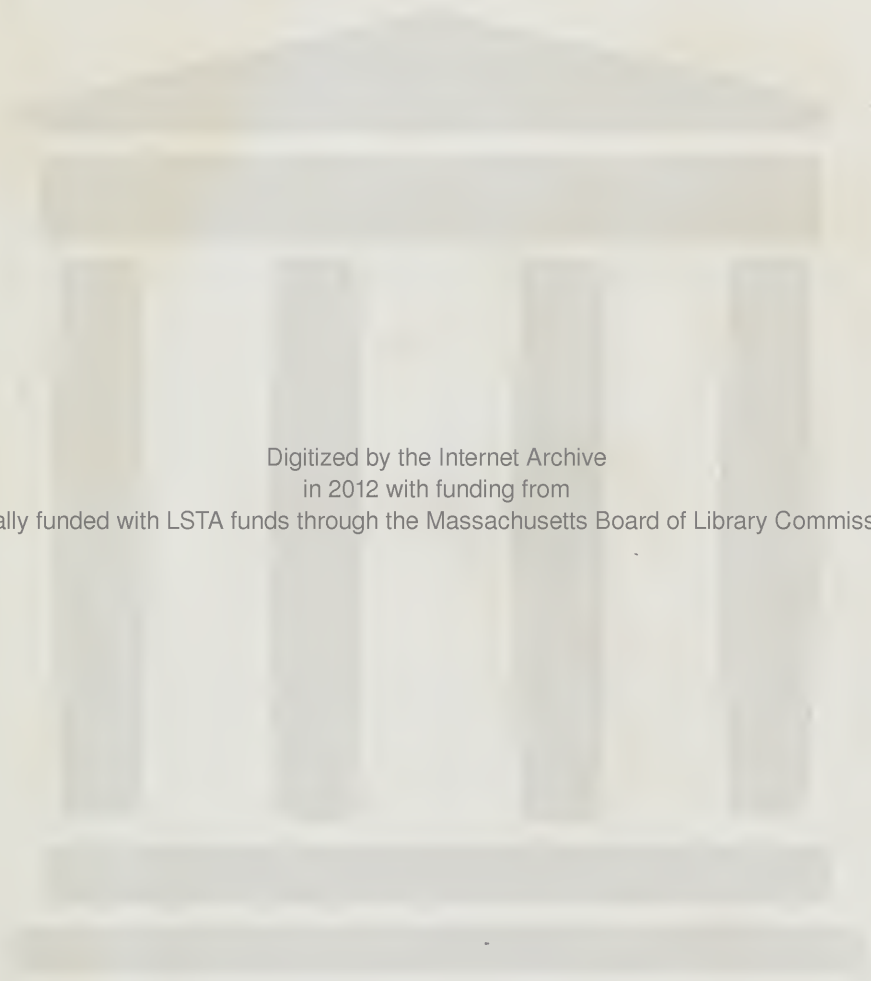

Gentlemen: I submit herewith my report of an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Ipswich for the period from January 1, 1932 to December 11, 1933, and in addition, the accounts of the treasurer and collector of taxes for the period from December 12, 1933 to March 22, 1934, made in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 44, General Laws. This is in the form of a report made to me by Mr. Herman B. Dine, Chief Accountant of this Division.

REPORT OF CHIEF ACCOUNTANT

Mr. Theodore N. Waddell,

Director of Accounts,

Department of Corporations and Taxation,

State House, Boston.

Sir: In accordance with your instructions, I have made an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Ipswich for the period from January 1, 1932 to December 11, 1933 and, in addition, have made an audit of the accounts of the treasurer and collector for the period from December 12, 1933 to March 22, 1934, the following report being made thereon:

The financial transactions of the town, as recorded on the books and accounts of the several departments receiving or disbursing town funds or committing bills for their collection, were examined and reconciled with the books and records of the town accountant.

The books and accounts of the town accountant were examined and checked in detail. The recorded receipts were checked with the treasurer's books and departmental records, while the recorded payments were compared with the treasury warrants and the treasurer's books.

The appropriation accounts were examined, and all appropriations and transfers were checked with the town clerk's records of town meetings and the finance committee's records of transfers authorized from the reserve fund.

The ledgers were analyzed, the necessary adjustments were made, a trial balance was drawn off proving the ledger to be in balance, and a balance sheet, which is appended to this report, was prepared showing the financial condition of the town as of December 11, 1933.

The books and accounts of the treasurer and collector, as treasurer, were examined and checked in detail. The recorded receipts were analyzed and compared with the records in the several departments collecting money for the town, with the other sources from which money was paid into the town treasury, and with the records of the town accountant. The payments were checked with the selectmen's warrants authorizing the treasurer to disburse town monies and with the accountant's ledger accounts.

The cash balance on December 11, 1933, and again on March 22, 1934, was verified by an actual count of cash in the office and by a reconciliation of the bank balance with a statement furnished by the bank of deposit.

The payments on account of maturing debt and interest were proved with the amounts falling due and with the cancelled securities and coupons on file.

The savings bank books and securities representing the investments of the several trust funds in the custody of the town treasurer were personally examined and listed as of December 11, 1933 and March 22, 1934. The income was proved and the receipts and disbursements were verified.

It was noted that, included in the investments of one of the trust funds on March 22, 1934, was a bond in the amount of \$12,342.68 representing a loan issued in accordance with a vote of the town at a special meeting held December 14, 1933. As the issue of this bond was not in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 44, Gen-

eral Laws, the investment of public trust funds in this type of security is contrary to the provisions of Section 54, Chapter 44, General Laws.

The books and accounts of the treasurer and collector, as collector, were examined and checked in detail. The commitments of taxes, assessments, and electric light and water charges were verified and compared with the warrants issued by the assessors and with records in the electric light and water departments. The recorded collections were checked with the payments to the Treasurer as shown by the treasurer's and accountant's books.

The recorded abatements were proved with the assessors' records of abatements granted and with the records in the electric light and water departments, and the taxes transferred to tax titles were compared with the treasurer's and the accountant's records of tax titles held by the town.

The outstanding accounts were listed and reconciled with the accountant's ledger, and were further verified by mailing notices to a number of persons whose names appeared on the books as owing money to the town, the replies thereto indicating that the accounts, as listed, are correct. The outstanding tax, assessment, electric light and water accounts on March 22, 1934, were marked in the commitment books, and the total amounts outstanding on the several tax levies were given to the assessors and to the electric light and water boards for recommitment to the new collector.

It is recommended that a determined effort be made to secure settlement of the overdue tax, assessment, electric light, and water accounts.

The books and accounts of the assessors were examined and checked. It is recommended that the assessors' record in the official abatement book all abate-

ments granted, and that they report to the town accountant monthly all abatements granted by them.

In checking the assessors' computation of the 1933 Tax rate, it was noted that they failed to include in the total amount of appropriations raised in the tax levy of 1933 the sum of \$14,285.88, representing appropriations from available funds voted by the town, although the above amount was used by the assessors in the determination of the tax rate as a deduction from the amount to be raised by taxation. The failure of the assessors to provide for these appropriations caused a revenue deficit for 1933, which should be provided for and raised in the revenue of 1934.

The town clerk's records of town meeting votes were examined and the appropriations, transfers, and loans authorized were checked to the accountant's ledger. An annual appropriation for the water department should be voted, since Chapter 396 of the Acts of 1928 placed the water department on the same basis as other town departments in the matter of incurring liabilities without specific appropriation therefor.

The town clerk's records of dog and of sporting licenses were examined, and the payments to the town treasurer, the county, and the State were verified.

The surety bonds on file for the several town officials required by law to furnish such surety, were examined and found to be in proper form.

The records of receipts from licenses granted by the selectmen, and of receipts from the sealer of weights and measures, town hall rents, town scales, town infirmary, and of the health, public welfare, school, and cemetery departments were examined, and the recorded collections were checked with the payments to the treasurer as shown on the treasurer's and the accountant's books.

In examining the departmental accounts receivable it was noted that certain departmental accounts outstanding are long overdue. A determined effort should be made to secure settlement of these delinquent accounts, but if they are found to be uncollectible, they should be abated.

