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
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

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The Year in Art

INTRODUCTION

Thinking over the impressions received through the eyes during 1917 perhaps the most insistent is that of the numerous hoardings covered with posters. Immediately after the declaration of war in April blank walls became alive with recruiting posters and these were soon after alternated with posters calling attention to the Liberty Loan, the Red Cross drive,

and other activities brought about by the war.

When future historians write about the great war they will turn to the posters of various countries and look upon them as "documents" revealing the point of view of each nation, their culture, artistic ability, etc. Will we be proud of the posters printed by the millions for distribution in the We be proud of the posters printed by the millions for distribution in the United States? It is an open question. Here and there an artist of experience has done his "bit" by producing the design for a poster which stands out as an exception among many mediocre or bad designs. In this group of good posters belong the "Three Sisters" made by Edwin H. Blashfield at the time of the visit to this country of General Joffre, the Navy League poster painted by Robert Reid on a large billboard space in Chicago, the Maxfield Parrish design widely used in San Francisco, and the recruiting

the Maxfield Parrish design widely used in San Francisco, and the recruiting poster by Albert Sterner, "Over There," which was displayed in New York City and which forms the frontispiece to this volume of the "Art Annual."

Never since the Middle Ages, when the Church taught its lessons by means of pictures to people who could not read the written word, has art been called upon to serve in so many ways. The National Committee on Public Information has found it necessary to have a Division of Pictorial Publicity with headquarters at 200 Fifth Avenue, New York City, of which Charles Dana Gibson is chairman. The Camouflage Corps, under the direction of the Division of Engineers at Washington, has attracted many artists.

Even the Medical Department requires artists.

Throughout the country the artists are doing a full share of war work. Perhaps the museum which has been most active in this direction is that at Toledo, Ohio, where a great number of patriotic meetings have been held, including a War Garden Show. The Toledo Museum has also placed a building on its grounds at the disposal of the Red Cross and of the Woman's

Patriotic League for offices and workrooms.

The severance of trade relations with Germany has thrown the United States upon its own resources and, for the development of industrial art this has been a real service. The year 1917 has seen greater advancement along industrial art lines than at any time in the history of this country. There is still much to be done, however, if we are to hold a foremost place in the commercial war that will surely follow the military peace. Every effort at the present time should be concentrated upon industrial art education.

The greatest progress in industrial design has been in the textile industry because a few men have realized its importance. In New York City the work was started at the American Museum of Natural History, then by the Metropolitan Museum of Art, and later by the Art Alliance of America, which is now working systematically in co-operation with the industry to establish American design for American textile manufacturers on a per-

manent and artistic footing.

The first national convention of the allied home industries was held in New York City in April, 1917. The large attendance of furniture manufacturers, interior decorators, and others dealing in closely allied lines proved the interest manifested in this branch of trade. More than \$500,000,000 is spent annually in the United States for home furnishing, and surely it is worth while cultivating this vast audience.

Some of the craft societies have realized the importance at this time of carrying on the hand industries both for their cultural value and as trades to be taught to disabled men. Among the most active societies in this group are the Detroit Society of Arts and Crafts, the Crafters of Cincin-

nati, and a centre in San Francisco.

Another phase of the same subject is the finding of positions for artists. The United Employment Bureau in New York City had long had an art department and this has recently been merged with the Art Alliance of America, where the work is being carried on systematically and with marked success. Plans are under way whereby the Art Alliance can aid in the establishment of similar art placement centers in other cities.

There have naturally been few new enterprizes this year. At least one new gallery has been opened, however, the Dudley Peter Allen Memorial Art Building at Oberlin College in Ohio, which was dedicated June 12, 1917.

The auction sales of objects of art have continued steadily but without any of marked importance. During the season of 1916-1917 there were 61 sales of paintings. These included 3,052 pictures sold for \$50 and over, bringing a total of \$2,160.49. The highest priced painting of the year was "Going to Market," by Troyon, which was knocked down for \$45,000 on April 17. The highest prices for pictures by American artists were \$16,400 for an Inness and \$15,600 for a Fuller, while the honors for work by a living artist went to J. Francis Murphy, whose "Springtime in the Catskills" at the Humphreys sale brought \$5,000.

The gifts and bequests of the year included about \$2,500,000 to the Metropolitan Museum coming from the estate of John Hoge, of Zanesville, O.; J. B. Dick and Isaac Fletcher, both of New York City. The bequest to the city of Philadelphia of the J. G. Johnson collection of paintings valued at over \$3,000,000. The painter, Henry W. Ranger, bequeathed to the National Academy of Design about \$200,000, the income to be used to purchase paintings by contemporary artists; the Minneapolis Society of Fine Arts received from an anonymous donor the William Ladd collection of etchings valued at about \$225,000; the Cleveland Museum received from Mrs. Mary Warden Harkness a bequest of \$100,000 and her collections will later go to this museum; Worcester, Mass., has received numerous gifts and bequests for its Museum.

The deaths among prominent artists were quite numerous. The man whose personality will be most missed is William M. Chase, the greatest teacher that this country has ever had. Other painters of note who have left us are Ranger, Bunce, Ryder, Enneking. The sculptors include Boyle, Bela Pratt and Moses Ezekiel. Philadelphia lost its great collector, John G. Johnson, and New York one of the pioneer dealers in American pictures, William Macbeth.

In this volume of the American Art Annual the biographical directory of living painter, sculptors, and illustrators, known as "Who's Who in Art" is issued for the ninth time. The number of names has increased to 5,022, whereas two years ago there were only 4,665 names. The number of those who will be found here for the first time is 1,132, while 775 names have been dropped owing to death or because they are no longer active in art work.

To the State representatives and others who have aided in compiling this volume of the American Art Annual, sincere thanks is here tendered. The art activities of this country are multiplying so rapidly that without this co-operation the publication of the record would not be possible.

BOSTON

The art season of 1916-17 in Boston was made memorable by the unveiling, on December 20, 1916, of a new group of mural paintings in the great series which John Singer Sargent is executing for the Boston Public Library. The decoration of the lofty staircase hall of the Special Libraries floor now lacks only four panels. The two great themes of Mr. Sargent's work are Judaism and Christianity, and last year his latest achievement of the sequence came to its maturity.

The great composition, "The Theme of the Madonna," is now in place, relating itself to "The Dogma of the Redemption," of an earlier installation, and completing the decoration for the Christian end of the hall. The dominant features are the two representations of the Madonna, which will take their place with Mr. Sargent's greatest creations-ideal types of woman. In subordinate relation to these are three groups of paintings dealing with the mysteries of the Rosary. The whole reveals itself as a work of over-powering splendor, comparable to some superb choral.

The new group includes also six great lunettes for the ceiling: three dealing with Judaism and three with Christianity. The three Jewish subjects are "The Law," "Gog and Magog," and "The Messianic Era"; the three others are "The Judgment," "Hell," and "The Passing of Souls into Heaven." These new creations of the artist, together with the older paintings, will

rank as the noblest specimens of mural decoration in America.

The Boston public also had an opportunity to see a different side of Sargent's art in the exhibition, comprising fifty or more of his paintings, water colors and drawings, which opened with a private (and expensive!) view, on January 22, at the Copley Gallery on Newbury Street. The exhibition, which again showed him as the masterly painter, included the famous portrait, "Lady Essex," and the celebrated water color called "The Looking Glass." The proceeds from admittance fees went to the American Ambu-

lance Hospital in France.

The year 1916-17 saw the "passing" of Copley Hall, long the home of the Copley Society and the scene of brilliant exhibitions. Sadly the artist occupants of the studios gathered up their pictures and easels and tea-cups to move out, prior to the dismantling of the twenty-five-year-old building in the name of "progress." But Copley Hall "went out" in something like a blaze of glory. Under the auspices of the Copley Society a representative and dignified collection of Zuloaga's work was shown, including the enormous canvas, "My Uncle Daniel and His Family," subsequently purchased by the Boston Museum of Fine Arts. Later in the year the tapestries and carpets from the Royal Palace of the Padro, Madrid, which had been lent by King Alfonso to the Hispanic Society of America, arrived, in the course of their American pilgrimage, in Boston, where they were beautifully housed in Copley Hall under the auspices of the Copley Society. On the night of the Private View, April 25, the vast hall, lighted only by candles, was a scene of unforgetable beauty. The final event in the career of Copley Hall was a remarkably successful and unique exhibition given late in the spring by the artist occupants of the building.

For the second consecutive season the Guild of Boston Artists was represented (during the month of April) by an exhibition of painting and sculpture at the Museum of Fine Arts. It also sent exhibitions to Waterbury, Conn.; New Bedford, Mass.; and Manchester, N. H. The usual fortnightly one-man shows and the general Spring Exhibition gave evidence of the Guild's vigorous and healthy growth.

An exhibition which marked a new departure and scored a decided success was held the first two weeks of May by the women painters of Boston in Vose's Galleries, forty artists being represented. Prizes for the "most popular picture" in the exhibition, to be awarded by the votes of the visitors, were offered by an anonymous "Friend of Art." Jean Nutting Officer received the first prize for her oil painting, "Mother and Child," and the second prize was divided between Mrs. Lillian Wescott Hale and Gertrude Fiske.

The Bialesiock exhibition at Vose's Galleries, seen during parts of February and March, was noteworthy by reason of such canvases as "The Spirit of the Night." Here, also, were shown, a little later, the works of modern butch panners, covering nearly a century of achievement, including such celebrated canvases as "Meditation" and "The Anxious Family," by Israels. During the latter part of March the Vose firm celebrated the 77th anniversary of its founding by a public showing of its remarkable collection of the Barbizon school, including the large and superb "Fontaineblean Oaks," by Isles Durve.

