## ANNUAL REPORT.

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*To the Governor of the State of Ohio, Columbus, Ohio.*

DEAR SIR:— We have the honor to herewith submit the Twenty-third Annual Report of the Toledo State Hospital, Toledo, Ohio, for the fiscal year ending November 15, 1906.

The general condition of the institution at this time, we think is the best within its history. Its physical condition is at a high standard and its efficiency certainly seems to be at the best.

On February 19, 1906, Dr. H. A. Tobey, after many years of faithful service, tendered his resignation. The Board takes this opportunity of expressing its appreciation of his devotion to his work and the institution, and the high character of his services to the State.

Dr. Geo. R. Love, for many years first assistant of the medical staff, was unanimously elected to fill the vacancy caused by Dr. Tobey's resignation, and while Dr. Love has but fairly started in his work, we are convinced, from the energetic and conscientious way that he has taken hold, that the high standard of institutional work set by his predecessor, will not only be maintained, but that even a higher standard, if possible, may be maintained.

The population of the institution has increased 45 over last year, making a total at this time of 1,803.

The per capita cost based on the daily average number of patients present during the year and calculated on the amounts drawn from the State Treasury, including current expenses, salaries of officers, ordinary repairs and carpets and furniture, was \$136.94, which shows a reduction of \$3.15 per capita from last year's report. We will state that the above manner of estimating and calculating the per capita cost has always been followed in making reports of this institution and consequently comparisons have not always been favorable to this institution when compared with others, which base their calculations on the total number carried on the rolls whether in or out of the institution.

We again recommend the purchase of additional land suitable for maintaining and operating our own dairy, in order to produce our own milk and to a large extent our own butter. This will not only prove a sanitary measure, as well as a large saving to the State, but at the same time it will give employment to a larger number of patients, which experience has demonstrated, is extremely beneficial to them. The cost of the item of milk alone for the past year has been \$13,233.14. In

operating our own dairy, we consider a conservative estimate of saving to the state would be fully \$6,000 per year.

One of the great needs of the institution is a cold storage and ice plant. If the institution were able to properly refrigerate its meats, butter, eggs, etc., the saving would be very great, and we would thereby be in a position to take advantage of the market on commodities, the prices of which fluctuate greatly at certain seasons of the year. A plant of this character, adequate for the needs of the institution, could be installed for approximately \$10,000, and a conservative estimate would be that the saving to the institution in three years would pay for the entire outlay.

The failure of the legislature to provide an appropriation for new heating facilities caused great inconvenience to the institution, and had not the Emergency Board come to the rescue, the suffering to the patients would have been very great. The Emergency Board came to our relief by appropriating \$22,000. We have installed four new boilers with a capacity of 1,400 horse power, which is adequate for the needs of the institution, and which we consider second to none in the state, even though the cost has been considerably less. The low cost and satisfactory installation of the boiler plant is due to a very great extent to Mr. N. G. Carney, our chief engineer, who drew the plans and specifications for the new plant and labored indefatigably in the installation of same and the Board takes this opportunity to express its appreciation of his efforts.

The Board would suggest that some legislation be recommended to the end that would permit of more just salaries for the Financial Officers and Storekeepers of institutions of this kind. The present salaries are entirely out of proportion to the salaries of other officers in public institutions and greatly inadequate, considering the amount and kind of work they perform. The entire commercial business of institutions devolves on these men, and to a large extent they have the successful management of same in their hands. Competent and conscientious men, capable of filling these positions satisfactorily, are difficult to find. They must necessarily, be men of considerable business experience and training. It is necessary for them to purchase goods, weigh them, be judges of qualities, conditions, etc. They must be capable, honest and alert, and yet the law bars them from receiving, in our judgment, fair compensation, or as much as they could receive in the employ of private individuals or corporations. Under these conditions it is quite difficult to find such men and keep them.

We wish again to call attention to the amount realized this year from the farm, "\$18,635.47," the largest in the history of the institution. A detailed statement of the products and prices appears in the Financial Officer's report. We feel safe in saying that if we had been compelled

to go into the open market and buy these products, it would have cost the state fully \$22,000.

We are indebted to Dr. Love and his able and competent corps of assistants, to Mr. W. D. Wilcox, the Financial Officer, to Mr. Chas. Druitt, the Storekeeper, and the various heads of departments, for the able, competent and efficient manner in which they have discharged their duties.

## SUPERINTNDENT'S REPORT.

*To the Honorable Board of Trustees of the Toledo State Hospital:*

GENTLEMEN:— I have the honor of presenting the Superintendent's report for the year ending November 15th, 1906, it being the 23d annual report of the Toledo State Hospital. The following is a table showing admissions, re-admissions, discharges and deaths during the year.

By referring to the above table it will be seen that there were remaining at the end of last year 1,766 patients. There have been 474 admissions, 77 of which were re-admissions, making a total number of patients under treatment 2,240 for the year. Of this number 123 were discharged recovered, 115 improved, 30 unimproved, 2 not insane and 167 died, leaving in the institution at this date 1,803 inmates.

The percentage of recoveries based on number of admissions, was for men 27.43, women 25.75, total 25.98. The percentage of deaths based on the whole number under treatment, men 8.76, women 5.87, total 7.45.

The daily average number in the institution for the year was 1,737, which is 45 more than last year.

The per capita cost based upon the daily average number of patients in the institution and amount drawn from State Treasury, including current expenses and salaries of officers, was \$122.93. The per capita cost calculated upon the amount drawn from State Treasury, including current expense, salaries of officers, ordinary repairs and carpets and furniture, was \$139.94.

