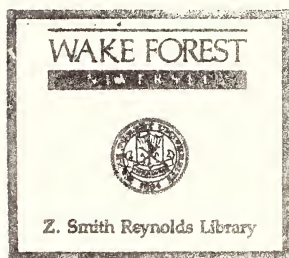




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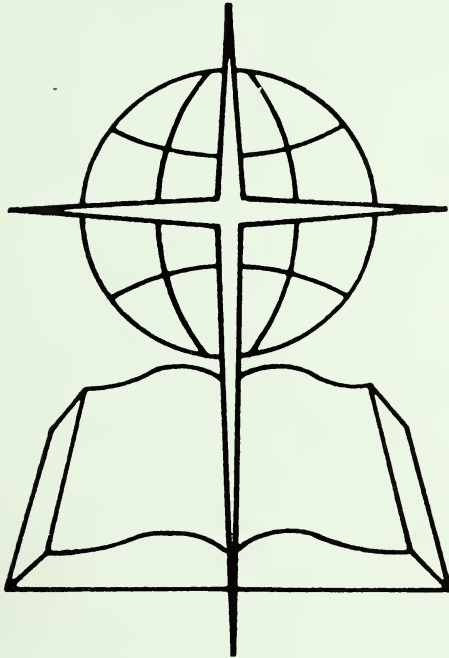

YOU WERE THERE IN AFRICA.

There are 1,900 languages spoken throughout the continent of Africa, and complete Bibles are only available in 119 of these languages. New Testaments in 213, and Portions in 224. However, there is not only the need for Bible translation, but also the need to teach people how to read and understand the Bible. New Reader Portions are part of the solution to this problem. In Africa at the present time, as many as 20,000 people are becoming Christians each day, and these Portions definitely help people to grow in their faith. It has been estimated that by the year 2000, 50 per cent of Africans, or 400 million people will be converted to the Christian faith.

YOU WERE THERE IN THE ASIA/PACIFIC REGION.

Reports state that daily more than 100 million people listened to or watched the Billy Graham mission broadcast from Hong Kong in November of 1990. This broadcast, which lasted five days, was transmitted to more than 30 countries throughout Asia and translated into 45 languages. Bible Societies throughout Asia and the Pacific were quick to become involved in this major evangelistic event, and special editions of the Scriptures and Scripture Selections were produced and distributed through the churches to coincide with the mission meetings or as part of the follow-up to inquiries.

YOU WERE THERE IN THE AMERICAS.

It is estimated that some 12,000 orphaned or abandoned children roam the streets of Managua, Nicaragua. The Bible Society of Nicaragua (BSN) supports the work among these homeless children and has already provided a number of Scriptures for the Barnabas Orphanage in Managua. The BSN also provides different types of Scriptures for school studies for these children, including New Reader Portions and complete Bibles.

YOU WERE THERE IN EUROPE AND THE MIDDLE EAST.

The United States Armed Forces Chaplains Board, contacted the American Bible Society in early January, 1991 requesting that the ABS increase its original number of desert camouflage-covered Scriptures produced for the military. Last October friends of the Bible Society had helped to provide about 100,000 copies of Scripture for servicemen and women headed overseas. These Scriptures gave comfort and strength to our men and women in the armed forces.

Because of the overwhelming response to the "Gifts of Love" campaign which was

launched in May, 1989, plus the continuing interest of the people manifested daily, a second phase of "Gifts of Love" was launched May, 1990. There are now plans to provide at least 30 million Bibles to the USSR and Central and Eastern Europe by 1994.

YOU WERE THERE IN NEW YORK AT THE AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY.

The American Bible Society is comprised of several departments which all work together to translate, produce and distribute the Scriptures in the languages and the formats that are most needed. YOU WERE THERE. You have been the facilitator — the enabler, if you will, of the workers that made the journey and presented that Bible to someone far away. Your love and generosity have done marvelous things in 1990. And 1991 is offering more challenges and opportunities than ever before as the church and American Bible Society celebrate their 175th Anniversary of helping others discover for themselves the Word of God . . . alive and active.

ANNUITY BOARD REPORT

Protection is an instinct each adult has toward his spouse and children.

It hurts to see a child fall or a spouse passed over for a promotion. We want to shield loved ones from the hurts of everyday life.

That kind of protection is impossible, but there is financial protection available to ministers that can provide a life-saving margin for his family in the event of his disability or death.

The good news is it costs him nothing if he is an eligible participant in the Church Annuity Plan.

The Protection Section of the Church Annuity Plan is provided by the state convention, and includes several benefits.

These benefits can mean receiving:

up to \$67,500 in special survivor benefits if you die prior to retirement, or while receiving a disability benefit.

up to \$300 a month if you become disabled and unable to perform any gainful employment due to physical or mental incapacity.

Additionally, up to \$35 each month can be credited to your retirement income account during your disability and your survivor benefits will remain.

This valuable family protection is funded from Cooperative Program dollars that match dollars contributed to your account by you and your church.

"The Church Annuity Plan offers significant up-front family protection that leaves your dollars free to build your retirement security. It is an important benefit that many ministers overlook in the retirement plan," Frank Schwall, senior vice president of Member Services.

The average annuitant in North Carolina receives \$287.43 per month, up from \$234 last year.

North Carolina has 3,396 members making contributions to Annuity Board retirement plans.

It is exciting to think about what has been done to help ministers retire with dignity and to have protection as they plan for retirement. Strong efforts have been made to make

all of our churches (and ministers) aware of the opportunities and the need to act on them.

But there is still much to be done! Consider these facts:

Small contributions make the annuitant's benefits small.

In North Carolina

185 receive less than \$50

482 receive less than \$100

1041 receive less than \$200

1338 receive less than \$300

There is a *great* challenge still before us to help ministers prepare for the future and to help churches be responsible employers.

BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES OF NORTH CAROLINA, INC. REPORT

For an institution that's 106 years old, Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina (BCH) looks strongly to the future!

Three pillars that uphold that futuristic foundation are: 1. The return of the Thanksgiving Offering beginning November 1991; 2. The success of our "Give a child a chance!" financial campaign, and 3. Baptists' continued support of BCH through the Cooperative Program.

This financial undergirding made it possible for BCH to serve more than 1,200 children and families last year through facilities at 13 locations across the state. Because Baptists cared enough to give, residents like Lynn will go to Wingate College this fall; Chris graduated from UNC-Chapel Hill; Jennifer is in her second year at Haywood Community College and Mark earned a football scholarship to North Carolina A&T. Each of these lives proceeds on firm footing because Baptist Children's Homes was there paving their pathway.

Most BCH residents come from dysfunctional families where a single parent, most often a mother, simply is unable to care for her children. Her frustration with life leads to limitless freedom for the children, which leads to troubling behavior. Physical abuse, divorce, alcohol, drugs and truancy mark their young lives.

Baptist Children's Homes provides a safe environment where children learn to name their problems and address them to change behavior. At the same time, willing family members also are addressing their problems with the help of BCH social workers. In many cases, children and families are restored.

BCH's "Give a child a chance!" campaign is raising \$11 million over three years to expand Cameron Boys Camp, boost general operating income and increase endowment. Gifts and pledges through July totaled \$9.3 million and response across the state has been overwhelming and heart gratifying.

Last year Baptist Men of North Carolina helped construct the new Tommy and Jeanie Eller Chuckwagon at Cameron Boys Camp that was dedicated May 19.

BCH celebrated this spring the 20th anniversary of the founding of Broyhill Home, our western-most campus, in Waynesville/Clyde. With the help of J.E. Broyhill and his family, the home was opened in 1971 on 91 hilly acres. It has capacity for 48 children in group care and for eight girls in emergency care.

In August 1990 BCH began the Gregg Children's Center for before and after school care. The Davidson County program offers security to children of working couples, who now don't have to go home to empty houses.

Children's hopes the world over have been bolstered by the 1991 return of the Thanksgiving Offering voted by messengers to the 1989 state convention. While suffering through its 13-year absence, BCH lost more than \$2 million in potential gifts. Our goal this year is \$500,000. Because of a partnership established in December with the Baptist Children's Homes of Sao Paulo, Brazil, BCH-North Carolina will donate 10 percent of everything it receives over the \$500,000 goal for work in that desperately

needy land.

In August 1990, BCH signed an agreement with Gaston County Department of Social Services to operate two emergency care homes owned by the county. That raises to seven the number of emergency care homes BCH operates. Emergency care, in which a child at risk of abuse or neglect can receive shelter right away, is the service most in demand throughout the state. Children stay a maximum of 60 days while BCH works with the custodian to determine a long-term plan of care.

The Cooperative Program continues to anchor our budget planning from the churches. We urge renewed commitment to cooperative giving among our North Carolina churches. It is essential, not only for us, but for the entire missions enterprise built painstakingly for a century and a half. Baptist Children's Homes receives \$1.5 million from Cooperative Program receipts each year. This is the stackpole around which we build our other income planning. A decrease in Cooperative Program dollars to Baptist Children's Homes would seriously jeopardize our ability to care for children.

Baptist Children's Homes has a 106-year history. But its history is just the knot that ties it to a boundless, unbroken ribbon of promise that stretches beyond the future to wrap children and families with eternal blessings.

BAPTIST FOUNDATION REPORT

The North Carolina Baptist Foundation is committed to generating increased perpetual support of Baptist causes throughout the state, nation and world. Assets (market value) were approximating \$27 million at the end of 1990 fiscal year, and the income to Baptist causes is significant each year.

Assets are either held as endowments paying interest income in perpetuity to named Baptist causes, or they are held in trust with current income being paid to individuals and future income being paid to Baptist causes in perpetuity. At one time we have several participants from our association sharing, and we hope that others will become interested in sharing.

Earned income distributed to Baptist institutions and mission causes during fiscal year of 1990:	\$647,180
Earned income distributed to individuals with Baptist causes named as charitable remainderman during fiscal year of 1990:	\$686,124

There are seven full time employees and two persons who provide part-time service in accounting and legal services. Because of increased requests for assistance in seminars and conferences by churches, associations and individuals, it has been necessary to have some part-time assistance in areas of the state which are some distance from the office.

There are continual improvements being made in available charitable estate planning, and the Foundation keeps up with the changes in state and federal regulations to help our people and to maximize the growth in financial support for Baptist causes.

In 1990, the Foundation moved into a new home, located next to the Baptist Building in Cary. Baptist groups are invited to use the meeting rooms when in the Raleigh/Cary area. The Foundation extends an invitation to church groups to call and arrange a visit to the newest building used for the Lord's service by North Carolina Baptists.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL OF NORTH CAROLINA REPORT

The year 1991 is significant in the history of Baptist Hospital — it marks the 50th anniversary of its entering a partnership with the Bowman Gray School of Medicine of Wake Forest University, to form one of the 126 academic medical centers in the nation. Appropriate events have been planned to celebrate this anniversary.

This partnership makes it possible for Baptist Hospital to offer its patients the most advanced technology for diagnosing and treating their health problems. For example, ours is one of 15 medical centers in the nation involved in clinical trials of a new coronary laser which vaporizes plaque in blocked coronary arteries. We are one of five centers in the U.S. conducting clinical trials in stereotactic radiosurgery, a procedure in which high-energy beams of radiation from a linear accelerator are focused by computers on brain tumors and lesions to destroy them. This procedure can be done on an outpatient basis. We are one of 24 Comprehensive Cancer Centers in the nation. We are the designated organ procurement agency for northwest North Carolina, and we recently received approval to begin performing pancreatic transplants this year. Early in 1992, we expect to open our new Center for Positron Emission Tomography, one of the most advanced radiological services which is capable of measuring the chemical structure of the body. This new diagnostic procedure promises to make possible earlier detection, and hence, earlier treatment of tumors, hopefully, improving the outcome of the treatment.

During the past year, the hospital admitted approximately 22,000 patients, and almost 400,000 persons were treated through the various outpatient services of the Medical Center. These patients came from most counties in North Carolina, from 32 other states, and from several other countries.

During the past year, Baptist Hospital was re-accredited by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Health Care Organizations, and the survey team which visited our institution ranked it in the top 10 percent of hospitals in the nation. Also, according to a recent report from the North Carolina Medical Database Commission, average charges for care at Baptist Hospital are 10 percent below the average charges for similar diagnoses in hospitals statewide, and substantially lower than charges in the other North Carolina academic medical centers.

The Pastoral Care Department, which is funded in part through the Cooperative Program, provided Clinical Pastoral Education to 42 students during the past year. The Pastoral Care staff provided more than 54,000 specific ministries to hospital patients, family members, and staff. And, the counseling division provided over 21,700 counseling sessions. The Professional staff of the Pastoral Care Department continues to respond to requests for help from churches in conflict, from pastors and their families across the state.

For the first time since 1978, a Mother's Day Offering exclusively for Baptist Hospital Benevolent Care was received in North Carolina Baptist Churches. The staff and patients at Baptist Hospital are profoundly grateful for this support.

BAPTIST RETIREMENT HOMES OF NORTH CAROLINA REPORT

1991: Making Life for Older Adults the Best of Times

The Baptist Retirement Homes of North Carolina, Inc. operates four residential facilities for Older Adults around the State — the Albemarle Baptist Home in the Southern Piedmont, the Western North Carolina Baptist Home in Asheville, the Hamilton Baptist Home in Eastern North Carolina, and the Brookridge Retirement Community in Winston-Salem.

In Asheville, 1991 began with a great deal of excitement. After more than five years of trying to receive state approval to build a nursing care bed addition, the Baptist Retirement Homes was awarded a Certificate of Need for 100 medicaid certified nursing care beds for its Western North Carolina Baptist Home on Richmond Hill in Northwest Asheville. Currently the only nursing care provided by the Baptist Retirement Homes is the 85 bed nursing care unit at the Brookridge Retirement Community in Winston-Salem. The addition of 100 medicaid certified beds will mean that quality nursing care can be offered to Western North Carolina Baptists regardless of their ability to pay for the institutional services that they need.

The 39,000 square foot addition will cost approximately \$2.8 million. At the present time, the Baptist Retirement Homes has raised approximately \$2 million of the \$2.8 million needed to make this long hoped for dream a reality. Baptists across Western North Carolina are being urged to help Baptist Retirement Homes meet the financial challenge of building this new unit on Richmond Hill.

In Winston-Salem, the Brookridge Retirement Community completed its second year of operation. Under the leadership of a well-trained and committed Christian staff, the Brookridge Retirement Community's Independent Living area and Health Care Unit are considered among the finest in the State.

In Albemarle and Hamilton, Assisted Living care is provided to Older Adults in residential settings. The Albemarle and Hamilton facilities offer quality care to Older Adults regardless of their ability to pay for the cost of the care they receive . . . a service unmatched by any other church related long-term care institution in this state.

The Caldwell Baptist Association was officially incorporated on January 15, 1991. The suggested Articles of Incorporation and the Board of Directors were approved by the Associational Messengers during two of their meetings in 1990.

The first ever Board of Directors for the Caldwell Baptist Association, Inc. met three times during the 1990-91 Associational Year. The first meeting was on April 16, 1991 at the Mount Zion Baptist Church for orientation about the work of the Board.

Also on April 16, the Board met at the same location with the Disaster Relief, Finance and Properties Committees to consider purchasing and equipping a trailer to be used as a disaster relief unit to be owned and operated by the association. The four groups

jointly recommended to the messengers on April 25 that a trailer be purchased and equipped. It was further recommended that the Disaster Relief Committee be given permission to have a fund raising campaign to secure funds for the purchases.

On September 22, 1991 the Board met at the Baptist Center to discuss the insurance coverage for the association. Two agencies were given opportunities to review our insurance.

After careful consideration, the Board of Directors decided to change agents and upgrade the coverage. The Granite Insurance Agency, Inc. has been asked to serve our insurance needs. The Kincaid Insurance Agency and the Cameron M. Harris and Company of Lenoir have been the agents.

A "new-old" event is about to take place in North Carolina Baptist life: A Special Committee!

From time to time we Baptists feel the need to take a hard look at ourselves. We do that through the time-honored practice of asking trusted people to serve on a committee for a year, sometimes two. In 1956, for example, "The Committee of Twenty-Five" began a comprehensive study which eventually embraced all aspects of North Carolina Baptist life. That committee reported to a special session of the Baptist State Convention called for that purpose on May 5-6, 1959. Again, "The Committee of Twenty," appointed in 1967, worked for two years before presenting its comprehensive findings and recommendations to the Convention in November of 1969. Both of these committees provided clarity and guidance for North Carolina Baptists which endured for many years.

New times call for a fresh look at ourselves. The "new times" which have taken shape in the Southern Baptist Convention since 1979 have particular relevance for institutions, agencies, their trustees and the Convention. North Carolina Baptist institutions and agencies have rendered distinguished Christian service for a total of 1,108 years! New times call for a new look by a competent special committee.

In May the General Board approved a 17-member "Institutions Relations Committee." Lamar Brooks, Wilmington, is chairman. Other members are: Jean P. At the beginning of 1991, several churches took advantage of working with Bob Clegg from the Church Building and Planning Department of the Baptist State Convention. Our Caswell work team continued the project of remodeling old Caswell buildings. Our Brotherhood was busy with our Disaster Relief Committee. A new year found our Nation in the heat of battle concerning the Middle East.

Our association was involved in several ministry actions that helped our troops and their families. Money was collected to help the families, along with a collection of special items, which was shipped to the troops. A community service to show our support of our troops was sponsored by the association. There was also a special day of prayer for the troops promoted in the churches.

A Year of Leadership Training

Leadership training for Vacation Bible School workers, ASSIST training for Sunday School leaders and Doctrine Study seminars for Discipleship Training leaders prepared our folks for training and emphasis in these program areas. Our W.M.U. and Brotherhood Councils also held many on-site leadership clinics to help train the mission leaders of our local churches. I see on-site training as a trend for associational work at all levels with all programs.

A Year of Change

Many changes took place in 1991. I'm referring to the new improved Sunday School Board curriculum and more and improved Discipleship Training resources. The Music Council found the new Baptist Hymnal to be a great hymn book and resource for our churches. All of our church program areas will continue to see new Christian education resources in print and video that will help us carry the Good News of Jesus Christ to Caldwell County and to the entire world. By the way, we changed the "Caller" publication in 1991, hope you like it.

A Year Ended on a Postive Note

I see a strong Caldwell Baptist Association at the end of the 1990-91 Associational Year. How do I measure that? I see many stronger and growing ministries teaching and reaching churches in the Caldwell Baptist Association. That is the measure of any Baptist Association's work. Remember, the Caldwell Baptist Association exists to help every member church become more effective in ministry to their particular situation. Keep up your good work for our Lord!

PROCEEDINGS

1. The Winter Quarterly Meeting of the Caldwell Baptist Association scheduled for January 24, 1991 was cancelled due to inclement weather. 3. Messengers and visitors were welcomed to the Concord Baptist Church by Pastor Paul Childers.
4. Rev. Stuart White, Vice-Moderator, called the meeting to order, in absence of the

moderator, and asked for the adoption of the program as printed in the Winter Quarterly Book of Reports with the following changes: (1) Brooks Barber brought the report from the Personnel Committee, (2) Floyd Annas gave a report on the work week at Caswell, (3) Rev. Roger Williams replaced Dr. William Stillerman with a report from the Baptist Retirement Homes. The program was adopted with the changes. Rev. White welcomed visitors and first-time messengers to the meeting.

5. Rev. Terry Crouse, Minister of Music at the Concord Church, led the congregation as they sang "We're Marching to Zion."
6. The following recommendations were presented at the Winter Quarterly Meeting:
 - a. Rev. Paul White, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, made the following recommendation for the October 1, 1991 — September 30, 1992 Mission Performance Program Directors.

Motion was made and approved on the recommended leadership for 1991-92.

- b. Pete Underdown, Chairman of the Strategy Committee, brought a recommendation from the Strategy Committee and made the motion that the messengers approve the proposed amendments to the Constitution and Bylaws which were presented for their consideration at the Fall Quarterly Meeting. The amendments deal with "Membership" and are located on page 90 of the 1990 Annual Minutes. The proposed amendments were approved. The Strategy Committee also presented additional proposed amendments to the Bylaws. The messengers were instructed to study the proposed amendments, printed in the Winter Quarterly Book of Reports, and to be ready for discussion and vote at the Spring Quarterly Meeting.
- c. The Finance and Properties Committees jointly recommended that the association purchase a Dell 316SX Computer with necessary accessories for a price not to exceed \$4,500. 00. It was further recommended that money needed beyond the amount allocated in the budget for new equipment be taken from associational reserves.

The joint recommendation was approved by the messengers.

7. Reports from the Clerk, Treasurer and Personnel Committee were given as information.

The Personnel Committee is currently seeking someone to serve as Financial Secretary for the association. To date, nineteen inquires have been made about the position and four completed applications have been returned.

8. The following recommendation concerning the incorporation of the association

was made by Rev. Dale Fisher, upon suggestion of the association’s attorney, during the period for miscellaneous business:

“The Messengers of the Caldwell Baptist Association approve the transfer of all assets of the Caldwell Baptist Association to the Caldwell Baptist Association, Incorporated effective January 15, 1991, and authorize the Board of Directors to execute such deeds and other documents as may be required to effect this transfer.”

Motion was made and approved to accept the recommendation.

- 9. Rev. Dale Fisher presented the Director of Missions report. He gave words of appreciation to Rev. Stuart White, who will be leaving the Caldwell Association to serve as Pastor of the Carolina Memorial Baptist Church in Thomasville at the end of February. He also expressed words of appreciation to the state leaders of North Carolina Baptists for the capable leadership they demonstrate as they perform their duties.
- 10. Rev. Tom Lolley, Western Area Missionary for the Baptist Convention of North Carolina, gave the promotion of coming associational events with help by associational leaders.
- 11. The Church Development Director’s report was given by Rev. Dan Lipp. Rev. Lipp expressed praise for the fine work taking place in the Caldwell Association. He encouraged the churches to call on him for any needs they may have in church program areas.
- 12. Rev. Terry Crouse led the congregation as they sang “I Will Sing the Wondrous Story.”
- 13. Floyd Annas, Associational State Missions Promotion and Projects Director, gave the report of the 1991 Caldwell work week at Fort Caswell. Sixteen volunteers from six churches performed 490 hours of labor during the week. The following people participated:

Fisher introduced special music performers, “Straight to the Heart” from the Baptist Student Union at Appalachian State University and guest speakers, Dr. Roy Smith, Executive Director-Treasurer of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina; Rev. Tom Lolley, Western Area Missionary for the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina; and Rev. Roger Williams, representative of the North Carolina Baptist Retirement Homes.

- Rev. Fisher asked Rev. Bob Lowman, Pastor of the Kings Creek Church, to lead in a time of prayer for the soldiers, family and friends of those serving in the Middle East.
16. After the special music by "Straight to the Heart", Dr. Smith brought his message. He used the theme "Extending Christ's Mission . . . in North Carolina" as his sermon topic. PROCEEDINGS

1. The Spring Quarterly Meeting of the Caldwell Baptist Association, Inc. was held at the Setzer Creek Baptist Church on April 25, 1991. It began with music by the Mulberry Baptist Church Choir.
2. Rev. Joseph Barrett read scripture and led in prayer.
3. Messengers and visitors were welcomed to the Setzer Creek Baptist Church by Claude Storie, a member of the church.
4. Rev. Glenn Walker, Moderator, called the meeting to order and asked for the adoption of the program as printed in the Spring Quarterly Book of Reports with

the following changes: (1) Floyd Annas to make a recommendation from the Missions Development Council, (2) Rev. Joel Sellers to make a recommendation from the Personnel Committee, (3) The New Life singers who were scheduled for special music could not be at the meeting. It was noted that Sue Smith was taking minutes of the meeting in the absence of the clerk. The program was adopted with the changes. Rev. Walker welcomed visitors and first-time messengers to the meeting.

5. Rev. Dale Fisher recognized new pastors and staff.
6. Edgar Haas, Minister of Music at Setzer Creek, led the congregation in singing "Glory to His Name," after which registration cards were collected.
7. The following recommendations were presented:
 - a. Lewis Miller, Chairman of the Properties Committee, made the following recommendations: "The Board of Directors and the Properties Committee jointly recommend that the Caldwell Baptist Association sell one-hundred (+/-) chairs, currently in storage, to the Dudley Shoals Baptist Church for a price of five dollars per chair. These chairs are twenty years old and were used in the Baptist Center prior to the purchase of new chairs in 1987."

The Board of Directors recommends that the Properties Committee do an inventory of all other unused furniture and equipment owned by the association and make this information known to the churches. It is further recommended that a showing date be set so that all interested persons will have opportunity to look at the items. After the showing date, it is recommended that all interested churches and persons send sealed bids by an established date to the Properties Committee, and that the church or person making the best bid be sold the property requested. Motion was made and approved.
 - b. Earl Woods, Director of the Brotherhood Council, made a recommendation from the Board of Directors, The Disaster Relief, Finance and Properties Committees that the messengers approve the purchase of a Wells Fargo Trailer, plus the equipment, license, insurance and other items necessary to make the trailer operational as a Disaster Relief unit owned and operated by the Caldwell Baptist Association, Inc. Cost is \$6000.00. They further recommended that permission be granted to launch a campaign to raise the \$6,000.00 from interested churches, groups and individuals. In addition, they recommended that the association permit the Disaster Relief Committee to borrow \$2,500.00 from associational reserves to make this purchase, and this money would be replaced with money received from the campaign.

Motion was made and approved.
 - c. Charles Suddreth made a recommendation from the Membership Committee that the Indian Hills Baptist Church and the Open Door Baptist Mission be accepted under the watchcare of the Caldwell Baptist Association, Inc. as of April 25, 1991.

Motion was made and approved.
 - d. Sherrill German made a motion that the Nominating Committee Report of Associational Leadership for October 1, 1991 — September 30, 1992, as printed in the Spring Quarterly Book of Reports be approved. Three of those listed, Dianne Anderson and Roger Goble on the Disaster Relief Committee and Rev. Wayne Caviness, Moral Concerns Director of the Christian Life

Council, were to begin serving immediately.

The motion was seconded and approved.

- e. Pete Underdown, Chairman of the Strategy Committee, made a motion that the proposed amendments to the bylaws which were presented at the Winter Quarterly Meeting and printed in the Spring Quarterly Book of Reports be approved.

Motion was seconded and approved.

- f. Floyd Annas, State Missions Promotion and Projects Director, made the following recommendation from the Missions Development Council:

“One of the current building projects of the North Carolina Baptist Men is a triplex for married student housing at the Fruitland Baptist Bible Institute. Construction started March 25, and is scheduled to be completed by volunteers in late October. This is a one-day-per-week work project with most of the labor being done on Saturdays.

“Your Missions Development Council recommends that we have a Caldwell Baptist work day at the Fruitland Baptist Bible Institute on Saturday, June 22, 1991. The group should leave here about 7:00 a.m. and would return late Saturday afternoon. All interested in participating, please contact Earl Woods or Floyd Annas.”

Motion was made and approved.

- g. Rev. Joel Sellers made a motion that the total travel allowance for the Church Development Director be increased from \$1,800.00 per year to \$3,600.00 per year. The recommendation for this increase came from the Personnel Committee.

Motion was seconded and approved.

8. Reports from the Christian Life Council, Clerk and Treasurer were given as information.

Rev. Fisher asked for prayer for our Clerk, Ann Hatton, during her recovery from a foot injury.

The Christian Life Council gave information concerning a lottery which is being considered by the N.C. Legislature and urged those present to be aware of this. Brochures were available for those who wanted them.

9. Rev. Glenn Walker asked for miscellaneous business or announcements at this time. There were none.

10. A Calendar Emphasis skit was given by associational leaders.

11. Rev. Dan Lipp gave the Church Development Director's report, stating that he had visited in about half of the churches in the association and hoped to visit in all of them very soon. He offered his services to any church who needed him.

12. Rev. Dale Fisher reported that the Western North Carolina Retirement Home in Asheville has been given permission to expand if they can raise the money by the end of this summer. If the money is not raised the 100 beds will be given to someone else. He urged churches to help the retirement home get these beds.

In place of his regular report, Rev. Fisher called for a time of prayer of thanksgiving and praise to God for answered prayer in the Gulf War situation, and for continued prayer for the troops still in that area, for our President, and for world leaders. He asked all deacons and pastors present to join him at the altar and Rev. Frank

Denning led the prayer.

13. Daryl Triplett of First Baptist Church, Whitnel, gave a testimony on his call to Home Missions, stating that he had felt this call while on a mission trip to West Virginia in July, 1989. He made his call public in his church two weeks later. He is now enrolled at Gardner-Webb College, beginning the required education for home missionaries of 4-year college and 3-year seminary degrees.
14. Knolan Benfield from First Baptist Church, Hickory, gave a slide presentation of Home Missions work in different areas of our country.
15. Marlene Alexander led in a Commissioning Service for the Home Mission volunteers who will be participating in a mission trip to Baltimore, Maryland, July 13-20. She led a responsive reading and closed with prayer.
16. Rev. Fisher introduced program personalities.
17. Edgar Haas led the congregation in singing "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms."
18. Rev. Terrell L. Moore, Director of Missions, Muskingum Valley Baptist Association, Cambridge, Ohio, brought the message, "Extending Christ's Mission . . . in the United States." Taking his text from Isaiah 6, he stressed, "I dare you . . . "to say "yes" to God's call to salvation, vocation and location; to accept God's cleansing, trust Him and go to work for Him in the area He has called you; to be a witness for Christ as long as you live; and to let God use your life to help change our world. He closed with the poem, "Missionary or Mission Field."

6. Rev. Dale Fisher recognized new pastors and staff present. Those present were Rev. Ken Mashburn, Pastor of the Setzer Creek Baptist Church and Mrs. Barbara Fisher, Interim Youth Minister of the Mount Zion Baptist Church.
7. Marlene Alexander, Home Missions Promotion and Projects Director, and Gilbert Blackburn, Minister of Music and Youth for the Lower Creek Baptist Church, gave highlights of the 1991 associational sponsored Home Mission trip to Baltimore, Maryland on July 13-20. Forty-one people from eleven associational churches were involved in the project. They reported eight professions of faith made during the week.
8. Ray Hall led the congregation as they sang "We've A Story to Tell."
9. Reports from the Clerk and Treasurer were given as information.
10. The following recommendations were presented:
 - a. The Associational Council recommends:
 - (1) That the 1991-92 Calendar of Activities for the Caldwell Baptist Association, Inc. be approved by the messengers as presented in the Summer Quarterly Book of Reports.
 - (2) That permission be given to the Associational Council and the Associational Staff to make necessary changes to the calendar if needed.

The proposed amendment is presented during the Summer Quarterly Meeting only as information for the messengers. Discussion and vote will take place on Friday, October 25, 1991 during the Fall/Annual Meeting of the association.
 - (2) The Strategy Committee requests permission of the messengers to implement the process of strategy planning. At the 1991 Annual Meeting on October 25, 1991, the committee will present to the

messengers for consideration the names of those enlisted to serve on the various task groups and the strategy planning process schedule.

The motion to implement Strategy Planning was approved.

- e. Rev. Don Ingle, Chairman of the Finance Committee, presented the 1991-92 Ministry Budget of the Association to the Messengers for their approval. There was no discussion and the Budget was approved as printed.

- f. On October 26, 1990, the messengers approved a recommendation from the Personnel Committee that the association employ a Financial Secretary. Rev. Joel Sellers, Chairman of the Personnel Committee, recommended Mrs. Judy Brittain for that position. Her duties would begin on August 1, 1991 at the salary level stated in the 1991-92 Ministry Budget.

The floor was opened for questions and discussion but there were none. The Messengers approved unanimously for Mrs. Judy Brittain to become the first Financial Secretary for the Caldwell Baptist Association, Inc.

11. During the period of miscellaneous business, Hovis Allen, member of the Disaster Relief Committee, gave a report from that committee. Six thousand dollars is

needed to buy and equip a Disaster Relief Trailer; however, to date only \$3,246.12 has been raised for the project.

12. G.A.s dressed in costumes from different countries sang "Jesus Loves the Little Children" and helped Rev. Fisher and Rev. Lipp with the calendar emphasis for the next quarter.
13. Rev. R.B. Burnett, a retired Pastor, introduced the guest speaker, Rev. Tom Small. Rev. Small is a retired Southern Baptist Missionary to Africa.
14. The messengers and visitors enjoyed a period of international music presented by Rev. Sherrill German, Minister of Music for the Yadkin Baptist Church and Rev. Brooks Walker, Minister of Music for the North Catawba Baptist Church. Rev. German taught the congregation a song he had learned while serving as a volunteer missionary in Africa and Rev. Walker sang a song he had learned while doing volunteer mission work in Guadeloupe.
15. Rev. Small, guest speaker, using scripture from Acts and the theme "Extending Christ's Mission . . . Around the World" emphasized the importance of sharing the message not only here at home but everywhere.
16. A Commissioning Service for the August and September mission teams going to Brazil was led by Rev. Robert Livingston. After a time of prayer for the mission volunteers, Rev. Livingston turned the meeting over to the Moderator.
17. Rev. Walker adjourned the meeting and Ken Smith gave the benediction.

PROCEEDINGS

1. An Instrumental Ensemble consisting of Sherrill German, David Whipple, Bob Lowman and Thomas Hinton gave the call to worship as messengers and visitors gathered for the final session of the 107th Annual Meeting.
2. Rev. Dan Lipp, Church Development Director of the Caldwell Baptist Association, Inc., read scripture from Deuteronomy 31 and led in prayer.
3. Rev. David Payne, Pastor of the host church, extended the welcome from the Flemings Chapel Baptist Church. Ladies, who were members of the Elizabeth Campbell Circle from the Flemings Chapel Baptist Church, placed an azalea in the sanctuary in honor of Miss Elizabeth Campbell. This was in appreciation for her dedication and hard work as Director of Caldwell Baptist Missions for thirty-six and one half years.

COMMUNICATIONS COMMITTEE REPORT

The Communications Committee began the year by proof reading the 1990 Annual Minutes, working to make sure that all information contained in the minutes was accurate so that a correct historical record could be kept.

For the first time, the Communications Committee had a Caldwell Baptist Association float in the Lenoir Christmas Parade. The float was a trailer pulled by a truck. The trailer was decorated with a cross, Bible and globe, denoting the Southern Baptist Convention's logo. Children rode in the trailer and sang Christmas carols.

In May, the Communications Committee produced a daily prayer calendar for Associational Emphasis Week. The one-page calendar was made available to all churches that wanted to distribute it. The calendar included prayer requests for various

associational leaders and their ministry.

As for the new year, the Communications Committee will once again begin its work by proofreading the annual minutes.

No decision has been made on whether the committee will participate in the Christmas parade again.

There has been discussion about doing the prayer calendar again for Associational Emphasis Week in the coming year. It is hoped that the committee can prepare the calendar farther in advance in 1992 and recruit more churches into using it for this special emphasis week.

The Communications Committee has requested funding in the budget for the coming year so that a better quality calendar can be produced, and that if the Christmas parade project is repeated, there will be money to finance it.

DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS REPORT

Rev. R. Dale Fisher
Mount Zion Baptist Church

The Caldwell Baptist Association, Incorporated is organized into six levels of operation: Governing, Personnel, Coordinating, Administrative Services, Mission Performance Programs and Fellowship Groups. Each level is unique but carefully connected to the other levels.

GOVERNING

The Governing Level consists of the duly elected messengers of member churches in attendance at each quarterly or called meeting of the association. The functions of the messengers are to receive current information and reports about the work of the association and groups with which it is related; transact the business of the association; and report on the meetings and activities of the association to the churches.

The messengers meet quarterly on the fourth Thursday night of January, April and July. The Fall Quarter, or Annual Meeting, meets on the fourth Thursday and Friday of October. The first Quarterly Meeting of the Messengers was on January 26, 1989. This has proven to be a very successful plan over the past three years.

This year there was an average of 180 persons at the meetings with an average of 37 churches represented. I am pleased that more people are getting involved in the business of the association.

PERSONNEL

During their Summer Quarterly Meeting, the messengers approved a recommendation from the Personnel Committee that Mrs. Judy Brittain be employed as the association's first Financial Secretary. Her main responsibility is to assist the Treasurer but she also helps the Administrative Assistant with office responsibilities.

Judy began her part-time work on August 1, 1991. She has quickly become a valuable staff member. It is a pleasure to work with her.

The association now has four paid employees with over two-hundred and forty volunteers filling nearly three-hundred positions. Together, these people form a team of workers striving to "assist member churches," which is the purpose of the association.

COORDINATING

The Associational Council serves as the main coordinating group for the association, being responsible for the overall program and calendar.

It is made up of twenty associational leaders, including the Director of Missions, the Church Development Director, the Administrative Assistant, the Fellowship Council Director, the Administrative Services Director, and the fifteen Mission Performance Programs Directors.

At the start of the 1990-91 Associational Year two additional coordinating councils were added to the organizational structure. The Administrative Services Council consists of the chairmen of the Administrative Services Committees. These committees deal with the internal operation of the association. The council coordinates the overall work of these committees. The council director represents these committees as a member of the Associational Council.

In addition, the Fellowship Council is made up of the head leaders of the associational fellowship groups. This council meets to discuss fellowship needs and to coordinate the activities of the fellowship groups. The council director represents these groups as a member of the Associational Council.

ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES

This level of operation is made up of eleven committees, the Board of Directors and the five officers of the association. Their purpose is to carry out assigned work in order to help the association operate smoothly.

The committees have met as needed this year, some far more than others because of the nature of their work. The Associational Meetings, Finance, Membership, Nominating, Personnel and Properties Committees have in particular put in a lot of extra hours this year because of opportunities and challenges they have encountered.

The Communications Committee designed an associational float that was entered in the Lenoir Christmas Parade. Also, a prayer guide was developed for use by the churches during the Associational Emphasis Week. These were new ideas for the association which were well received.

I am pleased that the History Committee is working to secure a history of each church in the association. History is important and this committee is doing a worthwhile task by encouraging each church to write its history. Plans are also in the making to update the association's history.