The electric light guarantee deposits in the custody of the manager of the electric light department were examined and checked at the expiration of the audit and these funds were placed in the custody of the town treasurer.

In addition to the balance sheet there are appended to this report, tables showing a reconciliation of the treasurer's cash, summaries of the tax, assessment, and departmental accounts, together with schedules showing the trust fund transactions.

For the courtesies and co-operation extended by the various town officials during the progress of the audit, I wish, on behalf of my assistants and for myself, to express appreciation.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

To the Citizens of Ipswich :

The new plan of electing Selectmen for one, two and three years, as you know, came into effect this year and as a result one old member of the Board and two new members were elected. It is a pleasure to state to you that the Board of Selectmen has worked through the entire year with complete harmony and has co-operated in all matters we have handled for what we believe to be the best interest of the town and not for the purpose of furthering the personal advancement of any member of the Board. It is true that some attempts have been made to break up this harmony but they have not been successful. The old member of the Board has co-operated with the new members and has given them, without stint, of the experience he has gained in previous years.

We have tried to keep in very close touch with the expenditures of the departments that come under our control with the result that we will finish the year with no unpaid bills. During the year the Chairman of the Board received the appointment of E.R.A. Administrator, and he has been at all times willing to consult with the full Board on all matters and projects pertaining to E.R.A. work and to unite with us to get as much as possible for the benefit of Ipswich.

In regard to the different departments which come under our charge and supervision we desire to say that although the highway appropriation is limited the general upkeep and care of the streets under Superintendent Wood has given satisfaction.

In the Police Department the Chief of Police, William E. Garrette, has at all times kept in close touch with the wishes of the Board and in our opinion the administration of the department under him has been of a high order and satisfactory to the people.

In the Fire Department Ipswich has always had an efficient fire department and this year has been no exception. We have been thoroughly satisfied with the work of the men in that department.

We desire also to extend our thanks and appreciation to Town Counsel George A. Schofield for his advice and assistance during the year and also to Robert F. Bamford, Esq., who was the Acting Town Counsel during the absence of the regular Town Counsel while in Europe.

We fully realize that the people are looking for economy in town government and the situation is such that the word economy must be kept continually in mind. In going over the budgets of the departments for this year we have had that in mind and we have made a very careful study of the actual needs of the various departments and we feel that the amounts requested are actually needed to carry on the work efficiently. Neglect to do needed work is usually not a saving but a loss and in spite of hard times needed work should be done.

During the year the Board has attended all public hearings where matters of interest to the town of Ipswich were to be discussed and has labored at all times, together with the Town Counsel, to put forward the claims of Ipswich to the end that we might receive a fair, proportionate part of whatever is being expended from outside sources.

We made the following recommendations: That the streets be given at least the same care as last year, that Chap. 90 Work, so called, for the Topsfield and Linebrook Roads be continued and Chap. 90 Work, so called for Mill Road shall be adopted. We also recommend that the town take advantage of any P.W.A. allotments

that the federal government may make available for Public Works Program. All of our neighboring towns and cities are reaching out to get a share of this work and ultimately we will have to pay our share in taxes to the federal government for all the work done. It seems to us that to neglect to get a part of that work for Ipswich for its future betterment and at the same time be paying for the betterment of other places is not a wise course. We certainly have needs in Ipswich which might be met under the P.W.A. plan and our opinion is that we ought not to neglect the opportunity to get assistance for something which is actually needed.

There is a concerted movement at the present time on the part of the President and the Governor for a wise program for the suppression of crime. To make such a movement a success every town and city must contribute its part. To the end that Ipswich may do its share, we recommend that a generous appropriation be given for police work and that no false economy shall prompt the cutting down of a fair appropriation for that department.

NOTICE

The attention of parents is called to the law relating to the registering of births. The present requirements are as follows:

Chapter 29, Section 6 of the Revised Laws. Parents within forty days after the birth of a child . . . shall cause notice thereof to be given to the Clerk of the town or city in which such child is born.

Section 8. A parent . . . who neglects so to do for ten days after the time limited therefor . . . shall forfeit not more than five dollars for each offense.

ATTENTION OF PHYSICIANS AND MIDWIFES IS
CALLED TO CHAPTER 280, SEC. 1
ACTS OF 1912

Section 1. Physicians and midwives shall, within forty-eight hours after the birth of every child in cases which they were in charge, mail or deliver to the Clerk or Registrar of the City or Town, in which the birth occurred, a notice stating the date and place of the birth, giving the street number, if any, the number of the ward in a city and the family name. Failure to mail or deliver the said notice shall be punished by a fine not exceeding twenty-five dollars for each offense.

I wish to call attention to the following vital statistics:

It is important that these records shall be correct. If any errors are discovered, the Clerk will deem it a favor to have them reported at once, so that correction may be made.

Some of the many reasons why births should be recorded:

To prove legitimacy.

To establish identity.

To prove nationality.

To show when a child has the right to enter school.

To show when a child has the right to seek employment under the Child Labor Law.

To show when a child has the right to apply for a license to operate a motor vehicle.

To establish the right to inheritance to property.

To establish liability to military duty as well as exemption therefrom.

To establish the right to hold public office.

To qualify to hold title to, and to buy and sell real estate.

To prove the age at which the marriage contract may be entered into.

To make possible statistical studies of health conditions.

As required by Chapter 46, Section 15, General Laws of Massachusetts notice is hereby given that the Town Clerk will furnish blanks for returns of births to parents, householders, physicians and registered hospitals' officers applying therefor.

For the benefit of the owners and keepers of dogs, the following extract of the General Laws is hereby submitted:

General Laws, Chapter 140, Sections 136A-175

Amended by Ch. 289 of 1932 and Ch. 320 of 1934

SECTION 137. Licenses and Tags. The owner or keeper of a dog which is three months old or over shall annually, on or before March thirty-first, cause it to be registered, numbered, described and licensed for one year from April first following, if the dog is kept in Boston in the office of the police commissioner, or if kept in any other town in the office of the clerk thereof. The license shall be in a form prescribed by the director, upon a blank to be furnished, except in the county of Suffolk, by the county in which the town is located, and shall be subject to the condition expressed therein that the dog which is the subject of the license shall be controlled and restrained from killing, chasing or harassing live stock or fowls. The owner or keeper of a licensed dog shall cause it to wear around it's neck or body a collar or harness of leather or other suitable material to which shall be securely attached a tag in a form prescribed by the director, and upon which shall appear the license number, the name of the town issuing such license and the year of issue. Such tags shall be furnished in the same manner as the license blanks, and if any such tag shall be lost the owner or keeper of such dog shall forthwith secure a substitute tag from the town clerk, at a cost of ten cents which shall be retained by the town clerk unless otherwise provided by law. Any person may bring or cause to be brought from another state or country any dog licensed under the laws thereof and keep such dog

in this commonwealth for a period not exceeding thirty days without licensing it hereunder, and during such period the foregoing provisions of this section shall not apply to such dog.

SECTION 138. Licenses. The owner or keeper of a dog may at any time have it licensed until April first following; and a person who after April first becomes the owner or keeper of a dog which becomes three months old after March thirty-first in any year, shall, when it is three months old, cause it to be registered, numbered, described, licensed, collared or harnessed and tagged as required by section one hundred and thirty-seven.

In summary, may I say that the arrests for the year 1934 increased about 30% over the previous year.

Drunkenness showed a marked increase as did operating while under the influence of liquor, while other violations remained about the same.

The automobile situation in this town, the same as many others, has arrived to the point wherein some provisions must be made relative to parking, and as a committee is already working on that particular thing, let us hope that the citizens will get behind this project and see that it is carried out. Automobiles are here to stay and we must make provisions for them.

The town should also adopt rules and regulations governing parking, that is, parking on the side only, one hour parking in some sections and wherein stop signs are displayed, make them mean something.

There are several bad corners which display stop signs and if automobilists would heed them, there would be a lot less accidents.

