

Inaugural Address

Delivered by the Mayor, J. A. Vaillancourt

To the Honorable City Council and Fellow Citizens:-

My re-election as Mayor of Berlin was a vindication, also an approval of my administration during the past year. I thank all the citizens of our City, and I pledge myself to give you the best there is in me during the coming year, and with the help of my Council, there is no doubt that the results will be as good as last year. I appreciate the confidence that the citizens of Berlin have shown by electing us to manage the Municipal Affairs. Let us understand that much depends on us, and we must always have in mind the welfare of our City.

To the new members of the City Government, I extend a cordial greeting.

With your permission, I will mention a few of the improvements that this administration brought about during the past year.

First was the matter of the rebuilding of the Green Street Underpass. We took this up with the Public Service Commission in Concord, and they rendered a decision in favor of the City, which resulted in the Canadian National Railways rebuilding the underpass at their expense.

The second matter brought to our attention was the establishment of traffic rules and regulations; this has long been a point of issue between the City Council and the Police Commission. In the month of May, the matter was settled and the new traffic rules and regulations went into effect. We do not claim these rules as being perfect, but it is our intention to amend and change them until they are suitable to the needs of the City.

During the past year, the City purchased a new American Lafrance type seventy-five triple combination pumper.

These are only a few of the events which took place in the past year.

FINANCES

'It is with apprehension that I approach this subject; but it is necessary that the tax payers should know what the financial condition of the City January 31st, 1924, was, also that of January 31st. 1925.

On March 31st, 1924, when I was sworn in as Mayor, I felt confident that the report did not give an actual statement of the affairs of our City, so I hired an expert accountant to go over the books of the City of Berlin, and his report was very different than the one submitted by the previous administration. It was found that the overdraft for the year 1924 amounted to \$110,648.80 and not \$70,051.30 as reported. The net City debt January 31st, 1924, was \$736,370.59 and not \$695,773.09 as reported. The difference between the actual debt and the debt as reported January 31st, 1924, was \$40,597.50 so that we owed that much more. (This amount comes from the following items).

That amount added to the overdraft shown on page 344 in the City Report of 1923-1924 shows an overdraft of \$110,648.80.

This year, on January 31st, 1925, our net City indebtedness was \$591,010.86, showing a decrease during the year of \$145,359.73.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

This department during the past year did not overrun its appropriation. Considerable work was done as the payroll shows that the City paid \$8,000 more in wages than was paid last year.

I regret to say that on account of the illness of Mr. Ward we have lost the most efficient Superintendent of the Public Works Department that the City of Berlin has ever had.

The Milan road will be completed this year at a cost to the City of about \$35,000.

It is essential that the City keep up its improvements on the sewers, streets and sidwalks.

PUBLIC SCHOOLS

The subject of the schools is of greatest importance and many different opinions are entertained in this matter; however, the public should realize that this matter is left entirely with the Board of Education. They are doing all in their power to make our schools the best in the State, and it is our duty to support them, and when orders are given they should be carried out, and not discussed, as that is conductive to lack of discipline.

NEW JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL

A new school will be built, work to start very soon, contracts have been awarded. The plans of this building are the same as those submitted to the old board except that the auditorium and gymnasium are not to be built this year. This will be a great improvement of our School System. The health and mental development of our children comes above all. They must have the best training possible to fit them for the battle of life. This training they will receive only in modern and well-managed schools.

We will not issue any bonds at present to build the Junior High School, as it is our intention to use our surplus cash.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

This department is in excellent condition and is very efficient. There has been added to it a new American Lafrance 750 gallon combination pumper.

This year if our funds permit, it is our intention to buy a hook and ladder truck, thereby completing the motorization of the Central Fire Station.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT

The Health Department is ably conducted by Mr. Leeds. The City has spent several thousands of dollars on new apparatus, hoping to put this department on a first-class basis.

When Mr. Leeds came here, he found files and records gone from that office, and he had to work under great disadvantages.

TAXES

Many persons in the town have refused to pay their poll taxes. The law says they must. Poll taxes must be collected and I will insist that they are; the old ones as well as the new ones. You must realize the fact, and the faster, the better, that the business of Municipality is to protect life and property, maintaming its police and fire departments and provide for other necessities and pleasures of the people through the maintenance of sewers, streets, sidewalks, schools and library. Is this worth a few dollars? Everybody should be proud to pay his or her poll tax. This year the poll tax will be reduced; it will be only \$3.00 apiece for both men and women.

WATER SYSTEM

After much work and many delays, we have succeeded in purchasing the Water Company at a price of \$475,000 plus the

actual amount of money spent for permanent improvements during the past year. We will issue bonds to the amount of \$700,000 of which about \$200,000 is to be used for improvements consisting of a filtration plant and many other improvements too long to enumerate at this time.

We will have better fire protection, also pure water for domestic purposes.

CONCLUSION

I recommend that a purchasing committee be appointed by the Mayor to look after all the purchases made for the City. I have noticed that the City is never credited with discounts on bills although same are paid very promptly. Much can be saved in this manner.

It is necessary that we acquire a snowplow to keep our streets clear of snow in the winter, so that fire apparatus can get to a fire at a minimum loss of time.

I also recommend public playgrounds for this City, and a small sum of money be appropriated for such purposes. This demand comes from the Welfare Committee of the Woman's Club, and it deserves attention.

To you, Councilmen of Berlin, I expect your hearty support and I know that you will help to carry on the work so that the citizens will realize that we are working for their interests.

Ordinances

In the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and twentyfive.

AN ORDINANCE relating to the erection and maintenance of gasoline pumps.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Berlin as follows:

Section 1. No person shall hereafter erect or install any gasoline pump on the curb of the sidewalk, on any public street or square.

- Sect. 2. All persons now owning gasoline pumps located on the curb of the sidewalk on any public street or square shall obtain a permit for each pump, so located, from the City Clerk. Each person shall pay for such license, for the use of the City, the sum of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00); said license fee to be paid on or before the first day of August annually.
- Sect. 3. All persons owning and operating gasoline pumps from their own land to connect with automobiles parked at the curb of the sidewalk, shall assume all responsibility for any injuries or damages caused to persons or property of the public lawfully occupying the sidewalk, street or square.
- Sect. 4. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine not exceeding ten dollars (\$10.00) for each offense.
 - Sect. 5. This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

Resolutions

In the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and twentyfive.

A RESOLUTION authorizing the issue of Water Bonds.

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Berlin as follows:

That under authority of and in compliance with New Hampshire Acts of 1925, Chapter entitled "An Act Authorizing the City of Berlin to Acquire, Construct, Manage and Own Water Works" and for the purpose of raising funds to acquire by purchase or otherwise the property, rights and privileges within and outside of the city, of Berlin Water Company, Incorporated, and for the construction of new filter beds and water improvements and extensions, the City Treasurer be and he is hereby authorized to borrow the sum of seven hundred thousand dollars (\$700,000) and for that purpose to issue bonds of the City in said amount of seven hundred thousand dollars (\$700,000), dated April 1, 1925, in coupon form payable to bearer, or, at holder's option, in coupon form registerable as to principal only, as may be determined by the City Treasurer to be for the best interests of the City, payable \$10,000 on April 1 each year 1926 to 1930 inclusive, \$15,000 on April 1 each year 1931 to 1940 inclusive, \$20,000 on April 1 each year 1941 to 1950 inclusive, and \$30,000 on April 1, each year 1951 to 1960 inclusive, with principal and interest payable at the Old Colony Trust Company, Boston, Massachusetts, shall bear the city seal, shall be signed by the Mayor and countersigned by the City Treasurer, and shall bear interest at a rate not exceeding $4\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. per annum payable semi-annually. The coupons annexed to said bonds shall bear the facsimile signature of the City Treasurer. None of said bonds shall be obligatory without the certificate of said Old Colony Trust Company signed thereon. Other particulars as to the form, issuance and sale of said bonds not inconsistent with legal requirements shall be determined by the City Treasurer, subject to the approval of the Finance Committee. The proceeds of said bonds are hereby appropriated for the purposes mentioned herein except that any premiums received from the sale thereof less cost of preparing, issuing and selling

said bonds shall be applied to the payment of principal of the first maturing bonds.

For the purpose of providing for the payment of principal and interest of said bonds accruing each year, there shall be raised by taxation annually such sums as, in addition to any income available for said purpose from the water works, may be found necessary to pay said principal and interest each year until said bonds are paid in full.

A RESOLUTION authorizing the issue of serial bonds of said City to the amount of one hundred seventy-five thousand dollars (\$175,000.00).

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Berlin as follows:

That there be appropriated for the purpose of building and equiping a Junior High School building, the sum of one hundred seventy-five thousand dollars (\$175,000.00).

Be it further resolved that the City Treasurer be and he is hereby authorized to borrow said sum of one hundred seventy-five thousand dollars (\$175,000.00) and for that purpose that the bonds of said City be issued to the extent of one hundred seventy-five thousand dollars (\$175,000.00) under the "Municipal Bonds Act of 1895" and acts amendatory of and in addition thereto.