The association was incorporated on January 15, 1991. The decision to incorporate brought the necessity of a Board of Directors. The board replaced the Trustees Committee since the duties would be basically the same. The board has met this year to discuss the purchase of a trailer to be used as a disaster relief unit and to discuss the insurance program of the association. The board consists of the association's five officers and six other members, one from each of the six districts.

MISSION PERFORMANCE PROGRAMS

The work of the Mission Performance Programs of the association is carried out through councils. Each council member has definite responsibilities and the number of members on each council is determined by program needs.

There are fifteen programs offered by the association. Their sole purpose is to assist the churches by providing such things as personal consultations, training opportunities, experiences in "hands-on" missions, and encouragement for church leaders.

The Disaster Relief Committee, which is a sub-group of the Brotherhood Council, has been in the spotlight this year in the creation of a disaster relief trailer. The trailer has already received statewide attention by an article done on it in the "Biblical Recorder." The trailer is operated by the Disaster Relief Committee and maintained by the Properties Committee.

The Christian Life Council conducted a "Ministering After Abortion" Seminar this year. It was not intended as a time for debate on the issue. Instead, it was a seminar designed to help those who minister to individuals and their families who have gone through an abortion. This was a creative and helpful program offered by this council.

I am grateful for the continuing work of the Discipleship Training Council in regards to Bible drills. It is vitally important that our children and youth learn well how to use the Bible and to instill the truth of God's Word in their minds. The Children and Youth Bible Drills and the Youth Speakers' Tournament are excellent tools for helping to meet this need. I encourage more churches to get involved in this worthwhile program of Bible training. This council has also worked hard on "M" Night. Our "N" Night is the second largest attended in the state.

It has pleased me to see a well balanced evangelism program develop in the last couple of years. The Personal Witnessing Workshop on January 29 was a great success. It was such a joy to see a large number of youth and adults come for witness training.

The Family Ministry Council continues to do good work. The Single Adult Conference, Senior Adult Symposium and Luncheon and the Associational Youth Night are being well planned by the council and appreciated by the participants. This council is also responsible for the Gardner-Webb Ministerial Education Day held in the association.

The Media Library Council has really helped to develop church libraries. Good attendance is the norm at quarterly meetings of the church librarians.

This association is blest to have such an active Missions Development Council, which has a global view of missions. Our association is a leader when it comes to volunteer involvement in missions. The Green Mountain Park Resort Ministry, the Caldwell Work Week at Caswell, the work project at Fruitland, the Maryland Mission Project and the Brazil Partnership have all been successful. I encourage more and more Caldwell Baptists to get involved in missions.

The Music Ministry Program is strong and healthy. The Children's Choir Camp and the Adult Praise Sing continue to be well attended and are highlights of the associational year. I am very pleased with the addition of a handbell clinic and a music reading clinic to this program's activities.

The Pastoral Ministries Council has been successful with the annual Deacon Workshop held each year in January. Good attendance and participation have shown that this workshop is meeting the needs of deacons. This council doubles as the Association's Ordination Council and several meetings have been held to do interviews of potential candidates for the Gospel Ministry at the request of associational churches. In addition, this council touched the hearts of the community by planning and implementing a Community Worship Service held in the National Guard Armory in December. The purpose was to pray for our troops serving in the Middle East and their families anxiously waiting at home, during Operation Desert Shield which became Operation Desert Storm.

Prayer is a very important part of the Christian's life. The Associational Prayer Council is working hard to develop and involve people in prayer. The year started with an Associational Prayer Meeting. A successful Prayer Conference was held this year led by Dr. Bruce Anthony. The Prayer Partners continue to voice prayers when called upon.

The once dormant Recreation Council has come to life this year and has planned a "Carousel for Church Recreation" in November. I am very happy to see the enthusiasm and commitment currently demonstrated by this council.

Seminary Extension continues to help educate interested persons. The council has done a good job in providing worthwhile courses this year.

The Stewardship Council is actively planning and working. A good Stewardship Conference was held this year. Next year, even more exciting things are planned by this council.

Sunday School is a key church program. The Associational Sunday School Council has worked hard to motivate and involve people in Sunday School. "Spark Plug" night, V.B.S. Clinics, High Attendance Day, and Curriculum Workshops are events that have been carried out this year.

What would we do without the Woman's Missionary Union? Caldwell Baptists can be proud of our W.M.U. Program. Retreats, conferences, prayer meetings, fellowships, activities and rallies have all marked the success of W.M.U. work this year.

FELLOWSHIP GROUPS

The purpose of the Fellowship Groups is to provide a setting for particular groups to meet together for fellowship, dialogue, encouragement and mutual care. This is an important element of the associational work.

We have a very strong and active Ministers' Conference. The meetings offer good programs and are well attended. The Ministers and Wives Quarterly Fellowships have been very well received. The Ministers Wives have worked hard this year. The Church Secretaries and Youth Leaders Fellowship are also doing well. Let's strive to keep the fellowship alive and well in the Caldwell Baptist Association.

CONCLUSION

Six levels of operation have kept this association moving forward. Great advancements have been made in recent years by our leaders. It is an honor for me, along with the associational staff, to work with the leaders that have been elected to serve this great association of churches.

Much more remains to be done. More lives need to be touched with the message of Christ. We must always guard against the dangers of complacency, criticism and polarization.

God has given us a Great Commission! Let's keep working as a united fellowship of believers to accomplish the mission that He has entrusted to us.

I love you, Caldwell Baptists! Thank you for allowing me the great privilege of serving as your Director of Missions.

DISCIPLESHIP TRAINING COUNCIL REPORT

The past year has been a challenging one for our Associational Discipleship Training Leadership. The year began well as we prepared for and led in the annual "M" Night program. We continued the practice of providing age-level conferences due to unavailable facilities for hosting an all age combined gathering. This has proven to be a good practice. "M" Night was well attended with 354 total present. (This made Caldwell Association second highest in the state among all associations reporting.) A total of twenty-six churches were represented as College Avenue Baptist Church hosted this event.

Three Bible Drill Interpretation Meetings were conducted at separate locations. These were led by Rev. Stuart White at Mulvale, Harrisburg and Clarks Chapel. The

FOREIGN MISSIONS REPORT

Miss Stella Austin, Representative
Kings Creek Baptist Church

Churches - For the year 1990 the Foreign Mission Board is pleased to report that there was one of the highest gains ever in the number of overseas churches - up to 24,122. A total of 1,550 were started this year.

Baptisms - The second highest total of baptisms were reported - 208,381.

Membership - Overseas Baptist church membership grew about 9% to about 2.7 million.

Volunteers - A record number of 11,650 Southern Baptists took part in overseas projects.

People groups - Southern Baptist personnel began working with 23 new people groups and entered 176 cities where there had been no work previously.

Personnel - a total of 414 new missionaries were appointed in 1990. At the end of the year there were 3,863 overseas personnel in 121 countries.

Sunday School - There was concern that Sunday School enrollment dropped in 1990.

Theological education - There was a 1,770 drop in seminary extension but there was a slight increase in enrollment in theological seminaries, Bible schools and institutes with a total of 12,586 being enrolled.

Human Needs - Southern Baptists spent nearly \$7.5 million for overseas hunger and relief projects in 1990, more than in 1989. There were 286 projects in 62 countries, including Cambodia and Vietnam.

CLARKS CHAPEL: Darryl Wilcox was ordained as deacon. Acchronobell Chimes system, which was donated by Miss Toye Clark was dedicated in memory of Mr. and Mrs. J.C. Clark, her Grandparents, whose inspired vision led to the establishment of Clarks Chapel Baptist Church.

CLOVER: Property and house sold (old Sherrill property). Architects obtained to draw first, second and third phases of additional facilities plus renovation of sanctuary.

DUDLEY SHOALS: Held one week VBS at First Hispanic Baptist Church, Spartanburg, South Carolina. Began construction on new educational building with seventeen new Sunday School classes. Cost \$500,000. Used Challenge To Build to secure funds.

FLEMINGS CHAPEL: September, 1991 called Rev. Barry Mershon to be our new Associate Pastor.

FRIENDSHIP: Hired a full-time Minister of Music/Education.

HARTLAND: We had a Old Timer's Day to celebrate Caldwell County's 150th Birthday.

HUDSON FIRST: Renovation of Educational Building.

INDIAN HILLS: Placed under watchcare of the Caldwell Baptist Association, Inc., Church renovation.

KINGS CREEK: Two young men answered call to ministry. Church sent team of five to Brazil on mission trip. Road around cemetery paved. Moved old baptistery to church grounds. Sanctuary reroofed.

LENOIR FIRST: Ordination of Mrs. Tommie S. Davis to the ministry. Dedication of new playground.

MOUNTAIN GROVE: Added two balconies to the sanctuary which added approximately 250 more seats. Purchased another house and four acres of land for additional parking.

HISTORY COMMITTEE REPORT

Mrs. Elizabeth Moore, Chairman
First Baptist Church of Granite Falls

It has been noted: "Without books, history is silent, literature is dumb, thought and vision at a standstill."

The History Committee of the Caldwell Baptist Association extends a challenge to each church to compile a comprehensive history and keep records current. We have requested a brief history of each church be placed on file in the Baptist Center. To date there are thirty-six church histories in place with several in process.

We are available for guidance. This is an experience of learning, cooperation and appreciation.

Flemings Chapel Baptist Church

Rev. David Payne, Pastor

What stands today as Flemings Chapel Baptist Church is a testimony to dedication and faithfulness. Many of the present church members can trace their roots to one or more of the first settlers in Caldwell County.

On the fourth Saturday in September 1867, a number of persons in the neighborhood of what came to be called "The Burnt Schoolhouse" banded together for the purpose of being constituted into a Baptist Church. A presbytery, consisting of Elders R.H. Moody, H. West, and G.D. Sherrill, recommended the constitution of an arm of a church. The group petitioned Lower Creek Baptist Church for their help and cooperation in establishing the work. On the fourth Saturday in November, fourteen members were organized into an arm of Lower Creek. Elder G.D. Sherrill was chosen as the first pastor, and Elder R.T. Fleming the first clerk.

In April 1869, the arm of Lower Creek at Flemings Chapel voted to organize a regular Baptist Church. This became a reality on the fourth Saturday in May. From its original beginning with services on Saturday and Sunday once a month, the church has now grown to full-time weekly services.

The following is as nearly complete a list of pastors as could be determined: G.D. Sherrill, R.H. Moody, D.W. Conway, B.H. Martin, Bob Fleming, Solomon Gwaltney, W.H. Hull, J.M. Harris, H.M. Croom, M.L. Clark, J.F. Crisp, S.B. McCall, Ansel Pardee, Boyd Cannon, Bob Prestwood, Tommy Shoemaker, W.R. Moss, Jay Younce, Sam Silvers, W.L. Sorrells, James R. Lail, Stanley Townsend and David C. Payne. Through the years the church has ordained ten men to the Gospel ministry.

The first house of worship was built of logs and constructed about 1871. Approximately thirty years later the log building was torn down and replaced with a frame building as the church realized the need for a better place of worship. This frame building was erected in 1897.

At the turn of the century, wings were added in order to provide more room. In 1953 a basement was completed, adding space for Sunday School rooms. Also that year the building was remodeled and veneered with brick. In 1960 the church erected a two story educational building designed to meet the needs of the church for the years ahead. The church completely remodeled and refurnished its auditorium in 1972. The following year a fellowship hall was added on the church property.

On January 21, 1986, the church sanctuary burned to the ground, though the educational building was saved. Worship services were held in the fellowship hall until

the completion of the new auditorium. The first worship service was held in the new sanctuary on November 22, 1987.

Kings Creek Baptist Church

Rev. Bob Lowman, Jr., Pastor

The Kings Creek Baptist Church was organized in the year 1779. The exact month is unknown. The first church records were destroyed in 1860 when the home of Thomas Isbell, church clerk, burned. The oldest written records date from 1860.

While the year is well established, the early history is not. The early church was a crude log building which was shared by the community school. This log structure is said to have been located in the Dug Hill area. The church moved to its present site sometime in the nineteenth century (prior to 1860).

Over the years Kings Creek has been a member of many different associations. The earliest was probably the Mountain District. In April of 1872 Kings Creek became a part of the Brushy Mountain Association and remained a member until October 21, 1887 when membership was granted in the Caldwell County Baptist Association.

Usually the church met once a month. The services were held on Saturday. The earliest meetings consisted of sermon, business, call for complaints and "opening the doors to receive members." The call for complaint gave members an opportunity to bring the sins and failures of neighbors to the attention of the fellowship for discipline.

In May of 1869 it was noted that each male member was to pay 25 cents a year and the treasurer was to keep an account.

In July of 1878 the church appointed a building committee to construct a new house of worship and sell the old one. The work was started in December 1879.

A milestone was reached the third Saturday of March in 1880. On that day the church voted to commence a Sabbath School on the first Saturday in April. No doubt, this forerunner of our Sunday School was very different from what we do today. It was a positive step in the growth of the fellowship.

The pastor was on an annual call for about the first one hundred and fifty years. In August 1887 the church voted to set the pastor's salary at \$35.00 a year.

In the early part of the twentieth century Kings Creek began to have services twice a month. In 1908 a pastor was called to serve Kings Creek and Lower Creek. He was to serve two weeks at each church. The first pastor to serve the two churches in this manner was Reverend J.G. Benfield.

In May of 1911 work was authorized on a cement baptistry. The site was purchased for ten dollars and work was completed by August. The baptistry was about three-tenths of a mile north of the church and was filled with water from a nearby creek.

In March of 1928 the trustees were instructed to investigate the cost of construction of a new church. The church voted to construct a new building and the first services in the new church were held in February of 1929.

The marvel of electricity came to Kings Creek Baptist Church in July of 1937 at a cost of \$60.54.

Reverend Grant Miller was called to the church in 1943 and was asked to live in the community. The first pastorium was built in 1946. Reverend R.L. Miller was called to be the first full time pastor in 1949. It was during his pastorate that Stella Austin made her long journey to Nigeria.

The three story educational building that is used today was erected in 1954 and 1955.

In 1973 during Rev. M.E. Patton's pastorate a committee was elected by the fellowship for the purpose of a new construction. A new house of worship and a new pastorium were to be built. Work was completed in February of 1975 on the pastorium. The first services were held in the new house of worship in November of 1975.

Presently Rev. Bob Lowman, Jr. serves as pastor. He began his pastorate August 20, 1989.

Over the two hundred and twelve years of the church's history, Kings Creek has had at least six houses of worship and one educational building.

The church at Kings Creek has been blessed and used of God for two hundred and twelve years. Little did that small band of settlers know of the world that we would live in in 1991, but we owe them our gratitude for having a vision to establish in this place for the work of the Lord.

HOME MISSIONS REPORT

The Home Mission Board had a significant year in 1990 as it continues to reach our nation for Christ.

The number of missionaries under appointment reached an all-time high of 4,573. These missionaries, serving in the U.S., Puerto Rico, the U.S. Virgin Islands, American Samoa and Canada, reported 385,031 baptisms.

A total of 2,271 endorsed chaplains reported 22,000 professions of faith and 3,500 baptisms. The number of volunteers totaled 52,545. The Annie Armstrong Easter Offering totaled \$35,679,669.00.

In this last decade of the 20th century, the Home Mission Board renews its commitment to reaching the goals of the Bold Mission Thrust. We make a difference in home missions by our praying, giving and going. The challenge is ours to carry Christ's message across the nation so the lost may hear.

Church libraries have Bible study resource tools that will enrich exploration of the world. PASTORAL MINISTRIES COUNCIL

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE BYLAWS

The following amendments were presented to the messengers as information during their Summer Quarterly Meeting. The amendments have gone through the proper procedure for presentation, discussion and vote during the Annual Meeting.

The Personnel, Properties and Finance Committees have agreed that it would be better to move the custodian from Personnel to Administrative Services under the Properties Committee. The position is done by contract more so than employment. Because of this decision it is necessary to amend the Bylaws.

Proposed Changes

Spark Plug Night on October 18 was the leadoff event for Associational Sunday School work in 1990-91. Rev. Ron Harrison, pastor of Grace Baptist Church in Gastonia was the featured speaker.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION of Caldwell Baptist Association, Inc.

A NONPROFIT CORPORATION

We, the undersigned natural persons of the age of eighteen or more, acting as incorporators for the purpose of creating a nonprofit corporation under the laws of the State of North Carolina, as contained in Chapter 55A of the General Statutes of North Carolina, entitled "Nonprofit Corporation Act," and the several amendments thereto, do hereby set forth:

Article I: Name

The name of the corporation is Caldwell Baptist Association, Inc.

Article II: Duration

The period of duration of the corporation shall be perpetual.

Article III: Purpose

- A. The purpose for which this corporation is organized is to operate and function as an association of churches to assist member churches, individually and corporately, to enlarge and strengthen God's kingdom at home and around the world through evangelism and missions; and to encourage them to cooperate fully in the programs and ministries of this association, the North Carolina Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention.
- B. In furtherance of its purpose and to the extent necessary to carry out such purpose, the corporation:
 1. Is to have all the powers given to and possessed by a North Carolina Corporation organized under the North Carolina Nonprofit Corporation Act.
 2. May engage in any lawful activity within the purpose for which the corporation may be organized which is incidental to and in furtherance of the exempt purpose of the corporation.
- C. No part of the net earnings of the corporation shall inure to the benefit of, or be distributable to its members, trustees, officers or other private persons, except to

pay reasonable compensation for services rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of the purpose as set forth in the Articles.

- D. No substantial part of the activities of the corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, and the corporation shall not participate, or intervene in (including the publishing or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office. Notwithstanding any other provision of these articles, the corporation shall not carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on (a) by a corporation exempt from federal income tax under section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provisions of any future U.S. Internal Revenue Law) or (b) by any corporation, contributions to which are deductible under section 170 (c) (2) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future U.S. Internal Revenue Law.)

Article IV: Government

The government of this corporation is associational in nature, and the final authority for the operation and management of the affairs of the corporation, spiritual and temporal, is vested in the messengers of the corporation, which authority is exercised in the manner set forth in the Constitution and Bylaws. Messengers alone have the authority to adopt and amend the Constitution and Bylaws, approve budgets, and govern and conduct the affairs of this corporation. Messengers are to be elected by the member churches as set forth in the Constitution and Bylaws.

Article V: Members

The membership of the corporation is composed of cooperating Southern Baptist Churches which have been approved for membership by the corporation. All present members of the association shall automatically become members of the corporation.

Article VI: Initial Directors

Article VII: Dissolution

a manner, or to such organization or organizations organized and operated exclusively for religious purposes as shall at the same time qualify as an exempt organization or organizations under section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future U.S. Internal Revenue Law), as the Board of Directors shall determine, subject to provisions of the Bylaws. Any such assets not so disposed of shall be dispersed by the Superior Court of the county in which the principal office of the corporation is then located, exclusively for such purposes or to such organization or organizations, as said court shall determine, which are organized and operated exclusively for such purposes.

Article VIII: Registered Office

The address of the initial registered office of the corporation in North Carolina is 208 Nuway Circle, N.E., Lenoir, North Carolina 28645, and the initial registered agent of the corporation is R. Dale Fisher.

**CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS
 of the
 CALDWELL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION, INCORPORATED**

CONSTITUTION

Preamble

The Constitution has been established to identify and preserve the fundamental truths and basic beliefs of this association.

Article I: Name

The name of the corporation is the Caldwell Baptist Association, hereinafter referred to as "association."

Article II: Duration

On October 22, 1885, sixteen churches met at the Rocky Springs Baptist Church to organize the Caldwell Baptist Association. The duration of this association is perpetual.

Article III: Location

Section 1. The member churches of this association are located in and adjacent to Caldwell County, North Carolina.

Section 2. The Caldwell Baptist Center, located at 208 Nuway Circle, Northeast, in Lenoir, North Carolina 28645, is recognized as the official headquarters of this association.

Article IV: Purpose

The purpose of this association is to assist member churches, individually and corporately, to enlarge and strengthen God's kingdom at home and around the world through evangelism and missions; and to encourage them to cooperate fully in the programs and ministries of this association, the North Carolina Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention.

Article V: Membership

Section 1. COMPOSITION: The membership of the association is composed of cooperating Southern Baptist Churches which have been approved for membership by the association.

Section 2. ADMISSION: When seeking admission into the association, a church must present to the Membership Committee a typed letter of request for admission. The letter should contain the name of the church, the reason for seeking admission into the association, and the date when the church voted to take such action.

- A. After receiving a request for admission into the association the Membership Committee is to meet with leaders of the church to discuss their desire for

membership, to explain the associational requirements for admission, to consider any of their church approved documents and location of their meetings, and to deal with any other matters that would help the committee make a decision about their request.

- B. At the next Quarterly Meeting of the Messengers, the Membership Committee is to share the request with the association and to make one of the following recommendations:
1. That the church requesting admission be accepted under the watchcare of the association;
 2. That action on the request be delayed for further consideration at the next quarterly meeting of the association; or
 3. That the request for membership be denied.

The committee is to give clear reason for its recommendation concerning the status of watchcare. As soon as possible following the associational meeting, the committee is to communicate the action of the association with the church first in spoken words, and then by typed letter.

- C. Any church that is accepted under the watchcare of the association must remain in that status for at least one full year before being admitted into the membership of the association.
1. Watchcare is a time of bonding between the association and the church seeking admission. The association is to carefully observe the faith, practice and cooperation of the church. The church under watchcare is to receive the same opportunities extended to member churches; however, members of churches under watchcare may not vote nor hold a position of leadership in the association.
 2. During the watchcare period, the church is expected to have an active part in the support of the work of the association, the North Carolina Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention.
 3. The Membership Committee is to meet, as needed, with leaders of the church, during the watchcare period to discuss their relationship with the association. Representatives of the committee are to visit during meetings of the church to observe the organization and practices of the church.
- D. Near the close of the watchcare period the committee is to evaluate the condition and cooperation of the church and to decide on one of the following recommendations to make to the association at the appropriate time concerning membership:
1. That the church requesting admission be accepted into full fellowship of the association;
 2. That action on the admission be delayed until the next quarterly meeting of the association; or
 3. That admission into the association be denied.

The committee is to give clear reason for its recommendation concerning membership. As soon as possible following the associational meeting, the committee is to

communicate with the church the action of the association first in spoken words, and then by typed letter.

- E. A two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present is needed for the church to be accepted under watchcare or into full membership of the association.
- F. If a church is denied the status of watchcare or membership by the association, then after the lapse of one year it may submit another letter to the Membership Committee requesting admission.

Section 3. CONFLICT: If a member church is in conflict and requests help from the association, then the Membership Committee and/or the Director of Missions may meet with the church to counsel and work with them in an attempt to help resolve the problem(s).

Section 4. COOPERATION: Any member church which fails to cooperate with the association for two consecutive years is to be contacted by the Membership Committee to ascertain the wishes and desires of the church relative to its continuance in the association. After counsel with the church, the committee may choose to make a recommendation that the church be removed from the membership of the association. Such a recommendation would have to be made at a quarterly meeting of the association, and a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present would be needed for dismissal of the church from the association.

The committee is to give clear reason for its recommendation concerning action toward the member church. As soon as possible following the associational meeting, the committee is to send a letter to the church to communicate the action taken by the association.

A cooperating church is defined as one who sends an annual church letter to the associational clerk, is represented by duly elected messengers at quarterly associational meetings, contributes financially to the association, and is in general agreement with the purpose, basic beliefs, programs and ministries of the association.

The association recognizes that any affiliated church has the right to withdraw its fellowship from the association. It is requested that the report of such action by a church be sent to the Membership Committee in an official letter from the church.

Upon receipt of the letter, the Membership Committee is to discuss the action with leaders of the church. At the next quarterly meeting of the association, the committee is to inform the messengers of the church action. The association is to take one of the following actions:

- A. Accept the action of the church and immediately remove the church. The church is to be notified of the action by a letter from the association.
- B. Delay acceptance of the church action until the next quarterly meeting and instruct the Membership Committee to ask the church to reconsider its action.

Section 5. NOTIFICATION: The association is to immediately inform the North Carolina Baptist State Convention when a church is accepted under watchcare or membership. In addition, the convention is to be informed if a church is dismissed from the association as a member.

Article VI: Authority

Section 1. This association is an autonomous body which is governed only by the duly elected messengers from the churches that compose it. Every messenger has the

right to vote on all matters of business presented at any quarterly or called meeting of the association provided that the messenger is present. Absentee voting is prohibited.

Section 2. This association may advise and assist member churches as requested, but may not infringe upon the rights of these churches. The association recognizes each church as a self-governing body that has voluntarily decided to be affiliated with the association.

Article VII: Relationships

Section 1. This association is composed of member churches that govern and support it.

Section 2. All internal groups created and empowered by the association are only accountable to the association.

Section 3. The association voluntarily cooperates with and supports the North Carolina Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention.

Article VIII: Basic Beliefs

This association accepts the doctrinal statements of *The Baptist Faith and Message* as adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention in 1963. A copy of *The Baptist Faith and Message* is available for study in the Media Library of the Caldwell Baptist Center.

Article IX: Dissolution

This association may be dissolved by a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present at any quarterly meeting of the association, provided that the recommendation to dissolve was presented in written or typed form to the clerk and publicly stated to the messengers by the moderator or his designee at the preceding quarterly meeting of the association. Typed copies of the recommendation are to be furnished to the messengers of the association for study at least two weeks prior to the vote on the recommendation. Upon vote to dissolve, the assets of the association will be dissolved by the Board of Directors upon instruction of the messengers.

Article X: Amendments

This Constitution may be amended by a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present at any quarterly meeting of the association, provided that the amendment was presented in written or typed form to the clerk and publicly stated to the messengers by the moderator or his designee at the preceding quarterly meeting of the association. Typed copies of the amendment are to be furnished to the current messengers of the association for study at least two weeks prior to the vote on the amendment.

BYLAWS

Preamble

These Bylaws have been established to identify and preserve procedural matters of this association and to govern this body in an orderly manner.

Article I: Administrative Policies

Section 1. The associational staff is responsible for scheduling the use of the Baptist Center in Lenoir and the Caldwell Cottage at Ridgecrest.

Section 2. Money is to be contributed to the Gideons by the association for the purchase of memorial Bibles upon the death of a pastor, staff minister, associational

leader, or the spouse of a pastor, staff minister or associational leader.

Section 3. The Clerk, the Treasurer and the Director of Missions are authorized to have access to the association's safety deposit box located at the First Union National Bank on Main Street in Lenoir.

Article II: Associational Year

The Associational Year begins on October 1 and closes on September 30.

Article III: Finances

Section 1. The fiscal year of the association begins on October 1 and closes on September 30.

Section 2. The Associational Budget for the upcoming year is to be formally presented by the Finance Committee for a vote by the messengers during the quarterly meeting of the association in July each year. In order to give the messengers adequate time to study the budget, the Finance Committee is to prepare and distribute copies of the budget to the messengers by the second Thursday of July each year. The budget becomes effective on October 1 annually. The Finance Committee is to maintain a budget format that corresponds with the organizational structure of the association.

Section 3. The treasurer is to present to the messengers a current financial report clearly showing all receipts and disbursements during each quarterly meeting of the association. During the quarterly meeting in October, an annual financial report is to be presented. The treasurer is to provide a monthly financial report in the associational newsletter including the contributions of each church in the association.

Section 4. The association maintains an ongoing "Ministers Support Fund" to temporarily assist associational pastors, staff ministers, retired ministers, other ministers and their immediate families during times of financial crises. The Finance Committee confidentially administrates the fund, giving an annual report as to the number of ministers assisted and the amount of money given. The money for this fund comes from the portion of the State Missions Offering that the association receives.

Section 5. Each associational church is requested to contribute at least 4% of all undesignated receipts to the association.

Section 6. The association is a non-profit organization.

Article IV: Logos

Section 1. The association is to continually have a personalized logo that visually displays the identity and current work of this body.

Section 2. The association accepts and uses the logo of the Southern Baptist Convention to help identify who we are.

Article V: Meetings

Section 1. The messengers of the association meet quarterly to receive information and reports and to transact the business of the association. The meetings are held in October (Fall Meeting), January (Winter Meeting), April (Spring Meeting), and July (Summer Meeting). The meetings in January, April and July are night meetings which are held on the fourth Thursday of each month. The meeting in October is considered the Annual Meeting of the association and is conducted on the fourth Thursday and Friday of October.

The first session of the Annual Meeting is held on Thursday night. The second (final) session is conducted on Friday morning, concluding at lunch. The annual meeting is to be held in one church on Thursday and in another church on Friday. The association

is responsible for providing lunch for the messengers on Friday. The association has the option of charging for the meal on a cost recovery basis, or may pay for the meal out of the associational budget.

Section 2. The Associational Meetings Committee is fully responsible for preparing the program, selecting and contacting program participants, and for choosing and preparing the location for each meeting. The location for each quarterly meeting is to be presented in the annual "Calendar of Activities" for the forthcoming year. The committee may ask the associational messengers to move a quarterly meeting to a date one week prior to or one week after a scheduled meeting date to avoid conflict with a major denomination emphasis date. The meetings are to be held in as many member churches as practically possible on a rotating basis.

Section 3. The Moderator or the Director of Missions can call the messengers together for special meetings to deal with extremely urgent matters that cannot wait until the next quarterly meeting. Before calling a special meeting to order, a notice of at least two weeks is to be given to the messengers with a clear explanation as to the purpose of the meeting. A quorum of fifty messengers must be present to conduct a special meeting.

Section 4. The Moderator may postpone and reschedule quarterly or called meetings of the associational messengers, in cooperation with the Director of Missions and the Associational Meetings Committee Chairman, in the event of inclement weather or other unforeseen crises.

Section 5. A quorum at each of the quarterly meetings of the association consists of those messengers who attend each meeting.

Section 6. *Robert's Rules of Order, Revised*, is the authority for parliamentary rules of procedure for all business meetings of the association.

Section 7. Visitors attending a quarterly or called meeting of the association may by approval of the body participate in debate without the privilege to vote. Visitors are welcome to attend the meetings of the association.

Article VI: Organization and Leadership

Section 1. The association is organized into six levels of operation: Governing, Personnel, Coordinating, Administrative Services, Mission Performance Programs and Fellowship Groups.

A. GOVERNING

1. The ASSOCIATION-IN-SESSION consists of the duly elected messengers by member churches and seated by vote of the messengers in attendance at each quarterly or called meeting of the association.
2. Churches of fifty (50) members or less are entitled to five (5) messengers. One (1) additional messenger is allowed for each additional fifty (50) church members or major fraction thereof provided no church has more than ten (10) messengers.
3. Churches are to elect their messengers before October each year so that the messengers can serve the full associational year from October 1 through September 30. Messengers can serve consecutive years but must be elected annually by their church. Messengers are expected to attend all of the quarterly and called meetings of the association. The name, address, and telephone number of each messenger should be delivered by the church clerk to the associational clerk no later than October 7 each year to facilitate advance

registration. This information can accompany the annual church letter.

4. The functions of the messengers are to receive current information and reports about the work of the association and groups with which it is related; transact the business of the association; and report on the meetings and activities of the association to the churches.
5. A person serving as a messenger from a church must be a member in good standing of that church.

B. PERSONNEL

1. Positions:

- a. The *Director of Missions* is the general leader of the association serving as the director of directors of all programs, ministries, and services of the association. In addition, the Director of Missions leads the association to explore new mission frontiers, and serves as a minister to the churches and church leaders.

The Director of Missions is the chief executive officer of the association, the registered agent of the corporation (association), and is an ex-officio member of all associational committees, councils, and groups. The Director serves as director of the Associational Council.

Election to this office is upon recommendation of the Director of Missions Search Committee and by two-thirds majority vote of approval by the messengers at any quarterly meeting of the association. The time of service is indefinite and can be terminated by written notice to the Personnel Committee by the Director of Missions or by two-thirds majority vote of the messengers at any quarterly meeting of the association upon recommendation of the Personnel Committee.

- b. The *Church Development Director* serves the association as the administrative leader and church consultant in the development of the programs of Brotherhood, Discipleship Training, Family Ministry, Media Library, Music Ministry, Recreation, Stewardship, Sunday School and Woman's Missionary Union. The person is to provide responsible leadership through planning, correlating, implementing and evaluating these assigned programs in cooperation with associational leadership. Training opportunities, counsel, and encouragement are to be offered for associational and church leaders as needed or requested. Other responsibilities include developing the Baptist Center Media Library in cooperation with the Associational Librarian and Media Library Council, serving as editor of the Caldwell Baptist Caller, and working in other associational capacities as deemed necessary by the Director of Missions. Election to this office is upon recommendation of the Personnel Committee and by two-thirds majority vote of approval by the messengers at any quarterly meeting of the association. The time of service is indefinite and can be terminated by written notice to the Personnel Committee by the Church Development Director or by two-thirds majority vote of the messengers at any quarterly meeting

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- of the association upon recommendation of the Personnel Committee.
- c. The *Administrative Assistant* serves primarily in a secretarial role. However, this individual assists the Director of Missions with daily administrative matters of the association. In addition, the person supervises the general operation of the Baptist Center by answering the telephone, greeting visitors and helping to meet their needs. The Administrative Assistant supervises office help along with the Director of Missions. This person also serves as the Associational Clerk and as secretary of the Associational Council. The Administrative Assistant is enlisted and recommended to the association by the Personnel Committee. A two-thirds majority vote of approval by the messengers is necessary for employment. The time of service for the Administrative Assistant is indefinite and can be terminated by written notice to the Personnel Committee by the employee or by two-thirds majority vote of the messengers upon recommendation of the Personnel Committee.
 - d. The *Financial Secretary* serves as assistant to the Treasurer and helps the Administrative Assistant with office responsibilities. It is a part-time position. The Financial Secretary is enlisted and recommended to the association by the Personnel Committee. A two-thirds majority vote of approval by the messengers is necessary for employment. The time of service for the Financial Secretary is indefinite and can be terminated by written notice to the Personnel Committee by the employee or by two-thirds majority vote of the messengers upon recommendation of the Personnel Committee.
 - e. A *Summer Worker* is to be hired as needed for approximately ten weeks of work. This person, normally a student, does special projects as assigned by the Director of Missions or his designee. The summer worker is enlisted and recommended to the association by the Personnel Committee. A two-thirds majority vote of approval by the messengers is necessary for employment. The association may hire more than one Summer Worker per year, if needed and money is available.
2. General:
 - a. Each paid employee is to be provided by the Personnel Committee with an up-to-date job description of his responsibilities.
 - b. The Director of Missions is the general supervisor of all paid employees of the association. However, the Director is to work closely with the committees and leaders who share supervision.
 - c. The Personnel Committee cannot recommend the Director of Missions, the Church Development Director, the Administrative Assistant, or the Financial Secretary to the association for termination of duties without proper notice and a clear explanation of such action given to the individual prior to the associational meeting at which time the recommendation for dismissal is to be made. A closing financial arrangement is to be provided for an employee

who has been dismissed by the association. The Personnel Committee is to determine a fair closing financial arrangement and to make it a part of the recommendation for dismissal to the association.

The Summer Worker and other temporary employees may be dismissed with clear explanation by the Personnel Committee without approval by the association. No closing financial arrangement is necessary.

C. COORDINATING

1. This level of operation is made up of the Administrative Services Council, the Associational Council and the Fellowship Council. The purpose of these councils is to coordinate the overall work of the association. The Associational Council serves as the primary coordinating council.
2. Coordinating Councils:
 - a. The Administrative Services Council consists of the administrative services committee chairmen. The council meets only as needed to coordinate the overall work of the committees. The council director represents the committees as a member of the Associational Council.
 - b. The Associational Council consists of the Mission Performance Programs Directors, the Administrative Services Council Director, the Fellowship Council Director, the Director of Missions, the Church Development Director and the Administrative Assistant. The Director of Missions serves as the Council Director and the Administrative Assistant serves as secretary.

The purpose of the council is to coordinate the overall program and calendar of the association. The council meets only as needed.
 - c. The Fellowship Council consists of the head leaders of the associational fellowship groups. The council meets only as needed to discuss fellowship needs and to coordinate the activities of the fellowship groups. The council director represents the fellowship groups as a member of the Associational Council.

D. ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES

1. This level of operation is made up of the committees, the Board of Directors, and the officers of the association. Their purpose is to carry out assigned work in order to help the association operate smoothly. There are eleven committees, the Board of Directors and five officers. Each committee chairman serves as a member of the Administrative Services Council.

The six associational district members serving on the Board of Directors and all committee members are elected for three consecutive years of service. After the lapse of at least one year a person may be nominated for a position previously held. The length of service for the officers is in accordance with their individual job descriptions.

