in Business Advocate for the Long Island region. In 1992, the Town of Brookhaven named her Woman of the Year in Business in recognition for her leadership of the town's Small Business Advisory Council.

Deidre and her husband, Ira, recently celebrated their 32nd wedding anniversary. They enjoy visiting their two sons. Ira, Jr., 27, and his wife, Hilary, reside in Berwyn, PA. Ira, Jr. works for Vanguard and Hilary directs a literacy program at the

Besides work, volunteering, and getting to know her "new country," there hasn't been much time for hobbies this year. Southern friends introduced her to the art form of quilting and Deidre takes classes and has completed six quilts (mostly by machine), from wall hangings to king-size. She sews from 9 p.m. to midnight, and says the diversion of quilting eliminates a lot of stress, as does her early-morning ladies' exercise group.

While at SJC, Deidre raised her children, and they made sure she did her homework. But she did take time to act in a production of "Vanities" directed by Sister Grace and produced in the Rathskeller, before the Clare Rose Theatre was donated. "It was great fun vamping around like a bad girl," she recalls.

"The best thing about SJC for me, besides friends and interesting educators, was the scholarship opportunity and thesis experience. Without the scholarship, I could not have selected SJC and might have had to go back to a part-time education. I greatly value the wisdom of people who contribute to the scholarship programs. As for the thesis — the research, critical thinking, analysis, organization, and presentation are all skills that I use regularly in my service to clients. # **General Studies Spotlight** John C. Cassillo '94

New York City police captain John C. Cassillo is executive officer of Transit District One at 59th Street and Columbus Circle in midtown Manhattan. In this role, he supervises

police coverage of the subways in midtown during special events; analyzes daily subway crime statistics and audits crime reporting; tracks complaints; schedules the lieutenants and sergeants who supervise both uniformed and undercover officers who work the subway; and over-

sees disciplinary procedures.

John Cassillo

John joined the Transit Police in July 1983, after four years as a sorter and driver for United Parcel Service. He graduated second in his class, and was assigned to subway patrol duty from 8 pm to 4 am, traveling underground through every borough of the city except Staten Island. He was soon assigned to plainclothes duty in Brooklyn, making undercover arrests on trains for robberies, assaults, drugs and, of course, fare evasion. He then moved to the surface crime unit, where he worked primarily in the South Bronx.

Four years out of the police academy, John was promoted to sergeant and assigned to Union Square, Manhattan; a year later he became a lieutenant and was named integrity control officer for a downtown Brooklyn command. He spent the next seven years in various administrative and patrol assignments. While serving in the East New York section of Brooklyn, he enrolled at St. loseph's.

On being promoted to captain in March 1995, John was assigned to Crown Heights, Brooklyn, as the executive officer. The following August, he entered the City University of New York School of Law in Queens, The school emphasizes public service and has produced prosecutors, legal aid counselors, politicians, law professors and public advocates. John is studying labor law, with a special interest in the application of the Americans with

Disabilities Act, the Family Leave Act. and the WARN Act. As a law school intern, John represents indigent victims of physical and psychological abuse. By graduation, intern in the Battered Women's Clinic will have worked on matters of custody, visitation, child support, divorce, uncontested

After graduation in May, John plans to prepare for the July bar exam. He hopes to integrate his law degree into his law enforcement career, and to teach at the college level.

John has been cited six times for exceptional, commendable and meritorious acts performed in the line of duty. He received the 1986 New York City Transit Police Columbia Association's Michael Melchiona Award for Valor in the Line of Duty, and the Staten Island Borough President's Award, presented to members of the civil service for acts of loyalty and duty to the community.

John has served as delegate to the Lieutenants' Benevolent Association. He is a member of the New York City Police Department Honor Legion; the 10-13 Association, which represents retired civil servants; and the Badge and Gavel Society, an organization of New York State law enforcement personnel who hold advanced degrees in law.

John has been married for 15 years to Lorraine Moffitt Cassillo. They have three children, John Christopher, 10, Matthew Franklin, 8, and Lindsay Mariah, 2. They live in Deer Park in

Suffolk County, NY. John coaches football in the Suffolk County Police Athletic League and is a regular visitor to the St. Joseph's Athletic Center at the Patchogue Campus.

John writes, "In addition to the skills and knowledge people who work for you have, they also have personal baggage (problems). If you don't learn to manage people's baggage, it will affect their job performance and prove costly to the organization in the long run.