During the past year we have had two deaths from unnatural causes, the first a woman, who had the privilege of the grounds for a number of weeks. She suicided by drowning in one of the lakes. The other, a man, suffering from melancholia. One evening while the attendants were busy serving supper, he hung himself, using a sheet from his bed as a rope for the purpose. Neither one was considered a suicidal patient.

Our methods of treatment have been medical, recreative and employment at some kind of labor, the latter being the most beneficial to both acute and chronic cases. The institution has always made it a rule to keep as many patients as possible employed at some kind of labor. It is considered much better for the patients physically, and at the same time aids in the cure of their mental diseases.

Our daily average number of patients employed during the past year were men 542, and women 462. The men are employed on the farm, garden, ward work, barns and stables, greenhouse, general care of the grounds, coal sheds and various trades. The women are employed in the laundry, ironing room, sewing and mending departments, ward work, fancy work and general dining rooms, etc. By employing so many patients, it is a great saving to the state, for much of the work done by patients would have to be done by regular employees.

The subject of proper classification of mental diseases has not been thoroughly settled, each authority has his own classification and reasons for same. There is a tendency among modern institutions to accept the more scientific and simpler classification of Kreapelin, the German alienist. Some authorities differ with him while others modify it to suit their own needs. We make no apologies for adopting this modern and more reasonable classification.

During the past summer and autumn we have built and completed two double story verandas on the north wings of the "M" building, the wards on this building being occupied by our disturbed male patients. The porches are built of cement blocks, brick, cement and iron, and are provided with suitable screens. Each porch will accommodate an entire ward, and during suitable weather this gives the patients the benefit of outdoor life.

Porches to cottages No. 3 and No. 5 have been constructed during the past summer, the same material being used in each porch. At the present time cottage No. 2 is being remodeled, an appropriation of \$4,500 being allowed us for remodeling cottages for this year. Two small additions have been built to this cottage, one for an extra stair-

way leading to the dormitory in case of fire; the other addition is for lavatories, bath room and closet, which have been tiled and wainscoted. This addition has been extended to three stories, the upper one being used for sleeping room for two night watches.

We have also built an addition to our bake shop and this extra room will be utilized as a flour room; the present one being too small and was without heat and in cold weather it was necessary to heat the flour before the baker could use it. The old flour room will be used as a bread room.

We have also built a new oil room to our electric light station and boiler plant. The old one was too small and beginning to tumble down on account of the foundations giving away.

During the last session the legislature failed to give us an appropriation to install a new boiler plant. By placing the exact facts before the Emergency Board, we were allowed \$22,000 for the installation of four new 350 horse power water tube boilers. The contract was awarded to the Ricard Boiler and Engine Co., of Toledo, Ohio. Owing to the lateness of letting the contract, we have suffered more or less inconvenience on account of the cold autumn weather. At the present time we have one battery of two boilers completed and in operation, and they are giving perfect satisfaction. I take this opportunity to thank the contractors, our chief engineer and his men, who have worked night and day in order to have the first battery of boilers ready for heat, at the earliest possible moment. Some of the men worked two days and nights without sleep, and every one connected with the work was faithful and did more than was required of him.

We are also building a new corn crib in connection with our hog pen, that will hold 1,200 bushels of corn.

We have installed an entire new central energy telephone system which is working with perfect satisfaction. In connection with the new telephone cable, we have made provision for fire, general calls, and night watch system calls.

All the crops from the farm and garden were very good for the past year. Products from the garden were estimated at \$7,175.40, and products of the farm amount to \$6,585.70. Hogs slaughtered amounted to \$4,874.37, making a grand total of \$18,635.47. For itemized account we refer you to the Financial Officer's report. As an experiment, we planted 12½ acres of sugar beets, which produced 175 tons at \$5.00 per ton F. O. B. cars, amounted to \$875.00. We consider this a very good result from so small an acreage.

The weekly dances have been continued throughout the year, with the exception of July and August on account of the extremely hot weather. During that period we repainted and redecorated our amusement hall.

Our ball team, under the management of Dr. Unckrich, was up to the usual standard, and on an average of two games per week were

played with various teams of the city. This is an amusement our patients thoroughly enjoy.

The hospital band, under the direction of Dr. Young, gave regular weekly concerts on the lawn when the weather permitted. Often times the band gave their concerts while the ball game was being played, and it made the afternoon doubly enjoyable to our patients.

Our annual picnic was given at the Casino, about 750 patients in all enjoying the day. We are especially indebted to the management of the Casino for the free use of their park and theatre at that time.

Rev. A. J. Jennings holds religious services every first and third Sunday of the month. Rev. N. B. C. Love every second Sunday, and Father Chas. Herr conducts Catholic services every fourth Sunday of the month.

We are indebted to Mr. H. P. Crouse, editor of the Toledo Press, for our Memorial Day address, and to the Hon. D. D. Donovan, of Napoleon, Ohio, for our Fourth of July oration. We also wish to thank the Toledo Maennerchor for the excellent concert they gave us, and the Toledo High School boys for their minstrel show.

No changes have been made in our medical staff this year, which consists of Dr. Nelson H. Young, Dr. Frank D. Ferneau, Dr. Frank J. Latshaw, Dr. Chester C. Kirk, Dr. Elmer C. Unckrich and Dr. Rose E. Timms. They take a great interest in their work and have been very faithful in the performance of their duties, and I especially wish to thank them. Mr. W. D. Wilcox still remains as our Steward, and I wish to thank him for the excellent manner in which he has conducted the financial affairs of the institution. I also wish to thank Mr. Chas. W. Druitt, our Storekeeper, for the careful and conscientious manner in which he has conducted his department.

In conclusion, gentlemen of the Board of Trustees, permit me to thank you for the care and attention you have given the affairs of the institution and for your faithful support and wise counsel and personal kindness you have extended to me on all occasions.