2. Committees:

- a. The *Associational Meetings Committee* is responsible for planning and conducting the regular and called meetings of the associational messengers. The duties of this committee are to: (1) propose an order of business for each meeting of the associational messengers; (2) enlist all program personnel for the associational meetings; (3) publicize the order of business to the churches in advance of the meeting; (4) arrange for the facilities needed for each meeting; (5) arrange for and conduct proper registration of messengers and visitors at each meeting and to report registration as requested; and (6) recommend future meeting places to the associational messengers in the annual "Calendar of Activities" for the forthcoming year; the committee may ask the associational messengers to move a quarterly meeting to a date one week prior to or one week after a scheduled meeting date to avoid conflict with a major denominational emphasis date. The committee consists of six members, each elected for a three-year term with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year.
- b. The *Communications Committee* is responsible for communicating the programs, ministries, resolutions and services of the association to the churches and to the general public. Its duties are to: (1) develop and implement an annual Associational Emphasis Week promotion plan; (2) assist, as needed, with office-produced communications, such as: The Book of Reports and the Annual Minutes; (3) receive, review and recommend all proposed resolutions or public statements; (4) initiate resolutions or statements as needed; (5) develop promotional brochures or other literature that identifies the work of the association, and (6) assist, as requested by the association or associational leaders, in promoting or reporting the work and actions of the association through the secular media. The Communications Committee consists of six members, each elected for a three-year term with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year.
- c. The *External Relations Committee* is responsible for establishing and maintaining proper relationships with groups outside the association. Its duties are to: (1) serve through individual representatives as a channel of communication between the association and various agencies, boards, foundations, and other groups affiliated with the North Carolina Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention, and (2) communicate and work, as needed, with non-Baptist groups.
The External Relations Committee consists of the associational representatives of the American Bible Society, the Annuity Board, the Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina, the Baptist Retirement Homes of North Carolina, the Baptist World Alliance, the Biblical Recorder, Christian Higher Education, the Foreign Missions Board, the General Board of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina (two representatives), the Home Mission Board,

- the North Carolina Baptist Foundation, and the North Carolina Baptist Hospital, each elected for a three-year term.
- d. The *Finance Committee* assists the association in securing, administering and reporting its finances. Its duties are to: (1) develop and recommend an overall financial development plan; (2) develop and recommend an associational budget based on the plans of the association's various programs and ministries; (3) plan and direct the effort to seek giving commitments from the churches; (4) conduct studies and make recommendations concerning proposed expenditures not included in the budget; (5) review expenditures periodically in terms of budget allocations and recommend budget adjustments if needed; (6) develop and recommend financial policies and procedures, including provisions for auditing; and (7) administer the associational "Minister's Support Fund." The Finance Committee consists of six elected members, each elected for a three-year term with terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year.
 - e. The *History Committee* is to gather, preserve, and interpret historical records of the association's life and work. Its duties are to: (1) work with the associational clerk in gathering and preserving past associational records; (2) assist in the recording of present-day activities; (3) communicate and interpret the heritage of the association to associational leaders and member churches; (4) use historical facts and documents to challenge the association to accomplish its mission; (5) develop and recommend to the association policies and procedures regarding its historical materials; (6) encourage churches to gather and preserve their historical records and to write, communicate, and interpret their history. The History Committee consists of six members, each elected for a three-year term with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year.
 - f. The *Membership Committee* is to assist the association in determining when churches are of like faith and order and can be properly accepted into the association according to the provisions made in the Constitution of the association. Also, this committee serves as a "church conflict" advisory body. In addition, this committee encourages active participation by inactive churches in the association. The duties are to: (1) recommend and implement approved guidelines as needed for receiving churches into the association and for dealing with troubled member or inactive churches in the association; (2) counsel with churches seeking admission into the association and with troubled or inactive member churches; (3) examine the credentials of churches seeking admission into the association (namely, their articles of faith or doctrinal positions, church covenant, polity — including their constitution and bylaws — and relationship to the denomination. The Membership Committee consists of six members, each elected for a three-year term with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year.

- g. The *Nominating Committee* leads in coordinating the selection of all association-elected leaders except paid personnel. Its duties are to: (1) select, interview, enlist, and recommend general associational officers, mission performance program directors, and committee chairmen and members; (2) coordinate the selection of workers for all the association's organizations and committees; (3) approve workers before they are invited to work in program organizations; (4) distribute associational leadership according to priority needs; (5) assist associational program leaders in discovering and enlisting qualified persons to fill positions in their respective organizations; (6) present workers to the association; (7) nominate special committees as assigned by the association. The Nominating Committee consists of six members, one from each of the six associational districts, each elected for a three-year term with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year. The committee should give careful consideration that all nominees are selected fairly from all six districts of the association, and from all pastors, staff members, men and women of the churches. Each nominee must be a member in good standing in an associational church.

LEADERSHIP SELECTION

- (1) All Mission Performance Program directors are to be formally presented by the Nominating Committee for vote by the messengers at the January meeting of the association. In order to give the messengers adequate time to consider the nominees for program directors, the Nominating Committee is to prepare a complete list of the names and positions and have copies distributed to the messengers by the second Thursday in January.
The individuals approved at the January meeting of the association immediately become the program directors-elect until October when their tenure of service officially begins. The program directors-elect would meet with the Associational Council only upon request; however, each program director-elect is expected to participate in the annual calendar planning meeting.
- (2) Each program director-elect is to immediately start selecting individuals to serve on the respective program councils for the upcoming year. A complete list of the individuals selected to serve is to be presented to the Nominating Committee by March 31, by each program director-elect.
- (3) Fellowship Groups may select their own leadership or ask the Nominating Committee to do the selection. Each group that chooses its own leadership for the upcoming associational year is to present a complete list of the individuals selected to serve to the Nominating Committee by March 31.
- (4) The Board of Directors, officers, committee chairmen and members, leaders of the fellowship groups, and all previously

unelected members of program councils are to be formally presented by the Nominating Committee for vote by the messengers at the April meeting of the association. In order to give the messengers adequate time to consider the nominees, the Nominating Committee is to prepare a complete list of the names and positions and have copies distributed to the messengers by the second Thursday of April.

The individuals approved at the April meeting of the association are the leaders "elect" until October 1 when their tenure of service officially begins. Each leader has the privilege to plan and to train as necessary for the upcoming year. The leaders "elect" have no authority over the current year's work, except in a position currently held.

- (5) If vacancies occur during the year the Nominating Committee is to enlist a person to fill each vacated position and to recommend the person to the association. The committee is to work with program directors and committee chairmen as needed in filling each vacancy.
- h. The *Personnel Committee* is responsible for all paid employees of the association. Its duties are to: (1) recommend policies and procedures for the selection, supervision, and termination of associational personnel; (2) maintain up-to-date job descriptions in a manual for every paid position in the association; (3) recruit, interview, and recommend to the association new personnel, excluding the Director of Missions, in full cooperation with the appropriate supervisor; (4) develop and recommend salaries and benefits for employed personnel; (5) develop and recommend to the association policies and procedures regarding continuing education and development for the Director of Missions and other paid personnel. The Personnel Committee consists of six members, each elected for a three-year term with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year. The chairman is a member of the Director of Missions Search Committee.
- i. The *Properties Committee* assists the association in the administration of all properties in Buncombe and Caldwell Counties. Its duties are to: (1) inspect and keep inventory of all associational properties; (2) secure, supervise and terminate the services of persons responsible for the care of associational properties; (3) develop and initiate scheduled cleaning procedures; (4) develop and recommend a program of preventive maintenance; (5) develop and recommend policies and procedures for using facilities and equipment; (6) request and administer maintenance, furniture, and equipment budget; (7) develop and, with the Board of Directors, recommend and adequate insurance plan for the properties. The Properties Committee consists of six members, each elected for a three-year term with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year.

This committee can spend up to \$500.00 on one item without

approval of the association. Items above that amount must have association approval.

- j. The *Search Committee* is designed to serve only as needed to secure a Director of Missions. Its duties are to: (1) meet as a committee for the first time within a month following election by the association; (2) choose from within the committee a chairman, vice-chairman and secretary during the first meeting; (3) study and follow carefully the Job Description for the Director of Missions; (4) seek comments and suggestions from the association concerning the expectations of the next Director of Missions; (5) report regularly to the association on progress being made; (6) develop a list of prospects for the position; (7) narrow the list of candidates, thoroughly researching qualifications and references; (8) interview and observe most favorable candidate(s) in different settings; (9) unanimously present choice candidate to the association for approval; (10) assist newly elected Director of Missions during transition period; and (11) inform all other candidates by letter, as necessary, of the decision of the association, expressing appreciation to each person for their time and cooperation. The committee will consist of one pastor, one layman, one laywoman (all named by the Nominating Committee), plus the Moderator and Chairman of the Personnel Committee.
 - k. The *Strategy Committee* assists the association in determining its strategic objectives and in staying on course in achieving them. Its duties are to: (1) monitor the needs and opportunities of the churches and provide updated information to the churches and to the associational programs annually; (2) recommend modifications as needed; (3) maintain up-to-date job descriptions in a manual for every volunteer position in the association excluding paid workers; (4) lead the association to conduct strategy planning about every five years. The Strategy Committee consists of six members, each elected for a three-year term with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year.
3. Board of Directors:
 - a. The Board of Directors acts as the legal agent of the association. Its duties are to: (1) serve as legal representative of the association; (2) act as directed by the associational messengers in handling legal matters; (3) oversee the total insurance plan of the association; (4) hold in trust any property, money, endowment or other securities of the association; (5) exercise the power, under the instruction of the associational messengers, to hold, buy, sell, and convey property, both real and personal, and to sign all papers necessary for the purchase or conveyance; and to (6) act in behalf of the associational messengers, under usual and extreme circumstances, giving a full report to the messengers as soon as possible to explain action taken. The Board of Directors consists of eleven members. Serving are the five officers of the association, plus six other members, one from each of the six associational districts. The six associational district

members are each elected for a three-year term with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year. The Moderator serves as the presiding officer of the board. The Board of Directors meets annually in October and at other times as necessary.

b. Officers:

- (1) The *Moderator*, also known as president, presides over the quarterly and called meetings of the associational messengers. As the presiding officer, the Moderator (1) opens the meetings punctually at the appointed time, enforces the rules, preserves the order, and exercises all the prerogatives of a presiding officer according to the principles of established parliamentary usage (*Roberts Rules of Order, Revised*); (2) appoints a parliamentarian, if desired, to serve at any or all meetings of the associational messengers during his term of office; the person appointed must be approved by all messengers-in-session; (3) serves as an ex-officio member of all committees, councils, and groups of the association; (4) calls the associational messengers together for special meetings to deal with extremely urgent matters that cannot wait until the next quarterly meeting (Before calling a special meeting to order, a notice of at least two weeks is to be given to the associational messengers with a clear explanation as to the purpose of the meeting. A quorum of, fifty associational messengers must be present to conduct a special meeting.); (5) postpones and reschedules quarterly or called meetings of the associational messengers, in cooperation with the Director of Missions and the Associational Meetings Committee Chairman, in the event of inclement weather or other unforeseen crises; and (6) serves as a member of the Director of Missions Search Committee. The Moderator is elected for a one-year term and is eligible for election to a second consecutive term; however, after serving for two consecutive years, the individual could not be considered for Moderator for at least one year.
- (2) It is the duty of the *Vice-Moderator*, also known as Vice-President, to discharge the duties of the Moderator in the absence or at the request of the Moderator. The Vice-Moderator is elected for a one-year term, and is eligible to a second consecutive term. However, after serving for two consecutive years, the individual could not be considered for Vice-Moderator for at least one year.
- (3) The *Clerk*, also known as Secretary, records and keeps in permanent form all transactions of the association and makes this information available upon request. The Clerk's duties are to: (1) serve as recorder during the meetings of the association; (2) secure from the churches the annual Uniform Church Letter and process it according to recommended procedures; (3) edit the associational annual minutes; (4) work with the History Committee to preserve the official records of the association; (5) train and assist church clerks. The Administrative Assistant serves as the Clerk of the association.

- (4) The *Treasurer* receives all of the funds contributed to the association and disburses them in accordance with the budget of the association or for which the funds were contributed. The Treasurer's duties are to: (1) serve as an ex-officio member of the Finance Committee; (2) work with the Finance Committee to recommend and establish fiscal policies; (3) maintain proper records of all monies received and disbursed; (4) provide printed quarterly and annual reports to the association of all receipts and disbursements. The Treasurer is elected annually and can succeed himself. The chairman of the Finance Committee is authorized to fulfill the duties of the treasurer in the event the treasurer is unable to do so.
- (5) The *Director of Missions* is the chief executive officer of the association, also serving as the registered agent.

E. MISSION PERFORMANCE PROGRAMS

1. The work of the Mission Performance Programs of the association is carried out through councils. Each council member has definite responsibilities and the number of members on each council is determined by need. Council members are elected annually. The general director of each council serves as an ex-officio member of the Associational Council. Each council has meetings according to need. Each council consists of a program director and other leaders as needed to conduct the program.
2. Councils:
 - a. The *Brotherhood Council* assists churches in educating and involving men and boys in missions.
 - b. The *Christian Life Council* informs the churches of critical moral and social issues and leads in Christian action to meet those needs. The council seeks to develop good Christian citizenship and healthy human relations.
 - c. The *Discipleship Training Council* assists the churches in starting, improving and expanding Christian discipleship through their Discipleship Training programs. ,
 - d. The *Evangelism Council* assists churches in reaching people for Christ through evangelistic training and by bringing the churches together in corporate efforts of evangelism.
 - e. The *Family Ministry Council* assists churches in developing family ministry programs. Special emphasis is placed on ministry activities for preschoolers, children, youth, adults and students. Training opportunities are provided for general leaders of these age groups.
 - f. The *Media/Library Council* assists churches in the establishment, development and improvement of church media library services. In addition., the council is responsible for organizing and operating the associational Media Library in the Baptist Center.
 - g. The *Missions Development Council* leads the churches to discover opportunities for associational, state, home and foreign missions and to assist the churches in doing mission projects individually and

- corporately. The council works closely with the Brotherhood, Sunday School and W.M.U. Councils.
- h. The *Music Ministry Council* assists churches through establishing, conducting, enlarging and improving their music ministries.
 - i. The *Pastoral Ministries Council* assists the churches in the development of pastoral ministries, deacon ministry, vocational guidance and church administrative services. In addition, the council ministers to the distinctive needs of pastors, deacons, church staff persons, church councils, church officers and committee members and church vocation volunteers. This council is responsible for interviewing candidates for ordination to the "Gospel Ministry" as requested by the churches.
 - j. The *Prayer Council* is responsible for promoting prayer in the churches, providing opportunities for prayer among the churches, and offering conferences and seminars on prayer.
 - k. The *Recreation Council* assists churches in providing recreation methods, materials, services, and experiences and is available to other associational organizations wishing to use recreation in accomplishing their particular tasks.
 - l. The *Seminary Extension Council* promotes and provides practical and theological education to ministers and laypersons on basic and college levels.
 - m. The *Stewardship Council* assists the churches in the development of individual and corporate stewardship.
 - n. The *Sunday School Council* assists and challenges churches to improve and enlarge all areas of their Sunday School through planning, training, administration activities, consultation, program interpretation, and cooperative projects.
 - o. The *Woman's Missionary Union Council* assists churches in promoting missions and in establishing, enlarging, and strengthening W. M. U. work.

E. FELLOWSHIP GROUPS

1. The purpose of the Fellowship Groups is to provide a setting for particular groups to meet together for fellowship, dialogue, encouragement and mutual care. Hopefully, as the individual groups meet together the fellowship of the whole association can be strengthened. Each group determines its own leadership in cooperation with the Associational Nominating Committee, and plans its own activities in cooperation with the Associational Fellowship Council. The leader of each fellowship group is a member of the Fellowship Council.
2. Groups:
 - a. The *Church Secretaries' Fellowship Group* includes all Caldwell Baptist church and denominational secretaries.
 - b. The *Ministers' Conference Fellowship Group* includes all pastors, bi-vocational pastors, church staff ministers, other ministers and retired minister in the association.

- c. The *Ministers Wives' Fellowship Group* includes all the wives of active, deceased, or retired ministers in the association.
- d. The *Music Leaders' Fellowship Group* includes all paid and volunteer ministers of music, director of music, organists, pianists, and other music leadership in the churches and the association. This group cooperates with the Music Ministry Council of the association.
- e. The *Retired Ministers' Fellowship Group* includes all retired Southern Baptist ministers and their spouses living in the associational area.
- f. The *Youth Leaders' Fellowship Group* consists of all paid and volunteer ministers of youth, youth directors and other youth leaders in the churches of the association. The Associational Youth Director of the Family Ministry Council serves as a member of this group.

Section 2. Every committee, council or fellowship group has the authority to appoint temporary sub-groups to carry out specific assignments as needed. The sub-group ceases to exist at the completion of the assignment. Permanent, but not temporary, sub-groups must be suggested to and approved by the Nominating Committee and then by the messengers of the association.

Section 3. Every associational committee and council is to choose a secretary to record the proceedings of each meeting.

Section 4. Associational leaders and representatives are responsible for presenting written and/or verbal reports to the association as requested.

Section 5. An up-to-date "Organizational Chart" is to be maintained to visibly reveal the overall associational operation.

Section 6. An "Operations Manual" is to be maintained by the Associational Staff in the Baptist Center, containing such items as: paid and volunteer job descriptions, administrative policies, the Articles of Incorporation and the Constitution and Bylaws. The appropriate groups within the associational organization are to assist the staff in keeping the manual up-to-date.

Section 7. Each ex-officio member serving on a council, committee or group is entitled to full voting rights.

Section 8. The General Board members of the Baptist State Convention from the Caldwell Association are to represent the association to the State Convention and vice-versa. The Board members are encouraged to report to the association about Board actions.

Article VII: Printed Material

Section 1. A monthly newsletter known as the "Caldwell Baptist Caller" is published to communicate information about the work of and matters of interest to the association.

Section 2. The Annual Minutes are prepared to serve as a record of information about the association.

Section 3. An "Associational Directory" is prepared annually and updated quarterly to provide information on who are associational leaders, church leaders, and other persons of interest to the association and how to contact them.

Section 4. A "Calendar of Activities" is prepared annually to inform the churches of upcoming events in or related to the association.

Section 5. Reports to the association and promotional pieces about the work of the association are printed as needed.

Section 6. Each member church is expected to prepare and deliver to the associational clerk the annual "Uniform Church Letter" by October 7 each year.

Article VIII: Amendments

These Bylaws may be amended by a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present at any quarterly meeting of the association provided that the amendment was presented in written or typed form to the clerk and publicly stated to the messengers by the moderator or his designee at the preceding quarterly meeting of the association. Typed copies of the amendment are to be furnished to the current messengers of the association for study at least two weeks prior to a vote on the amendment.

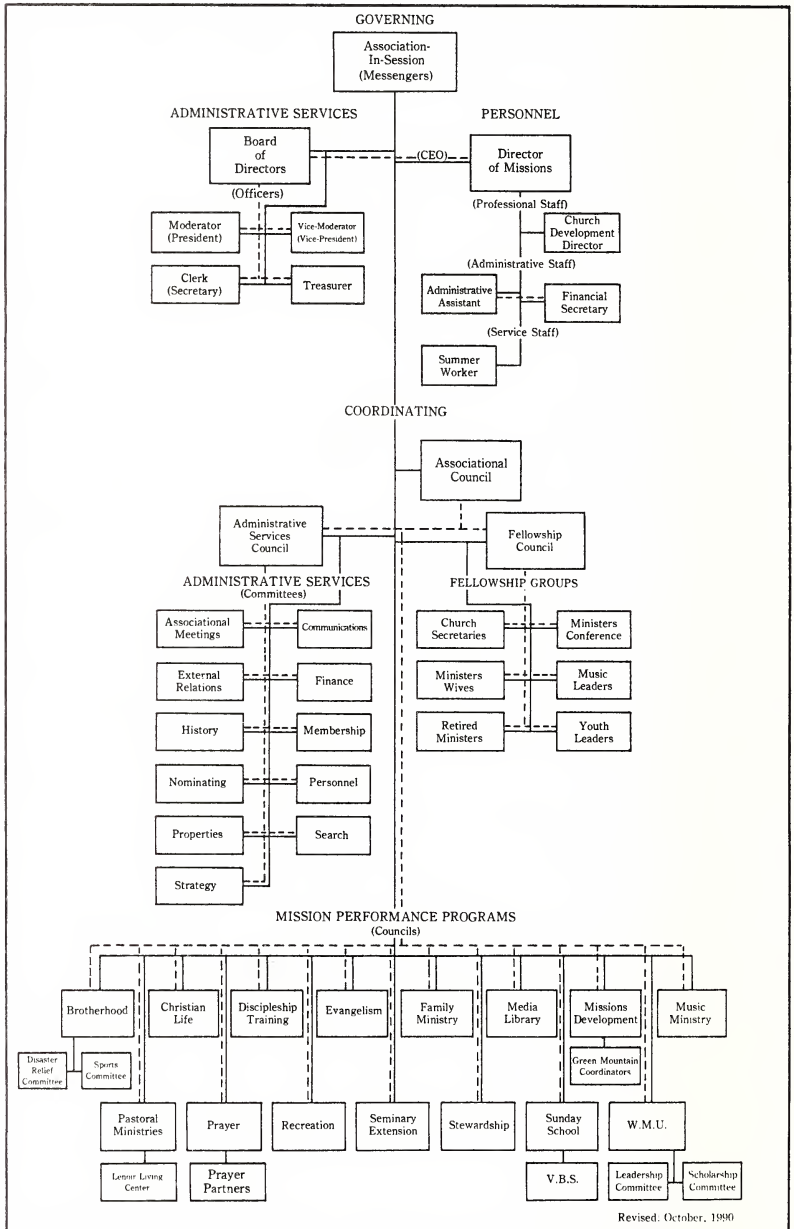

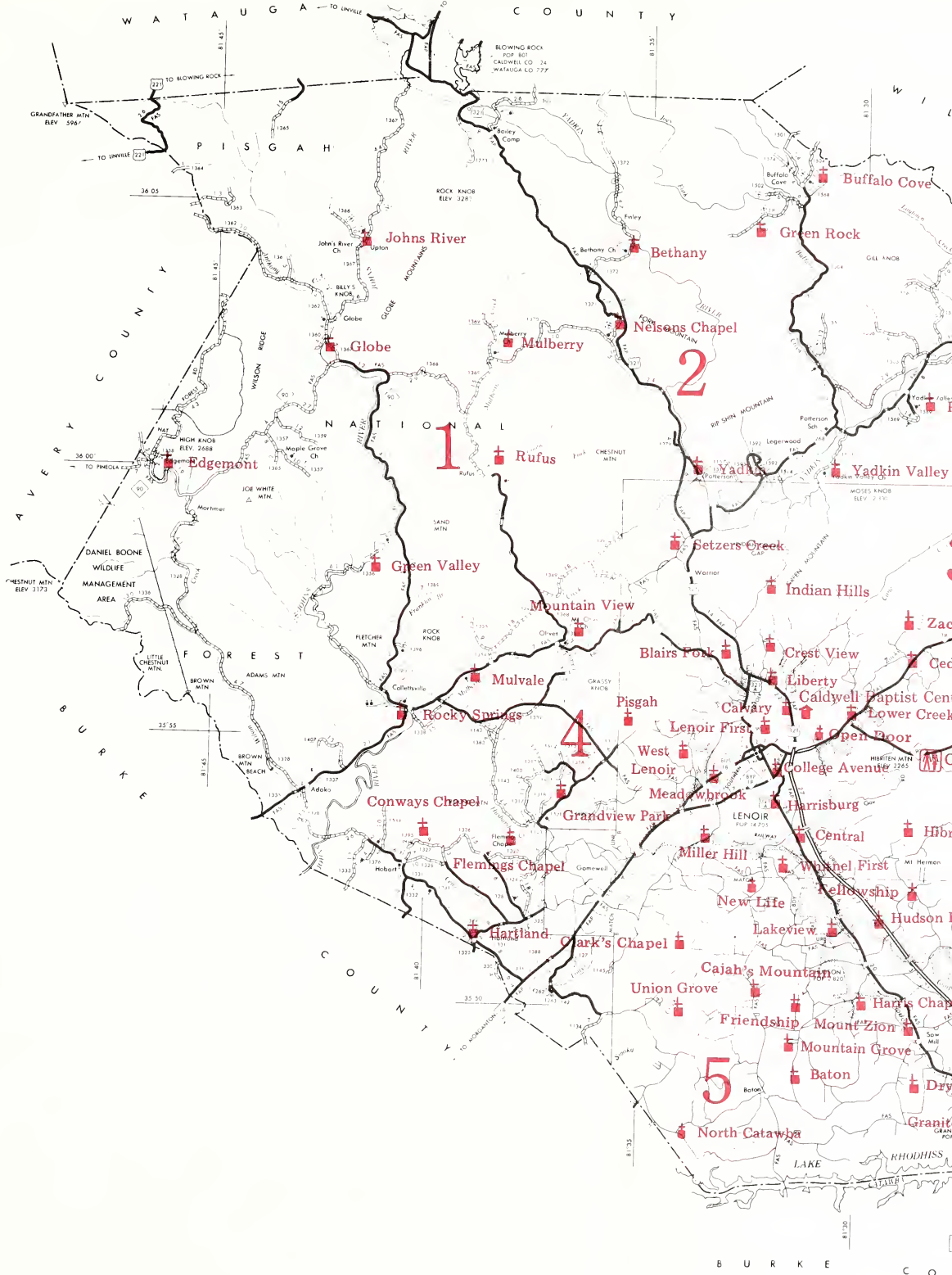

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ANNUAL REPORTS

ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES COUNCIL REPORT

The council was represented this year on the Associational Council by the director. Plans were submitted for a council orientation meeting on March 22, 1993 and an Associational Committees Training Workshop on April 20, 1993.

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY REPORT

In 1991, the American Bible Society celebrated 175 years of outreach to people around the world, sharing the Word of God in the languages and formats they could most easily understand. And this anniversary year also turned out to be one of momentous opportunity, challenge and achievement. The war in the Persian Gulf at the beginning of the year offered an unprecedented opportunity to reach men and women in the Armed Forces while they were serving the cause of peace in the Middle East. More than 300,000 Bibles with special camouflage covers and over 100,000 New Testaments were shared with those involved in Desert Storm.

The American Bible Society continued with its outreach to individuals, churches, correctional institutions, schools, hospitals and nursing homes, community organizations and other Christian ministry agencies. In addition, special Portion and Selection formats were created for those with special needs, such as troubled youth, alcoholics and drug abusers, the homeless and those suffering from AIDS, etc.

No area of American life was left untouched in the American Bible Society's attempt to reach every man, woman and child in the United States with at least some portion of God's Word in 1991. Much of the successful sharing of almost 100 million Scriptures throughout the United States in 1991 can be attributed to an active and dedicated corps of 7,000 Volunteers who operate Scripture Courtesy Centers, which make God's Word easily available even in the most remote areas of the country.

The Word of God speaks to people of every culture, in every place and every age. During 1991 thirty-two languages were added to the number of those in which at least one complete book of the Bible has been translated and published by various agencies, copies of which have been received and registered by the United Bible Societies. This brings the total number of different languages and dialects in which God's Word has been printed to 1,978.

Complete Bibles were reported for the first time in four additional languages and New Testaments in thirty-six. Additional Portions were registered during 1991 in thirty-six languages which do not yet have either an Old Testament or a New Testament and in fifteen languages which have the New Testament but not the Old Testament. New or revised versions of Portions, Testaments, or Bibles have now appeared in forty-five other languages in which translation and publication had previously taken place.

The year 1991 was bright with accomplishments, both in the United States and around the world. The American Bible Society wishes to express deep gratitude to all who help to make it possible for them to share the Word of God with all.

ANNUITY BOARD REPORT

A growing number of churches and ministers are catching a vision for insurance protection and preparation for retirement. Unfortunately, far too many pastors, other ministers and church and associational personnel do not have adequate financial protection. The Annuity Board's primary focus for 1992 and 1993 is on enrolling as many people and churches as possible in the Church Life and Health Program and the Church Annuity Plan. New medical plans will be offered on January 1, 1993, as options to help address the affordability issue.

The Church Annuity Plan is far more than a retirement plan. It is a means to provide family protection today as well as financial security tomorrow.

As of May 1992, 34,571 persons were participating in the Church Annuity Plan. This is the highest number of members in the history of the Plan. The number of churches involved was 19,930.

Eligible participants in the Church Annuity Plan benefit in five significant ways.

1. The Plan includes a Protection Section that covers disability and death. In 1991, 252 families received disability checks from the Plan, and 60 families received well over \$1,000,000 in survivor benefits. Additionally, they received the full value of the deceased retirement accounts. All of these protection benefits are free to the members. They are funded by state convention Cooperative Program dollars.
2. The Plan includes a choice of plan funds offering valuable, advantageous investment opportunities for retirement. In 1991, the Variable Fund credited 28.3% earnings and the Balanced Fund credited 22.4%.
3. The Plan offers significant opportunities for avoiding unnecessary income tax. Ordained ministers do not pay self-employment tax for Social Security on contributions to the Church Annuity Plan. These advantages exceed those offered by IRAs.
4. The Plan includes matching state convention Cooperative Program dollars for eligible members' retirement income accounts. This can amount to \$210 per year resulting in higher benefits at retirement.
5. A fifth value is the Annuity Board's strength and stability. On July 1, 1992, a five percent increase was applied to Plan A and defined contribution funded annuities. This brings Plan A increases to 222% of what was called for by the original plan formula benefit.

Based on the needs of our people and in light of these special advantages, your association is encouraged to lead every church to participate in the Church Annuity Plan.

The Annuity Board is celebrating 75 years of keeping the confidence of the people we serve. Our ministry continues to be "Serving Those Who Serve the Lord."

ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL REPORT

The Associational Council had regular meetings this year to coordinate the overall program and calendar for the association. In addition, considerable time and energy was spent in the preparation of the 1992-93 Associational Calendar of Activities.

The Associational Bylaws state that "the association is to continually have a personalized logo that visually displays the identity and current work of this body." The logo that was used became out-of-date when the associational objectives were modified. On January 23, 1992, the messengers approved a new logo as presented by the Associational Council. It will be used along with the logo of the Southern Baptist Convention.



On March 16, 1993, the Associational Council has planned to meet with all interested Church Councils to discuss the needs of the churches and how the association can help. This plan is based on the associational purpose statement. The information received will be used to plan the 1993-94 Associational Calendar of Activities which will be presented to the messengers on July 22, 1993 during their Summer Quarterly Meeting.

An Associational Leadership Appreciation Banquet was sponsored by the council on September 21, 1992. This annual event is a means of expressing gratitude to the leaders for the work they have done through the year.

BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES OF NORTH CAROLINA INC. REPORT

Like a marathon runner, Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina (BCH) "hit the wall" in 1991-92, but persevered to finish standing up!

In an exhausting year for staff and a myriad of volunteers, BCH successfully concluded its first statewide fund-raising campaign, received its first Thanksgiving Offering since 1979, dedicated expansion of Cameron Boys Camp, broke ground for the new Fleshman-Pratt Education Center in Thomasville, inaugurated an innovative Bible study program at Mills Home, installed two new pastors at campus churches and solidified programs that have placed it among child care leaders for decades.

In April, BCH successfully concluded its "Give a child a change!" financial campaign by gaining three-year commitments for \$11.2 million, topping the \$7.5 million goal, and the challenge goal of \$11 million. Significant priorities accomplished in the campaign are: expansion and relocation of Cameron Boys Camp to a more secluded site on its 903-acres of wilderness; ground-breaking for the Fleshman-Pratt Education Center, a model day care facility for infants, toddlers and two-year-olds; a unique Staff Training Institute for child care workers and social workers; and more than \$2.7 million committed for permanent endowment.

And, the first Thanksgiving Offering for BCH since 1979 raised \$510,000, a sum more than \$100,000 greater than that realized through the combined offering with Baptist Hospital and Baptist Retirement Homes, BCH sent \$1,000 from the Thanksgiving Offering to the Baptist Children's Homes of Sao Paulo, Brazil as fulfillment of a promise to donate 10 percent of everything received over the goal to our partners in the south. In addition, BCH maintained the partnership with our Brazilian counterparts by sending three training teams to Brazil, and hosting a group of Brazilian pastors in Thomasville.

Most BCH residents come from dysfunctional families where a single parent, most often a mother, is unable to care for her children. Her frustration with life, often

due to alcohol or drug abuse, or having been abused herself, leads to troubling behavior. Physical abuse, divorce, alcohol, drugs and truancy mark their young lives. Behavioral problems make it impossible for the child to continue to live at home.

Baptist Children's Homes provides a safe environment where children learn to name their problems and set goals to overcome them, which leads to behavior change and often at the same time, willing family members also are addressing their problems with the help of BCH social workers. In many cases, children and families are restored.

BCH enjoyed a year of tremendous successes, in human terms and in institutional terms, which will allow it to continue to affect change in lives. Success in the "Give a child a chance!" Campaign will help provide a margin of excellence in the future when the pledges are paid. Already, the enthusiasm engendered by the effort have lifted the spirits of staff across the state.

Still, the Cooperative Program continues to anchor our budget planning. We urge renewed commitment to cooperative giving among our churches. It is essential, not only for us, but for the entire missions enterprise built painstakingly for a century and a half. Baptist Children's Homes receives \$1.5 million from Cooperative Program receipts each year. This is the stockpile around which we build our other income planning. A decrease in Cooperative Program dollars to Baptist Children's Homes would seriously jeopardize our ability to care for children.

An increasingly important aspect of our support comes from estate gifts and bequests. More and more people who want their resources to provide new life for children include BCH in their wills.

BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF NORTH CAROLINA REPORT

The North Carolina Baptist Foundation, as an agency of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, is committed under the guidance of the Holy Spirit in serving North Carolina Baptists and others in generating an increased awareness of Christian estate stewardship principals as a means of financially undergirding churches, institutions and mission endeavors on a permanent basis.

Assets are managed under the direction of the Foundation Board of Directors with interest income being paid either in perpetuity to Baptist causes named by the donor or to the donor (or heirs) for their lifetime (or specific period of time) before the income is then paid in perpetuity to the named Baptist causes.

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During 1991, the Board of Directors, with the assistance of a nationally recognized investment consulting firm, adopted a detailed Investment Policy to govern the types of investments that its fiscal agents may make in keeping with the Christian commitment of the Foundation, as well as attempt to insure that the future spending value of the invested trust fund dollar will keep up with inflation. A study revealed that during the past five years the fiscal agents managing the Foundation assets ranked near the top nationally with other investment managers who operate under investment guidelines similar to the ones provided by the Foundation Board.

The Foundation staff and operations are housed in a building adjacent to the Baptist State Convention Building in Cary. Individuals and church groups are invited to call and arrange a visit of their Trust Agency's office building.

The significance of the Foundation services was illustrated in a recent experience that staff members had while eating in a fast food restaurant in Durham. In taking a seat adjacent to a table occupied by a young black police officer, we observed the enthusiasm of a white lad of about 4 years of age as he stood talking to the officer. As the mother and a younger child, coming from another area of the restaurant, called for the lad to join them, he walked away from the table 6 to 8 feet, turned around and said to the officer, who was now standing and preparing to leave, "Can I give you a hug?" After an affirmative answer from the officer, the child walked over to the officer, reached around his legs and gave him a hug. The officer confirmed to us that he wished the world was filled with people like this child. The example corresponds to what so many already have done through the Foundation. As they approach the time of leaving this earthly life, they look back affectionately on what the Lord has done for them during their life and decide that they want to leave an expression of their love through an enduring and lasting gift (a "hug", if you please) that will serve the Lord until His return.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL OF NORTH CAROLINA REPORT

Baptist Hospital utilizes the skills and training of more than 5,700 employees to provide outstanding health care in settings as varied as the Brenner Children's Hospital, the Trauma Center, and the J. Paul Stitch Center on Aging and Rehabilitation. Last year, the Joint Committee on the Accreditation of Health Care Organizations said that Baptist Hospital ranks in the top 10 percent of all hospitals in the nation.

During the past year, the hospital admitted 24,000 patients. It performed 16,662 surgical procedures, including 1,020 open heart operations, 29 kidney transplants and 80 bone marrow transplants. The AirCare helicopter flew 742 missions.

Total revenue of the hospital during the year was \$407,280,000. Cooperative Program gifts from the churches were \$656,180, which was applied to the budget of the Department of Pastoral Care. The Mother's Day Offering and other special gifts from the churches totaled \$424,406 and was used for benevolent care for patients who had no other means of paying their hospital bills.

The Pastoral Care Department, which is funded in part through the Cooperative Program, provided clinical pastoral education to 55 students during the past year. The Pastoral Care staff provided more than 53,000 specific ministries to hospital patients, family members, and staff. And, the counseling division provided over 24,000 counseling sessions. The professional staff of the Pastoral Care Department continues to respond to requests for help from churches in conflict, from pastors and their families across the state.

The various services of the hospital are readily accessible to all North Carolina Baptists and others. A telephone call to the Health-On-Call Office (919-716-2255) can secure an outpatient appointment with any one of the various specialists on the staff or can begin the process of gaining admission to the hospital if that need is indicated.

Charges for the hospital services compare very favorably with those in other hospitals of the state. Reports from the North Carolina Medical Database Commission indicate that Baptist Hospital's charges are lower than the average in other hospitals which provide similar services and are considerably lower than in the other teaching hospitals. Our hospital did not have an increase in its rates for the current fiscal year of July 1, 1992 - June 30, 1993.

The hospital's physical plant continues to expand. A new 840-space parking deck was opened in January. A new Emergency Department/Dietary building which will also make possible more private patient rooms is under construction now. Construction will begin soon on the 170-bed skilled and intermediate care nursing facility and on the J. Paul Stich Center on Aging and Rehabilitation. This expansion will make it possible not only to serve more people, but to serve them better.

The staff and the patients of Baptist Hospital are grateful to North Carolina Baptists for the heritage they have given the institution and for the moral and financial support they continue to give to its ministry.

BAPTIST RETIREMENT HOMES OF NORTH CAROLINA REPORT

One of the greatest needs facing North Carolina Baptists as they move into 1993 is the ability to provide affordable quality long-term care services to the "Aged Saints" of our Convention.

The fastest growing segment of North Carolina Baptist life are those individuals in the age category of 85 and older. That age group is growing at five times the rate of any other population segment in Baptist life. The 85 and older age group is also that age group most likely to need the services provided by a long-term care institution like Baptist Retirement Homes. Unfortunately in 1992 in our State, there were not enough nursing care beds to meet the needs of the growing number of Older Adults who were functionally impaired and needed the services of a long-term care provider. Complicating the shortage problem was the fact that the cost of those beds was high (more than the average North Carolina Baptist Older Adult could pay). And to make matters even worse, in spite of the high cost of those beds, often the quality of care provided through those beds was fair at best. In other words, the greatest problem facing North Carolina Baptist Older Adults in 1992 was the fact that there were

simply not enough affordable quality nursing care beds available for use by people like you and me and our Older Adult family members.