I must admit that the first time I heard this I was not in agreement. It was only after a semester of labor economics that I began to see the real cost of recruiting, testing, training, and keeping an employee. Even in civil service where the majority of applicants come to the municipality unskilled, once the investment is made in applicant screening, and then academy training, it is in the City's financial interest to help officers manage personal problems that may interfere with job performance. But even more than the financial interest, the employer has a duty to be benevolent toward its employees because the employees have, exhibited lovalty to the employer.

One of my duties with the police department is to evaluate disciplinary action taken against officers. I not only review the punishment to ensure it fits the act, but also to ensure that the misconduct is not a symptom of a personal problem. I never hesitate to make a referral to an appropriate resource, because in doing so, I am helping both the officer and the department.

Education comes to us in many forms. Sometimes we find it when we are not looking for it. At St. Joseph's I learned a great deal about many things. But the biggest lesson was that the students sitting to my left and right were full of experience and knowledge, and that the teacher was only there as a prompter to release those experiences so we, the class, could attach real-life situations to the theory of management. That's the uniqueness of St. Joseph's."

#### Excerpts from Sister Elizabeth A. Hill's Speech

The beautiful medallion which I have just received from Sister George is weighted with symbolism and heavy with meaning, but it is surely not a burden. It represents the continuity of a prized tradition, which has been handed down from one generation to the next and which today I pledge to safeguard and foster to the best of my ability.

As we look ahead, then, on this day marking another new beginning, we know that we are starting from a good place, and that we have much on which to build. At the same time, we also know that, as the world moves toward a new millennium, humankind is charging very rapidly into new territory, and that there are virtually no maps to help us navigate in this terra incognita. All of these social, political, and economic issues, and the technological developments which enable them to impact us so quickly, are challenging those of us in the academic world to examine everything we are doing. *continued on p. 15*

As a college, our work is to teach....to transform our students, to fire their imaginations and energies, to inspire them to change. In the words of James Freedman, President of Dartmouth College, we must provoke them with "powerful and transcendent ideas that will trouble them, elevate them, and brace them for new endeavors." By the time they leave us, our students should have had all their preexisting notions challenged, so that false assumptions and facile generations will have been set aside. They should have become true liberals, in that they are open and receptive to new realities, and free enough to embrace them. They should also be true conservatives - conscious of basic values and truths that must be preserved, protected and handed down. And they should have changed and grown and discovered new possibilities within themselves that they determine to develop throughout their lives.

...because we believe that education is the most powerful tool of personal liberation and development, we choose to be educators...Because we believe that education is not simple preparation for a career, but preparation for life, we choose to be educators.

...Because we believe, with Bacon, that all knowledge begins in wonder, and that the work of life is to grapple with the ambiguity of the moral universe and to ask searching questions about our very humanity, we choose to be educators.

I firmly believe that St. Joseph's College aspires and has the capacity to be a great institution of learning - great, not in size, but in excellence of our faculty, the quality of our programs, and the contributions our graduates make to the many professional and civic arenas in which they live and work. Today is not the day to set forth a specific agenda for the future. Instead, today, I call on each member of the College community to join me in working together to assure that potential is realized - to engage in the dialectic between the past and the future which will enable us to make wise decisions about the present.

# A Letter from the President

Dear Graduates:

As we celebrate the beginning of another new year, I am writing to wish you and your family God's choicest blessings, especially good health, peace and prosperity, not only in 1998, but for many years to come. I am also happy to have the opportunity to bring you up-to-date on some of the things we are doing at St. Joseph's.

The time since July 1st has certainly flown, and I find it difficult to believe I am already half-way through my first year as President. We have all been very busy, with activities ranging from intensive preparation for the upcoming accreditation visit from the Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools, which is scheduled for March 1-4, 1998, to extensive research into the multifaceted field of high technology. Faculty and administrators alike are working to upgrade our computer systems both for academic and administrative purposes, and we are exploring issues such as the utilization of video-conferencing and distance learning, as well as multi-media in the classroom. As you know, this field is changing from moment to moment, so it is important to have a clear sense of direction, with enough flexibility to adapt to new developments. To that end, we are developing a Master Technology Plan which, hopefully, will guide us into the 21st century. We are also seeking funds from foundations and corporations to assist in this vital, but formidable undertaking.

Another area we are exploring is strengthening the role of the fine and performing arts on both campuses. As a college with a liberal arts tradition, it is appropriate that the arts have a place of distinction and we have formed committees at both Brooklyn and Patchogue to help us create a climate of cultural awareness and appreciation in our students. It is our hope that, having had positive experiences of theatre, the ballet, orchestral and other forms of music, and many other art forms as well, that our students will graduate, enriched by a life-long love of the arts. We are also having conversations with a number of potential funding sources to assist us with this project.

