By invitation of the Brooklyn Auxiliary, the fifth annual meeting of the American McAll Association will be held in Brooklyn, N. Y., April, 1888.

The kind wishes of all members of the Association and Auxiliaries will follow their President and Treasurer across the sea. The unfailing devotion of these ladies to the McAll work for the past four years has rendered rest and change an imperative necessity. The interests of the work will not suffer by their absence, but rather, their personal investigations of the methods of the Mission in France, and their intercourse with the workers upon the field will endow them with a new inspiration, which on their return in the autumn will doubtless give a fresh impetus to the work in America—an impetus which will be felt to the remotest Auxiliary.

The Sale for the benefit of the McAll Mission, held in Paris on the 10th and 11th of May, realized in those two days the sum of 27,000 francs, and it was estimated that the private disposition of the goods remaining on hand would bring the amount up to 30,000 francs. This is a very substantial and gratifying success.

American women visiting Paris during the summer will be interested in learning of the work among shop-girls, begun four years ago by their country woman, Miss Atterbury. It is well known that these young girls—the greater number of them homeless and friendless—are exposed to unusual temptations and dangers. Miss Atterbury has provided for them a house, 27 Rue Jean Jacques Rousseau, where they are under kind protection and where various advantages of instruction, of social intercourse, and of mutual helpfulness are theirs. It is especially desired that a knowledge of this work (*Œuvre des demoiselles de magasin*) should be made known among the shop-girls themselves, and in this our countrywomen can render valuable assistance at the cost of no trouble to themselves.

It will be interesting to those who care for the spiritual welfare of France, to know of the existence in Paris, of a League against Atheism, which has been founded by men of high position, and which includes among its members men of all shades of political and religious belief. At its first anniversary meeting, held in April, at which the well known M. Jules Simon presided, the venerable Adolph Francke, of the Institute of France, delivered a very able address on The Idea of God in Humanity, drawing the argument against atheism from history and from reason, showing the danger to patriotism, to liberty, and to morality, which inheres in atheism, arguing that philosophy should see in religion not an adversary, but an ally, and calling upon all religious communions to forget their differences, and unite against the common enemy.

The interest of the Christians of Providence, R. I., in the McAll Mission, began with the visit of the lamented Mr. Dodds. Since then we have received many tokens of material sympathy, from individuals and from churches. During a recent visit of the Representative Secretary, a most promising Auxiliary was organized with 42 members at the outset. In this work we gratefully acknowledge the helpful co-operation of several clergymen and laymen of Providence, among whom are the Rev. D. H. Greer, D.D., the Rev. C. A. L. Richard, D.D., the Rev. J. H. McIlvaine, D.D., and Professor Clarke.

Among other good works of which Salle Baltimore is the centre, is an Employment Bureau conducted by a society of French ladies. It is impossible to over estimate the benefit to French working girls, whose temptations are unusually great, in being thus brought into kindly relations with ladies of high Christian character. The friendly advice and oversight extended to these girls, is of far greater value than the assistance given them in procuring employment.

THE AMERICAN MCALL ASSOCIATION.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE FOURTH ANNUAL MEETING.

The fourth annual meeting of the American MeAll Association convened on the morning of April 27th, 1887, in the Mt. Vernon M. E. Church, Baltimore, Maryland.

The morning session opened with a meeting for prayer conducted by Mrs. J. C. Thomas of Baltimore, and the business session began at eleven o'clock after devotional exercises conducted by the President of the Association, Mrs. Chase. The following despatch was read: "The ladies of the Olean (New York) Auxiliary send greetings. Isa. lii. 7–10 and Mal. i. 11."

The roll of Auxiliaries was called to which thirty-six delegates responded, representing seventeen Auxiliaries.

Mrs. James Cary Thomas, President of the Baltimore Auxiliary then read the following welcome:

ADDRESS OF WELCOME.

Madam President and Members of the American McAll Association:—

On behalf of the Baltimore Auxiliary of our beloved Association, I extend to you a hearty greeting, and assure you of the kindly welcome which is in our hearts for you as you come into our midst.

We are indeed gratified in having the fourth annual meeting of the Association held in our city, and are sure that the presence of such a body of earnest women will be an inspiration to our own little band. We welcome you as fellow workers in the white fields of France, and are happy that we can rejoice together in the seed sowing and in the harvest song. There is no field more ready for the

planting and the reaping than the one to which your efforts are directed, and none perhaps will yield a richer harvest.

In every recurring spring-time and autumn our Father teaches us the lesson that it is for us to sow with unsparing hand, and assures us that He will give the increase. As the ground receives the seed and brings forth fruit an hundred fold, so the human heart, receiving the truth as it is in Jesus, quickens and brings forth fruit abundantly, to the glory of the husbandman.