Said bonds shall be dated December 1st, 1925, to be in coupon form payable to bearer, maturing five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) on December 1st, 1926, five thousand dollars on December 1st, 1927, five thousand dollars on December 1st, 1928, five thousand dollars on December 1st, 1929, five thousand dollars on December 1st, 1930, and ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00) on December 1st, 1931, and ten thousand dollars on the first day of December of each of the years 1932 to 1945 inclusive.

Each annual payment to be divided into bonds of one thousand dollars each, principal and interest to be payable at the Old Colony Trust Company, Boston, Mass., and none of said bonds to be obligatory without the authenticating certificate of said Old Colony Trust Company endorsed thereon.

The said bonds shall bear the seal of said City, to be signed by the Mayor and countersigned by the City Treasurer and bear interest at the rate of four and one-half (4½) per cent per annum, payable semi-annually. To the Board of Trustees of the Berlin Public Library:

The thirty-third annual report of the Librarian of the Free Public Library is herewith submitted:

The circulation reports for the past year show a very creditable increase over previous years. Every effort has been made to give our library patrons courteous attention and to meet their demands for reading material

In September a new registration was taken and 2,244 borrowers have registered since that time. In this manner a more definite idea of the number of borrowers taking books from the library at the present time has been obtained.

The Juvenile Department has been equally active during the past year. Eager readers come daily to the library and the Children's Room is crowded from opening until closing hour.

The Children's Book Week program was especially effective. The closing event was a Book Week play entitled "The Revolt of the Books," which excited much interest and enthusiasm among adults and juveniles alike. We wish to thank Mr. John Graff for the use of his spotlight, the People's Furniture Company for the use of their furniture, and all others who helped to make this event a success.

We are very grateful to the Woman's Club, the Friday Club, Mrs. O. B. Brown, Mrs. W. R. Brown, Mrs. A. M. Stahl, and Mr. Paul Brown for their generous gifts to the library during the past year.

We also wish to thank the Brown Company for the space they have so generously given us in the Brown Bulletin, and also for the use of their truck in the Armistice Day parade.

We trust that the pleasant relations that have always existed between the library staff and their patrons will continue during the coming year.

Fire Department

To His Honor, the Mayor, and City Council of the City of Berlin: Gentlemen:—I have the honor of submitting herewith the annual report of the Fire Department of the City of Berlin for the year ending December 31, 1925.

During the year we had 1 out-of-town call to Gorham, 82 still calls, 22 bell calls, 5 false alarms and 6 verbal alarms, making a total of 116 calls.

The fire loss for the year, however, was very small, being only \$9,315.68 on buildings and \$4,235.07 on contents, making a total of \$13,550.75.

I personally inspected the business section of the City and had inspectors go over the other buildings and yards, ordering cleanups and repairs where necessary.

Fire Prevention Week was observed as in former years. Fire Chiefs all over the country feel that this is a great benefit to communities and have made it an annual event.

The 750 Triple Combination Pumper ordered last year was put in service in February and has proved to be a great help. A City Service truck has also been ordered by the City for this Department and will be delivered about February 10th. This will do away with horses at the Central Fire Station and will be a great addition to our equipment.

During the year we have worked 108½ hours at fires and have traveled 357 miles. 3,979 gallons of chemicals were used, 1,234 ft. of ladders used, 14,900 ft. of 2½ inch hose laid and 9,225 ft. of chemical hose used.

A statement in detail of all fires and alarms for which damage was claimed is attached with the names of the owners, occupants, etc.

Report of the City Solicitor

Berlin, N. H., Jan. 31, 1926.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and City Council of the City of Berlin:

I herewith submit my report as City Solicitor for the fiscal year ending January 31, 1926.

During the past year, I have investigated many claims for damage to property and other claims against the City of various natures. All claims have been disposed of amicably, and as a result, no new suits have been brought against the City since my last report.

The case of William Arsenault against the City of Berlin was tried at the December, 1925, Term. This suit was instituted for an alleged trespass by the City in changing the grade of the street and sidewalk in front of Mr. Arsenault's property on State Street, causing water to accumulate on the plaintiff's property, and for the taking of fifty loads of rock that were piled in the yard. The jury found that the plaintiff was entitled to the sum of two hundred eighty-eight dollars and twelve cents for his damage.

In the appeal case of F. W. Woolworth Co. against the City for interference with their leasehold rights in the Day Block, at 9-11-13 Main Street, questions were framed for an opinion by the Supreme Court in an advance of a jury trial. The Supreme Court ruled that in the event that the City of Berlin actually took possession of the small brick ell before the termination of Woolworth's lease on May 1, 1929, the City would be compelled to pay damages to Woolworth Company for taking any property covered by their lease, but unless the City of Berlin actually entered into possession, no damage would accrue.

The case of the Estate of George Ryder against the City of Berlin has been disposed of by an agreement that the City of Berlin will build a retaining wall along the sidewalk on the street side of this property, and the Estate of George Ryder is to put in their own steps from the sidewalk to the house. This agreement was in accordance with an understanding between the late Mr. George Ryder and Ex-Mayor Eli J. King.

Report of Police Commission

To His Excellency, the Governor of the State of New Hampshire, and to His Honor, the Mayor, and City Council of the City of Berlin.

In accordance with the provisions of Chapter 160, Session Laws of 1905, as amended by Chapter 148 of the Session Laws of 1913, we submit our annual report.

We were not appointed until December 17, 1925, and consequently have very little to report.

We found the Police Department well organized and in a high state of efficiency.

We organized as required by law by electing Edmund Sullivan Chairman and P. W. Churchill, Clerk. Since our organization, no charges have been made.

Appropriations

In the matter of appropriations, we are not prepared at this time to give a detailed statement of the amount required by the department for the ensuing year. It is our purpose, however, to furnish a statement to the Mayor and City Council before they make their annual appropriations.

We suggest at this time that the "call box" system is out of repair. This is an important appliance and absolutely necessary to the efficiency of the Police Department. It should be put in first-class condition.

We are also contemplating putting the force on an eight hour basis. If this is done, we will have to increase the force about one third, which will increase the expenses of the Department at least \$10,000.00 a year. This move has been long contemplated by the Police Commissioners. Our predecessors had it in mind and were making an investigation of the different Police Departments through the state. It is our purpose to continue the investigation and see whether such a change is desirable, and seasonably report to the Mayor and City Council, so that the necessary appropriation can be made in case we decide to make the change.

It is extremely gratifying to report that relations between the Police Force and the State and County Officers are of the best.

They work in harmony and for the common good. The State Officers and the County Solicitor have only words of praise for the Berlin Police Force.

Police Commissioners

The Police Commissioners are appointed by the Governor, one each year, for a period of three years, with a salary of \$350.00 a year, to be divided as the Board may determine. The term of each incumbent expires as follows:

Edmund Sullivan, September 1, 1928. Napoleon Ramsey, September 1, 1927. Perley W. Churchill, September 1, 1926.

Beats

Main Street—From Ste. Ann's Church to and including Glen Avenue—is under constant surveillance.

Exchange Street, including Grand Trunk Railway Station and Pleasant Street, between Green and Mason Streets, are under constant surveillance of some officer.

Main Street, for a short distance above, opposite, and below the Brown Company's Store, is patrolled during the entire day until eleven p. m.

Mason Street, on the East Side, and in the vicinity of the Boston and Maine Railroad Station, is patrolled from twelve o'clock noon to eleven p. m.

High Street is patrolled during the early part of the evening. For the names of officers, salaries, and list of property of the Police Department, reference is made to the City Marshal's Report.

Report of Superintendent

To the Board of Education:

I herewith submit my fifth annual report as Superintendent of the Berlin Public Schools.

There is not much new to which I shall call your attention at this time. Our work in Character Education in the grades has commanded considerable attention. We have received inquiries from many places even as far away as California. The present year we are attacking the problem of Character Education in the High School but the progress made is not yet in form to put into the annual report. The grade faculty are working out a careful, detailed course of study following the general plan as outlined in the State Program of Studies.

I believe that these activities on the part of the teachers are bearing fruit in a higher type of professional attitude and through this improved attitude a higher type of class procedure. It has been a source of great satisfaction to me to observe the eagerness and the conscientious industry of the teaching corps in the carrying out of these extra professional activities.

I believe that our teaching corps is the best balanced and most effective that we have had in the past five years.

HIGH SCHOOL PROGRAMS

Last year in the effort to secure adequate provision for the Junior High School we attempted a long school day with a supervised study plan. For a number of reasons, this did not give the best of satisfaction so the new program as now in force was started. This program provides for the opening of the Senior High School at 8 o'clock and the Junior High School at 9.30. The Senior High closes at 11.00, opens again at 1.00 and closes for the day at 2.30. The Junior High closes its morning session at 12.00, opens again at 2.00 and closes at 4.00. This program seems to have resulted in much more satisfaction and harmony, although during the periods that both Junior and Senior High Schools are in session we are forced to crowd our classes and hold some classes in the Marston Building.

