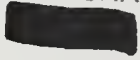

WINDSOR LECTURES IN LIBRARIANSHIP

The 1974 Windsor Lectures were given on May 3 and 4. The four lectures were presented in honor of Alice Lohrer, Professor of Library Science, who will retire from the faculty in August 1974.

Dr. Harold Lancour, Dean Emeritus, University of Pittsburgh Graduate School of Library and Information Sciences, gave the first two lectures: "The Role of Americans in Library Education Abroad" and "Trends in Librarianship in Developing Countries". The final two lectures, "Desirable Personal Qualities in School Library Personnel" and "The Future as Depicted in Children's Books Today", were given by Dr. Peggy A. Sullivan, Executive Secretary of the Library Education Division of the American Library Association.

The Phineas L. Windsor Lectures are given each year in memory of Mr. Windsor, who was Director of the University of Illinois Library and Library School from 1909-1940.

OBITUARIES

1905

Josie B. Houchens died February 5, 1974 at the Urbana Americana Nursing Center. She was born in New Orleans and received her B.A. from Tulane University. She was an assistant librarian at Eastern Illinois University in 1906 and returned to the University of Illinois in 1907 where she remained until her retirement in 1951. During this period, she served as order assistant, reference assistant, and binding librarian. In 1941 she was placed in charge of all library personnel and was made an associate professor in 1948. Miss Houchens also taught summer sessions at Columbia University for 13 years. She was visiting lecturer at the University of Southern California for one summer and was associate professor at Florida State University in 1954.

1919

Pauline Gauss died December 18, 1973 in Peoria. Her career was spent on the staffs of the Bradley University Library and the alumni office.

1928

Cerilla Elizabeth Saylor died April 19, 1974 at Crown Point, Indiana. Miss Saylor retired from the University faculty in 1964 after a 28 year association with the Library and Library School. After obtaining her B.S. in Library Science in 1928, Miss Saylor joined the staff of the Washington University Library in St. Louis. She returned to the University of Illinois in 1938 as an assistant and was named Architecture Librarian in 1940.

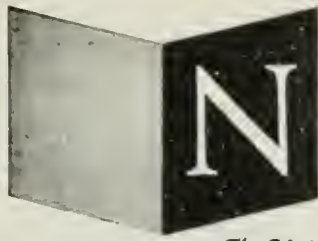

WINDSOR LECTURES IN LIBRARIANSHIP

The 1975 Windsor lecturer will be Heinz Von Foerster, recently retired Professor in the departments of Electrical Engineering and Biophysics at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. While Dr. Von Foerster is a physical scientist by training, his research and interests have involved him in the exploration of the peculiar relation between the observer and the observed. In 1959, he was awarded a Guggenheim Fellowship to study the neurophysiology of his "enigmatic observer." Over the last twenty-five years, he had become increasingly involved with the anthropological aspects of man and has been an active force in a number of anthropological research groups. In his research and thinking, Dr. Von Foerster has probed into exciting and complex areas of man that require the mind of both the physical scientist and of the social scientist, if indeed not also of the humanist.

The series of two lectures, entitled "Dialogue in a New Key." will be given on Monday, September 22 and Monday, September 29 in Room 66 of the University of Illinois Library, Urbana. Both lectures will be at 8:00 p.m.

The Phineas L. Windsor Lectures are given each year in memory of Mr. Windsor, who was Director of the University of Illinois Library and Library School from 1909-1940. Mr. Windsor died in 1965. A lecture fund was established from the contributions received from thousands of alumni of the Library School at the time of Mr. Windsor's retirement.

OBITUARIES

Rose Phelps died July 6, 1974 in Phoenix, Arizona. Miss Phelps had had fifteen years of professional library experience before joining the Library School faculty in 1931. Throughout her teaching career, Miss Phelps specialized in reference services. She was also active in a number of professional organizations and served as president of the Association of American Library Schools in 1951-52. She retired in 1958. Miss Phelps bequeathed funds for the establishment of the Rose B. Phelps fellowship for Library School students. Additional contributions to that fund are welcome.

1908

Ethel Bond graduated from the University of Illinois in 1908 and, after four years of professional cataloging experience, she joined the Library School faculty in 1912. Miss Bond specialized in the teaching of cataloging and classification. At the same time, she became active in A.L.A.'s Division of Cataloging and Classification, holding the presidency of that division in 1946-47. After 37 years of service, she retired from the faculty in 1949. Miss Bond maintained her residence in Champaign, where she died on September 13, 1974.

1911

Mary E. Marks died March 1, 1975. In 1950, she had retired as Librarian of the University of Wyoming. For the last 12 years, she had been a resident of Desert Crest Retirement Home in Phoenix, Arizona.

PLACEMENT PROCEDURES FOR RELEASING CREDENTIALS

Because placement procedures have changed considerably in the past two years, all alumni who wish to have credentials sent out by the office are requested to please check first on the status of them. Any credentials to be released are to be up-to-date as to further graduate study, employment record, and references. The School's policy for several years has been not to release the faculty evaluations of course work if the degree had been taken five or more years previously, and they have now been dropped altogether, in accordance with University policy and the federal 1974 Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act. Under it the alumnus or student solicits the letters of reference to be included in the placement file and must sign a waiver permitting release of the file.

She was Reference Librarian at the University of Illinois Library from 1920 until her retirement in 1951.

A SABBATICAL IN JAMAICA

Through a mutual friend, I was invited to spend the academic year of 1978/79 at the Department of Library Studies, University of the West Indies, Mona Campus, Kingston, Jamaica. I wanted to repeat two studies which I had previously done in U.S. libraries; for best results I needed a good public library, but in another country in order to see if I got the same results in a different setting. I had heard of the work of the Jamaica Library Service, and was assured of the cooperation of the Kingston and St. Andrew Parish Library.

Thus it was that I spent most of my time from September 1978 through May 1979 at the UWI, except for the month of November, when I was asked by UNESCO to visit the library school at the University of Brasilia, in the capital city of Brazil. That was a noteworthy experience in itself, inasmuch as Brasilia is a planned city only 20 years old and already with almost one million people.

Jamaica turned out to be a most fortuitous choice for a sabbatical year. The climate was fantastic; it didn't bother me at all to skip one whole winter (and the winter of 1978/79 was a good one to miss). The temperature never dropped below 70 degrees. Not that I spent all my time at the beach; the campus is several miles from the south shore of Jamaica, and the tourist resorts (and best beaches) are mostly on the north shore.

The people in the Department of Library Studies and in the University Library were fine librarians. We became great friends, and I shall long remember them all with

fondness. Daphne Douglas, head of the Department, gave me an office just off the library school library, a half-time research assistant, access to the UWI computer, and a share in the use of the Department's Volkswagon. The one main thing she asked of me in return was to teach a one-week course in May on research methods for practicing librarians. Other than that assignment I devoted myself full-time to research. I had brought two reports with me to be finished; this was done and they have both been published. I also sketched out two new studies which I hope to do some day, but most of my time was devoted to three studies of the Kingston and St. Andrew Parish Library.

One of these was an analysis of the daily circulation of the Kingston Parish Library for 1977/78. I found, among other things, that juvenile circulation fluctuated more widely than did either adult fiction or adult non-fiction, that a holiday (when the library was closed) had more influence on the circulation of the day after than of the day before, that Saturday was the busiest day of the week and Thursday the least busy, and that a sample of six days a year (stratified by day of the week and for each two-month period) closely reflected the whole year's circulation both in total sum and in percentage composition by juvenile, adult fiction and adult non-fiction.