Your society in seeking to extend its borders in our own country, and to bring in more home workers, is greatly widening the fields in France, and gathering strength and power to send more laborers into the field. The great charm of our Association is its undenominational character. We are met together here from various parts of our country, and from the different branches of the church of Christ—in His name—to work for Him.

Like the little companies that meet in the Salles of the MeAll Mission in Paris, we are truly a Société Fraternelle, knowing something of the helpfulness of the Saviour's prayer, "That they all may be one, as thou Father art in me and I in thee, that they may be one in us."

Long may this union and fellowship erown our assemblies. May this annual meeting be greatly blessed of the Lord, and may each Auxiliary receive a fresh inspiration to seek for the power of the Spirit to rest upon all the workers.

I hope you may receive as much pleasure from your stay in our city as you will bestow upon those who have the gratification of entertaining you. I again welcome you very cordially to our hearts and homes.

RESPONSE BY MRS. CHASE.

Madam President, and Ladies of the Baltimore Auxiliary:—
In behalf of the delegates here assembled, permit me

to thank you for the cordial weleome extended to us, as the guests of your hospitable homes and beautiful "Monumental City." It has been with no little pride and pleasure that, from its formation, we have watched the growth of your Auxiliary. We recall the first steps of your work, when in your zeal you thought of renting a theatre, and requested Mr. McAll to open a Station "on the wickedest spot in Paris," to which he responded at once and called for a rent of one thousand dollars in advance to secure the premises, now called "Salle Baltimore," on Boulevard Bonne Nouvelle, where the Gospel had never been preached and where sin abounded. As you did not have the money in hand, the Board of Directors gladly forwarded it at your request and secured the hall. Not many days were you their debtor, for, in almost an incredible time, the amount was raised and sent to the Treasurer at Philadelphia.

And what a marvellous work has followed the consecration of the hall on that gay and fashionable Boulevard! You are to be congratulated and commended for your steadfastnesss of purpose and boldness of undertaking. God grant that from this time you may be able to raise the additional sum you have so long desired, which will enable you to supply the salary of an Evangelist and thus assume the entire expense of your great enterprise.

May our coming to you bring such inspiration as to give fresh impetus not only to yourselves, but to all the representatives of the American McAll Association who have accepted your gracious invitation. And may God add His blessing to our fraternal intercourse.

Rev. J. C. Bracq, Representative Secretary of the Association was then introduced by the President, and read a Letter of Salutation from Rev. R. W. McAll of Paris.

The names of the Nominating Committee which had been

previously appointed were then read, Miss Rebecca McConkey of Baltimore being chairman. The following committees were appointed by the Chair:—Committee on Resolutions: Mrs. J. F. Lovering of Worcester, chairman. Devotional Committee:—Mrs. J. C. Thomas of Baltimore, chairman. Committee on Enrollment:—Mrs. M. B. Hammond of Baltimore, chairman.

Mrs. Craighead of Washington and all ladies present who were members of the Baltimore Auxiliary were appointed visiting delegates.

The following Representatives from other Boards were appointed visiting delegates:—Mrs. Erskin Carson, representing local charities, Mrs. Juliana Hayes, representing Home Mission work, Miss Isabelle Hart, representing the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, Mrs. Summerville Baldwin and Mrs. Edward Robinson, representing the Woman's Christian Temperance Union.

Mrs. G. Huntington Williams of Utica, and Mrs. W. Warren of Salem were accepted as delegates.

The Recording Secretary then read an extract from the minutes of the Directors' Meeting in reference to the death of Dr. Isaac Lea, which was referred to the Committee on Resolutions.

The proposed amendment to the Constitution of the Association, of which the Auxiliaries had been previously notified, was then read, together with an additional wording also recommended by the Board of Directors. An extended discussion concerning the wording of the proposed amendment then ensued, in which ladies from the Baltimore, Newark, Washington, Amherst, Worcester, and Albany Auxiliaries took part, and at its close the subject was referred to the following committee, who were requested to report at the Thursday afternoon session: Mrs. J. C. Thomas

of Baltimore, chairman, Mrs. W. W. Byington of Albany, Mrs. Morgan L. Smith of Newark, Mrs. John Rodgers of Washington, Mrs. J. M. Longacre of Philadelphia.

Mrs. J. S. Berry, chairman of the Committee on Entertainment, in behalf of the ladies of Baltimore, then extended, to all the ladies present, a cordial invitation to lunch in the chapel, and the meeting adjourned until afternoon.

Wednesday Afternoon.

The devotional meeting of the afternoon was conducted by Mrs. Morgan L. Smith of Newark, and the business session convened at half past two o'clock.

The reports of the President, Treasurer, Foreign, Home and Representative Secretaries were read; the report of the Home Secretary being read by Mrs. Morgan L. Smith.

An opportunity was then given for enquiries or suggestions with reference to the work of Auxiliaries, to which several ladies responded, giving an account of the means used for strengthening and deepening the interest in the Mission work in their own cities, and after an earnest appeal from the President for greater consecration in this service the meeting adjourned to Thursday morning.