THE NEW BUILDING AND REORGANIZATION

The new building will give us an opportunity not only to relieve the congestion in High School but also in the grades. It is likely that we shall place in the new building the sixth, seventh and eighth grades, although in order to use the Burgess Building properly it may not be possible to take out all the sixth grades. Another problem that is involved here and upon which I am not prepared as yet to make a recommendation is the problem of departmental work in the sixth grades.

Departmental work, I believe, will result in better subject matter teaching and economy of instruction. On the other hand, it may make the problem of habit formation and character building more difficult. The opening of the new building with its attendant changes will require at least three and more likely four additional teachers. However, it will enable us to relieve the congestion in a number of very large classes.

This building leaves us with adequate facilities for taking care of all the pupils in the public schools, but there are still some problems to be faced. The number of pupils living in the Bartlett School district is so great that we will have to move all grades above the fourth into other buildings.

We also have approximately sixty pupils of the first six grades living at Cascade. We have been able in the past to make arrangements with Gorham for the care of these pupils. If these arrangements can be continued we will have no difficulty there; the matter will depend, however, on the situation in the Gorham district and an agreement with Gorham will have to be made from year to year.

It looks as though the next building demand would be for a four-room building on the East Side. Such a building would enable us to abandon the old Cole School which is not desirably located. Most of the children in the first two grades in this building come from the East Side. It is possible that a number of children living on the East Side cannot attend the Cole School on account of the distance. There is also a possibility that we will have to add to the Bartlett School in the near future.

FINANCES

The accompanying financial statement makes it clear that we have endeavored to conduct the schools with economy. I do not believe that it will be possible in another year to maintain a budget under \$180,000. I am not submitting at this time a proposed

budget for there are so many factors of reorganization to be settled before that budget can be accurately estimated.

Penmanship Report

To Superintendent of Schools, Carl M. Bair:

I herewith submit my third annual report as Supervisor of Penmanship in the Public Schools of Berlin.

I wish first to pay a tribute to the Palmer Method of Penmanship. It has many good points but there stand out preeminent among others, two valuable features that no other system had until it copied them from the Palmer Method. These two are the instruction of the teachers in the Method, free of expense, and, secondly, a clear and definite outline of the work. Not being satisfied at stopping with teaching the teacher how to write, the Palmer Method gives clear and definite instructions as to how writing should be taught. It shows the position, the movement, and the forms of the letters, so that the teacher cannot go astray, but may direct the pupil by successive steps until the child reaches the goal of good business penmanship.

Many of the teachers realizing the splendid opportunity have enrolled in the free correspondence course and are progressing rapidly. Since my last report, Mrs. Murray, Miss Morin, Miss Flynn and Miss Moshure have received their Palmer Method Teachers' Certificates. Miss Moshure became so interested in the work that she took a special course at Mr. Palmer's New York Summer School.

The boys and girls enjoy the penmanship period and take pride in using muscular movement in all their written work. They like to receive the Palmer Method Awards which are: for the first grade, a silver star button; for the second, a gold star button; a Palmer Method button for grades three and four; a progress pin for grades five and an Improvement Certificate for grade six.

Ninety minutes each week are given to the penmanship in the grades. I give a lesson each week in the first four grades and alternate weeks in grades five and six.

At this time I wish to express my appreciation to the Superintendent, teachers, and all who have cooperated in the work.

Drawing Report

To Superintendent of Schools, Carl M. Bair:

I herewith submit my third annual report as Supervisor of Drawing in the Berlin Public Schools.

Efficiency is the slogan of our age. This is being demonstrated in business, industry and all progressive enterprises. It is being used in the schools. The present demand in education is for a maximum of learning in a minimum of time. We are called upon to apply this principle to the art work of the public schools.

A most encouraging trend in the national problem of art education is evidenced in the activities of the Federated Council on Art Education, a research body, national in scope, and backed by sufficient funds to assure the success of its undertakings. The object of the council is to be a clearing house for all art questions and to unify art objectives.

The citizens of the United States are beginning to realize that the banker, merchant, the newspaper, and all agencies advancing programs of thrift, health, play, character, religion, good reading, etc., make an appeal to the public through a medium which is a product of art education.

The one aim in art work in the public schools is the development of the imagination or creative ability. We accomplish this, in the primary grades, by paper folding, freehand cutting and pasting. This work tends to make the pupil skillful with his hands and encourages neatness. With the advance of the grade more difficult problems in paper construction are made. Much time is devoted, during the fall and spring, to nature drawing. In this work careful study is made of lines, proportions and color harmony.

At least forty-five minutes each week is given to the art work in the grades. Each grade is visited by the supervisor alternate weeks.

In conclusion I wish to express my appreciation to the Superintendent, teachers and all others who have assisted in the progress of the work.

Evening School

To Superintendent Carl M. Bair:

The Evening School has undergone some changes during the present year. Through the marriage of Margaret Mahaney Haines and her subsequent removal from the city, Berlin lost a valued and experienced Director of its Evening Schools. Teachers and pupils alike miss her presence at the accustomed places.

No full time director has since been elected. The school is under the direction of Superintendent Carl M. Bair who appointed Katherine E. Porteus and Bertha M. Cross as assistants in the English and Citizenship work respectively.

The schedule of work has continued along the same lines as in previous years—thanks to the outlines and material left on file at the office of Mrs. Haines, and to the employment of practically the same teaching staff with the training and attitude so essential to this type of teaching.

All work is centralized at the Senior High School where ten classes are now in session. School opened on October 13, 1925, and will continue until the State requirement of sixty lessons in English and Citizenship is completed, which will be early in March.

On November 3, 1925, a class in Machine Shop practice, with Richard Towers instructor, was opened for the first time. Seven men, mostly garage mechanics, took advantage of the course. It was not long before a maximum of ten men was attained and several are on the waiting list. These students pay the instructor's salary. The attendance and interest is very commendable. Tools needed for use in the men's daily work form the project work.

There was such a demand for typewriting by young men and women of the city that on November 4, 1925, the typewriting room was opened with Emma J. Williams, the regular day school teacher, in charge. There were not machines enough to accommodate all the applicants and many are on the waiting list. The total number taking typewriting is 55. 32 of these are taking the full period and 23 part time.

Music Department

To Carl M. Bair, Superintendent of Schools:

The addition of an assistant this year has given us an opportunity to meet the grade teachers more frequently and to direct more closely the teaching of music in the grades. This has also given the Director of Music an opportunity to spend more time in supervision and the directing of the work in the musical organizations of the High School.

In the intermediate grades the same method has been followed as in past years. Considerable attention has been paid to phrasing, enunciation and articulation. Vocal exercises and frequent tests in sight singing, with the cooperation of the regular teachers, has produced some fine results.

On account of the crowded condition in the Senior High School building, the pupils of the Junior High School have been deprived of instruction in vocal music as they were last year. Two years without the chance of expressing themselves in school singing is much to be regretted. Next year when the new Junior High School building is completed and occupied, it is to be hoped that vocal music instruction can be resumed. The Junior High School has an orchestra of eighteen which meets outside of school hours. These players will be augmented during the spring months by pupils from the instrumental classes. They are getting orchestra practice which will fit them for membership in the Senior High School orchestra.

Instruction in the playing of musical instruments, omitted last year, was begun again in September. Instruction is given in classes for violin, viola, string bass, clarinet, cornet, horns, trombone, tuba, saxaphone and drums. Ninety-four pupils are registered in these classes. Music Appreciation is taught in the Senior High School as last year. This class has twenty students.

With the beginning of 1926, the Senior High School Band will be the largest one the school has had, about thirty-five players. The band will be trained to play and drilled to march and will be an organization of which the school should be proud.

The Senior High School Orchestra has a membership of

thirty-nine. The instrumentation of the orchestra is well balanced and, to the best of my knowledge and belief, it is playing as difficult music and of as high a grade, and doing it well, as any high school orchestra in the New England states.

- 2. Calesthenics.
- 3. Games.
- 4. Folk Dancing.

This year our exhibition is to be in the form of a May Festival.

Report of Headmaster

To Superintendent Carl M. Bair:

I herewith submit my thirteenth annual report as Headmaster of the Berlin High School.

REGISTRATION

The total registration for the school year ending June, 1925, was 815 pupils, 386 boys and 429 girls. Table I. gives the registration in full. The total enrollment of the Senior and Junior High Schools to date for the year 1925-1926 is 774, 367 boys and 407 girls, indicated in full in Table II. Twelve pupils who left school last year due to sickness and other causes have returned.

The registration of the class of 1929 for the school year 1925-1926 is as follows: from the public schools 76, repeating the year 4, from St. Patrick School, 40, from St. Regis Academy 6, from Angel Guardian School 6, and from outside schools 13, a total of 145 pupils, 62 boys and 83 girls.

