

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Inaugural Address.

Delivered by the Mayor, Hon. George F. Rich, March, 27, 1916.

To the Honorable City Council:

For the second time it becomes my pleasant duty to address you upon matters relating to the business affairs of our City.

A brief review of the work of the past year will show that while the affairs of the City have been given close and careful attention still there is an opportunity for improvement and it should be our duty to benefit by our experience in the past and take up our duties the coming year with renewed zeal and the sole purpose that we should in all cases act for the best interests of the people of the eity.

To those of you who were members of this board during the past year I will say that I trust that our relations during the coming year may continue to be as pleasant as they have been and to the new members I extend a welcome and assurance that you will find among the older members of this board, men who are congenial, companionable, and ever ready to do their part of the work assigned to them.

Finance

The financial condition of the City is set forth in our annual report, from which it appears that there has been a slight increase in our net debt during the past year. This is not surprising when we consider the growth of our City and the many improvements which we are called upon to make and if we intend to keep abreast of the time we must expect that our debt will be increased to some extent.

During the past year we had occasion to issue bonds of the City amounting to ninety thousand dollars (\$90,000), which bonds bear interest at the rate of four per cent. and the sale of these bonds at a premium show that our financial condition is such that our credit is good in the money markets.

During the past year all uncollected taxes for the year 1907 have been abated and I should recommend that during the coming year all uncollected taxes for the years 1908 and 1909 should also be abated and this policy continued until all of these worthless "assets" disappear from our financial report.

As has been the case for several years, there has been during the past year large overdrafts in some of the departments and while there may have been some excuse for some of these overdrafts, still I recommend that our appropriations be sufficiently large during the coming year so that it will be unnecessary to have overdrafts of any considerable amount in any department.

Public Schools

Our public schools continue to do good work and while the appropriation for this department was overrun during the past year, I am satisfied that the money was well and economically spent. I am in hopes that the appropriation during the coming year will be sufficiently large so that there will be no overdraft in this department during the coming year.

It seems to me necessary that a new school building should be erected in that part of our City known as Ward One, during the coming year and I recommend that this matter be given your prompt and careful consideration.

Our Board of Education has devoted their best efforts toward the improvement of our schools and while it may seem to the casual observer as though they were spending large sums of money in the maintenance of our schools, I am satisfied that we are getting as good returns for our money in this City as is the case in any other City in this State.

Department of Public Works

This department having the control and management of our streets, sidewalks, sewers, civil engineering, sprinkling streets, cleaning streets and garbage collection, necessarily demands the expenditure of large sums of money. Last year there was an overdraft in this department amounting to \$7,932.65. Although there may have been some justification for this overdraft, still I do not believe that it is good business, or good policy, to have overdrafts

in any department to this extent, and I trust that the appropriation and expenditure of the same during the coming year may be such that there will be no overdraft in this department.

In addition to the ordinary needs of this department during the coming year, I should favor the improvement of the highway leading from Post Office Square to the Gorham line, so that the same may become part of our State Highway System, to which the State is ready to contribute one-half of the expense of these improvements.

Fire Department

The showing made by this department during the past year is very gratifying. Not only has the department done good service but has been so well managed that there has been a saving from the appropriation of \$730.79. With the same careful management this department should be able to get along during the coming year with the same appropriation as that of last year and make what necessary improvements seem to be necessary, in order to keep the department up to its present high standard of efficiency.

Police Department

This department is under the management of a Board of Police Commissioners appointed by the Governor and Council and while they report to the Mayor and Council, they are in no way under our supervision.

During the past year, there was an overdraft in this department amounting to \$608.43 and we are informed by the Police Commissioners that in order to meet the needs of this department they will require a somewhat larger appropriation than was the case last year.

Public Library

The affairs of this department have been well and economically managed by the Board of Library Trustees, who are elected by direct vote of the people. The appropriation for this department is turned over to the Treasurer of this Board and expended under their direction and I am informed that they have a small balance left over from last year's appropriation so that quite likely an appropriation of the same amount as last year will be sufficient.

Health Department

Health conditions throughout the City during the past year have been unusually good and in my opinion our well organized and

efficient health department deserves great credit for the part which they have played in bringing about such healthy conditions.

City Poor

Notwithstanding the fact that this department shows an overdraft for the past year amounting to \$156.66, I think the showing has been remarkably good. Our deserving poor must be taken care of even if it becomes necessary to have an overdraft and while economic conditions in the City appear to be better than they were a year ago, I should expect that there would be more calls for help from this department than has been the case heretofore, which will necessitate a somewhat larger appropriation.

Law Department

The expense of this department is necessarily more or less uncertain, but during the past year we have been especially fortunate in freedom from expensive litigation and the business of the department seems to have been handled in an able and satisfactory manner.

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Incinerating Plant

In my opinion the time has arrived when it will be necessary for us to make different arrangements for the disposal of our garbage from what has prevailed heretofore and investigations, which we have recently made, have satisfied me that an incinerating plant, which would cost about four thousand (4,000) dollars should be established in the outskirts of the City during the coming season and I recommend that an appropriation be made for this purpose.

The New Bridge at Berlin Mills

During the past year a new bridge has been built across the Androscoggin River in that part of the City known as Berlin Mills, which will be a great accommodation to the residents of that section. This bridge, which now accommodates pedestrians, will probably be ready for other traffic about the first of May and the approach to the same on the Easterly side of the river should be improved and made convenient and attractive to the traveling public.

Public Parks and Playgrounds

This department is conspicious by its absence, but I believe that the time has come when we should make a start toward acquiring land for these purposes in those parts of the City which will

be most accessible. The start will necessarily have to be in a small way, but after a real beginning has been made and a department created, it should be easy to make additions to the same from time to time. The longer this matter is postponed the more expensive it will become and I urge a beginning during the current year.

Conclusion

By the votes of our constituents we have been delegated to manage the affairs of the city. This is an important duty and a trust which we should carefully guard. By their votes the people have reposed a confidence in us, but this confidence will be retained only so long as we continue to act honestly, wisely and industriously. With this idea in mind, let us take up our duties in a way that will reflect credit, not only on ourselves, but upon our City.

To His Honor, the Mayor and City Council,

Gentlemen:-

I submit herewith my report as City Overseer of the Poor for "the year 1916, and in connection I desire to call to your attention again the fact that the expenditures for aid to our City Charges is increasing somewhat, and without going into details regarding the situation at this time, I should be pleased to come before the Council or the Appropriation Committee for 1917, and state the needs for this department for the coming year. The account is again overdrawn unavoidably, as during a part of last year, we have had nine children extra to support. This one item will require the coming year about \$900. There are constantly new deserving cases coming to us where a settlement is gained, and aid must be given. The continued advance in cost of living has added at least 25 per cent to our bills, and proved a hardship especially to the poor everywhere. We have several old people on the list, of long residence "here, who are deserving and must be cared for.

At this particular time, I have no estimate for the year 1917 but will be pleased, at any time, to discuss the matter and furnish such information as you may desire. A great deal of aid is being given by kind hearted people of our City to our City poor. All cases that have been brought to my notice, have been investigated and dealt with in accordance with their needs, and in my opinion could not have been handled more economically under existing conditions.

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Report of the City Solicitor.

Berlin, N. H., Jan. 19, 1917.

To His Honor the Mayor, and the City Council of Berlin:

I beg to submit herewith the report of the City Solicitor for the fiscal year ending Jan. 31, 1917.

During the past year the following civil cases have been disposed of:

(1) Henry A. St. Laurent v City of Berlin. A claim for damages in the sum of \$1000 to personal property of the plaintiff, caused by the back-water from Dead River. This case was tried by jury last April, and resulted in a verdict for the plaintiff for \$300.

(2) Joseph J. Daley v City of Berlin. A claim for personal injuries sustained and caused by an alleged defective condition of the highway. Suit was brought but the case was settled out of Court for the sum of twenty-five (\$25) dollars.

(3) Michael J. Cryans v City of Berlin. This suit was instituted at the same time as the suit of Daley v Berlin. This case was also settled for the sum of twenty-five (\$25) dollars.

(4) Carl M. Mickelson v City of Berlin; petition for assessment of damages. This case was referred to and tried before the County Commissioners, who rendered a verdict for the plaintiff for \$275.

(5) City Bowling Alleys v City of Berlin. Action for damages caused by overflow of Dead River. This case was tried by jury in 1915, and at this trial there was a verdict against the City for five hundred (\$500) dollars; on the defendant's exceptions it was transferred to the Supreme Court where it was argued in March 1916. The judgement against the City was reversed, and the verdict set aside. This case is still on the Court docket.

The following civil cases are now on the docket, awaiting trial-

In the United States District Court,

(1) City of Berlin v Charles L. Farnsworth; action for breach of contract.

(2) Joseph O. A. Devost v City of Berlin, Twin State Gas & Electric Co., and Berlin Water Company; an action for personal injuries. This case will be tried at Concord on January 30, 1917.

In the Superior Court,

(1) County of Coos v City of Berlin. This case will determine the liability of the City or County for the support of certain paupers.


(2) International Paper Company v City of Berlin.

(3) International Paper Company v City of Berlin.

The above cases are petitions for abatement of taxes and have been referred to the Tax Commissioners.

In addition to the Court work, I have conducted all prosecutions in the Municipal Court for the Police Department, have assisted the City Council in investigating and adjusting minor claims, have prepared such ordinances and resolutions as were brought to my attention and have performed such other duties as are incident to my employment.