THURSDAY MORNING.

The Thursday morning prayer meeting was conducted by Miss Wright of Baltimore. After the opening of the business session, the welcome to Delegates from other Boards was given by the President, to which very interesting responses were made by Mrs. Carson, Mrs. Hayes, Miss Hart, and Mrs. Baldwin.

The Treasurer, Miss Lea, then made a short statement of the responsibilities of the Association with special reference to the support of the Beach Memorial Station and the salary of Rev. W. W. Newell, Jr.

The reports of Auxiliaries were then called for and a

portion of them heard. The reading of the remainder was deferred until the preliminary meeting of the afternoon.

An address was then delivered by Rev. J. C. Bracq upon Sunday-school work in Paris, and the meeting adjourned to o'clock.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON.

The business session convened after the usual devotional exercises, and an invitation was read from the Brooklyn Auxiliary sending greeting to the Association and inviting the ladies to hold their fifth annual meeting in the city of Brooklyn. The invitation was accepted with thanks to the ladies of Brooklyn, and the dates of the meeting referred to the Board of Directors.

The Committee on the Amendment to the Constitution reported the following wording of the proposed amendment: That in Article V., Auxiliaries, Section 3 be affixed as follows:

Section 3, In order to provide for the general expenses of the American McAll Association, each Auxiliary shall send five per cent. of all its receipts, after deducting local expenses, to the general treasury.

Thirty-one delegates being present, the amendment, as thus proposed, was accepted and adopted, and incorporated in the Constitution by a vote of thirty to one.

Mrs. Louise S. Houghton then read an able and most interesting paper on America's Debt to France.

The remaining reports from Auxiliaries were then called for. Fourteen Auxiliaries were represented by delegates, twenty-eight by written reports and fifteen failed to answer.

The assembly then proceeded to the annual election of offiers. Mrs. Thomas of Baltimore, took the chair. The report of the Nominating Committee was read and accepted, and the officers therein recommended for the ensuing year were unanimously elected.

The Enrollment Committee reported thirty-six delegates

present; eight from Pennsylvania, six from New Jersey, six from District of Columbia, five from Maryland, four from Massachusetts, three from New York, two from Maine, and one each from Ohio and Michigan, representing seventeen Auxiliaries. There were also six visiting delegates.

The Committee on Resolutions reported the following, which were unanimously adopted.

Resolved, That the ladies of the American MeAll Association have received with much gratification the letter of Mr. MeAll, with its graphic portraiture of the present state of the Mission in France; with the interesting details of its enepuragement, its advance, and alas! also, of its needs and its drawbacks. Thankful for the clear statement of the whole truth, they still feel that there is eause for much gratitude to Him who has so wonderfully blessed the work, for all the progress made, and for the many who have not only sought but found comfort and joy and peace in believing, through the instrumentality of this Mission. They would, therefore, be of good heart and take eourage, and, while earnestly praying for more wisdom and more strength, they would endeavor by redoubled efforts, to bring into action those resources which God has appointed as the means of carrying on His work.

To Mr. MeAll himself, they wish to express earnest and ever growing appreciation of his unwearied devotion to the interests of the Mission, and of his increasing exertions in its behalf, and also assure him that their heart-felt prayers are offered to the Giver of every good gift, that his life and health may long be spared for continued usefulness, and that God's best gifts, both temporal and spiritual, may be abundantly bestowed upon him and his.

Resolved, That the ladies of the MeAll Association feel, that by the death of Dr. Isaac Lea, they have lost one of the most earnest and efficient helpers in their work; one

who by his character and his efforts, was both an example and a support. They are desirous to put on record their deep sense of the loss they have sustained, and to express to those nearest and dearest to him, their tender sympathy with them in their sorrow, and also their rejoicing with them at the thought of that bright and glorious home to which he has been transferred.

Resolved, That the members of the American McAll Association, as a body, recognize the necessity of aiding the Board of Directors, by furnishing a portion of the amount required to carry on the many incidental expenses of the work; that we have entire confidence in the efforts of said Board, to conduct such work with the utmost economy and prudence; and that we approve and most heartily endorse, the rule adopted at the last annual meeting, and now incorporated in the Constitution, which requires that five per cent. of the receipts of each Auxiliary, after deducting local expenses, shall be sent to the general treasury.

Resolved, That the thanks of the Association are due to the Rev. J. C. Braeq, for his earnest and efficient work in organizing new Auxiliaries, in promoting increased interest in older Auxiliaries which have been privileged to hear through him of the progress of the work in France, and for his never failing zeal in forwarding the McAll work at all times and in all places. And we would not forget the voluntary labors of Mrs. Bracq, but tender to her our sincere thanks for her generous coöperation with her husband in behalf of the McAll Association.