Charles H. Woodbury, the eminent marine painter, on March 19, opened a striking exhibition of his water colors, oils, etchings, and drawings at the Copley Gallery. "The Ten American Painters" exhibited their work at the St. Botolph Club in April, in conjunction with an exhibit of sculpture by

Albert Atkins.

Memorial exhibitions of the works of well-known artists who died during the year were important events. The Guild of Boston artists showed the work of John J. Enneking, the veteran New England landscape painter, whose recent death had been keenly felt. The late Melbourne H. Hardwick, not long after his decease, was also honored by a memorial exhibition at the Boston Art Club, in February. The death of J. A. S. Monks, the sheep painter, who, like Mr. Enneking, was a veteran in his field, occurred in March. The large and comprehensive showing of his works at the Boston Art Club earlier in the season, supervised by himself, proved, in fact, to be a splendid "memorial exhibition." The sudden death of Bela L. Pratt was a serious loss to American sculpture. Mr. Pratt was at work, at the time of his decease, on a statue of the late Phillips Brooks.

Among the novelties of the year should be placed the exhibition of architecture and "allied arts" held at the Institute of Technology in the fall of

1916.

The Boston public, as usual, was quick to take alvantage of the annual spring "open week" of the Isabella Stuart Gardner Museum in the Fenway, which occurred in March.

The opening of Amos Lawrence's unique "shop" at 85 Chestnut Street revealed the transformation of a prosaic dwelling house into a veritable little museum of rare antiques—an inspiration to collectors and connoisseurs.

The beginning of July saw Boston art lovers giving an enthusiastic welcome to Percy MacKaye's pageant-drama of "Caliban," which was fittingly produced for ten consecutive evenings, in the Harvard Stadium, "on the greatest stage in the most perfect out-door theater in America." Thousands of people from Greater Boston towns, in addition to well-known players, were in the cast of the wonderful play, which drew its thousands of spectators from practically all New England. The proceeds were given to the Metropolitan Chapter of Red Cross and Reserve Officers' Training Corps of Harvard.

The late Sir Herbert Tree's performances in Shakespeare, in October, were a rare treat to lovers of the best in dramatic art, and all too few to satisfy his admirers. The splendid pageantry and impressive acting in "King Henry VIII," with Sir Herbert as Wolsey and Edith Wynne Matthison as Queen Katharine, were especially appreciated. The Henry Jewett players scored a wonderful success all through the season at the little Copley Theatre in their well-acted repertoire of Shaw, Oscar Wilde, Pinero, Henry, Arthur Jones, and the other "moderns." Sarah Bernhardt appeared twice at the Opera House and the Russian dances were also welcomed back.

Galli-Curci, from the Chicago Opera House, was the bright star in the musical firmament, and her début in concert at Symphony Hall was a red-letter occasion. Her success was instant and overwhelming.

TREND OF ART IN CHICAGO

In making a survey of any phenomena, the larger point of view grasps the spirit rather than the detail. And so, while scanning the field of art in the midwest, and the Chicago region in particular, the facts betray a distinctly popular expression. The achievements come from groups of persons rather than from individuals. It is possible to count community movements in the graphic arts, music, and dramatic pageantry, while it is difficult to discover a single individual of dazzling accomplishment. The significant spectacle is the lively endeavor of associations toward the appreciation of artistic creations. Every group has an aim of its own, to seek and to preserve beauty in some form, be it in effecting an ideal city plan, in promoting an interest in American painting or sculpture, or in assisting in the creation of a work of art.

Chicago is a city of many nations. Democratic, though it is, the enthusiasm of its undertakings reaches far beyond its limits, dominating the interest of other cities a day distant. The Art Institute exhibitions draw viewers from Indianapolis, St. Louis, Minneapolis, and Milwaukee, although these cities have museums of their own. The extension exhibitions of the Art Institute, the Chicago Society of Artists, the Chicago Society of Etchers, visit the State University and the smaller towns whose art circles in return

are linked with the Chicago popular movements.

The popularizing of art in an educational way, spreads a feast, that is, presents opportunity. It is distictly opposite from the older method of drilling facts in student classes. The art department of the Illinois State Federation of Women's Clubs inspires the parents to reach the children, while the Public School Art Society attracts the children by the lure of art in order to reach the home. The Congressional District groups of women's clubs have their art sections which develop the neighborhood talents by exhibits of work by home artists, and in all these circles, linked with the city groups, goes on a propaganda for better architecture of the home, more tasteful interior decoration, public school adornment, the solace of pictures, and never-ending vistas of noble art of the past.

What has been done in Chicago during 1917 is the carrying out of the City Plan, which in spite of the stress of war unfolds in widened streets and schemes for parks and boulevards. Added to the former plan this year, is the Jarvis Hunt idea of constructing an island a mile from shore from the earth taken from the excavation of the Subway. The island of many hundreds of acres will extend two miles or more to the south. Its inner and outer beaches on Lake Michigan available for boating and bathing afford a charming playground off the city proper for thousands in summer. And on a greater scale than this, is the Forest Preserve, a belt of native rivers and woodland embracing the city north, west and south in a chain of natural parks. 1917 is famous for purchases of land in the Forest Preserve region. The Municipal Pier, a vast structural lace work in steel extending over a

The Municipal Pier, a vast structural lace work in steel extending over a mile lakeward, justifies its usefulness to armies of foreigners. Here the Municipal Art League, the Civic Commission for the Encouragement of Local Art, the Drama League, the Civic Music Association, the Community Music and Chicago Band co-operate in art for the eye in painting and sculpture, for the ear in concerts and dramatic reading and for the delights of

all the senses in pageantry, dramatic performance and the aesthetic dance. If ever an appeal to the nobler forms of beauty could awaken the soul, surely it must be heard here in this superb temple of the arts for the people.

In the spring of the year, the Pageant of the Dunes was enacted on the sands of Lake Michigan in Indiana, two hours distant from Chicago; the arts of the drama, of music, of verse and of the dance united in living pictures to draw the imagination of the ten thousand spectators to the tableaux of early history when the Chicago region still echoed to the war cry of the Indian.

The Municipal Art League and its allies of seventy-five men's and women's clubs from every city ward is the most efficient art force in the city at large. The Chicago Society of Artists, and the various art groups are its associates. Its triumph of 1917 was the restriction of billboard liberties in the suit won in the courts. Hereafter a majority of property owners must decide on the location of a billboard, and advertising boards are forbidden on boulevards and parkways.

The Muncipal Art League prizes are a feature of the Arts Crafts, the Chicago Society of Artists and the Art Students League Exhibitions. Their object is to encourage native artists. A recent undertaking is a competition of photographic Chicago views of monuments, public buildings, and vistas for a series of post cards to be published under its auspices. The League promotes gallery tours, exhibitions in the parks, and in the schools. The record last year gave the facts of incredible activity in its committees.

The Men's City Club art committee suggested the erection of small pieces of sculpture in obscure neighborhoods distant from parks. The Municipal Art League responded by offering \$160 in prizes for models in competition, the Western Society of Sculptors to be the jury. The trustees of the Ferguson Fund of \$1,000,000 for sculpture to beautify Chicago, will erect the chosen pieces of sculpture, fountains, or heroic figures, as the results may be.

chosen pieces of sculpture, fountains, or heroic figures, as the results may be. The Robert Reid Navy League Poster came by chance, as it were, to mark an epoch in billboard history. Mr. Reid being in the city offered the design as his contribution to the Navy recruiting service. The Chicago Tribune gave the large wall of a building it owned for advertising purposes, and the billboard firm of Thomas Cusack contributed paint and painters to carry out Mr. Reid's design. The painting of two Jackies wig-wagging, the background a seated female figure representing the motherland Columbia, cannon pointing long uplifting lines right and left, an arched rainbow of hope holding the composition together, and all brilliant in red, white and blue, is visible a mile south on Michigan Avenue. It was intended to appeal to the man on the street—and it does.

The Public School Art Society continues to hang pictures, while specializing on museums of handicrafts for girls in the technical high schools. The Outdoor Art League justified its name by planting over 500 wild crab apple trees at the entrances of parks to paint the bloom of spring for the eyes of city dwellers. The Friends of Our Native Landscape preach the beauty of prairie distances and the need of guarding picturesque sections of Illinois. The Illinois State Fair at Springfield for the first time in its history opened an adequate art hall, exhibiting paintings and sculpture and prints; also an architectural competition with prizes for a farm house, the latter under the auspices of the jury of the Illinois Chapter of the American Institute of Architects.

Of peculiar significance among young people, was the "City Desirable Survey" instituted by the Association of Commerce among the Civic Industrial Clubs in the City High Schools, The results were surprising. An exhibit shown at the Art Institute revealed a wide scope of observations. The Flower Technical High School girls photographed pleasing types of domestic architecture in its ward, the McKinley High School boys collected

types of architecture, one school mapped out well defined zones of residential and manufacturing areas, another made a model of Columbus Park, another mapped its ward to show the need of parks and aesthetic treatment.

During the year 1917, sculpture in Chicago has gained a replica in bronze of Houdon's standing Washington, which is placed on the porch of the Art Institute. Early in 1918, the Daniel Chester French "Republic" in bronze will be erected on its pedestal in the south parks, and the Illinois Monument will be built in the west same. will be built in the west parks. At the same time the foundations will be laid for Lorado Taft's colossal Fountain of Time with its procession of eighty gigantic figures, which are finished and awaiting the final construction of the work.