Report of Board of Health.

Berlin, N. H., January 31, 1917

To His Honor the Mayor and the City Council of the City of Berlin:

Gentlemen:—In the report of the Health Officer and Milk Inspector, hereinafter set forth, a great increase in the amount and scope of the work of this department is shown, laboratory diagnosis, water analysis, and the scoring of food stores. Plans are formulated for further activities, the results of which will be shown next year.

Through the generosity of the motion picture houses in the city, in giving us the free use of their screens, we have an effective and economical opportunity to inform the public on health matters.

The public have commented favorably upon the publishing of the results of the milk analysis and food store scores in the newspaper, and we intend to continue this year, publishing results once a month if possible.

We feel that the statistics as accumulated and tabulated by the Health Officer are much above the general standard. We have had occasion to compare statistics, both of work accomplished, and of the causes and ages of deaths, in a number of cities and towns, and frequently the information has been inadequate.

It is with deep regret that the Board records the loss of one of its members, Dr. A. Provost, whose death occurred September 9, 1916.

We have tried to keep within our appropriations, and should have succeeded had it not been for the fact that a high percentage of diphtheria cases during the year were in families requiring financial aid from the City, and that in one case we were obliged to maintain a guard night and day to enforce quarantine.

We respectfully recommend that for the coming year only one appropriation be made for this department, as we believe that it will simplify our accounting, and that this appropriation be \$3,900.-00. This amounts to an expenditure of twenty-six cents per capita, which it seems to us is not excessive for the public health.

Contagious Diseases

Tables 11 and 111 show the occurance of contagious disease in the city for each month of the past year, and for each year for the past five years, which is as far back as the records were kept.

The following are the periods during which patients are kept isolated.

Diphtheria; until there are three consecutive negative cultures from the throat, taken not less than twelve hours apart.

Scarlet Fever; until desquamation has ceased, usually in fromfour to six weeks.

• Onicken Pox; until the body is free from scabs, usually in - about three weeks from the date of the initial symptoms.

Measles; 2 weeks, or until desquamation has ceased.

German Measles; 10 days to 3 weeks.

Infantile Paralysis; 14 to 16 days.

Whooping Cough; 8 weeks.

Mumps; never less than 3 weeks

Small Pox; until the body is clean of scabs, usually in about r6 days.

Diphtheria carriers are given a spray of a 50 per cent. solution of Mulford's Benzo-Formol with which to spray the throat three times daily, and are required to report at the Board of Health Office twice a week for culture. So far, we have had no obstinate cases which would not respond to treatment with the spray.

A small outbreak of Diphtheria occurred during the month of November, and the early part of December, with a total of 10 cases. There was no connection which could be traced between the cases, and the houses were well spread over the city. In two cases, carriers were found as the cause of the disease, but no other carriers could be found, and those that were discovered did not have communication, at least not directly, with the rest of the cases.

In one case is was necessary to employ a guard night and day to enforce quarantine.

In only one house was there any recurring case, and this was traced to a carrier in the family, so that we do not feel that there was any fault with the methods of disinfection or fumigation.

For fumigation we use the Dolge Fumigating candles, which give very satisfactory service.

The reason for the unusually high mortality in Diphtheria seems to be the fact that a doctor is not called until too late, and the antitoxine is not administered early enough to do much good. In order to overcome this difficulty, the idea was conceived of throwing bulletins on the screen at the moving picture shows. The manager of the theatres in the city, Mr. Gray, very generously offered to give the Board of Health this service free of charge. These bulletins, which are simply pieces of glass cut the right size, with the printed matter printed neatly on them by hand, are frequently changed, and contain advice concerning not only diphtheria and antitoxine, but also about other matters regarding the Public Health. They are printed by Mr. H. C. Bates, Architect, who was generous enough to offer his services for this purpose. The results of these bulletins are very gratifying so far, for it was noticed by the physicians that they were called to cases earlier, and that there was less fuss raised in giving antitoxine, more especially among the poorer class. We intend to enlarge on the bulletin idea during the coming year, and to have something to put on the screen every week throughout the year.

During the summer months when Infantile Paralysis was epidemic in so many of the larger cities, a guard was placed at both railroad stations to meet every train, and get a registration of all children getting off at this city. The plan was to get the name of the child, name of parent, home address, and intended address while in Berlin. In this way the Health Officer could follow up any children coming from infected areas, and keep them under watch for two weeks, in the mean time keeping them from public places.

It was found, however, after a three weeks trial, that the number of children getting off at Berlin was very small, only three families appearing in the three weeks, and only one of these from any infected area. The guard was consequently dropped. At the same time the guard was on duty at the rail road stations, printed cards with places for the above information were given to the hotels and garages, so that any families which might have come into the city by other ways than the rail roads would be registered. We had no cards from these sources.

In connection with the outbreak of Infantile Paralysis, the State Board of Health furnished blank certificates to be filled out by the Health Officer, stating that the bearer had not had Infantile Paralysis, and had not been exposed to the disease while in the city. These certificates were issued to persons going into infected regions where such certificates were required. About twenty-five of these certificates were issued during the summer.

Certificates were also required by a number of colleges to be carried by students going to that college, stating substantially the same thing.

Vaccination

This year 393 children were vaccinated at the expense of the city, as is the custom. Of this number 16 were re-vaccinated

The custom here is for the city to furnish vaccine, and pay the physician on the Board of Health his fee of fifty cents for each vaccination. Persons wishing their own family physician to vaccinate their children, pay the physician's fee, but the City in any case pays for the vaccine used.

For about a month before school starts in the Fall, the Board of Health Physician is in the laboratory of the Board of Health three afternoons a week, where he does the vaccinating.

Infant Mortality

The infant mortality in this city has been steadily declining for a number of years, and this year is the lowest of which there is any record; 103.9 deaths per 1,000 births. The following table gives a summary of the Infant Mortality, also the crude death rate, since 1910, when the Health Department first employed a trained Health Officer and Milk Inspector.

There is at present no work done by this department to reduce infant mortality other than the regular milk inspection. The Disrict Nurses Association, which is a private affair, does however do very good work in helping to keep down the infant death rate. These nurses visit the homes of the poorer class of people, giving instruction and care to the mothers and babies. The following facts show the reduction in infant mortality due both to the District Nurses and to Milk Inspection. The District Nurses started their work in 1903, and milk inspection commenced in 1910.

Average infant death rate during ten year period previous to district nurses, 230.8.

Average infant death rate from time district nurses started to time milk inspection started, 188.6.

Average infant death rate from time district nurses started to present time, 171.3.

Average infant death rate for ten year period before milk inspection started, 199.5.

Average Infant Death rate from time milk inspection started to present time, 154.0.

The above facts show that both the District Nurses and the City Milk Inspection have reduced the Infant Mortality to a great extent.

I have not made any inspections of diary farms since August first, and expect to almost entirely drop this line of work. The reason for this is that there is a great amount of work for the Health Officer to do. The plan is to keep watch of the milk taken from carts and stores more closely, and if there is any indication of trouble, make an inspection of the farm, and especially of the methods of handling the milk to find out the cause of the trouble, which may then be remedied. I realize that this method is not so valuable as a combined inspection but feel that it is the best under the circumstances, where there is no time for one man to attend

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efficiently to all branches of the Health Department. During the latter part of the year I have analysed the processes of three milk dealers and was able to find the trouble in all cases.

Ice Cream Inspection

I have made one examination of the ice cream, from each manufacturer in the City, to determine the butter fat content. The results of the examination are given below. Next summer I intend to make examinations oftener, and to also make bacterial analysis of the ice cream.

Food Stores Scores

In former years the custom has been for the Inspector of the State Board of Health to come to this City and score all the food stores once a year. This year, however, a slightly different arrangement was made whereby the Health Officer scores the stores. In this way a fairer score can be made for two reasons; first, the Health Officer is perhaps more familiar with the stores as they run throughout the year than a man from out of the City, and second, when a score is made once a year, the tendency would be for the stores to slacken up in cleanliness after the State Inspector has made his rounds. The scoring of stores was not started until rather late in the season, and for this reason only a few stores were scored, but the work will continue throughout the year, and by the time of the next report every store will have been scored probably more than once. The plan as started, and as will be carried out during the coming year, is to publish the stores in the Berlin Reporter every month or so, and thus give the public a chance to compare the sanitary condition of the store they trade in with other stores in the city. Any place having a score that is below 60 per cent, is not published in the paper the first time, but is given a chance to remedy their condition, and at some future date not told by the Health Officer, the place is again scored, and this second score is published regardless of what the score is.

Report of the Board of Education.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and the City Council of the City of Berlin:

We beg to submit to you the thirty-second annual report of the Department of Education for the year 1916-1917.

It is a great satisfaction to the members of the Board of Education that some of last year's plans have been successfully carried out; first, the establishing of a junior high school in the Berlin school system, and second, the erection of a fine building on the Cole lot in Ward 1. This school is called the Bartlett school after the late ex-Mayor Fremont D. Bartlett who was a member of the Board of Education at the time of his death. It is a six-room grade building and was opened the second day of January with an enrollment of 205 children.