Resolved, That we gratefully recognize the arduous labors of our beloved President, Mrs. Mariné J. Chase, of our Treasurer, Miss Frances Lea, as well as those of the efficient Board of Directors, while we are not unmindful of the satisfactory and well-fulfilled duties of the Home, Foreign, and Recording Secretaries.

We also tender our sincere thanks to Mrs. Louise Seymour Houghton, for her able work in editing the Record, which has proved such an important aid to the Auxiliaries, and also for her admirable paper on "Our Debt to France."

Resolved, That the hearty thanks of the officers of the Association and of the delegates representing the Auxiliaries be tendered to the ladies of the Baltimore Auxiliary for their cordial welcome and thoughtful care; to the efficient corps of young ladies who have been unremitting in their duties as aids during the meetings; and, also, to all the ladies of the Mt. Vernon Methodist Church and their associates for their generous hospitality, which, like the flowers which have graced both the speaker's stand and the refreshment room, will leave in every heart a fragrant memory of this fourth annual meeting of the American McAll Association.

In connection with the coming visit of the President and the Treasurer to Paris the following message was prepared and entrusted to their care, after which the meeting adjourned:—

The Delegates of the American McAll Association assembled at Baltimore, send their heartfelt greetings to the Board of Directors in Paris, and to the Ladies' Committee, of which Mrs. Newell is President, giving thanks to God who has so bound us together in His service that the broad ocean is no barrier between us, and looking forward to the time when, in the world where there shall be no more sea, we may meet face to face and work together for Him.

To the children of our Mission Sunday-schools, in their festival assembly, we send our loving greeting and rejoice to welcome them to the Christian fellowship of all the sons and daughters of the Lord Almighty.

THURSDAY EVENING.

A good audience assembled at the general meeting on Thursday evening at which Dr. Andrew Longacre presided. Bishop Latane, and Revs. Charles D. Anderson, A. H. Studebaker, Dr. Walter Williams, Dr. W. T. Slocum, and Dr. J. F. Leftwich, all of Baltimore, took part in the exercises. Addresses were given by Rev. Arthur T. Pierson, D.D., of Philadelphia, and Rev. J. C. Bracq. Music was furnished by the choir of the Mt. Vernon Church.

LETTER OF SALUTATION.

Mission Populaire Evangélique de France.

To the Members of the American McAll Association, assembled at Baltimore, April, 1887.

Dear Christian Friends,—A noble result has crowned another year of your united consecration to the promotion of the Saviour's cause in France. Without the stimulus of novelty, and notwithstanding the drawback arising from great uncertainty in commercial affairs, you have gladdened us by a larger aggregate of offerings than in any previous season. This has been especially helpful and, indeed, necessary to us in consequence of the serious diminution of receipts from England occasioned by the depression of trade. For us in Paris, the period has been marked by painful anxiety on financial grounds, so much so that, as you know, we have been compelled to economize by withdrawing from several spheres of labor, and to refuse every call to extension. This has occasioned us much regret, at a time when France is so remarkably open for the preaching of the Gospel.

But we are most grateful to Him who, during recent months, has inclined the hearts of His children around us in France and England also to aid towards making up the serious deficit of our funds. And we have been deeply touched on learning that, even among yourselves, though you had already done so much, special extra gifts are being set apart for the same purpose. It is our fond hope that, ere long, we may again have the joy of responding to some of the urgent appeals for breaking new ground in cities and districts hitherto unevangelized. We watch with interest and thankfulness the career of our friend, the Rev. J. C. Bracq, whose zealous efforts to plant new Auxiliaries have been crowned with so much success. The organization of these bands of devoted Christian ladies in cities and towns all over the States is a sure basis for the permanent support of the work, and presents the most reliable promise of enabling, ere long, its urgently needed extension.

Our heart has been brought into closest sympathy with yours on occasion of the removal from your midst of beloved friends, among them that gifted and consecrated man, Dr. Isaac Lea. The full retention of his fine faculties had eaused us almost to overlook his singularly advanced age. What words of affection and encouragement he had sent to us across the Atlantic only a few weeks ere the Lord called him to the higher service above! Let me bear part in my own name and in the name of all my colleagues, in the sentiment of sacred affection for his memory, and in that of deep and tender condolence with those so dear to him, which I am sure pervades at this moment your whole assembly. We know that their unremitting devotion to this work had the entire sympathy of our now sainted friend, an assurance which will be as a new consecration to their continued efforts on our behalf.

And now, I remember that you meet this year in a city the name of which has become to us in Paris a household word through the large and very interesting Mission hall which bears it, and where I saw last night the series of beautiful photographs of the churches of Baltimore which now ornament it. No Christian heart in the city could

fail to rejoice if made aware of all the history of that Mission Station since its planting, three years ago. There where, at the outset, even brave religious workers in Paris assured us it would be impossible to face the surrounding mockery and vanity, the Gospel is preached every night to a large and earnest audience, composed in great part of young men. When a simple Bible exposition is given after the close of the public services as many as one hundred and fifty or two hundred remain. The fortnightly meeting of the Fraternal Society is attended by from one hundred to one hundred and twenty serious persons.