Having become aware some years ago of the above mentioned problem, Baptist Retirement Homes (for the last five year period) has been working to develop a system of affordable quality nursing care beds throughout the State for use by North Carolina Baptist Older Adults. New nursing care beds became available in the Piedmont area of our State in 1989 (through the opening of the Brookridge Retirement Community). In 1992, affordable quality nursing care will become available to Western North Carolina Baptist Older Adults through the new Rickman Nursing Care Center being built on Richmond Hill in Northwest Asheville. It is our institution's hope that by 1994 affordable quality nursing care will also be available to Eastern North Carolina Baptist Older Adults as well. Your support has made the above possible.

In 1992, North Carolina Baptists through their gifts to the Cooperative Program and North Carolina Offering for Older Adults made it possible for Baptist Retirement Homes to provide financial assistance to more than 60% of all the Older Adults living in its health care related facilities. In addition, Western North Carolina Baptists contributed more than \$2.5 million toward the construction of the new Rickman Nursing Care Center in Asheville. . . a new facility that will enable Baptist Retirement Homes to make life for many Western North Carolina Baptists truly. . . the Best of Times.

Thank you North Carolina Baptists for your support. Please continue to pray for our ministry and its ability to meet the ever growing needs of the Older Adults of our Convention.

BAPTIST WORLD ALLIANCE REPORT

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

The following amendments were presented to the messengers as information during the Spring Quarterly Meeting in April 1992. The amendments have gone through the proper procedure for presentation, discussion and vote during the Summer Quarterly Meeting.

CONSTITUTION

Article IV: Purpose Statement

"We associate ourselves to assist member churches in fulfilling the Great Commission of Christ through fellowship, education and mission involvement."

BYLAWS

B. PERSONNEL

1. Positions:

(Replace current wording with the following)

- b. The Associate Director of Missions serves the association by working under the supervision of the Director of Missions in general leadership, mission strategy, ministry to churches and church leaders and as a representative to the denomination and community.

Election to this office is upon recommendation of the Personnel Committee and by two-thirds majority vote of approval by the messengers at any quarterly meeting of the association. The time of service is indefinite and can be terminated by written notice to the Personnel Committee by the Associate Director of Missions or by two-thirds majority vote of the messengers at any quarterly meeting of the association upon recommendation of the Personnel Committee.

2. General:

- c. The Personnel Committee or any other committee cannot recommend the Director of Missions, the **Associate Director of Missions**, the Administrative Assistant. . . (same)

- c. The Associational Council made the following recommendations:
 1. That the 1992-93 Calendar of Activities for the Caldwell Baptist Association, Incorporated be approved by the messengers as presented.
 2. That permission be given to the Associational Council and the associational staff to make necessary changes to the calendar as needed.
 - d. The Finance Committee brought before the messengers for their approval the 1992-93 Associational Ministry Budget. A copy of that Budget will be recorded in the 1992 Annual Minutes.
9. The Strategy Committee presented the following amendments as information to the messengers during their Summer Quarterly Meeting. These amendments will be formally presented for discussion and vote during the Fall (Annual) Meeting.

CONSTITUTION

Article V: Membership

The association is composed of cooperating Southern Baptist Churches, which have been approved for membership by the associational messengers in accordance with the procedures described in the Bylaws.

Article X: Amendments

(Change "two-thirds" to "three-fourths majority".)

BYLAWS

Article I: Administrative Policies

Section 2. Money is to be contributed to the Gideons by the association for the purchase of memorial Bibles upon the death of a pastor, staff minister, associational leader, or a close family member of a pastor, staff minister or associational leader.

Article III: Finances

Section 4. The association maintains an ongoing "Ministers Support Fund" to temporarily assist associational pastors, church staff, retired ministers, other ministers and their immediate families during times of financial crises. The Finance Committee confidentially administers the fund, giving an annual report as to the number of persons assisted and the amount of money given. ~~The money for this fund comes from the portion of the State Missions Offering that the association receives.~~

Article V: Meetings

Section 8. All proposed resolutions or public statements to be considered by the associational messengers are to be received by the Communications Committee at least two weeks prior to the scheduled meeting of the messengers. The messengers are to consider only those proposed resolutions and public statements that have been reviewed by the Communications Committee. The committee is responsible for presenting a positive or negative recommendation to the messengers on each proposed

resolution or public statement received. The proposal may be amended or substituted by the committee as a part of their recommendation. Copies of all proposed resolutions and public statements, with the name of the initiators, are to be made available to the messengers at or before the beginning of their meeting.

(New) Article VI: Membership Procedures

Section 1. ADMISSION: When seeking admission into the association, a church must present to the Membership Committee a ~~typed~~ letter of request for admission. The letter should contain the name of the church, the reason for seeking admission into the association, and the date when the church voted to take such action.

- A. After receiving a request for admission into the association the Membership Committee is to meet with leaders of the church to discuss their desire for membership, to explain the associational requirements for admission, to consider any of their church approved documents and location of their meetings, and to deal with any other matters that would help the committee make a decision about their request.
- B. At the next Quarterly Meeting of the Messengers, the Membership Committee is to share the request with the association and to make one of the following recommendations:
 1. That the church requesting admission be accepted under the watchcare of the association;
 2. That action on the request be delayed for further consideration at the next quarterly meeting of the association; or
 3. That the request for membership be denied.

The committee is to give clear reason for its recommendation concerning the status of watchcare. As soon as possible following the associational meeting, the committee is to communicate the action of the association with the church first in spoken words, and then by ~~typed~~ letter.

- C. Any church that is accepted under the watchcare of the association must remain in that status for at least one full year before being admitted into the membership of the association.
 1. Watchcare is a time of bonding between the association and the church seeking admission. The association is to carefully observe the faith, practice and cooperation of the church. The church under watchcare is to receive the same opportunities extended to member churches; however, members of churches under watchcare may not vote nor hold a position of leadership in the association.
 2. During the watchcare period, the church is expected to have an active part in the support of the work of the association, the North Carolina Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention.
 3. The Membership Committee is to meet, as needed, with leaders of the

church, during the watchcare period to discuss their relationship with the association. Representatives of the committee are to visit during meetings of the church to observe the organization and practices of the church.

- D. Near the close of the watchcare period the committee is to evaluate the condition and cooperation of the church and to decide on one of the following recommendations to make to the association at the appropriate time concerning membership:
1. That the church requesting admission be accepted into full fellowship of the association;
 2. That action on the admission be delayed until the next quarterly meeting of the association; or
 3. That admission into the association be denied.

The committee is to give clear reason for its recommendation concerning membership. As soon as possible following the associational meeting, the committee is to communicate with the church the action of the association first in spoken words, and then by typed letter.

- E. A two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present is needed for the church to be accepted under watchcare or into full membership of the association.
- F. If a church is denied the status of watchcare or membership by the association, then after the lapse of one year it may submit another letter to the Membership Committee requesting admission.

Section 2. COOPERATION: A cooperating church is defined as one who sends an annual church letter to the associational clerk, is represented by duly elected messengers at quarterly associational meetings, contributes financially to the association, and is in general agreement with the purpose, basic beliefs, programs and ministries of the association.

Section 3. CONFLICT: If a member church is in conflict and requests help from the association, then the Membership Committee and/or the Director of Missions may meet with the church to counsel and work with them in an attempt to help resolve the problem(s).

Section 4. DISMISSAL: Any member church which fails to cooperate with the association is to be contacted by the Membership Committee at their discretion or upon direction of the messengers to ascertain the wishes and desires of the church relative to its continuance in the association. After counsel with the church, the committee may choose to make a recommendation that the church be removed from the membership of the association. Such a recommendation would have to be made at a quarterly meeting of the association, and a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present would be needed for dismissal of the church from the association.

The committee is to give clear reason for its recommendation concerning action toward the member church. As soon as possible following the associational meeting, the committee is to send a letter to the church to communicate the action taken by the association.

Section 5. WITHDRAWALS: The association recognizes that any affiliated church has the right to withdraw its fellowship from the association. It is requested that the report of such action by a church be sent to the Membership Committee in an official letter from the church.

Upon receipt of the letter, the Membership Committee is to discuss the action with leaders of the church. At the next quarterly meeting of the association, the

committee is to inform the messengers of the church action. The association is to take one of the following actions.

- A. Accept the action of the church and immediately remove the church. The church is to be notified of the action by a letter from the association.
- B. Delay acceptance of the church action until the next quarterly meeting and instruct the Membership Committee to ask the church to reconsider its action.

Section 6. NOTIFICATION: The association is to immediately inform the North Carolina Baptist State Convention when a church is accepted under watchcare or membership. In addition, the convention is to be informed if a church is dismissed from the association as a member.

Article VII: Organization and Leadership

Section 1. The association is organized into six levels of operation: Governing, Personnel, Coordinating, Administrative Services, Mission Performance Programs and Fellowship Groups.

A. GOVERNING

1. The ASSOCIATION-IN-SESSION consists of the duly elected messengers by member churches ~~and seated by vote of the messengers~~ in attendance at each quarterly or called meeting of the association.
2. Churches of fifty (50) members or less are entitled to five (5) messengers. One (1) additional messenger is allowed for each additional fifty (50) church members or major fraction thereof provided no church has more than ten (10) messengers.
3. In addition to the total number of messengers to which each church is entitled, each pastor and each of the five associational officers are considered messengers by virtue of their positions provided that the person is a member of the church being represented.
4. Churches are to elect. . .
5. The functions of the messengers. . .
6. A person serving as a messenger. . .

E. FELLOWSHIP GROUPS

2. Groups:

- a. The Bivocational Ministers Fellowship Group is for all ordained pastors and other ministers who have a secular vocation in addition to their church vocation.

Article VIII: Printed Material

Section 1. A periodical newsletter known as the "Caldwell Baptist Caller" is published to communicate information about the work of and matters of interest to the association.

10. Barry Mock led the congregation as they sang "When the Roll Is Called Up Yonder".
11. During the time of miscellaneous business the position the association will take on the proposed vote on liquor-by-the-drink which is scheduled for September 8, 1992 was discussed. Rev. Bob Lowman, Director of the Christian Life Council, presented a flier opposing the issue which is available for all churches to use. The flier urges each person to Pray, Register to Vote, Give and Vote Against the Issue. The association will also place an ad in area newspapers stating our position on the issue.
12. Dr. Christopher White, President of Gardner-Webb College, spoke to us concerning Christian Higher Education. He brought greetings from the college and thanks for our Cooperative Program support, the students we send them and for the prayers we offer on their behalf.
13. Bob Lowman, Director of the Christian Life Council, promoted the upcoming "Parade for the Hungry". He urged the churches to become involved and to register their people to be walkers for the hungry.
14. Home Missions Projects and Promotion Director, Marlene Alexander, gave an exciting report about the 1992 Home Mission Trip to Branson, Missouri. 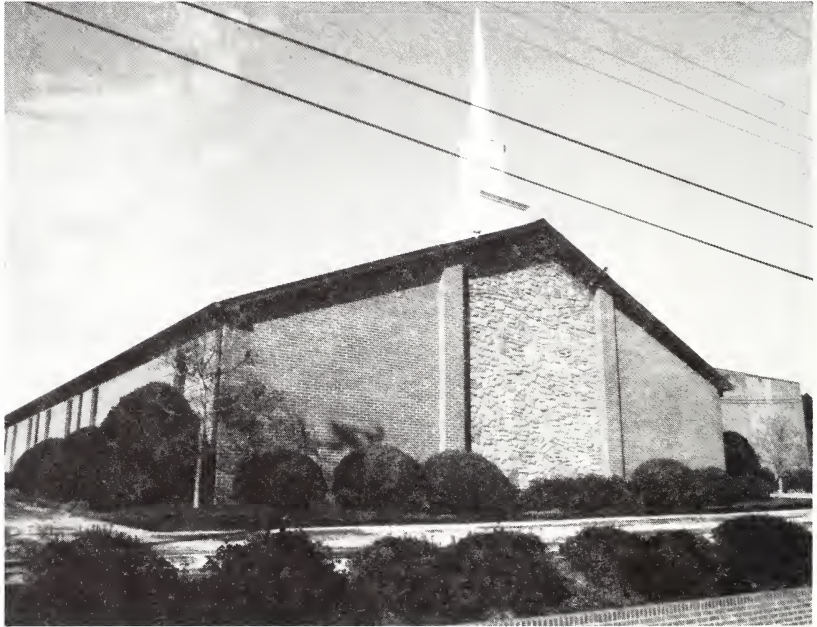

PROCEEDINGS

1. The 108th Annual Meeting of the Caldwell Baptist Association, Inc. opened with the singing of *Victory In Jesus* led by John Riley, Minister of Music for the Friendship Baptist Church.
2. Ken Mashburn, Pastor of the Setzer Creek Baptist Church, read scripture and led in prayer.
3. Bill Dyson, Pastor of the host church, extended the welcome to visitors and messengers.
4. Joel Sellers, Moderator, called the meeting to order and asked for the adoption of the program with the following changes: (1) Karen Ford to give the local missions report for Terry Barnes, (2) Karla Lowman would replace Terry Crouse as Music Director on Friday and (3) Dale Fisher would present the Strategy Committees recommendation on Friday instead of Fred King. The program was approved with the changes.
5. Moderator Sellers instructed the messengers to study the proposed recommendations which would be presented on Friday and recognized special messengers and visitors.
6. New pastors and staff were recognized by Director of Missions, Dale Fisher. Those present were: Rev. and Mrs. Tom Small serving at the Buffalo Cove Baptist Church, Phil Duncan, Minister of Education and Music serving at the Mount Zion Baptist Church, Rev. and Mrs. John Jernigan from the Central Baptist Church and Rev. Stanley Townsend who is serving as Interim Pastor at the First Baptist Church of Rhodhiss.

7. John Riley led the congregation as they sang the hymn More About Jesus.
8. Rev. Fisher led the messengers in "A Time of Celebration." This was a time of reflection on the accomplishments of the association and a time to commemorate the 15th Work Anniversary of Ann Hatton, who serves as Administrative Assistant for the association. A plaque and a check for \$500.00 were presented to Ann in appreciation for her years of service.
9. The Song For All the World was performed by soloist, Leslie Ford.
10. Missions Development Program Director, Joann Propst, praised Caldwell Baptists who had served as mission volunteers in 1991-92. There were 622 Caldwell Baptists involved in some type of volunteers mission work this past year. Reports on various areas of mission work were given by the following volunteers:
 - a. Local mission report by Karen Ford. Karen served as one of the Green Mountain Park Resort Ministry coordinators. This year 215 people from 31 churches were involved in this ministry.
 - b. The state mission report was given by Zeno Hames. Zeno gave highlights of the work done by Caldwell volunteers at Camp Caswell.
 - c. Home Mission Projects and Promotion Director, Marlene Alexander gave highlights of the home mission trip to Branson, Missouri. There were 119 Caldwell Baptists on mission for our Lord in Branson this past summer. Next year's home mission trip will be to the state of New York on July 10-17, 1993.
 - d. Robert Livingston gave the final report of the Brazil Partnership. The Caldwell and Osasco Baptist Associations have been involved in a five year partnership. During that time twelve mission teams from our association have gone to Brazil to help with the work there.

Also, two different groups of volunteers went to Florida to serve with the North Carolina Baptist Men's Unit in feeding people who had been struck by Hurricane Andrew.
14. Elizabeth Campbell, former Director of Missions for the Caldwell Baptist Association reminded us that we should remember the many Caldwell Baptists who have served as career missionaries as well as those who have served as volunteers.

Have you ever wondered what happens during an associational year? Listed below is a monthly summary of some of the events in which this Director of Missions and other Caldwell Baptists were involved.

October 1991

Simultaneous prayer meetings were held on the first Sunday of October in each of the six associational districts. Good worship experiences were reported at Calvary, Fellowship, Mulvale, New Life, Oak Grove and Setzer Creek Baptist Churches.

A Ministers' Golf Tournament was conducted by the Ministers Conference on October 14. The ministers had a great time of fellowship at the Lenoir Golf Course.

One of the most exciting events in October was the Sunday School High Attendance Day on October 27. The associational goal was to have 10,000 people in Sunday School. A total of 10,208 persons were involved in Bible Study that day.

In addition to a large number of meetings and training events, the 107th Annual Meeting of the Caldwell Baptist Association was conducted. Two good sessions were carried out with the Kings Creek and Flemings Chapel Baptist Churches. Messengers seem to appreciate the absence of the Friday afternoon session and certainly enjoyed the meal served by the Disaster Relief Volunteers out of the Association's Disaster Relief Trailer.

November 1991

The month began with a Royal Ambassador Fun Car Race at the Yadkin Baptist Church on November 2. In addition, the RAs enjoyed seeing Magician Stan Cabell at the RA Conclave on November 4. Also, the 1991-92 Royal Ambassador and High School Baptist Young Men's Basketball Program began this month.

The WMU was active in November with a Baptist Women/Baptist Young Women's World Day of Prayer on November 4. A Mission Friends Leaders Meeting was held on November 16.

A first-ever Church Recreation Carousel was conducted by the Recreation Council on November 21. This event was well received as participants learned how to reach people with clowns, puppets, drama, fellowship/socials and wellness/fitness.

The Discipleship Training Council provided another well planned "M" Night on November 26. Also, the council conducted a Bible Drill Interpretation Meeting for workers on November 7.

Rev. Tom Lolley, Western Area Missionary for the Baptist State Convention, thrilled the hearts of those in attendance at the Ministers and Wives Quarterly Fellowship on November 18. The event was well planned and attended.

December 1991

December began with the Week of Prayer for Foreign Missions and the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering. The association provided several teachers for the foreign missions study.

Rev. Bill Pearson, Director of Missions for the Surry Baptist Association, led a very informative tax seminar for pastors, staff ministers, church treasurers and others at the Baptist Center on December 4. This was one of the many fine programs planned by the officers of the Ministers Conference.

December 7 was marked by two significant events. The Music Ministry Council offered a Handbell Clinic at the Lower Creek Baptist Church and then presented a Handbell Performance in the Lenoir Mall. At the same time the Communications and Disaster Relief Committees were involved in Christmas parades throughout the county.

A wonderful "Preschool and Parent Celebration" was conducted by the Family

Ministry Council on December 14. Also on December 14, men from the Dry Ponds Baptist Church cut and hauled 101 Christmas trees in two hours for the needy. This was a joint project of the Caldwell Baptist Association and the Salvation Army. On December 16, the association sponsored a "Habitat for Humanity" Awareness Meeting for Caldwell Baptists at the Crest View Baptist Church.

The Personnel Committee accepted the resignation of the Rev. Daniel F. Lipp on December 3 as the association's Church Development Director to be effective on December 31. He decided to return to local church ministry. He and his family moved back to Apex, North Carolina.

January 1992

The new year began with the Book of Isaiah. I had opportunity to teach this year's January Bible Study in four different churches.

Training was an important part of January with a Deacon Workshop offered by the Pastoral Ministries Council, an Equipping Center Showcase and LIFE Interpretation Meeting provided by the Discipleship Training Council, simultaneous Personal Evangelism Conferences for adults and youth sponsored by the Evangelism Council, and a Church Missions Development Meeting conducted by the Missions Development Council. These were very helpful events that provided good training for those who participated.

A very successful Winter Quarterly Meeting was held at the Harris Chapel Baptist Church. The 1991 Annual Minutes and the 1992 Associational Directory were distributed at the meeting.

I had a very productive meeting this month with a small number of the bivocational pastors in the association to discover ways in which needs they have can be met. As a result of this meeting a Bivocational Ministers Conference is being formed.

The Missions Development Council sponsored a Caldwell Work Week at Caswell in January. This has become an annual event for our association. It was a joy to work alongside the volunteers this year at the North Carolina Baptist Assembly.

February 1992

The Music Reading Clinic, VBS Early Bird Clinic, Baptist Women and Baptist Young Women's Prayer Retreat, and the Stewardship Conference provided great opportunities for instruction, fellowship, inspiration and information during February. Many thanks to the Music Ministry, Sunday School, Stewardship and WMU Councils for providing these events.

Seminary Extension got underway for the year in February with another course entitled "How to Understand the Bible." This class was taught by Rev. Terry Barnes.

The Ministers and Wives Quarterly Fellowship was held at the Center Grove Baptist Church on February 17. This time of fellowship takes place on the third Monday each February, May, August and November. It has been a very successful event over the years.

The Sunday School Breakthrough Growth Campaign was conducted at the end of the month. The participating churches benefitted greatly from this campaign. I have heard excellent reports from the churches.

During February and March, disaster relief volunteers were trained on how to use the Disaster Relief Trailer in a disaster setting. Also in February, the World Missions Conference Coordinating Committee received training on how to conduct the

World Missions Conference scheduled for our association, March 28-April 4, 1993. Strategy Planning went into full swing with an orientation meeting for the steering committee and task groups.

March 1992

On Saturday, March 7 at 3:00 p.m., a wedding was held at the Baptist Center. I was given the opportunity to unite in marriage J.W. (Pete) Myers to Vergie Bumgarner, both members of the Oak Grove Baptist Church. Since Pete is a retired director of missions, he and Vergie wanted to be married at the Baptist Center by their director of missions.

Work began in March with a sub-committee of the Child Advocacy Council of Caldwell County to coordinate the distribution of gifts and food during the Christmas season to needy families in the county. This has been a challenging task for years, mainly coordinated by the Department of Social Services. The association was invited to join the Department of Social Services, the Salvation Army, Yokefellow, South Caldwell Christian Ministries, the Lenoir Ministerial Association and the Caldwell County Sheriff's Department in designing a good plan to coordinate giving to needy families during this very special season.

The RA Car Competition, Youth Night, Baptist Men's Breakfast, Choral Workshop and Evangelism Rally helped to train and motivate people in March. The Brotherhood, Family Ministry, Evangelism and Music Ministry Councils worked hard in pulling these events together.

The 1992-93 RA/HSBYM Basketball Program came to a close in March with the Basketball Banquet. I appreciate the involvement of the participating churches in this athletic outreach program.

April 1992

This was a very special month as I began my seventh year as your Director of Missions and turned forty all during the first four days of the month. Words are inadequate to express my deep appreciation for the surprise parties, gifts and other special activities.

A regional worship planning conference was conducted on April 1 and a Single Adult Conference on April 4. The annual Associational Bible Drills were held on April 11. Church Secretaries were honored with a luncheon on April 22. Two VBS Clinics were held to prepare church leaders. The WMU experienced their annual meeting, an Acteens Activity and a GA Rally.

On April 23 during the Spring Quarterly Meeting I received a check from the churches for \$2,307.32. This very generous gift was used to pay for my trip to Brazil in August. Thank you very much!

May 1992

Dr. Larry McSwain, from Southern Seminary, led two "Conflict Resolution Seminars" on May 5, one for ministers in general and the other for bivocational ministers. Talmadge Williams, with the Baptist State Convention, conducted a "Church Ministry Budgeting Conference".

The Brotherhood Council and the Properties Committee sponsored a work day at the Caldwell Cottage on May 16. A Missions Friends Rally was held on May 9 and a BYW Banquet on May 18.

June 1992

The Associational Council and Finance Committee completed work on the 1992-93 Calendar of Activities and the 1992-93 Budget. A very successful GA Overnight Camp was held at the Blowing Rock Assembly Grounds.

My family and I attended the annual meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention in Indianapolis. Afterwards, we enjoyed several days of vacation in that part of the country.

July 1992

The largest mission project ever sponsored by the association was conducted July 11-18. A total of 119 Caldwell Baptists went to Branson, Missouri to do Vacation Bible Schools, Backyard Bible Clubs, musicals and construction work. Nearly a year of planning with several months of orientation meetings preceded this trip.

The Hartland Baptist Church hosted the Summer Quarterly Meeting which featured a "Fantastic Family Fellowship" after the program. The ice cream and fellowship were tremendous.

A very successful Interfaith Witness Conference and a church Clerk's Training Event were conducted. In addition, a good Children's Choir Camp was held with a Children's Choir Concert as the climax.

On a lighter note, the Fishers added a dog to our family. His name is "Major".

August 1992

Barbara Joiner, a well known writer and speaker, spoke in three different settings on August 1. The RA Camporama was held at the Lake Myers Campground near Mocksville on August 8.

Two Sunday School Training Schools were offered and were well received. A great Men and Boys Field Day was sponsored by the Brotherhood Council on September 12.

Two teams went from the association to South Florida to help with disaster relief efforts following Hurricane Andrew. The churches contributed \$23,146.55 for hurricane relief in Florida (80%) and Louisiana (20%).

The Disaster Relief Trailer was called into action by the American Red Cross to feed emergency personnel in North Carolina's largest mock disaster. Caldwell Baptists fed breakfast and lunch for those who were fighting the make believe fire in the Blowing Rock area.

A "Parade for the Hungry" was sponsored by the Christian Life Council. Sixty-two walkers raised \$2,041.55 for hunger relief.

The final Brazil Mission Team from the association went to Sao Paulo, September 3-16. It was a construction team that worked on the first building of a proposed Baptist Camp for the Osasco Baptist Association.

FOREIGN MISSION BOARD REPORT

Mildred Roberts

First Baptist Church of Whitnel

In spite of a world that drastically changed in 1991, some things consistently remain the same. God's plan of salvation hasn't changed. The needs of the lost world haven't changed. And the Lord's mandate for Baptists to be a missions people has not changed. How did Southern Baptists respond to God's calling in 1991?

- **BAPTISMS** (233,334) by churches related to Southern Baptist foreign missions climbed to a record total in 1991. It was the third year since 1987 that worldwide baptisms set a new record.
- **NEW CHURCHES** (1,576) for the year represented a 6.5 percent increase over 1990. Our mandate is to reach people for Christ and, in turn, to start new churches around the globe.
- **TOTAL CHURCHES** (27,932) advanced by 15.8 percent over 1990, a net gain of 3,810 churches. Many of these churches have a few visible resources, but each carries the power of God for bringing others into a saving relationship with Christ.
- **MEMBERSHIP** (nearly 3 million) grew at a rate of 12 percent -- an extra 400,000 people in 1991. The number of members in Baptist churches overseas has been constantly growing through the decades.

- **PREACHING POINTS** (22,736) increased 11 percent in 1991. These locations serve as beginning points of new churches and are key to long-lasting effectiveness of evangelism.
- **VOLUNTEERS** (more than 10,000 for the third year in a row) went to all parts of the world, in spite of the many tense locations and a weakened U.S. economy.
- **CHURCH EVANGELISM EFFECTIVENESS** flourishes. Churches relating to Southern Baptist foreign missions baptized an annual average of one convert for every 12 church members. That ratio is more than three times greater than that of Southern Baptist Convention churches.
- **TOTAL MISSIONARIES** continued to climb. The 3,906 missionaries serving at the end of 1991 represented a net increase of 43 from the previous year's total of 3,863. God continues to call many able and prepared persons to spread the gospel in far corners of the world.

Southern Baptist giving to foreign missions continued to grow in 1991. Most came through two channels: the Cooperative Program and the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering. But churches and individuals also gave to support hunger and disaster relief efforts and other special projects.

What can you do about foreign missions? God may call you to career service or short-term foreign efforts. He calls all Christians to support missions through prayer and financial resources. And He calls you to nurture others to support foreign missions.

GENERAL BOARD of the BAPTIST STATE CONVENTION REPORT

The ongoing work of the State Convention between sessions is undertaken by the General Board, which meets three times a year. The Board has supervision of all agencies and institutions of the Convention; however, it does not have the power to contravene any action of the Convention nor to launch a new institution.

The Board is composed of one member from each of the 79 associations, one additional member for each association with more than 20,000 members, and another additional member for any association with more than 40,000 members. The Caldwell Association is entitled to two Board members.

Members are elected in annual session of the Convention from a slate of names presented by the Nominating Committee. Board members serve four years with approximately one-fourth rotating off each year.

HISTORY COMMITTEE REPORT

First Baptist Church of Granite Falls

In the Caldwell Baptist Center there is on file a volume entitled Church Histories 1992. The History Committee of the Caldwell Baptist Association extends a challenge to each church to compile a comprehensive history and keep records current. We have requested a brief history to be placed on file in the Baptist Center. We appreciate your cooperative spirit.

Calvary Baptist Church
Rev. Bill Dyson, Pastor

Calvary Baptist Church was organized under the name of Willowdale Baptist Church on April 21, 1945 with Rev. Harvey Phillips as pastor. The first deacons to serve the church were: George Kincaid, James C. Woods, Roscoe Morrow, J.K. Walker, Hugh Kincaid and B.H. Watson.

On September 22, 1946 the name of the church was changed to Calvary Baptist Church. Since the name change, the following have served as pastors: Rev. J. Edd Crump, Rev. Buren P. Hastings, and present pastor, Rev. Bill Dyson.

The auditorium was bricked in 1958, and a homecoming and note burning was held on the 5th Sunday in August, 1959. Remodeling of the auditorium and the building of the present three story education building was undertaken in 1960.

The church purchased a pastorium at 327 Sharon Avenue, N.W., in 1970. The present auditorium was started in August 1980 and the first service was held on February 8, 1981. The church membership stands at 245, with a Sunday School enrollment of 216. The church is a member of the Southern Baptist Convention and supports many of its mission programs.

Along with the support of the Southern Baptist Convention, Calvary Baptist Church supports its own foreign missionary. On June 3, 1970, Calvary voted to send Christine Hastings to the foreign mission field. She met and married Rev. George Braidwood and they were led to Haiti, where they founded the Haitian Christian Center for the Deaf.

Calvary Baptist has ordained the following men to preach the gospel: Rev. Hugh Kincaid, Rev. Bernard Tuttle, Rev. Pete Edmisten, Rev. Calvin Helton, Rev. Dewey Sumpter, Rev. Roscoe Morrow, Rev. Phillip Martin, Rev. James Crump, Rev. Darrell McGuire, Rev. Aldene Wheeler, Rev. William Crowder, Rev. Vance Triplett, Rev. Terrell Crump, Rev. Jimmy Robbins, and Rev. Eric B. James.

Dry Ponds Baptist Church
Rev. Rick Crouse, Pastor

In the year of 1891, a brush arbor was built by the people in the small community of Dry Ponds. It was built in front of a little one room wooden school house. In that same year a Sunday School was started in the little wooden school with L.A. Berry as superintendent. Sunday School cards and literature were ordered through the Methodist Church.

In 1930, Dry Ponds and Sawmills Schools were combined and the men in the community bought the school from the county and an additional land of 1 1/2 acres from Mrs. Theodore Hayes.

At this time the Methodist preacher came and preached one Sunday a month and the Baptist preacher from Mt. Zion at Sawmills came and preached one Sunday leaving Sundays for visiting different denominations. Doctrine was not so much of an issue as was living according to the commandments and to the teachings of Jesus.

The year 1939 found the little wooden house pretty full and they talked about building a new church. It was decided to use field rocks to build the church as they could be had for the labor of hauling them. The majority of the folks were Methodist and the preacher came one Sunday a month from Granite Falls and the Baptist preacher came one Sunday from Mt. Zion at Sawmills. The church was named Dry Ponds Union Church.

On March 12, 1939 services were held for the first time by Rev. Reid Wall, Methodist preacher from Granite Falls.

In 1959, 20 years later, more space was needed and an educational building was added to the back of the church.

Rev Audley Frazier was called as first full-time pastor of the Union Church, with Rev. McRae Crawford preaching one Sunday, he being a Methodist.

The 1980's were a time of growth and change for Dry Ponds Union Church. The attendance was growing as were the activities. In the early 80's, the fellowship hall was built, but as the church progressed, it became evident that a larger sanctuary and more Sunday School rooms were needed.

Other changes have taken place at Dry Ponds in the first three years after the sanctuary was built. Under the fine leadership of Interim Pastor Willard Jenkins, the church approved a constitution, a set of by-laws and applied for full membership in the Caldwell Baptist Association and changed the name of the church to Dry Ponds Baptist church. The church became a member of the association on October 25, 1990.

While the new building is something we are all proud of, the church now faces the challenge of filling it. It is hope that Dry Ponds Baptist Church will continue in a spirit of cooperation and have as its primary objective to win as many people to Jesus Christ as possible.

HOME MISSION BOARD REPORT

The following amendments were presented to the messengers as information during the Summer Quarterly Meeting on July 23, 1992. The amendments have gone through the proper procedure for presentation, discussion and vote during the Fall Quarterly (Annual) Meeting.

RECOMMENDATION

CONSTITUTION

Article V: Membership

The association is composed of cooperating Southern Baptist Churches, which have been approved for membership by the associational messengers in accordance with the procedures described in the Bylaws.

Article X: Amendments

(Change "two-thirds" to "three-fourths majority".)

BYLAWS

Article I: Administrative Policies

Section 2. Money is to be contributed to the Gideons by the association for the purchase of memorial Bibles upon the death of a pastor, staff minister, associational leader, or a close family member of a pastor, staff minister or associational leader.

Article III: Finances

Section 4. The association maintains an ongoing "Ministers Support Fund" to temporarily assist associational pastors, church staff, retired ministers, other ministers and their immediate families during times of financial crises. The Finance Committee confidentially administers the fund, giving an annual report as to the number of persons assisted and the amount of money given. ~~The money for this fund comes from the portion of the State Missions Offering that the association receives.~~

Article V: Meetings

Section 8. All proposed resolutions or public statements to be considered by the associational messengers are to be received by the Communications Committee at

least two weeks prior to the scheduled meeting of the messengers. The messengers are to consider only those proposed resolutions and public statements that have been reviewed by the Communications Committee. The committee is responsible for presenting a positive or negative recommendation to the messengers on each proposed resolution or public statement received. The proposal may be amended or substituted by the committee as a part of their recommendation. Copies of all proposed resolutions and public statements, with the name of the initiators, are to be made available to the messengers at or before the beginning of their meeting.

(New) Article VI: Membership Procedures

Section 1. ADMISSION: When seeking admission into the association, a church must present to the Membership Committee a ~~typed~~ letter of request for admission. The letter should contain the name of the church, the reason for seeking admission into the association, and the date when the church voted to take such action.

- A. After receiving a request for admission into the association the Membership Committee is to meet with leaders of the church to discuss their desire for membership, to explain the associational requirements for admission, to consider any of their church approved documents and location of their meetings, and to deal with any other matters that would help the committee make a decision about their request.
- B. At the next Quarterly Meeting of the Messengers, the Membership Committee is to share the request with the association and to make one of the following recommendations:
 1. That the church requesting admission be accepted under the watchcare of the association;
 2. That action on the request be delayed for further consideration at the next quarterly meeting of the association; or
 3. That the request for membership be denied.

The committee is to give clear reason for its recommendation concerning the status of watchcare. As soon as possible following the associational meeting, the committee is to communicate the action of the association with the church first in spoken words, and then by ~~typed~~ letter.

- C. Any church that is accepted under the watchcare of the association must remain in that status for at least one full year before being admitted into the membership of the association.
 1. Watchcare is a time of bonding between the association and the church seeking admission. The association is to carefully observe the faith, practice and cooperation of the church. The church under watchcare is to receive the same opportunities extended to member churches; however, members of churches under watchcare may not vote nor hold a position of leadership in the association.
 2. During the watchcare period, the church is expected to have an active part in the support of the work of the association, the North Carolina Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention.
 3. The Membership Committee is to meet, as needed, with leaders of the church, during the watchcare period to discuss their relationship with the association. Representatives of the committee are to visit during meetings of the church to observe the organization and practices of the church.
- D. Near the close of the watchcare period the committee is to evaluate the condition and cooperation of the church and to decide on one of the following

recommendations to make to the association at the appropriate time concerning membership:

1. That the church requesting admission be accepted into full fellowship of the association;
2. That action on the admission be delayed until the next quarterly meeting of the association; or
3. That admission into the association be denied.

The committee is to give clear reason for its recommendation concerning membership. As soon as possible following the associational meeting, the committee is to communicate with the church the action of the association first in spoken words, and then by typed letter.

- E. A two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present is needed for the church to be accepted under watchcare or into full membership of the association.
- F. If a church is denied the status of watchcare or membership by the association, then after the lapse of one year it may submit another letter to the Membership Committee requesting admission.

Section 2. COOPERATION: A cooperating church is defined as one who sends an annual church letter to the associational clerk, is represented by duly elected messengers at quarterly associational meetings, contributes financially to the association, and is in general agreement with the purpose, basic beliefs, programs and ministries of the association.

Section 3. CONFLICT: If a member church is in conflict and requests help from the association, then the Membership Committee and/or the Director of Missions may meet with the church to counsel and work with them in an attempt to help resolve the problem(s).

Section 4. DISMISSAL: Any member church which fails to cooperate with the association is to be contacted by the Membership Committee at their discretion or upon direction of the messengers to ascertain the wishes and desires of the church relative to its continuance in the association. After counsel with the church, the committee may choose to make a recommendation that the church be removed from the membership of the association. Such a recommendation would have to be made at a quarterly meeting of the association, and a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present would be needed for dismissal of the church from the association.

The committee is to give clear reason for its recommendation concerning action toward the member church. As soon as possible following the associational meeting, the committee is to send a letter to the church to communicate the action taken by the association.

Section 5. WITHDRAWALS: The association recognizes that any affiliated church has the right to withdraw its fellowship from the association. It is requested that the report of such action by a church be sent to the Membership Committee in an official letter from the church.

Upon receipt of the letter, the Membership Committee is to discuss the action with leaders of the church. At the next quarterly meeting of the association, the committee is to inform the messengers of the church action. The association is to take one of the following actions.

- A. Accept the action of the church and immediately remove the church. The church is to be notified of the action by a letter from the association.
- B. Delay acceptance of the church action until the next quarterly meeting and instruct the Membership Committee to ask the church to reconsider its action.

Section 6. NOTIFICATION: The association is to immediately inform the North Carolina Baptist State Convention when a church is accepted under watchcare or membership. In addition, the convention is to be informed if a church is dismissed from the association as a member.

Article VII: Organization and Leadership

Section 1. The association is organized into six levels of operation: Governing, Personnel, Coordinating, Administrative Services, Mission Performance Programs and Fellowship Groups.