The junior high school divides our Berlin school system into what is commonly called the six-six plan. This plan gives six years to elementary school work, two years to intermediate or junior high school and four years to high school proper. The two-year intermediate course is so arranged that the pupil is better prepared for the work in the high school than by the seven-four plan, and it also gives a chance in the last year of the high school for advanced work. As the average child enters school in his sixth year a twelveyear system brings the age to eighteen years at the time of graduation from the public school, and at that age those who intend continuing their studies may enter special schools or colleges. Those who must go to work are mentally and physically better able to choose an occupation, and they also give better satisfaction to their employer than at a younger age. It seems, therefore, that this six-six school plan helps to solve one of the greatest educational and social problems that we have with the boys and girls of our city.

Beginning in October medical inspection has been given to all new children and to all cases reported by the teachers. In the superintendent's office there is a card giving the doctor's report and

recommendation for every child in our schools. The principal results so far of this medical inspection in the past three years has been that many children have had their (each properly cared for by a dentist and the general physical cleanliness is noticeable.

There are many children whose eyes need to be examined and treated by a specialist and this we hope to accomplish in the near future. Also with the aid of the district nurse we hope to follow up all the cases especially recommended for treatment by the doctors.

We feel the urgent need in our school system for a trained teacher for deticient and backward children. These children need individual attention and with proper understanding may be so helped that their whole lives may be benefited by it.

Our school buildings and grounds represent city property valued at \$187,000. It is well protected by insurance and with the exception of the Cole school is in good repair. This school will be painted on the outside this summer. The Bartlett school grounds will be put in order as soon as streets and sidewalks have been completed by the Street Department. At the Burgess and Marston schools the porches must be rebuilt. There are many minor details such as plumbing and painting to be attended to in all the buildings.

The crowded condition in the high school and proper accomodations for junior high school classes are conditions to be arranged for before the September opening. There are over 1300 children in our schools at the present time.

The Board of Education appreciates the generous interest and co-operation of the City Council in last year's appropriation and asks for the same treatment the coming year. It recommends the buying of the three lots adjoining the Marston school as soon as possible, also the closing of Pine Street, so that the property in this location may be held for school grounds and buildings to meet the rapid growth of our schools.

It has been the policy of the Board to get the best teachers available. To keep these teachers contracts must be signed in May. Therefore we ask for an early hearing before the City Council that the appropriation may be sufficiently increased to meet the necessary demands of our public school system for the ensuing year. Following is the financial statement of the School Department for the fiscal year ending January 31, 1917.

Report of the Superintendent.

"To the Board of Education:

I hereby submit to you my fourth annual report as Superintendent of your public schools, the thirteenth to be issued from this office.

Membership

The total membership in the public schools on February first was 1317 pupils. It will be seen from the table below that the first grade classes entering in September were unusually small, in fact they comprised but seventy-five per cent. of the expected attendance. This can probably be attributed to the large amount of sickness among the children of the city during the late summer and early fall, also to the widespread anxiety over the epidemic of infantile paralysis. Fortunately Berlin was entirely free from the dreaded disease and schools opened on time. Yet an instinctive fear of possible infection together with an uncertainty created by the continuous reports of other schools being closed no doubt prevented many parents from sending their young children to school for the first time. It may be said in this connection however that it has been definitely proven that there is less danger of contracting illness in a well managed school with proper medical inspection than at home with the freedom of the streets and public places.

The usual crowded conditions in the first grades were somewhat relieved, still there was no room for the Cole first grade of forty pupils. This grade was finally placed in the vestry of St. Barnabas church and later transferred to a room in the Y. M. C. A. building where it remained until the close of the fall term. On the completion of the new Bartlett school a general reassignment of pupils was made resulting in a more uniform distribution. At present there is an average of thirty-five pupils to a teacher throughout grades I to VI.

Promotion and Retardation

Each year we are receiving an increasing number of over age children from other schools, many of whom are merely handicapped by being unfamiliar with the English hanguage. We have also our usual proportion of backward children. These groups should be handled by themselves, in small classes, and given the benefit of individual instruction. We are failing in our responsibility to this part of our school membership. It is on this account that our retardation is high as indicated in the table below. I would recommend again that some provision be made for at least one special class to open at the beginning of the next school year. I see no reason why this cannot be done if we can find a room suitable for the purpose.

Child Labor

The unusual industrial conditions of the past year have created a wider demand than ever for child labor. The effect upon our attendance is marked, especially in the high school where a decrease of six per cent, of expected attendance has resulted. In so far as the call of labor tends to deprive children of a high school education the situation is to be deplored. The lure of attractive wages to an adolescent child is strong, but to yield at the sacrifice of an education is to mortgage a lifetime for mere present returns. On the other hand the increasing opportunities offered for Saturday and vacation employment cannot be too gladly welcomed. Every child old enough profits by some form of systematic employment outside of school time.

Under the present New Hampshire law no child under fourteen vears of age may be employed or permitted to work at any gainful occupation. Newsboys and bootblacks working on their own account are excepted. A child between the ages of fourteen and sixteen may be employed or permitted to work outside of school hour by se curing a duly executed labor certificate from the superintendent of schools, but no child under sixteen may work at any occupation after seven o'clock in the evening. The law further requires that every child shall attend school every day that school is in session until he reaches the age of sixteen unless he previously completes the work of the elementary school. It is plain therefore that ne permit to work during school hours may be issued to any child attending the elementary school. The law is specific and the su perintendent of schools has no discretion in the matter. No labor certificate can be issued to anyone who does not fully comply with the law.

Since January 1, 1916, I have issued 117 labor certificates, twenty-nine regular certificates and eighty-eight vacation certificates good only during the specified school vacation.

Noon Lunch

Our noon lunch organized over a year ago is proving successful. It is conducted entirely by the Domestic Arts department and at no expense to the city. Pupils from the High, Marston and Burgess huildings who cannot go to their homes for dinner are now assigned to the high school lunch room, where cocoa, soup, etc., are served at actual cost. Often fifty to sixty pupils are cared for at a time. If this number continues some change in management must soon be made. The burden is becoming too heavy for one teacher and the small number in the class.

Print Shop

Systematic work in the school print shop was begun at the opening of the spring term in April. Before that time printing was done only when time from other work permitted. Now it has become a regular part of the mechanic arts program. With few excep-

tions all the printing required by the school department has been done by the pupils. The work has a decided educational value and results in a considerable saving in expense.

Evening School

The Burgess Memorial Evening School has had the largest enrollment in its history. 279 men and women have been in attendance at some time during the year. The demands upon the school have increased to such proportions that we have been entirely unable to meet them, yet even in its limited capacity I believe the school is a valuable asset to the community. The school should be in fact as well as in name a continuation school, open to every man and woman in the city, and offering instruction in all subjects for which there is a reasonable demand. Thus far the school has been no expense to the city save for light and fuel. But now in view of its size and its service we venture to ask for some financial assistance. Mrs. George E. Burgess has very generously offered to increase her contribution another year to \$500 on condition that an equal amount be appropriated by the city. I urge that this matter be brought to the immediate attenion of the Council for their action.

Medical Inspection

The work of the school physicians was resumed in November when the first and second grade pupils were examined, and cases needing attention reported to parents. A much more healthful condition was found among the children than ever before which leads to the conviction that the plan is eminently worth while. Our greatest need now is the services of a nurse to follow up cases that otherwise would be neglected. A school Board of Health has been formed in each building, one member serving from each room, headed by a health officer elected from their number. This movement is in the way of practical demonstration in matters of school and civic health.

The High School

Every attempt is being made in the high school to maintain the highest possible standard of work and conduct. By the addition of three new instructors it is now possible for the first time to arrange complete periods for all classes of the school. Further details are contained in the Head Master's report.

Domestic Arts

Only seven and one-half per cent, of the girls in the high school are enrolled in the Domestic Arts department. It is to be regretted that many more do not take advantage of this important work. Certain subjects are offered which ought to be included in the high school education of every girl. I refer to design and decoration, physiology and nursing, and dietetics and invalid cooking. These subjects are now confined to the few who elect the work of the Domestic Arts department. I would recommend that another year they be added to the curriculum of every girl in the school.

The School Savings Bank

The Berlin School Savings Bank was organized in September 1910. Since that time a total of \$7,335.92 has been placed on deposit by the public school children of the city. On January first the Bank had a balance on hand of \$2,573.11. Deposits to the amount of \$1,358.39 were made during the year by approximately five hundred children. This represents an average saving of \$2.70 per pupil. The largest single individual deposit during the year was \$5.01, the smallest one cent. The largest individual withdrawal was \$100.99, the smallest seven cents. The largest total weekly deposit amounted to \$154.90, the smallest \$14.71, with an average of \$37.73 per week throughout the entire school year. Interest at the rate of six per cent, has been added to all accounts of \$1.00 and over. The operation of the Bank is one of the strongest departments of our commercial work. I know of no object lesson better adapted to the teaching of thrift.

The Junior High School

In accordance with my recommendation of a year ago the first year's work of the junior high school was begun in September. The seventh grades of the eity were brought together in the Marston building and the work reorganized an undertaken on the departmental plan. The eighth year classes which as far as possible constitute the second year of the junior high school entered the high school building as usual for the reason that no available room existed Both pupils and teachers have adjusted themselves elsewhere. readily to the change and results are sure to become apparent as soon as adequate room and equipment can be provided. More room is absolutely necessary. This year's seventh grade must pass into the eighth grade next fall. Whether it enters the high school building and is conducted as a high school class or whether it has accomodations of its own in conjunction with the seventh grade depends upon what building additions are crected this year. The classes of the seventh year now average forty-four pupils to a teacher. This is nearly double the number a teacher in this department should be expected to teach at a time. The program of studies is necessarily modified to meet the conditions of reorganization. Another year must elapse and room, teachers and equipment be provided as indicated above before we can have a strictly junior high school program in force. I urge that this matter be given your immediate attention.