I shall not forget the spectacle when, on a Sabbath evening in November, at an after-meeting, a commercial employé, a man in his prime, asked our permission to stand up amidst his neighbors, and, in the name of the members of the Salle Baltimore Fraternal Society, appealed to the many, who, as he and they believed, had received blessing there, to evidence it by giving according to their ability, to reduce the financial burden pressing on the Mission. He concluded by publicly avowing that he himself, had found his Saviour there. A subscription was immediately commenced, which soon amounted to 250 francs.

Rest assured, dear Christians of Baltimore, that the Lord is using the product of your generosity and self-sacrifice, to glorify His name on a spot which seemed to have been set apart, from generations long past, as the very shrine and vortex of the world's bitterest enmity against all religion.

Oh, how much remains to be done for this fair land! The years, the months, the days, in which this "great door" stands open are precious, for who can tell when they may be numbered! Take heart afresh, beloved American friends, and by your gifts and prayers, enable us to attempt greater and still greater things, for the salvation of the dear people of France. PRESIDENT'S REPORT. April, 1886, to April, 1887.

In presenting our report at this Fourth Anniversary, we quote from the inspired Word with profound gratitude, "Thou crownest the year with thy goodness; and thy paths drop fatness." For the year just closed, has been in some respects memorable, especially in the general work of the Association.

The labors of the Representative Secretary have been most successful, but rather in forming new Auxiliaries than in securing large collections from the churches where he has chiefly presented the work, in New England. His efforts have been greatly appreciated by the clergy, as numerous letters attest, and many friends have been gained to the cause, not only by his labors, but we may add also, by those of Mrs. Bracq, who has most cheerfully given her services in addressing ladies' meetings with much acceptance. For these gratuitons labors on the part of Mrs. Bracq, we desire to express our sincere appreciation; and also for unnumbered blessings, our hearts should ascend with grateful love to Him, who has guided the Directors in the conduct of the work, and crowned their labors with abundant success.

We also bow before His divine will, in the removal from earth to heaven of one of our Life Directors, whose intimate and helpful relations to the Association, and most generous support financially, causes the loss sustained to be most profoundly felt.

AUXILIARIES.

We greet the representatives of the Auxiliaries gathered here with gladness; we are truly grateful for the earnest zeal of their constituents, for their continued labors and success. With two exceptions, all the Auxiliaries have fulfilled their financial pledges for the support of their special work on the field, and, in a number of instances, some have contributed special sums for purposes named from time to time by the Board of Directors. In this connection we would mention the generous response from the Auxiliaries, to the call of the President for the special fund in aid of the deficit in Paris. Some of these gifts have been most generous.

And what shall we say of the twenty-one newly formed Auxiliaries since our last meeting? We have watched over them with the deepest interest, and it is largely through their contributions that the income from Auxiliaries has amounted to thirty-one hundred dollars more than last year. In this connection we would mention with gratitude that the newly formed Auxiliaries of New England have greatly relieved the anxiety of the Board in providing for the expenses of the Beach Memorial Station, which large expenditure was undertaken by the Directors at the request of the Delegates assembled at Washington at the first annual meeting, and has proved a very heavy burden to our finances. Happily, these new Auxiliaries are feeling a righteous pride in the desire that the entire support of this memorial to one of New England's illustrious daughters shall be provided by the Christian women of those states. This is as it should be, and it is expected that another year will find the entire sum of two thousand dollars raised in New England.

We now number fifty-seven earnest, active Auxiliaries. God grant that the work which we have thus unitedly undertaken may bind us more closely in Christian love and endeavor, and may our watchword be "France for Christ"

RECEIPTS AND EXPENDITURES.

The receipts for the year are \$34,356.88; there have been received from Auxiliaries \$28,586.92, not including \$1459.73 for the Special Fund. \$1651.80 have been ap-

propriated by Auxiliaries for the Beach Memorial Station, and, in accordance with the five per cent rule, \$879.71 have been forwarded to the Association treasury from the twenty-four Auxiliaries having special work on the field. The receipts from church and Sunday-school collections have been \$2003.53.

The expenditures are \$33,312.78, including \$28,701.80 for the work in France; \$2178.27 for salary and travelling expenses of Rev. J. C. Bracq; \$1420.07 for publications; \$1012.64 for speakers at annual meeting, clerical and editorial work, incidentals, postage, expressage, and stationery.

The gain in the income from Auxiliaries over last year's report is \$3177.54 and the loss in church collections \$1786.45, while the gain in funds forwarded to Paris is \$1681.05. Shall we not regard this record as evidence of that steady and substantial growth which is our best hope for the permanence and increase of our work?

OUTLOOK.

These anniversary days are like mile posts, having two arms pointing different ways. The one points backward to the past, the other straight forward to the future. And thus by past experience may we not venture to speak prophetic words of the future growth of our work.