The foregoing is but a brief outlook upon the activities aspiring to artistic ends in the Chicago region. It will be seen that ambition animates the many rather than the few, and that there is co-operation toward the accomplish-

ment of a joyful consummation in the adventures of art.

DETROIT

The year 1917 in the City of Detroit has been marked by no great artistic advances but by a steady interest in things beautiful, which has tended to equalize the intense industrial spirit and to refine great commercial prosperity. The centres of their civic salvation are the Detroit Museum of Art and The Society of Arts and Crafts.

During the year there have been twenty special exhibitions at the Museum. Through the Panama-Pacific International Exposition, Detroit enjoyed Contemporary French and Belgian Art, representing the major portion of the San Francisco exhibits, collected under the personal supervision of the Curator of the Louvre Museum, Paris, and comprising the work of the

leaders in modern French Art.

Later in the year was hung the Retrospective Collection of French Art, lent by the Luxembourg, Paris. The official Persian exhibit by the Panama-Pacific International Exposition, consisting of tapestries, rugs, embroideries, shawls, cloths, brocades, pottery, manuscripts, furniture, miniature painting, silversmiths' and goldsmiths' work, armor, etc., was shown to crowds. The talks of Dr. Ali Kuli Kahn about it and on the philosophy and religion back

of Persian art were deeply appreciated.

The School of Design, a part of the Museum, has grown in numbers and strength. The Recreation Commission of the city has created a department. of instruction at the Museum, in charge of three teachers, for the benefit, primarily, of school children. Through the co-operation of the Board of Education, the eighth grade pupils were expected to attend the Museum, as a part of their regular school work, and some 240 sections, each comprising from twenty-five to fifty children, came, and in addition some fifty other grade classes, on voluntary pilgrimages. Free sketching classes were held Friday evenings and Saturday mornings. The Public Library has establisher a branch at the Museum, with a specially trained librarian in charge. Free extension lectures, musical programs on each Sunday afternoon, and free lectures by the Detroit Institute of Science and by the Detroit Archæology Society, have crowded the auditorium with thousands. The turnstile registered from July 1, 1916, to May 31, 1917—156,871 visitors.

The opening of the finest Arts and Crafts home in America took place in Detroit in November, 1916. The building itself has been well described in

the June, 1917, number of the American Magazine of Art, but the full scope of the work done there may not be generally known. The Society is not a

mere middleman between craftsman and purchasers, but, besides workshops, salesrooms, and exhibition galleries, has provided social rooms, and a charming theatre, so that all the fine arts are fostered under the one roof. It is one of the most generous, democratic, and far-reaching elements in the entire civic life, offering freely, in the most attractive way, a share in its work and its pleasures. Detroiters appreciate the opportunity of seeing and of buying the best work of American and of foreign craftsmen, and last year the Society ranked second in point of sales in the United States, with a total of \$26,545. This year the gross sales show an increase of 60 per cent. over last year's. One-man shows are often held, though every day the shelves and cases are full of the work put out by artists each among the best in his own line.

Some of the little workshops are occupied permanently by Detroit craftsmen, while others are rented temporarily by outsiders who come to town to give courses in some particular art or craft. The Society's own lampshade department and costume department occupy two. The latter has recently furnished outfits for two productions of "The Tempest,"—one in the East and one in California, for a Christmas Mystery Play at St. Paul's Cathedral, Detroit, for high school productions of "Antigone," "Comedy of Errors," "Prunella," etc., besides lending scenery and costumes and giving much

time and free consultations about other school productions.

Perhaps the most successful work ever done by Miss Helen Plumb and the Misses McEwen, who have this department in charge, has been the cos-

tuming for the Arts and Crafts Theatre during 1916-1917.

The Society, during the past winter, has presented nineteen plays, in six groups, at its own theatre. These have been produced by the gifted and capable Sam Hume, of Boston, with a group of 150 actors and actresses, most of whom had had no previous training and had no "pull," but who had real interest and surprising ability. Under Mr. Hume's capable direction they have given the choicest of dramatic treats with nothing amateurish about them. The theatre seats 350. The stage is as large as those of many commercial playhouses. The stage equipment, including the unusual plaster background and Mr. Hume's specially designed lighting system and adaptable settings, is simple, beautiful, and sufficient because of its adaptableness. The auditorium itself is charming, both in color scheme, arrangement, and general delightfulness. It can be intimately small, just right for a Granville Barker afternoon talk, with the chairs, so charmingly varied in color, afterwards swung cozily about the tea table set in easy reach of the fascinatingly pretty kitchen; or large enough for the worthy interpretation of a master-piece before a larger audience. Performances were given on two evenings and one afternoon for six months, and the expenses were entirely paid by the season subscriptions. The settings by Katherine McEwen, Albert A. Andrews, and others, have been as interesting as beautiful. All have been in the new style of stage decoration, typical of the best work in the new stage craft and much more choice and satisfying than many that the best commercial theatres in our country present. The theatre was designed to produce plays which would not otherwise be seen in Detroit. A high artistic standard has been realized and a higher standard of dramatic appreciation fostered in an already discriminating public. Of the nineteen plays given, one occupied the entire evening and three each comprised four one-act plays. Four were distinctly poetic, while six were either tragedy or serious drama. Their authors were Lord Dunsany, Howard Brock, K. S. Goodman, Frank G. Tompkins, Lawrence Housman, Philip Moeller, Susan Glaspell, Harold Brighouse. Muarice Materlinck, W. B. Maxwell, G. C. Cook, Sir John Hankin, Sam Hume, and Molière.
Public lectures under the auspices of the Museum and The Society of

Arts and Crafts have been given by William Poel and by Granville Barker

of London, by James P. Haney of New York, Campbell Bonner of Ann Arbor, and by Sam Hume of Boston. The Society has launched *The Theatre Arts Magasine*, edited by Sheldon Cheney, with a board of contributing editors comprising Winthrop Ames, Clayton Hamilton, W. P. Eaton, Charles Rahn Kennedy, and Percy Mackaye. They have also brought to the city Stuart Walker's Portmanteau Players for six performances, and a company of students from the Carnegie Institute of Technology, Pittsburgh, who, under the unsurpassed training given by William Poel of London, the head of the Elizabethan Stage Society, gave two remarkable presentations of Ben Johnson's "Poetaster," with the costumes used at a similar performance in London, April, 1916.

NEW YORK CITY

War conditions have changed the aspect of New York City. Its streets are no longer dull drab, but floating flags and brilliant posters give it unusual color. During the spring one parade in honor of a foreign representative was followed by another in rapid succession and the City decked itself in a new color scheme for each event.

The problem of raising funds for war purposes offers many opportunities The problem of raising funds for war purposes offers many opportunities for the special use of artistic ability. Every city has done its share, but perhaps one of the most successful events, from an artistic as well as financial point of view, was the Festa in Macdougal Alley. For three days, June 7, 8 and 9, this little by-way, at one time a row of stables but in recent years transformed into artists' studios, blossomed out into an Italian street. Plaster balconies were added and house fronts entirely transformed to simulate broad houses with towers where in reality there were but two-story stables; the balconies were brilliarly hung with hanners. were but two-story stables; the balconies were brilliantly hung with banners, and there was music, and other attractions. Crowds flocked to the Festa eager to see what had been accomplished and to exchange their silver and bank-notes for the pleasure and amusement offered by these clever artists.

The flood of posters which has innundated the country was evident in New York in even a greater degree than elsewhere. The posters were everywhere; shop windows displayed them and they decorated the outside and inside of Fifth Avenue stages as well as being plastered over every available hoarding. But New York and Washington shared one phase of the poster problem unknown to other cities. It was to these two cities that original designs for posters were sent and committees examined thousands in the hope of finding one that would give a real "thrill," but without success. The women artists organized the Art War Relief with headquarters at

661 Fifth Avenue and knitted or rolled bandages just like all other women. The men within draft age departed, entered the camouflage corps, or volunteered for other service. The older men did their share through raising

A sale of paintings by American artists was held by the Committee of One Hundred for the benefit of the French artists. The sale at the American Art Galleries of 168 works netted \$14,330. Other activities included the award by the National Arts Club of \$500 for a valor medal, \$250 for the best American war poem and \$250 for the best American war song. A poster stamp was also issued by the Club and is sold for the benefit of the artists' relief. Unrest is not conducive to great creative art and no epoch making works were shown.

All these activities were very well for the artists who could afford to be comparatively idle but for others the suffering is great. The Art Alliance of America, realizing the needs at this time broadened its scope, enlarged its quarters and, for the duration of the war, will confine its efforts to work along industrial art lines. Exhibitions were held of hand decorated

textiles and of textile designs, of Liberty Loan posters and of box covers. A placement section was established which finds positions in the art field for both men and women. This work is being encouraged in other cities

and aided by the Alliance.

The museums have continued their usual activities, though each staff has been greatly reduced through enlistments. The Metropolitan held a Memorial Exhibition of painting by the late William M. Chase and showed an important collection of eighteenth century English paintings lent by John H. McFadden of Philadelphia. The Print Department was opened with an exhibition in the new south wing, and the north wing, from which the Morgan collection had been withdrawn, was rearranged. Bequests received by the Metropolitan Museum during the year totalled nearly \$3,000,000. The Brooklyn Museum held several interesting exhibitions, the most notable being that of early American portraits and furniture.