A. GOVERNING

1. The ASSOCIATION-IN-SESSION consists of the duly elected messengers by member churches ~~and seated by vote of the messengers~~ in attendance at each quarterly or called meeting of the association.
2. Churches of fifty (50) members or less are entitled to five (5) messengers. One (1) additional messenger is allowed for each additional fifty (50) church members or major fraction thereof provided no church has more than ten (10) messengers.
3. In addition to the total number of messengers to which each church is entitled, each pastor and each of the five associational officers are considered messengers by virtue of their positions provided that the person is a member of the church being represented.
4. Churches are to elect. . .
5. The functions of the messengers. . .
6. A person serving as a messenger. . .

E. FELLOWSHIP GROUPS

2. Groups:
 - a. The Bivocational Ministers Fellowship Group is for all ordained pastors and other ministers who have a secular vocation in addition to their church vocation.
 - b. The Church Secretaries. . .
 - c. The Ministers Conference. . .
 - d. The Ministers and Wives Quarterly Fellowship is for all Caldwell Baptist Ministers and their spouses.
 - e. The Ministers Wives. . .
 - f. The Music Ministers. . .
 - g. The Retired Ministers. . .
 - h. The Youth Ministers. . .

Article VIII: Printed Material

Section 1. A periodical newsletter known as the "Caldwell Baptist Caller" is published to communicate information about the work of and matters of interest to the association.

INTRODUCTION

Strategy Planning is a process by which an association takes a good look at itself. The process involves (1) reviewing the purpose statement of the association; (2) taking a fresh look at the needs of the churches and communities served by the association; (3) determining objectives based upon the purpose and needs; and (4) developing goals and action plans to carry out the objectives.

On July 25, 1991, the Messengers approved a request from the Associational Strategy Committee for permission to implement a strategy planning process. The Associational Bylaws require that this standing committee lead the association to conduct strategy planning about every five years. The last process was conducted during 1986-87.

Fifty-one people (27 men and 24 women) from thirty-two associational churches were approved by the messengers on January 23, 1992 to serve as members of the Steering Committee and the seven task groups. Eight pastors, three pastors' wives, ten church staff members (including part-time and full-time associate pastors, music and youth ministers and church secretaries) were a part of this group. A complete list of their names and positions can be found in the Clerk's Report for the Winter Quarterly Meeting of the Messengers, January 23, 1992.

In February, these people were trained on how to do their work. In March, the Steering Committee reviewed the purpose statement of the association. A proposed revision was presented as information to the messengers on April 23 which was later approved on July 23.

During March through July, the different task groups met to gather data and to prepare reports from their findings. On August 29, the Steering Committee reviewed the work of the task groups and prepared recommendations, based upon the gathered information, for presentation to the Associational Messengers on October 23. The 1991-92 Strategy Planning Process comes to an end on October 23, and the Steering Committee and the seven task groups cease to exist on that date.

RECOMMENDATIONS

FIVE YEAR PLAN

October 1992-September 1997

Recommendation Number I: Purpose Statement

Every organization needs to have a clear and concise statement of purpose. It serves as a basis for all that we do.

Recommendation number one was approved by the messengers on July 23. It appears now as information to make the report and recommendations complete.

"We associate ourselves to assist member churches in fulfilling the Great Commission of Christ through fellowship, education and mission involvement."

Recommendation Number II: Objectives

Objectives are statements or words that grow out of our purpose and discovered needs. These are clear and concise statements on what we believe God would have us to do as an association of churches. The Steering Committee recommends the following seven objectives for 1992-1997.

ASSIST MEMBER CHURCHES IN EFFORTS TO . . .

- A. Reach Lost Persons for Christ
- B. Develop Believers for Dedicated Service
- C. Support Missions at Home and Around the World
- D. Minister to Human Need
- E. Enhance Christian Fellowship
- F. Strengthen Families
- G. Utilize Associational and Community Resources

Recommendation Number III: Goals

Goals are different from objectives in that they are specific, obtainable and measurable. The following goals are designed to fulfill the seven stated objectives.

Action plans are activities designed to achieve the stated goals. The associational program council(s) and committees in parenthesis at the end of each goal statement is/are responsible for the fulfillment of the assigned goal. Program councils and committees will prepare budget and calendar requests each year to reveal their action plans.

A. OBJECTIVE: Assist Member Churches in Efforts to Reach Lost Persons for Christ.

- Goal 1. Encourage churches to increase baptisms by five percent (5%) each year through September 30, 1997 (Evangelism and Sunday School Councils).
2. Increase the number of participating churches in the associational Personal Witnessing Workshops for youth and adults by two percent (2%) each year by September 30, 1997 (Evangelism Council).
3. Involve an average of one-hundred (100) persons each year in the associational Interfaith Witness Conference by September 30, 1997 (Evangelism Council).
4. Enlist fifty (50) churches to participate in the nationwide, simultaneous revival effort by Southern Baptists entitled "Here's Hope. Share Jesus Now" by December 31, 1994 (Evangelism and Sunday School Councils).
5. Conduct at least two (2) Sunday School outreach training events for church leaders and/or members by September 30, 1997 (Sunday School Council).

B. OBJECTIVE: Assist Member Churches in Efforts to Develop Believers for Dedicated Service.

- Goal 1. Encourage churches to increase enrollment in Brotherhood, Church Music, Discipleship Training, Sunday School and WMU by one percent (1%) each year by September 30, 1997 (Brotherhood, Discipleship Training, Music Ministry, Sunday School and WMU Councils).
2. Provide at least two (2) Seminary Extension courses per year through September 30, 1997 (Seminary Extension Council).
3. Have a meeting between church and associational leaders by September 30, 1993 to determine ways in which the association can better assist churches in their work (Associational Council).
4. Provide at least one training event for pastors each year in a specific area of pastoral ministries by September 30, 1997 (Pastoral Ministries Council).
5. Increase attendance of church leaders by two percent (2%) per year in each training event sponsored by the association in the areas of Brotherhood, Church Music, Discipleship Training, Media Library, Prayer, Recreation, Stewardship, Sunday School and WMU (Brotherhood, Discipleship Training, Media Library, Music Ministry, Prayer, Recreation, Stewardship, Sunday School and WMU Councils).
6. Enlist sixty-five (65) churches to conduct Vacation Bible School each year by September 30, 1997 (Sunday School VBS Team).

7. Provide at least one recreational training event per year through September 30, 1997 for persons interested or involved in such things as clowning, puppets, drama and retreats (Recreation Council).
8. Have a district prayer meeting in every church of the association by September 30, 1998 (Prayer Council).

C. OBJECTIVE: Assist Member Church in Efforts to Support Missions at Home and Around the World.

- Goal 1. Seek to involve one-thousand (1,000) Caldwell Baptists in a variety of volunteer mission projects per year by September 30, 1997 in and out of the county (Brotherhood, Missions Development and WMU Councils).
2. Help to involve at least forty-five (45) churches in a variety of mission projects per year by September 30, 1997 (Brotherhood, Missions Development and WMU Councils).
 3. Challenge churches to increase giving to ongoing mission offerings sponsored by the North Carolina Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention at least by five percent (5%) per year through September 30, 1997 (Stewardship Council).
 4. Encourage churches to increase giving to the association at least by five percent (5) each year through September 30, 1997 (Stewardship Council and Finance Committee).
 5. Work to involve at least ninety percent (90%) of the churches in giving financial support on a regular basis to associational missions by September 30, 1997.
 6. Assist twenty (20) churches in organizing a Missions Development Council by September 30, 1997 (Missions Development Council).
 7. Establish at least five (5) new work units (such as ongoing Mission Sunday Schools, Backyard Bible Clubs, campground or recreational ministries) by September 30, 1997 (Mission Development Council).
 8. Conduct a missions awareness program during at least one of the Quarterly Meetings of the Messengers each year through September 30, 1997 (Associational Meetings Committee).
 9. Enlist forty (40) churches to be involved in a World Missions Conference in 1998 by September 30, 1997 (Missions Development Council).
 10. Prepare a study with recommendations on how to minister to Hispanics living in Caldwell County by September 30, 1993 (Missions Development Council).
 11. Do a thorough study with recommendations of ethnic groups living in Caldwell County by September 30, 1994 (Missions Development Council).

D. OBJECTIVE: Assist Member Churches in Efforts to Minister to Human Need.

- Goal 1. Challenge churches to increase their gifts each year at least by five (5%) to the North Carolina Baptist Children's Homes, Baptist Hospital and Baptist Retirement Homes through September 30, 1997 (Stewardship Council).

2. Encourage churches to increase their giving by at least five (5%) percent to the annual World Hunger Relief Offering sponsored by Southern Baptists through September 30, 1997 (Christian Life Council).
3. Involve thirty-five (35) churches and five-hundred (500) walkers in the "Parade for the Hungry" by September 30, 1997 (Christian Life Council).
4. Encourage ten (10) or more pastors and five (5) or more staff ministers to make themselves available to the public schools for counseling as needed (Pastoral Ministries Council).
5. Motivate churches to assist financially at least two (2) non-profit, local human assistance organizations through September 30, 1997 (Christian Life and Missions Development Councils).
6. Enlist at least five (5) additional disaster relief volunteers per year through September 30, 1997 (Disaster Relief Committee).

E. OBJECTIVE: Assist Member Churches in Efforts to Enhance Christian Fellowship.

- Goal 1. Increase the attendance by ten percent (10%) per year in each associational fellowship group by September 30, 1997 (Fellowship Council and individual fellowship groups).
2. Enlist an appropriate number of qualified leaders for each fellowship group by September 30, 1993 (Fellowship Council and individual fellowship groups).
 3. Have the leaders of each fellowship group involved in regular planning meetings by September 30, 1993 (Fellowship Council and individual fellowship groups).
 4. Evaluate the effectiveness of each fellowship group on an annual basis and make necessary adjustments (Fellowship Council and Nominating Committee).

F. OBJECTIVE: Assist Member Churches in Efforts to Strengthen Families.

- Goal 1. Encourage thirty-five (35) churches to conduct an annual Christian Home emphasis through September 30, 1997 (Family Ministry Council).
2. Sponsor at least one major event each year for Single Adults and at least one per year for Senior Adults through September 30, 1997 (Family Ministry Council).
 3. Develop a Christian family/marriage counseling office by September 30, 1995 (Family Ministry and Pastoral Ministries Councils).
 4. Organize a Youth Ministry Committee by September 30, 1993 (Family Ministry Council and Nominating Committee).
 5. Offer a workshop or conference on parenting skills by September 30, 1994 (Family Ministry Council).

G. OBJECTIVE: Assist Member Churches in Efforts to Utilize Associational and Community Resources.

- Goal 1. Complete an inventory of all media library resources at the Baptist Center by September 30, 1993 (Associational Staff and Associational Librarian).

2. By September 30, 1993, make available a complete list of available media library resources at the Baptist Center and continue this practice quarterly (Associational Staff).
3. Develop and implement a plan by September 30, 1993 on how to better educate Caldwell Baptists on the work of the association and the denomination (Communications Committee).
4. Make a recommendation to the messengers by April 30, 1993 on whether to upgrade the Caldwell Cottage or to sell it (Finance Committee, Properties Committee and Board of Directors).
5. Prepare a study with recommendations to be presented to the messengers by January 31, 1994 on ways to expand, improve or rearrange the Caldwell Baptist Center for immediate and future needs (Properties Committee).
6. Improve the energy efficiency of the building by September 30, 1994 (Properties Committee).
7. Secure a history of every church in the association and compile them into a book by September 30, 1994 (History Committee).
8. Complete an updated history of the association by September 30, 1993 (History Committee).
9. Develop or discover and make available a booklet on community resources that would be helpful information for the churches by September 30, 1993 (Communications Committee).
10. Conduct a study on how to involve more pastors, church staff and members in associational activities by September 30, 1993 (Communications Committee).
11. Purchase a video camera and necessary accessories by September 30, 1994 to tape special workshops and activities of the association for use by the churches (Media Library Council and Associational Staff).

CONCLUSION

It is the responsibility of the Associational Strategy Committee to review these objectives and goals each year and to propose necessary changes to the messengers. Proposed changes should be made during the Winter Quarterly Meeting of the Messengers.

The Administrative Services Council, Associational Council and the Fellowship Council are responsible for coordinating the work involved in planning and implementing these objectives, goals and action plans. The three councils are to work closely with one another to avoid repetition or ineffective plans.

**CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS
of the
CALDWELL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION,
INCORPORATED**

CONSTITUTION

Preamble

The Constitution has been established to identify and preserve the fundamental truths and basic beliefs of this association.

Article I: Name

The name of the corporation is the Caldwell Baptist Association, hereinafter referred to as "association."

Article II: Duration

On October 22, 1885, sixteen churches met at the Rocky Springs Baptist Church to organize the Caldwell Baptist Association. The duration of this association is perpetual.

Article III: Location

Section 1. The member churches of this association are located in and adjacent to Caldwell County, North Carolina.

Section 2. The Caldwell Baptist Center, located at 208 Nuway Circle, Northeast, in Lenoir, North Carolina 28645, is recognized as the official headquarters of this association.

Article IV: Purpose Statement

We associate ourselves to assist member churches in fulfilling the Great Commission of Christ through fellowship, education and mission involvement.

Article V: Membership

The association is composed of cooperating Southern Baptist Churches which have been approved for membership by the associational messengers in accordance with the procedures described in the Bylaws.

Article VI: Authority

Section 1. This association is an autonomous body which is governed only by the duly elected messengers from the churches that compose it. Every messenger has the right to vote on all matters of business presented at any quarterly or called meeting of the association provided that the messenger is present. Absentee voting is prohibited.

Section 2. This association may advise and assist member churches as requested, but may not infringe upon the rights of these churches. The association recognizes each church as a self-governing body that has voluntarily decided to be affiliated with the association.

Article VII: Relationships

Section 1. This association is composed of member churches that govern and support it.

Section 2. All internal groups created and empowered by the association are only accountable to the association.

Section 3. The association voluntarily cooperates with and supports the North Carolina Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention.

Article VIII: Basic Beliefs

This association accepts the doctrinal statements of The Baptist Faith and Message as adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention in 1963. A copy of The Baptist Faith and Message is available for study in the Media Library of the Caldwell Baptist Center.

Article IX: Dissolution

The association may be dissolved by a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present at any quarterly meeting of the association, provided that the recommendation to dissolve was presented in written or typed form to the clerk and publicly stated to the messengers by the moderator or his designee at the preceding quarterly meeting of the association. Typed copies of the recommendation are to be furnished to the messengers of the association for study at least two weeks prior to the vote on the recommendation. Upon vote to dissolve, the assets of the association will be dissolved by the Board of Directors upon instruction of the messengers.

Article X: Amendments

This Constitution may be amended by a three-fourths majority vote of the messengers present at any quarterly meeting of the association, provided that the

amendment was presented in written or typed form to the clerk and publicly stated to the messengers by the moderator or his designee at the preceding quarterly meeting of the association. Typed copies of the amendment are to be furnished to the current messengers of the association for study at least two weeks prior to the vote on the amendment.

BYLAWS

Preamble

These Bylaws have been established to identify and preserve procedural matters of this association and to govern this body in an orderly manner.

Article I: Administrative Policies

Section 1. The associational staff is responsible for scheduling the use of the Baptist Center in Lenoir and the Caldwell Cottage at Ridgecrest.

Section 2. Money is to be contributed to the Gideons by the association for the purchase of memorial Bibles upon the death of a pastor, staff minister, associational leader, or a close family member of a pastor, staff minister or associational leader.

Section 3. The Clerk, the Treasurer and the Director of Missions are authorized to have access to the association's safety deposit box located at the First Union National Bank on Main Street in Lenoir.

Article II: Associational Year

The Associational Year begins on October 1 and closes on September 30.

Article III: Finances

Section 1. The fiscal year of the association begins on October 1 and closes on September 30.

Section 2. The Associational Budget for the upcoming year is to be formally presented by the Finance Committee for a vote by the messengers during the quarterly meeting of the association in July each year. In order to give the messengers adequate time to study the budget, the Finance Committee is to prepare and distribute copies of the budget to the messengers by the second Thursday of July each year. The budget becomes effective on October 1 annually. The Finance Committee is to maintain a budget format that corresponds with the organizational structure of the association.

Section 3. The treasurer is to present to the messengers a current financial report clearly showing all receipts and disbursements during each quarterly meeting of the association. During the quarterly meeting in October, an annual financial report is to be presented. The treasurer is to provide a monthly financial report in the associational newsletter including the contributions of each church in the association.

Section 4. The association maintains an ongoing "Ministers Support Fund" to temporarily assist associational pastors, church staff, retired ministers, other ministers and their immediate families during times of financial crises. The Finance Committee confidentially administrates the fund, giving an annual report as to the number of persons assisted and the amount of money given.

Section 5. Each associational church is requested to contribute at least 4% of all undesignated receipts to the association.

Section 6. The association is a non-profit organization.

Article IV: Logos

Section 1. The association is to continually have a personalized logo that visually displays the identity and current work of this body.

Section 2. The association accepts and uses the logo of the Southern Baptist Convention to help identify who we are.

Article V: Meetings

Section 1. The messengers of the association meet quarterly to receive information and reports and to transact the business of the association. The meetings are held in October (Fall Meeting), January (Winter Meeting), April (Spring Meeting), and July (Summer Meeting). The meetings in January, April and July are night meetings which are held on the fourth Thursday of each month. The meeting in October is considered the Annual Meeting of the association and is conducted on the fourth Thursday and Friday of October.

The first session of the Annual Meeting is held on Thursday night. The second (final) session is conducted on Friday morning, concluding at lunch. The annual meeting is to be held in one church on Thursday and in another church on Friday. The association is responsible for providing lunch for the messengers on Friday. The association has the option of charging for the meal on a cost recovery basis, or may pay for the meal out of the associational budget.

Section 2. The Associational Meetings Committee is fully responsible for preparing the program, selecting and contacting program participants, and for choosing and preparing the location for each meeting. The location for each quarterly meeting is to be presented in the annual "Calendar of Activities" for the forthcoming year. The committee may ask the associational messengers to move a quarterly meeting to a date one week prior to or one week after a scheduled meeting date to avoid conflict with a major denominational emphasis date. The meetings are to be held in as many member churches as practically possible on a rotating basis.

Section 3. The Moderator or the Director of Missions can call the messengers together for special meetings to deal with extremely urgent matters that cannot wait until the next quarterly meeting. Before calling a special meeting to order, a notice of at least two weeks is to be given to the messengers with a clear explanation as to the purpose of the meeting. A quorum of fifty messengers must be present to conduct a special meeting.

Section 4. The Moderator may postpone and reschedule quarterly or called meetings of the associational messengers, in cooperation with the Director of Missions and the Associational Meetings Committee Chairman, in the event of inclement weather or other unforeseen crises.

Section 5. A quorum at each of the quarterly meetings of the association consists of those messengers who attend each meeting.

Section 6. Robert's Rules of Order, Revised, is the authority for parliamentary rules of procedure for all business meetings of the association.

Section 7. Visitors attending a quarterly or called meeting of the association may by approval of the body participate in debate without the privilege to vote. Visitors are welcome to attend the meetings of the association.

Section 8. All proposed resolutions or public statements to be considered by the associational messengers are to be received by the Communications Committee at least two weeks prior to the scheduled meeting of the messengers. The messengers are to consider only those proposed resolutions and public statements that have been reviewed by the Communications Committee. The committee is responsible for presenting a positive or negative recommendation to the messengers on each proposed resolution or public statement received. The proposal may be amended or substituted

by the committee as a part of their recommendation. Copies of all proposed resolutions and public statements, with the name of the initiators, are to be made available to the messengers at or before the beginning of their meeting.

ARTICLE VI: Membership Procedures

Section 1. **ADMISSION:** When seeking admission into the association, a church must present to the Membership Committee a letter of request for admission. The letter should contain the name of the church, the reason for seeking admission into the association, and the date when the church voted to take such action.

- A. After receiving a request for admission into the association the Membership Committee is to meet with leaders of the church to discuss their desire for membership, to explain the associational requirements for admission, to consider any of their church approved documents and location of their meetings, and to deal with any other matters that would help the committee make a decision about their request.
- B. At the next Quarterly Meeting of the Messengers, the Membership Committee is to share the request with the association and to make one of the following recommendations:
 1. That the church requesting admission be accepted under the watchcare of the association;
 2. That action on the request be delayed for further consideration at the next quarterly meeting of the association; or
 3. That the request for membership be denied.

The committee is to give clear reason for its recommendation concerning the status of watchcare. As soon as possible following the associational meeting, the committee is to communicate the action of the association with the church first in spoken words, and then by letter.

- C. Any church that is accepted under the watchcare of the association must remain in that status for at least one full year before being admitted into the membership of the association.
 1. Watchcare is a time of bonding between the association and the church seeking admission. The association is to carefully observe the faith, practice and cooperation of the church. The church under watchcare is to receive the same opportunities extended to member churches; however, members of churches under watchcare may not vote nor hold a position of leadership in the association.
 2. During the watchcare period, the church is expected to have an active part in the support of the work of the association, the North Carolina Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention.
 3. The Membership Committee is to meet, as needed, with leaders of the church during the watchcare period to discuss their relationship with the association. Representatives of the committee are to visit during meetings of the church to observe the organization and practices of the church.
- D. Near the close of the watchcare period the committee is to evaluate the condition and cooperation of the church and to decide on one of the following recommendations to make to the association at the appropriate time concerning membership:
 1. That the church requesting admission be accepted into full fellowship of the association;
 2. That action on the admission be delayed until the next quarterly meeting of the association; or

3. That admission into the association be denied.

The committee is to give clear reason for its recommendation concerning membership. As soon as possible following the associational meeting, the committee is to communicate with the church the action of the association first in spoken words, and then by letter.

- E. A two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present is needed for the church to be accepted under watchcare or into full membership of the association.
- F. If a church is denied the status of watchcare or membership by the association, then after the lapse of one year it may submit another letter to the Membership Committee requesting admission.

Section 2. COOPERATION: A cooperating church is defined as one who sends an annual church letter to the associational clerk, is represented by duly elected messengers at quarterly associational meetings, contributes financially to the association, and is in general agreement with the purpose, basic beliefs, programs and ministries of the association.

Section 3. CONFLICT: If a member church is in conflict and requests help from the association, then the Membership Committee and/or the Director of Missions may meet with the church to counsel and work with them in an attempt to help resolve the problem(s).

Section 4. DISMISSAL: Any member church which fails to cooperate with the association is to be contacted by the Membership Committee at their discretion or upon direction of the messengers to ascertain the wishes and desires of the church relative to its continuance in the association. After counsel with the church, the committee may choose to make a recommendation that the church be removed from the membership of the association. Such a recommendation would have to be made at a quarterly meeting of the association, and a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present would be needed for dismissal of the church from the association.

The committee is to give clear reason for its recommendation concerning action toward the member church. As soon as possible following the associational meeting, the committee is to send a letter to the church to communicate the action taken by the association.

Section 5. WITHDRAWALS: The association recognizes that any affiliated church has the right to withdraw its fellowship from the association. It is requested that the report of such action by a church be sent to the Membership Committee in an official letter from the church.

Upon receipt of the letter, the Membership Committee is to discuss the action with leaders of the church. At the next quarterly meeting of the association, the committee is to inform the messengers of the church action. The association is to take one of the following actions:

- A. Accept the action of the church and immediately remove the church. The church is to be notified of the action by a letter from the association.
- B. Delay acceptance of the church action until the next quarterly meeting and instruct the Membership Committee to ask the church to reconsider its action.

Section 6. NOTIFICATION: The association is to immediately inform the North Carolina Baptist State Convention when a church is accepted under watchcare or membership. In addition, the convention is to be informed if a church is dismissed from the association as a member.

Article VII: Organization and Leadership

Section 1. The association is organized into six levels of operation: Governing, Personnel, Coordinating, Administrative Services, Mission Performance Programs and Fellowship Groups.

A. GOVERNING

1. The ASSOCIATION-IN-SESSION consists of the duly elected messengers by member churches in attendance at each quarterly or called meeting of the association.
2. Churches of fifty (50) members or less are entitled to five (5) messengers. One (1) additional messenger is allowed for each additional fifty (50) church members or major fraction thereof provided no church has more than ten (10) messengers.
3. In addition to the total number of messengers to which each church is entitled, each pastor and each of the five associational officers are considered messengers by virtue of their positions provided that the person is a member of the church being represented.
4. Churches are to elect their messengers before October each year so that the messengers can serve the full associational year from October 1 through September 30. Messengers can serve consecutive years but must be elected annually by their church. Messengers are expected to attend all of the quarterly and called meetings of the association. The name, address, and telephone number of each messengers should be delivered by the church clerk to the associational clerk no later than October 7 each year to facilitate advance registration. This information can accompany the annual church letter.
5. The functions of the messengers are to receive current information and reports about the work of the association and groups with which it is related; transact the business of the association; and report on the meetings and activities of the association to the churches.
6. A person serving as a messenger from a church must be a member in good standing of that church.

B. PERSONNEL

1. Positions:
 - a. The Director of Missions is the general leader of the association serving as the director of directors of all programs, ministries, and services of the association. In addition, the Director of Missions leads the association to explore new mission frontiers, and serves as a minister to the churches and church leaders.

The Director of Missions is the chief executive officer of the association, the registered agent of the corporation (association), and is an ex-officio member of all associational committees, councils, and groups. The Director serves as director of the Associational Council

Election to this office is upon recommendation of the Director of Missions Search Committee and by two-thirds majority vote of approval by the messengers at any quarterly meeting of the association. The time of service is indefinite and can be terminated by written notice to the Personnel Committee by the Director of Missions or by two-thirds majority vote of the messengers at any quarterly meeting of the association upon recommendation of the Personnel Committee.

- b. The Associate Director of Missions serves the association by working under the supervision of the Director of Missions in general leadership, mission strategy, ministry to churches and church leaders and as a representative to the denomination and community. Election to this office is upon recommendation of the Personnel Committee and by two-thirds majority vote of approval by the messengers at any quarterly meeting of the association. The time of service is indefinite and can be terminated by written notice to the Personnel Committee by the Associate Director of Missions or by two-thirds majority vote of the messengers at any quarterly meeting of the association upon recommendation of the Personnel Committee.
- c. The Administrative Assistant serves primarily in a secretarial role. However, this individual assists the Director of Missions with daily administrative matters of the association. In addition, the person supervises the general operation of the Baptist Center by answering the telephone, greeting visitors and helping to meet their needs. The Administrative Assistant supervises office help along with the Director of Missions. This person also serves as the Associational Clerk and as secretary of the Associational Council. The Administrative Assistant is enlisted and recommended to the association by the Personnel Committee. A two-thirds majority vote of approval by the messengers is necessary for employment. The time of service for the Administrative Assistant is indefinite and can be terminated by written notice to the Personnel Committee by the employee or by two-thirds majority vote of the messengers upon recommendation of the Personnel Committee.
- d. The Financial Secretary serves as assistant to the Treasurer and helps the Administrative Assistant with office responsibilities. It is a part-time position. The Financial Secretary is enlisted and recommended to the association by the Personnel Committee. A two-thirds majority vote of approval by the messengers is necessary for employment. The time of service for the Financial Secretary is indefinite and can be terminated by written notice to the Personnel Committee by the employee or by two-thirds majority vote of the messengers upon recommendation of the Personnel Committee.
- e. A Summer Worker is to be hired as needed for approximately two weeks of work. This person, normally a student, does special projects as assigned by the Director of Missions or his designee. The Summer Worker is enlisted and recommended to the association by the Personnel Committee. A two-thirds majority vote of approval by the messengers is necessary for employment. The association may hire more than one Summer Worker per year, if needed and money is available.
2. General:
- a. Each paid employee is to be provided by the Personnel Committee with an up-to-date job description of his responsibilities.
- b. The Director of Missions is the general supervisor of all paid employees of the association. However, the Director is to work closely with the committees and leaders who share supervision.
- c. The Personnel Committee cannot recommend the Director of Missions, the Associate Director of Missions, the Administrative Assistant, or

the Financial Secretary to the association for termination of duties without proper notice and a clear explanation of such action given to the individual prior to the associational meeting at which time the recommendation for dismissal is to be made.

A closing financial arrangement is to be provided for an employee who has been dismissed by the association. The Personnel Committee is to determine a fair closing financial arrangement and to make it a part of the recommendation for dismissal to the association.

The Summer Worker and other temporary employees may be dismissed with clear explanation by the Personnel Committee without approval by the association. No closing financial arrangement is necessary.

C. COORDINATING

1. This level of operation is made up of the Administrative Services Council, the Associational Council and the Fellowship Council. The purpose of these councils is to coordinate the overall work of the association. The Associational Council serves as the primary coordinating council.
2. Coordinating Councils:
 - a. The Administrative Services Council consists of the administrative services committee chairmen. The council meets only as needed to coordinate the overall work of the committees. The council director represents the committees as a member of the Associational Council.
 - b. The Associational Council consists of the Mission Performance Programs Directors, the Administrative Services Council Director, the Fellowship Council Director, the Director of Missions, the Associate Director of Missions and the Administrative Assistant. The Director of Missions serves as the Council Director and the Administrative Assistant serves as secretary. The purpose of the council is to coordinate the overall program and calendar of the association. The council meets only as needed.
 - c. The Fellowship Council consists of the head leaders of the associational fellowship groups. The council meets only as needed to discuss fellowship needs and to coordinate the activities of the fellowship groups. The council director represents the fellowship groups as a member of the Associational Council.

D. ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES

1. This level of operation is made up of the committees, the Board of Directors, and the officers of the association. Their purpose is to carry out assigned work in order to help the association operate smoothly. There are eleven committees, the Board of Directors and five officers. Each committee chairman serves as a member of the Administrative Services Council. The six associational district members serving on the Board of Directors and all committee members are elected for three consecutive years of service. After the lapse of at least one year a person may be nominated for a position previously held. The length of service for the

officers is in accordance with their individual job descriptions.

2. Committees:

- a. The Associational Meetings Committee is responsible for planning and conducting the regular and called meetings of the associational messengers. The duties of this committee are to: (1) propose an order of business for each meeting of the associational messengers; (2) enlist all program personnel for the associational meetings; (3) publicize the order of business to the churches in advance of the meeting; (4) arrange for the facilities needed for each meeting; (5) arrange for and conduct proper registration of messengers and visitors at each meeting and to report registration as requested; and (6) recommend future meeting places to the associational messengers in the annual "Calendar of Activities" for the forthcoming year; the committee may ask the associational messengers to move a quarterly meeting to a date one week prior to or one week after a scheduled meeting to avoid conflict with a major denominational emphasis date. The committee consists of six members, each elected for a three-year term with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year.
- b. The Communications Committee is responsible for communicating the programs, ministries, resolutions and services of the association to the churches and to the general public. Its duties are to: (1) develop and implement an annual Associational Emphasis Week promotion plan; (2) assist, as needed, with office-produced communications, such as: The Book of Reports and the Annual Minutes; (3) receive, review and recommend all proposed resolutions or public statements; (4) initiate resolutions or statements as needed; (5) develop promotional brochures or other literature that identifies the work of the association, and (6) assist, as requested by the association or associational leaders, in promoting or reporting the work and actions of the association through the secular media. The Communications Committee consists of six members, each elected for a three-year term with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year.
- c. The External Relations Committee is responsible for establishing and maintaining proper relationships with groups outside the association. Its duties are to: (1) serve through individual representatives as a channel of communication between the association and various agencies, boards, foundations, and other groups affiliated with the North Carolina Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention, and (2) communicate and work, as needed, with non-Baptist groups.
The External Relations Committee consists of the associational representatives of the American Bible Society, the Annuity Board, the Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina, the Baptist Retirement Homes of North Carolina, the Baptist World Alliance, the Biblical Recorder, Christian Higher Education, the Foreign Mission Board, the General Board of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina (two representatives), the Home Mission Board, the North Carolina Baptist Foundation, and the North Carolina Baptist Hospital, each elected for a three-year term.

- d. The Finance Committee assists the association in securing, administering and reporting its finances. Its duties are to: (1) develop and recommend an overall financial development plan; (2) develop and recommend an associational budget based on the plans of the association's various programs and ministries; (3) plan and direct the effort to seek giving commitments from the churches; (4) conduct studies and make recommendations concerning proposed expenditures not included in the budget; (5) review expenditures periodically in terms of budget allocations and recommend budget adjustments if needed; (6) develop and recommend financial policies and procedures, including provisions for auditing; and (7) administer the associational "Minister's Support Fund." The Finance Committee consists of six elected members, each elected for a three-year term with terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year.
- e. The History Committee is to gather, preserve, and interpret historical records of the association's life and work. Its duties are to: (1) work with the associational clerk in gathering and preserving past associational records; (2) assist in the recording of present-day activities; (3) communicate and interpret the heritage of the association to associational leaders and member churches; (4) use historical facts and documents to challenge the association to accomplish its mission; (5) develop and recommend to the association policies and procedures regarding its historical materials; (6) encourage churches to gather and preserve their historical records and to write, communicate, and interpret their history. The History Committee consists of six members, each elected for a three-year term with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year.
- f. The Membership Committee is to assist the association in determining when churches are of like faith and order and can be properly accepted into the association according to the provisions made in the Constitution and Bylaws of the association. Also, this committee serves as a "church conflict" advisory body. In addition, this committee encourages active participation by inactive churches in the association. The duties are to: (1) recommend and implement approved guidelines as needed for receiving churches into the association and for dealing with troubled member or inactive churches in the association; (2) counsel with churches seeking admission into the association and with troubled or inactive member churches; (3) examine the credentials of churches seeking admission into the association (namely, their articles of faith or doctrinal positions, church covenant, polity -- including their constitution and bylaws -- and relationship to the denomination. The Membership Committee consists of six members, each elected for a three-year term with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year.
- g. The Nominating Committee leads in coordinating the selection of all association-elected leaders except paid personnel. Its duties are to: (1) select, interview, enlist, and recommend general associational officers, mission performance program directors, and committee chairmen and members; (2) coordinate the selection of

workers for all the association's organizations and committees; (3) approve workers before they are invited to work in program organizations; (4) distribute associational leadership according to priority needs; (5) assist associational program leaders in discovering and enlisting qualified persons to fill positions in their respective organizations; (6) present workers to the association; (7) nominate special committees as assigned by the association.

The Nominating Committee consists of six members, one from each of the six associational districts, each elected for a three-year term with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year. The committee should give careful consideration that all nominees are selected fairly from all six districts of the association, and from all pastors, staff members, men and women of the churches. Each nominee must be a member in good standing in an associational church.

LEADERSHIP SELECTION

- (1) All Mission Performance Program directors are to be formally presented by the Nominating Committee for vote by the messengers at the January meeting of the association. In order to give the messengers adequate time to consider the nominees for program directors, the Nominating Committee is to prepare a complete list of the names and positions and have copies distributed to the messengers by the second Thursday in January.

The individuals approved at the January meeting of the association immediately become the program directors-elect until October when their tenure of service officially begins. The program directors-elect would meet with the Associational Council only upon request; however, each program director-elect is expected to participate in the annual calendar planning meetings.

- (2) Each program director-elect is to immediately start selecting individuals to serve on the respective program councils for the upcoming year. A complete list of the individuals selected to serve is to be presented to the Nominating Committee by March 31 by each program director-elect.
- (3) Fellowship Groups may select their own leadership or ask the Nominating Committee to do the selection. Each group that chooses its own leadership for the upcoming associational year is to present a complete list of the individuals selected to serve to the Nominating Committee by March 31.
- (4) The Board of Directors, officers, committee chairmen and members, leaders of the fellowship groups, and all previously unelected members of program councils are to be formally presented by the Nominating Committee for vote by the messengers at the April meeting of the association. In order to give the messengers adequate time to consider the nominees, the Nominating Committee is to prepare a complete list of the names and positions and have copies distrib-

uted to the messengers by the second Thursday of April. The individuals approved at the April meeting of the association are the leaders "elect" until October 1 when their tenure of service officially begins. Each leader has the privilege to plan and to train as necessary for the upcoming year. The leaders "elect" have no authority over the current year's work, except in a position currently held.