It is noticeable the number of cars that park on Choate Bridge and without any question of doubt, it is one of the most dangerous places we have within our jurisdiction.

Some over six hundred cars were tagged for irregular parking and were simply requested to park within the lines as there was no other method to pursue.

It should be that the Police would have the power to stop all these irregularities by a town ordinance governing same.

I just want to call your attention to cramped quarters at the Police Station. We have one room only which has to be used by officers and prisoners alike and if a party wants to talk in privacy, we have absolutely no place to take them.

We have four cells in the lock-up and although they are painted and kept clean, they are unfit for habitation. They are not ventilated and are very cold and damp, and regardless who the party is that may be unfortunate enough to be locked up, they still remain a human being.

In conclusion, I want to thank the Board of Selectmen for the efficient way they have handled the Police Department and also that they have made it possible to confer with them as a body and not individually.

REPORT OF CEMETERY COMMISSIONERS

To the Citizens of Ipswich :

During the past year considerable work has been done in the Old North, Highland and Locust Grove Cemeteries, where with the kind co-operation of Chairman Wallace of the Board of Selectmen and who is also local E.R.A. Administrator, and the members of the Board, noticable improvements have been accomplished.

In the Old North the old stones have been straightened and cemented and others were repaired. The old tombs also were repaired and put in first class sanitary condition. On one of the terraces, because of erosion, it was deemed necessary to build a wall. The trees throughout were trimmed and thinned.

In the Locust Grove Cemetery the grass avenues were dug to the depth of 10-in. and gravelled, giving a good solid road bed. Single graves which were in poor shape and for which no funds were available, were for the improvement of the cemetery, reloamed and seeded.

The Commissioners are asking this year for a somewhat larger appropriation than last year, for the following reasons: The acreage of the grounds has been considerably increased, entailing more work to keep them presentable. The fence in the Locust Grove Cemetery, on the Lower Farm Road and Locust Road, is wholly down and 35 feet of the fence on the Northwest, bounding the Foster estate, has blown down during the high winds, and the rest is in bad shape. A section of fence in the Old North Cemetery also needs replacing. Both tool houses require shingling.

Acknowledgment is hereby made to all persons who by acts or suggestions have assisted the Commissioners in their work during the past year, or who have contributed in anywise toward the improvement of the town's burial grounds.

REPORT OF MOTH SUPERINTENDENT

To the Board of Selectmen:

I herewith submit my annual report as Superintendent of the Moth Department.

During the past year this department has carried on the usual routine of insect control. The gypsy and browntail moths have been found in considerable numbers in various sections of the town. The tent caterpillar and elm leaf beetle were more or less numerous during the summer. Evidently the low temperatures of last winter had no effect upon them. Apparently these insects intend to stay with us indefinitely, consequently the work of suppressing them must still be carried on.

Considerable work was accomplished in this department during the early winter by means of an E.R.A. project. Through this project insect control work was carried on on Town Hill, Dow Memorial Park, Highland Cemetery, and the territory surrounding the Ipswich Basin. Sixteen men and a foreman were employed in the work, which consisted of painting the egg clusters of the gypsy moth with creosote and cutting the webs of the browntail moth. Throughout this territory the insect conditions were found to be about normal. This project was under the supervision of the local Moth Superintendent.

REPORT OF TREE WARDEN

To the Citizens of Ipswich :

I herewith submit my annual report as Tree Warden.

During the past year the usual routine of this department has been carried out.

Many of our shade trees have received careful attention with regard to the removal of dead and diseased limbs. Many low-hanging limbs were also removed, as they constituted a danger to passing vehicles.

A great deal of work was accomplished last winter in the nature of brush cutting along the rural streets through C.W.A. projects. There is much more to be done, and will be done this coming year.

Four shade trees were taken down during the past year. Two of these were in a very dangerous condition, while the remaining two were growing on the edge of the highway and were very much in the way of traffic. It will be necessary to remove several more during the coming year which are already dead. New trees will be planted in their places.

Dutch Elm Disease. Your attention is again called to the possible menace of this disease to our fine old elms. As yet, this disease has not entered Massachusetts, although several trees in Connecticut have succumbed to its ravages. The tree warden urges all those who are interested in the welfare of the elm to procure information from this department or from the government. It is hoped that an extra sum of money can be obtained this coming year in order that our elms may be thoroughly cleaned of dead and diseased wood. It would be a wise investment for us to take preventative steps at this time rather than to wait until the disease suddenly strikes into such trees as are in a low state of vitality and which may possibly infect healthy trees.

REPORT OF PARK COMMISSIONERS

To the Citizens of Ipswich :

The Board of Park Commissioners herewith submit their annual report:

Arthur W. Dow Park: With the assistance of an E.R.A. project, this tract of land received a thorough cleaning out of underbrush and old trees which disfigured the landscape. This is a beautiful piece of property which is deserving of considerable care.

North and South Greens: As in former years, tulips have been planted in the beds on both Commons.

Due to the excessive dry spell of the past season, the parks have not looked as well as formerly. Many brown and bare spots throughout the park areas which showed themselves during the drought have provided favorable inroads for many of our common weeds, which are difficult to eradicate after they become well established. The Park Commissioners feel that a slightly higher appropriation should be made this year to combat this condition. Re-loaming many of the bare spots, reseeding, and fertilizing should be done early this spring in order that these areas may be benefited before the hot summer months arrive.

Giles Firmin Garden: A tulip bed was added to this plot of ground last fall. A new lawn area on one side of the pond was seeded last spring and is now well established. The developments that have been made on these grounds during the last two years have added much to their beauty.

The Park Commissioners wish to take this opportunity to express their sorrow in the loss of one of their members, Ernest H. Pickard, who passed away last fall.

All our apparatus and equipment is in first class condition at the present time.

We are pleased to report a very small loss caused by fire this year, \$8,079.40 as compared with an average loss of the five previous years of \$54,094.00.

The purchase in April of this year of the 1000-gallon Seagrave pumper which went into commission in July, proved a very valuable addition to our fire fighting equipment.

The C.W.A. projects this year at the Central Fire Station cement floor and painting of the building inside and out, and new electric light fixtures, cost the Department about \$400.00 as their share of the expense.

Our local administrator of the E.R.A. funds took advantage of the opportunity offered this year to build water holes, so-called, in the outlying sections of the town beyond the hydrant service, so as to give fire protection to the citizens of those localities. Under the supervision of the Chief Engineer of the Fire Department five were built in the Linebrook section, one at Bull Brook, one at the foot of Garrett's Hill (South West End), one at the Turft ditch just across the Turnpike near Spiller's corner, one near the Plains Road nearly opposite the Linebrook Church, and one just beyond the old cemetery in Linebrook near the main road. In the Argilla section, water was piped from the Rantoul Pond, a distance of

200 feet, to a brick cistern built along side of the road. At the present time one is being built just outside the entrance to Little Neck, and will be completed within a short time. All of these holes can be easily reached by our pumping engines, and contain enough water to put out any fire that might occur in their vicinity.

Before these holes were constructed we had nothing to work with, but now we can use our engines. We are in hopes of having some more built as we have chosen locations for them.

We desire this year to purchase new service coats for the firemen, and a deluge gun so that it will be possible to have a heavy concentrated stream if needed. At the present time we have nothing of the kind.

We are also asking for 500 feet of 2½-in. hose as we bought none the past year, and it is really necessary to add new hose to our equipment as some that we now have is quite old and will soon have to be replaced.

REPORT OF CLAM COMMISSIONERS

To the Citizens of Ipswich :

The Clam Commissioners submit the following report.

We wish first to call to your attention the importance of this industry. There has been a disposition in the past to overlook the value of it to the town. There is no reason why clams should not bear the same relation to Ipswich as fish does to Gloucester.

For the last few years clamming in Ipswich has been at a very low ebb. Perhaps lower than ever before. A great deal of this was undoubtedly caused by the prevalence of the green crab. Last town meeting appropriated \$750.00 to be used in connection with money from the state to exterminate them, but we did not have to use it as the extreme cold of last winter completely wiped them out. The result of the elimination of the green crab is clearly shown when we find last summer a great natural seeding (the first for several years), so that practically every flat is full of small clams. Evidence that the crabs did destroy the seed in years back.