I am happy to report that space has become a problem at both campuses, because enrollment is up. This means, of course, that we must try to find creative solutions to a lack of parking, and even classroom space, as well as faculty and administrative offices. We have been discussing a number of different approaches, and we will keep you posted as things develop.

And last but by no means least, we are continuing to strengthen our academic offerings by increasing the number of full-time faculty, especially those with the doctorate or appropriate terminal degree. This has been a longstanding commitment, and we are now accelerating the process to assure that the tradition of academic excellence we have prized for 82 years will be carried forward into the next millennium.

Let me close by saying that I would love to know your reactions to the things I have written about here - or other ideas you might like to share with us. You are very much part of the College, and we are always happy to hear from you!





Elba Montalvo is the Executive Director and Co-founder of the Committee for Hispanic Children and Families Inc., now in its 15th year. The Committee has developed a four-pronged approach to address the needs of Latino families: community education, social services, professional training, and public policy.

Elba, former Director of the Hispanic Adoption Program and former chairperson of the Hispanic Task Force on Child Abuse and Neglect, has served on many boards and commissions. She is currently a member of the NYS Permanent Judicial Commission on Justice for Children and of the Board of Directors of Children of Bellevue Inc. Elba has been involved at the national level in policy and advocacy efforts in child welfare and child care. In December, Elba attended the White House Conference on Child Care. She has also been the recipent of many awards including the most recent, presented to her by Governor George Pataki on January 15th, the Martin Luther King, Jr. "Living the Dream" Award for her relentless commitment to the people of New York State. "My life is stressful, but very rich in experiences and good people," says Elba.

She is a founding member of the Caribbean Women's Health Association and of Community Action Project, a Brooklyn initiative to combat drugs and domestic and gang violence and bring community concerns to the proper authorities. She also works with the Community Affaits Department of the 67th Precinct. She is a member of 100 Women for Major Owens, and serves as second vice president of the Martin Luther King Commission for Youth. # **Executive Board Nominees**

#### Honorable Joan Carey '61

Joan is deputy chief administrative judge for the New York City courts, overseeing the operation of all state courts in Bronx, Kings, New York, Queens and Richmond counties. The courts, with a combined judiciary of nearly 600 judges, exercise both civil and criminal jurisdiction. Judge Carey also determines disciplinary matters and personnel requests for more than 6,000 non-judicial employees and monitors fiscal operations and budgets.

From 1968 to 1976, she was an assistant district attorney in Queens County. She then became special assistant attorney general for Brooklyn and Staten Island. In 1978, Mayor Edward I. Koch appointed her judge of the Criminal Court of the City of New York; a year later, she

rose to supervising judge of the Criminal Court. In 1983, Joan was named acting supreme court justice of the Supreme Court, Criminal Term, First Judicial District. Initially assigned to one of six "blockbuster" parts, she was responsible for a calendar of more than 600 felony matters, the resolution of all pre-trial issues and the supervision of six or more grand juries. In 1993, she became

administrative judge of the Supreme Court, Criminal Term, First Judicial District, overseeing the largest branch of the State Supreme Court, with an average of 17,000 filings annually. In January 1995, Joan was appointed administrative judge of the Criminal Court of the City of New York.

Since the early 70's, Joan has lectured widely and appeared on radio and television. She has served on several committees of the Association of the Bar of the City of New York, and is a member of the American Inns of Court; the National Association of Women Judges; the New York County Lawyers Association Inn of Court, where she has been program chair since its establishment in 1993; and the New York State Association of Women Judges, where she chaired a committee to draft legislation regarding domestic violence.

Joan has received many awards, including the Albert Conway Award of the St. Thomas More Pre-Law Society of St. Francis College; the St. Thomas à Becket Award of the Catholic Lawyers Guild, Kings County Chapter; Citizen Advocates for Justice; and the March 17th Society. In 1992 she was named Distinguished Mentor in the Field of Law by the Clairol Mentor Program.

Joan lives in New York City with her husband of ten years, Thomas V. Dana.

Barbara is an adjunct lecturer at Kingsborough Community College. She works for College Now, a collaborative effort that allows high school seniors to take college courses for credits that are transferable to the college of their choice.

S. Mary Winifred earned her bachelor's degree from St. Joseph's College for Women in 1939 and went on to Columbia to become a librarian. By 1947, she had received both a bachelor of library science and a master's degree, which in those days was the equivalent of a doctorate. Thus armed with the latest techniques and methods, Sister was prepared to be chief librarian, and later, when we had more than one library, director of libraries.