Auction sales included no great collections nor were there any startling prices. In the dealers' galleries the important works sold for high prices but the demand for medium and low-priced pictures was much below the normal. One-man and group "shows" were held regularly.

The societies continue to have their exhibitions at the usual dates. Two

new societies were formed. The Painter-Gravers which aims to cultivate American taste for the graphic arts held an interesting first exhibition extremely well displayed in a small gallery. The Society of Independent Artists, heralded as having "No jury and no prizes," filled the Grand Central Palace. This exhibition was open to all upon payment of \$1 initiation fee and \$5 annual dues. Pictures to the number of about 2,500 were hung alphabetically. The exhibition was neither an artistic nor a financial success. Perhaps the declaration of war just at the time of the opening prevented people from going to see this exhibition, or was it the war atmosphere that

produced so many discordant works?

*Not more than one in twenty of the entertainments that take place in New York's theatres has even a remote connection with art. A review of this pathetic minority, however, shows two remarkable developments. Of these the more remarkable is the fact that in the glorified musical extravaganza there is a closer approach to art on the pictorial side than in any other form of entertainment. Such productions as "The Century Girl," for instance, are essentially picture shows, although it is still the fashion in certain quarters to allude to them cheaply as "leg shows." But the fact is that they are giving a taste and appreciation for beauty of color and line—in costume as in the scenery—to thousands of people who could never be dragged into art museums by teams of wild horses. They make an intelligent effort at an organized use of color and the effect of color upon human emotions. Primarily, of course, this development is due to the influence of the Russian ballet and particularly of Leon Bakst. Without this influence Joseph Urban, who is responsible for most of the beautiful spectacles we have seen in New York in the last three years, would not be the fashionable scene painter of the day. The fact that he has this position is significant. He himself is an enthusiastic disciple of Adolphe Appia, undoubtedly the greatest scenic artist the history of the stage has ever

Mr. Urban is not alone, however, in creating scenery of real beauty that stimulates the imagination of the audience and illumines the meaning of the author. Men like Lee Simonson—his work is an obvious result of the influence of Bakst-Sam Hume and Robert Jones have contributed a good deal towards raising the creation of an art of stage decoration in America, an art that until recently existed only in the form of puerile parody.

The other important development is the growth of such organizations as the Washington Square Players, and the Provincetown Players. It is these people, chiefly, who are satisfying the taste of that increasing class of people who would like to go to the theatre but are repelled by the stupidity of the Broadway show. The Washington Square Players have acted works by the foremost European dramatists, such as Maeterlinck, Wedekind, and Andreive and mounted them with discrimination, sympathy and good taste. The Provincetown Players have produced in Eugene O'Neill and Susan Glassell. American players have show real promise

Glaspell, American playwrights who show real promise.

Aside from these developments the most important things that happened in the theatre were William Faversham's production of Bernard Shaw's "Misalliance." It was, by the way, at another small theatre, the Neighborhood Playhouse, that Gertrude Kingston gave Dunsany's "The Queen's Enemies." Stuart Walker with his Portmanteau Theatre brought Dunsany's "The Gods of the Mountain," "King Argimenes and the Unknown Warrior" and "The Golden Doom." Arnold Daly gave a superb performance in Hermann Bahr's "The Moster"

and "The Golden Doom." Arnold Daly gave a superb performance in Hermann Bahr's "The Master."

The novelties at the Metropolitan Opera House were the Richard Strauss version of "Iphigenia in Tauris," very badly done; Zandonai's "Francesca da Rimini" and Reginald de Koven's "The Canterbury Pilgrims," the libretto being by Percy Mackaye. The obvious purpose of the last was to ridicule the idea of American opera. It succeeded. There were revivals of "Thais," "Lakme," "Les Pêcheurs de Perles," "Le Nozze di Figaro," "Fidelio," and "L'Elisir d'Amore." The last named was quite delightfully sung, and the revivals of Figaro and Lakme were interesting as was part of "Les Pêcheurs."

The theatre has felt the influence of the war much less than has painting and sculpture, but it is a question how long this can continue. The year has been an eventful one in many ways, but the future requires much thought and effort on the part of those who have the good of the "cause" at heart. It is our duty to prepare now for the reconstruction after the war in art as in other lines of activity. How to carry the aesthetic influence and the power of beauty into every-day life of the masses is the problem.

OHIO

In Ohio the Year in Art has been made notable by the establishment of two new art galleries. They are the Dudley Peter Allen Memorial Art building at Oberlin College, and J. G. Butler's art gallery at Youngstown, Ohio, now in course of construction. The former, dedicated on June 12, fulfills three functions. It provides a place for the teaching of the history of art, studios for classes in applied art, and a building for the housing of the permanent collection of the art objects of Oberlin College, including those paintings formerly kept in the Olney gallery. The buildings consist of a nearly square main building done in the north Italian Renaissance style which houses the galleries, classrooms and library, connected by a cloister court with a long, low building of north Italian Romanesque architecture, in which are located the studios. The museum will house, in addition to the Olney collection, the college's modern paintings, Oriental rugs, Chinese pottery, Rookwood pottery, silver objects, and Japanese and Chinese paintings. The library is exceedingly well equipped with books and photographs for the comprehensive study of art history. The sculpture court will contain a good collection of casts. The building is the gift of Mrs. Dudley P. Allen of Cleveland in memory of her husband. They founded, during Dr. Allen's life, a professorship in history and appreciation of art, thus assuring competent instruction for Oberlin students. The Cleveland Museum of Art completed its first year on June 5. Since the close of the Inaugural Exhibition in September, 1916, the galleries have been occupied by the permanent collections as well as local and temporary exhibitions. The museum places particular stress upon American Colonial art, one of its most notable examples being a portrait of Nathaniel Herd by Copley. The museum is also rich in French sculpture, possessing one of Rodin's "Burghers of Calais," his "Le Penseur" and a large bronze head of another of the "Burghers of Calais." It also possesses bronzes and marbles by Carpeaux, Rivière and others. Many important acquisitions have been made during the year, the gifts including the thirty-four paintings presented by Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Wade, the Worcester R. Warner collection of Oriental art with an endowment for maintaining the same, the John Huntington collection of Egyptian art, art of the East and far East, Colonial paintings and Renaissance and Gothic art, and a bequest from Mrs. Charles W. Harkness including European porcelain, paintings and an endowment fund.

The museum's activities are as important as its collections, its educational department being of great value to the city of Cleveland. There is marked co-operation between the public schools and the museum, the principals of the former being authorized to send pupils to the museum during school hours. As a result about 250 classes have worked in the museum in connection with history, geography and English. Classes in drawing are also maintained for school children. Clubs and classes of adults meet there frequently for their programs or their talks on art by the museum staff. On Sunday afternoon during the winter there is a gallery talk at four o'clock. An Saturday afternoon there is an entertainment for young people, including talks, music, motion pictures and illustrated lectures. Each month the museum sends to the branch libraries of Cleveland an exhibition of supplementary museum material, together with articles explaining briefly the history of the country and its artistic background. The museum closed its first year with an attendance of 376,459, a remarkable record.

Also very active in Cleveland is the newly-formed Cleveland Art Association which was organized to establish an art centre where all the art interests of the city may converge. It co-operates with the Cleveland Museum of Art and the Cleveland School of Art and does the work which neither is prepared to do for itself. Its varied activities include the renting of studios, the arrangement of exhibitions, the development of an art labor exchange, the foundation of scholarships in the Cleveland Art School, the securing of suitable decorations for the city's public buildings and the enriching of the museum's collections. It is expected that it will become a very powerful force in the development of art in Cleveland. In July Mr. George E. Gage, Cleveland's leading art dealer, opened his beautiful galleries to the Persian exhibition from the Panama-Pacific Exposition, the

proceeds from the show going to the local Red Cross.

The past year has been a very active and memorable one in Toledo. Besides furnishing a storehouse for art treasures, and being the center of all artistic activities, many of the movements for civic betterment are initiated and carried on by the museum. The past year has been devoted especially to patriotic services. The museum has furnished a recently acquired building in the museum grounds to the Red Cross and the Women's Patriotic League for their offices and workrooms. The museum has been opened freely to all patriotic meetings, a great number of which have been held there. In addition to this several members of the museum staff have served on the speakers bureau for the Liberty Loan and the Red Cross, and were very active in both campaigns.

For the past three years the museum has held flower and vegetable garden contests. These gave place this year to the Museum War Garden

Show, at which were exhibited some of the best products of Toledo's 27,000 war gardens. The Museum Bird Club's membership has been increased to 15,000. The attendance of children at the museum is especially large. For their benefit educational motion pictures were shown, as in previous years, and children selected from the public and parochial schools were given free instruction in modelling and design. Opera hours were held at which the stories of the operas were told and the music played

and illustrated by steriopticon slides.

Especially fine temporary exhibitions were held during the year, including five large sections of the Panama-Pacific International Exposition, as well as the annual summer show of American paintings. There have been many important acquisitions, among which may be mentioned "Apple Blossoms" by Arnold M. Gorter, "Jeanne Cartier" by F. Luis Mora. "Memories" by F. C. Frieseke, the Barber collection of American glass, bust of Power's "Greek Slave," Evelyn B. Longman's "Victory," and many prints and classical antiquities. Talks on art have been given by members of the staff to many organizations, both in Toledo and surrounding cities. Lectures on art, archæology, travel, civics, literature, drama, etc., are held in the museum.

The Director of the museum is President of the Toledo Center, Drama League of America, and one of the directors of the Civic Music League of

Toledo, thus broadening the scope of the museum's influence.