The second and third studies were interrelated. Both were done of adult books in individual biography. About 300 titles were chosen at random and notes taken on all observable characteristics (e.g., number of pages, date of publication, date of acquisition, number of loans per year, whether rebound by the library, having a plastic cover over the printed jacket, etc.). We then checked each title in 20 different reviewing journals, book selection tools, and retrospective bibliographies in order to get an estimate of the "quality" of each book. The central question to be answered is whether the best books are the most read. An earlier study in the Evansville (Indiana) Public Library concluded that the answer

is "No." The Jamaica data confirm this finding ten years later, in a different subject field, and in libraries almost a thousand miles apart.

The third study involved 115 of the 300 biography books, chosen because they had circulated the least (less than once a year in the last five years). For three months we recorded every loan of these books, and asked patrons returning any of them to answer a brief questionnaire (How much of the book did you read? How did you happen to select it? Are you glad you borrowed it?). Then for the next three months, we ran two experiments, and continued to monitor all loans. Fifty-five books, chosen at random, were put in a prime display location under a sign, "Some Good Books You May Have Missed"; these books were borrowed eight times as often in the second three-month period as in the first three months and as in the last five years, the same result we had found in a similar study done earlier in the Champaign Public Library. In Jamaica, however, we went one step further; 30 of the remaining 60 books were described in a booklet of which 1000 copies were distributed, but the books (and the final 30 titles, which served as a control group) were left on their regular places on the shelves. I had predicted that circulation of booklist titles would not be affected, but I was wrong; the number of loans in the three months of the experiment was four times larger than in the three preceding months and in the last five years. The 30 control books had exactly the same number of loans in the second three months as in the first. My problem now is to find the factor or factors which caused these two groups of books to increase in circulation. I would like to hear from any of you alumni who have relevant experiences, insights, or opinions to offer me.

GREETINGS FROM WINIFRED LADLEY

Professor Emerita Winifred Ladley sent news of her current activities on the occasions of the 1978 and 1979 Alumni Homecoming Days. The editor hopes former students of Miss Ladley's will enjoy the following account.

After retiring from the Library School in September 1973, Miss Ladley taught for a year at the College of Librarianship, Aberystwyth, Wales, before settling in Portland, Oregon. She spent three and a half years there, keeping busy by teaching two summers at Portland State University and spending many hours in the Portland and Beaverton schools telling stories as a volunteer in their enrichment programs for elementary and junior high schools. In March 1978 she moved to the Seattle, Washington, area.

Seattle is now benefitting from her presence. In the summer of 1978 she spent every Thursday in various Seattle parks telling stories as a volunteer in their summer recreational program. Her principal activity, however, is her volunteer work for the Washington Regional Library for the Blind and Physically Handicapped, an arm of the Seattle Public Library. Among its many services is an extensive Radio Reading Service, broadcasting from its own channel seven days a week. Miss Ladley has a 30-minute weekly program of her own for which she has complete freedom of choice of content. The programs are all taped for broadcast, and many are also converted to cassettes for circulation from the library. Miss Ladley also tapes entire books, for the most part very recent publications or older books not available from the Library of Congress, which are broadcast in one-hour segments five days a week, and are also available on cassettes for circulation to the blind. She continues to do a number of "live" story hours, but is trying to limit this because of the demands of her radio work.

Miss Ladley hastens to add that she is not too busy for relaxation! Seattle has several professional theater groups, a symphony orchestra and opera, and a wealth

of scenic beauty and recreational opportunities.

NEW LIFE MEMBERS

Since leaving Urbana, she has also done a lot of traveling--in Russia, Czechoslovakia, Hungary, Austria, France, Germany, the United Kingdom, the Canary Islands, and Africa on safari to many game parks. She concludes that, "all in all, retirement isn't half bad!"

If you completed your degree before 1960 and have had occasion lately to call the Library School for information from your educational or placement record, chances are you were told your file had to be retrieved from Archives. But don't feel too old and useless! When the School made the move from the Library to David Kinley Hall, something had to go--there just wasn't room for all the files. It became a choice of throwing out (sacrilege!) or sending to Archives any file from pre-1960. Thanks to the excellent cooperation of Maynard Brichford, University Archivist, and his staff, all our older records are now safely in the care of University Archives, but available to us when needed.

DID YOU KNOW?

Since the first library school class was graduated from the UI in 1898, there have been 5,961 degrees awarded. These include 20 AB, 363 BLS, 1838 BSLS, 39 BS, 3530 MS, 86 CAS, 2 DLS, and 83 PhD degrees. Only the MS, CAS, and PhD are now awarded.

Life memberships were first established in 1925. Since that time, 618 alumni have paid their \$25.00 (no, the amount has not changed in 55 years). Money from life memberships goes to the endowment fund; the interest has been used primarily for the Katharine L. Sharp Fellowship.

DEAR ALUMNI:

As you are aware, the Library School Association has been suffering from relative inactivity during the past few years. Many of us are concerned that one of the oldest alumni groups on campus not be allowed to die of inertia. Among its principal values and functions has been communication with alumni, bringing news of both the School and fellow graduates; this has been accomplished primarily through a newsletter, which is sent to all alumni of the School. It has also been instrumental in providing endowment funds for awarding the Katharine L. Sharp Fellowship.

After much consideration, we have concluded that perhaps the best way to revitalize the Library School Association is to affiliate with the university-wide Alumni Association. At present 34 department, school, and college alumni groups are

"Constituent Associations" of the UI Alumni Association. The Library School Association remains one of perhaps two alumni groups to exist separately. We believe we can breathe new life into it through an affiliation with the University of Illinois Alumni Association. Further, it should be less confusing for our graduates to be asked to join one, not two, UI alumni organizations.

As requirements for constituent association status, the Library School Association would have to maintain elected officers and directors, elect a member to the UI Alumni Association Board, have someone act as liaison between the two associations and the School, hold at least one meeting a year, publish one newsletter annually, and promote special events, awards programs, continuing education programs, etc., to benefit its members.

Currently the costs of membership in the UIAA are as follows:

One-Year Memberships:

Single - \$9 Husband/Wife - \$10

Life Memberships:

Single - \$150 (cash) or \$160 (installments)
Husband/Wife - \$175 (cash) or \$185 (installments)

The amount of individual dues credited to constituent associations by the UIAA is currently the same as the Library School Association annual dues --\$2.00. Additional reserve funds are available from the UIAA if needed. Of further benefit to the Library School Association would be the unquestioned use of the University's non-profit organization bulk rate postage permit and services of the mailing center, printing services, and accounting services handled by the UIAA office. Additional benefits you would receive, should you enroll as members of the UIAA, include all their newsletters and communications, discounts on group tours, discounts on University Press publications, and advance notice of ticket sales.

Those of you who have life memberships in the Library School Association would continue to have full voting privileges. However, we cannot in all conscience ask the UIAA to accept you as full life members without paying their dues. The \$25 you paid to the Library School Association (an amount established in 1925 with the amendment relating to endowment funds) has been deposited with the University of Illinois Foundation as endowment funds for providing fellowships and awards. None of it is transferable to the UI Alumni Association. At present about 120 of the approximately 600 living life members of the Library School Association are already life members of the UI Alumni Association. An additional 40 or 50 of our life members pay annual dues to the UIAA. We do not have a count of the number of other alumni who are either life or annual members of the UIAA.

Future additions to the endowment fund would have to be direct gifts for that purpose, since new life member dues would go directly to the UIAA. It is anticipated that all current assets of the Library School Association would be transferred to the endowment funds administered by the UI Foundation, prior to becoming a constituent association.