The problem for the coming year is to see that we get the most out of our flats and bar the digging of the small clams. If the situation is handled right we should have good clamming in Ipswich for years to come.

The Commissioners tried to get the State law changed to 2½ inches insted of 2 inches, but we were told that on account of conditions on the South Shore it was not feasible at this time.

Last summer under the E.R.A. 120 barrels of clams from polluted areas were placed in the back river. These helped out in the late fall and winter clamming. The

seeding was done under the supervision of a member of the Commission and furnished work for a number of in-town men.

In the spring the seed was so thick on some flats that it was taken and put in some other flats that were not so well covered. This also furnished work for a number of the clambers.

During the summer a large area in the back river was closed, including most of the shore flats to protect them from out of town diggers. This necessitated a good deal of supervision.

In view of the large number of small clams in the flats it requires a lot of watching if we are to get the most out of our flats and prevent wrecking of them by indiscriminate digging.

The Commissioners recommend that a fee be charged for a permit this year and that a suitable amount be raised to secure a reasonable amount of supervision. There will be no need for any seeding this year, but a lot of police work will have to be done if we are to avoid the mistakes of the past and get the most out of our flats.

There is no reason why with proper care clamming should not be a permanent source of income to a large part of our people.

ASSESSORS' REPORT

In making this, the annual report of the Board of Assessors, there has been included the work sheet that is used in computing the tax rate, and tables of aggregates covering the work of this Department.

It is needless for us to recall the increase in tax rate for 1934, but perhaps a few figures would be interesting to the tax payer.

Our appropriations in 1933 were \$316,538.22 against \$372,855.04 for 1934, an increase of \$56,316.82.

Available funds and special distributions in 1933 were \$38,035.00; in 1934 these same accounts were \$6,763.48, a loss of \$31,271.52.

Income from State in 1933 was \$23,998.70 and amount authorized by Commissioner in 1934 was \$28,693.66, but amount actually received was \$26,591.67.

In spite of loss from State authorized funds for use and amount received, by using a conservative amount for local receipts, we had a credit balance at end of year of over \$5,000.00. Therefore a true tax rate.

Our valuation in both Real and Personal was \$221,280.00 less than previous year, which compares very favorably with other municipalities.

A few were able to reduce their rate, a large majority were faced with an increase and many a larger amount than Ipswich.

Some interesting points of Massachusetts Weights and Measures laws, by John P. McBride, Director of Standards of Massachusetts:

Hawkers and Pedlers

From interpretation of this statute it will be noted that the offense is described in Sec. 13 as selling, carrying for sale, or exposing for sale and that there must be a going from place to place. A great source of trouble in the enforcement is experienced by reason of the so-called orders for future delivery. Our attitude in relation to this phase is that at least one day shall elapse from the time of taking the order and delivery thereof. This reason rests on the ground that such construction is the only fair manner to prevent circumvention of the law, and runs back also to the main question as to whether there is a carrying for sale. If the merchandise is present at the time of the solicitation we have a carrying for sale. In those instances where the operator has a source of supply other than in a vehicle or his person, as the case of the ordinary grocery store or a coal man, and receives telephone orders or mail orders or solicits the business filling orders from his permanent source of supply, such method of operation would not be construed as peddling even though fulfillment of the order occurs on the day of its receipt.

Transient Vendors

The difficulty with this law lies in the shifting of the burden. Heretofore this law was construed to place the burden on the alleged transient opening after April 1st. It now becomes necessary by reason of the Attorney General's opinion that the government assumes the burden of showing by all the facts the transient nature of the busi-

ness. This, of course, is in accord with the theory of law and is in line with the opinion of the Attorney General. This opinion, however, does not mean that there are no transient vendors, but rather means that it is more difficult to prove the issue and opens wide the possibilities of avoidance. We were able to obtain convictions before the time clause was inserted in the law and the issue turned on the permanent or temporary character of the business as determined by the facts. After all it must be admitted that the man in business has certain privileges and our activities along these lines must now be directed to stores doing seasonal business and stores coming in for a special sale for limited duration. This may have been the real reason for the enactment of this law as the Supreme Court has said that it is not a revenue statute but is primarily for the purpose of preventing fraud and is, therefore, an exercise in its licensing requirement of the police power. You may differ with the opinion of the Attorney General, and the courts likewise may differ with this opinion but it is the duty of the State office to accept the guidance of the Attorney General as the chief law officer of the Commonwealth and with this opinion we have no quarrel.

IPSWICH BEACH COMMITTEE REPORT

To the Citizens of Ipswich :

In a previous report made by this Committee to the town it was unanimously recommended "that the Committee should be authorized to enter into an agreement with the owners of the Crane property to establish a reservation at the Beach — the care and control of the reservation to be placed in the hands of this Committee, giving them full authority to make rules and regulations concerning the use of the property."

It was also recommended that such an agreement should be made "only upon the full and complete recognition on the part of the owners of the Crane property and of the town that the fact of having entered into this agreement shall not be used by either of the parties in any way to bolster up any claim of ownership that either may have."

Both these recommendations were accepted and this Committee was authorized to act under them. Acting under this authority, meetings were held by the Committee with the representatives of the Crane property and as a result of such meetings a certain area of land was agreed upon and your Committee received from the attorney for the Crane people a letter, now on file, which states as follows :

"They (the Crane people) have authorized me to write you stating that they entirely approve and will cooperate with you in securing orderly parking and proper policing of the premises. This approval extends not only to uplands and Beach in which the Cranes or the Crane estate claim ownership but the Government property, of which Mrs. Crane is at present the licensee.

As I understand it, you desire to make a charge in connection with parking and other facilities and for this purpose desire to use certain parts of the

Crane property which you have designated in your conference with me. This will confirm the authorization which I gave you at that time to use such facilities and make such charges provided it is understood that this arrangement is entirely temporary and may be terminated by either party, it being only intended to provide a workable plan pending more permanent arrangements.

In this connection I should like to say that I am advised that there are no persons who have been given any permits by any of the Crane family to maintain refreshment stands or other edifices on the beach or upland, nor have any concessions been granted by them.

I further understand that you will endeavor to confine the parking to certain areas and to avoid congestion on the road leading to the Crane property and to the beach, and that you also intend to collect parking fees and to control all concessions and the erection of sanitary facilities and will do so in such a way that any concession granted will be temporary and such as may be terminated in the event of notice of termination of this agreement.

It is also my understanding that the town will undertake on its own responsibility to police the property, prosecute for disorderly conduct or other misdemeanors committed on the premises, and to exclude and eject undesirable persons from the area.

Finally it is understood on the part of both the town and the Crane family that this agreement is entirely without prejudice to any rights or claims of title made either by the town or the Crane family to any part of the beach and that neither party by entering or acting upon this agreement waives or relinquishes any rights or claims of title which either may have."

Acting under the above arrangement, your Committee turned over to William E. Garrett, Chief of Police of Ipswich and a member of the Committee, the work of putting the reservation in the best possible order and the work of making collections for parking and policing the reservation. This work started about July 1st and ended Sept. 26th so far as the collections for parking were concerned. A fee for parking was established as follows: On Sundays and holidays out of town cars, fifty cents; local cars, twenty-five cents. On all other days out of town cars, twenty-five cents; local cars, free. The following table will show the total receipts and expenditures for the three months covered:

When one considers the situation at the Beach previous to this work being undertaken and then looks over the territory after the work has been done, we believe there will be found a really wonderful piece of work was done. It was the universal sentiment, so far as we could learn, that those in charge of the work, the Chief of Police and his assistants, had accomplished wonders in a single year or indeed, in only three months. It must also be remembered that all the work was done, the cutting out of trees and bushes, the filling up of holes, the graveling of a large area of land to make it suitable for parking purposes, the building of a new board walk so long needed from the roadway to the Beach and many other improvements made there, not the least of which was the police work and the handling of the parking and the collection of the fees, all this work was done without the appropriation of a single cent of the town's money and not only paid for but left a balance of nearly a thousand dollars to start work with next season.