The most important event of the year was the completion on January 1 of the raising of an endowment fund for the maintenance of the museum building. A generous portion of this was invested in Liberty Bonds.

In the spring the art organizations of Toledo united to form the Toledo Federation of Art Societies. This association will hold an annual exhibition at the Toledo Museum of Art, giving encouragement to the producing

artists of the city.

Cincinnati has long been an art center and its museum is one of the old institutions of the country. There the work outlined last year has been further developed, lectures being given in public schools and libraries by members of the staff to familiarize the people of Cincinnati and surrounding cities with the works contained in the museums. The series of half tone reproductions was enlarged and the prints widely distributed. Travelling exhibitions were sent out to various points. Through the museum, the Municipal Art Society placed many reproductions in the public school. That society had much to do with the erection in the spring of 1917 of the heroic bronze statue of Lincoln by George Gray Barnard. This was presented to the city of Cincinnati by Mr. and Mrs. Charles P. Taft. The collections of the museum continued their normal growth, notable acquisitions being "The Legend of the Bell" by Zurbaran, a portrait of Professor Loeffts by Frank Duveneck, a fine Twachtman, "Under the Willows" by Frieseke, and a canvas by Fortuny, which was added to the Emery collection. The usual special exhibitions, fourteen in number, were held. The museum keeps itself in touch with the community not only through the permanent collection but through the four hundred students to whom training is given in the art academy.

Especially notable in Cincinnati art circles was the meeting of the College Art Association in the spring, in connection with which the museum arranged special exhibitions and to the members of which it extended many courtesies. The Crafters Company conducted an important industrial art exhibition showing the work in applied art done in Cincinnati from day

to day.

The Federation of Women's Clubs is doing a great work throughout the state by sending to the smaller towns exhibitions of reproductions of paintings in the museums of the state, and an exhibition of reproductions of

American paintings. The latter gives a comprehensive but brief history of

the development of painting in America.

In all of the other cities of the state there is a growing love for and interest in art. Columbus, Dayton, Zanesville and many others hold one or more exhibitions annually either in public schools or public libraries and the attendance at these is always large. Within a few years there will be many more small museums in the State. NINA STEVENS.

SAN FRANCISCO

The year has seen renewed evidence of San Francisco's appreciation of her surroundings and has added materially to the beauty of the city. Few scars of the fire remain, and these await their revivification behind huge hoardings, which have become a real source of joy when they display posters as fine as those of Maxfield Parrish.

Domestic architecture has made great strides along the line of picturesque and livable bill houses often built of stone, concrete or plastered, and making the city white in the light of the setting sun. The completion of the Twin Peaks tunnel brings into close connection with the center of town a large group of delightful new residence districts laid out in winding roads and terraced gardens, fog-swept and refreshing on the seaward side of the hills. The whole top of the doubled-pointed landmark itself has, in San Francisco's inimitable way, been made into a public reservation and lookout reached by fine roads which have turned even hilly San Francisco into an automobile town.

. Notable among the new buildings and delighting the eye of the trans-bay arrival is the stately pile of brick and marble designed by Bliss and Faville, to house the Southern Pacific's offices. With the ferry tower and, across the blue bay, Oakland's high city hall and Berkeley's shimmering white campanile, this Italian Renaissance structure strikes again the note of kinship between San Francisco and the famous cities of the Mediterranean Sea.

San Francisco naturally develops the open-air and community forms of art. The large civic auditorium is used by the people for the regular Sunday Symphony concerts and for such extensive affairs as the French Colony's celebration of the Fall of the Bastille. Festivals and fêtes are, however, ordinarily held in the streets, Golden Gate Park, or the Greek theater in the college town, where Sunday after Sunday sees the populace in family groups listening to concerts by local bands and orchestras and the best talent that comes to the Coast.

On Mt. Tamalpais and in the Greek theater, the Mountain Play Association has given "Jeppe-on-the-Hill," a comedy in three acts translated from the Danish by Ludwig Holweg; and the Player's Club of San Francisco, assisted by the Californian, Beatriz Michelena, gave "The Talisman," and "Matsuo," the one-act Japanese tragedy, which proved so great a success

in the Little Theaters.

In the southern part of the state, where much dramatic talent finds encouragement, Mary Daggett's new Chinese play, "The Second Son," is the

most notable production of the year.

Closely allied with architecture, both painting on walls and decorative sculpture have been given opportunity for notable work in buildings new and old.

Arthur Mathews has completed his beautiful series of wall paintings for the State Capitol at Sacramento, making that fine colonial building more than ever a part of California's treasure.

The adornment of the Masonic Temple by Ralph Stackpole's dignified figures and its interior decoration by the mural work of Mr. Mathews and his corps of workers; the enhancement of the St. Francis Hotel by the fine animal sculpture of Arthur Putnam and the paintings by Albert Herter, the beautiful Maxfield Parrish mural in the Grill of the Palace Hotel, have set a high standard of art in public places and still contribute to the joy of life. Latest to be put in its place, and closest to the walks of the people is Arthur Mathews' wall painting dedicated to Art and Mechanics and

placed in the entrance to the Mechanic's Institute and Library.

In its growth as a community, San Francisco seems to have formed three centers of art influence, each with its own distinctive work to do. Oldest, and representative of what has been accumulated in local power of expression is that small but potent center known as "1717 California Street." Here Arthur Mathews, so long director of the San Francisco Art School, and his co-laborers gathered together the remnants of their studio effects after the fire, and here ever since has emanated a spirit of high art in the form of beautiful books, well-designed furniture or schemes of decoration

for the use of architects.

Adequate exhibition of the work of all local painters has not been held in any one place, but in the numerous art stores, one-man exhibitions, like the summer exhibit of Bruce Nelson's excellent canvases, have been hung; and at the print shop of Hill Tolerton an unusual effort to give the public good exhibitions from other places has culminated in the showing of war

posters and etchings by that viril master, Frank Brangwyn.

At the levelled exposition grounds the adventurous bowman still ventures on a crumbling column before a sea-scape as fine and under skies as blue as ever the exposition saw. Against distant Tamalpais, the new Normal School once the "California Buildings," enveloped in its restoration scaffolding, keep company with the Palace of Fine Arts rising above its garlanded lagoon. Bereft of most of its out-door statuary, the colonnade is still beautiful; and the new museum records an attendance of 164,150 people during the year ending May 1, 1917.

Around this ambitious art center the rejuvenated Art Association has gathered its forces and broadened the scope of its eduactional work in exhibitions, docent lectures, and other museum activities correlated with

its re-organized art school on Nob Hill.

In the rotunda of the Museum are the murals from the exposition buildings and the Spreckles collection of Rodin bronzes and casts. The great Brangwyn paintings, though shorn of appropriate setting, are still glowing and fine. Opening from this hall are conference and study rooms and a club room for enlisted men which more than justifies the gift by the Federal Government of the ground on which the museum stands.

The Exhibition galleries include the Chase room and the Hungarian

Exhibitions, and such enlightening collections as that of 400 examples of the contemporary graphic art of Holland, and the best of the travelling

exhibitions of American art.

Mrs. Phoebe Hearst has lent, as a nucleus for the historic and comparative museum, her fine collection of noted tapestries and many interesting textiles, wrought-iron and carved wood pieces, illuminated books and paintings by European masters,—a veritable boon to art lovers and students on the Pacific Coast.

In two rooms convenient for study, are the casts illustrative of the development of Greek Sculpture, presented to San Francisco by the Greek Government, and here too, curiously enough, in strange seclusion from the stir of warlike preparation in the world, there may be found those queer experiments in paint, the work of futurists, cubists and what not, which filled "The Annex" at the Fair, now hanging as quietly as they may, in a far room of the museum, like flotsam and jetsam of art washed up and forgotten on civilization's western shore.

Art for the outmost circle, for the people who demand their paintings and their sculpture with their band concerts on Sunday afternoon, may be found at our third art nucleus in the museum at Golden Gate Park, where generous additions have been made this year by Mr. M. H. de Young and other patrons of the people's art. Caught by the decoration on an old sword hilt or by a familiar scene depicted by an unknown hand, the idler here may first become the serious student and be led to the many deeper fonts of art.

More fundamental in its relation to the people is the noticeable tendency the war has had to drive art deeper into life. In San Francisco this is known in the training of teachers to give individual instruction, in the use of art as a basis for vocational training and in the surprisingly original color work done by children in all walks of life and exhibited in the

color work done by children in all walks of life and exhibited in the children's room at the Fine Arts Museum.

At the University of California Summer School where teachers and students congregated, this vitalizing of art was emphasized. Domestic Art, instead of struggling for recognition, was on a pedestal; and Design under the broad and practical treatment given it by Henry Hunt Clark of the Boston Museum, was seen to be the very foundation of Art. Correlated with these popular courses the work of Professor C. E. Seashore of Iowa State University put art in step with our stirring times by teaching the use of practical physchology in the selection of leaders fit to receive special training. This idea found immediate application by President Frederick Burk of the San Francisco State Normal School, where that attention Burk of the San Francisco State Normal School, where that attention and encouragement elsewhere given to subnormals is granted to normal and especially gifted children.