Four years ago there were only three Auxiliaries in existence in the United States; to-day we chronicle fifty-seven, with a larger increase this year than during any previous year. In the infancy of the Association, comparatively little was known of the real work or needs of the McAll Mission, and while much ignorance still exists in many places, yet our publications which have been scattered broadcast over the land, and the hundreds of earnest addresses delivered in behalf of the work, have militated against the

ignorance, and gained to the eause thousands of friends whose enthusiasm has suffered no diminution. In publishing the Quarterly RECORD alone, nearly eight million pages of printed matter have been put into eirculation, while the pages of the many thousands of eopies of tracts and pamphlets eannot be numbered. In view of these facts may we not predict for the next four years double the number of Auxiliaries, and a corresponding increase in the funds? Let us be fully alive to the possibilities which lie before us, and remember that funds are not only needed in the McAll Mission but that other highly deserving agencies are at work in France for her evangelization which greatly need aid. These societies are awakened to the great opportunity of reseuing their country from atheism. Let us then have a strong faith, which means broader fields, more work, and more money with which to enlarge our borders.

The work in this country is His work, and a part of the work in France, and must be sustained or we shall fail of doing all that God requires of us. Each year finds us remitting to the field larger sums. Why? because we have sent funds there intact? no; it is because we have used some of the unappropriated funds for enlarging the work at home, or rather we have invested these funds and have received a large profit on our investment. From its beginning, an important part of the work of the Association has been the enlargement of our borders in America. During the first year we gained eleven Auxiliaries, mostly in the large eities. The receipts from these Auxiliaries during the following year were nearly nine thousand dollars. The history of the second and third years has been but a repetition of the first. The large eities being occupied, in the second year eleven, and in the third year ten Auxiliaries were formed in the smaller eities and towns. In

each case three thousand dollars were received from these young Auxiliaries in the following year. The attention, care, and money expended in planting these societies proved well invested and brought ample returns. Shall we not consider that the growth of our work demands not only that increased receipts be sent to Paris, but that the knowledge of the Mission and the foundations of our Association are broadened in this country as well?

It has been truly said that France is not atheistic. This is shown by her language both of speech and pen, which are more deeply imbued with Christianity than those of other countries which may justly boast of superior light. Go where you will in France Christianity faces you. Cloaked, garbled, distorted, it has been; railed at, mocked, ridiculed it is; but this is the outcome of disappointment in the lives of those who, having been called forward to manifest the Truth, have denied it. What wonder when the salt which has lost its sayor is trodden under the feet of men? A powerless Christianity is no Christianity at all; and the glimmering tradition of what Christianity was at its originfull of mighty growth—only helps to show the falling off with greater vividness. France is not atheistic, but alas! atheism is ereeping over her. "France," * writes Mrs. Dodds, "has gone out in quest of a religion! Even men who want none for themselves often admit that the nation, if she is to be saved, must have one. Shall her quest end in a fall back into superstition? Not likely. In rationalism, a religion without the supernatural? Or shall she give it up, and say, 'No God?' Or, shall the pure Gospel enlighten her from end to end?

"These questions we cannot answer. Only, we know that the nation we have been accustomed to eall 'Catholic

France' exists no longer as such. It is in a state of fusion, and in the chaos, new forces of crystallization are drawing the atoms now to this side, now to that. A purer faith—a darker atheism—a new impulse from heaven of hope and progress—a blast from hell, killing all faith, not only in God, but in the very names of faith, and purity and virtue: such are the alternatives. Such are the ehemical solvents at work. And shall we look ealmly on and watch the process till the molten mass has cooled, and the stamp is irreversible?"

Dear coadjutors, such words as these should not fall upon our ears unheeded, nor upon those of thousands of American Christians; they should go down deep into our hearts and cause our lives to bring forth fruit. Say not, we are doing all we can for such a people at such a crisis. Nay; we have only made a beginning, we cannot shake off our responsibility. America is too closely allied with France not to put forth every effort for her salvation to-day, for what is done must be done quickly. In this latter part of the nineteenth century all things move with the greatest rapidity, and the history of nations is as changing as the ebb and flow of the ocean tides. Shall we falter in our work and fail of bringing all our forces into this arena of Christian activity? Shall we close our eyes to the fact that the "kingdom of God has come nigh" to France, and by our dilatoriness hinders its entrance into that fair land to possess it?

REPORT OF HOME SECRETARY.

No department of our Association work is so uninteresting in its details or furnishes so few incidents to weave into a report as that which distributes our literature. Here there can be no thrilling recitals of conversions: no records of lives rescued from vice and misery, and no vivid pie-

turings of death-bed seenes where the glorified spirit breaks the bonds which enclose it in a tortured body and, almost visibly, wings its flight into the realms of eternal bliss; yet there is no department more important nor more necessary for the success of our aims. It is by means of our literature that our friends become aequainted with our glorious work for the redemption of souls, and by the printed page we reach thousands of hearts and touch them with one sympathetic thrill. By our publications we keep alive the enthusiasm of those whose love might die without this food to nourish it. The press is our evangel; our storehouse of information; our spiritual magnet; but the statistical statements of our distributions are interesting to but few.