The real "jewel in the crown" of her professional life, is McEntegart Hall. Every aspect of that building's construction, futnishing, and maintenance came under her scruti-

AUDREY J. CONLEY Excerpts from S. Mary Florence Burns' Tribute March 9, 1998

In 1985, when St. Joseph's College began to look for someone to develop and lead a nursing program, we knew we needed an exceptional administrator, who could create a program single-handedly and do it on two campuses.

Audrey Conley was that exceptional person. She had taught college for ten years and served as dean of the College of Nursing at Downstate Medical Center, and then as dean at the University of Southern Maine. With vision, leadership, and commitment, she created SJC's nursing program, and brought it to NLN accreditation by 1991, the shortest time-frame possible. And the program has flourished.

Audrey was a colleague, in the best sense of the term. And the faculty responded by electing her to the Committee on Rank, Tenure, and Faculty Interests, the Agenda Committee and the Planning Committee. Sister George Aquin appointed her to the Dean Search Committee in 1996.

Throughout this year, Audrey continued to be actively



ny, and it is an enduring tribute to her today.

There is a another part of the S. Mary Winifred story, of course, for which I will use the name by which many in our community knew her— Winnie. You will have

noted that the gospel for today's liturgy was Matthew's version of the last judgment, which asks, "When did I see you hungry, thirsty, or naked, and feed you." Winnie believed in simple, direct, no-nonsense generosity. Quietly, with no expectation of notice or reward, she did feed the hungry, clothe the naked, visit the sick and comfort the dying. We will never know the extent of her charity but if our good deeds go before us, Winnie was well known in heaven long before she arrived!

S. Mary Winifred Grass left us two great legacies—professionally, a commitment to excellence, a love of learning, and an openness to new challenges; and personally, an example of generous service, rendered in humility and with love. As we bid farewell to her, we thank her for all she has been and done for St. Joseph's College.

Audrey lived a life of service as a nurse, teacher, and administrator, as one who always had time for others. In any difficult college discussion, she clearly believed in the College motto: Esse non videri—To be, not to seem.

For all her networking ability, Audrey was a very private person. But 1 do not think it is far-fetched to link Audrey's deepest courage to her Irish roots. It is appropriate that the memorial card carries the Celtic cross. Independent judgment, stubbornness, and faith run deep in the Irish. Audrey believed in the Resurrection and in the life of the world to come. She was with us in this chapel for Mass whenever she could be. As we gather here today, she celebrates her new life. For surely on the evening of February 14, Audrey received the tribute reserved for those who strive to love God and neighbor the welcoming words of Jesus himself: "Enter thou into the joy of the Lord."

# Who Make a Difference

#### Catherine Vesey O'Neill '64

he White House appointed Catherine Vesey O'Neill a US representative to the UN Commission on the Status of Women in 1998, asking her to focus on issues of women and armed conflict. A 17-year member of the board of directors of the International Rescue Committee, she has worked for almost 20 years for the cause of refugees, especially women and children, who make up the vast majority of the world's refugees. She has led or participated in delegations to Rwanda, Bosnia, Congo (Zaire), Tanzania, Cambodia, Vietnam, Pakistan, Afghanistan, Iran and Central America. She also serves on the National US Board of the UN High Commission for refugees. She has written on humanitarian issues for the Los Angeles Times,

the Washington Post, the International Herald Tribune, the Philadelphia Inquirer and the Brown University Journal of Foreign Affairs. She has testified many times before Congress and has succeeded in changing the laws to more equitably allocate humanitarian assistance to refugee women and children.

She has appeared on Nightline, the Today Show, the ABC evening news, Charlie Rose, CNN, C-Span and National Public Radio, among other media outlets.

In 1988, she founded the Women's Commission for Refugee Women and Children, which is now funded by the majority of leading American foundations. In ten years it has sent 44 delegations of women to visit the 20 million-plus displaced women and children around the globe.

On this 50th anniversary celebration of the class of 1948, we are pleased to dedicate a scholarship in the name of Sr. Joseph Immaculate C.S.J.

WE REMEMBER WITH FONDNESS SR. JOSEPH'S LONG AND DEDICATED YEARS OF SERVICE AT ST. JOSEPH'S COLLEGE WHERE SHE PROVIDED CONSTANT INSPIRATION FOR HER STUDENTS AS TEACHER, MENTOR, FRIEND AND GUIDE TO THE WONDERS, THE IMAGERY AND THE POETRY OF ENGLISH LITERATURE.



Sr. Joseph was delighted by the bonor, stating: "This is truly a red letter day for me." Now 8.7 years old, Sr. Joseph also expressed satisfaction with her life, saying, "There is no part of my life 1 would want to change."