Berlin's Problem

The opening of the new Bartlett school has relieved the congestion in grades 1 to V throughout the eity. Grades VI and VII remain as before with forty to fifty pupils each. The Brown and Burgess schools can doubtless care for all the children in their localities for several years to come. The Marston school, if relieved of the seventh grades, will be able to accomodate another sixth grade also the class for special pupils recommended above. A new building will soon be needed on the East Side. But Berlin's

real problem now is to provide for the junior high school. At least eight more rooms are needed in September besides additional shop room and equipment. Two plans are possible: Either to erect a new eight-room building on the lot immediately back of the Marston school or add an extension to the rear of the present high school building. The former plan would provide ample room for the junior high school but would in no way improve shop and assembly conditions in the senior high school. The latter plan would meet all requirements of the junior high school and in addition make possible enlarged shops and more adequate assembly and study rooms. The last six years of the school system could then be cared for under one roof and one management. This plan also has the advantage of being less expensive and is the one I carnestly recommend for your consideration.

Head Master's Report.

To Supt. Harry L. Moore:

Berlin, N. H., February 1, 1917.

I herewith submit to you my fourth annual report as Head Master of the Berlin High School.

The total registration for the school year ending June 1916, was 423 pupils, 192 boys and 234 girls, an increase of 26 over the school year 1914-15, and 43 over the school year 1913-14. The total enrollment to date for this school year is 401, 190 boys and 214 girls. It is of interest to note that seven pupils that left school last year, due to sickness have returned. Four of these students through special work during the summer passed the work lost by examination in September, thus continuing with their respective classes, theother three repeating the work with the class below. Tables number 1 and 11 give the registration in full.

The registration of the Freshman class is as follows: From the Public Schools 92, repeating their Freshman year 8, from St. Patrick's School 16, from St. Regis Academy 2 and from outside schools 13, a total of 131 pupils, 72 boys and 59 girls.

In the class of 1916 there were 74 pupils registered at the beginning of the year. Three left school to go to work and twofailed to graduate, due to poor work and the remaining 69 graduated, or approximately 38 per cent. of the entering class as compared with 34 per cent. for the previous year, a gain of 4 per cent.

Total graduating 69 pupils, 30 boys and 39 girls.

For the past three years it has been the custom to keep a record of the number of graduates of the high school who have entered college, normal, business and training schools, and other vocational work. Table 3 gives a detailed account of not only the graduates of the class of 1916 but of other graduates who entered college during the school year 1916-17.

Out of the 389 graduates from the Berlin High School from 1907-17, 144 pupils or approximately 37 per cent., have continued their work in higher institutions of learning. One then might ask: Is the school in touch with the type of work done by these pupils and if so what are the results? The colleges send a detailed report of the work of each individual. From these reports as received there has been no complete failures indicated and in several cases the reports have shown that students have carried honors. In view of the fact that not only the select few, but the great mass are striving for higher educational ideals and that all are not of the same mental calibre, it is not surprising to find now and then a failure. On the other hand our reports indicate failures only in cases where certificate privileges were not fully granted, or wherepupils were allowed to enter college on condition, with a full understanding between the college and the school.

In connection with table 2 it will be noted that only 24 pupils for the school year 1916-17 have left school thus far. The principal causes for these losses are siekness, (personal or in family), inability to meet the school requirements, change in residence and the necessity for earning money particularly the latter, as never before has there been such a demand for both boys and girls.

Table 4 gives a full report of the loss of the different classes for the school year 1915-16, and if compared with similar tables of previous reports, will furnish some very interesting data that space will not permit for a discussion in this report.

In an attempt to raise the scholastic standing of the school the teachers are required to send to the office a weekly report of all students doing unsatisfactory work. Through this means I have come in personal contact with all those students whose work is below the average. I find that one of the great difficulties is the lack of the right kind of home study. To encourage scholarship, the results of the standing of each class are tabulated and placed on the school bulletin board, also the names of the pupils who have obtained an average of 90 per cent, or more in any of their subjects. In the appendix will be found the names of the students who have obtained an average of at least 90 per cent, in three or more subjects for the first semester of this school year.

The social activities of the school at the present time are in a healthy condition. This is due to the efforts of the teachers who have these different organizations under their supervision and they are to be congratulated upon their success. The teacher who can do this kind of work along with her other duties and obtain results is not only a component part of the school but one who when found should never be allowed under ordinary circumstances to leave the school system without the careful consideration of the school officials. The reports of the work of the different organizations as follows speaks for itself.

The French Club, "Entre Nous" worked as their project last year the play "Le Petit Chaperon Rouge," this was presented to the Parent-Teachers Organization.

The program of the Debating organization "The Forum" for the year 1915-16 will be found in the appendix.

The Athletic Association is in good financial standing having to its credit \$111.30 in the School Savings Bank. It is to continue its practice of basket-ball in the Y. M. C. A. Gymnasium, the boys under the direction of Mr. Donnelly and the girls under Mr. Atwood, the Physical Director of the Y. M. C. A.

Due to the generous gift of W. R. Brown the Rifle organization quarters in the basement of the high school building have been moved to its new quarters where there is absolutely no danger connected with the target practice.

The Mandolin Club that was started last year has proved a great success. It gave a program before the Parent-Teachers Association last year, and also the graduation exercises. At present fit is getting ready for a public concert to be given some time the datter part of the winter term.

The Latin Club, "Societas Latina," has also offered opportunities for the individual development of its members, giving as a result of its work the Latin play, "The Roman School." One of the programs for this year is an illustrated lecture given by Mr. Woodhull, the Latin Instructor on Rome, The Forum, Colosseum and Pompeii. The slides for this lecture about seventy in number have been made possible through the courtesy of Dr. L. R. Dean, Professor of Archeology at Dartmouth College.

I have watched with great interest the development of the Nature Club. The work of this club has created the spirit of investigation and research, not only among its members but the Science Department as well, so that the younger students are looking ahead for the time when they themselves can enjoy the privileges of this course. The work of this club is bringing into contact with the school, men of experience and influence, as can be seen from this type of program that was carried out the fast school year 1915-16.

Venereal Diseases by Dr. Homer Marks.

Through the kindness of Mr. John Graff, the official photographer of the Berlin Mills Co., a program of five lectures and four photographic excursions are being carried out under his personal supervision. This affords the members an opportunity to study and see developed the art of photography under the direction of an expert. The plan is to have the results of this work published in a picture story form that will give credit to all concerned. This to me is one of the methods that will make school work real and bring it in contact with the outside world.

Under the present program, every room and available place is now being used every period of the day. The use of the lecture room, laboratories and dining-room used for elass work other than that for which they were intended, hinders the work of these departments. The shop work is greatly handicapped due to the unsuitable place, crowded condition and lack of equipment. The general assembly is no longer possible, as the hall is not large enough to accommodate the student body at one time. In not being able to do this the school loses its opportunity to create at this period of youth the spirit of democracy among is cosmopolitan group. On account of this lack of accommodation it became necessary to refuse the parents the privilege of attending the school socials. Many parents as a result, were disappointed in not being able to attend and follow the social development of their children. On occasions of school socials it becomes necessary to move the large study tables into the hallways partly blocking them, thus increasing the danger in case of fire, Under these conditions it will soon be necessary to limit the number of classes attending these socials.

If the Berlin High School is to maintain its standing in this State for the high type of work that it has created and developed something must be done with both building and equipment to provide a means of not only carrying on successfully the present work but in developing and expanding the larger phases and opportunities that are now possible under modern educational principles.

In conclusion permit me in behalf of the teachers of the Berlin High School to express our thanks to you for the co-operation and courtesies extended to us during the past year.

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Report of City Engineer.

Berlin, N. H., January 22nd, 1917. **To His Honor the Mayor and the City Council:** ' Gentlemen:—

The work done by this department for the year just closing consisted of laying out and giving batter-boards for about 6,502 lineal feet of concrete sidewalk curb and about 1,695 feet of sewers, making a large amount of surveys and plans for the following objects: improvements on the Gorham road and Glen Avenue, assistance to the State Engineer on the Gorham Road, surveying, making descriptions for deeds and plans of the new Bartlett School lot, also laying out the building and plans of the new Bartlett School lot, also laying out the building and miscellaneous small jobs for the School Board, making surveys and getting through the needed papers and records for establishment of "Bridge Street" and the disestablishment of the old road across the Paine Bridge; re-establishing the side lines of Hutchins Street according to my record of 1897 for about half a mile; making surveys of the old Boston and Maine right-of-way past the cemeteries and staking out some new lots at the City Cemetery; some \$50 worth of work on account of the lawsuit of St. Laurent vs. the City and getting new data and checking the old references of the Sewer Book in cases where old sewers were dug up, and man-holes were found not to be well referenced in the book; and the regular small matters, such as numbering new houses, giving grades and street lines by which to set buildings and retaining walls along the street lines and estimating various small jobs for the Commissioner.