In our Sunday-school lessons, we have lately been studying the history of Joseph, who was the saviour of his people, and whose life pulsated with glorious deeds. Whilst he was the ruler of the seven years' garnered stores of Egypt, there must have been those whose duty it was to distribute the grain, to measure it out, and to record what passed through their hands. At certain times, they must have accounted to Joseph and that account would show both the terrible needs and straits of the people and the vast number reached by his wonderful prevision and provision. In such a position, apart from the busy, interested throng, stands your Home Sceretary, with only the bare records and statistics of the stores of literary, instructive and spiritual food prepared and distributed by your busy servitors, yet, by these statisties, proving the wisdom and activity of the Association which prepares and scatters this necessary nutriment, and whiel:, by the great demands, measures the necessity for this provision.

Each year shows a steadily increasing demand for our literature and this demand has, each year, been met by an increased supply.

The tracts "French Children's Appeal" and "Bishop Whipple's Letter" were reprinted from the RECORD of January 1886. "Three Years' Retrospect" was reprinted from

the RECORD of April 1886. "An Appeal to the Women of New England," "Sociétiés Fraternelles," "Some Results of the McAll Mission," "French Protestantism in the Nineteenth Century," and "What France thinks of the MeAll Mission," are entirely new publications.

In a society so young as ours and one that grows by the constant formation of new Auxiliaries, it is absolutely necessary to distribute a large amount of literature gratuitously. When our representative Secretary goes to a church to speak in behalf of the McAll Mission, he must have our literature to scatter among the congregation. When an Auxiliary is just formed, before it has collected any funds, it is provided with our literature gratuitously to enable it to reach the hearts of friends hitherto strangers to the work. Most of our publications are distributed in this way and although we seem to get no direct benefit the scattered information proves of inestimable benefit to the Auxiliaries and ultimately to the work and the Association. After an Auxiliary is well started, it usually pays for its literature but so much is unpaid for that the need of a special fund for this department is more of a necessity than ever. The Auxiliaries pay a nominal price for the RECORD, but out of the 49,752 copies distributed during the year, 23,453 were distributed gratuitously.

Those of our friends who have read "The White Fields of France" will be interested to know that the McAll Mission in Paris has lately published a new book, "A Cry from the land of Calvin and Voltaire"—a continuation of "The White Fields of France," copies of which will be for sale in this country. So soon as it is known where, we will advertise it in our Record.

While these statisties measure the supply and demand for our publications they also declare our increasing success. All over our land Christians are growing more Christ-like in their desire to carry salvation to their perishing brothers, and in the aim of the Association to win for France an evergrowing company of these Christ-like friends, more than ever, and more decidedly we can claim a glorious success.

REPORT OF FOREIGN SECRETARY.

Our latest reports from Mr. McAll speak very cheeringly of the increased interest of the meetings in every part of France. In Paris especially, there is an unabated readiness to hear the Gospel, and the past year has seen many instances of avowed decision for Christ. As an offset, however, to this very hopeful condition of affairs, a "thorn in the flesh" has been permitted (as we have already heard) in the shape of financial anxiety, and a deficit of from four to five thousand dollars. There are two main reasons for this deficit. One, the failure or lessening of accustomed gifts, on account of the recent financial depression in England. The other, the entire cessation of a large number of regular subscriptions in Great Britain, owing to the death of the subscribers. To entirely clear off this indebtedness is of course the one idea of the Directors in France. And, aside from the help which friends in England and America are sending there is a touching desire on the part of the converts of the Mission, to do what little they can towards it. A man rose in the Salle Baltimore recently, and proposed that those who had received only good there should give, according to their ability, to help lighten the burden: and 250 francs were speedily raised. And a poor workman in Tulle wished to give something as a token of gratitude: but what could he spare from his family, out of his miserably scanty earnings? It occurred to him that he might give up the use of tobacco, and devote the amount saved to the Mission; and after a fortnight's trial he told

joyfully that the craving for it had passed away. Besides such little helps, the French Protestant ladies of Paris are to have a large Sale or Fair in May, for this express purpose. As they raised \$5,000 at a Vente held some years ago for the McAll Mission, this one undoubtedly will be of very material assistance. The lesson to us of all this seems to be that without increased funds no new work can be attempted in France. Every penny that they get now is more than needed to keep the Stations already established. And it is well to remember that it is a most economically conducted Mission: the salaries are only living salaries, and Mr. McAll himself receives nothing from the Mission funds.