The Executive Board of the Library School Association will make the following motion at the 1981 annual meeting:

The Executive Board moves that the University of Illinois Library School Association request approval of its charter as a Constituent Association by the Board of the University of Illinois Alumni Association.

Should this motion be approved, it will be necessary to circulate a petition to secure the signatures of 25 persons who are both alumni of the School and members of the UIAA; the petition will then be forwarded to the UIAA Board requesting appropriate action.

Because of the numerous revisions necessitated by a move to become a Constituent Association of the UIAA, completely new proposed Bylaws are printed below. They may be compared with the present Constitution as printed following these proposed Bylaws.

UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS
LIBRARY SCHOOL ASSOCIATION

BYLAWS

ARTICLE I - Name

This association shall be called the University of Illinois Library School Association, herein referred to as the Association.

ARTICLE II - Affiliation

The Association shall be chartered by the University of Illinois Alumni Association, herein referred to as the UIAA, as a Constituent Association.

ARTICLE III - Objects

The objects of the Association shall be:
- to advance the interests of the profession of library and information science;
- to promote the interests of the University of Illinois Graduate School of Library and Information Science (GSLIS);
- to foster a cooperative relationship between the GSLIS, the UIAA, and the alumni of the School; and
- to maintain communications among alumni.

ARTICLE IV - Membership

Section 1. Qualifications: All persons who are graduates of the library school of the University of Illinois, members of the faculty, friends or supporters, are eligible to become members of this Association. Enrollment as a member of the UIAA is a requirement for membership in this Association.

Section 2. Types: Annual and life memberships are available. Graduates of the University of Illinois are eligible to be regular members, and non-graduates may be associate members. Associate members, upon paying the required dues, shall enjoy all the privileges of regular membership. No special categories of membership may be created by this Association, except those authorized by the UIAA.

Section 3. Library School Association Life Members: Persons completing life memberships in the Association prior to affiliation with the UIAA shall remain life members of this Association with voting privileges, but may not also be considered life members of the UIAA without payment of the required dues to that association.

ARTICLE V - Dues

Part of the dues paid to the UIAA shall be credited to the Association for use in alumni activities and publishing of an annual newsletter. No additional dues shall be charged by this Association.

ARTICLE VI - Nominating Committee

The president of the Association shall appoint three members to serve on the nominating committee. They shall present a single slate of officers and directors at the annual meeting. The Dean of the GSLIS shall serve in an advisory role to the committee.

ARTICLE VII - Officers

Section 1. The officers shall be a president, a first vice-president/president-elect, a second vice-president, a secretary-treasurer, and three directors, one of whom shall be the retiring president of the Association.

Section 2. Qualifications: Officers and directors must be members in good standing of the Association.

Section 3. Term: Officers shall be elected at each annual meeting and shall continue in office until the adjournment of the meeting at which their successors are elected. The retiring president shall be elected a director for a one-year term; the other two directors shall be elected for two-year terms, with terms expiring in alternate years.

Section 4. Duties: The officers and directors shall perform the duties usually incumbent upon the positions to which they have been elected.

ARTICLE VIII - Executive Board

Section 1. Composition: The executive board shall consist of the elected officers and directors of the Association. In addition, the Dean of the GSLIS and the elected representative to the UIAA Board shall be members ex officio of the executive board.

Section 2. Authority: The executive board shall have the power to carry on the regular business of the Association between meetings, but all questions

of major policy in which members should have a voice must be presented at a regular meeting of the Association before final action is taken.

Section 3. Vacancy: A vacancy in any position on the executive board may be filled until the next annual meeting by vote of the remaining members of the board.

ARTICLE IX - UI Alumni Association

Section 1. Board Member: Every two years a member shall be elected to serve for two years on the UIAA Board representing the Association; a member may not serve more than three consecutive two-year terms.

Section 2. Liaison: The Dean of the Graduate School of Library and Information Science shall appoint a member of the faculty or staff, subject to the approval of the executive board, to serve as liaison between the GSLIS, the Association, and the UIAA office.

ARTICLE X - Editor

The executive board shall appoint a member residing in the Urbana-Champaign area to serve as editor of the annual News Letter.

ARTICLE XI - Meetings

Section 1. Annual: A regular business meeting of the Association shall be held annually.

Section 2. Special: Special meetings of the Association may be called by the president upon request of the executive board or of ten members.

Section 3. Notice: Due notice of the time and place of meetings and the purpose of special meetings shall be given to all members by the secretary.

ARTICLE XII - Quorum and Voting

Ten members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. A simple majority of those members present and voting will carry the vote, except as provided in Article XIV, Amendments.

ARTICLE XIII - Endowment Funds

Section 1. All receipts from life memberships of the Association received prior to its affiliation with the UIAA, and all gifts for endowment purposes, shall constitute permanent endowment funds which shall be kept forever inviolate. The interest from the endowment funds shall be expended as the executive board of the Association may direct, with such restrictions as the Association may specify.

Section 2. The endowment funds shall be in the custody of the University of Illinois Foundation, which shall act as the agent for the administration of these endowment funds according to the written agreement between the Association and the Foundation.

ARTICLE XIV - Amendments

These Bylaws may be amended by a three-fourths

vote of those present at any regular meeting, provided the proposed amendment shall have been specifically set forth in the call for such meeting.

CONSTITUTION OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS
LIBRARY SCHOOL ASSOCIATION

Adopted, 1898

ARTICLE I - Name

This association shall be called the University of Illinois Library School Association.

ARTICLE II - Objects

Its objects shall be to promote social intercourse among its members and to advance the interests of the University of Illinois Library School.

ARTICLE III - Membership

Section 1. Active members: All persons who have been members of the Library School of Armour Institute of Technology or of that of the University of Illinois may become members of this association on payment of the annual fee. Persons failing to pay dues for three consecutive years shall be dropped from membership in the association.

Section 2. Life members: All persons who have been members of the Library School of Armour Institute of Technology or that of the University of Illinois may become a life member of the association on the payment of the required fee.

Section 3. Honorary members: Honorary members may be elected by a unanimous vote of the members present at any regular meeting. Honorary members shall be exempt from payment of dues and shall have all the privileges of full membership, except that of voting.

ARTICLE IV - Dues

Section 1. Annual dues: The annual membership dues for the Association shall be two dollars.

Section 2. Life membership: On the payment of twenty-five dollars, any member may become a life member. This amount shall be paid in full, or in installments of not less than five dollars for five consecutive years.

ARTICLE V - Officers

The officers shall be a president, first and second vice-presidents, a secretary-treasurer, and three directors, constituting an executive board

of seven. They shall be elected by ballot at each annual meeting and shall continue in office until the adjournment of the meeting at which their successors are elected. The three directors shall include the retiring president of the association who shall be elected to serve for one year following his term as president. The other two directors shall be elected to serve for three-year terms, except that the first year following adoption of this article one shall be elected for a two-year term and the other for a three-year term.

ARTICLE VI - Executive Board

The Executive Board shall have power to carry on the regular business of the association between meetings; but all questions of policy in which members should have a voice must be presented at a regular meeting of the association before final action is taken.

ARTICLE VII - Advisory Committee

Section 1. The president shall appoint an advisory committee proportioned to the representation of former students in geographic section, to serve during good behavior.

Section 2. Among the duties of this committee shall be to collect news items and forward same to the secretary, that they may be recorded at the school and may be printed in the alumni News Letter.

Section 3. All suggestions regarding the school shall be referred to the Executive Board for its attention.