In addition to the sewers for which batters were given, about 2700 feet, where grades were steep, were laid without batter boards, but most of these were staked out, and references taken by which to locate them in the future. A beginning has been made toward a complete and more correct set of sewer records, by obtaining a new and larger book, copying into it the records from the old book, and adding many sheets of records of new sewers, and sewers which had been laid in former years but no proper records of them kept. There is a great deal more of this latter work which should be dono as soon as possible in the future, as I think there are several of the old sewers, of which we have no record, except the memories or private data of the foremen. The Chairman of the Committee on Public Works wished the sewer book to be made in duplicate, so that one copy should never be taken out of the office. This might easily be done now, by copying the records out of the new book into a similar one, but the new book itself will not hold a great many more new records. There are surveys of a few sewers laid this summer, which I have not yet put into the book, but I expect to complete this work the present winter.

A large amount of work was done in surveying Glen Avenue and the Gorham Road, to make plans for much needed improvements in what is the most travelled entrance to the City, and at the same time much the worst road we have in some ways. The proposed widening involved agreements with the Berlin Street Railway, part of which had to be made satisfactory to the State Highway Department, and also agreements with one or two abutting owners, particularly the International Paper Company. A complete new layout of centre line of the Street Railway tracks was run in for over half a mile in two parts, but it proved so difficult to adjust conflicting interests that before contracts were signed with the Street Railway and an agreement made with the International Paper Company for an exchange of deeds, the season was too far advanced, in view of the labor situation, to attempt any construction. In consequence of this, the railway line will have to be run in again, in conformity with the agreements and plans, whenever the work is taken up. I understand that the exchange of deeds between the City and the International Paper Company has been carried out.

In establishing building grades, I was obliged to run a line of levels along the following streets:—Blanchard from Emery to Hillside, Ottawa, the whole length and Champlain Street from Strafford north to the Boston and Maine right-of-way, in order to avoid giving grades which would not fit the future changes in the streets. Profiles of all these have been made except Champlain Street, north end, but I will make up this a little later.

One or two matters, which will call for attention in the future are the continuance of improvement of the sewer records, especially of obtaining data which are now missing, and checking over the references we have, also getting data as to depth of sewers, to save trouble when abutters, whose houses are built low, wish to connect with the sewers. In the past hardly any records have been made as to depths. There are also several man-holes which have been covered to a depth of nearly two feet with macadam, which should be built up to the new level of the streets and new reference measurements to them taken. Some time should be spent by the Engineer with the sewer foremen, Mooney and Guilmette, to obtain for the records many private references and measurements which they have taken for their own convenience. The sewer book should be carefully gone over as many of the old measurements on which we have to depend now have been lost by changes or removal of buildings or building of new ones.

A small matter that should be done is to go over the Cemetery with Mr. A. W. Walters and make up a new plan, as there are several errors in marking names of owners of lots on the plan, which have caused trouble by deeding lots which have already been sold. The old plans are not entirely correct, and a new one should be made to take in all the additions on one plan.

The plans and notes in the office should be carefully gone over and re-indexed, and more filing room provided, as there are quite a number of plans, which I have been unable to file away for want of room in the drawers.

A difficulty of the City Engineer, under the present system, to which the attention of the Mayor and Council is respectfully called is the inability to guarantee steady work to his assistant chainman or axeman. The Engineer frequently no sooner trains a young man to be competent help than he leaves to accept some other position where he is sure of full time, and the process of training has to be taken up again with a new man. For some jobs ordinary labor can occassionally be picked up, which will serve fairly well, but very few ordinary laborers are as competent as a well-trained chainman, who is fairly well educated, and young boys just out of school can be hired for less wages than ordinary labor, if they can only be guaranteed steady time, because the work is not heavy or not, as a rule, disagreeable. I think it would add to the Engineer's efficiency for the City, without costing very much more, if the City would allow him to hire such assistance by the month or week, allowing the City fair credit for such a man's time when used on surveying for private parties.

Another matter, which will probably come up within the near future is that of perambulating the town lines. I know this matter was brought up in the Council by the present Mayor several years ago, but nothing has ever been done about it. I made the last perambulations of the Gorham, Milan and Success lines more than 20 years ago, and they must be in very bad condition. It will, if done properly, be quite a long and expensive job, as the greater part of the lines have been lumbered over since and old spotting will be very hard to find.

In closing I owe an apology to the Mayor and Council for leaving their work during the term for which I had been appointed. I did, however, reserve the right in my new position, to carry along what work was necessary, and the last of the sidewalks were staked out by Mr. Brennan. I had an opportunity to earn nearly 50 per cent. higher salary than the City pay, with no lost time, which latter is a serious drawback to the service of the City in winter.

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Report of Public Works Department.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and the Honorable City Counicl:

I herewith submit to you the Annual Report of the Department of Public Works for the year ending January 31st, 1917, and wish to say a few words in regard to the work done in this department before giving you a description of the work done during the past year with the cost of the same which appears in this report under job numbers.

It would be hard to find a year when this department was not erowded with work and this year has been an exceptional one in that respect, due to the heavy rains we had early in the summer, which did a great amount of damage to our eity streets and our country roads as well, washing out in a great many places the roads, culverts and small bridges, leaving the roads impassable to travel, so you will see that the Street Maintenance, Road Maintenance, and sewer Maintenance as well, have been very expensive the past year.

Another costly problem that the department has had to contend with the past year has been the high cost of labor and the scarcity of same. It has been necessary during the past year to increase the wages of all the employees and likewise all teams working in this department and after figuring out the increased cost of labor and material, which has been necessary during the year, I am firmly convinced that it has cost from 20 to 25 per cent. more to do the same work this year than it did last year. At that, I do not think this city has suffered in this respect as badly as many other cities in this state, for in talking with other Commissioners of other cities in this State, I find that in many instances they were not able to accomplish all the work they had contemplated doing, and that which was done was at a cost of from 25 to 30 per cent. increase over the previous year.

We have endeavored this year, as in previous years, to do more permanent work, and I am convinced that if the citizens will look over carefully the work done the past season, they will agree with me that a greater amount of good permanent work has been done this past year than in former years. I would like to call your especial attention to a part of the work which I have in mind: A portion of Pleasant St. has been properly graded and covered with bituminous concrete, making one of the best and attractive streets in our City. Glen Hill, leading from Post Office Sq., has been treated in a like manner. Success St., which has cost the city thousands of dollars to maintain has been permanently laid down with Macadam, covered with Tarvia, and catch basins and gutters installed to take care of the water, making the street one of the best in our city at the present time, and with a very small expense to the City I cannot see why this street should not be in excellent condition for at least ten years to come.

All sidewalks built during the past year requiring back walls, were constructed with good stone masonary, with pipe railing on top, instead of being laid up with loose stone or old plank, which only lasted a short time and which necessitated the replacing of the same a short time later, at an additional expense to the City.

This year, the department has in laying new sewer pipe been especially careful to put in the pipe large enough to take care of the sewerage in years to come, a thing which has been sadly neglected in former years. In all places where it has been necessary to take up old pipe, larger pipe has been replaced and laid in a more substantial manner, where it could be done by connecting with the other sewers. The department laid about 100 feet more of sewer pipe this year than they did during the year 1915.

About the same amount of waterbound macadam street was built this year as last, and many of our old ones resurfaced. The cost of maintaining our city streets is more and more every year, as the city is building a lot of new streets every year and the old ones are fast wearing out, owing to the heavy increase of the Automobile Traffic.

Some of the new work ordered by the Public Works Committee was not completed this year, as stated before, by reason of the Heavy rains during the early part of the season and the searcity of help to do the work, as all the men employed by the City were busy at all times and it was impossible to obtain additional help, which would have been necessary to complete all work asked for. The most noticeable of the work left undone was a few short sidewalks. About one and one half miles of walk were built this year which was about 1200 ft. less than we built last year.

Many of the recommendations suggested by the Public Works Committee in our last report have been carried out, so far as pos-The one large job mentioned in these recommendations sible. which was left undone was that of widening out Glen Ave., moving over the car tracks, cutting off the top of Glen Hill, and making preparations for a sidewalk from Post Office Sq. to Cross' Machine Shop. This work was held up owing to our not receiving the land transfers from the International Paper ('o, until it was too late in the season to begin this work but at the present time all surveys have been made, land transfers attended to and I see no reason why this work cannot be commenced at an early date. This job when completed, and the finishing up of the State Road job started this year from the Gorham line will give the City a good wide and practically straight road from the Gorham town line to Post Office-Sq. and a road that the City will justly feel proud of.

Following is a list of the work done the past year with the cost of the same.

Job No. 1, Street Maintenance

On account of the heavy rains during the early season which caused heavy damages by reason of many of our streets being washed away the cost of this job is unusually heavy. The work includes the putting in of a large number of new catch basins and the upkeep of the old ones, taking care of the surface water, street drains, culverts, etc., in the city limits, sweeping and cleaning all streets, removing snow and sanding sidewalks, cuting ice and ditches, the collection of ashes during the year, painting and repairing fences and guard rails, also painting the Mason street bridges, includes 250 yds, of crushed rock used in resurfacing a number of our worn out macadam streets namely; East Mason St., from the Boston and Maine Bridges to the Boston and Maine R.R. Crossing, Green St., from Pleasant St., to the Grand Trunk Underpass. Pleasant St. from the Grand Trunk branch to Church St. and the westerly end of Emery St. The cost of this work for the year is \$11,053.99.