The eighth annual convention was held in Washington, D. C., May 16, 17, and 18, 1917. "Art and Civilization" was the general topic. Hennen Jennings presided at the first session, at which the Address of Welcome was made by Hon. James L. Slayden; and papers given on "The Place of Art in a Democracy," by Hon. Breckinridge Long; "Outdoor Art in Washington," by Charles Moore; and a "Review of the Year's Work," by the Secretary, Leila Mechlin. John Frederick Lewis, President of the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts, presided at the second session which was devoted to the subject "New Currents—Modern Art and Modern Methods" with papers on "Modern Art," by Duncan Phillips; "The High Cost of Art," by Florence N. Levy; and "Art and Citizenship," by I. B. Stoughton Holborn. At the third session John W. Beatty, Director of the Department of Fine Arts, Carnegie Institute, presided; and the general subject was "Open Channels—Educational Work." The papers were on "Art in State Fairs," by Dudley Crafts Watson; "Art Exhibitions in Colleges," by George Breed Zug; and "Museum Methods," by Mrs. George W. Stevens. John R. Van Derlip, President of the Minneapolis Institute of Arts, presided at the fourth session when the general subject of consideration was "Inland Streams—The Useful Arts." Col. Harts gave an impromptu ten minutes' talk on "The Open Air Theatre" which has recently been constructed in Washington under Government auspices, and papers were read on "The Place of Industrial Art in Art Museums," by George G. Booth; "The Art of the Immigrant," by Henry Hornbostel, and "The Future of the Handicrafts," by H. Percy Macomber. At the fifth session Charles L. Hutchinson, President of the Art Institute of Chicago, presided and the general subject was "The Great Sea—Correlating the Arts." The papers were on "Socializing Art in Chicago," by Lena M. McCauley; "The Dramatic Work Shop," by George Pierce Baker; "The Theatre and the Studio," by Thomas Wood Stevens; and "Community Music," by Arthur Farwell. Robert W. de Forest, Presi-

dent of the Federation, presided at the last session, when reports of special committees were presented and other business transacted. The convention was concluded by the annual dinner attended by 215 persons. "The Message of Art Today" was the general subject, and the speakers were E. Raymond Bossange, Robert Underwood Johnson, Hermon MacNeil, Ernest Peixotto, Victor Horta, Senator Phelan, Senator John Sharp Williams and Edward Robinson.

By invitation of the Handicraft Club of Baltimore, a number of the delegates visited the handicraft exhibition at the Peabody Institute and were taken through Roland Park and other beautful suburbs, visiting the unique

garden of Mrs. Bouton, which includes an open air theatre.

The next annual meeting will be held in Detroit, Mich., May 23 and

24, 1918.

The educational work is chiefly along four lines. It sends out exhibitions of high standards circulates typewritten paintings and other works of art of high standard; circulates typewritten lectures on the fine and applied arts, accompanied by illustrative stereopticon slides; publishes monthly "The American Magazine of Art," which is specially purposed for the general reader; and issues the "American Art Annual," which is the standard book of reference for art in the United States.

A series of outlines for study courses on American art with a bibliography have been issued in pamphlet form, also portfolios containing reproductions

of 24 notable works of American sculpture.

During the year 1916-17 The American Federation of Arts sent out 31 collections, which were shown in 125 cities in the South, East, and Middle West. A complete list of the last season's exhibitions is given on page. To organizations which are chapters of The American Federation of Arts no fee is charged for expert service, but each place pays its proportionate share of actual cost incident to collection, transportation and insurance. To non-chapters a charge is made for expert and clerical services.

The twenty-one illustrated lectures circulated have been on the following subjects: American Painting, American Illustration, American Sculpture, Civic Art, American Mural Painting, Whistler's Etchings, Tapestries, Furniture, Contemporary Art Movements in America, Design—its Use and Abuse, Contemporary Paintings in Europe and America, George Inness, Mezzotint Engravings, Municipal Art Commissions and their Work, Painters of the Mode, Rembrandt, Lace, British Painting, Boston Museum, Art in the Public Schools, and Sorolla. Each has been written by an authority and is illustrated by about fifty slides. The lectures are adapted to accompany the illustrations so that they can be delivered by any good reader. These have been sent to places where authoritative lecturers could not be secured (without fee to chapters, and upon the payment of \$3 by others) at the cost of transportation and a guarantee against loss by breakage.

The Federation's Bureau of Information has been made possible and of much value by the co-operation of its Standing Committees composed of the foremost authorities in the several branches of art. Questions of importance which have been presented to the Federation have been referred to

these committees.

Rutherford Mead Fund and the Daniel H. Burnham Fund); in sculpture, \$1,000 a year for three years (every third year this Fellowship is provided by the Rinehart Fund of the Peabody Institute of Baltimore, Md.); in painting, \$1,000 a year for three years (every third year this fellowship is provided by the Lazarus Fund of the Metropolitan Museum of Art, New York. See Vol. XI, p. 200); in landscape architecture, \$1,000 a year for three years (this fellowship is awarded every third year and is provided by the American Society of Landscape Architects. Next competition 1918). The awards are made on competitions which are open to all unmarried men, citizens of the United States, without age limit, who fulfill the requirements of the Academy.

A Bulletin is issued monthly, October to May. The Scammon lectures are published annually. Regular weekly classes are held for adults and lectures on the collections given to clubs by the Museum instructor. Classes for public school pupils are a part of the educational work for children, together with the children's hour Saturday mornings and afternoons. Art study outlines are issued for the use of students, and a class-room is provided for stereopticon talks. There is also a class-room in the Ryerson Library for the use of visiting classes. Besides its collection of over 12,000 books, the library has a clipping file, a postcard collection, and lantern slides and photographs for rental. An art school is maintained in the Museum building (see school section). An Extension Department has been established, with a program of traveling exhibits and accompanying lectures.

The building was enlarged by the opening of the new East Wing in November, 1916, the main floor of which is named the Frank W. Gunsaulus Hall of Industrial Arts and the second floor of which is divided into nine

galleries for temporary exhibitions.

Established by City ordinance November 9, 1914. Consists of seven members appointed for terms of four years. It is empowered to select and purchase paintings, sculpture, and other works of art produced by residents of Chicago, and to place them in City buildings. Annual meeting, first Monday after the first Sunday in January. First annual appropriation \$2,500.

The 1916 appropriation from the City of Chicago was \$4,500. Twenty

paintings by artists of Chicago and vicinity were purchased. The entire collection of the Commission is used for exhibition purposes in public schools,

public parks and similar places.

B. F. FERGUSON MONUMENT FUND

Art Institute of Chicago

For work accomplished see Volume XI, p. 99.

Established by bequest of Benjamin Franklin Ferguson of Chicago, who died in 1905. Annual meeting first Thursday in January. The principal is over \$1,000,000; the annual income of over \$34,000 is expended by the Art Institute of Chicago in the erection and maintenance of statuary and monuments in the parks and other public places of Chicago. Balance to credit of the Fund Dec. 31, 1916, was \$209,389 and liabilities on contracts let amounted to about \$105,000.

During 1915-16 a commission was awarded to Henry Bacon and Evelyn B. Longman for a monument to be erected in Logan Square to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the admission of Illinois as a State and to be dedicated Dec. 3, 1918. Also a commission to Bela Pratt for a memorial statue to Alexander Hamilton to be placed in Grant Park, Chicago. In co-operation with the World's Columbian Exposition Directors, a commission was given to Daniel C. French for the erection in Jackson Park of a bronze replica of his "Statue of the Republic."



Expenditures: for maintenance, \$21,093.36; for additions to collections \$362.98 (for works by American Artists \$930), 124 tions to collections, \$3,624.98 (for works by American Artists, \$930). 124 objects were purchased during the year; 640 acquired by gift. There are 3,566 objects in the Museum; 1,466 books in the Library; 2,442 photographs; 1,453 lantern slides. There were 47,268 visitors during the year; 13,713 children and teachers visited the Museum; 20 exhibitions held; 106 lectures and talks.

Chartered 1870; present building opened 1909. Annual meeting third Thursday in January; Board meetings third Thursdays in April, July and October. Annual dues of subscribers \$10; membership 1,796. During 1916 attendance was 265,409; Print Study Room visited by 2,167 persons; 2,553 students worked in the Textile Study Room; 5.241 in the Library, and 3,453 in the Photograph Room.

The collections of the Museum cover practically the entire field of art, though there has been no attempt to form an architectural collection. The most remarkable collection is in Oriental art, the assemblage of Japanese objects being unequalled outside Japan. The collection of classical antiquities is very noteworthy, while the Egyptian department has a unique collection of early Empire sculpture together with good examples of the work of later periods. The Museum's print department offers the best opportunity in America to study the history of the engraver's art. Improvements for the display of the collection of Greek sculpture have been made by the construction of an alcove with top light for the Three-sided Relief, sometimes called the Throne, which permits the proper exhibition of this most important piece of marble sculpture in the Museum.

The Museum issues a bi-monthly Bulletin, annual reports, handbook of the Museum, and special catalogues. The Handbook (twelfth edition), is free to annual subscribers on application to the Secretary. A Catalogue of Arretine Moulds in the Museum Collection, by Prof. George H. Chase, and a catalogue of the Collection of Prints from the Liber Studiorum by J. M. W. Turner, privately printed, add to the publications of the Museum. A Leaflet Guide to the Museum is issued in vest-pocket size, giving directions for reaching all the departments and a plan of the galleries. With the Inserts issued regularly the Guide gives a complete outline account of all the Museum has to show, corrected up to the day it is issued. The Print Collector's Quarterly is published for the Museum. The registry of local art has been continued in co-operation with the Municipal Art Commission.

A School of Arts is maintained (see school section). The educational activities, under the direction of a Supervisor of Educational Work, include docent service, special talks on subjects in the Museum on Sunday afternoons, and University Extension courses in the Museum. Sunday docent service includes informal guidance of small groups (not more than six persons), the objects to be studied being determined by the wish of the majority. Persons may receive training in museum work by serving as volunteer assistants. The photograph department lends to schools, clubs and classes in the immediate vicinity of Boston.