We believe that an enlargement of the parking space, the erection of necessary sanitary places and other needed improvements will follow along, many of them being possible from the receipts for the coming summer

and we hope we have made a start on solving the problem which has for so many years faced the people of Ipswich in regard to the Beach. It would seem that we are on our way to provide a place which is not to be commercialized but is to be such a place where one may take his family and children and feel perfectly safe in selecting that Beach for his outing. We know from the Crane family that they have been highly pleased at the result so far accomplished and we also know from what we have heard from those who have seen and used the Beach that not only our own people but many from surrounding towns have expressed great appreciation of the work which has been undertaken and the manner in which it has been conducted. Your Committee is in hopes that if not this season, probably at no distant date, when more of the improvements have been accomplished, it will be possible to open up the reservation for parking to the people of the town without charging any fee whatever for Sundays or holidays. Of course, all other days are free to them now.

The other members of the Committee desire to extend their appreciation and thanks to their fellow member, William E. Garrette, for the great interest he has shown and the amount of time he has devoted to making our plan successful.

We earnestly regret the passing of one of our Committee, Dr. Charles W. Townsend, who was deeply interested in Ipswich Beach and all pertaining to it.

The following quotations from a letter recently received from the representatives of the Crane family we believe will be of interest to our citizens:

“The feeling is unanimous that conditions at the beach last year were vastly improved. The parking arrangements were more satisfactory, the policing of the beach was excellent, and the general discipline and behavior of those using the beach showed a corresponding improvement.”

“The Crane family wish to express their great appreciation of the efforts of the Beach Committee, the officials of the town and the Chief of Police in endeavoring to remedy a situation which had become most unsatisfactory.”

The vacancy caused by Dr. Townsend's death was filled by the appointment of Mr. Frank R. Starkey and the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mr. Edwin H. Damon was filled by the appointment of Mr. Harlan Burke.

As now constituted, the Committee is made up as follows: Three members of the Board of Selectmen, one member of the Board of Health, one member of the Water and Light Commission, the Chief of Police and the Town Counsel, all town officials, and three citizens, Robert T. Bamford, Esq., Roger Warner, Esq., and Joseph F. Claxton, Jr., all of whom have a deep interest in the future of the Beach. The knowledge and experience they have gained in the past year will be of benefit to all in the future management of the Beach. Unless the voters feel that they desire a change, we recommend that the present Committee be continued.

WELFARE REPORT

To the Citizens of Ipswich :

The taxpayers will be pleased to learn that Welfare expenditures have been reduced from \$61,320.19 in 1933 to \$47,543.03 in 1934, a drop of nearly twenty-five per cent.

This large reduction has been accomplished chiefly through the cooperation of the E.R.A. Administrator Wallace has found employment for many family men who have applied to the Welfare for relief, and this has been a substantial help in lightening our financial burdens. Weekly examination of cases at the Welfare room and daily investigations made at the houses of recipients of relief have been contributing factors in lowering costs.

The duty of billing and collecting from other cities and towns, formerly the work of another department, has been taken over by the Welfare and delegated to Miss Dawson, the secretary. The results obtained have justified this change. The amount collected from other cities and towns in 1933 was \$8,763.91, while the total collections of 1934 were \$11,206.86, a gain of about twenty percent. It is not possible to collect all that is owing up to December 31st in any given year. There will necessarily be overlappings but these even up in the long run.

The work of investigation in Ipswich and other cities and towns has been carried on through personal visitation and correspondence. Some seventy places have been covered in these ways, the files showing over eight hundred pieces of correspondence, and the mileage above three thousand, of which about two thousand has been paid for at six cents per mile. Investigation has been made of approximately two hundred hospital cases.

The entire board has worked with an eye single to the best interests of the taxpayer and the needy poor, and it is believed that the results will bear favorable comparison with those of any other town of like size and condition in the state regardless as to whether the form of government is ancient or modern. In numerous other places the Bureau of Old Age Assistance is separate from the Welfare Board, with extra cost of administration. Here they are combined for the sake of economy and no additional expense entailed.

The number of families being assisted remains practically the same as a year ago. Some of course have been discontinued, but their places have been taken by others, leaving no real change in the total. The board is sensible of the fact that the allowance to each family is considerably less than the actual need, but it is also mindful of the plight of the taxpayer. It is obvious that full support cannot be given to families, and that the best the board can do is to afford a measure of relief which must stop at least somewhat short of complete support. Whenever a man able to work has applied for aid and has received an order for supplies, he has been sent to some one of the labor departments of the town to work out his order. In this way close cooperation has existed between the Welfare and other departments which has worked to mutual advantage. There has been some complaint because recipients of aid having work created especially for them have been allowed \$3.00 a day, while those employed on regular and necessary town work have been paid \$4.00; but this has been in accordance with the vote of the town and appears to be wholly fair when viewed in the proper light.

Prospects for the coming year have not brightened. Industrial conditions as a whole give little promise of improvement and there is no knowing when Federal money allotted to cities and towns will be curtailed. In the uncertainty there appears to be nothing to do but to recommend an appropriation of substantially the same amount as last year.

The town infirmary is in good condition and is well managed, Mr. and Mrs. Dorr continuing to give general satisfaction. Those who expect the farm to show a profit should bear in mind that the place is an infirmary, in a very definite sense a semi-hospital, and that much of the superintendent's time is necessarily devoted to personal attentions to those in the home, farming operations being a secondary consideration. If those who think they could make the farm show a profit would impart their information to other farmers in town, it would be thankfully received. Better, still, the State Board would no doubt receive the information with gratitude because there is not a town or city farm in the state that we know about which shows a profit.

In conclusion, may we say that the town is passing through the most difficult period in its history and there is no branch of its government that is placed in a more trying situation than the welfare department. The board is laboring assiduously to meet the approval of the citizens and feels that measurably good work is being accomplished. We invite intelligent inspection and criticism. An unexpended balance of \$2,166.62 is being returned to the treasury.

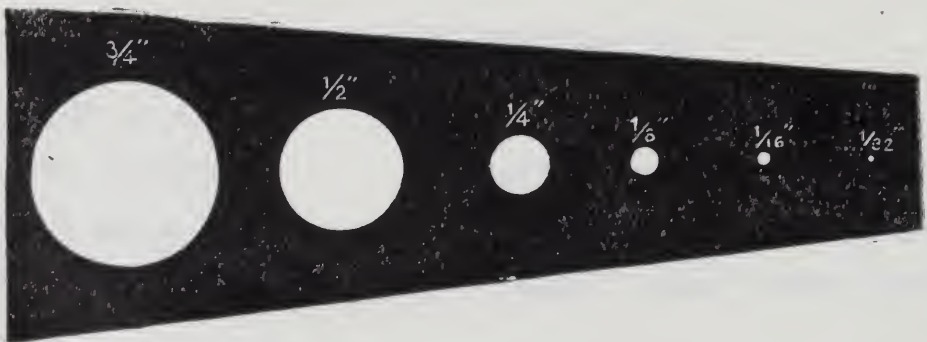

This comparison shows the very important fact that although there was 11% more electric current produced over the previous year the operating costs were reduced 7% at the same time. Included in this decreased operating cost was the price of fuel oil that increased $\frac{1}{2}$ a cent per gallon. The question could be asked, how could 11% more electricity be produced with the cost of fuel oil $\frac{1}{2}$ a cent more and still have the operating costs reduced by 7%? The answer is that the new engines installed the past year have shown a higher efficiency and there has been no repair bills such as we had on the old equipment.

On January 1, 1935 a new schedule of electric rates was announced which was a reduction of from 10% to 20% according to the type of consumer. This was made possible by the increased output and decreased costs and is the old story, the more current used the lower the rate.

This also affects the amount charged the Town for Street lighting. The estimated cost for the year 1935 is \$8,700.00, which is a decrease of 13% from the \$10,000 for 1934.