Job No. 2, Sewer Maintenance

The sewer maintenance of our city is increasing every year due to the fact that the small sewers laid years ago being unable to take care of the great amount of sewerage at the presnt time and the addition of the large number of new sewers which are being put in each year. During the past two years the City has laid approximately two miles of new sewers. The work under this job number

includes the general upkeep of the entire sewer system, also the putting in of a large quantity of new sewer pipe and the labor of haying same, a few new manholes and the cost of land rent for sewers which are on private property. The cost of this job is \$1,220.21.

Job No. 3, Tools and Equipment

This job includes the repairs and maintenance of the boilers, buildings and general equipment of the Public Works Department, and in addition to this the account shows the payment of \$1000.00 in part payment of a new Steam Roller and also all tools bought for the construction of State Road Work, as the State does not assume to pay for any tools used on State work. The cost of this job is \$2,280.96.

Job No. 4, Office

This account includes all office supplies and equipment purchased, Superintendent's salary and clerk hire. Total cost \$2,533.86.

Job No. 5, Garbage Collection

This job includes the collection of Garbage and waste from all parts of the city. The cost of the work is \$1,088.17 which is less than previous years due to the fact that the city now owns its own 'Garbage team and by careful management the team is now able to devote a portion of the day working for the Public Works Dept., the work being paid for by the department and duly credited to the Garbage account.

Job No. 6, Storehouse

The storehouse account is carried for the purpose of caring for all cement, sewer pipe, Dynamite, etc., which is needed by the department during the year. All such materials are charged to the storehouse account and as used is charged to the job for which it is needed and credited to the Storehouse account. All materials are charged out at actual cost but the freight and transportation from the cars to the storehouse is charged to the storehouse. The debit in this account is practically wiped out by reason of the Cement, Sewer pipe, Dynamite, etc., which is still stored in the building and which is listed in the inventory. The cost of the job s \$246.77.

Job No. 7, Blacksmith Shop

This account is kept similar to the Storehouse account, the work done by the shop is charged out to the different jobs and

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credited back to the Blacksmith account. The cost shows a small debit as quite a number of new tools were purchased, including a new blower. The cost of the shop account is \$99.28.

Job No. 8, Road Maintenance

Road maintenance suffered much the same as the Street Maintenance account, only a great deal more so, owing to the tremendous amount of rainfall and washouts during the early part of the season. During the month of June we had two very heavy storms which practically made our Cates Hill, East Side, and Success roads impassable. The cost of repairing Cates Hill alone was about \$3,700.00 A portion of this work was done under contract by James Hinehey, and it cost the Department over a \$1,000.00 to repair the Success Road and the East Side Road, as a great part of these roads was entirely washed out, including many small bridges and culverts. This account also includes the West Milan road which was also very badly damaged by the heavy rains. The cost of this work was \$5,516.13.

Job No. 9, 1915 Account

During the year bills were received for work that was done last year amounting to \$1736.00 This account includes \$1.592.68 which was carried over from S. D. Tiltons last years account. We have received credits for work done last year amounting to \$353.26, leaving a debit balance of \$1,382.74.

Job No. 10, Laurel St.

Laurel St. was a sewer and grading job commenced in 1915 and completed this year. Cost of same this year was \$187.51.

Job No. 11, Crusher

All rock used by the City was hauled and charged to the Crusher and later charged out to the different jobs and credited back to the crusher account. The yardage cost was a little more this year as the haul to the crusher was exceptionally long. During the latter part of the year we sold considerable rock to S. D. Tilton and the Cummings Construction Co. at a profit. We crushed during the year 2192.5 yards of rock at a cost of \$1.24 a yd.or total cost of \$2,718.70. This rock was sold out to the different jobs at \$1.24 yd. excepting that sold to Tilton and Cummings Construction Co. and the last named sold had enabled the crusher account to show a credit balance of \$143.09.

Job No. 12, Miscellaneous Account

This account covers the heating of the Fountain at the Post Office Sq., Insurance on the Storehouse buildings, Telephone which has been installed at Wm. Mooney's residence, labor on the City Skating Rink on Pleasant street, sign painting, and some work done back of the Cote Block on Dead River, caused by an ice jam. Cost of work \$427.44.

Job No. 13, Engineering

This account is for all necessary Engineering and cost \$675.62. For further information of this account see the City Engineer's report.

Job No. 14, Cascades

This little job includes the taking care of the water, earing: for the gutters and eulverts and general repairs of this little settlement known as Cascades. Cost of work was \$73.90.

Job No. 15, Sprinkling

The cost of the Sprinkling Account has been reduced over \$600.00 this year as we used considerable road oil and reduced our sprinkling, which we think has proven more beneficial to our streets. The cost of the Sprinkling account is \$1,159.87.

Job No. 17, Norwegian St.

This includes filling in and grading Norwegian St. with einders from Eight St. to Tenth St. Cost of this job is \$129.50.

Job No. 18, Hutchins St.

This includes repairing and grading Hutchins St. South from the New Berlin Mills Bridge through Napert Village. By reason of the New Berlin Mills Bridge this street is used a great deal and required a lot of work on it. Cost of the job was \$316.25.

Job No. 19, State Highway Maintenance

The cost of the State Highway Maintenance account over run the appropriation about \$500.00 due to the heavy rains and washouts during the early Spring, but Mr. Everett, State Engineer, took care of the State's proportional part of this amount. The work done included all repairs, resurfacing with gravel parts of the road heretofore surfaced with elay, cost of the patrol system, 2700 ft. of new railings and two applications of oil. The total cost of the work

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was \$2,738.24 and the city received from the State \$1,556.21 out of which \$189.19 was deducted and credited to the 1915 account, as this amount was for work done last year but check was received too late to be shown in last years report, the balance amounting to \$1,367.02 has been credited to this account, making the cost to the city \$1,371.22.

Job No. 20, Sidwealk Maintenance

This account includes the maintenance and upkeep of all sidewalks not covered with concrete. Cost \$551.68.

Job No. 23 (A), Mason St.

This job includes a heavy fill, widening the street, putting in catch basin and drainage pipe on Mason St., between Burgess and Hillsboro Streets, East side of river. Cost of job \$195.48.

Job No. 23 (B), Mason St. Macadamizing

This job included the raising and macadamizing Mason St. from Oak St. to Granite St., and up School St. from Mason St. to near the Grand Trunk Crossing. Surface area covered 2,208 sq. yds. Cost \$1,072.07. Cost per yd. 48½c.

Job No. 24 (B) Cambridge St.

This was the widening out of Cambridge St. to the full width of the street on the North Side. This work was done principally for the purpose of building a sidewalk this coming year and so the street can be graded and macadamized much the same as Success St. was done this year. This work was all through heavy ledge and consequently very costly. Cost of job \$537.62.

Job No. 25, Tarvia

The City used about the same amount of Tarvia as last year, covering all streets treated in former years together with the new Macadam streets built this year. Total cost of the work \$1,870.24.

Job No. 27 (A), Fourth Ave.

This job was for the widening out and grading Fourth Ave. from Madigan St. to Wight St., also the putting in of one 3 ft x 3 ft, concrete culvert and two smaller pipe culverts. Cost of this job was \$439.05.

Job No. 27 (B), Fourth Ave. No. 2

The large ledge just south of Madigan St. a job which had been contemplated for many years was carried on under this job

number. The large ledge completely blocked the street, compelling the traveling public to use private property. This ledge has been taken out and the rock crushed and used on other streets. The cost of this work was divided between the crusher and the street, the breaking of the rock and hauling of the same being charged to the crusher, balance of the work being charged to the street. The cost of the job was \$1,745.85.

Job No. 29, State Road Construction

This work was the building of a piece of State Road from the Gorham line toward our City. Owing to the high cost of labor and scarcity of same, this work was not completed as planned. It was done under the supervision of Mr. Diamond employed by the State as foreman on State Construction work. The work was completed from the Gorham line to the first crossing of the Berlin Street Railway and a new road from that crossing on the west side of the street railway was brushed out for a distance of about 400 ft. and about 200 ft. of the same was partially graded by sub-grade and one culvert installed. The building of about 2500 ft. which was finished included the widening out and straightening of some places of the old highway, blasting out a large amount of ledge on a sharp turn this side of Mr. Corbin's residence. Installing one 10 inch galvanized pipe 24 ft. long and the building of one stone culvert. The replacing of the old guard rails with new ones, nearly the whole distance of this piece of work. A heavy sub grade was put in and resurfaced with about 6 inches of good gravel, which was hauled from the Street Railways pit at the Cascades. Total cost of work \$4,940.98 of this the City paid 50 per cent. and the State the other 50 per cent. The cost to the City was \$2,470.49.

Job No. 30, Ninth St.

This job was for the laying of 145 ft. of surface drain and widening the street out to the street line on the north side. The cost of the pipe and the laying of same amounted to \$52.92 and the grading cost \$75.15. Total cost of the job was \$128.07. The part of this job which is for the pipe and labor of laying same is also charged in the sewer list.

Job No. 31, Houle St.

A short length of high back wall next to Mr. Shupes lot on East side of the short street just east of the Burgess School. A pipe railing was set on the top. The contract price paid to Mr. Alfred Morresette for the wall was \$2.50 per surface yd., with an extra allowance of \$5.00 for digging. Total cost \$124.49.

Job No. 32, Success St.