Section 4. This committee shall arrange also for local reunions in connection with the state meetings.

ARTICLE VIII - Annual Meeting

The annual meeting shall be held during the annual meeting of the American Library Association.

ARTICLE IX - Special Meetings

Special meetings may be called by the Executive Board.

ARTICLE X - Notices

Due notice of the time and place of meetings and the purpose of special meetings shall be given to all members by the secretary.

ARTICLE XI - Quorum

Ten members shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE XII - Endowment Funds

Section 1. All receipts from life memberships and all gifts for endowment purposes shall constitute permanent endowment funds which shall be kept forever inviolate. The interest from the endowment funds shall be expended as the Executive Board of the Library School Association may direct, with such restrictions as the Association may specify.

Section 2. The endowment funds shall be in the custody of the University of Illinois Foundation, which shall act as the agent for the administration of these endowment funds according to the written agreement between the Library School Association and the Foundation.

ARTICLE XIII - Amendments

This Constitution may be amended by a three-fourths vote of those present at any regular meeting, provided the proposed amendment shall have been specifically set forth in the call for such meeting.

HAROLD LANCOUR DIES

Harold A. Lancour, associate director of the UI Library School from 1947 to 1961, died October 23, 1981, at his home in Weston, Vermont. He was the founding dean of the Graduate Library School--now the School of Library and Information Science--at the University of Pittsburgh in 1961 and was named dean emeritus in 1974. Lancour began his career at the New York Public Library, and before coming to Illinois was librarian for ten years at the Cooper Union in New York City. A leader in national and international library and information science professional organizations, he was also active as a consultant in library development. He was a founding member and executive secretary from 1948 to 1974 of Beta Phi Mu, international library science honorary founded at the UI in 1948. He made numerous distinguished contributions to the literature of the field, and served as managing editor of Library Trends from 1952 to 1961, first editor of the Journal of Education for Librarianship, and joint editor of The Encyclopedia of Library and Information Science. Lancour is survived by his wife, Marie, and one daughter.

Library School Association Board Meeting

Annual Meeting At Dallas ALA Conference A Success

The Board met June 24, 1984 in Dallas prior to the Alumni Reception and the Annual Business Meeting and in Urbana on September 15, 1984. Perhaps the most significant news at the June 24th meeting was that Edith Elizabeth Hague (BLS '18) remembered the Library School Association in her will. The exact amount has not yet been determined, but it is expected to be between \$30,000 and \$40,000. The board discussed possible uses for the money when it becomes available and decided at the September 15th meeting that 20% of the funds be invested to produce income for membership activities such as receptions, special awards, and newsletter expenses. The other 80% of the funds will be invested to establish a named professorship in the Graduate School of Library and Information Science. Until the fund has accumulated a sufficient amount of money to support a named professorship, the board proposes to utilize half the income from the fund to support a "distinguished speakers program," which could include outstanding alumni, and return the other half of the income to the fund to increase the principal. The Board also voted at its September 15th meeting to approve an allocation of \$350 to support the participation of a current GSLIS student at the IFLA (International Federation of Library Associations) meeting in Chicago (August, 1985). Other action included the establishment of a committee to explore the possibility of an Alumni of the Year award. The secretary-treasurer was instructed to invest the bulk of the Association's funds and to place these investments with the University's Alumni Association. This is consistent with the transition of the Library School Association from an independent association to a constituent association of the University's Alumni Association.

Several hundred alumni, faculty, and friends of the GSLIS attended the Library School Association Annual Meeting held during the Alumni Reception in the Dallas Hilton on June 24, 1984. The 1983-84 President of the Association, Robert W. Oram (MS '50), presided. The slate of nominees (see list of current officers below) was approved by the members present. Many felt the large turnout was due to scheduling the reception on Sunday evening rather than Tuesday, as had been done at past ALA conferences. Your Association is planning on a Sunday reception for next year's meeting at the ALA Conference in Chicago. Let us hear from you if you have a preference for another day. Details of the Chicago reception will be announced in the spring of 1985.

Over 100 students have earned a doctorate in library and information science since it was established in 1948. It is difficult to determine who the "100th doctorate" is because there are several ways the completion of the doctorate might be calculated. Nine people have received the doctorate from the Graduate School of Library and Information Science in 1984. We issue a list of doctoral recipients, but these are listed in alphabetical order, not chronologically by date of graduation within the year. (doctorates are awarded in January, May, and October.) In this alphabetical listing, John Olsgaard, who did his dissertation on "The Relationship Between Administrative Style and the Use of Computer-Based Systems: An Attitudinal Study of Academic Library Professionals" will be the 100th doctorate listed. In terms of the date of the final defense of the dissertation, Jeanette Drone, whose dissertation was entitled "A Study of the Relationship Between Size of Monographic Collections and Internal Duplication in a Select Group of Libraries Using LCS (Library Computer System)," was the 100th person to successfully defend the doctoral dissertation. In terms of the deposit of the completed dissertation at the Graduate College, Chandra Prabha, who did a dissertation entitled "A Comparison of Scatter of Citing and Cited Literature for the Subject of Desalination," was the 100th person to deposit a GSLIS doctoral dissertation. This is an involved way of saying that it is not especially important who is the 100th person to receive the doctorate. What is important is that one hundred people who have earned the doctorate at Illinois in library and information science have done much to contribute to our profession as teachers, scholars, and practicing librarians and information scientists. ALA Student Chapter Activities

The Student Chapter of the American Library Association (the second in the nation, incidentally; Michigan beat us to it) was originally organized in 1981. The 1983-84 officers were: Evelyn (Becky) Brown (Chairperson), Mark McKnight (Co-Chairperson), Mary Elling (Funds Officer), Jim Edstrom (Program Committee Chair), and D Anna Shotts (ALA Conference Committee Chair). Walter Allen is Faculty Advisor to the Chapter. There were two other general meetings to plan programs, a highly successful bake sale (the usual fundraiser), and several program meetings. The first of these was a talk about "Librarianship in the Philippines in the '80s" by Catalina Diluvio, former head of the library school at the University of San Carlos, Cebu City, the Philippines, presently a doctoral student at GSLIS. Another interesting program took place on May 2, when Eve Merriam spoke on "The Censorship of Children's Books." A well-known author (*The Inner City Mother Goose Growing Up Female in America, and several volumes of poetry, among other writings*), Ms. Merriam has had a great deal of personal experience with censors, especially in regard to *The Inner City Mother Goose*. Becky Brown, Chapter Chairperson, was selected to participate in the ALA student staff project at the ALA Annual Conference in Dallas. All in all, the ALA Student Chapter had an active and successful year in 1983-84. In future issues we hope to have reports from the Special Libraries Association and the American Society for Information Science student chapters.

Lynch Wins ALA Presidency

Beverly P. Lynch (M.S. '50) has been elected ALA vice-president and president-elect. Dr. Lynch is university librarian at the University of Illinois at Chicago, where she has been since 1977. She was executive secretary of the ALA Association of College and Research Libraries in 1972-76. She has also worked in the Serials Division of Yale University Sterling Memorial Library, a division she headed from 1965-1968. After receiving her M.S. from the GSLIS, she took her first professional library position at Marquette University Memorial Library.

In 1981 Dr. Lynch was named Academic Research Librarian of the Year by ACRL, North Dakota State University, where she obtained her undergraduate degree, awarded her an honorary doctorate in 1980. She received the Ph.D. from the University of Wisconsin in 1972.

Charles Davis, dean, to step down next August

Charles H. Davis, dean of the UI Graduate School of Library and Information Science, will step down from that position to return to teaching and research effective Aug. 21, 1985.