Water Department

During the past year the usual maintenance work has been carried on together with new extensions of the main water pipes on Cleveland Avenue, Ryan Avenue, and Agawam Avenue.

At the present time the small 4 inch water pipe on Lower East Street is being replaced by an 8" pipe which when completed will properly supply water to that section including the Summer colonies at Eagle Hill, Great Neck and Little Neck. This is an E.R.A. project the Water department furnishing the materials and some skilled labor and the E.R.A. the rough labor.

We recommend that a sum of money be appropriated for the current expenses of the Water Department this money to be paid from the receipts of the department.

Report of the Committee.

To the Citizens of Ipswich :

The School Committee has functioned as economically as usual this year in spite of various articles which have been published to the contrary.

The outstanding accomplishment this year has been the opening of the Trade School at the Green Street property. This school has relieved the congestion somewhat in the Manning Building and constitutes a very valuable addition to our school system. In view of the fact that so many boys are taking the course in manual training, the idea of establishing a State Trade School such as we have at Beverly, has been advanced for Ipswich. All of these State Trade Schools are overcrowded. Each has a long waiting list of students desiring admittance. We have the facilities and believe that the idea is worth consideration.

The various buildings in the school system with the exception of the Manning, are in excellent condition. They have been painted and present a very fine appearance. We wish to thank Mr. Wallace for his efforts in securing funds from the E.R.A., with which to carry on this work. Also in conjunction with the E.R.A. we are conducting classes in pre-primary work.

The need of a new high school is more urgent than ever. The present high school building does not furnish

any facilities for library work. Unless these can be provided, our boys and girls cannot compete with others more fortunately situated. In all fairness to our children, provision for this work should be made at the earliest possible date.

Owing to the completion of the athletic field, we are not asking for any appropriation to carry on our athletic program this year. It is a shameful fact that the one sport where girls can secure much benefit and enjoyment, namely basket-ball, cannot be carried on because there is no place available in which to play the game. The use of the Town Hall has been forbidden.

Provision should be made for this increasing demand for more indoor athletics. Parents are unwilling that their children should attend those places where commercial profits are the main consideration. With a new gymnasium, our young people of both sexes might share equally in the enjoyment of these health-giving activities under school supervision and authority. This is a matter also that demands our serious attention, for the welfare of our young people is in the balance.

However, unless Federal funds in the form of a large grant are forthcoming we advise waiting until we can see a reduction in the tax rate.

There are numerous items such as the elimination of field day and night sessions of classes during Education week, of which we might write but, due to expense of printing, we have been asked to curtail. In fact we have tried in every way to keep the expense of conducting the schools just as low as possible. We welcome any just criticism and would appreciate greatly any suggestions from citizens as to how we might reasonably economize.

Report of the Superintendent

To the School Committee of Ipswich :

Gentlemen :

The thirty-third annual report coming from the Superintendent of Schools is herewith submitted for your consideration.

Note: As a measure of economy, I have been requested to exclude from this number all reports of principals, supervisors, and subsidiary agencies, to review briefly the work of the year and to indicate as briefly such lines of policy as will, in our judgment, contribute to the best interest of our schools.

We are living in a changing world. To many of us these changes are most disturbing, and have brought nothing but confusion and distress. But the changes are with us and their solution demands the broadest and most comprehensive kind of consideration, something that will best meet the needs of the situation.

No one can foresee the end for the end is not yet. What that end will be depends upon our attitude of mind, our breadth of view, our good common sense, and our ability to choose the substance instead of the shadow.

As a general proposition it may be stated that unrestricted selfishness, while it may bring larger material gains to the individual, is absolutely destructive of those

higher ethical and moral principles upon which any enduring society must be built. Selfishness must then give place to service and sacrifice. This is America's challenge.

The consensus of the world's opinion seems to be that the "philosophy of the Golden Rule which comprehends all human rights, which sweeps across all lines of color, caste, and creed, which guarantees to every man freedom of thought and the integrity of his own conscience to affirm the dignity and divinity of human brotherhood," furnishes us with an objective that is worth our serious consideration.

It goes without saying that if, in our strivings, one half the weight and influence had been given to the moral and spiritual values upon which our happiness and very existence as a nation depend, we should not have found ourselves in this miserable plight. To this most of us agree.

But what are the facts. Let us face a few of them: Every natural resource, every known appetite and passion, and even those that would have remained dormant had they not been aroused by some subtle suggestion, has been exploited and made to pay tribute to greed and selfishness. We strove to become big before we were great.

The machine has forced us into a situation where the former work of our schools has been made to contribute, unconsciously, to our individual helplessness. Our knowledge, our skills, our inventive abilities are increasing our present troubles, and they are driving us irresistibly towards greater changes that will demand newer objectives.

All have not contributed to our discomfort; only the leaders have been responsible for the larger portion of our economic ills. But these had the power; they held the destiny of millions in their hand and they betrayed our confidence; in place of assurance they have given us distrust and disappointment. No man nor group of men is great enough nor good enough to exploit his fellow men. Neither should they be privileged to do so. Omnipotence is an attribute of God alone.

I have no desire nor inclination to explore all the depths of our manifold ills and miseries. That would be as unprofitable as it is humiliating. And so I will dismiss this phase of the subject with a single blanket indictment, general in scope and individual in application, of man's inhumanity to man.

But the way out, that is our present concern. And, first of all, may we agree to "let the dead past bury its dead." Crimination and recriminations get us nowhere. We need the best thoughts of the best minds that can be found anywhere. We need souls as well as minds. Souls untrammelled by any low-born thought of selfishness and bold enough to speak out.

Is a human being an asset or a liability? That depends largely upon his education and training. Let us examine a few specimens.

Do we ever stop to think about John Dillinger, formerly Public Enemy No. 1, the man that cost our government more than \$100,000 to kill? He was a gentle, mild-mannered, growing-up youngster. What was the matter with him? If some good mother, like Lincoln's mother, or your mother, could have gotten hold of him during the receptive period of his youth and given him the right attitude towards society, and impressed him with a sense of personal responsibility, wouldn't it have

been more economical, and wouldn't society have gained something? Does this suggest anything?

It was only a common place incident, witnesses in the slave market, that moved Lincoln to become the emancipator of nearly four millions of people. It was only an accidental happening that decided Sir Wilfred Grenfell to transform the cold, inhospitable country of Labrador into a spiritual kingdom whose influence is seen and felt in two continents. Were these worth while? What price will you put upon such service?

"The foxes have holes and the birds of the air have nests," but there are nearly half a million boys and girls between the ages of 13 and 20 in this country, living promiscuously in groups of 8 to 40 "that have not where to lay their heads." They travel from place to place as the resources of their section fail them. All means of transportation are open to them in equal degree at one stated price as is that of their food — theft. In summer they camp in thickets of wood, behind high buildings or walls, anywhere that offers protection from wind and rain. In winter they sleep in box cars, old buildings and sheds and even in abandoned ice houses and this, though miserably clad, in zero weather.

What are we to do with these? Aren't they worth saving? any of them? Suppose one of them was your child. I refer to their social salvation only. John Newton was an old slave trader and yet after he became "converted" he wrote some of the most beautiful hymns of which the Christian Church may boast. There's many a "brand snatched from the burning" that has become the torch bearer for the world on its upward swing. Does this group contain any such? **Equal educational opportunity should not be denied them.**

But we need not be sentimental, nor deal with theories alone. If we want a concrete example of what an enlightened and decent sense of justice and of personal moral responsibility will do for a people, just look across the line into Canada, our best and highly esteemed neighbor. That boundary line, 4,000 miles in extent, without a single fort or an armed guard throughout its whole length, is an everlasting monument to the intelligence, the moral integrity, and the exalted opinion of peace and goodwill held by neighboring people. Here is a lesson that should be driven home by our teachers. Some times we range far afield for examples that may be found right at hand.