This is a very steep street and subject to very heavy runs of water in wet times and which has also been very troublesome and expensive to the city owing to the gravel and filling washing down on to our Main St. at every rain storm. This street has been resurfaced, the hill near Main St. having been ent down, which was all ledge work, a portion of the curb on the South side of the street being cut off which was too high, grading the street with crushed rock, thoroughly rolled and covered with Tarvia, three catch basins put in to care for the water and a four foot concrete gutter put in next to each sidewalk curb. The sidewalks have also been covered which will be shown in the sidewalk covering jobs. The area covered by macadam was 1492 sq. yds. Cost per sq. yd. including cutting down the hill, lowering the sidewalk curb in some places, and cost of catch basins was \$1,240.04, or cost per yd. of 83c. Had the gutters put in on this street been included which cost \$318.00 it would have made the cost of the work done on this street \$1,558.04. While this is an expensive job we feel that the money was well expended.

Job No. 33, State Aid

After the building of the new bridge in the Berlin Mills Village and the discontinuance of the old Sam Paine Bridge, it threw all the travel to our cemeteries, which is growing heavier each year, on to Hutchins St. and the East Side Road, the direct road to Milan, As this street and road was in very poor condition it seemed necessary by the City Officials, that this work should be done. The work covered under this job number includes grading of Bridge St. from the new bridge to Hutchins St. with a sub grade of cinders and a top grade of good gravel, straightening out and widening Hutchins St. and grading same with gravel to the Bean Brook Bridge, putting in a temporary bridge across Bean Brook for the travel, removing the old wooden bridge across the brook and putting in an up to date iron and concrete bridge, the size of which is a 28 ft. span, width of driveway 18 ft. 6 in., a 4 ft. 6 inch sidewalk on the West side, with concrete curb and pipe rails. It also includes building two large concrete culverts to take care of the water in the hollow this side of Jos. Lavartu's and the big brook just this side of St. Anne's Cemetery. These culverts were built long enough to

build a sidewalk, which we are in hopes to see to the Cemeteries in the near future. It also includes the installation of one 12 inch galvanized 28 ft. pipe across Hutchins St., near Horne St., the cutting off of the hill this side of Mr. Lavartu's and the filling over of one of the culverts in the hollow to a depth of about six feet. The City received from the State \$328.71 which is their proportional part of the whole cost of the job at the ratio of 1 to 5, which is the State Aid law. The amount received from the State does not include any part of the amount expended on Bean Brook Bridge, as the span of this bridge is too long to come under the State Aid regulations. This job is not as yet completed to the Cemeteries as was vour intention to do at the first of the season but the proportional part of the State's funds are available at any time to complete this work, without the City having to make any application for a new appropriation from the state. The whole cost of the work was Received from the state \$328.71, leaving a cost to the \$2,407.42. City of \$2,078.71.

Job No. 34, Walls

This job includes two back walls put in this year to hold up the filling of sidewalks that had been built before. They were both built under contract by Gustave Anderson. The first, on Mt. Forist St., along the Methodist Church lot, 98 ft. in length and the second on the north side of Hillside Ave. at the east end of Dead River Bridge, where the former wall had subsided. Contract prices on these walls were \$2.50 per surface yd. but some extra was paid for excavating on Hillside Ave. Total lengths 208 ft. Cost \$513.99.

Job No. 35 (B) Pleasant St.

This job was regrading Pleasant St. between Mason and Mechanic Sts. with crushed rock, and covering with a tar concrete surface and constructing crossings and gutters. The street was brought up to sub grade with crushed rock by the City and the surfacing, crossings and gutters by S. D. Tilton at following contract prices, \$1.25 per yd. for the roadway and \$1.00 for crossings and gutters. Cost of work done by the City \$557.73. Tilton covering roadway 3,658.08 yds. \$4,572.60, Tilton crossings and gutters 314.20 yds. \$314.20. Total cost of job \$5,444.53.

Job No. 36, Oiling

The city used more oil on their streeets this year than heretofore for dust laying purposes. There was applied 10,304 gals. at .07 1-5c, applied under contract by the Standard Oil Co.'s oil spraying machine, this being the same price paid by the state of New Hampshire on all her State roads. This account also includes a small item of \$7.86 for heating the last tank car. Total cost of the job \$749.79.

Job No. 38, (A), State St.

This was the filling in and grading of State street, a very much needed job. Cost of the work \$327.29.

Job No. 38 (B), Hemlock St.

Portions of Hemlock St. were graded and repaired throughout its entire length. Cost \$175.75.

Job No. 39 (C), Main St. Macadam

This was a small job of macadamizing done on upper Main St. Berlin Mills, from Sixth St. to Seventh St., where the road bed had sunk down leaving large holes and dangerous depressions. This piece of road was filled in with crushed rock, thoroughly rolled and surfaced with Tarvia. The cost of the job was \$220.64.

Job No. 43 (B), Horne Wall

This is a concrete wall built by the city along the front of Mr. Horne's lot on the East Side of Main St. joining the front wall of the old hose house, to keep the water from running off the street onto Mr. Horne's land. The length of this wall was 110 ft. and the cost was \$162.11.

Job No. 46 (A), Glen Hill

This job consists of filling with crushed rock, surfacing and rolling and concreteing with bituminous concrete, the steep hill in front of the International Paper Co.'s office, leading from Post Office Square. This department expended \$143.99 for labor and material bringing the street up to grade and the bituminous concreteing was done by S. D. Tilton under a contract price, which is shown in a listed table of Mr. Tilton's work. The work done by Mr. Tilton on this contract amounted to \$495.20 making the total cost of the improvement \$639.19.

Job No. 48 (A), Ottawa St.

This account was carried for the blasting out of a ledge and taking off a knoll on Ottawa St., near the point where it intersects with Cambridge St. The cost of this work was \$92.11.

Job. No. 17 (B), Norwegian St. Sidewalk

Under this heading is included a concrete sidewalk curb running from Eight St. to Tenth St. on the westerly side of Norwegian St. and about 350 ft. southerly from Eight St. on the same side, also a curb on the East side of Sweden St. all the way from Seventh St. to Eight St. except a gap near C. M. Davidson's where there is a large knoll of rock. These sidewalks were filled with enders, with covering of crusher dust. As the streets were very irregularly graded, some of these curbs were very high, and much filling was required. Total length 2215 ft. Total cost \$1,464.44 or about 66c per ft.

Job No. 26, Burgess St. Sidewalks

This job includes about 920 ft. of sidewalk concrete curb on the Westside of Burgess St., running about 700 ft. northerly and 300 ft. southerly from Mason St., also about 612 feet of the same on the West side of Champlain St., from Mason to Strafford, also about 424 feet on the north side of East Mason street, all with einder filling and crusher dust surface, all sidewalks in this locality being included in this one job. It also includes about 348 ft. of back walls on Burgess and Champlain Sts., on which concrete curbs were run and railings set. On about 200 ft. of these walls the abuting owners paid half the cost. Length of sidewalks 1956 ft. Back walls 348 ft. Total 2,304 ft. Total cost \$1,586.06. Ft. cost sidewalks and walls 69c.

Job No. 35, Pleasant St. Sidewalk

This includes a concrete sidewalk curb on the South side of Pleasant St., from Mason St., westerly to Green St., with einder filling and crusher dust filling and also includes about 65 ft. of back wall with curb on the top of it. The total length from end to end is 1059 feet, but there were several wide gaps and driveways, besides the crossing of Mechanic St., for all which we have thrown out the odd 159 feet. The total length of sidewalk 900 ft. Total length of back wall 65 ft. Total cost of job \$843.95 or 871/2 c per running ft. of sidewalk and wall.

Job No. 39, Post Office Sq. Sidewalk

This was a small piece of cement concrete sidewalk laid on the north-east side of Post Office Sq., where the sidewalk travel is very heavy. Cost \$111.97.

Job No. 39 (B), Mechanic St. Sidewalk

This was a short length of sidewalk on the East side of the street, extending from the old walls over the top of the hill to the Decoteau Residence, with necessary filling. Length 238 feet. Cost \$162.43. Cost per foot 681/4 c.

Job. No. 49, Washington St. Sidewalk

This includes concrete curb sidewalk running along the north side of School St., from High to Washington and on the East Side of Washington as far as Emery, filled in with cinders and covered with crusher dust. Length 463 ft. Cost \$315.06. Cost per ft. 68c.

Job No. 49 (B), Malloy Sidewalk

This includes about 300 ft. of concrete curb sidewalk with cinder filling along the west side of Willard St. extending the former sidewalk northerly. There was a great deal of heavy filling and some of the back had to be stoned up to hold the filling, making a very costly job. Length 317 ft. Cost \$309.12. Cost per ft. 97½c.

Job No. 50, Pine St. Sidewalk

This is a new walk with concrete curb and cinder filling on the northerly side of Pine St., running westerly from Hemlock St. toward Dead River. Length 403 ft. Cost \$256.11. Cost per ft. 63½c.

Job No. 45, Covering Sidewalks and Repairing Main St.

This job included covering a number of einder filled walks with tar concrete, re-surfacing some old walks that were in bad condition and covering uneven places on Main St., between Sixth and Seventh Sts., and laying a new piece of street at the end of the Y. M. C. A. Bridge and also covering Main St., at the intersection of Main and Mason Sts. This work was done under contract by S. D. Tilton at the following prices: 65c per sq. yd. for covering new walks, 50c per yd. for recovering old ones, \$1.00 per yd. for crossings and gutters and \$1.25 per yd. for repairing Main St. The total cost of this job was \$3,629,25 distributed over the following streets.