Davis made his decision known to former chancellor John E. Cribbet and to Edwin L. Goldwasser, vice chancellor for academic affairs, in a letter this past summer.

Davis said he found "insufficient time" for his professional activities. "I can think of no better time to announce a voluntary resignation than when things are going well," he said.

The school he heads is ranked first among its peers in the United States and Canada. It is one of the nation's oldest library schools and the first to be founded in the Midwest.

"Its master of science program recently was reaccredited for the rest of the decade by the American Library Association. In addition, the school has been favorably reviewed by the Committee on Program Evaluation (COPE)," Davis said.

"We have successfully recruited bright young tenure-track faculty and we are attracting, graduating, and placing students in record numbers."

Davis, 46, was appointed dean in 1979, succeeding Herbert Goldhor, who bore the title of director.

A native of Indianapolis, Davis holds three degrees from Indiana University—a bachelor's in chemistry and physics, and master's and doctoral degrees in library and information science. He also studied toxicology at Indiana and chemistry at the University of Munich, West Germany.

Before assuming the deanship at Illinois, Davis was dean of the Faculty of Library Science at the University of Alberta, Canada. He also has been on the faculties of Indiana and Drexel universities and the University of Michigan.

Davis began his career as a chemist, working as an editor for Chemical Abstracts in Columbus, Ohio, in the early 60s. Automation was just beginning there and Davis was fascinated by the technique of computer-based information retrieval, now called information science. He went back to school to earn degrees in the then new subject and has been a leading authority in the field for many years.

He is the author or co-author of such books as "Information Retrieval and Documentation in Chemistry," "Guide to Information Science" and "Illustrative Computer Programming for Libraries," and numerous technical articles. He also serves on the editorial and advisory boards of two journals, "Microcomputers for Information Management" and "Library Hi Tech."

Davis served as president of the American Society for Information Service, 1982-83, and currently is a consultant to the National Science Council of Taiwan.

In 1982 he received the Louise Maxwell Award given by the alumni association of the Indiana University School of Library and Information Science.

Cribbet wrote Davis, "It has been a pleasure to work with you during my term as chancellor, and I congratulate you on your many achievements, both personally and for the school. I am particularly pleased you plan to remain at the UI and that we



will have your services in many capacities in the years ahead."

Goldwasser said, "This is a good time for me to say, once more, how much I appreciate the excellent job you have done as dean of our Graduate School of Library and Information Science. You have gained the confidence of your faculty and they appear to have developed . . . that mutual respect which is so essential to a strong academic unit."

Donald Krummel, chairman of the school's executive committee, said, "In my opinion, Dean Davis's most significant contributions have probably been in promoting the established pre-eminence of the Illinois library school. He has been particularly valuable in publicizing our cause in the communities of information scientists.

"His expertise in computers has added valuable equipment to the resources of this school, which in turn has supported a broader potential for research and course offerings."

Reception to Honor New Dean

The Library School Association, with the assistance of the University of Illinois Alumni Association, will hold a reception at the American Library Association Mid-winter meeting in Chicago, Saturday, January 18, 1986. Alumni and friends of the Graduate School of Library and Information Science will have an opportunity to meet Dr. Leigh Stewart Estabrook, the new dean of GSLIS. The reception will be held in the G.A.R. rotunda of the Chicago Public Library Cultural Center from 5:00 to 7:00 p.m.

Leigh Estabrook is currently associate professor at the School of Information Studies, Syracuse University and associate editor of Book Research Quarterly. She received her A.B. in history from Northwestern University, her M.S. in library science from Simmons College, and her Ph.D. in sociology from Boston University.

Her publications have focused on issues of social and technological change and its impact on libraries. She has also worked jointly with Kathleen Heim, formerly assistant professor at GSLIS, on a study of career patterns and sex discrimination in librarianship. She is currently involved in research on the impact of information technology on the library labor force. She is also serving as consultant to the State Department in an evaluation of how technological innovation is affecting work in the U.S. embassy in Bonn, Germany. She has also served as consultant to public, academic, and special libraries.

The Chicago Public Library Cultural Center is located at 78 East Washington Street (Washington Street between Wabash and Michigan). The Washington Street entrance to the center will be the only entrance open on Saturday evening.

EDITH HAUGE BEQUEST

Edith Elizabeth Hague (B.L.S. 1918), who died in 1979, left the Library School Association nearly half of her estate. The LSA board has decided that 20% of the funds be invested to produce income for membership activities such as receptions, special awards, and newsletter expenses. The other 80% of the funds have been invested to establish a fund to endow a named professorship in the Graduate School of Library and Information Science. Until the fund has accumulated a sufficient amount of money to support a named professorship, half the income from the 80% will be used to support a distinguished speakers program. The other half of the income from this portion of the bequest will be returned to the fund to increase the principal. Several hundred thousand dollars is required to establish a named professorship. The LSA board has targeted a named professorship as one of its long term goals.

Edith Hague began her library career as the assistant in charge of continuations and serials at the Kansas State Agriculture College in Manhattan, Kansas (now Kansas State University). After serving two years each as reference librarian at the Spokane (Wash.) Public Library and at Oregon State Agriculture College (Corvallis), she spent the next twenty-one years as a librarian in government service with the U.S. Veterans Administration. During the last five years of her career, she worked as a cataloger at the military Air Transport Service in Washington, D.C. After retirement from her interesting and varied career, Miss Hague lived in Charlotte, North Carolina.

The association is most appreciative of the bequest and looks forward to the constructive programs for the school and its alumni that such a gift will provide.

LSA Name Change

At its September meeting, the LSA board discussed changing the name of the Library School Association. The present name neither reflects the expanded role of the graduates in information science nor does it indicate that it is an association for GSLIS alumni. If you have suggestions regarding the possible change of name for the association, drop us a line. The board has appointed a committee to review the association's bylaws and to consider the possible name change. We hope to have a report from that committee by the 1986 annual meeting in New York.

DISTINGUISHED ALUMNUS AWARD

Guidelines

I. Purpose:

The purpose of the Distinguished Alumnus Award is to recognize an individual alumnus making an outstanding contribution to the field of Library and Information Science, to the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign (UIUC) Library School Association, or to the UIUC Graduate School of Library and Information Science (GSLIS).

II. Eligibility:

- A. Only living alumni of the UIUC Graduate School of Library and Information Science are eligible. For purposes of definition, an alumnus is any person who shall have regularly enrolled in the UIUC GSLIS or its predecessors and who has remained in attendance at least one semester.
- B. The nominee shall have made significant contributions in library and information science benefitting his/her community, state, nation, or the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign.
- C. The nominee does not have to be a member of the UIUC Library School Association.

III. Award:

- A. The award shall consist of an engraved certificate.
- B. The award shall be presented at the reception held for new graduates by the GSLIS and announced at the annual membership meeting of the Association.
- C. Announcement of the recipient's name may be made in April, after the recipient is officially notified.
- D. Necessary travel expenses (transportation, meals and lodging) for the presentation shall be paid by the UIUC Library School Association.
- E. The recipient's name shall be inscribed on a Distinguished Alumnus Award plaque. The plaque will remain on open display in the UIUC GSLIS Library or in the quarters of the UIUC GSLIS.

