



SEASON OF 1902.

INTRODUCTION.

The Boston Floating Hospital has been subjected to the most trying tests, especially at times when conditions were most unfavorable. The season just past has witnessed a crucial test, because the public could not easily understand why our hospital was imperatively needed during a cool summer.

The report of the Visiting Staff will answer all medical questions bearing upon the season's work. Here we have every reason to congratulate ourselves. At the same time, we are assured that the Hospital cannot be spared during the summer months, whether the winds blow hot or cold. It is speaking within the bounds of reason to say that had the usual dog-day weather prevailed, the Hospital would have been overcrowded and the force overworked.

We started in last year with a problem which has been solved, so far as the plan for future activity is concerned; that is to say, we have plans for a new boat giving ample room to every department and anticipating demands which certainly will be made upon us during the next quarter of a century. Much original work can be done when the new hospital boat is in commission, and this means not only lives saved in our hospital, but contributions to medical science which will extend life-saving outside the Hospital. Fifty thousand dollars will pay for the new boat, though it will not furnish it. However, much

of the equipment now in use can be transferred to the new boat, and the atmospheric plant will have an opportunity which is impossible in our present cramped quarters.

It would have been fatal to the work of the season of 1902 had we attempted to secure contributions for the new boat and for current expenses of the year; but we have on hand for the new boat \$8,000, with promises of \$2,000 more, about one-fifth the probable cost. This question of the new hospital, like Banquo's ghost, "will not down at bidding." Not only are we handicapped by our present small quarters, but we are absolutely crippled, and the efficiency of our work is materially checked. The present boat will not answer our purpose after another season, and we face the possibility of being compelled to omit a season's work, if by August 1, 1903, we do not have a construction fund sufficiently large to justify us in giving a contract for the new boat.

Of course it goes without saying that because we did not experience severe heat the past summer, contributions fell off materially. It is due to this fact that we are carrying a debt. The managers could have closed the Hospital September 1st, but the calls for our service were louder during the first half of September than during any previous part of the season. Our best work was done during this half month, and let all possible emphasis be laid upon the fact that the receipts from Sept. 1 to Sept. 15, inclusive, were \$2,000 less than the expenditures. Yet, looking backward, we cannot regret that we have served suffering humanity even at such a cost.

The atmospheric plant is full of possibilities. With the one object in view of saving baby life, we have employed everything available to this end, casting about, meanwhile, for means, measures and methods in advance of any already adopted. This is why the atmospheric plant came into existence. That it has saved many a baby's life is easily susceptible of proof.


The Treasurer's report will show several gifts to the Endowment Fund, the income from which is applied to the current work. The facts in the case present the strongest argument for larger contributions, especially of money for immediate use and for removing the incubus of a debt. With the relief thus afforded there will be no misplaced energy in the coming season. The Boston Floating Hospital will get the full benefit of all our power that can be developed.

A report of the work of the Hospital would be incomplete without a hearty acknowledgment from the managers of the generous endorsement of the work by the press, local and suburban. This co-operation is most valuable and fully appreciated.

REPORT OF THE VISITING STAFF.

The exceptionally cool season this year, with its marked diminished morbidity among infants, might have been expected to lessen the number of our patients to a marked degree. In the department for day patients such was the case. A little more than half the usual number were treated. In the permanent wards, however, the opposite condition prevailed. They were rapidly filled and remained so, while the number of patients rejected for lack of beds was very large, viz., 128, or about one-third of the whole number of applicants. This means that our permanent work would have been about 40 per cent. more than that of last year, had the requisite room been available.

As our work increases, the crowded condition of the boat becomes more and more oppressive. Doctors, nurses, and all employees of the Hospital labor under disadvantages from this cause, and often an undue expenditure of time and strength is required relative to the work accomplished.

It is needless to say that we who know the urgent need that exists among the class of patients for whom the Hospital cares, are longing to see that need supplied by larger and better accommodations.

In general, the results of treatment have been excellent. It is believed that many lives have been saved, which would under home conditions have been lost. The danger from infection, which existed in a marked degree last year, has not been observed this season. Our precautions in disinfecting and surgical cleanliness, we believe, have had much to do with this.

The open-air ward was continued in spite of the cool weather, and demonstrated its value.*

The Hospital has had but little in the way of contagious diseases to contend with. This bugbear of infants' hospitals is guarded against by every means in our power, but will sometimes make its appearance in spite of all.

The details of treatment have been thoroughly attended to. The Hospital discipline this season was by far the best in its history, the reason being the presence of an efficient resident physician.

The class of cases of this year has shown more variety in the nature of the diseases present than in previous years. Many desperate cases have been admitted, and the Hospital still adheres to its policy of admitting the sickest babies, even though their condition is evidently hopeless. In spite of this, however, our total percentage of mortality has been remarkably low.