The growing spirit of internationalism is compelling the study of modern history as never before. That nation having the best banking system, the best industrial system, the least unemployment, the fewest divorces and homicides and robberies, the best judiciary system, the best police system, the best educational system, is most humane in handling the aged, the infirm, and sick, etc., are studied and scrutinized most thoroughly today and the best, so far as other conditions permit, is appropriated by the rest of the world. Canada and the United States are friendly competitors; and we are pleased to state that in many particulars Canada ranks high, and should be studied by the students of government of other nations.

I have already suggested that our history classes make a more intensive study of the governmental machinery of other nations. If you can discover that the most stable forms are due to the general intelligence and moral integrity of a people, then you have made good progress in training for citizenship. Don't omit the study

of our own government and be sure to include the biography of the men who laid its foundation.

Our study of the great world movements should be thoroughly done. But the initial motive or purpose behind these movements furnishes the crux to the whole situation.

We need therefore to analyze the motives behind these movements very carefully for from them we get our standards of judgment. Unrestrained selfishness is self destructive and those things that are to endure must be free from its blighting influences. Men's opinions vary with their interests, therefore in studying great men or great movements, it behooves us to know what those interests were. We cannot emphasize this point too strongly.

Never before in the history of the whole world were so many noble attempts being made to lift our civilization to a higher plane. One touch of nature seems to have made the whole world akin and to have presented us with unexampled opportunities to benefit all mankind.

Some of these are old and some of them are new. But whether old or new they are bound to meet with opposition and resistance from those who have profited selfishly under the old order. Such is to be expected, for it has always been so. No reform, no great advance movement for humanity's sake, has ever been undertaken without incurring the open antagonism, the ridicule, and the scorn of those who are to lose materially by the change.

But this should not turn us from our purpose. Nothing is settled until it is settled right. If these things are right, that is, if they are calculated to relieve suffering and distress, to make a fairer distribution of the world's

abundance, to make better homes, to better adjust the burden of taxation, to give economic security and social justice, to furnish equal educational opportunity, to eliminate the slums, to guarantee to every man the "right of life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness," then, as all these point to human uplift and betterment, they are right in every moral and spiritual sense of the term, **and should be fought through to a finish.** It is the greatest opportunity of the ages. It is needed to round out the full measure and meaning of democracy, to establish peace in our land and to make this a **bloodless** revolution.

I have said that the machine is driving us irresistibly into new situations. In view of the evidence presented on every hand, no one will question this statement. What effect will the shorter-work day and the thirty-hour week have on school activities? With the hours of idleness on the worker's hands increased by one third and the raising of the school age, I feel that there is but one rational answer to this question. It is simply a shift from manual to mental activities, and wisdom will suggest that generous provision be made for the change.

I seriously question whether there will be many drastic changes made in our courses of study, partly because of the prevailing inertia, and partly because of the proven value of those we have. What changes are made should be in the nature of expansions and additions that will better meet present needs. College requirements are less rigid than formerly, and the notion that every boy should go to college is being discounted. This will give our secondary schools more latitude in the arrangement of courses and schedules, and let the individual come into his own.

Even in the absence of complete laboratory equipment much information and interest may be gained from the study and discussion in class of many of our natural and social science text books. More attention must be given to the reading of magazines and papers, especially those dealing with economic and sociological matters. The doings of governmental bodies both here and abroad should be kept as nearly up to date as possible.

In this connection I wish to speak of the need of a library room in each of our school buildings. At present we are severely handicapped in this respect. Until such time as these rooms are available, book shelves should be furnished in one room at least in each building. The books should be carefully selected and purchased from the appropriation for text books and supplies. In each and every instance these books should be in the charge of some competent person with some knowledge of library practices as to cataloguing and distribution.

But all the courses of study, all the books and libraries in the world, will not make a good citizen without these being supplimented by some authority or power that is capable of holding each and every student up to the full measure of his responsibility. The schools have a specific task, the boy has, or should have, a definite purpose in coming to school. These objectives should never be lost sight of. They need not be always on parade; but they should be there, and each of the parties should fully realize that fact. The temptation to get by and the lapse of thorough understanding of the relationship between teacher and pupil, have led naturally but unconsciously to some unhappy results. Let then the teacher be given full authority and autocratic power to

enforce all reasonable mandates, and let him have the moral support and backing of the community. Could the proper conception of obedience to constituted authority be firmly impressed upon the minds of our youth today, our schools would turn out a more uniform product.

And now I wish to turn to a matter, though of world-wide significance, that has also a legitimate claim to local attention. The work of our local Parish Players will greatly assist me in conveying my idea. Poetry, music, and art should have a larger place in our life and no good reason can be given why each of these subjects should not be more fully developed in this community of ours. We should have more literary clubs, more musical societies, more art clubs of which there is such a dearth at the present time.

This was the home of Anne Bradstreet, one of the first female poets in this country. This is the birthplace of Arthur Wesley Dow, who went out from among us and gained an international reputation for what was high and pure and noble in art. We still have artists in our midst who are willing to do all in their power to develop art appreciation and skill. We still have with us musicians who are equally willing and anxious to develop their special lines. Our indifference to the successful development of these subjects takes much from the cultural status of our community. Could our enforced leisure time be employed to any better advantage?

In our zeal to accomplish as much as possible for world recovery by the newer lines of effort, we should remember that character and frugality still retain their ethical values and must be given a large place in the work of reconstruction. They furnish the best criterion

by which a decisive judgment may be had of the real value of men or measures and should never be repudiated. So let the old-fashioned virtues of honesty, truth, justice, patience, sympathy, **righteous indignation, and open hostility** be given a larger place in our thought and action.

But let us not delude ourselves. The reign of Technocracy may be coming, but it has not yet arrived. That cultured leisure, that social justice, that equality of opportunity, that economic security, etc., are as yet, merely consummation to be desired. Before any of these can reach the realization stage, the hardest kind of hard work must be done; for let it be remembered we are dealing with minds not materials. Are we willing to pay the price?

For the first time since athletics came into such prominence can our school system boast of an athletic field under the authority of the school department and for the exclusive use of our school membership. Athletics has become an integral part of our school curriculum, and it was necessary in order to carry out any constructive program of athletic work that only those in authority in school matters should have control of such equipment. It has been our good fortune to possess such additional facilities and for the future no special appropriations will be required.

In the matter of baseball and football there is a promising field for expert coaching with salaries in many instances equalling that of the highest paid members of the school faculty. This is the material side of sport. I claim it also has other possibilities. If we can translate the training and the spirit which high-minded coaches

endeavor to inculcate in their teams, to the furtherance of social, political and patriotic activities, much will be accomplished towards conserving our democratic institutions. If we could couple the training that football gives to that spirit so prominent in the Athenian's oath, then our country would be the outstanding nation of the world in reference to rugged citizenship. Then football instead of a form of recreation would become a builder of men, equal to that of any subject in our curriculum. We have two or three outstanding examples of that at the present time.

At the beginning of the fall term, it was necessary to provide accommodations for between 20 and 30 over-aged boys. These, while having the ability to do the work which they disliked, much preferred to shift to manual activities. Through the co-operation of the Board of Selectmen the use of the building at the County House property was turned over to the School Department and a new phase in school adjustment was inaugurated. This provided not only for the special class but also gave opportunity to those already in the High School to undertake a systematic course in manual arts or trade school activities.

This extended the privilege to make repairs on articles of furniture in the home, and the making of new articles for home use or adornment was also seriously undertaken. The cost of new material was the only requirement. The money so obtained furnished the basis for a revolving fund by which new material could be purchased and the work continued.

Only a beginning has been made but the increased interest and enthusiasm of the membership confirm the

soundness of this policy. We are in hopes that the town will grant the authority to establish a Trade School by which one-half of the maintenance would be borne by the State. This would not only relieve us of a financial burden but would give opportunity to pupils in surrounding towns to enter this school on a tuition basis and thus further increase our revenue. The popularity of trade schools has increased immensely since the beginning of the depression and is looked upon by educators as one of the outstanding developments of school activities in recent years.

Trade schools already established have been obliged to increase their capacity until tuition students from other towns have been refused admission. The time has come when we are compelled to provide such instruction, and it can be said that those who have graduated from these schools during the past year have been successful in securing remunerative work. It is an opportunity for the schools of Ipswich to enlarge their scope, to increase their usefulness, and to become an educational center for both academic and trade schools activities.