IV. Nominations:

- A. Nominations may be submitted by 1) any member of the UIUC Library School Association, 2) any current or former member of the UIUC GSLIS faculty, or 3) any alumnus of the UIUC GSLIS.
- B. All nominations must be made in writing and must include complete biographical information; a statement outlining the nominee's achievements in library and information service; and include the name and address of the person making the nomination.
- C. Nominations must be submitted no later than November 1.
- D. Nominations are to be submitted to:

- E. All nominations for the Distinguished Alumnus Award shall be continued in force for the following two successive years. After that time, they may be resubmitted.
- F. If, in the opinion of the Award Committee, no worthy candidate is nominated in a given year, the Award will not be presented that year.

V. *Award Committee:*

- A. The Award Committee shall consist of the President of the UIUC Library School Association, the Dean of the GSLIS, the chair of the GSLIS Executive Committee, and two other Association members selected by the President.
- B. The Award Committee shall elect their own chairperson.
- C. The Secretary-Treasurer of the UIUC Library School Association shall serve as an ex officio, non-voting member of the Award Committee.
- D. It shall be the duty of the Award Committee to make the final selection of the award recipient and make such recommendation to the Executive Board of the UIUC Library School Association.

VI. *UIUC Library School Association—Executive Board:*

- A. The UIUC Library School Association Executive Board is responsible for approving the recommendation of the Award Committee and for notifying the recipient.
- B. The UIUC Library School Association Executive Board is responsible for approving and releasing all publicity relating to the Distinguished Alumnus Award.

The first award will be granted in the spring of 1987. Nominations will be accepted until November 1, 1986. The guidelines were approved on July 7, 1985.

Stevens in Retirement

Rolland Stevens (Ph.D. 1951) officially retired from the Graduate School of Library and Information Science in 1980. Although in good weather he reserves Monday for golf, Dr. Stevens has not stopped being professionally active. He is as busy as ever and is seen around the campus almost as often as he was before retirement. He co-authored *Reference Work in the Public Library* (Libraries Unlimited, 1983) with Joan M. Walton, director of adult services at Champaign Public Library (Ill.) This collaboration resulted from Dr. Stevens' desire to have the information dispensed in his classes and in his books reflect the "real-life" informational needs of reference librarians. For many years Joan talked to Prof. Stevens' classes on reference sources they don't tell you about in library school. Then they worked together on the book.

Dr. Stevens' next book, co-authored with Linda Smith, is soon to be published by Libraries Unlimited. Titled *Reference Work in the University Library*, it is his second book in three years. Professor Stevens has the distinction of holding the very first Ph.D. degree granted by the University of Illinois Graduate School of Library and Information Science. Therefore, it is appropriate that he is featured in our first column of News Notes about Retired faculty.

Lest it seem that Dr. Stevens' life is all work and no play, he assures me that gardening, bridge, and woodworking play a significant role in his retirement. Also he and his wife go dancing several times a month.

Downs reflects. . .

The Ultimate Bibliophile — Books Changed His World

From a one-room schoolhouse in the hills of North Carolina, to directing one of the world's largest libraries, Robert Bingham Downs has enjoyed a lifelong love affair with books. En route, he has collected stacks of awards, six honorary degrees and the "Second Class of the Order of the Sacred Treasure" from the government of Japan.

"No librarian has reached such a wide audience," says his Clarence Day Award from the American Library Association, "and no librarian has made a richer contribution to an understanding of books for their enjoyment and for their significance in our time."

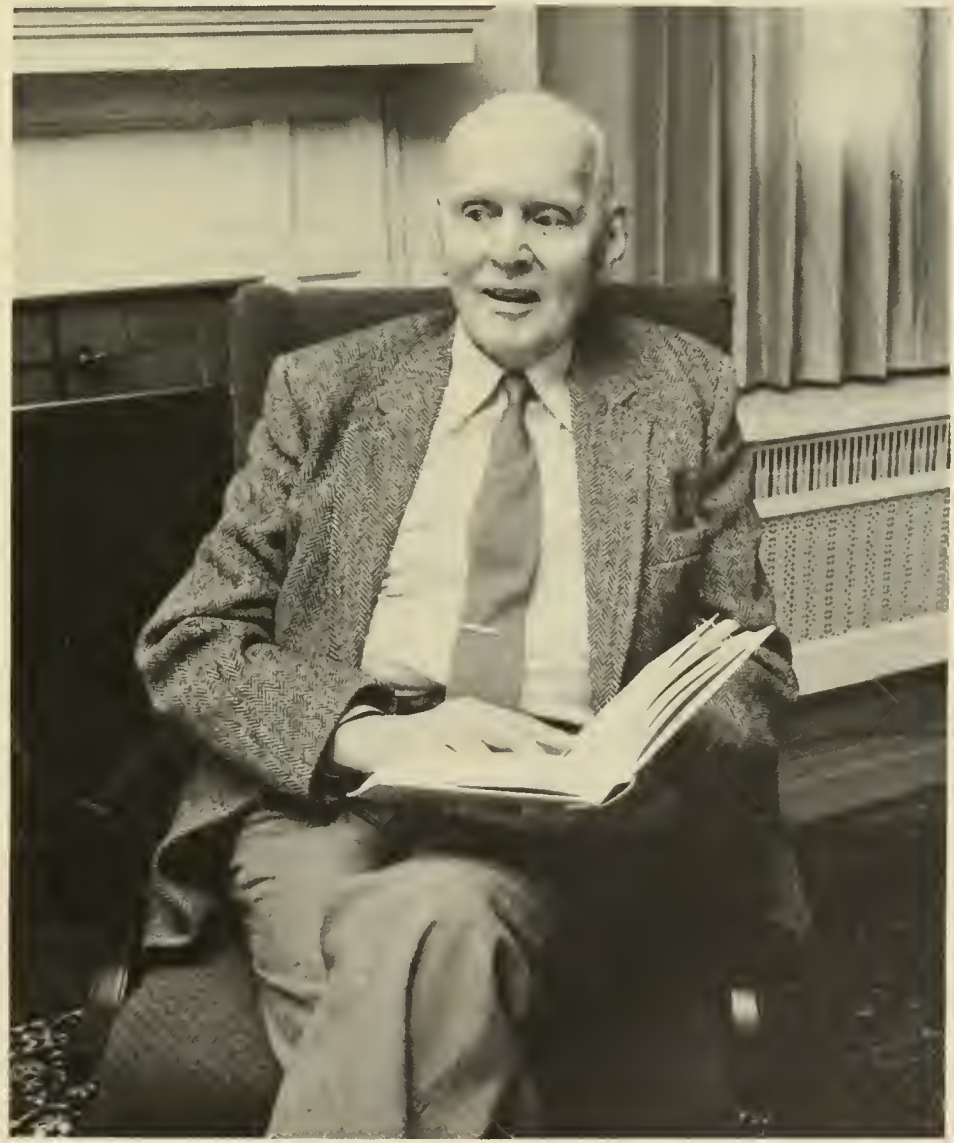
At 82, the distinguished author, educator and administrator is still busy promoting the idea that "certain books have had a profound influence on history, culture, civilization and scientific thought throughout recorded time."

And he's still outspoken about "disturbing trends" in the field of librarianship.

Dean emeritus Downs spent almost three decades shaping the world-famous UI Library; before that, he built collections at the University of North Carolina and New York University. Widely known as a crusader for intellectual freedom, collection development and faculty status for librarians, Downs ranks at the top in his field.

"Few librarians in this century have mastered the profession so completely, and fewer still have shared their convictions and judgments so extensively," said Arthur P. Young, in a chapter on Downs in the new book, "Leaders in American Academic Librarianship: 1925-1975."