The free educational courses, lectures and exhibitions offered by the Comnission on Extension Courses, the Lowell Institute and the Boston Public Library during 1916-17 included 13 lectures on art topics. The exhibition room at the Central Library was devoted during the winter to weekly exhibitions arranged to illustrate lectures given. Thirty Branches and Stations had exhibitions which were opened on the first Wednesday of each month and continued for two weeks.





The educational work of the Museum includes: Saturday morning lectures on the collections in the Museum; a class-room with lantern for teachers and pupils where the work is conducted in co-operation with art schools, colleges, high schools, elementary public schools, private schools, civic societies, women's clubs and the general public. The Museum is open at night to any organization assuring an attendance of 200 or more visitors. It is requested that notice be given a week in advance. The Museum lends exhibits to the Public Library, the High Schools, Teachers' College, and all grade schools. Facilities are offered students and copyists. Catalogues of the special exhibitions are published and mailed to any one for \$1 a year. A bulletin is issued quarterly, subscription 50 cents a year. Photographs of

During 1916-17 the work of the active committees included: Lectures on Modern Sculpture, Modern Architecture and one on the possibility of decorating the new State Capitol; through a Special Committee the League was instrumental in getting the State Legislature to pass a bill for the decoration of the Capitol. The Purchase and Donations Committee recommended the purchase of Victor Holm's statue, "The Fathers' Sword," which has been placed in the Public Library. Committee on Competitions and Scholarships awarded \$500 in prizes (by a competition) for a medal: the first prize was given Ulric Ellerhusen of New York, for his design which is now used on the Bulletin; the Committee also instigated a completion for a prize poem, the first prize being given to Ethelwyn Dithridge for "As Thou Wilt." Drama and Pageantry Committee is conducting a competition for a one-act play which will close September, 1918. Mural Decoration and Sculpture Committee gave three prizes for designs submitted for a public fountain; the Committee also awarded prizes for War Posters symbolizing the necessity for Conservation, to Harland Frazer and Michael Lipman: (The first prize design is used as the official poster of the Woman's Central Committee on Food Conservation). Music Committee gave a Spring Festival with the co-operation of the Drama Committee; it has in preparation a competi-tion for a patriotic song and military march, and is working on the subject of Municipal Music. Several competitions were held by the Committee on Architecture, which also instituted the Annual Award in Architecture. Exhibition Committee assembled four separate exhibitions: The Traveling Exhibition, consisting of 61 pictures and sculptures, which was sent to 7 different places between June, 1916, and April, 1917; the Local Exhibition consisting of 38 paintings which was shown in 3 branch libraries; the special

Y. W. C. A. Exhibition, consisting of 22 pictures assembled and shown at the Wheatley Branch, Y. W. C. A.; the Second Annual Thumb-Box Exhibition, which opened in the Artists' Guild Galleries Oct 30, 1916; 33 works were sold, prizes were awarded to Mary McColl, Victor S. Holm, F. Naumann and Edith Hethcock. The third annual exhibition will be held Oct. and Nov., 1917. Admission is free, except on Mondays and Tuesdays, when a fee of 25 cents is charged for adults and 10 cents for all under the age of 16. Copyists and public and private school teachers and pupils are admitted free at all times. All holidays are free days.

The Brooklyn Institute of Arts and Sciences has two museums, the Central Museum and the Children's Museum. Both include in their scope natural science and ethnology, as well as art, the main or Central Museum being organized on a well-defined departmental plan. At present, comparatively little art work is done at the Children's Museum, except through its

library.

Museum established 1889; first section of the present building dedicated 1897; the fourth section is now in process of construction. Annual member-

ship dues \$10.

The art collections include Egyptology; architecture, especially the photographic enlargements of the surveys in Europe undertaken by William H. Goodyear in connection with researches in architectural refinements; bronzes; a hall of casts of Greek and Roman antiquity; casts of the Renaissance period; modern sculpture; Greek terra cottas (Tanagra); Greek vases (small); ancient glass; coins and medals; drawings; Oriental and European ceramics; paintings, old and modern; photographs; prints; textiles and vestments.

Among the notable special collections are: 83 water color paintings by John S. Sargent; water colors by Winslow Homer; paintings illustrating the life of Christ, by James J. Tissot, consisting of 350 water colors, 10 oil paintings and 161 black and white sketches; the Cyrus J. Lawrence collection of 106 bronzes, 8 paintings and 5 sketches, by Antoine Louis Barye; a collection of 145 pieces of Chinese cloisonné, presented by Samuel P. Avery; the Pell collection of European porcelain; ancient embroideries and ecclesiastical vestments; lithographs by J. McNeill Whistler. The Department of Ethnology contains a collection of Japanese imperial robes; garments and utensils representing the Ainu, the Japanese aborigines.

The Central Museum has docent service, including motion pictures and illustrated lectures for school children in co-operation with the School Art League; lectures for the public; furnishes classroom or lectureroom for societies, teachers, etc.; an information bureau; research work is done by various members of the staff. The Library, containing about 25,000 volumes for reference, is open daily 9 A.M. to 5 P.M.; Thursday from 7.30 to

9.45 P.M.; and on Sunday 2 to 6 P.M.

The Museum publishes an annual report, a Quarterly, and scientific bulletins. Also Memoirs of Art and Archæology and catalogues of its various collections.

750 scrapbooks; Reference library of about 1,500 books on arts and trades; objects arranged in chronological sequence—furniture, textiles, wood carvings, etc. Decloux collection of about 500 original decorative designs.

The Council provided a supplementary class in architecture at the Night Art School. The Ladies' Advisory Council provided for 1916-17 a scholarship of \$500 and one of \$600 to be awarded in weekly sums of \$12 and \$15 during 1916-17 to enable talented pupils to remain for a fourth year of instruction.

"Au Panier Fleuri," at 767-A Lexington Avenue, is successfully maintained as a workroom and salesroom for students and graduates of Cooper Union Art School. An average of 24 girls are constantly employed and permanent positions have been found at from \$15 to \$20 a week.

A member of the staff is detailed for export guidance; the cost is 25 cents a person, with minimum charge of \$1 an hour, except for members and

Public School teachers and pupils.

Photographic copies of all objects belonging to the Museum (not only paintings, but the objects in every collection) are made by the Museum photographer and by several firms. Prices range from postals two for five cents to large colored prints at \$10. The publications in print number fifty-eight and include catalogues of the various departments, handbooks of special exhibitions, and a History of the Museum; a monthly Bulletin is issued, which is sent free to members, to others \$1 a year and 10 cents a number; a quarterly Children's Bulletin is issued at 40 cents a year, 10 cents a number.

Incorporated 1870. Dues, annual members, \$10; sustaining, \$25; fellowship, \$100; total membership Oct. 1, 1917, was 8,362.

Collections include the fine arts—painting, sculpture and architecture—as well as what are usually called decorative or industrial arts. Ancient art includes Egyptian, Babylonian, Assyrian, Phœnician, Cypriote, Etruscan, Greek and Roman antiquities. In painting the attempt is made to illustrate the history of the art in antiquity, and from the Middle Ages to the present time, with especial attention to the work of American artists. The decorative arts include woodwork, metalwork, ceramics and textiles. The collections represent the East and the Near East (China, Japan, Persia and Asia Minor), Europe and America. Special attention is given to American art.

Broadly speaking, the first floor of the Museum is filled with the Egyptian and classical collections, the casts, arms and armor, musical instruments and modern sculpture; the second floor with the art of the East and Near East, textiles, laces, paintings, including the Altman collection and prints. The decorative arts, chronologically arranged—the Romanesque period to the nineteenth century—occupy a wing by themselves. The Library and photograph department occupy a separate wing; a print department was established

in December, 1916.

The principal gifits during 1916 included the Colonna Altarpiece by Raphael, the sculptured stone groups of the Pietà and the Entombment from the Château de Biron in France, and the collection of sculpture, architectural fragments, woodwork, and other objects of art in the Gothic and Renaissance sections of the Hoentschel Collection—all the gift of J. Pierpont Morgan; the painting "Salome" by Henri Regnault, from George F. Baker; "St. Nicholas Resuscitating the Three Youths" by Bicci di Lorenzo, from Francis Kleinberger; three portraits by Jonathan B. Blackburn, from Sylvester Der-Kleinberger; three portraits by Jonathan B. Blackburn, from Sylvester Dering; the Parmelee collection of pewter, presented by Robert M. Parmelee and Mrs. William L. Parker in memory of Mrs. Alice E. Parmelee; the carved wood dome of a Jain temple, presented by Robert W. de Forest; 101 pieces of Chinese tomb jades, given by Samuel T. Peters; and a series of firearms and accessories from Charles M. Schott, Jr. Among the paintings purchased were "Madame X" by John S. Sargent; "Pushing for Rail" by Thomas Eakins; "Honfleur" by Jongkind, and examples of the work of Wilhelm Trübner, Hugo von Habermann, Wilhelm Leibl, Max Liebermann, Hans Thoma, and F. A. von Kaulbach. To the collections of decorative art have been added the tapestry of the "Crucifixion," formerly in the Morgan collection and the earliest Gothic tapestry known, and a retable of Spanish-Romanesque sculpture. Two very important imperial Chinese flowerMetropolitan Museum-Continued

pots of the Sung period are the most important accessions of Far Eastern art. To the classical collection have been added a beautiful marble head of a young Greek athlete, five fine Greek vases, and several important terracottas.