Ninety-five pupils graduated in June, 1925. Table IV. gives a full report of the activities of the members of this class since graduation. It will be seen from this table that 30 per cent. entered colleges and training schools as compared with 37 per cent. for 1924, 47 per cent. for 1923, and 43 per cent. for 1922. There are 103 pupils in the Senior class that will graduate in June, 1926.

ORGANIZATION

For the school year 1925-1926 the organization of the school program is as follows: The hours of the Senior High School are from 8.00 a. m. to 11.00 a. m., and from 1.00 p. m. to 2.30 p. m. The make-up period is from 11.00 a. m. to 11.45 a. m. All the extracurricula activities are held from 2.30 p. m. to 5.00 p. m. The hours of the Junior HighSchool are from 9.30 a. m. to 11.45 a. m., and from 1.45 p. m. to 4.00 p. m. The make-up period is from 1.00 p. m. to 1.45 p. m. In each case the pupils have two hours for the noon lunch. The program has been very satisfactory both for the students and teachers of the two schools.

SCIENCE

The work of the Science Department has progressed well

during the year. It has been the aim of those in charge to impress upon the pupil that what he studies is but the explanation and, to a certain extent, the elaboration of his every-day experiences at home, on the street and at school. Through the courtesy of the General Electric Company and the U.S. Department of Agriculture, sets of lantern slides, each with a lecture, are loaned to the school. A definite period each week is given over to this visual education, in which all pupils take keen interest. Tests show that the material covered in this way is remembered more completely than that presented by any other method. Many manufacturing concerns have furnished the Department with valuable exhibits, so that when the pupil is studying friction, he has an opportunity to examine a set of Timken roller bearings, exactly like the ones in the family car; when he learns that Wood's metal melts at a lower temperature than that at which water boils. he sees the most important use of this metal in automatic sprinkler models, furnished by the Grinnell Company.

Another form of valuable material is found in the descriptive literature of many manufacturing concerns. An advertiser, writing for prospective customers, furnishes clearer, more comprehensive, more enthusiastic explanations of his product, and illustrates with more copious and finer photographs than any text-book on the market. Most of those to whom application has been made, have responded most generously. Many government documents have been furnished by the Bureau of Chemistry, Weather Bureau, Geological Survey, Bureau of Standards and other departments at Washington. As a result, there is now available to the pupil a library of more than two thousand bulletins and pamphlets, illustrating some phase of his scientific study. These are assigned to individual pupils at the proper time, are studied and a report is made on them.

In general, effort is made to inculate in the pupil a spirit of research. An outline is turnished him, he is required to look up in the material at hand, text-books, pamphlets, clippings from magazines, the topics of the outline; this is further illustrated by his laboratory work and by facts drawn from his observation and experience. Last year the Berlin pupils made a good showing in the Prize Essay Contest of the American Chemical Society, first prizes being won by Kelsea Moore and Albert Lazure, and a second prize by Katherine Macy. This year, since more than twenty essays have been submitted, more than double the number of any previous year, it is hoped that this excellent showing may be bettered.

ACADEMIC WORK

For the past year both the Junior and Senior High School teachers have carried out the recommendations of the State Department of Public Instruction on the teaching of fundamentals in our Secondary schools. Daily drill work was given in the fundamental processes of arithmetic, reading, spelling, grammar, and geography. At the beginning of the year tests were given, results tabulated and again checked at the close of the year The results of the tests showed a marked improvement. This year the school officials have placed more emphasis upon the educative processes and methods of teaching. Several teachers' meetings have been held, topics and papers discussed by the teachers and many fundamental principles of education practiced. The teachers are to be congratulated upon the fine spirit of cooperation and the excellent results obtained.

COMMERCIAL

During the past year the illustrated lectures, by use of the Picturol Projector, have been continued in the Economic classes. Motion pictures of the various subjects, as furnished by the United States Bureau of Mines and the General Electric Company, were also used and have proved of much value to the pupils, especially those pictures illustrating the industries with which pupils in this part of the country are unfamiliar.

For the past year the "Gregg Transcription Tests" have been given to the members of the second year Shorthand class. These tests are given at three speeds of dictation, 60, 80, and 100 words a minute and are of five minutes' duration, the requirement for a certificate being a typewritten transcription that shall grade not less than 95%. The test material is furnished by the Gregg Company and all papers are submitted to them for checking. Fifteen 60-word Certificates, nine 80-word Certificates, and two 100-word Certificates have been awarded during the year.

Since so many of the universities and colleges are granting college entrance credits for commercial subjects, we have adopted the certificate plan in the Bookkeeping work. Pupils completing the Elementary, or First-Year Bookkeeping work with a grade of 85% are awarded a "Certificate" and pupils completing the Second-Year, or Advanced Bookkeeping work with the same grades are awarded a "Certificate of Proficiency." During the past year certificates for First-Year Bookkeeping have been awarded to the following pupils: Mary K. Haddad, Alma J. Hill, Juliet J. Pepin, Sarah R. Preil, Flavilla E. Smith, and Alice A. Goodreau. A

certificate of Proficiency for Advanced Bookkeeping was awarded to Vera Fournier.

In the Typewriting Department we have continued the use of the Rational Rythym Records for the victrola, which were introduced last year. The method has resulted in a marked improvement in both speed and accuracy. During the past two years especially we have placed a number of our commercial graduates in very desirable positions with the Brown Company and other business offices in the city.

STUDENTS' REPORTS

The report cards indicating the type of work accomplished by the pupils are sent to the parents four times during the school year for the Senior High School and six times for the Junior High School. In order to avoid any misunderstanding between the teachers and pupils and also to give a warning to the parents, all teachers are required to report to the office on special prepared cards the names of all pupils doing unsatisfactory work and those who are not doing the work that they are capable of doing. These cards are mailed to the parents. As a result, no student can receive an unsatisfactory mark in any subject unless both the student and parent have been warned by mail before the time that the report card is issued. The results have been tabulated at the office and show that a great many pupils that would have failed at the time the report cards were issued have passed their work. This method has developed a personal contact between the parents, teachers and school. It has also developed an avenue whereby a great many parents have made personal visits to the office of the Headmaster to investigate cases where their children have been doing unsatisfactory work.

MUSIC

Our High School Orchestra is growing each year both in number and the type and grade of music played. This organization has rehearsal for one hour each day. Mr. Goldthwaite has many instrumental classes preparing a larger number of pupils on the different instruments, such as the tuba, cornets, horns, and clarinets, to take the places of those in the School Band that left due to graduation. These different classes are now being grouped and assembled and will be able to enter the School Band by the end of the first semester. The Junior High School Orchestra is doing excellent work and will offer good material for our Senior High School Orchestra next year.

ATHLETICS

The work of the first year students in the Physical Training classes has been of a very high order. The gymnasium is now used every period by the different classes. The Athletic Associa-

tion has replaced all the worn-out equipment and paid expenses of all games for both boys and girls during the past year with a balance of \$105.59 on January 1, 1926. A summary of games played in all sports for both boys and girls during the year shows 29 games won and 12 lost. The football team of 1925 won 6 games and lost 2. This year the football schedule included larger schools. A greater interest is now being developed locally in school athletics as was shown by the increased attendance at the football games during the past season. The school won the highest score for secondary schools at the State track meet held at New Hampshire University. A cup was awarded to the school at the Kiwanis Track Meet held at Manchester. At this meet Hamel, Class 1926, won highest place in the pole vault, breaking the State record for secondary schools. The track team also took part at the Bowdoin Inter-scholastic meet at Brunswick. A dual track meet with Rumford was held here at Berlin.

During the past year 55 boys and 9 girls received their letter. Elective classes have been formed by Coach Burlingame, giving an opportunity to the Junior High School students to use the gymnasium during the crowded periods of the program. third annual Physical Training program gave the people of Berlin an opportunity to measure the fine type of work done by the students in this department under the able direction of the Physical Directors. The first aim of the work in this department is to inculcate the principles of fair play and leadership among its members. The following letter will give an idea as to the type of student developed as a result of the training of this department

ALUMNI NIGHT

The first annual Alumni Meeting was held on the evening of December 18, 1925. The object of the meeting was to give the graduates of the school an opportunity to organize and form an association. Over 800 people attended the meeting. During the evening, officers were elected and an advisory board was formed made up of a delegate chosen from each class from 1887-1925. The Class of 1925 won the contest, showing an attendance of 45%.

PRACTICAL ARTS

This year cooking was confined to the Junior High School. The following courses have been offered to the girls of the Senior High School electing work in Domestic Arts. These courses were recommended by the New Hampshire Association of Teachers of Home Economics and are briefly as follows:

Freshman Year-Textiles and Clothing.

Objective—To give the girl opportunity through study and experience to acquire a knowledge of textile fabrics and of their use in clothing and in house furnishings in order that she may be able to select fabrics wisely, construct garments skillfully and care for her wardrobe and for the furnishings of her own room economically and independently.