Share Downs has. As an author, he has written about 40 books and 400 articles dur-

ing his 60-year career. Still going strong, Downs is now spreading his famous "power of books" message in two new volumes, "Perspectives on the Past: An Autobiography," and "Books in My Life."

His "best-seller" is "Books That Changed the World." Published in 1956, translated into 17 languages, expanded and revised twice, "Books" has sold several million copies.

"A pirated Chinese edition, published 10 years ago in Taiwan, sold 50,000 copies alone," he said, "and I've been told the book is now required reading for the master of arts degree at Johns Hopkins University."

The book was so popular it created a demand for sequels. In the next 15 years Downs followed it with "Books That Changed America," "Molders of the Modern Mind," "Books That Changed the South," "Memorable Americans" and "More Memorable Americans," to name a few.

In 1960, he published "The First Freedom." A reviewer called it a "fighting book, wholehearted in its repudiation of censorship and untimidated in naming and assailing the opposition."

In recognition of his war against censorship, the UI Library in 1968 established the Robert B. Downs annual award for outstanding contributions to intellectual freedom in libraries.

In another realm, Downs parlayed a lifelong interest in tall tales and folk humor into "The Bear Went Over the Mountain," "American Humorous Folklore" and other books.

In his long career, Downs presided over the major library associations including the American Library Association, and also took on consulting assignments — he calls them "foreign missions" — on five continents. For his work in developing the Japanese National Diet Library after World War II, he recently received the prestigious "Second Class of the Order of the Sacred Treasure."

Despite prodding from associates, Downs was slow to write his own story, which was published in 1985. He explains why in the autobiography.

"Perhaps I have been deterred . . .," he said, "by an impression that an autobiography is a kind of swan song — one's final act as an author, when all that one can hope to accomplish as a writer is finished. That is definitely not true in my case."

Indeed, since the autobiography, Downs has produced "Images of America," a compilation of accounts by famous people of their travels through the United States, to be released later this year. He is also talking about expanding an essay on scientific taboos and superstitions.

Books won Downs' heart at an early age. A farmboy, he eagerly plowed through Shady Grove School's book collection, which, luckily for him, continued to grow thanks to proceeds from the annual box supper. He was doubly fortunate as books were stored in his home during the summer.

When Downs was 10, he won a spelling bee at Shady Grove. The prize — a copy of Aesop's Fables — made a strong impression on him and to this day remains one of his all-time favorite books. Five years later, his family moved to Asheville, where the Pack Memorial Library "opened up a new world of books for me," and he devoured a book a day.

Despite, or perhaps because of, the reading, Downs dropped out of high school for two years, "gaining considerable breadth of experience" as a fire ranger, telephone repairman, construction worker and rancher.

He continued, however, with books that were an education in themselves. With only nine years of formal schooling, he entered college, earning a bachelor's degree from the University of North Carolina, and a second bachelor's and a master's degree from Columbia University.

After stints at Colby College, North Carolina and New York, Downs came to Illinois in 1943 as director of its library and library school. Promoted to dean of library administration in 1958, he served in that role until his retirement in 1971.

Following World War II, Downs began building foreign acquisitions, with emphasis on such areas as Slavic and East European, Far Eastern, Latin American, and African and Afro-American studies. Today, these collections are regarded as among the best in the United States.

He was also "passionately committed to acquiring and holding valuable books," Young said. When three items from the library's premier Milton collection were stolen several years ago, Downs received phone calls from the thief demanding a ransom. When the police turned up no leads, he took matters into his own hands.

He persuaded the original book dealer to put up the ransom and arranged a secret meeting with the thief, exchanging the books for money.

"The FBI thought I had done the wrong thing and that I should have reported to them. But I had been assured by the burglars that if I made any attempt to catch them, they would destroy the books. I preferred to have the books back rather than catch the thieves," he said.

A recent report on the university's collection development program said, "During his 28-year tenure, the University Library grew to its present position as one of the world's

greatest research libraries, the third-largest American university library and the largest state university library. The achievement of this national and international prominence can in large measure be attributed to Downs' leadership."

In his autobiography, Downs lashes out at those younger librarians who are "preoccupied with the science of management, computers and automation, or in some cases simply with gadgetry."

These people "lack enthusiasm for the printed word and the desire to serve the reader." Downs said. "From all indications, some chief librarians would be as happy and perhaps more successful in managing a supermarket as a university library."

He also criticizes the current fad of downgrading "the importance of books while preaching the false doctrine of the obsolescence of paper and print."

"We've been hearing this since the book was invented in the 15th century," he said. "I think there's no chance of it ever happening."

"Throughout my life I have tried to emphasize that you can't replace books," he said. "They have a unique place in our lives and society."

1987 Data Processing Clinic, April 5-7 1987

This year's topic for the annual Data Processing Clinic is the "Impact of Automation on Reference and Information Services." Reference work in libraries of all types is being transformed by the availability of sources in electronic form (e.g. machine-readable databases) which supplement printed sources and paper files. Over the past decade there has been a substantial increase in the number of databases, the types of databases (nonbibliographic vs. bibliographic), and the search systems providing access to these databases. More recently new formats have been introduced, with databases on CD-ROM for local use supplementing databases accessible through telecommunications links. These new sources offer an opportunity to extend reference and information services, if librarians can learn how to use them effectively.

Demonstrations and speakers are among the activities. The Proceedings of the conference are published by the Publications Office of GSLIS. Professor Linda Smith is conference coordinator, and can be reached at 410 DKH, GSLIS, University of Illinois 61801; 217-333-7742.

SALARY STATISTICS

For a number of years the University of Illinois Library School has collected from its former students, statistics on salaries and positions. These have been published about every three years in the News Letter and present an interesting picture of salary trends.

The last tables in 1930 represent probably the peak in the library salaries. Before that the trend was slowly up and since then rather rapidly down. It is impossible to make these tables show a true picture of the

whole salary situation for the figures are taken only from blanks returned, and many Alumni did not reply and some who replied omitted the salary. Out of 1127 in active work, there were 834 replies which could be used. As usual some of the Alumni whose salaries fall in the higher brackets did not return their blanks.

The peak first year registration of the Library School was in 1930 with 152 students and in 1931 with 134 students. Since then the registration has been held

down to about 60 in an effort to relieve the placement problem. This has meant that applicants were rejected each year, and not that there has been any appreciable decrease in the numbers seeing to enter the profession.

Table 1 gives the average salaries for men and women who have taken the one and two years course since 1917. This shows clearly the rise to 1930 and the decline since the depression. Figures in parenthesis give the number of replies.

FIFTIETH ANNIVERSARY

As the University of Illinois is planning to celebrate the seventy-fifth anniversary of its founding on March 2, 1943, our [planning] committee decided to celebrate our fiftieth anniversary on the same date, thus making it a double celebration for the Library School. Our tentative plans provide for a one-day meeting ending with a reception or dinner in the Illini Union. Because of the conditions due to the war, Professor T.C. Pease, chairman of the University committee, informed us that their program will be limited to the holding of a University convocation and to the publication of the history of the University which is near completion.

THE SCHOOL IN WARTIME

The University of Illinois Library School entered upon its fall session under condi-

tions quite different from the ordinary. Classes began on October 13, a month later than usual, because of the change to a school year of three sixteen week semesters, necessitated by the University accelerated educational program. Library School students share study tables and other library facilities with khaki-clad young men of the Army Specialized Training Program, here for the special study of foreign languages and areas, and with blue-clad young men of the Navy's V-12 program. Between classes their progress along the campus walks is frequently halted by lines of soldiers marching to class. Among civilians, young women are noticeably in the predominance.