The educational work of 1916-17 included a course of story-hours for the children of members; three lectures for art students; courses in aesthetic criticism for members and others; four lectures to students of history in the city high schools; seminars for designers, buyers, and salespeople; four lectures for the deaf; three lectures for the blind. Definite work was done with public school classes and lectures were given in both elementary and high school buildings. Sets of photographs were lent to branch public libraries and to public schools; 1,078 borrowers, some from places as far west as the Mississippi River, used 41,496 lantern slides. Educational work in the Museum has been conducted by many outsiders, including the Extension Departments of Columbia and New York Universities, Hunter College, Pratt Institute, the School of Ethical Culture, the School Art League, Art in Trades Club, and various art schools. The practical use of the Museum by designers and manufacturers has increased steadily. There were 64 lectures in the lecture hall, 36 being given under the auspices of the Museum, 23 by the School Art League, two by the Needle and Bobbin Club, and two by the American Archæological Institute, and one by the French Institute. There were shown in Classroom B during 1916-17 a collection of drawings,

There were shown in Classroom B during 1910-17 a collection of drawings, submitted in connection with a competition announced by "Women's Wear"; a series of exhibitions of designs evolved from study of the Museum collections by classes in different schools; and a group of objects—furniture, tapestries, textiles, jewelry, etc.—made by well-known manufacturing firms from designs influenced by the collections in the Museum. The group of paintings lent to the Bronx Society of Arts and Sciences remained in the Lorillard Mansion. Eighteen paintings were lent to the New York Public Library and shown at the Chatham Square Branch, beginning in May, 1917. July 6, 1916, there was a meeting of the National Education Association, with addresses on the relationship between the Museums and the Schools; one day's sessions of the annual meeting of the American Association of Museums were held at the Museum on May 22, 1917.

Statistics for the year ending December 31, 1916: Cost of administration, \$432,266.94, and of this, \$200,000 was paid by the city, \$90,275.70 was received from admission fees, membership dues, sale of handbooks, etc., and \$29,940.25 from special funds, leaving a deficit of \$112,050.99; total number of objects acquired during 1916 was 1,155, of which 12 were received from one bequest, 879 by gift of 58 persons and 264 by purchase; 344 objects were lent; attendance was 679,024, and 16,880 attended lectures in the lecture hall and classrooms, making a total of 695,904; the lecture hall and classrooms were used by 25,661 persons; 12,377 had the services of the Museum instructors; 26,361 visited the Museum with teachers; 12,502 used the library; 3,300 used the library photograph collection; 3,946 copies and studies were made in the galleries; 13,459 photographs and 57,319 cards were sold.

A trophy, consisting of a bronze medallion in the form of the seal of the Municipal Art Society, mounted on a carved oak panel, is awarded for excellence in drawing in the City High Schools through competitions. Each pupil on the winning team receives a small bronze replica of the medallion.

The Society has undertaken the erection of a fountain in the Queensboro Bridge Public Market. It will consist of a stone basin, a stream of water will flow from a mask of an ox's head and above will be a large mosaic panel representing "Abundance." The design of this panel is by Edwin H. Blashfield, the model of the head by Eli Harvey and the general plan of the monument by Charles W. Stoughton. The appropriation of the Society for its cost has been increased to \$2,400 by the generous gift of one of its members.

A docent is maintained who speaks every day in the elementary schools and takes classes to the art museums; lectures for members and for pupils of the elementary and the high schools are given at the Metropolitan Museum and at the Brooklyn Museum; free admission is secured for high school pupils to visit the current exhibitions; prizes are awarded for the best term work in art.


A medal is awarded in each class, each term in each of the 24 high schools: First year, Art in Trades Club medal for excellence in design, founded 1917; second year, John W. Alexander medal for merit, founded 1915; third year, St. Gaudens medal for drawing, founded 1917 by Mrs. Helen Foster Barnett. At graduation industrial art scholarships are offered, the money raised for this purpose by each school being duplicated by the League and the art schools. A bronze medal for fine craftsmanship founded 1909, is given each term in each of the 250 elementary school workshops. Red Cross and Thrift posters made by high school pupils in a competition

for medals and money prizes arranged by the League, were exhibited at the Knoedler Galleries. New York, in July, 1917, and were later lent in groups of 20 to Syracuse and other cities. During 1916-1917 the docent reached 26,533 pupils; there were 60 lectures and meetings with attendance of 14,468, making a total of 41,352 persons reached during the year.

A third edition of these notes has been printed with illustrations, and will form a convenient handbook for classes visiting the Museum.



Obituaries

1916 1917-

- ALLEN, AUSTIN, A.I.A.—An architect, died at Joplin, Mo., March 1, 1917. He was born in Philadelphia, August 3, 1880, and moved to Joplin at the age of ten. He graduated from the University of Pennsylvania with the Class in Architecture of 1902. He was prominent in athletics and represented the University of Pennsylvania at the English games held during the coronation of King Edward VII. Later he spent some time in travel and study in Europe. Mr. Allen designed many of the prominent buildings in Joplin. He was elected a member of the American Institute of Architects in 1916.
- ANDERSON, GEORGE, A.I.A.—An architects in 1916.

 He was born in 1869, the son of Larz Anderson. He was educated at Columbia University, New York City, and later studied at the Ecole des Beaux-Arts at Paris. Upon his return to the United States he entered the office of Samuel Hannaford and Sons, of Cincinnati, later associating himself with A. O. Elzner under the firm name of Elzner and Anderson, the partnership being still in existence at the time of his death. At that time he was serving as president of the Cincinnati Chapter of the American Institute of Architects, of which he became a member in 1899.
- BARBER, CHARLES E.—An engraver, died at his home in Philadelphia, February 19(?), 1917, at the age of seventy-five. He was one of the country's most expert engravers and was widely known to medal makers in this country and abroad, and for fifty years had been connected with the Philadelphia Mint. He engraved most of the presidential medals for the past half century.
- BARBER, EDWIN A. T. LEE.—Director of the Pennsylvania Museum of Industrial Art, of Philadelphia, died December 12, 1916. He was born in Baltimore, August 13, 1851. He was an authority on ceramics, antiquities and glassware, and wrote extensively on all of these subjects. He was the organizer of the exhibition in Philadelphia, 1916, "Fakes and Reproductions." Mr. Barber was one of the collaborators of the new edition of the Century Dictionary.
- BARLOW, JOHN NOBLE.—A painter, died at St. Ives, Cornwall, England, March 24, 1917. He was born in Manchester, England, in 1861, and became a citizen of the United States in 1887. He was a pupil of Lefebvre, Delance and Constant in Paris. He was an honorary member of the Providence Art Club, and is represented by three landscapes in the Rhode Island School of Design, Providence. He received a medal at the Paris Salon in 1899, and a silver medal at the Paris Exposition in 1910.
- BAUMER, JULIUS H.—A portrait painter, died in May, 1917, aged sixty-nine. He was born in Muenster, Westphalia, and had lived in Chicago since 1869.
- BESSUNGER, MORRIS.—An antiquarian and authority on armor, died at his home in New York City, October 6, 1916, at the age of ninety-nine. He was born in Darmstadt, Germany, but had lived in this country for sixty years. He secured many notable objects for the Metropolitan Museum and for private collectors.
- BETTS, E. C.—A landscape painter and interior decorator, died at his home in Denver, Colo., aged sixty. He was born in Hillsdale, Mich., and began his career as a freaco painter. He studied in New York art schools and later went to Colorado. His last painting was "The Valley of the Housatonic."
- BIERSTADT, MARY E. HICKS STEWART.—Widow of the noted landscape painter, Albert Bierstadt, died in New York City, October 3, 1916, at the age of seventynine.
- BIESTER, ANTHONY.—A portrait and landscape painter, died at Madisonville, Ohio, March 26, 1917, aged eighty. He was born in Cleves, Germany, and studied there and in Holland, Belgium, and France. He came to America after teaching art in Europe for several years. He was a member of the Cincinnati Art Club. He was awarded a gold medal at an Indiana State Fair. 





Editorial Note

"Who's Who in Art" is the directory section of the "American Art Annual." As heretofore, the directory has been compiled chiefly from the membership lists of the leading art societies in the United States and exhibitors at same. Data blanks were sent out in the early spring and the information thus received, with that sent by the artists for previous volumes, has formed the basis of the biographical notes.

This volume contains 5,022 names and addresses of painters, sculptors and illustrators; the last issue of this directory, that in Volume XII, 1915, contained only 4,665 names. One thousand one hundred and thirty-two (1,132) names appear here for the first time; these are new exhibitors who have been represented in the current exhibitions during the past two years. Seven hundred and seventy-five (775) names have been dropped because no answer has been received to our request for present address, the artist has not exhibited since 1915, is not a member of a recognized art society; or has died during the two-year period.

When two addresses are given and the second one is preceded by "h," it indicates that the first address is the studio, the second is the home. The artist's medium, whether painter, sculptor, illustrator, or craftsman, is indicated by letters at the beginning of the biographical note; when no biographical information was obtainable, the letters are used in parentheses after the address. The date after the abbreviation of a society of which an artist is a member, refers to the time of election.

The lists of "Work" under the names are limited to paintings in public galleries, monumental sculpture, and published illustrations.

The names of married women include the maiden name; they are preceded by "Mrs." or followed by the husband's name in parentheses. The maiden name is also entered in alphabetical order, with a cross reference. All names of women without title are "Miss."