The *Educational* work of the Hospital may be divided into several headings:

I. Mothers. Of course many mothers visit the Hospital, and even the least intelligent must absorb something of the ideas of system and cleanliness, and the manner of dealing with the infants. That this is true, is believed from the experience attained in a similar work in which those results can be actually observed, namely, that of district nursing. In this work, the nurse goes to the house of the poor, and instructs them in the same matters referred to. Nurses have told me that even years afterwards mothers are found still carrying out the directions they have received.

The love of the mother for the child is as fully developed in this class as in *any* class, and forms a powerful incentive to learn.

Special teaching of the mothers is also carried out, as elsewhere referred to, particularly in the matter of preparation of the infant's food, and this part of the work has been done more thoroughly this year than ever before.

2. Nurses. Instruction to the nurses involves (a) the work in the wards, which is supervised carefully by our head nurses, under the direction of the Superintendent of Nurses; (b) Special bed-side instruction to individual nurses by the visiting staff; (c) The attendance of the nurses upon a stated course of lectures given by members of the visiting staff. This season the number of nurses taking the course was so large that it was necessary to duplicate the lectures, in order that too many nurses might not be absent from the wards at the same time.*

The nurses took notes on the lectures, wrote them up, and they were corrected by the lecturers. At the end of the season a written examination was held. Nurses whose ward work and examination papers were satisfactory were given diplomas.

The examination questions were as follows:

The Hospital training of young men, who leave our Hospital to take their places as practising physicians, is a part of our educational work which is second to none in importance. These young men are continually with the patients, and gain an immense amount of experience in a short time. The result of such experience is incalculable, and affects more or less the whole community. Members of the visiting staff have endeavored to assist the house officers in their work by suggestion and direct instruction to a considerable extent. The men have almost invariably responded with alacrity, and have shown enthusiasm in their work.

REPORT OF RESIDENT PHYSICIAN.

Our season of 1902 lasted just ten weeks — July 8 to Sept. 15. As we have 57 cribs, it was therefore possible for us, if each crib was occupied every day, to have furnished 3,990 days' care to sick babies. Of course this was not possible. But so rapidly did the cribs fill that on July 19, after allowing three cribs to contain two babies each, we were obliged to refuse to take another. From this date on till the middle of August cases were refused nearly every day. The period of greatest pressure was about August 1. Thus, on August 4 we had 22 applicants for admission to the wards, and were able to take only 10. Other days were almost as bad. Some of these babies were in most desperate condition, and their rejection undoubtedly meant their death. After August 16 we were able to care for all who came till Sept. 4, and then for a week were again forced to refuse cases daily. In all 128 cases were refused admission. During these ten weeks we cared for 272 babies in the wards, a total of 3,517 days. That is to say, each of our babies stayed with us an average of 12.9 days. In 1901, 269 babies remained 3,390 days; and in 1900, 216 remained 2,693 days. To those who think of the work of the Hospital as chiefly with the day patients, this may be a revelation.

The work for these last was not in any way neglected, however, while all this was being done in the wards. A thoroughly competent and faithful externe, acting under my own special direction, with excellent assistants, cared for 418 patients on the upper deck. They made 1,648 trips. That is to say, our average number of such day patients was 27. This is not as large as in previous years, and is explained by cool weather.

Mothers will not bring their sick babies who are not dangerously sick unless the day is very hot. Moreover, there has been far less sickness than usual among the infants of the poor during the past summer. This suggests how great the number of rejected patients will be in a year of average severity, and makes even more prominent the need of new and larger quarters. These patients were sent to us by 231 different physicians, a fact which shows how generally our work is appreciated by the medical profession.

No radical changes were made in the boat or its equipment. During the spring the hull was strengthened, every portion of the boat was cleaned and painted, and my own stateroom was rearranged and very comfortably furnished. Later on a few changes were made on the lower deck, life buoys purchased, a portion of the upper deck canopied and curtained off for the use of the nurses when off duty, and a few steamer chairs purchased for the House Officers when not on duty. These two efforts to minister to the comfort of doctors and nurses were much appreciated by them. They work very hard, and should have a We usually had thirty nurses and ten fair chance to rest. medical men on duty, besides the matron, night matron, the visiting and resident physicians. Nor was this a bit too many. During the summer I was called upon to prescribe for them nearly 100 times.

The medical work was organized in two services besides that for Out-patients. Five House Officers and five medical assistants aided the Visiting Physicians and the Resident Physician in the medical care. For report of these, I refer you to the report of the Visiting Staff and the tables herewith presented. I wish, however, to testify to the faithfulness and enthusiasm of these officers.

A word as to the other employees of the boat. They were under the control and constant supervision of Arthur C. Hunt,

Chief Inspector. Their attitude toward the medical work of the Hospital was uniformly one of interest and helpfulness. This was to be expected, perhaps, seeing that a large proportion of them were college men and women. Early in the season careful organization was effected to meet the dangers of fire or of falling overboard. Each man had his post, fire hose was tested, the efficiency of the fire extinguishers explained and demonstrated, lowering of boats and throwing buoys tried. Fortunately, no emergencies arose, though we had narrow escapes.