- (5) If vacancies occur during the year the Nominating Committee is to enlist a person to fill each vacated position and to recommend the person to the association. The committee is to work with program directors and committee chairmen as needed in filling each vacancy.
- h. The Personnel Committee is responsible for all paid employees of the association. Its duties are to: (1) recommend policies and procedures for the selection, supervision, and termination of associational personnel; (2) maintain up-to-date job descriptions in a manual for every paid position in the association; (3) recruit, interview, and recommend to the association new personnel, excluding the Director of Missions, in full cooperation with the appropriate supervisor; (4) develop and recommend salaries and benefits for employed personnel; (5) develop and recommend to the association policies and procedures regarding continuing education and development for the Director of Missions and other paid personnel. The Personnel Committee consists of six members, each elected for a three-year term with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year. The chairman is a member of the Director of Missions Search Committee.
- i. The Properties Committee assists the association in the administration of all properties in Buncombe and Caldwell Counties. Its duties are to: (1) inspect and keep inventory of all associational properties; (2) secure, supervise and terminate the services of persons responsible for the care of associational properties; (3) develop and initiate scheduled cleaning procedures; (4) develop and recommend a program of preventive maintenance; (5) develop and recommend policies and procedures for using facilities and equipment; (6) request and administer maintenance, furniture, and equipment budget; (7) develop and, with the Board of Directors, recommend an adequate insurance plan for the properties. The Properties Committee consists of six members, each elected for a three-year term with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year. This committee can spend up to \$500.00 on one item without approval of the association. Items above that amount must have associational approval.
- j. The Search Committee is designed to serve only as needed to secure a Director of Missions. Its duties are to: (1) meet as a committee for the first time within a month following election by the association; (2) choose from within the committee a chairman, vice-chairman and secretary during the first meeting; (3) study and follow carefully the Job Description for the Director of Missions; (4) seek comments and suggestions from the association concerning the expectations of the next Director of Missions;

- (5) report regularly to the association on progress being made; (6) develop a list of prospects for the position; (7) narrow the list of candidates, thoroughly researching qualifications and references; (8) interview and observe most favorable candidate(s) in different settings; (9) unanimously present choice candidate to the association for approval; (10) assist newly elected Director of Missions during transition period; and (11) inform all other candidates by letter, as necessary, of the decision of the association, expressing appreciation to each person for their time and cooperation. The committee will consist of one pastor, one layman, one laywoman (all named by the Nominating Committee), plus the Moderator and Chairman of the Personnel Committee.
- k. The Strategy Committee assists the association in determining its strategic objectives and in staying on course in achieving them. Its duties are to: (1) monitor the needs and opportunities of the churches and provide updated information to the churches and to the associational programs annually; (2) recommend modifications in the organizational structure to help fulfill associational objectives; (3) review the association's constitution and bylaws and recommend modifications as needed; (4) maintain up-to-date job descriptions in a manual for every volunteer position in the association excluding paid workers; (5) lead the association to conduct strategy planning about every five years. The Strategy Committee consists of six members, each elected for a three-year term with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year.
3. Board of Directors:
- a. The Board of Directors acts as the legal agent of the association. Its duties are to: (1) serve as legal representative of the association; (2) act as directed by the associational messengers in handling legal matters; (3) oversee the total insurance plan of the association; (4) hold in trust any property, money, endowment or other securities of the association; (5) exercise the power, under the instruction of the associational messengers, to hold, buy, sell, and convey property, both real and personal, and to sign all papers necessary for the purchase or conveyance; and to (6) act in behalf of the associational messengers, under unusual and extreme circumstances, giving a full report to the messengers as soon as possible to explain action taken.
- The Board of Directors consists of eleven members. Serving are the five officers of the association, plus six other members, one from each of the six associational districts. The six associational district members are each elected for a three-year term with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year. The Moderator serves as the presiding officer of the board. The Board of Directors meets annually in October and at other times as necessary.

b. Officers:

- (1) The Moderator, also known as president, presides over the quarterly and called meetings of the associational messengers. As the presiding officer, the Moderator (1) opens the meetings punctually at the appointed time, enforces the rules, preserves the order, and exercises all the prerogatives of a presiding officer according to the principles of established parliamentary usage (Roberts Rules of Order, Revised); (2) appoints a parliamentarian, if desired, to serve at any or all meetings of the associational messengers during his term of office; the person appointed must be approved by the messengers-in-session; (3) serves as an ex-officio member of all committees, councils, and groups of the association; (4) calls the associational messengers together for special meetings to deal with extremely urgent matters that cannot wait until the next quarterly meeting (Before calling a special meeting to order, a notice of at least two weeks is to be given to the associational messengers with a clear explanation as to the purpose of the meeting. A quorum of fifty associational messengers must be present to conduct a special meeting.); (5) postpones and reschedules quarterly or called meetings of the associational messengers, in cooperation with the Director of Missions and the Associational Meetings Committee Chairman, in the event of inclement weather or other unforeseen crises; and (6) serves as a member of the Director of Missions Search Committee. The Moderator is elected for a one-year term and is eligible for election to a second consecutive term; however, after serving for two consecutive years, the individual could not be considered for Moderator for at least one year.
- (2) It is the duty of the Vice-Moderator, also known as Vice-President, to discharge the duties of the Moderator in the absence or at the request of the Moderator. The Vice-Moderator is elected for a one-year term, and is eligible to a second consecutive term. However, after serving for two consecutive years, the individual could not be considered for Vice-Moderator for at least one year.
- (3) The Clerk, also known as Secretary, records and keeps in permanent form all transactions of the association and makes this information available upon request. The Clerk's duties are to: (1) serve as recorder during the meetings of the association; (2) secure from the churches the annual Uniform Church Letter and process it according to recommended procedures; (3) edit the associational annual minutes; (4) work with the History Committee to preserve the official records of the association; (5) train and assist church clerks. The Administrative Assistant serves as the Clerk of the association.
- (4) The Treasurer receives all of the funds contributed to the association and disburses them in accordance with the budget of the association or for which the funds were contributed. The Treasurer's duties are to: (1) serve as an ex-officio member of the Finance Committee; (2) work with the Finance Committee to recommend and establish fiscal policies; (3) maintain proper records of all monies received and disbursed; (4) provide printed

quarterly and annual reports to the association of all receipts and disbursements.

The Treasurer is elected annually and can succeed himself. The chairman of the Finance Committee is authorized to fulfill the duties of the treasurer in the event the treasurer is unable to do so.

- (5) The Director of Missions is the chief executive officer of the association, also serving as the registered agent.

E. MISSION PERFORMANCE PROGRAMS

1. The work of the Mission Performance Programs of the association is carried out through councils. Each council member has definite responsibilities and the number of members on each council is determined by need. Council members are elected annually. The general director of each council serves as an ex-officio member of the Associational Council. Each council has meetings according to need. Each council consists of a program director and other leaders as needed to conduct the program.
2. Councils:
 - a. The Brotherhood Council assists churches in educating and involving men and boys in missions.
 - b. The Christian Life Council informs the churches of critical moral and social issues and leads in Christian action to meet those needs. The council seeks to develop good Christian citizenship and healthy human relations.
 - c. The Discipleship Training Council assists the churches in starting, improving and expanding Christian discipleship through their Discipleship Training programs.
 - d. The Evangelism Council assists churches in reaching people for Christ through evangelistic training and by bringing the churches together in corporate efforts of evangelism.
 - e. The Family Ministry Council assists churches in developing family ministry programs. Special emphasis is placed on ministry activities for preschoolers, children, youth, adults and students. Training opportunities are provided for general leaders of these age groups.
 - f. The Media/Library Council assists churches in the establishment, development and improvement of church media library services. In addition, the council is responsible for organizing and operating the associational Media Library in the Baptist Center.
 - g. The Missions Development Council leads the churches to discover opportunities for associational, state, home and foreign missions and to assist the churches in doing mission projects individually and corporately. The council works closely with the Brotherhood, Sunday School and WMU Councils.
 - h. The Music Ministry Council assists the churches through establishing, conducting, enlarging and improving their music ministries.
 - i. The Pastoral Ministries Council assists the churches in the development of pastoral ministries, deacon ministry, vocational guidance and church administrative services. In addition, the council ministers to the distinctive needs of pastors, deacons, church staff persons, church councils, church officers and committee members and church vocation

volunteers. This council is responsible for interviewing candidates for ordination to the "Gospel Ministry" as requested by the churches.

- j. The Prayer Council is responsible for promoting prayer in the churches, providing opportunities for prayer among the churches, and offering conferences and seminars on prayer.
- k. The Recreation Council assists churches in providing recreation methods, materials, services, and experiences and is available to other associational organizations wishing to use recreation in accomplishing their particular tasks.
- l. The Seminary Extension Council promotes and provides practical and theological education to ministers and laypersons on basic and college levels.
- m. The Stewardship Council assists the churches in the development of individual and corporate stewardship.
- n. The Sunday School Council assists and challenges churches to improve and enlarge all areas of their Sunday School through planning, training, administration activities, consultation, program interpretation, and cooperative projects.
- o. The Woman's Missionary Union Council assists churches in promoting missions and in establishing, enlarging, and strengthening WMU work.

E. FELLOWSHIP GROUPS

1. The purpose of the Fellowship Groups is to provide a setting for particular groups to meet together for fellowship, dialogue, encouragement and mutual care. Hopefully, as the individual groups meet together the fellowship of the whole association can be strengthened. Each group determines its own leadership in cooperation with the Associational Nominating Committee, and plans its own activities in cooperation with the Associational Fellowship Council. The leader of each fellowship group is a member of the Fellowship Council.
2. Groups:
 - a. The Bivocational Ministers' Fellowship Group is for all ordained pastors and other ministers who have a secular vocation in addition to their church vocation.
 - b. The Church Secretaries' Fellowship Group includes all Caldwell Baptist church and associational secretaries.
 - c. The Ministers' Conference Fellowship Group includes all pastors, bivocational pastors, church staff ministers, other ministers and retired ministers in the association.
 - d. The Ministers and Wives' Quarterly Fellowship Group is for all Caldwell Baptist Ministers and their spouses.
 - e. The Ministers Wives' Fellowship Group includes all the wives of active, deceased, or retired ministers in the association.
 - f. The Music Leaders' Fellowship Group includes all paid and volunteer ministers of music, directors of music, organists, pianists, and other music leadership in the churches and the association. This group cooperates with the Music Ministry Council of the association.

- g. The Retired Ministers' Fellowship Group includes all retired Southern Baptist ministers and their spouses living in the associational area.
- h. The Youth Ministers' Fellowship Group consists of all paid and volunteer ministers of youth, youth directors and other youth leaders in the churches of the association. The Associational Youth Director of the Family Ministry Council serves as a member of this group.

Section 2. Every committee, council or fellowship group has the authority to appoint temporary sub-groups to carry out specific assignments as needed. The sub-group ceases to exist at the completion of the assignment. Permanent, but not temporary, sub-groups must be suggested to and approved by the Nominating Committee and then by the messengers of the association.

Section 3. Every associational committee and council is to choose a secretary to record the proceedings of each meeting.

Section 4. Associational leaders and representatives are responsible for presenting written and/or verbal reports to the association as requested.

Section 5. An up-to-date "Organizational Chart" is to be maintained to visibly reveal the overall associational operation.

Section 6. An "Operations Manual" is to be maintained by the Associational Staff in the Baptist Center, containing such items as: paid and volunteer job descriptions, administrative policies, the Articles of Incorporation and the Constitution and Bylaws. The appropriate groups within the associational organization are to assist the staff in keeping the manual up-to-date.

Section 7. Each ex-officio member serving on a council, committee or group is entitled to full voting rights.

Section 8. The General Board members of the Baptist State Convention from the Caldwell Association are to represent the association to the State Convention and vice-versa. The Board members are encouraged to report to the association about Board actions.

Article VIII: Printed Material

Section 1. A periodical newsletter known as the "Caldwell Baptist Caller" is published to communicate information about the work of and matters of interest to the association.

Section 2. The Annual Minutes are prepared to serve as a record of information about the association.

Section 3. An "Associational Directory" is prepared annually and updated quarterly to provide information on who are associational leaders, church leaders, and other persons of interest to the association and how to contact them.

Section 4. A "Calendar of Activities" is prepared annually to inform the churches of upcoming events in or related to the association.

Section 5. Reports to the association and promotional pieces about the work of the association are printed as needed.

Section 6. Each member church is expected to prepare and deliver to the associational clerk the annual "Uniform Church Letter" by October 7 each year.

Article IX: Amendments

These Bylaws may be amended by a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present at any quarterly meeting of the association provided that the amendment was presented in written or typed form to the clerk and publicly stated to

the messengers by the moderator or his designee at the preceding quarterly meeting of the association. Typed copies of the amendment are to be furnished to the current messengers of the association for study at least two weeks prior to a vote on the amendment.

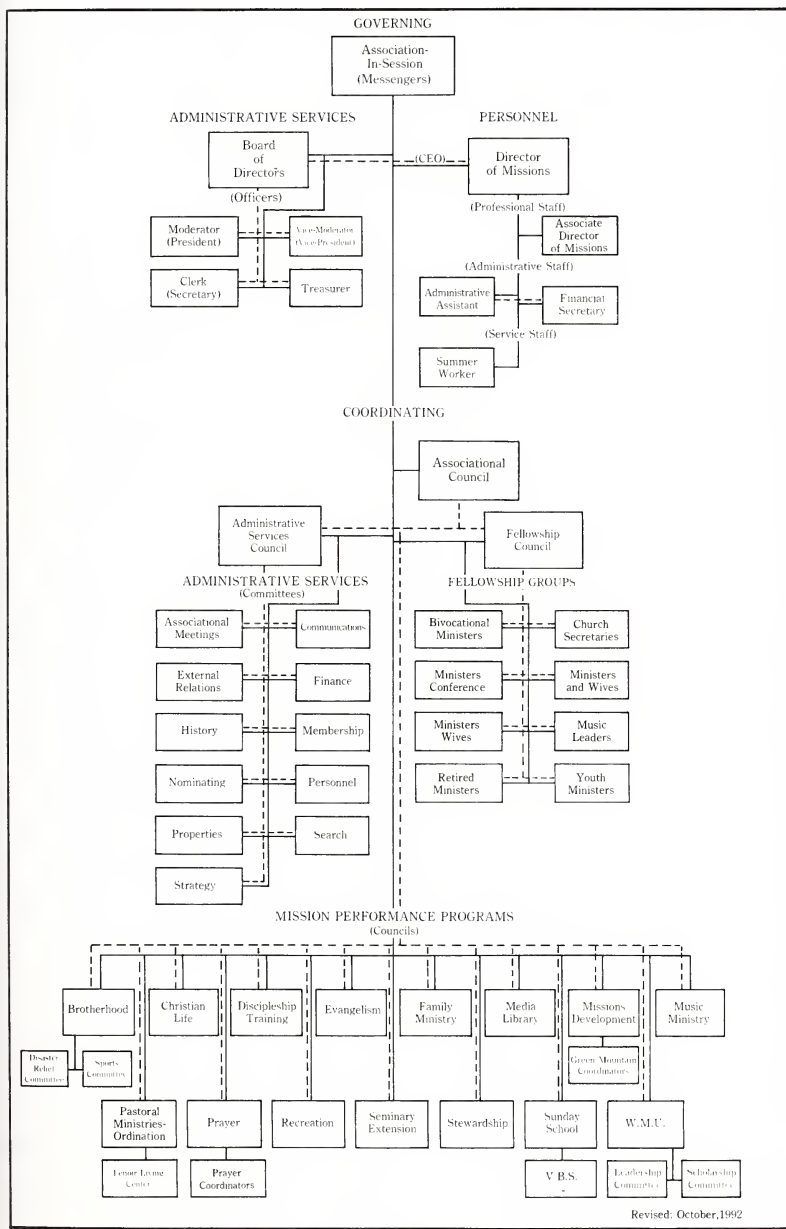

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

The American Bible Society serves churches, denominations and agencies around the world. It is not a church. Instead, it provides the Scriptures that churches and individuals need for study, preaching, teaching and witnessing. The society does not attempt to interpret or teach God's Word. The American Bible Society simply supplies the Scriptures and leaves interpretation and teaching to the churches, denominations and agencies.

Careful attention is given in publishing God's Word. The Scriptures must be in forms suitable for and appealing to the reader. With this goal in mind, they are designed, typeset, proofread, printed and bound. Upon completion, the Scriptures are distributed throughout the United States and in over 180 countries and territories all over the world.

Since 1816, the American Bible Society has actively produced and distributed God's Word. Over five billion copies of Bibles, Testaments, Scripture portions and selections have been shared. Scriptures are prepared in over 500 languages each year. In addition, the society prepares Scriptures for use by blind persons.

ANNUITY BOARD REPORT

Dr. Howard Hawkins, Representative Lakeview Baptist Church

A growing number of churches and ministers are catching a vision for insurance protection and preparation for retirement. Unfortunately, far too many pastors, other ministers and church and associational personnel do not have adequate financial protection. The Annuity Board's primary focus is providing that protection for as many people and churches as possible through the Church Life and Health Program and the Church Annuity Plan.

New, cost-competitive life insurance plans will be offered January 1, 1994, to help address the affordability issue. In addition, a Health Maintenance Organization (HMO) option will be available on that date in selected areas.

The Church Annuity Plan is far more than a retirement plan. It is a means to provide family protection today as well as financial security tomorrow.

As of June 1993, 35,301 persons were participating in the Church Annuity Plan. The number of churches involved was 19,975.

Eligible participants in the Church Annuity Plan benefit in five significant ways.

1. The Plan includes a Protection Section that covers disability and death. In 1992, 318 families received disability checks from the Plan. In addition, 78 families received almost \$1.2 million in survivor benefits. (If a member dies, the beneficiary also receives the full value of the deceased member's retirement accounts.) All of these protection benefits are free to the members. They are funded by state convention Cooperative Program dollars.
2. The Plan includes a choice of plan funds offering valuable, advantageous investment opportunities for retirement. The average annual return in the Variable Fund over the past 10 years has been 13.01%. The Balanced Fund has averaged 11.79% over the same period.
3. The plan offers significant opportunities for avoiding unnecessary income tax. Ordained ministers do not pay self-employment tax for Social Security on contributions to the Church Annuity Plan. These advantages exceed those offered by IRAs.

4. The Plan includes matching state convention Cooperative Program dollars for eligible members' retirement income accounts. This can amount to \$210 per year resulting in higher benefits at retirement.
5. A fifth value is the Annuity Board's strength and stability. On July 1, 1992, a five percent increase was applied to Plan A and defined contribution funded annuities. This brings Plan A increases to 222% of what was called for by the original plan formula benefit.

Based on the needs of our people and in light of these special advantages, your convention is encouraged to lead every church to participate in the Church Annuity Plan

ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL REPORT

The first meeting of the Associational Council during the new year was held at the Baptist Center on October 6, 1993. The purpose of the meeting was to orientate new members and to review plans made for the year.

On March 16, 1993, members of the Associational Council met with church leaders at the Lower Creek Baptist Church to discuss the needs of the churches and how the association could help. The ideas and suggestions mentioned were reviewed by the council at a meeting on March 24 at the Baptist Center.

Members of the Associational Council attended the Key Leadership Conference at Ridgecrest, May 10-11, 1993. This annual conference provides materials and insight on how to do the work of the association for the upcoming year.

During April, May and early June, the Mission Performance Program Directors, who make up the Associational Council met with their individual councils to plan their work for the next associational year, October 1, 1993-September 30, 1994. The information learned on March 16, March 24 and at the Key Leadership Conference served as a basis for their planning.

On June 22, 1993, the Associational Council considered the plans presented by the councils and other groups in the association. It was at this meeting that the 1993-94 Calendar of Activities was prepared. It was presented to the messengers at their Summer Quarterly Meeting on July 22, 1993 and was approved as printed.

BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES OF N. C., INC. REPORT

Baptist Children's Homes in 1992-93 served 1,453 children and their families through programs of intentionalized services at 13 facilities across North Carolina.

Those facilities include four residential care campuses; seven emergency care homes; two homes for behavioral troubled girls; therapeutic camping for boys; a maternity home; a home for teen-age mothers and their babies and model daycare facility.

Baptist churches, through the Thanksgiving Offering, Cooperative Program and direct gifts funded about one-third of BCH's \$10 million budget. A significant source of income continues to be from estate gifts from those who remember children in their wills.

BCH's model daycare service took a giant step June 27 when the new \$1 million, 10,000 sq. ft. Fleshman-Pratt Early Childhood Education Center was dedicated. It will accommodate 75 infants, toddlers and two-year olds.

During dedication, Robin Britt, N.C. Secretary of the NC Department of Human Resources, said BCH is "a true model of how young children can be shaped, nurtured and loved," and the "we will be looking at institutions like the Fleshman-Pratt Early Childhood Education Center as we find models to replicate."

T. Winfield Blackwell, president of the Fleshman-Pratt Foundation, whose lead gift started construction of the building, said, "Think how many children will be raised and shaped by the dedicated staff who serve here, and surely a goodly number will be developed, not only to be good citizens, but active ministers in God's service."

BCH also dedicated a counselor's lodge at Cameron Boys Camp; completed a strategic planning cycle for the next three years; celebrated the 50th anniversary of Odum Home in Pembroke; completed a three-year partnership with the Baptist Children's Homes of Sao Paulo, Brazil; and produced a new video about BCH, available August 15.

Swelling with emotion at the dedication of her new building, Daycare Services Director Mary Lou Dickey promised, "we will not fail" those who trust BCH with their children.

Michael C. Blackwell, who celebrated his 10th anniversary as president of BCH July 1, echoes that promise. "Baptist Children's Homes has been a cutting-edge ministry for North Carolina Baptists since 1885. As a disintegrating society moves the edges further and further, we're honing our ministry sharper and sharper. Thank you, North Carolina Baptists, for your support."

BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF NORTH CAROLINA REPORT

The North Carolina Baptist Foundation works diligently in service to Christ as directed by the agency's Mission Statement:

"The North Carolina Baptist Foundation is an agency of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina committed under the guidance of the Holy Spirit to serving North Carolina Baptists and others in generating an increased awareness of Christian estate stewardship principals as a means of financially undergirding churches, institutions and mission endeavors on a permanent basis.

And further, the Baptist Foundation staff and Board of Directors are committed to being scrupulously moral, legal, efficient and accurate in carrying out the intent of each donor and trustor whose funds are placed under management of the Foundation as a means of sustaining a tangible and perpetual involvement in presenting the Gospel, meeting human needs and strengthening all bodies of Christian fellowship where Christ is the Head."

The total market value of the assets of the foundation at the end of 1992 was \$41,880,638, an increase of almost \$5.6 million over the end of 1991. Typically, assets are either held as endowments paying interest income in perpetuity to named Baptist causes, or they are held in trust with current income being paid to individuals and future income to be paid to Baptist causes in perpetuity. Additionally, the Foundation offers fund management for Baptist causes on a revocable basis.

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In 1992, and continuing into 1993, the Long Range Planning Committee of the Board of Directors met extensively to lay the groundwork for the

Foundation's goals and objectives for the next five years. The previous five years were quite successful with ambitious financial goals being met early on. It is anticipated that the Board's work in evaluating the past and present status and in laying a road map for the future will result in exciting times ahead.

The staff of the Foundation consists of seven full time employees and two persons who provide part-time service in accounting and legal services. The office is located in Cary next to the Baptist State Convention building. Visitors are welcome and are encouraged to stop by for professional assistance or just to say hello.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL OF NORTH CAROLINA REPORT

Founded in 1922, Baptist Hospital is a missionary enterprise of the Baptist churches of North Carolina. The essence of our purpose is to carry out a ministry of healing as taught by Jesus Christ. We remain as fully committed to this mission as were our founding fathers. In the midst of changing health-care norms, we have not, nor will we, deviate from this mission. The following paragraphs report, not only basic facts, but various results of how we have sought in the last year to remain true to our heritage while providing quality health care at affordable prices.

Our healing team now consists of 5,852 employees. The Medical Center (NCBH and BGSMB) personnel total employment is fast approaching 9,000 people making us the second largest employer in Forsyth County. In our 806-bed facility, we had 23,247 inpatient admissions. Our Outpatient Department, physicians' clinics, and other related departments received 490,667 patient visits.

Our chaplaincy division, joined with our health-care professionals, provide spiritual and emotional healing. With 15-40 chaplains present at various times, 52,945 ministries were provided to patients, families, staff and groups.

A new department of our Pastoral Care program named the Center for Congregational Health was given birth. Its purpose is to (1) train intentional interim pastors; (2) train church leaders; (3) provide a minister's assessment program; (4) establish a Minister's Help Line providing an opportunity for

church leaders to receive guidance via a telephone call. The Pastoral Counseling Division opened a new counseling center in Wilmington bringing our total counseling centers to 11 across the state. The center provided 16,205 counseling sessions.

POINTS OF EXCELLENCE

- (1) The Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations ranks Baptist Hospital in the top 9% of all hospitals in the nation.
- (2) We performed our first pancreas transplant and first double organ transplant (pancreas and kidney) this year.
- (3) We are one of only 26 comprehensive cancer care centers in the nation, treating more cancer patients than any hospital from Baltimore, Md. to Atlanta, Ga.
- (4) Quality infant through adolescence care in our Brenner Children's Hospital.
- (5) Our neonatal transport team is the largest in North Carolina and one of the 10 largest in the U.S.
- (6) Our Level I (highest awarded) Trauma Center has 21,000 admissions a year.

Last year Baptists across our state gave \$422,000 to our annual Mother's Day Offering. All of these monies went toward relieving the financial burden of scores of former patients who have little or no health-care insurance and no financial means to pay their hospital bills. The churches and individuals help make this ministry possible and we are grateful.

In conclusion, it is readily seen that this healing ministry that we share together says to our patients and their families: "We care about your health-care needs, your spiritual and emotional needs, and your financial burdens, and we express our caring through service."

In 1993, North Carolina reached place number ten among all the states in the United States in regard to the size of its adult population over the age of sixty-five

That one-half of all the people who have ever lived to be sixty-five are now living

The fastest growing segment of North Carolina Baptist life is composed of those adults eighty-five and older and that by the year 200 that age category will double in size

That by the year 1996 North Carolina's "Baby Boomers" will be turning fifty-five every 18 seconds

That by the year 2010 one out of every two people living in North Carolina will be fifty years of age or older?

They point to the fact that one of the greatest needs facing our Convention as we move into the year 2000 is the provision of quality, affordable long-term care services to functionally impaired Older Adults through the expansion of existing long-term care facilities, and through the development of creative approaches to long-term care such as rural home health services, community day care programs, and respite programs for homebound care providers.

In an attempt to meet the above mentioned need, Baptist Retirement Homes of North Carolina, Inc. in 1993:

Opened the Rickman Nursing Care Center in Asheville, North Carolina (a 100 bed Medicaid certified nursing care facility). The Rickman Center is a state-of-the-art long-term care facility that has been developed to meet the needs of the poor elderly in Western North Carolina. (80% of the resident population will be recipients of benevolent funding).

Renovated the Albemarle Baptist Home in Stanly Baptist Association and renamed it the Taylor House. The Taylor House has no financial requirements for admission and is designed to provide care to the assisted living level of care resident, regardless of his/her ability to pay for the long-term care services provided.

Developed a new addition to the Brookridge Health Care Unit in Winston-Salem in order to provide an area for small group work with residents suffering from dementia. This state-of-the-art

program will enable Baptist Retirement Homes' staff to improve the quality of life experienced by members of its resident community who are mentally impaired.

Baptist Retirement Homes is keenly aware of the fact that without the support of North Carolina Baptists none of the above would have been possible. As a result of the prayers and funding that the "Homes" receives through the Cooperative Program and the North Carolina Offering For Older Adults, it has been able to offer hope to many Older Adults whose future would have been uncertain without the caring involvement of North Carolina Baptists. It is because of you that our institution has been able to make life for many Older Adults in 1993. . . The Best of Times. Thank you North Carolina Baptist for your support!

PROCEEDINGS

1. Bob Lowman, Sherrill German, David Whipple and Thomas Hinton, members of the Caldwell Brass, gave the call to worship as messengers and visitors gathered at the Clark's Chapel Baptist Church for their Winter Quarterly Meeting.
2. Lou Harlow, Minister of Education at the College Avenue Church, read scripture and led in prayer.
3. Jack Sprinkle, Pastor of the host church, welcomed those present.
4. Moderator, Joel Sellers, called the meeting to order, asked for the adoption of the program and recognized first-time messengers and visitors.
5. Director of Missions, Dale Fisher, recognized new pastors and staff. Those present were Steve Parker, Pastor of the Hartland Baptist Church and Lou Harlow, Minister of Education for the College Avenue Baptist Church.
6. Parks Underdown, Minister of Music for the host church, led the congregation as they sang "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name".
7. The Disaster Relief Committee presented the following suggested policies to the messengers for their approval. Permission was requested of the messengers to allow the committee to make minor changes as needed. The policies were approved by the messengers.

I. DISASTER RELIEF COMMITTEE:

- A. The Disaster Relief Committee is a subgroup of the Brotherhood Council of the Caldwell Baptist Association, Inc.
- B. The committee is enlisted by the Brotherhood Director and approved for service annually by the Associational Messengers upon recommendation of the Nominating Committee. Committee members may be reelected indefinitely.
- C. The committee is responsible for the coordination of all disaster relief services of the association and for the operation of the Caldwell Baptist Disaster Relief Trailer.
- D. The Brotherhood Director and Director of Missions are ex-officio members of the committee with full voting rights.

II. DISASTER RELIEF TRAILER:

- A. Only trained Caldwell Baptist Disaster Relief Volunteers or designees of the Disaster Relief Committee can operate the trailer.
- B. The trailer will be available for service in Alexander, Alleghany, Ashe, Avery, Burke, Caldwell, Catawba, Cleveland, Elkin, Gaston, Lincoln, McDowell, Polk, Rutherford, Surry, Watauga, Wilkes and Yadkin Counties in North Carolina. These counties constitute regions seven and eight of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.
- C. Upon approval of the Disaster Relief Committee, the trailer may be used outside the established area listed above.
- D. The trailer will be operated for disaster relief service only upon request by the American Red Cross or North Carolina Baptist Men. It may be used for non-disaster related events at the discretion of the committee.
- E. The American Red Cross will supply the food to be prepared by disaster relief volunteers working out of the trailer. The trailer is not a food storage unit.

- F. Only drivers approved by the committee will be allowed to pull or operate the trailer. This must be done with a properly equipped vehicle.
 - 1. Each driver is responsible for a "pre-trip inspection" before moving the trailer.
 - 2. The owner of the tow vehicle will be reimbursed 30 cents per mile for pulling the trailer.
- G. The Properties Committee is responsible for the general maintenance of the trailer, while the Disaster Relief Committee is responsible for the contents and general operation.
- H. The Properties Committee in cooperation with the Disaster Relief Committee will request money to be budgeted by the Finance Committee each year for the maintenance of the trailer. The Brotherhood Council will request money to be budgeted by the Finance Committee for special uses of the trailer, for training volunteers and general disaster relief services.
- I. The trailer is currently being stored at the Mount Zion Baptist Church in Sawmills.

III. DISASTER RELIEF VOLUNTEERS:

- A. To be a disaster relief volunteer for the Caldwell Baptist Association, Inc. each person must successfully complete two courses of training provided by the American Red Cross, entitled "Introduction to Disaster Services" and "Mass Feeding". Without this training, a person is not eligible to serve as a disaster relief volunteer for the association or the Red Cross.
- B. Each Caldwell Baptist Volunteer, upon completion of the necessary training, will be given (at no charge) one cap and one T-shirt with the Southern Baptist disaster relief logo and name of the association. Volunteers must purchase additional caps (\$5.00 each) or shirts (\$6.00 each).

1. Disaster Relief jackets are also available to volunteers (\$15.00 each). No one is entitled to a free jacket.
 2. The caps, T-shirts and jackets bearing the name of the association are available only for Caldwell Baptists who have been trained by the American Red Cross for disaster relief service as volunteers on the Caldwell Baptist Disaster Relief Trailer. No one else is eligible to receive or to wear one of these items.
 3. All persons (Baptist or non-Baptist) who have been trained by the American Red Cross in disaster relief volunteer service can purchase American Red Cross caps, T-shirts and jackets, which can be ordered through the local chapter.
8. The Membership Committee recommended a year ago that the Blue Ridge Baptist Church be accepted under the watchcare of the Caldwell Baptist Association. This period was to last for at least one year. With the expiration of this year the committee has considered this church and its participation in associational activities and financial support. We are happy to report that the members of the Blue Ridge Church have been active and supportive of mission causes; therefore, it is recommended by the Membership Committee that this church be accepted into full membership of the Caldwell Baptist Association. This recommendation was approved by the messengers.
9. The Nominating Committee presented for approval their list of the 1993-94 Associational Program Council Directors. The following list presented by the committee was approved by the messengers.

He offered the services of the Associational Brotherhood Council to help any church that might need help in starting a Brotherhood Program or help in strengthening their existing program. He expressed that through the Brotherhood Program a church can help its men and boys create a deeper commitment to missions.
13. Marlene Alexander, Home Missions Promotion and Projects Director, introduced the plans for the 1993 Home Mission Trip. This year mission volunteers from Caldwell Association will travel to Watertown, New York. While there they will be working with two churches and on the Ft. Drum military base. They will be doing Backyard Bible Clubs on the military base and leading Leadership Training Events for the workers of the two churches.
14. Personal Evangelism Director, John Barnhardt, gave a report of the

Personal Evangelism Workshop sponsored by the Associational Evangelism Council. The workshop for the adults was led by Richard Everett, former Personal Evangelism Director for the North Carolina Baptist State Convention, and for the youth by Mike Isaacs, Associate Pastor of the First Baptist Church of Hudson. There were 218 persons present with 22 churches represented.

15. Dolores Leftwich, Prayer Program Director, informed the messengers that this year the council is sponsoring a first Sunday Prayer Meeting each month in a different district of the association. She also reminded the messengers that on August 27-28, Dr. Jack Taylor, will lead a Prayer Conference for the association.
16. Joann Propst, Chairman of the World Missions Conference Steering Committee, reported that plans are well underway for that event which will take place on March 28-April 4, 1993. The following twenty-eight churches will be participating in the World Missions Conference: Baton, Buffalo Cove, Center Grove, Clark's Chapel, Clover, College Avenue, Dudley Shoals, Flemings Chapel, Friendship, Hartland, Hudson First, Kings Creek, Lakeview, Lower Creek, Meadowbrook, Miller Hill, Mount Carmel, Mount Zion, North Catawba, Pooveys Chapel, Pooveys Grove, Rhodhiss First, Rocky Springs, Setzer Creek, Temple Hill, Union, Whitnel First and Yadkin. Following Ms. Propst report, Dale Fisher, led in a special time of prayer for the World Missions Conference.
17. The congregation, led by Parks Underdown, sang "Set My Soul Afire".
18. Home Mission Board Representative, Gwyn Warren, brought a report from that board. She reported that in 1992 there were 4,868 home missionary personnel and that in 1991 there were some 70,000 home mission volunteers. She reminded messengers that March 7-14 has been set as the Week of Prayer for Homes Missions.
19. Musical selections were played by the Caldwell Brass.
20. State Missions Promotion and Projects Director, Floyd Annas recognized those who would be participating in the 1993 Caldwell Work Week at Ft. Caswell. This years volunteers are Boyd and Kathryn Cloer from the Baton Church, Curtis Powell from Dry Ponds, Zeno Hames from Lower Creek, Fred and Ruby Mitchum and Tom and Louise Calloway from Center Grove, and Earl and Johnsie

Woods, R.B. and Virginia Miller, Floyd and Theresa Annas, Walter Callis, Phil Turnmire, Keith Moore, Dale Fisher and Joe Icard all from the Mount Zion Church.

21. Marsha Marshall, a member of the Clarks Chapel Church, sang a solo before the featured speaker brought her message.
22. Hilda Cowsert, retired Southern Baptist missionary to Brazil, was the featured speaker. The theme of the meeting "Missions Involves Prayer" was her topic. She spoke on the importance of prayer in our lives. We were reminded to hold our nation and its leaders along with missionaries up in prayer daily. Ms. Cowsert said praying for one another is something all Christians can do regardless of where they are or their circumstances.
23. Moderator Sellers, adjourned the 1993 Winter Quarterly Meeting and David Whipple, Minister of Music for the College Avenue Church, gave the benediction.

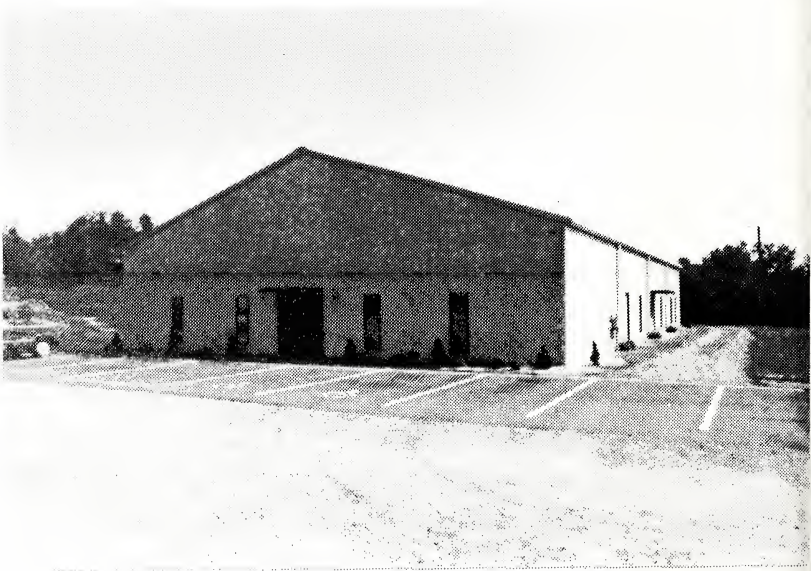

**Calendar of Activities
Caldwell Baptist Association, Inc.**

October 1, 1993-September 30, 1994

A major responsibility of the Associational Council is to prepare an annual Calendar of Activities for the association and to present it to the messengers for consideration during their Summer Quarterly Meeting. It takes several months of work each year, involving many people, to accomplish this task.

The Calendar of Activities, upon approval of the messengers, will guide the work of the association from October 1, 1993 through September 30, 1994. Tentative dates for October 1-December 31, 1994 are also included.

A new addition to the calendar is a listing of "Association Program Events to Assist Caldwell Baptist Churches". This should be a valuable resource for leaders wanting to know what helps are available for a particular program.

The Associational Council recommends:

1. That the 1993-94 Calendar of Activities for the Caldwell Baptist Association, Incorporated be approved by the messengers as presented.
 2. That permission be given to the Associational Council and to the associational staff to make necessary changes to the calendar as needed.
 3. That the associational goals for the 1993-94 Special Offerings be approved as printed on page 19 of the Calendar of Activities.
- d. Doug Clark, member of the Nominating Committee, brought the recommendation from his committee for the 1993-94 Associational Leadership. The list of the 1993-94 Associational Leadership was listed in the Summer Quarterly Book of Reports and will be

included in its entirety in the 1993 Annual Minutes. All listed nominees were approved.

e. PROPERTIES COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS

**Lewis Miller, Chairman
Mount Zion Baptist Church**

No. 1 - The Properties Committee recommends that the Caldwell Baptist Association purchase a Risograph Digital Duplicator at a cost of \$10,500.00 for the Baptist Center. This is a high speed machine, printing as many as 120 copies per minute for as little as 1/3 to 1/2 cent per copy. The life expectancy is 10 million copies.