TRANSPORTATION

It has long been our belief that a considerable saving could be effected by simply changing our school schedule. The high school begins at 8 o'clock and the elementary schools begin at 8.45. The high school closes at 1.30 and the elementary schools close at 3.30. By arranging our schedule so that all schools should begin

at 8.30, the high school closing at 2 o'clock, the elementary schools closing at 3 o'clock or 3.15, the same work in transportation could be efficiently done without any duplication of travel. There are several objections to this arrangement which should be overcome. The whole matter would be simplified if we had a new high school building that furnished cafeteria privileges. But even as it is much may be accomplished by requiring high school pupils to wait until the elementary schools were dismissed either at 3 or 3.15 o'clock before transportation privileges were given to them. One objection is the confusion that it might cause in the home. Another objection is that the capacity of the school buses are not adequate to accommodate both classes of pupils at one and the same time. This is a matter that could be easily adjusted by granting a longer contract to people who would furnish school buses of adequate capacity. This matter is under consideration with the School Committee and it is hoped that some favorable decision looking in this direction may be reached.

OBITUARIES

Death has gathered more than her usual toll from the membership of our schools this year, and where violence has not been the cause, the call has been sudden and unexpected. Within one week from the time Fred Saunders left home for the hospital his body was returned for burial. He was a quiet, peace-loving citizen, faithful in the discharge of his duties as he saw them, uncomplaining and with a desire to be helpful to others

at some cost to himself. His absence brings to mind many of those finer qualities of mind and heart which were not recognized while he was with us. We remember him as a worthy citizen and a true and loyal friend.

Samuel Hall, a member of the grammar school was taken very suddenly from our midst. From his entrance into the first grade he was always the favorite of both teachers and schoolmates. His sunny disposition and his readiness to make himself helpful on every occasion marked him as a special leader.

Robert W. Martell was drowned at the dam of the Green Street bridge. His was the only violent death and cast a gloom on the whole school membership.

Jennie Owsiak died at the Cable Memorial Hospital where she had gone for a surgical operation. She was a member of the Burley School and was loved and respected by all her schoolmates.

ACKNOWLEDGMENTS

First on the list of benefactors must be named the Red Cross Society. No gift or contribution of any other organization is comparable to what this organization is doing by supplying the physical needs of the pupils of our schools. By its generosity more than one hundred and fifty of our undernourished children have been made to realize that their social security as well as their bodily needs have been ministered to.

This is but one branch of a great organization that is world-wide in the variety and extent of its activities. Neither fire, famine, nor flood holds any terrors for this

organization. The amount of immediate relief given in times of distress is simply incalculable.

Moreover it has become an integral part, an outstanding feature, of our school system. Thousands have enjoyed the benefits of its home nursing classes, training in first aid, and home visitations.

I hold no brief for this society but in view of the work done here in the community every one should feel privileged to assist both financially and morally in increasing its practical usefulness. For my own part I wish to acknowledge with gratitude the relief afforded me personally in a situation that was extremely trying.

To Mr. Brainard C. Wallace, the local administrator of the N.R.A. work, for his untiring efforts and final success in placing our school houses and grounds in excellent condition, I wish to convey the thanks of the town and of the School Department. Without his personal interest in these projects it would have been a long time before our dreams of improvement would have been realized and, if success attends him, we may feel confident that an extension of these improvements will be forth coming for we have the utmost confidence in his ability to bring these things to pass. More power to him.

The Dental Clinic has been maintained by the same three unselfish persons who have rendered such helpful service to the schools in past years. We little realize how the condition of the teeth affects progress in school work. This has been demonstrated time and time again in a very practical way. In fact, our bodily health is held to be more largely affected by dental hygiene than ever before. We hope that these benefactors may have the full co-operation and patronage of our townspeople.

To the Chief of Police and his officers I wish to express my sincere appreciation of the assistance they have given the School Department during the past year. They have been untiring in their efforts to search out the facts in many a trying situation, That they have been successful in a majority of these cases goes without saying.

More than all this many of our school children are beginning to realize that our police officers are their real friends upon whom they may call in times of trouble. The old feeling of looking upon the police as an individual enemy is fast disappearing and our effort in the school is to promote a better understanding and relationship between pupils and the representatives of the law.

The thanks of the community are due Mrs. Richard Sears for her efforts toward conservation of the wild flowers in our section. As in former years lectures, prizes, and cards have been effectively employed. During the coming Spring months we are to benefit by a series of lectures from the same generous source. Already Mrs. Sears' influence is beginning to be noticeable in our schools. Children are not so much inclined to bring in great masses of wild flowers, but are more economical and selective in the flowers chosen. This is a training that requires much time and patience before it comes to full fruition but a good beginning has been made and without doubt the end aimed at will be accomplished. Too much credit cannot be given her for her interest in conserving the beauty of our hills and roadsides. She should receive the fullest co-operation of our townspeople.

To the teachers, including principals and faculty, I wish to convey my sincere appreciation of the spirit and

breadth of instruction that has obtained in our schools. While we have striven to maintain purely academic standards in our teaching, we have also tried to inculcate those higher principles of the humanities which enable people to live together in a neighborly, helpful and sympathetic fashion.

They have tried to teach those under their charge how to live; and, if proof is needed of their success, we have only to point to a multitude of those amenities that make life, under the most trying circumstances, enjoyable and worth while. No pupil, in any school, during periods of illness, whether confined at home or in the hospital, has failed to receive recognition by some expression of good will and sympathy either in the form of a class letter, a visit, or a token in flowers. When death has claimed a member of any class the occasion has been duly recognized by the schools in impressive fashion.

Generally a closer relationship has been established between the pupil and his own parents by recognition of birthdays and seasonal holidays. We have tried to establish the fact that the boundaries of the school should not limit our activities toward those who are unfortunate or infirm. On Thanksgiving Day baskets of provisions were distributed from some of the schools to those who were in need, not as charity, but as an act of good will. On Christmas Day tokens of remembrance were sent to the Hospital and the Coburn Home. These were gratefully received and acknowledged and there is no question in my mind that this investment in social adjustment will bear fruits through all the coming years. This is the spirit of the New Era and with a well-rounded, carefully-considered program persistently carried out the whole

world will be the gainer in social security and friendliness.

To Dr. Collins and Miss Bailey our school physician and school nurse, respectively, the thanks of this community are especially due. The work of this year has more than tripled that of former years. As a single instance which may be cited, in the case of immunization from diphtheria, more than one thousand inoculations were made; in T. B. clinics and other follow-up clinics they have shown the same efficient assistance as has characterized all their work. They have been instrumental in placing the health program of our school on a higher plane than it has ever reached before.

Last but not least, I wish to express my appreciation to the members of the School Committee, the Attendance Officer, our janitors for their timely suggestions and helpfulness in all the periods of the past. If this should seem but a slight meed of praise for service rendered, let me remind them that they are engaged in one of the most noble occupations and callings entrusted to mankind. There all the honor lies.

4 BLASTS AT 7.30—No Morning Session in ANY SCHOOL.

4 BLASTS at 8.00—No Morning Session in the FIRST SIX GRADES.

4 BLASTS AT 11.30—No Afternoon Session in the FIRST SIX GRADES.

In the absence of any signal at 11.30, the afternoon session will be held as usual. Teachers and pupils must be present at such sessions as on other days.

All should bear in mind that the 7.30 and 8.00 o'clock signals do NOT EXCUSE FOR THE ENTIRE DAY.

In addition to the warning given by the whistle, the street lights will be turned on for five minutes after the signal is given in each case.

In all cases **parents are expected to exercise their judgment** as to permitting their children to attend school during stormy weather.

On stormy days when the FIRST SIX GRADES are excused for the day by the 8 and 11.30 o'clock signals, the Junior and Senior High Schools will each have a single session closing at 1.30 P. M. The 11.30 o'clock signal will give parents ample warning for postponing the dinner hour.