The new work undertaken during the past year, is easily told. In the Southern towns of Montpellier, Cette, and Béziers an important branch has been established, our French friends there undertaking nearly half the cost. At Calais, where the visits of the Missionary ship had created great interest, we "have had the pleasure of aiding M. and Mme. Brun, a young French engineer and his wife resident there, to open a Mission hall, the work of which they voluntarily and successfully conduct. M. Anderson has removed from Cannes to Mentone to take charge of a Mission room, given for our use by the late Mrs. Dudgeon. Through the generosity of her relations, the eost of this Station to the treasury is small. In Paris, the room at Montrouge has been exchanged for a better one, and the expenses are still paid by an English lady. At Nice, through an arrangement with M. Gustave Monod, Jr., of the British and Foreign Bible Society, we have entered on a fine new hall, part of the rental of which is paid by that Society, its front serving as a Bible Depot: 'a method,' says Mr. McAll, 'which we should rejoice to see carried out in all our Mission rooms situated on public thoroughfares." The Stations in the rue Van Damme, and the rue Jouffroy, in Paris, have, for lack of funds, been given up, or rather, merged in neighboring ones.

The two Medical Dispensaries at Ivry and in the Ternes are doing noble work. Dr. Anderson, the Medical director says, "At all Medical-mission dispensaries Christ offers to His disciples a splendid opportunity of winning souls for Him à double main! They remind him, he says, of a certain river in England where you can fish with a rod in each hand, or of the ornamental ponds at St. Cloud, where in hot weather the gold fish swarm to such an extent, and come so close to the bank, that you can eath with your hand as many as you like.

The Lending Libraries are a valuable feature of the Paris work. For, contrary to the fixed ideas of many good English speaking people, there are excellent and interesting books written in French. M. Soltau says, "We consider these libraries a great means of counteracting the baneful effect of the evil literature which is so terribly abundant everywhere. And the bad books are by no means badly written, but are often, in style and execution very fascinating; all the more reason then, for us to furnish good books, in every sense of the word; and there are plenty of these to be had, by such writers as Tabarié, Couriard, Mme. de Pressensé, Mme. DeWitt, etc." But like every other branch of the work, they need money.

The general outlook, however, in every direction, is hopeful. Shall we not thank God and take courage?

REPORT OF REPRESENTATIVE SECRETARY.

To the Officers and Delegates of the American MeAll Association.

My work in connection with the American McAll Association, during the past year, has been more or less of

an experimental character. My first efforts were those of a learner, finding himself in a work whose machinery he understood but little, and in the midst of circumstances more and more difficult for the establishment of a new missionary interest. Still with the help of the President of the Association, the counsels of the Treasurer, and the lessons of experience, I came at last to find myself at home.

My first impressions of the work in this country were such as to elicit feelings of gratitude to God for what had been accomplished. The Association, its organization, the simplicity of its workings, the devotion to it of so many distinguished and devoted Christian ladies have seemed to me wonderful. The Association is a good counterpart of the work in France.

I have been struck by the amount of knowledge of the MeAll Mission already disseminated in your country, expressing itself in many places by active Auxiliarics, in others by a sort of intellectual admiration, only needing a practical hand to crystallize into vast resources for the Mission. The best possible process of crystallization is our Auxiliaries. My aim has therefore been to enlarge the efficiency of existing Auxiliaries and to form new ones. My efforts have been individually directed to this twofold yet same work. During the year I have addressed twelve Auxiliaries, either on their annual meeting or on some other oceasion. Among these, five had been organized during the year. I have presented the cause on Sunday from ninety-four pulpits, eight times on the occasion of large Union meetings. Eighty-four of these meetings were in places without Auxiliaries, fifty-eight in churches where Auxiliaries were subsequently organized, while five were in watering places where we aimed to scatter, in the broadest way possible, intelligence of the McAll Mission. I have

addressed twelve Sunday-schools, and forty meetings of ladies. I have delivered in all, in different forms and places, one hundred and sixty public addresses. I have formed eighteen new Auxiliaries, one in each of the following places:

without counting Winchester, which has passed from the stage of a circle to that of an Auxiliary. Some of these Auxiliaries are necessarily small, owing to their limited sphere of action, others have no imperfection but that of youth, which time, the healer of many ills, will doubtless remedy.

To this account must be added the work done through the circulation of literature, which I have abundantly distributed, and in places where it would be read. While my work by correspondence and calls has been another channel for enlarging the interests of the McAll Mission.

In connection with this report I should like to speak of the hearty coöperation which I have generally found on the part of friends of the Mission, who have spared no pains, not only to make my ministry in their midst pleasant, but also to make it efficient. I would gratefully acknowledge the kindly attitude of the Board of Directors, and the untiring readiness of the President and Treasurer to help and direct me in my work.

The cause which we advocate has, during the year, gained

in the number of its friends and in the deepening of their interest, and the past achievements of the American McAll Association seem to point out the words of Jesus, "Thou shalt see greater things than these."