This machine, along with our current copier, would allow the association to do almost all of its printing needs within the Baptist Center, excluding the Annual Minutes. It would lengthen the life of our current copier and greatly reduce the maintenance cost that we currently pay. Printing of envelopes, letterheads, the newsletter, cards and so on can be done on this machine.

It has been estimated that the association will save \$4,348.64 per year in printing costs by using the Risograph machine. This means that the machine would pay for itself in 2 1/2 years.

It is recommended that the machine be purchased immediately using money from our savings. The Finance Committee has approved this plan.

No. 2 - The Properties Committee, along with the Board of Directors and the Finance Committee, jointly recommend that the Caldwell Baptist Association sell the Caldwell Cottage at Ridgecrest. It is further recommended that the Board of Directors be given permission by the Messengers to sell the property for the best possible price to a suitable buyer at the earliest possible date. In addition, it is recommended that the Board of Directors be free to deal with the necessary business and legal matters involved in such a sell in accordance with the Associational Bylaws. The Finance Committee, at the appropriate time, would recommend to the Messengers how the proceeds from the sell would be used.

Caldwell Cottage has been owned by the Association for over fifty years. It has been a good retreat setting for many people. Unfortunately, interest in the cottage has diminished in recent years while maintenance costs have increased. The cottage sits empty most of the time with few of our churches making reservations to use it. With these thoughts in mind, the Board of Directors, the Finance Committee and the Properties Committee believe that the time has come to sell the cottage.

f. **DISASTER RELIEF COMMITTEE
RECOMMENDATIONS**

**Hovis Allen, Chairman
First Baptist Church of Hudson**

Recommendation presented by Committee Member Roger Goble

When Hurricane Hugo hit Caldwell County in 1989, several Caldwell Baptists began to realize that our association was not organized or equipped to assist our county in dealing with disasters. As a result, a Disaster Relief Committee was organized in 1990, as a sub-group of the Associational Brotherhood Council. It was developed to educate and involve Caldwell Baptists in disaster relief efforts.

In 1991, the committee recommended the purchase of a trailer to be used as a disaster relief unit, which the messengers approved. The purpose of the trailer is to assist emergency personnel and disaster victims during times of crisis caused by such events as forest fires, earthquakes, tornadoes and floods. This is accomplished mainly by serving hot food and refreshments at the disaster scene. The committee works closely with the American Red Cross and North Carolina Baptist Men.

Now in 1993, the committee feels there is a need for a vehicle to pull the trailer. To this point, a couple of persons have donated their time and trucks.

For several years there has been talk about purchasing a van to transport people on mission trips, to meetings, workshops and a variety of outings. It is the desire of the committee to secure a vehicle that would be a multipurpose vehicle to meet all of the above needs.

Therefore, the Disaster Relief Committee, along with the Board of Directors, Finance Committee and Properties Committee, jointly recommend that the Caldwell Baptist Association purchase a new one-ton, heavy-duty, 15 passenger van for a price of \$20,000 - \$25,000 from a reputable dealer where the best possible deal can be found. In addition, it is requested that the Board of Directors be free to make the purchase as soon as possible and to deal with the necessary business and legal matters involved with such a purchase.

It is further recommended by the Finance Committee that \$5,000 be paid from current savings as a downpayment for the van and the balance be financed. In addition, it is requested that permission be given to the Finance Committee and the Board of Directors to find the best possible financing plan and to carry out the necessary business and legal matters to secure the loan.

g. FINANCE COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS

**Alvin Daughtridge, Chairman
Kings Creek Baptist Church**

Recommendation presented by Director of Missions Dale Fisher

No. 1 - The Finance Committee recommends approval of the 1993-94 Ministry Budget as printed in the Summer Quarterly Book of Reports. This Budget will also be in the 1993 Annual Minutes.

No. 2 - In accordance with Internal Revenue Service requirements, the following policy statement is recommended for approval by the Messengers.

**REIMBURSEMENT POLICY
FOR EMPLOYEE BUSINESS EXPENSES**

Caldwell Baptist Association, Inc.

In addition to the salary provided our employees, we will reimburse them for auto travel and professional expenses considered ordinary and necessary for them to carry out their duties as provided in the association's annual budget. Auto expense will be based upon the current government mileage allowance.

If actual expenses are less than the budgeted amounts, employees cannot be given the difference as a bonus or salary. If actual expenses are greater than the budgeted amounts, the Finance Committee is authorized to decide whether or not to reimburse the employee for the extra amount.

Each employee seeking reimbursement is required to submit a monthly reimbursement voucher showing business expenses. Receipts are to accompany the voucher. At the first of each month, the voucher and receipts are to be reviewed by the Financial Secretary and Treasurer. The records should be kept for at least four years by the association.

This policy reflects the practice that has been followed for the last few years by the association. However, it is necessary in accordance with I.R.S. requirements to have the policy in writing and approved by our governing body, the Messengers.

No. 3 - The Finance Committee requests permission from the Messengers to secure a "Visa Business Card" from First Union National Bank, where the association does business, and to complete the necessary forms to get the card. The card would be used by the Director of Missions for business/ministry expenses related to the association. The card would be in the name of the association and tied to the association's bank account. The association would be billed directly, with the Financial Secretary and Treasurer overseeing the use of the card.

The only cost of the card would be an annual fee of twenty dollars. Since it is a business card there would be no finance charges because the bill must be paid in full each month.

Benefits of the card would be in making reservations for lodging and car rentals, which normally require a credit card. The card automatically covers auto rental collision insurance which would save the association money. Also, it would provide a clear monthly statement of all expenses. It would eliminate the need to carry associational checks or large sums of money on mission and business trips.

11. During the period for miscellaneous business and announcements, Dale Fisher requested that each person present remember the flood victims

in the mid-west in prayer. He also suggested that a recommendation from the body stating that the association sponsor an account for the flood victims would be in order. Churches and individuals would be able to contribute to this account and the association would pass it on to the flood victims. Doug Jordan, member of the Lower Creek Baptist Church, made the formal recommendation that such an account be established. His recommendation was seconded and approved by the messengers.

12. Short reports from the following associational councils were given as information:
 - a. Lynn Parsons, Pastor of the Harris Chapel Baptist Church, encouraged everyone to plan to be a part of the "1993 Parade for the Hungry", which will be sponsored by the Christian Life Council. He asked Joel Sellers to lead in prayer and to pray specifically for the moral concerns which our nation faces today.
 - b. Media Library Director, Bobbi Watson and Associational Librarian, Judy Brittain entertained those present with a skit promoting the Associational Media Library. Messengers were informed that a book listing all videos owned by the association has been created and is available to anyone who would like a copy.
 - c. Marlene Alexander, Home Missions Promotion and Projects Director, gave highlights from the association's 1993 Home Mission Trip to Watertown, New York. There were 41 mission volunteers from 14 churches in the Caldwell Association who participated in this year's trip.
 - d. Dale Fisher gave plans for the 1993-94 Seminary Extension classes, which will be offered by the association, on behalf of Wayne Bumgardner, Seminary Extension Council Director. The class beginning on August 31, 1993 will be the "History of Christianity". Beginning in 1994 simultaneous classes will be offered in both the Spring and Fall.
13. Bob Lowman, Chairman of the Associational Meetings Committee, introduced the program personalities. They were Dr. Alice Cullinan from the Gardner-Webb School of Divinity and Dr. J.W. Hutchens, Director of Church Growth and Evangelism, from the Home Mission Board.

14. Dr. Cullinan brought greetings from Gardner-Webb University and explained the School of Divinity program which Gardner-Webb is currently developing.
15. Dawn Fox, member of the New Life Baptist Church, sang "Each One, Reach One" for the special music.
16. Featured speaker for the program, Dr. J.W. Hutchens, brought greetings from the Home Mission Board. He used the theme of the Summer Quarterly Meeting, "Missions Involves Going", as his topic. He shared scripture from I Peter 3:15 and gave an inspiring sermon urging each person to be on mission for Christ in his setting. He emphasized that missions does not begin in our churches or association but with each individual.
17. Moderator Sellers adjourned the Summer Quarterly Meeting. This was the final meeting at which Rev. Sellers would serve as Moderator. He had words of praise and gratitude for the association. Don Ingle, Pastor of the Dudley Shoals Baptist Church, gave the benediction.

RECOMMENDATION NUMBER ONE

Members of the Membership Committee met with members of the group on September 2, 1993 to discuss their request. Also, members met with the group on Sunday, October 10 when the fellowship constituted as a church.

The church is currently meeting for study and worship in the Livingston Camper Center on Highway 18 in Gamewell. Rev. Ralph Staton is their pastor.

The Membership Committee feels that the church genuinely wants to be a Southern Baptist Church. Therefore, the committee recommends that the messengers allow the Gethsemane Baptist Church to come under the "watchcare" of the association.

RECOMMENDATION NUMBER TWO

The Providence Baptist Fellowship has requested membership in the Caldwell Baptist Association. Members of the Membership Committee met with members of the group on October 11, 1993 to discuss their request.

The group is currently meeting in a building next to Price Realty on Hibriten Drive in Lenoir. A service to constitute the fellowship into a church is scheduled for November 7, 1993 at 3:00 p.m. Rev. Dwight Rice is the pastor.

The Membership Committee feels that the group genuinely wants to be a Southern Baptist Church. Therefore, the committee recommends that the messengers allow the Providence Baptist Fellowship to come under the "watchcare" of the association.

- b. Missions Development Council Recommendations: Mrs. Joann Propst, Director, First Baptist Church of Rhodhiss.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 1: Caldwell Memorial Hospital

The Missions Development Council Recommends that the Caldwell Baptist Association begin, in the near future, an ongoing ministry with the Caldwell Memorial Hospital in Lenoir, providing weekly Bible study for patients, family members and others in the Restorative Care Unit. The ministry would be coordinated through the chaplaincy program at the hospital.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 2: Chinese Project

Plans are underway to construct a Chinese Baptist Church in Charlotte during 1994. This project would be similar to the Brunswick Islands Baptist Church project. The Missions Development Council recommends that the association participate in this effort.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 3: Mundo Vista

A renovation project has been planned for Mundo Vista, the state Baptist camp for girls in Asheboro. The Missions Development Council recommends that Caldwell Baptists participate in this project.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 4 New York

A very successful mission project was conducted in Watertown and Carthage, New York this past summer. Home Missionary Art Graves has requested that we come back to Watertown in 1994. The Mission Development Council recommends that the association sponsor another mission project in Watertown, New York, July 16-23, 1994.

9. This is the third year the committee has sponsored this project, and it continues to grow. More churches than ever participated this year by using the bulletin insert.

The committee did hold one meeting with representatives of the Finance Committee to discuss ways of increasing awareness of the association and what it offers churches.

In addition, the committee began preliminary work on a general information brochure about the association. Committee members brainstormed about what type of information should be covered, talked about costs and graphic design as well as resources and contacts within the churches.

The committee did not reach its goal of producing a brochure this year. However, this remains an important project, and it is hoped that next year's committee will be able to accomplish this work.

DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS REPORT

**Rev. R. Dale Fisher, Director of Missions
Mount Zion Baptist Church**

The purpose of the Caldwell Baptist Association is "to assist member churches in fulfilling the Great Commission of Christ through fellowship, education and mission involvement". As a "family of seventy-two Southern Baptist Churches" we have honored our purpose this past year.

FELLOWSHIP

It has been a pleasure for me to visit in every church this year at least once. This is an annual goal that I have set for myself. Through these visits, I get to experience first-hand the Christian fellowship of Caldwell Baptists. The

churches always make me feel welcomed. Some even say, "He's no longer a visitor, but one of us." I am grateful for many opportunities this year to preach, teach and help with special requests in the churches.

Many of the churches have experienced growth spiritually and numerically this year. It has been a good year for them and we celebrate the achievements. Others have been in transition with changes in pastoral leadership. Unfortunately, some have been in conflict. As requested, I have helped churches in their search for pastors and staff and tried to assist those in conflict.

Two new groups have formed this year with the objective of becoming active Southern Baptist Churches. These groups are known as the Gethsemane and Providence Baptist Fellowships. Gethsemane will constitute as a church on October 10, 1993 and Providence will constitute on November 7, 1993. Both groups have requested membership in the association. The Membership Committee and I have worked very closely with each of them.

The association has eight fellowship groups. Their purpose is to provide a setting for particular groups to meet together for fellowship, dialogue, encouragement and mutual care. The Ministers Conference is the most active and well attended with monthly meetings. The others meet quarterly or twice a year. The most exciting time of fellowship for me this year was the Ministers and Wives Quarterly Fellowship on February 15, 1993. This group's planning committee put together a delightful program which included a ministers and wives appreciation dinner. It was at this function that we learned how to keep the "tingles" in each of our marriages.

EDUCATION

Training is essential in an ever changing society. This association has fifteen Mission Performance Programs which are led by directors and coordinated through councils. These councils have planned and conducted county-wide leadership conferences and a host of special meetings this year to better educate Caldwell Baptists on the work of God's Kingdom. In addition, several associational leaders have been invited to conduct conferences in individual churches.

Caldwell Baptists have a great association. The work is very well organized and efficient. However, many of our church members know the association in name only. They understand very little about why it exists and why they

belong to it. Unfortunately, this is the situation all across the Southern Baptist Convention. I am concerned that Southern Baptists are losing sight of their identity and reason for being. There is very little interest these days in Baptist history, polity or denominational loyalty. Our churches need to spend more time educating members on who we are and what we do.

Because of these concerns, steps are currently underway to better educate our church members and our county on the identity and work of Caldwell Baptists. Keep people informed about your association. You are the association!

I am very pleased that the Baptist Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention has developed and launched the "True Love Waits" Campaign. This emphasis on sexual purity has crossed denominational lines and received unprecedented national media attention. Through this campaign we can educate and encourage children and youth on the value of sexual abstinence before marriage. In addition, this campaign can help our nation to better understand who we are and why we exist.

MISSION INVOLVEMENT

The Caldwell Baptist Association is a leader in mission involvement. FOREIGN MISSION BOARD REPORT

Mildred Roberts, Representative First Baptist Church of Whitnel

1992 proved to be another record-setting year for baptisms around the world: 251,901. This represents almost an 8% increase over the previous year. Another record setter: 1,606 churches were born in 1992, which represents a 5.8% increase. The total number of churches relating to Southern Baptist foreign missions was 32,797 at the end of 1992, which represents a growth of more than 17% in one year.

The Foreign Mission Board appointed 414 missionaries, bringing the total mission force to 3,893 serving in 129 countries and also assisted Christian outreach in another 27 countries. This is a cause for rejoicing; yet because of retirements, resignations, and completions of service, the total mission force at the end of 1992 was actually lower than 1991's ending total. Pray that many new missionaries will hear God's call in the coming years.

Southern Baptist representatives working with Cooperative Services International continued to move into areas where people have never heard the gospel of Jesus Christ. Results of their witness in 1992 include conversions in more than 20 people groups which previously had no believers.

A total of 11,343 Southern Baptist volunteers traveled on a short-term basis around the world to share their faith. These lay people worked alongside missionaries and overseas Baptists.

The Lottie Moon Christmas offering reached its highest total ever - more than \$81.4 million given for world evangelism and ministry. In 1992, more than \$69 million came to the Foreign Mission Board through the Cooperative Program, which has been the lifeblood of Southern Baptist mission work since 1925. This amount represents a decrease from Cooperative Program gifts in 1990 and 1991.

Southern Baptists responded to a hurting world with \$7.4 million for relief and hunger needs through the World Relief fund. More than \$1.5 million in relief was sent to aid the Somalis.

The ongoing work of the State Convention between sessions is undertaken by the General Board, which meets three times a year. The Board has supervision of all agencies and institutions of the Convention; however, it does not have the power to contravene any action of the Convention nor to launch a new institution.

The Board is composed of one member from each of the 79 associations, one additional member for each association with more than 20,000 members, and another additional member for any association with more than 40,000 members. The Caldwell Association is entitled to two Board members.

Members are elected in annual session of the Convention from a slate of names presented by the Nominating Committee. Board members serve four years with approximately one-fourth rotating off each year.

HISTORY COMMITTEE REPORT

First Baptist Church of Whitnel

The First Baptist Church of Whitnel was organized on April 24, 1910. Reverend I.W. Thomas and Reverend J.S. Gwaltney officiated at the organizational meeting. Reverend Thomas was elected Pastor.

Charter members were Clay Harrison, Sarah Deal, Kate Deal, Ella Jamison, John F. Barnett, Rossemah E. Smith, Robert M. Smith, J.K. Barber, Spurgeon Barber, Martha Barber, J.H. Johnson, Z.H. Johnson, Ida Lutz, Pearl Triplett and Grace Triplett.

The first clerk was Robert M. Smith, the first treasurer, Robert M. Smith; the first deacons, J.H. Johnson, J.R. Barber and Spurgeon Barber.

During the business meeting on July 24, 1910, the members voted unanimously to join themselves to the Caldwell County Baptist Association. J.H. Johnson, P.S. Barber and R.M. Smith were appointed delegates (from original minutes on page 34).

The first building was a one-room structure to which Sunday School classes were later added. It was located across the road from American-Efird Mills in Whitnel.

In 1925, under the leadership of Reverend T.E. Payne, a new building was erected. Services were held in the old Whitnel School building while the new building was being built.

In 1948, under the leadership of Reverend M.W. Stallings, the church erected the first parsonage (222 Whitnel Place).

Reverend Jyles Hall served the church as pastor from April 4, 1957 to May 1, 1965. Under Brother Hall's leadership, our present building was erected at 501 Connelly Springs Road. On March , 1959, the First Baptist Church of Whitnel moved into the present (educational) building. The first use of the new sanctuary was January 13, 1963.

Reverend Stuart Johnson was called as pastor on September 25, 1965. During his pastorate, additional property was purchased, the church library started, and a ball park and recreational area built. Also a new parsonage was bought at 531 Connelly Springs Road, and a full time Minister of Music and Education was called.

Reverend Haven Lowe served the church as pastor from June 30, 1970 to August 10, 1975. During this time, additional property was purchased and a bus ministry started.

On January 2, 1983, Reverend Stuart White came to the pastorate. The church voted to build a new parsonage in June, 1983. The parsonage is located at 1221 Connelly Springs Road and was dedicated on January 29, 1984. Reverend White served as pastor until February 1991.

Reverend Dwight Rice became pastor of First Baptist Church of Whitnel on August 1, 1991 and served until August 22, 1993.

Center Grove Baptist Church
Rev. Dan Redding, Pastor

Center Grove Baptist Church met on Saturday before the first Sunday in September 1912 to organize a Baptist church. The following presbytery was present: Mr. J.M. Harris, J.R. Annas, D.L. Miller, L.M. Annas and P.H. Icenhour, with Mr. J.L. Crump, J.R. Barber and L.G. Kirby, deacons of Sardis Baptist.

The church received by letter Mr. W.O. Bumgarner and wife Joanna, Sarah Bumgarner, Laura Mitcham, Hailey Harris, A.P. Harris and wife Catherine, Julia and Dovie Mitcham, J.R. Smith and wife Margaret. The church was then turned over to these capable members. These members adopted the Hissax Standard Manual and then received the following who had been baptized into the fellowship: Mr. A.J. Bumgarner and wife Martha, L.L. Bumgarner, Anna Barer, Joe Bumgarner and Maudie Goble.

Rev. J.M. Harris was unanimously called as pastor and four deacons were ordained. These were Joe Bumgarner, A.P. Harris, W.O. Bumgarner and A.J. Bumgarner.

Center Grove Baptist Church was organized in the school house, near the present church in the year 1912. The school was used until 1918 when the frame structure was erected: it served until 1950 when the present structure was erected. The educational building was erected in 1959.

Center Grove Baptist Church Mission was organized in June 1959 in a dwelling house near the present church. On July 2, 1961 the Mission had its first service in the new building (now Mount Carmel Baptist Church). The new building consisted of an assembly and nine classrooms.

The Center Grove Parsonage was built in 1957. A new parsonage was built in 1977. In 1988 the church built a beautiful new Fellowship Hall that is located behind the sanctuary building.

Rev. J.M. Harris was organizer and first pastor of the Center Grove Baptist Church. Other faithful pastors have been the Reverends S.B. McCall, A.J. Setzer, J.R. Hagerman, W.B. Bryant, L.G. Curtis, Orville Icard, C.W. Colvard, E.R. Teague, C.R. McFelia, Ray Davis, Paul Morrow, Riley Huckaby, Dwight Watts, Sr., Charles Lethcoe, John Madison, and Mickey Moree. The present pastor is the Reverend Dan Redding.

HOME MISSION BOARD REPORT

Gwyn Warren, Representative Hartland Baptist Church

The Home Mission Board (HMB) is a missionary-sending agency of the Southern Baptist Convention (SBC). Headquartered in Atlanta, Georgia, the HMB's purpose is to serve Southern Baptists by assisting churches to proclaim the gospel of Jesus Christ, start and grow New Testament congregations, and minister to people in the name of Christ.

At the end of last year, 4,868 missions personnel were serving in the United States, the Caribbean, American Samoa, and Canada. The HMB also had endorsed more than 2,200 chaplains who were serving in healthcare agencies, institutions, businesses, the military, and pastoral-care roles. More than 2,400 Mission Service Corps volunteers were serving on home mission fields. During the year there were 367,847 baptisms and 1,281 church starts.

Approximately half the HMB support comes from individual SBC churches through the annual Annie Armstrong Easter Offering for Home Missions. In 1992, gifts to the offering totaled \$37.61 million, up almost 6 percent from the 1991 total. One hundred percent of the offering goes to support the work of home missionaries in the field. The 1993 Annie Armstrong Easter Offering goal is \$38 million. About 36 percent of the HMB's income comes from the denomination's Cooperative Program.

Home missions is a partnership of the HMB, state conventions, associations, and churches. The HMB's strategy is to help start churches, ministry endeavors, and evangelism efforts that will grow to self-support or be carried on by local churches or associations.

The following is a summary of program/support ministry highlights from 1992:

Chaplaincy Ministries -- The 2,293 Southern Baptists now serving as chaplains and pastoral counselors reported 24,000 professions of faith and 4,600 baptisms.

Alternatives to Abortion -- Workers in 23 crisis pregnancy centers received training from the HMB. As a result of the ministry of these centers, 2,164 babies were born and 832 women found faith in Christ.

Church Loans -- More than 1,100 churches had active loans totaling \$115 million. These loans purchased, refinanced, remodeled, or constructed 106 buildings and purchased 9 building sites.

Language Missions -- Home missionaries and pastors in the Language Church Extension Division serve among 102 ethnic groups using 98 languages and dialects.

Personal Evangelism -- During the Southern Baptist Convention in Indianapolis, 1,353 volunteers canvassed 45,235 residences, conducted a religious survey, and shared the gospel with 2,905 individuals, 361 of whom made professions of faith.

Prayer and Spiritual Awakening -- A national team began efforts to enhance effective prayer and revival ministries in churches. The Intercessory Prayerline grew from 7,500 calls in 1985 to 130,000 last year.

Special Ministries -- Southern Baptists minister to seamen in 37 port cities and 200 missionaries are involved in ministries related to college students, resorts, special events, and diplomats.

MEDIA/LIBRARY COUNCIL REPORT

The Southern Baptist Convention celebrated the fiftieth anniversary of the Church Media Library Department this year. Many of the churches in our own association have celebrated many years of dedicated service to their church congregations. Our own TACMO (The Association Church Media/Library Organization) has grown from nine in attendance from eight churches at our quarterly meetings in 1984 to an average of twenty in attendance from sixteen churches in 1993. Our goals are still the same. We strive to provide Christian materials for all our members, to advance learning about God's work and stimulate Christian growth. We want to stretch the minds and spiritual upreach for the believers using our libraries. This is the real business of our church libraries.

Our media/library group has met regularly this year for training and fellowship. We met quarterly at Center Grove, Miller Hill, Friendship and Lenoir First. We have had an average of twenty present from sixteen churches. Five of us attended Library Week at Ridgecrest for one day. I attended Key Leadership at Ridgecrest in May.

We are encouraged by the work being done at the Baptist Center Library by Judy Brittain. She has programmed on the computer the video collection and made available a printed booklet to all our churches. These videos are listed by subject and this booklet is a valuable tool for use by the churches.

The collection continues to grow. Judy Brittain and I were privileged to give a report on the media/library and the TACMO group to the messengers at our quarterly associational meeting in July.

The First Baptist Church of Hudson has become our first church to put their entire library collection on computer. We had a demonstration of that system in August to our church librarians. We feel that other churches will be following their example.

We are always being challenged to reach out to include other churches that are not currently participating in our organization. We feel that we have a valuable service to share. We have many trained resource people who would be glad to help.

MISSIONS DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL RECOMMENDATIONS

RECOMMENDATION NO. 1: Caldwell Memorial Hospital

The Missions Development Council Recommends that the Caldwell Baptist Association begin, in the near future, an ongoing ministry with the Caldwell Memorial Hospital in Lenoir, providing weekly Bible study for patients, family members and others in the Restorative Care Unit. The ministry would be coordinated through the chaplaincy program at the hospital.

PASTORAL MINISTRIES COUNCIL REPORT

During the 1992-93 Associational Year, the Properties Committee met on October 8, 1992, June 7, 1993 and September 13, 1993. In addition, the committee met jointly with the Board of Directors, Disaster Relief Committee and Finance Committee on June 10 and August 26, 1993.

On October 8, the committee discussed the purchase of a plaque honoring Elizabeth J. Campbell, retired Director of Missions for Caldwell Association. The committee had been informed that on August 24, 1980, the Executive Committee had approved a recommendation from the Missions Committee that a plaque be purchased and placed in the Baptist Center honoring Miss Campbell. For whatever reason, the action had never been fulfilled. A plaque was ordered by the Properties Committee, presented to Miss Campbell during the Spring Quarterly Meeting of the Messengers, and mounted in the Conference Room at the Baptist Center.

Also, on October 8, the committee planned a work day on November 14, 1992 at Caldwell Cottage. On that day, eight people dug ditches behind the building to deal with a continuing water problem and carried out general maintenance. It was further decided to take action to dispose of Caldwell Cottage because of lack of use and continuing maintenance problems.

The committee also decided to move the office for the Financial Secretary from the Mailing Room to the old office of the Church Development Director. This action was carried out.

On June 7, 1993, the committee discussed the purchase of a Risograph Digital Duplicator, laser printer and computer for the Baptist Center. It was decided to seal the parking area in front of the building and to re-strip the parking places. The properties section for the 1993-94 Ministry Budget was prepared which included money for doing the above items, except for the Risograph.

On June 10, the committee met jointly with the Board of Directors, Disaster Relief Committee and Finance Committee to request that the Risograph Machine be purchased this year, to discuss selling the cottage and to purchase a van. The group voted to present these items to the messengers during their Summer Quarterly Meeting. On July 22, the messengers approved the immediate purchase of the Risograph Digital Duplicator using current funds. In addition, the messengers approved the purchase of a van and the sale of the cottage.

On August 26 the Properties Committee met again with the other groups to proceed with the purchase of the van and sale of the cottage. Subcommittees were appointed to carry out the work and to report back to the board and committees.

On September 13, the final meeting of the year for the Properties Committee was held. Items discussed and actions taken at this meeting were a security light and a handicap parking space for the back parking area at the Baptist Center. In addition, plans for preparing policies on the use of the van were discussed.

CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS of the

CALDWELL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION, INCORPORATED

CONSTITUTION

Preamble

The Constitution has been established to identify and preserve the fundamental truths and basic beliefs of this association.

Article I: Name

The name of the corporation is the Caldwell Baptist Association, hereinafter referred to as "association."

Article II: Duration

On October 22, 1885, sixteen churches met at the Rocky Springs Baptist Church to organize the Caldwell Baptist Association. The duration of this association is perpetual.

Article III: Location

Section 1. The member churches of this association are located in and adjacent to Caldwell County, North Carolina.

Section 2. The Caldwell Baptist Center, located at 208 Nuway Circle Northeast, in Lenoir, North Carolina 28645, is recognized as the office headquarters of this association.

Article IV: Purpose Statement

We associate ourselves to assist member churches in fulfilling the Great Commission of Christ through fellowship, education and mission involvement.

Article V: Membership

The association is composed of cooperating Southern Baptist Churches which have been approved for membership by the associational messengers in accordance with the procedures described in the Bylaws.

Article VI: Authority

Section 1. This association is an autonomous body which is governed only by the duly elected messengers from the churches that compose it. Every messenger has the right to vote on all matters of business presented at any quarterly or called meeting of the association provided that messenger is present. Absentee voting is prohibited.

Section 2. This association may advise and assist member churches requested, but may not infringe upon the rights of these churches. This association recognizes each church as a self-governing body that has voluntarily decided to be affiliated with the association.

Article VII: Relationships

Section 1. This association is composed of member churches that govern and support it.

Section 2. All internal groups created and empowered by this association are only accountable to the association.

Section 3. The association voluntarily cooperates with and supports the North Carolina Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention.

Article VIII: Basic Beliefs

This association accepts the doctrinal statements of *The Baptist Faith and Message* as adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention in 1963. A copy of *The Baptist Faith and Message* is available for study in the Member Library of the Caldwell Baptist Center.

Article IX: Dissolution

The association may be dissolved by a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present at any quarterly meeting of the association, provided that the recommendation to dissolve was presented in written or typed form to the clerk and publicly stated to the messengers by the moderator or his designee at the preceding quarterly meeting of the association. Typed copies of the recommendation are to be furnished to the messengers of the association for study at least two weeks prior to the vote on the recommendation. Upon vote to dissolve, the assets of the association will be dissolved by the Board of Directors upon instruction of the messengers.

Article X: Amendments

This Constitution may be amended by a three-fourths majority vote of the messengers present at any quarterly meeting of the association, provided that the amendment was presented in written or typed form to the clerk and publicly stated to the messengers by the moderator or his designee at the preceding quarterly meeting of the association. Typed copies of the amendment are to be furnished to the current messengers of the association for study at least two weeks prior to the vote on the amendment.

BYLAWS

Preamble

These Bylaws have been established to identify and preserve procedural matters of this association and to govern this body in an orderly manner.

Article I: Administrative Policies

Section 1. The associational staff is responsible for scheduling the use of the Baptist Center in Lenoir and the Caldwell Cottage at Ridgecrest.

Section 2. Money is to be contributed to the Gideons by the association for the purchase of memorial Bibles upon the death of a pastor, staff minister, associational leader, or a close family member of a pastor, staff minister or associational leader.

Section 3. The Clerk, the Treasurer and the Director of Missions are authorized to have access to the association's safety deposit box located at the First Union National Bank on Main Street in Lenoir.

Article II: Associational Year

The Associational Year begins on October 1 and closes on September

Article III: Finances

Section 1. The fiscal year of the association begins on October 1 and closes on September 30.

Section 2. The Associational Budget for the upcoming year is to be formally presented by the Finance Committee for a vote by the messengers during the quarterly meeting of the association in July each year. In order to give the messengers adequate time to study the budget, the Finance Committee is to prepare and distribute copies of the budget to the messengers by the second Thursday of July each year. The budget becomes effective on October 1 annually. The Finance Committee is to maintain a budget format that corresponds with the organizational structure of the association.

Section 3. The treasurer is to present to the messengers a current financial report clearly showing all receipts and disbursements during each quarterly meeting of the association. During the quarterly meeting in October, an annual financial report is to be presented. The treasurer is to provide a monthly financial report in the associational newsletter including the contributions of each church in the association.

Section 4. The association maintains an ongoing "Ministers Support Fund" to temporarily assist associational pastors, church staff, retired ministers, other ministers and their immediate families during times of financial crises. The Finance Committee confidentially administers the fund, giving an annual report as to the number of persons assisted and the amount of money given.

Section 5. Each associational church is requested to contribute at least 4% of all undesignated receipts to the association.

Section 6. The association is a non-profit organization.

Article IV: Logos

Section 1. The association is to continually have a personalized logo that visually displays the identity and current work of this body.

Section 2. The association accepts and uses the logo of the Southern Baptist Convention to help identify who we are.

Article V: Meetings

Section 1. The messengers of the association meet quarterly to receive information and reports and to transact the business of the association. Th

meetings are held in October (Fall Meeting), January (Winter Meeting), April (Spring Meeting), and July (Summer Meeting). The meetings in January, April and July are night meetings which are held on the fourth Thursday of each month. The meeting in October is considered the Annual Meeting of the association and is conducted on the fourth Thursday and Friday of October.

The first session of the Annual Meeting is held on Thursday night. The second (final) session is conducted on Friday morning, concluding at lunch. The annual meeting is to be held in one church on Thursday and in another church on Friday. The association is responsible for providing lunch for the messengers on Friday. The association has the option of charging for the meal on a cost recovery basis, or may pay for the meal out of the associational budget.

Section 2. The Associational Meetings Committee is fully responsible for preparing the program, selecting and contacting program participants, and for choosing and preparing the location for each meeting. The location for each quarterly meeting is to be presented in the annual "Calendar of Activities" for the forthcoming year. The committee may ask the associational messengers to move a quarterly meeting to a date one week prior to or one week after a scheduled meeting date to avoid conflict with a major denominational emphasis date. The meetings are to be held in as many member churches as practically possible on a rotating basis.

Section 3. The Moderator or the Director of Missions can call the messengers together for special meetings to deal with extremely urgent matters that cannot wait until the next quarterly meeting. Before calling a special meeting to order, a notice of at least two weeks is to be given to the messengers with a clear explanation as to the purpose of the meeting. A quorum of fifty messengers must be present to conduct a special meeting.

Section 4. The Moderator may postpone and reschedule quarterly or special meetings of the associational messengers, in cooperation with the Director of Missions and the Associational Meetings Committee Chairman, in the event of inclement weather or other unforeseen crises.

Section 5. A quorum at each of the quarterly meetings of the association consists of those messengers who attend each meeting.

Section 6. *Robert's Rules of Order, Revised*, is the authority for the parliamentary rules of procedure for all business meetings of the association.

Section 7. Visitors attending a quarterly or called meeting of the association may by approval of the body participate in debate without the privilege to vote. Visitors are welcome to attend the meetings of the association.

Section 8. All proposed resolutions or public statements to be considered by the associational messengers are to be received by the Communications Committee at least two weeks prior to the scheduled meeting of the messengers. The messengers are to consider only the proposed resolutions and public statements that have been reviewed by the Communications Committee. The committee is responsible for presenting a positive or negative recommendation to the messengers on each proposed resolution or public statement received. The proposal may be amended or substituted by the committee as a part of their recommendation. Copies of all proposed resolutions and public statements, with the name of the initiators, are to be made available to the messengers at or before the beginning of their meeting.

ARTICLE VI: Membership Procedures

Section 1. **ADMISSION:** When seeking admission into the association a church must present to the Membership Committee a letter of request for admission. The letter should contain the name of the church, the reason for seeking admission into the association, and the date when the church voted to take such action.

- A. After receiving a request for admission into the association the Membership Committee is to meet with leaders of the church to discuss their desire for membership, to explain the association's requirements for admission, to consider any of their church's approved documents and location of their meetings, and to deal with any other matters that would help the committee make a decision about their request.
- B. At the next Quarterly Meeting of the Messengers, the Membership Committee is to share the request with the association and to make one of the following recommendations:
 1. That the church requesting admission be accepted under the watchcare of the association;
 2. That action on the request be delayed for further consideration at the next quarterly meeting of the association or

3. That the request for membership be denied.

The committee is to give clear reason for its recommendation concerning the status of watchcare. As soon as possible following the associational meeting, the committee is to communicate the action of the association with the church first in spoken words, and then by letter.

- C. Any church that is accepted under the watchcare of the association must remain in that status for at least one full year before being admitted into the membership of the association.

1. Watchcare is a time of bonding between the association and the church seeking admission. The association is to carefully observe the faith, practice and cooperation of the church. The church under watchcare is to receive the same opportunities extended to member churches; however, members of churches under watchcare may not vote nor hold a position of leadership in the association.

2. During the watchcare period, the church is expected to have an active part in the support of the work of the association, the North Carolina Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention.

3. The Membership Committee is to meet, as needed, with leaders of the church during the watchcare period to discuss their relationship with the association. Representatives of the committee are to visit during meetings of the church to observe the organization and practices of the church.

- D. Near the close of the watchcare period the committee is to evaluate the condition and cooperation of the church and to decide on one of the following recommendations to make to the association at the appropriate time concerning membership:

1. That the church requesting admission be accepted into full fellowship of the association;

2. That action on the admission be delayed until the next quarterly meeting of the association; or

3. That admission into the association be denied.

The committee is to give clear reason for its recommendation concerning membership. As soon as possible following the associational meeting, the committee is to communicate with the church the action of the association first in spoken words, and then by letter.

- E. A two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present is needed for the church to be accepted under watchcare or into full membership of the association.
- F. If a church is denied the status of watchcare or membership by the association, then after the lapse of one year it may submit another letter to the Membership Committee requesting admission.

Section 2. COOPERATION: A cooperating church is defined as one who sends an annual church letter to the associational clerk, is represented by duly elected messengers at quarterly associational meetings, contribute financially to the association, and is in general agreement with the purpose, basic beliefs, programs and ministries of the association.

Section 3. CONFLICT: If a member church is in conflict and request help from the association, then the Membership Committee and/or the Director of Missions may meet with the church to counsel and work with them in an attempt to help resolve the problem(s).

Section 4. DISMISSAL: Any member church which fails to cooperate with the association is to be contacted by the Membership Committee at their discretion or upon direction of the messengers to ascertain the wishes and desires of the church relative to its continuance in the association. After counsel with the church, the committee may choose to make recommendation that the church be removed from the membership of the association. Such a recommendation would have to be made at a quarterly meeting of the association, and a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present would be needed for dismissal of the church from the association.

The committee is to give clear reason for its recommendation concerning action toward the member church. As soon as possible following the associational meeting, the committee is to send a letter to the church to communicate the action taken by the association.

Section 5. WITHDRAWALS: The association recognizes that an affiliated church has the right to withdraw its fellowship from the association. It is requested that the report of such action by a church be sent to the Membership Committee in an official letter from the church.