The Scholarship is currently funded at \$22,035. Alumni are invited to make additional contributions. To provide a full scholarship at the current level of tuition, would require the fund to grow to approximately \$125,000.

#### Dr. Joan Hinde Stewart '65

The University of South Carolina has picked Dr. Joan Hinde Stewart, a nationally known French literature scholar and experienced administrator, to be dean of the College of Liberal Arts. Joan was head of the foreign languages and literatures department at North Carolina State University from 1985 to 1997 and will assume her responsibilities as dean of USC's largest college this summer. USC President John M. Palms said, "Stewart's administrative and research record will make her a valuable member of the university's leadership team."

Joan earned her doctorate from Yale. She taught at Wellesley College before joining the NC State faculty in 1973. Joan has won research, teaching and service awards and has held a variety of administrative posts, including the assistant deanship for research and graduate programs in humanities at NC State and the chairmanship of the North Carolina Humanities Council. She has held two major fellowships from the National Endowment for the Humanities and a fellowship at the national Humanities Center. Most recently, she was a fellow of the Beinecke Rare Book and Manuscript Library at Yale University and a fellow of the Liguria Study Center for the Arts and letters in Bogliasco, Italy. She is a recipient of the Outstanding Research Award for the College of Humanities and Social Sciences at NC State and is the author of numerous books and articles on 18th and 20th century French literature.

# A Tribute to Sister Joseph Immaculate Schwartz, CSJ

In 1982, Sister Mary Florence Burns prepared the following tribute to Sister Joseph Immaculate Schwartz. It was delivered by Sister George Aquin O'Connor on the occasion of Sister Joseph's retirement. Sr. Mary Florence's words so captured the essence of this gifted educator, that we use her words again today to memoralize Sister Joseph who passed to eternal rest on May 18, 1999.

Sister Joseph Immaculate's application for appointment to the faculty of St. Joseph's College, still on file, is deceptively simply. The degrees and dates—AB, 1938, St. Joseph's College; M.A., 1939, Columbia University; Ph.D, Yale University, 1943—almost conceal the remarkable achievement of completing graduate work in five years at two universities famed for their English Departments.

She returned to St. Joseph's filled with enthusiasm for her field, to an active career as Professor of English, and for more than 25 years, Chairman of the Department.

During these years, she has been very much involved in such professional societies as the Modern Language Association, College English Association, National Council of Teachers of English, Catholic Renascence Society, Conference on the Humanities: and has served as officer and member of the Board of Directors of several of them.

She constantly updated her own preparation in the field, partly through post-graduate work at Columbia University and the University of Michigan; more systematically through her constant reading and alertness both to trends and underlying verities.

But her real contribution has been, in Gerard Manley Hopkins' phrasing, in the "inscape" or "in-forming" of the English Department. Her own love of literature, her communication of its beauty, her sensitivity to language and expression, virtually formed a "mystique" which she shared with students and which made an indelible impression on generations of English majors.

It is no accident that John Milton is one of het favorite poets and that she has made Paradise Lost and Paradise Regained benchmarks of English literature for every student whom she

has taught; the grandeur of vision, the magnificence of scale, the beauty of language, but most of all, the awe and the reverence for the wonder of man, the struggle inherent in humanity, and the possibilities always opening before us through the providence and mercy of God. These qualities, so well communicated, in turn give us just a glimpse of the values which she treasures. In the synthesis of religion and literature she has found a teacher's lifetime of happiness.

With Milton, she has convinced her students that "The world was all before them...and providence their guide".



Joan Geraghty Ross, an accomplished arrist, has enjoyed a widely diversified career as a Research Chemist at the Sloan Kettering Institute in New York and is an educator, both teacher and principal. Born in NY, she received a B.S. degree from

St. Joseph's College and later received a Teaching Certification at St. Elizabeth's College in Convent Station.

An award-winning watercolorist, Joan paints, with deep appreciation, the rural beauty that surrounds her. Her subjects include gentle lakes, quiet woodlands, historic farms and scenes that depict a true love of nature. She distinctly captures their beauty with her brush before they are gone forever. Presently, Joan conducts year-round workshops in watercolor. She has served on juries of awards and selection and demonstrated for art organizations in New Jersey, New York and Pennsylvania. 

Teddy Colbert's living wreaths have appeared in publications such as *Los Angeles Times Magazine, Martha Stewart Living, Better Homes* and *Women's Day.* She and her husband live in Somis, California, where her business, Teddy Colbert's Garden, offers living wreaths, instructions and supplies.