Sophomore Year-Foods and Nutrition.

Objective—To give the girl opportunity through instruction and experience to acquire the knowledge necessary to choose food wisely, to prepare it skillfully and to serve it attractively to the family.

Junior Year-The Home, Its Care and Management.

Objective—To enable the girl to plan the home wisely, to care for it efficiently, to buy for it economically and to arrange its furnishings attractively.

Senior Year-The Family and Its Members.

Objective—To help the girl to gain an appreciation of the importance of well-organized family life and of the knowledge and training necessary in order that one may become an efficient and responsible member of the family and of the community.

Excellent work has been done by the pupils in the Mechanical Drawing classes. The following are some of the projects completed for the year: Six preliminary plates and exercises in the care of instruments and lettering, instruction in working drawings, details and assembly, sketches of rural and Dutch scenes, copies of magazine covers and pictures, pen and ink sketches and posters for all school activities.

The work accomplished by the boys in the Machine Shop and Wood Shop for the past year has been of high order. One always finds interest, close application and an excellent discipline in both shops. A few of the Machine Shop projects are as follows: Machinist's jack, anvils made from steel railroad iron, machine vises, building jacks of different sizes, wood turning lathes, and various repair jobs. Wood Shop projects: Desks, tables, cedar chests: Speed lathe projects: Banisters, table legs, bed posts and lamp supports. The pedestals for the statuary given the school were made in the wood shop and is a good example of what boys can do under the proper training.

MR. WILLIAM BROWN'S GIFT TO THE SCHOOL

The school officials, teachers and pupils wish to acknowledge the generous gift of statuary and pictures given by the late Mr. William Brown to the Berlin High School. We also wish to thank Mrs. O. B. Brown under whose able supervision, the selection, plans and arrangements were so skillfully carried out. These beautiful pictures and statuary will not only add to the attractiveness of our building but will create impressions of the aesthetic and beautiful in art in the minds of all our pupils who come in daily touch with them.

THE METEOR

The school paper, The Meteor, under the direction of Miss Dresser, has had a very successful year, continuing along much the same lines as before. The subscription list has increased so that 1,000 copies of the last issue were printed. In March, 1925, The Meteor was entered in the Columbia University Contest, open to all high schools east of the Mississippi River, and won third place among high schools of its class, the classification being according to the number of students enrolled.

In November, 1925, a meeting of persons interested in secondary school journalism was held at Colby Academy, New London, N. H. The staff of The Meteor was represented by two delegates. At this meeting The New Hampshire Interscholastic Press Association was organized. The Berlin staff has a representative serving as treasurer of the Association and also acting on the Executive

Board.

SOCIAL ACTIVITIES

The work accomplished by the older teachers of experience in our school who have taken advantage of the opportunities offered in the development of the semi-curricula and extra curricula activities connected with their respective subjects is commendable. For the teachers concerned this has meant extra work outside the regular class room procedure. In all cases where the work has been well organized, developed and continued from year to year, the teacher as a result has not only created interest in the subject matter but has built up a self-active, intelligent, responsible, cooperative class of students. In dealing with these activities, emphasis has not been placed on the quantitative side of knowledge or on how much learning can be acquired but rather upon attitudes, habits of work and participation in the utilization of abilities and capacities and of required and derived interests in the learning to do by the taking of an active part. An illustration of this was demonstrated this year by the response obtained from a group of boys trained in military science under the direction and supervision of one of our High School teachers, Mr. Lowell. These boys who had been giving trouble to their home room teacher, organized their own group and not only policed themselves but helped the school to look after the order and discipline in our corridors during some of the public entertainments.

Many clubs have been started in the past but it is only those under the leadership of our strong teachers, willing always to give extra time outside their regular class room work that have stood the test and that are now doing active work. The results obtained by the Commercial Club, Music Organizations, Paint and Pen, the Athletic Association, and the School Paper are worthy of praise to all the pupils and teachers in charge. In order to provide a well balanced student program and to avoid the danger of having any one pupil take up too many activities, a system was provided evaluating the different activities on a decimas point system. The value given to each activity was based upon the amount of time given by the student to the activity. This system has been established for the past three years and gives valuable information as to the number of pupils and the amount of time given by each pupil to the different activities.

In closing, I wish, in behalf of the teachers and myself, to extend our appreciation for the valuable suggestions and cooperation that has been given by you and the members of the Board of Education which has helped us in the administration and teaching of the school.

Report of Board of Health

Berlin, N. H., Jan. 31, 1926.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and City Council of the City of Berlin: Gentlemen:

The Board of Health submits to your honorable body its 15th annual report of the work done by the Department of Health during the fiscal year of 1925.

COMMUNICABLE DISEASE

There has been no outbreak of any of the infectious diseases in the past year. The routine quarantine procedure and practices have been improved and better results are being obtained at less cost. New ordinances were framed regarding the control of the communicable diseases and have been submitted to your body and are awaiting your consideration. We feel that these ordinances are needed and recommend that they be passed.

MILK

The milk question has received a lot of attention in the past year, several phases of the problem have been gone over and new methods adopted, which, it is hoped, will materially improve our milk supply. A method of scoring the milk of the individual dealers has been devised, by which the purity and quality of the milk can be comprehended by the average person when the results are published in the paper. The need of a new milk ordinance has been shown and in the coming year it is our intention to frame one that will fulfill our needs.

WATER

The water question has occupied an important place in our work this past year. It is very important that a community should have a safe and adequate supply of water and we feel that we are responsible to the citizens of Berlin in so far as to insure the safety of any water coming into this city.

We wish to take this opportunity to express our appreciation of the cooperation we have received from the citizens of Berlin

and especially the help we have received from the Mayor and Council.

VITAL STATISTICS

Detailed statistics; population, births and deaths are to be found on the following pages. As vital statistics is the "Barometer of Health" by which the health officer carries on his work, it is exceedingly important that all persons charged with the filing of data, realize that only by prompt returns accurately made out, is it possible to make use of such data to the best advantage.

Registration of births is very important, not so much as a birth recorded but in years to come this record proves citizenship, residence, legal age; establishes the right to vote and many other things so essential to one's life.

Registration of deaths; it has been said that the use of death registration are "legal, economic and social." In the settlement of life insurance, property inheritance, it is invaluable. Statistics based on these records are used in studying disease and improving the health of the community. They are of great value in the study and control of epidemics and outbreaks of communicable diseases.

POPULATION

For the purpose of this report the July 1, 1925, population is estimated to be 18,268.

This figure is obtained by the arithmetical method, used in general for such purposes. The following table, No. 1, the estimated population from 1910 to 1926 is given.

STILLBIRTHS

There were 18 stillbirths reported during 1925 whose parents were residents of Berlin, and 1 stillbirth whose parents were non-residents.

The stillbirth rate based on the number of living births gives us a rate of 34.9 per 1,000 living births which is quite a decrease from the rate of 52.1 of last year.

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INFANT WELFARE

As infant mortality may be called a delicate instrument made use of by a department of health in the measurement of its efficiency along certain lines of work, so it is with us.

Forty-five deaths of infants under one year of age were reported during the past year, giving us a little higher rate than that of last year. Nevertheless it is gratifying to note that the yearly curve is gradually coming down. It is quite probable that all the births for the year have not been reported, which, if so, causes the infant mortality rate given for this year to be higher than the actual rate.

Too much credit cannot be given to the ladies of the Berlin Child Hygiene Association for the wonderful work they are doing and the gratifying results they are obtaining in their campaign of baby saving. They deserve the support of every person in Berlin.

In cooperation with this department the Berlin Child Hygiene Association held a Baby Day Exhibition on the seventh of last May, which proved to be a great success. Articles necessary in the care and feeding of babies were displayed in booths. Babies were examined by the clinic physicians.

Over 120 babies were present at this exhibit and about 300 adults. It is very encouraging to find that so many people are interested in the work of saving babies.

The following is a report of our Infant Hygiene Nurse, Miss Laura Morin, who works in close cooperation with the Berlin Child Hygiene Association.

COMMUNICABLE DISEASES

Fifty-nine cases of communicable diseases were reported to this department in the past year. Prompt reporting of a case of communicable disease aids materially in the control of these diseases. It is the duty of the private citizen as well as the attending physician to make sure that the health department has knowledge of the case.

SCARLET FEVER

There were 11 cases of scarlet fever reported in the past year. The following table shows the incidence of this disease in this city for the past six years.

The case rate is gradually coming down, which means there are fewer cases of scarlet fever per 1,000 every year.

No doubt several cases of the disease have not been recognized and therefore have not been reported. It should be remembered that a susceptible person can contract a very severe case from a mild case, therefore a mild case is much more dangerous to the community than a severe case which is usually confined to bed and is isolated, whereas a mild case is often not even under the supervision of a physician. Scarlet fever in itself is not really a serious disease, it is the complications that sometimes arise which cause it to be classed as a dangerous disease.

There were no deaths from scarlet fever reported in 1925.