Department Accounts

There are bills outstanding due the department from various sources amounting to \$178.68.

The department has collected during the year from various sources and turned over to the City Treasurer \$694.00.

After a careful study of the conditions in our City, I would like to make the following suggestions for work to be done this coming season.

Cambridge street should be treated in the same manner as Success St. was this year, which would save the City a considerable amount of money by reason of not having to fill in the street after every heavy storm.

Two of the oldest streets in our City which have been built up for over thirty years and which have received very little attention during that time, namely First and Second Sts. in Berlin Mills Village should be macadamized and proper drainage installed, this coming year.

Many of our residential streets are in bad shape and as far as possible should be macadamized this coming season. A few of the streets that I now recall to mind are: A portion of School St., Church St., Washington St., Upper end of High St., First Ave., Jolbert St., Mt. Forist and Clark Sts.

The work of removing the large ledge on Fourth Ave., where our crusher is now located should be continued this year.

Hillside Ave., from High St., to Prospect St., should be laid down with some permanent macadam during the coming season, to save the heavy washout in this section after every storm.

The East Side of our City should see a great deal of attention this season as it is building up very fast and the streets are on a whole in very bad condition. A portion of the streets in Forbush Park has been accepted by the city this year and they will require a lot of attention during the coming year.

A new iron and concrete bridge will have to be built over Jericho Brook, on the West Milan road, just above Dressers' Farm, to replace the old wooden structure, which is in a bad and unsafe condition for traffic. Some repairs will be necessary on the two bridges over Horne Brook on the East Side Road.

In closing I wish to express my thanks to the Mayor, City Conncil, Public Works Committee, and the City Engineer, for their many attentions and assistance shown me in the performance of my duties.



Librarian's Report.

December 31, 1916

To the Board of Trustees of the Free Public Library:

The twenty-fourth annual report of the library, showing its work for the year ending December 31, 1916, is herewith submitted.

The circulation deserves the foremost place, and it is with pleasure that we report the largest circulation in years. There have been given out 38,075 volumes, out of this number 15,773 volumes were taken from the children's department.

During the year four hundred and ninety-five books were bought, and seventy-six received as gifts, making a total of nine thousand seven hundred and eighty-seven volumes now in the library.

On account of many other expenses of the library this year, it was impossible to send any adult books to the bindery. A box of ninety-six books were rebound for the children's department, to help replace the large number that were taken out of circulation during the summer.

By Miss Hutchinson's resignation in the early part of the summer, the library lost a faithful and energetic worker; and everything in our power has been done, endeavoring to keep up the good work started by Miss Hutchinson.

The children's department under the supervision of Miss Jewell is being conducted the same as in past years. Miss Jewell by her pleasing manner has won the hearts of the many little ones who attend this department at every session. The government in this room was, for a time, a problem, but after working diligently with the children we feel that they now understand the meaning of this department.

The installing of the new stack in the literature alcove has greatly lessened the congested condition of the shelves that former-

ly existed before this addition was made. To further improve the usefullness of the library, the installing of a telephone, and the publishing of a monthly bulletin would be of much value.

The reading room is still the useful part of the library. Every session finds the chairs well filled with readers who make good use of the newspapers and magazines. In reference work we have done our utmost to answer all questions asked of us and also looking up all magazines articles requested.

Thanks are here given to the Trustees for their co-operation and to all the patrons who have taken an interest in the library.

Report of Library Trustees.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and the City Council of the City of Berlin: Gentlemen:--

The Trustees of the Free Public Library of the City of Berlin herewith submit their Twenty-Fourth annual Report, containing a statement of the financial condition, together with the report of the Librarian, showing the acquisition and circulation of books.

The work accomplished at the Library during the past year has been satisfactory and up to the standard of previous years. During the year we had the misfortune of being obliged to accept the resignation of Miss Adria A. Hutchinson, who has held the position of Librarian for the past few years, during which time she gave very faithful and efficient service, which has given the Library a very high standing. Miss Lottie Kailey has been Acting Librarian since that time, and is doing the same excellent work done by Miss Hutchinson. Miss Jewell has for the past few months been conducting the Children's Department in a very satisfactory manner.

It is impossible for the management of the Library to maintain the present efficiency without an increase in the appropriation. There must be in increase in the salaries of the Librarian and Assistant, as well as for janitor work which was done during the past year.

It will be seen from the Librarian's report that there has been a substantial increase in the circulation, both from the main desk and the Children's Department. There is at present an urgent demand for more books, especially along the lines of the work now being done in the High School.

We trust the City Government will see the importance of an efficient and up-to-date Free Public Library in a young and growing community, such as we have here in Berlin.

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Assessors' Report.

Berlin, N. H., January 31, 1917.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and the City Council of the City of Berlin:

Gentlemen:—We herewith submit our report for the year ending January 31, 1917, for the twentieth annual report of the City of Berlin.

The inventory of the taxable property of the City of Berlin shows an increase of \$522,529 over last year. Most of this was on Mills and machinery and new buildings. For the coming year we do not see where we can make much increase, other than on new property about the City, and in the Corporations. We think there will be an increase of about \$125,000 on new property outside of the Corporations.

We assessed the taxable property in the City as usual and made our report to the tax Commission. Under date of July 26, 1916, we were ordered by the tax Commission to make a re-assessment of all the taxable real estate and personal property situated in the City of Berlin belonging to the International Paper Company. Berlin Mills Company and the Burgess Sulphite Fibre Company. We complied with the order under date of August 24, in which case we found an increase in personal property of the Burgess Sulphite Fibre Company of \$324,750 which came about by our having taxed the pulp wood for the amount on hand April 1, 1916, (as had been the custom for some years back) instead of taxing it for the average through the year as the law requires. We intended to make this change for the year 1917 and were going to so advise the Corporation, but owing to the fact that in 1915 we got a much larger amount of pulp wood by taxing the amount on hand as of April 1st, instead of the average for the year, we did not think it a fair proposition to make a change without notifying the Corporations, but when ordered to re-assess we thought best to tax according to law. On the International Paper Company we found an increase of \$175.00, on the Berlin Mills Company we made no changes from our original assessmeent.

CITY OF BERLIN

We personally inspected and located all property so far as possible. In our last year's report we recommended that the City install a Card System for the Assessors similar to the one used in Manchester and other eities through the State. Since that report we have visited two of the other eities, and talked with representatives from many others, and we find that those that have not already got the system installed are either making arrangements to do so, or think the same a great benefit to the Assessors and Public in general. We have made a report to the City Council recommending that they authorize the Assessors to purchase such Cabinets and Cards as would be necessary for such a system.

We had the same difficulties last year that we have had in years past in getting the citizens to return their inventories according to law, and we feel that the same is due wholly by the people not appreciating the assistance that it would be to the Assessors to have the inventories returned promptly, property specifically mentioned and located, and where they are entitled to swear off the property according to law, have it properly done, then we would not have to abate taxes later on that should have been sworn off. We have had to do more or less of this in the past year but unless we can be shown some reasonable excuse for not having returned an inventory we shall feel it our duty not to allow parties to swear off their property after we have established the rate.

We found 3,845 polls in town which was about 300 more than last year, but there is no question in our minds but what there are in the vicinity of 500 polls in excess of what we located as it is impossible to get the names and locate the men in many of the boarding houses.

We desire to express our thanks to the eitizens for the information and help given us in discharging our duty.

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New Bartlett School.

To His Honor the Mayor and City Council:-

Gentlemen:-

The Building Committee of the Bartlett School begs to report the completion of the school building and hereby to tender its resignation.

A statement of the Committee activities follows: April 18, 1916 the Board of Education asked that an appropriation of \$42,000 be made "for the purchase of the Cole lot and the construction and epuipping of a six room school building to be located thereon." This appropriation was subsequently made; the lot purchased for \$12,000; and April 25th a joint building committee was appointed consisting of the members of the Board of Education and Councilmen King, Hazzard and Cooper.

The committee organized May 1st, with H. D. Green, Chairman and J. W. Cooper, Secretary.

Mr. H. C. Bates was engaged to furnish plans and specifications and to superintend the construction work.

June 6th a contract was entered into with Messrs. Rowell & Houston for the construction of the Building.

Work was begun June 10th and January 2nd the building was occupied by the schools.

Your Committee is pleased to report that the building is entirely furnished and completely equipped within the original appropriation; this in spite of the fact that the cost of material not contracted for and especially the cost of equipment had advanced considerably after the original contract was made.

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



The Committee on Finance herewith submits its financial report for the fiscal year ending January 31, 1917.

From the figures furnished us by our Auditor, Mr. Arthur T. Byrnes, which figures we have carefully examined, it appears that the total receipts for the year, including cash on hand January 31, 1916, amount to\$448,954.19

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In making the foregoing recommendations we have been guided by the probable needs of the different departments, based upon our experience and the expenditures for the year 1916.

The appropriation recommended for the Department of Public Works is with the understanding that all fees received from the State of New Hampshire for liquor licenses held in this city, shall be credited to this department, as has been done for several years.

Our tax rate for 1916 was \$2.20 and with an increase in our valuation which we think will probably be made the coming year we should be able to make the appropriations above recommended without an increase in the tax rate.

In making the foregoing recommendation for the appropriation for the Public Works Department we had in mind the completion of the improvements already begun on the highway between Post Office Square and the Gorham line.

For a detailed report of the financial condition of the City we respectfully call your attention to the Auditor's report which appears elsewhere in this volume.