The effect of the war is felt in the Library School enrollment, which totals fifty-one students. Besides these, twenty-three undergraduate students are enrolled in the course for teacher-librarians and thirty-one in the course in the use of books and libraries.

U. OF I. LIBRARIANS GAIN FACULTY STATUS

After thirty-three years under state and University civil service systems, the University of Illinois professional library staff this fall [1944] begins a new status. Following long study and discussion by the Library administration, the University Civil Service Committee, and the University administration a recommendation was made by President Willard, at the June 22, 1944 meeting of the Board of Trustees, to include professional librarians in the academic staff of the University, thereby removing them from the civil service organization.

SUMMARY OF REPLIES TO THE V-J DAY QUESTIONNAIRE

On V-J Day the Library School office mailed 159 letters and questionnaires to alumni in the armed forces and in war work. By the first of November a fair sampling of replies had been received in spite of difficulties with the mails and in spite of the fact that most of these people were probably much too busy to be bothered with questionnaires.

The School was interested primarily in two things: to prepare itself to give efficient and rapid placement service to alumni as soon as the discharge pin was fastened into the lapel of a new suit; and to plan its educational program with reference to the needs of those alumni who would be interested in further study.

With very few exceptions, alumni on leave are not interested in returning to former positions. The reason is easy to see when one learns of some of the things our G.I. alumni have been doing during the past three years or so. Many have been assigned to positions of great responsibility, and others have earned recognition for important achievements. They are, therefore, ready for much more responsible and challenging positions than those they left during what must seem to them like the Middle Ages before the war.

RECORD ENROLLMENT

The total number of students, 336, enrolled in the various curricula of the Library School this semester is the largest in the School's history. There are 136 taking the

library science courses on the Urbana campus, including those in the teacher-librarian and biological literature courses. Fifteen of these are registered in courses leading the B.S. degree, 65 for the M.S. degree, and 9 for the new Doctor of Library Science degree. Two of the 9 are devoting full time to their studies in the doctoral programs, Rolland Stevens, B.S.L. '40, A.M. '43, formerly assistant to the librarian, Rochester University Library, and Howard Winger, B.S.L.S., Peabody '45, M.S. Illinois '48, formerly stack librarian, University of Illinois Library.

Extension courses in Chicago include 31 candidates for the M.S. degree, while those in Dixon, Ottawa, and Rockford have enrolled 169 candidates for the B.S. degree.

AUDIO-VISUAL PROGRAM

In order to meet a growing demand for librarians who have been properly trained in the use of films, radio and recordings, slides, exhibits, displays and other so-called audio-visual aids to study and training, the Library School has enlarged its regular field work schedule to include a laboratory program of practical study and work experience with such materials. Assistant Professor C. Walter Stone, specialist in audio-visual and adult education, is directing the new program, known as the Demonstration Laboratory.

Training in this "Eye and Ear" Laboratory is open each semester to a limited group of students selected on the basis of professional qualification and need. Certain types of research projects are also sponsored; for example, a pilot survey of the film holdings of university, school, and public libraries in the state of Illinois, now nearing completion. This study will form the basis for a union list as well as provide data for a number of specialized studies.

KANSAS STATE BUILDING NAMED FOR ALUM

A high-rise residence hall will have a new food service unit named for Grace E. Derby, for forty years a member of the library staff at Kansas State. Miss Derby was a graduate of Western College, Oxford, Ohio, and received her library degree at Illinois in

1907. She worked at Kansas State from 1912 until she retired in 1951. She now lives in a retirement home at Newton, Kansas.

RECRUITMENT

Barbara McKelvey Conant, former instructor for both the Graduate School of Library Science and the Division of Library Extension, was appointed full-time recruiter for downstate Illinois February 1, 1967, under the Illinois State library recruitment project. She reports that much of her time is spent convincing school administrators that library service is a career worthy of their students' time and attention.

DEATHS

B. Juanita Amdor, former director of Wisconsin Valley Library Services died in an automobile accident in the spring of 1985.

Carol Bessler, died Nov. 3, 1984, after a long struggle with brain cancer. She was employed as chief reference librarian at the Wisconsin Valley Reference Service, a ten-county cooperative library system, from 1962 when it was established until her retirement on disability in 1983.

Anna M. Bradford, died December 27, 1985, in Urbana. Mrs. Bradford and her husband were missionaries for the Presbyterian Church at Elat Station, Cameroon, West Africa from 1921 to 1928. She graduated from Monmouth College in 1935. She became head librarian at Northern Illinois University from 1948-50. She was a librarian at Monmouth College from 1950 to 1968.

Dorothy Alice Clark, MS, died October 27, 1985, in Pontiac, IL. She cataloged music for the University of Illinois and worked in the Music Library there until her retirement in 1964. After her retirement she made Braille transcription for blind students at the UI Rehabilitation Center and transcribed music into Braille for the Library of Congress.

Johannes Dewton, MS '44, a major figure in cataloging activities at the Library of Congress for three decades died on July 2, 1985. He was 79 years old. Born in Vienna, Austria, and educated as a lawyer there, Mr. Dewton emigrated to the United States in 1939. He joined the descriptive cataloging division at the Library of Congress in 1945. His career at the Library of Congress was notable principally for the herculean tasks he undertook in editing a series of the book catalogs which, prior to the era of MARC, were so instrumental in distributing bibliographic information about the Library of Congress' holdings, and later about those of the entire network of the nation's research libraries.

Elsie E. Glasgow, BS in LS '46, died March 12 in Oxford, Ohio. She was librarian for home economics at Cornell University and was library cataloguer for the State University of New York at Geneseo in her last nine years before retirement. She was active in the Presbyterian Church and in the Business and Professional Woman's Club.

Bernice Rea died on July 18, 1984, in Riverside Hospital in Columbus, Ohio.

Marie Dickson Riley, '31, died of a malignant brain tumor on Nov. 23, 1981, in Lexington, Massachusetts.

Mahala Saville, reference librarian at the University of Mississippi for 28 years died February 19, 1986. She was 92. Miss Saville was honored in 1984 by the Friends of the Library at Ole Miss with a portrait of her that now hangs in the library's reference room. She retired in 1962.

Pearl Amundson Spayde, MS '40, died Sept. 2, 1985, in Sacramento, California. She was former library administrator at California State University, Sacramento. She was instrumental in setting up the first library at CSUS in 1948. She served as library administrator for 28 years. She was an active member of the American Library Association and the American Association of University Women. In 1977, she was awarded a Fulbright-Hayes scholarship for study in India after which she campaigned actively to gather books to be sent to India.

Arnold H. Trotier of Sarasota, Florida, retired director of technical services at the University of Illinois Library, died Sept. 12, 1986, at home. Mr. Trotier was appointed to the University of Illinois library staff in 1930. He served as associate director of technical services from 1949 to 1965 and as director from 1965 until his retirement in 1966. He was president of the Illinois Library Association 1941-42 and was active in the American Library Association and other professional organizations. From 1954 to 1955 he was a Fulbright lecturer in Thailand. He served as a president of the Urbana Exchange Club.

Grace Wormer, a longtime librarian at the University of Iowa, died April 15, 1986 at the age of 100. She was employed at University of Iowa from 1912 until her retirement on July 1, 1954. She was a graduate of Cornell College, Mount Vernon, Iowa and the University of Illinois Library School. She was employed at the Waterloo Public Library for two years before joining the University of Iowa staff. A life member of the American Library Association, she served on many of its committees and its Council. She also was a member of the ACRL Board and served on the Executive Board and a number of committees in the Iowa Library Association.