DIPHTHERIA

There were five cases of diphtheria reported in the past year and no deaths due to this disease. Diphtheria has ceased to be the dreaded disease of a few years ago, but it is still about and every case we have today is absolutely unnecessary. I mean that if a person does not want diphtheria they don't have to have it, they can avoid it by receiving the three injections of diphtheria toxin-antitoxin which is absolutely harmless and will protect one against diphtheria.

Table No. 12 shows the incidence of diphtheria for the past six years and the case rate per 1,000 population.

MEASLES

One case of measles was reported in the past year, and recovered without complications. Measles is another dangerous disease due to the complication of pneumonia. No doubt several cases occurred in this city in the past year that were not reported. The parents are required to report this disease as well as the physician.

TYPHOID FEVER

There were six cases of typhoid fever reported to this department in the past year. Several other cases of illness were strongly suspected to be typhoid that existed in the district affected. Most of these cases occurred in the Cascade Hill district, where several houses are not connected with the city sewer system, due to the fact that the city has not provided sewers. The sewage from these houses is deposited in cesspools, which at times fill and the contents overflow into the adjacent gutters. No doubt that some of this sewage contained the infectious material and the persons who became ill had come in contact either directly or indirectly with this matter. Upon recommendation of this department the City Council has ordered sewers in this street so that all these houses may be connected.

One case occurring on Ramsey Hill was traced to an uncle of the affected person who had been visiting the patient and who was found to be a typhoid carrier.

TUBERCULOSIS

All of the tuberculosis work in Berlin is done by Miss Emma Barker, R. N., representative of the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association, Inc. Miss Barker not only takes care of Berlin, but the entire county of Coos as well.

Miss Barker deserves the highest praise for the wholehearted spirit of service she applies to her work. She is getting results in the way of improved and arrested cases.

Of the 33 cases of tuberculosis reported last year, Miss Barker reported 32 over whom she has supervision.

The following is Miss Barker's report of the work done in Berlin in the past year.

Of the 33 reported cases of tuberculosis, only 24 were residents and nine were non-residents. Three deaths from tuberculosis were registered, two resident and one non-resident. It is interesting to note that none of these deaths were persons under the care of Miss Barker.

CHICKENPOX

One case of chickenpox reported in the past year. This case terminated fatally. Chickenpox very rarely kills, but in this case the patient was a very weak and under-nourished child. Dermatitis gangaenosa was given as the contributory cause.

SMALLPOX

There were no cases of smallpox reported in this city during the past year. Several cases were reported in Vermont, New York and southern New England States. These cases are of a virulent type and the fatality rate is very high, therefore, in protection of himself it behooves every person to submit to vaccination against this disease. We have a great number of tourists passing through our city in the summer time and they are coming from the sections where smallpox is existent and a light case may cause a violent outbreak of this disease if it should come in contact with an unvaccinated person.

Table No. 14 shows the results of the vaccination of the school children. We had no serious results reported, no children were reported as being killed outright or permanently injured or disabled as the result of our vaccinating them.

Quite a number of children did not return to be examined after being vaccinated, approximately 20 per cent, were not examined.

Records of vaccination for the years of 1924 and 1925 are on file at the Health Office and certificates may be obtained at any time. Certificates of vaccination are very handy, in fact, when one travels abroad proof of vaccination against smallpox is absolutely necessary.

The method of vaccination as used by this department is the latest and safest method known. We obtain our vaccine virus from the New York City Department of Health Laboratories where it is prepared under the supervision of the United States Public Health Service. We use individual tubes of vaccine virus, one to each person, and a clean, sterile needle is used only once, then thrown away. By this method the transmission of disease from one person to another is impossible. The actual vaccination consists of a slight scratch or tiny puncture into which the virus is introduced, and in a year the scar caused by the vaccination is barely discernable.

VENEREAL DISEASES

Undoubtedly there are several cases of syphilis existent in this city which have never been reported to this department. We received no reports of this disease during the year of 1925.

Only 25 cases of gonorrhea were reported to this department

last year, several cases known to this department have not been reported by the attending physician.

The state law requires the reporting of these diseases, and, while it is not the desire of this department to use the courts to enforce the law, we shall use this extreme measure if necessary to secure the reporting of these, and other diseases.

OTHER COMMUNICABLE DISEASES

One case of trachoma, an infectious disease of the eyes, was reported to this department last year.

LABORATORY

The laboratory work has increased a great deal in the past year, and the coming year bids to be a busier year as the examination and testing of milk is to be done on a larger scale.

The milk question in this city is a very complex one; milk is produced and sold in all manner of conditions. The lack of specific laws presents our most difficult obstacle.

There are a great many small dealers and producers in this city, so many that strict supervision is almost an impossible task along with the other routine work of this department. The dealers selling the largest quantity of milk have received the most of our attention. The quality and purity of the milk from these

dealers seems to have improved.

Thirty-eight dairy farms were inspected and a score card rating given. I am sorry to say that the majority of these farms did not receive a rating above 60 and only one received over 90.

If additional assistance is given, in the way of the employees asked for in my recommendations, a great deal more time will be devoted to the improving of our milk supply in the coming year.

The worst fault found with the milk in the past year, and it is a serious fault, is the large amount of dirt found in it.

A method of scoring the milk samples taken from the dealers has been introduced in the past year and it seems to have the desired effect. The reason for the scoring of the milk samples is to raise the milk standards of purity and quality, and, of course, to inform the public of the quality of the milk sold by the various dealers.

WATER

The question of obtaining a new source of water supply has engaged a lot of time and attention during the past year. One trip was made by the Health Officer and representatives of the State Board of Health and the Water Commissioners to Success Pond last July. The physical characteristics of the water of Success Pond proved to be almost identical with the water of the Androscoggin River and the water of the present reservoir supply. Another trip was made to the Pond of Safety in October and samples of water were taken from the pond and at different points along the Ammonoosuc River. All analyses of the samples collected are being made at the State Laboratory of Hygiene, and Mr. Charles D. Howard is supervising the sanitary side of the new water prospects.

The water from our present system has not been all that is desired of a city water, but it has proved to be free from infection of any kind. The brown color and dirt we experienced last summer was due in most part to decayed vegetation.

Closely allied to the water supply of a city is the question of ice used for domestic purposes. The ice used in this city is harvested from the Androscoggin River about a half-mile above Berlin Mills. We would not think of using the water from the Androscoggin without having it undergo some process of purification, yet we use the same water frozen and think nothing of it.

Some authorities claim that ice will purify itself after a few months' storage, while other authorities dispute this and claim that the bacteria of typhoid fever will exist in a dormant state for several months in ice and when the bacilli are released by the melting of the ice and the germs planted upon a favorable medium they will grow and reproduce. I feel that if there is the least chance of the bacillus of typhoid or any other germ found in the Androscoggin water, surviving this freezing, that some precaution should be taken. One examination of the water of melted ice was made in this department last year and several living coli bacilliwere demonstrated.

HYGIENE AND SANITATION

An inspection of the food stores found them to be in fairly good condition. The worst violation was the exposure of the uncooked foods to dust and flies. Drastic action will be taken against these offenders unless better cooperation exists in the coming year.

Thirty-one inspections were made of stores selling food.

A house to house inspection found many houses in different sections of the city were without sewer service. Some families in these districts have provided themselves with cesspools, while others are still using the old-fashioned privy.

Of a total of 152 sanitary inspections, 89 violations of the sanitary laws were found, 72 inspections found no violation. 31 complaints from citizens were received and investigated and in most part these were settled to the satisfaction of those concerned.

RECOMMENDATIONS

That a laboratory assistant and clerk be employed by this department.

That a sanitary inspector be employed by this department.

That the ordinances concerning the control of communicable diseases be passed by the City Council.

That ordinances giving this department more power over the control of the preparation and sale of foodstuffs, especially milk, be passed.

That a Public Health Nurse be employed by this department to do pre-natal work in an effort to reduce our high infant mortality and stillborn rates.

Report of City Engineer

Berlin, N. H., Jan. 31, 1926.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and City Council of the City of Berlin: Gentlemen:—

I respectfully submit the report of the Engineering Department for the year ending January 31, 1926. The following will be an outline of the work carried on by the Department as a more complete schedule of the amounts and costs of the different jobs will be shown in the report of the Public Works Department.

Considerable work was done for the Water Department this year. A booster pump and storage tank were installed early in the year under the supervision of this department. Owing to lack of water for future requirements it was necessary to make a complete survey in order to establish an adequate supply. With this in view lines were run from Keene Reservoir to Success Pond, in order that an estimate could be made of the cost of turning water into Keene Reservoir at times of need.

A survey is now in progress for investigating the Anninonosuc river as a source of supply. We found a suitable dam site at an elevation sufficiently high to put water into Berlin with good pressure, the stream has been measured and we find that there is an abundance of water. Samples of this water are being sent at regular intervals to the State Laboratory by the water department.