Upon receipt of the letter, the Membership Committee is to discuss the action with leaders of the church. At the next quarterly meeting of the association, the committee is to inform the messengers of the church action. The association is to take one of the following actions:

- A. Accept the action of the church and immediately remove the church. The church is to be notified of the action by a letter from the association.
- B. Delay acceptance of the church action until the next quarterly meeting and instruct the Membership Committee to ask the church to reconsider its action.

Section 6. NOTIFICATION: The association is to immediately inform the North Carolina Baptist State Convention when a church is accepted under watchcare or membership. In addition, the convention is to be informed if a church is dismissed from the association as a member.

Article VII: Organization and Leadership

Section 1. The association is organized into six levels of operation: Governing, Personnel, Coordinating, Administrative Services, Mission Performance Programs and Fellowship Groups.

A. GOVERNING

1. The ASSOCIATION-IN-SESSION consists of the duly elected messengers by member churches in attendance at each quarterly or called meeting of the association.
2. Churches of fifty (50) members or less are entitled to five (5) messengers. One (1) additional messenger is allowed for each additional fifty (50) church members or major fraction thereof provided no church has more than ten (10) messengers.
3. In addition to the total number of messengers to which each church is entitled, each pastor and each of the five associational officers are considered messengers by virtue of their positions provided that the person is a member of the church being represented.
4. Churches are to elect their messengers before October each year so that the messengers can serve the full associational

year from October 1 through September 30. Messengers can serve consecutive years but must be elected annually by their church. Messengers are expected to attend all of the quarterly and called meetings of the association. The name, address, and telephone number of each messenger should be delivered by the church clerk to the associational clerk no later than October 7 each year to facilitate advance registration. This information can accompany the annual church letter.

5. The functions of the messengers are to receive current information and reports about the work of the association and groups with which it is related; transact the business of the association; and report on the meetings and activities of the association to the churches.
6. A person serving as a messenger from a church must be a member in good standing of that church.

B. PERSONNEL

1. Positions:

- a. The *Director of Missions* is the general leader of the association serving as the director of directors of all programs, ministries, and services of the association. In addition, the Director of Missions leads the association to explore new mission frontiers, and serve as a minister to the churches and church leaders. The Director of Missions is the chief executive officer of the association, the registered agent of the corporation (association), and is an ex-officio member of all associational committees, councils, and groups. The Director serves as director of the Association Council.

Election to this office is upon recommendation of the Director of Missions Search Committee and by two-thirds majority vote of approval by the messengers at any quarterly meeting of the association. The term of service is indefinite and can be terminated by written notice to the Personnel Committee by the Director of Missions or by two-thirds majority vote of the

messengers at any quarterly meeting of the association upon recommendation of the Personnel Committee.

- b. The *Associate Director of Missions* serves the association by working under the supervision of the Director of Missions in general leadership, mission strategy, ministry to churches and church leaders and as a representative to the denomination and community.

Election to this office is upon recommendation of the Personnel Committee and by two-thirds majority vote of approval by the messengers at any quarterly meeting of the association. The time of service is indefinite and can be terminated by written notice to the Personnel Committee by the Associate Director of Missions or by two-thirds majority vote of the messengers at any quarterly meeting of the association upon recommendation of the Personnel Committee.

- c. The *Administrative Assistant* serves primarily in a secretarial role. However, this individual assists the Director of Missions with daily administrative matters of the association. In addition, the person supervises the general operation of the Baptist Center by answering the telephone, greeting visitors and helping to meet their needs. The Administrative Assistant supervises office help along with the Director of Missions. This person also serves as the Associational Clerk and as secretary of the Associational Council.

The Administrative Assistant is enlisted and recommended to the association by the Personnel Committee. A two-thirds majority vote of approval by the messengers is necessary for employment. The time of service for the Administrative Assistant is indefinite and can be terminated by written notice to the Personnel Committee by the employee or by two-thirds majority vote of the messengers upon recommendation of the Personnel Committee.

- d. The *Financial Secretary* serves as assistant to the Treasurer and helps the Administrative Assistant with office responsibilities. It is a part-time position.

The Financial Secretary is enlisted and recommended to the association by the Personnel Committee. A two-thirds majority vote of approval by the messengers is necessary for employment. The time of service for the Financial Secretary is indefinite and can be terminated by written notice to the Personnel Committee by the employee or by two-thirds majority vote of the messengers upon recommendation of the Personnel Committee.

- e. A *Summer Worker* is to be hired as needed for approximately ten weeks of work. This person normally a student, does special projects as assigned by the Director of Missions or his designee.

The Summer Worker is enlisted and recommended to the association by the Personnel Committee. A two-thirds majority vote of approval by the messengers is necessary for employment. The association may hire more than one Summer Worker per year, if needed and money is available.

2. General:

- a. Each paid employee is to be provided by the Personnel Committee with an up-to-date job description of his responsibilities.
- b. The Director of Missions is the general supervisor of all paid employees of the association. However, the Director is to work closely with the committees and leaders who share supervision.
- c. The Personnel Committee cannot recommend the Director of Missions, the Associate Director of Missions, the Administrative Assistant, or the Financial Secretary to the association for termination of duty without proper notice and a clear explanation of such action given to the individual prior to the association meeting at which time the recommendation of dismissal is to be made.

A closing financial arrangement is to be provided for an employee who has been dismissed by the association. The Personnel Committee is to determine a fair closing financial arrangement and to make it a part of the recommendation for dismissal to the association.

The Summer Worker and other temporary employees may be dismissed with clear explanation by the Personnel Committee without approval by the association. No closing financial arrangement is necessary.

C. COORDINATING

1. This level of operation is made up of the Administrative Services Council, the Associational Council and the Fellowship Council. The purpose of these councils is to coordinate the overall work of the association. The Associational Council serves as the primary coordinating council.
2. Coordinating Councils:
 - a. The *Administrative Services Council* consists of the administrative services committee chairmen. The council meets only as needed to coordinate the overall work of the committees. The council director represents the committees as a member of the Associational Council.
 - b. The *Associational Council* consists of the Mission Performance Programs Directors, the Administrative Services Council Director, the Fellowship Council Director, the Director of Missions, the Associate Director of Missions and the Administrative Assistant.

The Director of Missions serves as the Council Director and the Administrative Assistant serves as secretary.

The purpose of the council is to coordinate the overall program and calendar of the association. The council meets only as needed.

- c. The *Fellowship Council* consists of the head leaders of the associational fellowship groups. The council meets only as needed to discuss fellowship needs and to coordinate the activities of the fellowship groups. The council director represents the fellowship groups as a member of the Associational Council.

D. ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES

1. This level of operation is made up of the committees, the Board of Directors, and the officers of the association. Their purpose is to carry out assigned work in order to help the association operate smoothly. There are eleven committees, the Board of Directors and five officers. Each committee chairman serves as a member of the Administrative Services Council.

The six associational district members serving on the Board of Directors and all committee members are elected for three consecutive years of service. After the lapse of at least one year a person may be nominated for a position previously held. The length of service for the officers is in accordance with their individual job descriptions.

2. Committees:

- a. The *Associational Meetings Committee* is responsible for planning and conducting the regular and called meetings of the associational messengers. The duties of this committee are to: (1) propose an order of business for each meeting of the associational messengers; (2) enlist all program personnel for the associational meetings; (3) publicize the order of business to the churches in advance of the meeting; (4) arrange for the facilities needed for each meeting; (5) arrange for and conduct proper registration of messengers and visitors at each meeting and to report registration as requested; and (6) recommend future meeting places to the associational messengers in the annual "Calendar of Activities" for the forthcoming year; the committee may ask the associational messengers to move a quarterly meeting to a date one week prior to or one week after a scheduled meeting to avoid conflict with a major

denominational emphasis date. The committee consists of six members, each elected for a three-year term with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year.

- b. The *Communications Committee* is responsible for communicating the programs, ministries, resolutions and services of the association to the churches and to the general public. Its duties are to: (1) develop and implement an annual Associational Emphasis Week promotion plan; (2) assist, as needed, with office-produced communications, such as: The Book of Reports and the Annual Minutes; (3) receive, review and recommend all proposed resolutions or public statements; (4) initiate resolutions or statements as needed; (5) develop promotional brochures or other literature that identifies the work of the association, and (6) assist, as requested by the association or associational leaders, in promoting or reporting the work and actions of the association through the secular media. The Communications Committee consists of six members, each elected for a three-year term with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year.
- c. The *External Relations Committee* is responsible for establishing and maintaining proper relationships with groups outside the association. Its duties are to: (1) serve through individual representatives as a channel of communication between the association and various agencies, boards, foundations, and other groups affiliated with the North Carolina Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention, and (2) communicate and work, as needed, with non-Baptist groups.

The External Relations Committee consists of the associational representatives of the American Bible Society, the Annuity Board, the Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina, the Baptist Retirement Homes of North Carolina, the Baptist World Alliance, the Biblical Recorder, Christian Higher Education, the Foreign Mission Board, the General Board of the

Baptist State Convention of North Carolina (two representatives), the Home Mission Board, the North Carolina Baptist Foundation, and the North Carolina Baptist Hospital, each elected for a three-year term.

- d. The *Finance Committee* assists the association in securing, administering and reporting its finances. Its duties are to: (1) develop and recommend an overall financial development plan; (2) develop and recommend an associational budget based on the plans of the association's various programs and ministries; (3) plan and direct the effort to seek giving commitments from the churches; (4) conduct studies and make recommendations concerning proposed expenditures not included in the budget; (5) review expenditures periodically in terms of budget allocations and recommend budget adjustments if needed; (6) develop and recommend financial policies and procedures, including provisions for auditing; and (7) administer the associational "Minister's Support Fund." The Finance Committee consists of six elected members, each elected for a three-year term with terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year.
- e. The *History Committee* is to gather, preserve, and interpret historical records of the association's life and work. Its duties are to: (1) work with the associational clerk in gathering and preserving past associational records; (2) assist in the recording of present-day activities; (3) communicate and interpret the heritage of the association to associational leaders and member churches; (4) use historical facts and documents to challenge the association to accomplish its mission; (5) develop and recommend to the association policies and procedures regarding its historical materials; (6) encourage churches to gather and preserve their historical records and to write, communicate, and interpret their history. The History Committee consists of six members, each elected for a three-year term with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year.

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- f. The *Membership Committee* is to assist the association in determining when churches are of like faith and order and can be properly accepted into the association according to the provisions made in the Constitution and Bylaws of the association. Also, this committee serves as a "church conflict" advisory body. In addition, this committee encourages active participation by inactive churches in the association. The duties are to: (1) recommend and implement approved guidelines as needed for receiving churches into the association and for dealing with troubled member or inactive churches in the association; (2) counsel with churches seeking admission into the association and with troubled or inactive member churches; (3) examine the credentials of churches seeking admission into the association (namely, their articles of faith or doctrinal positions, church covenant, polity -- including their constitution and bylaws -- and relationship to the denomination. The Membership Committee consists of six members, each elected for a three-year term with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year.
- g. The *Nominating Committee* leads in coordinating the selection of all association-elected leaders except paid personnel. Its duties are to: (1) select, interview, enlist, and recommend general associational officers, mission performance program directors, and committee chairmen and members; (2) coordinate the selection of workers for all the association's organizations and committees; (3) approve workers before they are invited to work in program organizations; (4) distribute associational leadership according to priority needs; (5) assist associational program leaders in discovering and enlisting qualified persons to fill positions in their respective organizations; (6) present workers to the association; (7) nominate special committees as assigned by the association.

The Nominating Committee consists of six members, one from each of the six associational districts, each elected for a three-year term with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year. The

committee should give careful consideration that all nominees are selected fairly from all six districts of the association, and from all pastors, staff members, men and women of the churches. Each nominee must be a member in good standing in an associational church.

LEADERSHIP SELECTION

- (1) All Mission Performance Program directors are to be formally presented by the Nominating Committee for vote by the messengers at the January meeting of the association. In order to give the messengers adequate time to consider the nominees for program directors, the Nominating Committee is to prepare a complete list of the names and positions and have copies distributed to the messengers by the second Thursday in January.

The individuals approved at the January meeting of the association immediately become the program directors-elect until October when their tenure of service officially begins. The program directors-elect would meet with the Associational Council only upon request; however, each program director-elect is expected to participate in the annual calendar planning meetings.

- (2) Each program director-elect is to immediately start selecting individuals to serve on the respective program councils for the upcoming year. A complete list of the individuals selected to serve is to be presented to the Nominating Committee by March 31 by each program director-elect.
- (3) Fellowship Groups may select their own leadership or ask the Nominating Committee to do the selection. Each group that chooses its own leadership for the upcoming associational year is to present a complete list of the individuals selected to serve to the Nominating Committee by March 31.

- (4) The Board of Directors, officers, committee chairmen and members, leaders of the fellowship groups, and all previously unelected members of program councils are to be formally presented by the Nominating Committee for vote by the messengers at the April meeting of the association. In order to give the messengers adequate time to consider the nominees, the Nominating Committee is to prepare a complete list of the names and positions and have copies distributed to the messengers by the second Thursday of April.

The individuals approved at the April meeting of the association are the leaders "elect" until October 1 when their tenure of service officially begins. Each leader has the privilege to plan and to train as necessary for the upcoming year. The leaders "elect" have no authority over the current year's work, except in a position currently held.

- (5) If vacancies occur during the year the Nominating Committee is to enlist a person to fill each vacated position and to recommend the person to the association. The committee is to work with program directors and committee chairmen as needed in filling each vacancy.
- h. The *Personnel Committee* is responsible for all paid employees of the association. Its duties are to: (1) recommend policies and procedures for the selection, supervision, and termination of associational personnel; (2) maintain up-to-date job descriptions in a manual for every paid position in the association; (3) recruit, interview, and recommend to the association new personnel, excluding the Director of Missions, in full cooperation with the appropriate supervisor; (4) develop and recommend salaries and benefits for employed personnel; (5) develop and recommend to the association policies and procedures regarding continuing education and development for the Director of Missions and other paid personnel. The Personnel Committee consists of six members, each elected for a three-year

term with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year. The chairman is a member of the Director of Missions Search Committee.

- i. The *Properties Committee* assists the association in the administration of all properties in Buncombe and Caldwell Counties. Its duties are to: (1) inspect and keep inventory of all associational properties; (2) secure, supervise and terminate the services of persons responsible for the care of associational properties; (3) develop and initiate scheduled cleaning procedures; (4) develop and recommend a program of preventive maintenance; (5) develop and recommend policies and procedures for using facilities and equipment; (6) request and administer maintenance, furniture, and equipment budget; (7) develop and, with the Board of Directors, recommend an adequate insurance plan for the properties. The Properties Committee consists of six members, each elected for a three-year term with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year.

This committee can spend up to \$500.00 on one item without approval of the association. Items above that amount must have associational approval.

- j. The *Search Committee* is designed to serve only as needed to secure a Director of Missions. Its duties are to: (1) meet as a committee for the first time within one month following election by the association; (2) choose from within the committee a chairman, vice-chairman and secretary during the first meeting; (3) study and follow carefully the Job Description for the Director of Missions; (4) seek comments and suggestions from the association concerning the expectations of the next Director of Missions; (5) report regularly to the association on progress being made; (6) develop a list of prospects for the position; (7) narrow the list of candidates, thoroughly researching qualifications and references; (8) interview and observe most favorable candidate(s) in different settings; (9) unanimously present choice candidate to the association for approval; (10) assist newly elected Director of Missions during

transition period; and (11) inform all other candidates by letter, as necessary, of the decision of the association, expressing appreciation to each person for their time and cooperation. The committee will consist of one pastor, one layman, one laywoman (all named by the Nominating Committee), plus the Moderator and Chairman of the Personnel Committee.

- k. The *Strategy Committee* assists the association in determining its strategic objectives and in staying on course in achieving them. Its duties are to: (1) monitor the needs and opportunities of the churches and provide updated information to the churches and to the associational programs annually; (2) recommend modifications in the organizational structure to help fulfill associational objectives; (3) review the association's constitution and bylaws and recommend modifications as needed; (4) maintain up-to-date job descriptions in a manual for every volunteer position in the association excluding paid workers; (5) lead the association to conduct strategy planning about every five years. The Strategy Committee consists of six members, each elected for a three-year term with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year.

3. Board of Directors:

- a. The *Board of Directors* acts as the legal agent of the association. Its duties are to: (1) serve as legal representative of the association; (2) act as directed by the associational messengers in handling legal matters; (3) oversee the total insurance plan of the association; (4) hold in trust any property, money, endowment or other securities of the association; (5) exercise the power, under the instruction of the associational messengers, to hold, buy, sell, and convey property, both real and personal, and to sign all papers necessary for the purchase or conveyance; and to (6) act in behalf of the associational messengers, under unusual and extreme circumstances, giving a full report to the messengers as soon as possible to explain action taken.

The Board of Directors consists of eleven members. Serving are the five officers of the association, plus six other members, one from each of the six associational districts. The six associational district members are each elected for a three-year term with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year. The Moderator serves as the presiding officer of the board. The Board of Directors meets annually in October and at other times as necessary.

b. Officers:

- (1) The *Moderator*, also known as president, presides over the quarterly and called meetings of the associational messengers. As the presiding officer, the Moderator (1) opens the meetings punctually at the appointed time, enforces the rules, preserves the order, and exercises all the prerogatives of a presiding officer according to the principles of established parliamentary usage (*Roberts Rules of Order, Revised*); (2) appoints a parliamentarian, if desired, to serve at any or all meetings of the associational messengers during his term of office; the person appointed must be approved by the messengers-in-session; (3) serves as an *ex-officio* member of all committees, councils, and groups of the association; (4) calls the associational messengers together for special meetings to deal with extremely urgent matters that cannot wait until the next quarterly meeting (Before calling a special meeting to order, a notice of at least two weeks is to be given to the associational messengers with a clear explanation as to the purpose of the meeting. A quorum of fifty associational messengers must be present to conduct a special meeting.); (5) postpones or reschedules quarterly or called meetings of the associational messengers, in cooperation with the Director of Missions and the Association Meetings Committee Chairman, in the event of inclement weather or other unforeseen crises; (6) serves as a member of the Director of Missions Search Committee. The Moderator

elected for a one-year term and is eligible for election to a second consecutive term; however, after serving for two consecutive years, the individual could not be considered for Moderator for at least one year.

- (2) It is the duty of the *Vice-Moderator*, also known as Vice-President, to discharge the duties of the Moderator in the absence or at the request of the Moderator. The Vice-Moderator is elected for a one-year term, and is eligible to a second consecutive term. However, after serving for two consecutive years, the individual could not be considered for Vice-Moderator for at least one year.
- (3) The *Clerk*, also known as Secretary, records and keeps in permanent form all transactions of the association and makes this information available upon request. The Clerk's duties are to: (1) serve as recorder during the meetings of the association; (2) secure from the churches the annual Uniform Church Letter and process it according to recommended procedures; (3) edit the associational annual minutes; (4) work with the History Committee to preserve the official records of the association; (5) train and assist church clerks. The Administrative Assistant serves as the Clerk of the association.
- (4) The *Treasurer* receives all of the funds contributed to the association and disburses them in accordance with the budget of the association or for which the funds were contributed. The Treasurer's duties are to: (1) serve as an ex-officio member of the Finance Committee; (2) work with the Finance Committee to recommend and establish fiscal policies; (3) maintain proper records of all monies received and disbursed; (4) provide printed quarterly and annual reports to the association of all receipts and disbursements.

The Treasurer is elected annually and can succeed himself. The chairman of the Finance Committee is authorized to fulfill the duties of the treasurer in the event the treasurer is unable to do so.

- (5) The *Director of Missions* is the chief executive officer of the association, also serving as the registered agent.

E. MISSION PERFORMANCE PROGRAMS

1. The work of the Mission Performance Programs of the association is carried out through councils. Each council member has definite responsibilities and the number of members on each council is determined by need. Council members are elected annually. The general director of each council serves as an ex-officio member of the Associational Council. Each council has meetings according to need. Each council consists of a program director and other leaders as needed to conduct the program.
2. Councils:
 - a. The *Brotherhood Council* assists churches in educating and involving men and boys in missions.
 - b. The *Christian Life Council* informs the churches of critical moral and social issues and leads in Christian action to meet those needs. The council seeks to develop good Christian citizenship and healthy human relations.
 - c. The *Discipleship Training Council* assists the churches in starting, improving and expanding Christian discipleship through their Discipleship Training programs.
 - d. The *Evangelism Council* assists churches in reaching people for Christ through evangelistic training and by bringing the churches together in corporate efforts of evangelism.

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- e. The *Family Ministry Council* assists churches in developing family ministry programs. Special emphasis is placed on ministry activities for preschoolers, children, youth, adults and students. Training opportunities are provided for general leaders of these age groups.
 - f. The *Media/Library Council* assists churches in the establishment, development and improvement of church media library services. In addition, the council is responsible for organizing and operating the associational Media Library in the Baptist Center.
 - g. The *Missions Development Council* leads the churches to discover opportunities for associational, state, home and foreign missions and to assist the churches in doing mission projects individually and corporately. The council works closely with the Brotherhood, Sunday School and WMU Councils.
 - h. The *Music Ministry Council* assists the churches through establishing, conducting, enlarging and improving their music ministries.
 - i. The *Pastoral Ministries Council* assists the churches in the development of pastoral ministries, deacon ministry, vocational guidance and church administrative services. In addition, the council ministers to the distinctive needs of pastors, deacons, church staff persons, church councils, church officers and committee members and church vocation volunteers. This council is responsible for interviewing candidates for ordination to the "Gospel Ministry" as requested by the churches.
 - j. The *Prayer Council* is responsible for promoting prayer in the churches, providing opportunities for prayer among the churches, and offering conferences and seminars on prayer.
 - k. The *Recreation Council* assists churches in providing recreation methods, materials, services, and experiences and is available to other associational organizations

wishing to use recreation in accomplishing their particular tasks.

- l. The *Seminary Extension Council* promotes and provides practical and theological education to ministers and laypersons on basic and college levels.
- m. The *Stewardship Council* assists the churches in the development of individual and corporate stewardship.
- n. The *Sunday School Council* assists and challenges churches to improve and enlarge all areas of their Sunday School through planning, training, administration activities, consultation, program interpretation, and cooperative projects.
- o. The *Woman's Missionary Union Council* assists churches in promoting missions and in establishing, enlarging, and strengthening WMU work.

E. FELLOWSHIP GROUPS

1. The purpose of the Fellowship Groups is to provide a setting for particular groups to meet together for fellowship, dialogue, encouragement and mutual care. Hopefully, as the individual groups meet together the fellowship of the whole association can be strengthened.

Each group determines its own leadership in cooperation with the Associational Nominating Committee, and plans its own activities in cooperation with the Associational Fellowship Council. The leader of each fellowship group is a member of the Fellowship Council.

2. Groups:

- a. The *Bivocational Ministers' Fellowship Group* is for ordained pastors and other ministers who have a secular vocation in addition to their church vocation.
- b. The *Church Secretaries' Fellowship Group* includes a Caldwell Baptist church and associational secretaries.

- c. The *Ministers' Conference Fellowship Group* includes all pastors, bivocational pastors, church staff ministers, other ministers and retired ministers in the association.
- d. The *Ministers and Wives' Quarterly Fellowship Group* is for all Caldwell Baptist Ministers and their spouses.
- e. The *Ministers Wives' Fellowship Group* includes all the wives of active, deceased, or retired ministers in the association.
- f. The *Music Leaders' Fellowship Group* includes all paid and volunteer ministers of music, directors of music, organists, pianists, and other music leadership in the churches and the association. This group cooperates with the Music Ministry Council of the association.
- g. The *Retired Ministers' Fellowship Group* includes all retired Southern Baptist ministers and their spouses living in the associational area.
- h. The *Youth Ministers' Fellowship Group* consists of all paid and volunteer ministers of youth, youth directors and other youth leaders in the churches of the association. The Associational Youth Director of the Family Ministry Council serves as a member of this group.

Section 2. Every committee, council or fellowship group has the authority to appoint temporary sub-groups to carry out specific assignments needed. The sub-group ceases to exist at the completion of the assignment. Permanent, but not temporary, sub-groups must be suggested and approved by the Nominating Committee and then by the messengers of the association.

Section 3. Every associational committee and council is to choose a secretary to record the proceedings of each meeting.

Section 4. Associational leaders and representatives are responsible for presenting written and/or verbal reports to the association as requested.

Section 5. An up-to-date "Organizational Chart" is to be maintained to visibly reveal the overall associational operation.

Section 6. An "Operations Manual" is to be maintained by the Associational Staff in the Baptist Center, containing such items as: paid and volunteer job descriptions, administrative policies, the Articles of Incorporation and the Constitution and Bylaws. The appropriate groups within the associational organization are to assist the staff in keeping the manual up-to-date.

Section 7. Each ex-officio member serving on a council, committee or group is entitled to full voting rights.

Section 8. The General Board members of the Baptist State Convention from the Caldwell Association are to represent the association to the State Convention and vice-versa. The Board members are encouraged to report to the association about Board actions.

Article VIII: Printed Material

Section 1. A periodical newsletter known as the "Caldwell Baptist Caller" is published to communicate information about the work of and matters of interest to the association.

Section 2. The Annual Minutes are prepared to serve as a record of information about the association.

Section 3. An "Associational Directory" is prepared annually and updated quarterly to provide information on who are associational leaders, church leaders, and other persons of interest to the association and how to contact them.

Section 4. A "Calendar of Activities" is prepared annually to inform the churches of upcoming events in or related to the association.

Section 5. Reports to the association and promotional pieces about the work of the association are printed as needed.

Section 6. Each member church is expected to prepare and deliver to the associational clerk the annual "Uniform Church Letter" by October of each year.

Article IX: Amendments

These Bylaws may be amended by a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present at any quarterly meeting of the association provided that the amendment was presented in written or typed form to the clerk and publicly stated to the messengers by the moderator or his designee at

preceding quarterly meeting of the association. Typed copies of the amendment are to be furnished to the current messengers of the association for study at least two weeks prior to a vote on the amendment.

DEDICATIONS

IN MEMORY of STELLA AUSTIN Missionary to Nigeria



Stella grew up in the Kings Creek community of Caldwell County. She attended Kings Creek Baptist Church and Kings Creek High School from which she graduated in 1937. She attended Mars Hill College from 1943-1945, Meredith College 1945-1947 and the WMU Training School and Southern Seminary, Louisville, Kentucky 1947-1949. On April 19, 1949 she was appointed by the Foreign Mission Board, SBC, as a missionary to Nigeria, West Africa.

Stella left for Nigeria the first of October, 1949 and travelled by freighter. She arrived in Lagos, Nigeria on December 3, having been on the ship for 56 days.

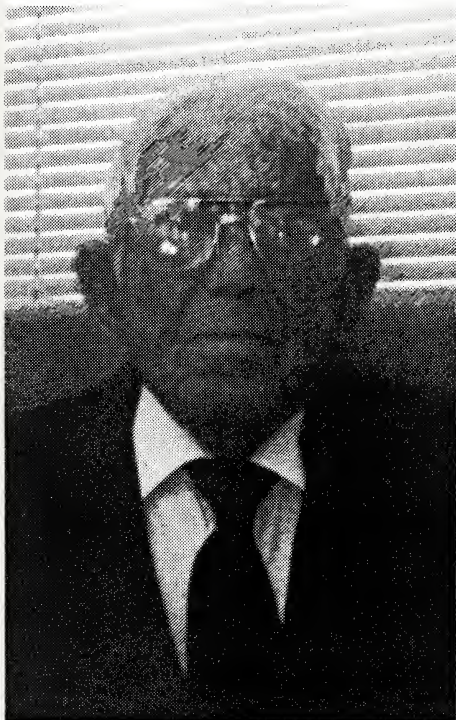
Stella's first assignment in Nigeria was to teach at the newly begun Baptist Girls' High School in Agbor. In 1956 she moved to Obomosho and became the first principal of the Obomosho Baptist Girls' High School.

Because she felt that teaching rather than administrative work was her calling, in 1961 Stella asked to be relieved of the work of principal. She was transferred to Baptist College, Iwo, in 1962.

From May until December of 1966, Stella served as principal of the Baptist Women's Training College in Ile-Ife. In 1969 she was asked to go back to Agbor to serve and was there again until 1971 when she had to come home on medical leave. Following this, Stella returned to Baptist College, Iwo where she remained until 1981. In 1982 she transferred to Obomosho and served in the Women's Training Center of the Nigerian Baptist Theological Seminary.

In March, 1985 Stella left Nigeria for the final time and officially retired on

Rev. J.H. Crisp was born in the Globe Community of Caldwell County on November 25, 1893. His father and grandfather were Baptist ministers. He preached his first sermon in his home church, Whitnel Baptist, in 1932.

Rev. Crisp has pastored churches in Caldwell and Watauga Counties. In Caldwell County the churches he has served are Johns River, Globe, Mulberry, Rufus, Rocky Springs, Yadkin, Union Grove, Central, Bailey's Camp and Poovey's Chapel.

In Watauga County he served the Bethel, Beaver Dam, Cool Springs, Middle Fork, Blowing Rock, Sandy Flats and Beech Valley Baptist Churches.

During his 61 years in the ministry there are few families in Caldwell and Watauga Counties that have not been touched by the life of this man. According to area Funeral Directors, he has conducted more funerals than any other minister in Caldwell County, and there was seldom a week that passed that he did not perform a wedding.

Possibly the greatest tribute that can be paid to him is to say he has lived the teachings of the Bible he has taught through the years without seeking any publicity, profit or glory for himself.

Hilda felt called to special work when she was 15 years old and decided to go to college in order to prepare for service. For two years Hilda studied in the university. Then she had to stop and work in order to get enough money to finish her studies.

When she was ready to go back, the university was full because of the service men returning from the war. It was then that Elizabeth Campbell, associational missionary, suggested that she go on to the seminary. God opened the doors and Hilda got a scholarship in the Southwestern Baptist Seminary in Fort Worth, Texas.

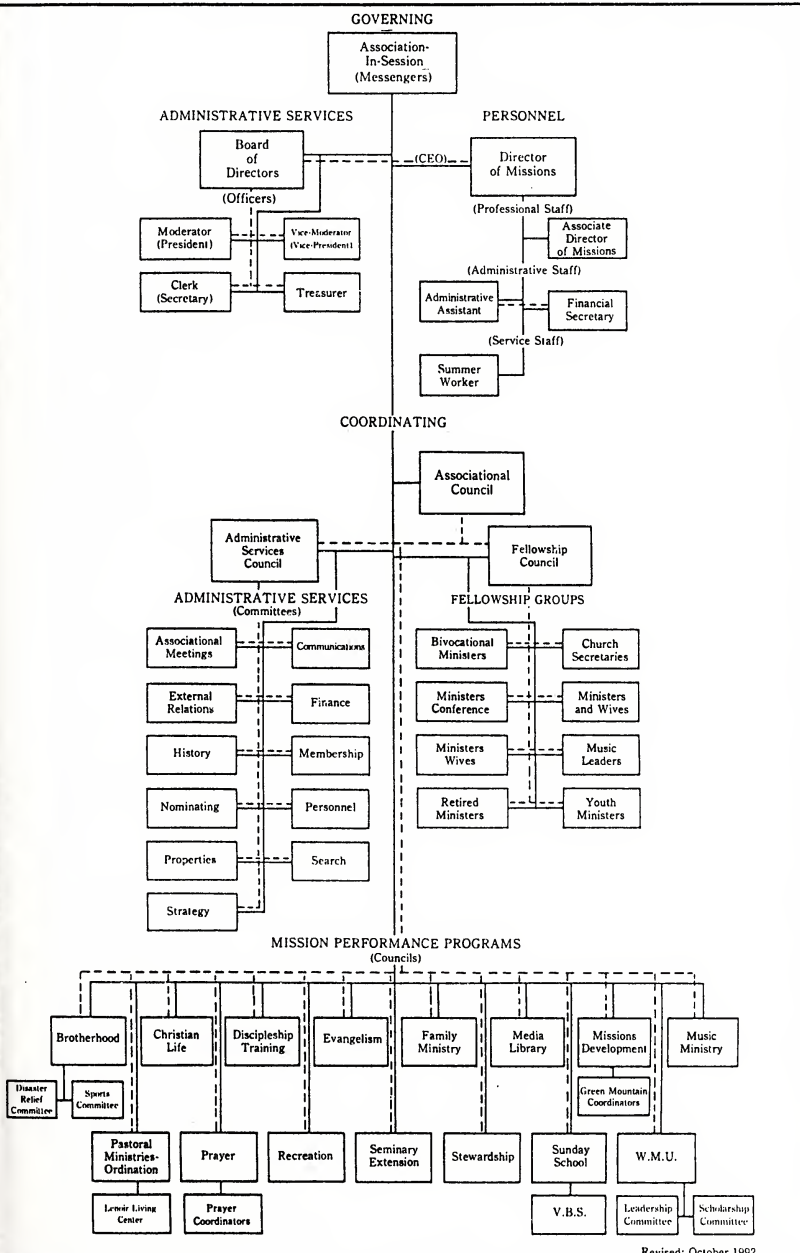

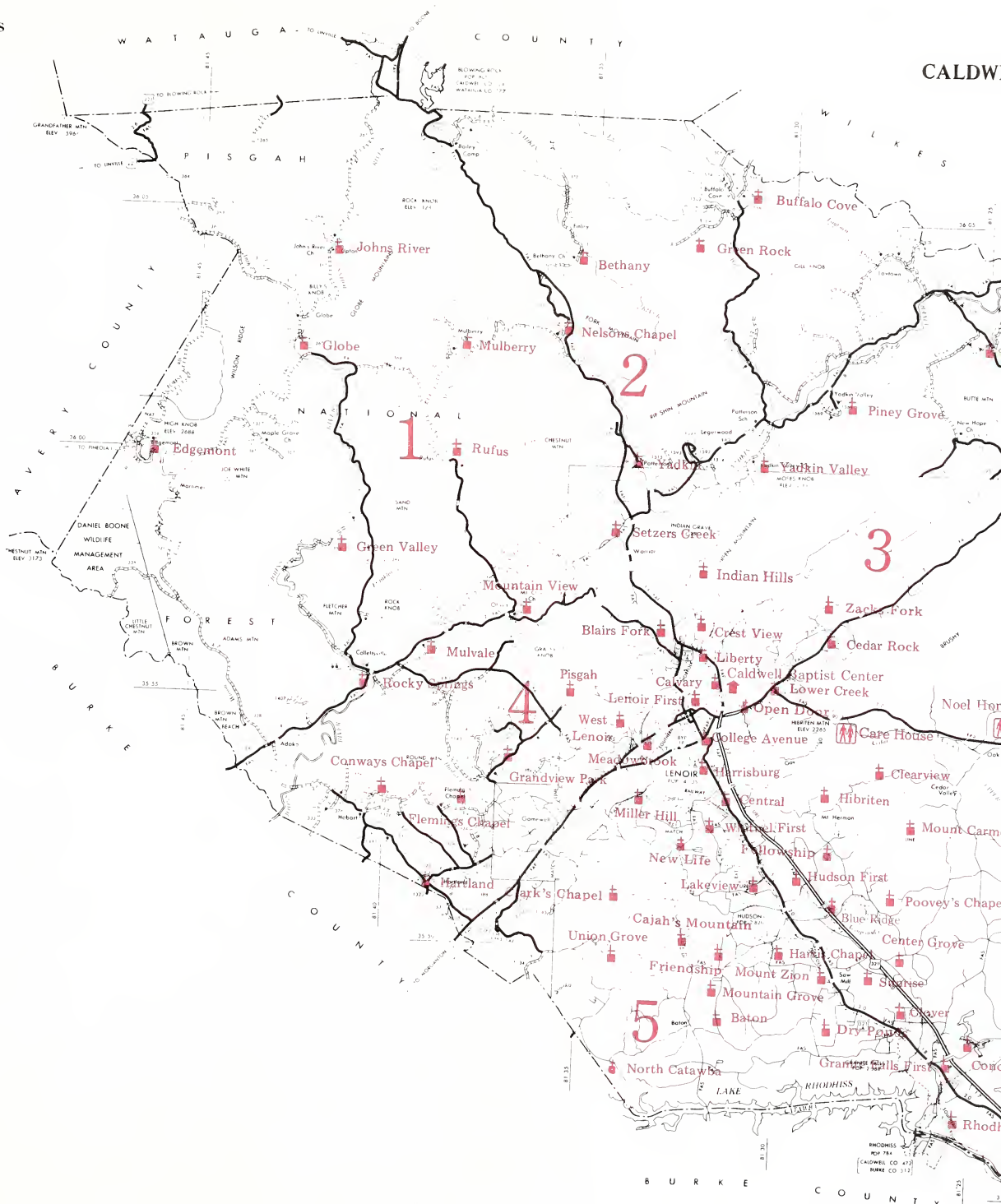

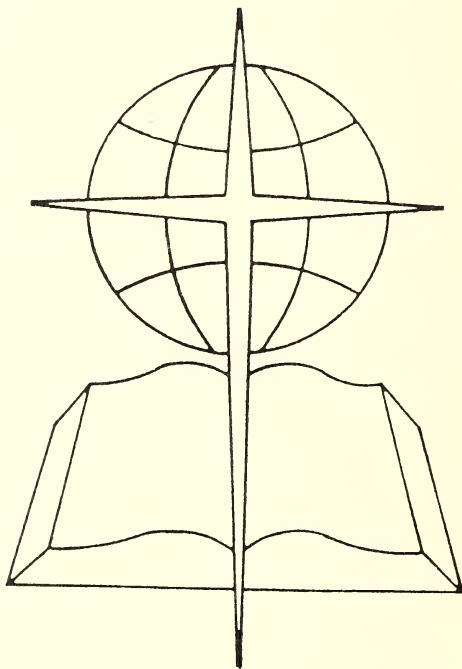