The purpose of these surveys is to furnish the Mayor and Board of Water Commissioners with accurate information that they may decide the proper source from which they may obtain an adequate supply of water.

In looking through some old Berlin Water Company files a number of old note books were found, these notes were plotted and we have on file a complete set of plans showing the Berlin Water Works reservoir system, with elevation pipe lines and other data that will be very valuable in the future.

The sewer book, cemetery map and plan files have been kept up to date with many additions.

Lines, grades, and ledge estimates were made at the new Junior High School for the School Board.

Miscellaneous work, such as street lines and grades for those building fences or walls on the street line, foundation grades for those building houses, pole and hydrant locations, street names and house numbers, a census of gasoline pumps, location of traffic beacons, bridge painting, etc., were handled by this department.

In closing I wish to thank the Mayor, the City Council and the residents of the City for the hearty cooperation given this department during the past year.

Public Works Department

Berlin, N. H., Jan. 31, 1926.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and City Council of the City of Berlin: Gentlemen:—

I submit to you the report of the Public Works Department for the year ending January 31, 1926. In submitting this report I wish to emphasize the policy of this administration as one of sanitation, general maintenance and permanent construction

It has been the policy of this department to organize the work in such a manner as to provide as much work as possible for the unemployed citizens of the city as is consistent with the general plan of efficiency.

The total payroll for the department for this year was \$116,739.81, an increase of \$11,137.52 over last year.

STREET MAINTENANCE—This account includes sweeping and repairing all streets, painting and repairing all guard rails and fences, the care of bridges and culverts, taking care of surface water, removing snow and ice, sanding sidewalks, and taking care of two ice skating rinks, one at the shoe shop lot and one at Berlin Mills. The damage caused by two bad rain and hail storms was taken care of by this account. The above account shows a total of \$36,124.54, being a decrease of \$6,866.54 from last year's account.

ROAD MAINTENANCE—This account takes care of the general upkeep of all roads outside the city limits, such as Jericho. Cates Hill, Croteau Hill and East Milan roads. This account shows a total of \$3,901.04, being a decrease of \$790.58 from last year's account.

SEWER MAINTENANCE—This account calls for the payroll of a small crew of emergency and general repairs. This account shows a total of \$2,862.56, an increase of \$808.71 over last year's account.

OFFICE—This account takes care of the general office expense and the payroll of the commissioner and bookkeeper and timekeeper. The total of the above was \$4,465.10, showing an increase of \$225.75 over last year.

ENGINEERING—This account takes care of all expenses incidental to this department and shows a total of \$1,647.78, being a decrease of \$2,046.71 from last year's account.

PATCHING ACCOUNT—This account takes care of the patching of all paved streets, sidewalks and gutters and shows a total of \$2,326.20, an increase of \$197.77 over last year's account.

TOOLS AND EQUIPMENT—This account takes care of the cost, upkeep and replacement of all tools and equipment, from small tools to tar kettles and concrete mixers, and shows a total of \$2,901.74, an increase of \$545.72 over last year's account.

TRUCKS AND EQUIPMENT—Two G. M. C. trucks, a Best tractor, Buick coupe and one pair of horses were bought for this department from this account which is not carried on the Public Works Department books.

ASPHALT CONCRETE PAVING—The following streets were paved with stone and asphalt, the "penetration method" being used: Prospect Street, Hillside Avenue and Second Street, also a large patch at Green Street Underpass and the Boston and Maine Crossing on Mason Street. This work cost less than two dollars and fifty cents per square yard, all grading, shaping and material included.

WATER BOUND MACADAM—The following streets were paved with water bound macadam: Brown Avenue, Merrimac Street, Grafton Street, Eighth Street, at a cost of one dollar and fifty cents per yard.

SIDEWALKS—Concrete sidewalks were laid on the following streets: Third Avenue, Green Street, First Avenue, Shepard Street, Madison Avenue, Main Street, Hillside Avenue, School Street, Church Street, Emery Street, Elm Street, Eighth Street, Bridge Street, Hutchins Street, Champlain Street, and Coos Street.

Tar sidewalk was rebuilt on Pleasant Street and Main Street. Concrete sidewalk was built for a little less than three dollars per yard, grading included.

Tar sidewalk was rebuilt for one dollar and fifty cents per square yard.

I wish to take this opportunity to mention a few of the jobs done by this department this year.

WEST MILAN ROAD—One mile of State road was built by the City this year. This job furnished employment to upwards of forty men all summer and was under the direction of this department. The State payed one-half of the total, \$17,135.16.

MILAN ROAD—The concrete road to the Milan line was completed this year by contract to Paul J. Keating of Fitchburg

Mass., at a cost of \$55,628,50.

MAIN STREET WALL—This wall was built along the easterly side of Main Street from the St. Louis Hospital to Cambridge Street to take care of large floods of water that run down from the Heights section, and has caused much damage to the Brown Company property in past storms. The cost of this job was \$2,264.40.

SHEPARD STREET—Owing to the fact that a brook has always run down the northerly side of Shepard Street, causing damage and inconvenience to the residents, a culvert was built along the street line and the top was finished as a sidewalk, thus taking care of the water and giving the residents in that section a suitable place to walk and a chance to improve their property. The cost of this job was \$2,319.22.

MADISON AVENUE—Eight hundred feet of concrete sidewalk was laid on the northerly side line of Madison Avenue. This was a much needed improvement and cost \$1,912.98.

STATE STREET—Nine hundred cubic yards of ledge was taken from the foot of State Street at a cost of \$1,875.72. This was crushed and used for street paying.

HILLSIDE AVENUE—Hillside Avenue was paved and a sidewalk was built as far as Prospect Street. This was a much needed improvement and will save the City considerable expense in the future. The cost of this job was \$6,422.49.

BROWN AVENUE—This street was in a very bad state of repair, and was paved with water bound macadam at a cost of \$1,269,46.

SINTH STREET—A twenty-four inch storm sewer was built from the end of Sixth Street through the Brown Company mill yard to the river. This was expected to take care of the water flowage from Norwegian Village and will be extended to Sweden Street in the future. The cost of this job was \$3,579.83.

GRAFTON STREET—This street was paved with water bound macadam and a sidewalk built from Burgess Street to Sullivan Street at a cost of \$5,977.28.

COOS STREET—Thirteen hundred feet of concrete sidewalk was built on the northerly side line of Coos Street from Sullivan Street to Beaudoin Street. This job will give a more suitable place to walk for the school children and residents of Forbush and Blais Park. The cost of this job was \$4,885.25.

KENT STREET SEWER—A half-mile of ten-inch sewer was laid to improve sanitary conditions in Forbush Park. This is the last large sewer job that will be necessary in that section. The

cost of this job was \$7,566.01.

Gentlemen:

As instructed, I have made an audit of the books and accounts of the City of Berlin for the year ended January 31, 1926. As a result, I wish to submit, herewith, my report thereon and the following exhibits. These show in detail the financial position of the City on January 31, 1926, the cash received and the condition of the budget accounts at the end of the year:

The above cash balance was verified by examination and verification of the account with the Berlin National Bank. The account as reconciled appears as follows:

The deposits of February 1 and 5 were verified at the bank. The City Treasurer has been furnished with a copy of the bank reconciliation.

TAXES RECEIVABLE—\$53,740.65. RESERVE FOR TAXES—1925 \$7,663.78.

The unpaid taxes for the years 1920 to 1925 inclusive as shown to be due by the Treasurer's ledger were verified by adding and listing the open accounts in the tax ledgers of these years. Since a portion of the tax assessed against the Berlin Water Company for 1925 will not be paid by that company, it becomes necessary that provision be made for the loss therefrom. This has been accomplished by the creation of Reserve for Taxes in the amount of \$7,663.78 representing the balance due. When the account is abated or paid by the City of Berlin, the charge should be made to this account. In this way the assets of the City are not overstated by a large amount of taxes known to be uncollectible. A summary of the taxes as verified follows:

This account has not changed during the year. It represents wages of city employees which have not been called for.

DUE TO KERR AND HOUSTON-\$1,000.00

Th cost of performing the work on the tower of the City Hall was \$2,000.00. The final payment of \$1,000.00 is being withheld pending time in which to determine that the work will prove satisfactory.

DUE TO APPROPRIATION ON NEW JUNIOR SCHOOL.— \$58,662.62

This account represents the unexpended balance of the bond issue of \$175,000.00 floated for the purpose of completing the New Junior High School. Note should be taken that the cash balance is sufficient to warrant this expenditure.

DUE POLLING PLACE ON EAST SIDE—\$69.52

The above amount indicates the balance still available for the expenses of the polling place on the East Side.

CITY CLERK'S DEPARTMENT

The numerous financial records in this department were examined and verified in detail. The duplicate Automobile Registration Permits were added and listed. All receipts stubs were traced to the City Clerk's cash book. All were found to agree and the money duly paid to the City Treasurer.

The Criminal Docket was checked against the court cash book and all receipts less expenses found to be properly turned over to the City Treasurer.

CITY TREASURER'S DEPARTMENT

The cash receipts and disbursements of the City Treasurer were examined and classified in detail as shown in Exhibit B. All money reported as paid to him was found to be accurately accounted for. Only such disbursements as had been authorized by the City Council had been made. These disbursements were compared with the vouchers as approved for payment. All postings to his general ledger were examined. The balance of cash on hand January 31, 1926, was verified as shown in the above comments on cash.

Since the Department Heads, Mayor and Councilmen have shown such an earnest desire to carry out my suggestions, I can see nothing further at this time to offer in the way of recommendations. I wish to congratulate them on the eagerness and thoroughness they have shown in the performance of their respective duties as public officials.

This, the first report of the Water Department, is for the period from the appointment of your Commission, May 22, 1925, and the actual taking over of the property of the Berlin Water Works Co. which was as of July first, 1925.

Your Commissioners, appointed May, 1925, began immediately to look into matters pertaining to the improvement, in the way of additional sources of supply, of the system, and have continued so to do up to the present time.

We have investigated several schemes as a possible supply and have caused surveys and estimates to be made for a pumping and filtration plant with the Androscoggin River as a source and also one of Success Pond and pipe line to Keene Reservoir on Horn Brook.

As the above schemes contemplated the pumping of the water supply, we have practically abandoned them in favor of a gravity supply from the Ammonoosuc River and are now having surveys made of this territory, and find that at a point on the river known as Godfrey Dam, there will be head enough to supply water to all parts of the City by gravity. We also have found that the supply of water from the Ammonoosuc is ample for the present and future needs of our City.

Under the State Act, granting to the City of Berlin the right to own and maintain a water system, it specifically states that all sources of supply should be with the approval of the State Board of Health, and we have called on the State Board in all our investigations and they have visited and taken samples of the water from the various sources, and are continuing so to do at the present time.

We hope that in the course of a few months we will have data enough to enable us to decide on which source of supply will be the better, both physically and financially, for the best interests of the City.

We would respectfully refer you to accompanying reports of

the City Auditor as to the financial condition of the department and to that of the Superintendent as to its physical condition.

Report of the Superintendent

Berlin, N. H., December 31, 1925.

To the Honorable Board of Water Commissioners: Gentlemen:—

In presenting my first report since the purchase of the Berlin Water Works, six months ago, from the Berlin Water Company, a private corporation, I wish to present a brief history of the plant from the beginning to the present time.

The present water system now owned by the City of Berlin dates back to 1892 when the first reservoir was constructed on Bean brook, about two and one-half miles northeast of the City. It was a very crude affair, only holding about 100,000 gallons of water. From this small reservoir a 10-inch cast iron pipe line was laid to the corner of Spring and Guilmette streets where another small reservoir was constructed and used for fire protection, but was later abandoned. From there a 12-inch pipe line extended into the center of the City, which at that time was sufficient for all purposes. The City grew so rapidly that it was soon apparent that additional supply was needed. To take care of this situation additional reservoirs were built on the Horn brooks.

When the system was purchased from the City of Berlin on July 1, 1925, it had a storage capacity of 13,770,000 gallons, distributed as follows:

- (1) Keene Reservoir: Located on Horn brook, capacity, 9,209,000 gallons. The supply flows directly by gravity through an 18-inch wood stave pipe line two miles long into Anderson reservoir.
 - (2) Anderson Reservoir: High pressure reservoir. (Used exclusively for fire protection.) Capacity, 2,350,000 gallons. A 12-inch cast iron pipe line leads directly into the distribution system of the City and is operated by an electrically controlled hydraulic valve. In case of fire the throwing of a switch in the office of the works at the City building makes, almost instantly, available an increase in pressure of from 20 to 35 pounds. The overflow from this reservoir flows into Stewart reservoir.
 - (3) Stewart Reservoir: Capacity, 558,000 gallons. Bean Reservoir: Capacity, 1,650,000 gallons. Stewart and Bean reservoirs, both having the same elevation, supply the present low

pressure system for the City. A 12-inch cast iron pipe leads from Stewart reservoir and connects with the old original 10-inch pipe from the Bean reservoir, which leads into the center of the City.

In 1917 it was found that the supply from this single 10-inch line was inadequate for the needs of the City, so a 12-inch combination of part wood stave and part cast iron pipe was laid from the main distribution line near Bean reservoir across through the Brown Company's mill yard, and connected with the 10-inch pipe at the junction of Third and Main streets. This materially increased the supply for the City, mainly on the east side of the river, and the Berlin Mills section of the west side. Since that time an average of 85 new services per year have been added to the system or an increase of 331-3 per cent.

In 1923, the then Berlin Water Company was called on to supply water for what is commonly known as the Ramsey Hill section of the City. It was impossible to furnish pressure enough to supply these houses with water, so a Booster pumping station was erected at the corner of Spring and Guilmette streets. The pumping unit consists of two De Laval single-stage, centrifugal pumps in series, having a capacity of 9,000 gallons per hour. The pump takes suction from a well supplied through a float valve from the gravity system, and pumps through a 6-inch cast from pipe into an elevated tank of 40,000 gallons capacity. The operation is automatic and governed by pressure to keep from two to seventeen fect of water in the tank. This system supplies about 100 services with water and nine hydrants for fire protection. The pressure on the hydrants varies from 50 to 100 pounds.

We also have for emergencies an auxiliary pumping unit. This system consists of a two-stage centrifugal pump, chlorinator and, by special agreement with the Brown Company, the use of their filters, all located in the filter house at the Burgess Sulphite Plant. When necessary, the water is filtered, treated with chlorine, and pumped directly into the distribution system.

Weather conditions during the past six months have been most favorable, making necessary only twenty-one hours' use of this system, during which time it is estimated 1,260,000 gallons of water were pumped.

The City is again rapidly reaching the point where something must be done to relieve the shortage of water, both for fire protection and domestic purposes, more observable in the down-town district. In order to remedy this rapidly increasing inadequacy, I make the following recommendations:

That a 14-inch pipe be connected with the 10 and 12-inch mains at the corner of Main and Third streets, and extend through Main street and connect with the 6-inch main at the corner of Main and High streets. That two hydrants be placed on the line as follows: corner of Main and Success streets, corner of Main and Cambridge streets.

That a 6-inch line be extended up Third Avenue from the corner of Third Avenue and Madigan Street and connected with the 6-inch line on Wight Street, in front of Mrs. A. W. Wight's residence, also the installation of two hydrants on the line.

That hydrants be placed in the following locations:

- (1) Corner of Pleasant and York streets.
- (2) York Street, 375 feet from the corner of Granite Street.
- (3) Three on Western Avenue.
- (4) Corner of School and Prospect streets.
- (5) Corner of Spring and Guilmette streets.

Following is a brief description of the activities of the department for the six months ended December 31, 1925. More detailed information will be found later, under different heads.

The past six months have been a very progressive and profitable period for the department as may be seen by the Auditor's report.

Very little water has been pumped, having had only about one month of dry weather, this coming the last two weeks of August and the first two weeks of September. Less water having been pumped than in any year since 1918, but at no time were we unprepared for fire, the high pressure reservoir being full at all times.

Service Department

The Service Department has installed 49 new services, relaid 15 complete services, and relaid six from the main to the curb.

An inspection of services was made and 150 fixtures were discovered leaking. The owners have been notified to have same repaired.

Meter Department

The Meter Department has set 11 meters on new services and changed 25, bringing the total number of meters in use to date to 414, which is 19.6 per cent, of the total number of services.

Hydrant Department

Under the contract with the Berlin Water Company, all inspection work was done by the Fire Department, who reported all defective hydrants, and repairs were made immediately by the Berlin Water Company. At present this work is all being done

by this department. To make a proper inspection of each hydrant, it requires the services of two men and a truck for five hours per day.

Valves

It is important that all valves be carefully inspected and this work will be done in the early spring, as soon as the weather permits. The last inspection was made in 1918.

Work Under Construction

Work on the Blais Park pipe line is well under way and will be completed about February first. This consists of the installation of 1,100 feet of 6-inch cast iron pipe. 650 feet of 2-inch wrought iron pipe, and one hydrant. We hope next year to complete the pipe line on the south part of Kent street, thus enabling us to supply all the houses on Kent street with water and fire protection.

As per your request we have measured the entire amount of water which was consumed by the City of Berlin for a period of one week. Following are the results and the methods used.

Our supply entering the City through two main pipe lines, it was necessary for us to install a meter on each line.

Having only one Venturi meter in the department, we installed it on the 10-inch line which crosses through the Horn field. Readings were taken on the meter every fifteen minutes for the entire week and recorded on a chart, also the high and low temperature for the twenty-four hours.

The chart shows the exact amount of water consumed through the 10-inch line and at what time of day the greatest amount of water was consumed.

An 8-inch meter was used to measure the amount of water consumed through the 12-inch line. This meter registered the amount of water so did not necessitate readings at fifteen minute intervals.