Each year in our history there has been a distinct advance in some direction. This year it was in our food department. Here, owing chiefly to the careful planning and unwearied efforts of Charles E. Buck, a graduate pharmacist and fourth year medical student, the system was entirely revolutionized. By the courtesy of Dr. Hibbert W. Hill, bacteriologist of the Boston Board of Health, we were enabled to test the purity of all foods given to the babies, and so perfect the methods of preparation as to attain nearly ideal results. We started with the freshest and best milk we could get, namely, direct from the Walker-Gordon farms, and, we believe, delivered it to the babies free from contamination. Food was prepared fresh for each feeding, and served in bottles tagged with a bed and ward number. In containers to keep the bottles warm this food went to the wards. Thus within half an hour every one of a hundred babies could have his special formula of food at just the right temperature, and in just the ordered quantity, and this without any confusion in the wards. Sterile cans, percolators, bottles, nipples and hands were all essentials in the process.

In various other ways the food preparations were improved. The work was done under many disadvantages, some of which we trust will be remedied before another year.

Mr. Buck had charge of our pharmacy, and, with the added

courtesy of Mr. Charles Jaynes, produced a very marked reduction in our drug bill.

The unusually cool summer made it unnecessary to rely largely upon the Atmospheric Plant. Nevertheless, numerous tests of it were made. These seem to clearly indicate that the simple addition of three or four expansion valves will increase the effective value of the ice plant many fold, and, it may be, make it possible to do away with the ordinary ice refrigerators in the babies' food department. We have not found any defect in the system which takes fresh outside air, dries it and warms it, and sends it to the wards. But we need more power for cooling, and another season shall doubtless have it.

Another feature of the work which has been under the care, as in previous years, of Mr. Anderson, is the kindergarten. Smith College students have given their services, and daily entertained the well children who are allowed to come because mothers could not leave them at home. The thanks of the Board are surely due to Misses Jouett, Smith, Clement and Freeman for devotion to this work.

So far as possible, the urine and the blood of every baby was examined, many tests of secretion made, and at the end of the season a somewhat systematic analysis of the dejections begun. Twenty-five autopsies were performed, six being done by House Officers under my personal direction. The others were performed by our Pathologist, Dr. Brinckerhoff, or his assistants, and much valuable observation was made.

A new system of records was begun and will, I trust, prove simple, accurate and capable of indefinite expansion.

The precautions taken against the spread of infection by flies, the cleansing of hospital laundry by formalin, the care of doctors and nurses to keep hands and arms clean, the educational work done for the mothers in the daily lecture, — all of these points are admirably stated in the report last presented

by Dr. Breck. I would only say that they have been carefully continued and required.

In closing, I have a few recommendations:

- I. Light and air should be admitted to the food department. The large sterilizer should be replaced by one or two small set kettles. Two tanks should be built, one with pipes in the bottom carrying steam to keep things warm and sterile; the other with pipes in the bottom carrying brine to keep foods cold and therefore sterile. This will do away with two or three refrigerators, and make the work of this department much easier. This is dependent upon the action of your Executive Committee, I believe already consummated, increasing the efficiency of the ice plant.
- 2. Some changes should be made in the arrangement of the berths in the Senior House Officer's room. But more important, some provision should be made for the other House Officers. They cannot be expected to work every minute of the day. They should have a place where they can rest. I know full well that it is a difficult matter to arrange within our limited quarters. But I believe very strongly that it is a need, and hope that some solution may be found before the beginning of the coming season. This last year they were compelled to resort to the row boat or to the tug, neither of which was a suitable arrangement.

In the new boat these and many other problems will easily be solved. But we very much desire to be able to note at the end of next year an even more successful season than this year.





SEASON OF 1903.

INTRODUCTION.

The Board of Managers, in presenting the annual report for the season of 1903, are so impressed with the need of a new boat for next season that other considerations, important as they may be, fall into the background. If ever a work has been thoroughly tested, it is that of the Boston Floating Hospital. Those who see it at close quarters are most pleased with it. The philanthropist from his standpoint is gratified that the babies of the worthy poor are receiving during the summer the care they so much need, and physicians who are specialists along the lines of our activity most heartily approve our efforts and urge their continuance and extension along other lines.

Unnatural and unusual weather conditions in summer seem to make no difference in the work. The past summer may have been thought to be an ideal one for keeping babies at home. As a matter of fact, however, we were called upon to do more than ever before, and a large number of babies were refused for lack of accommodations. All this has been said before, but it demands no less emphasis now. The best of anything is none too good for Boston, and the testimony of no less an authority than Dr. Simon Flexner, of the University of Pennsylvania, after he had inspected the Hospital, is that we have one of the most excellent charities he has ever seen. He further states: "I have never seen a floating hospital like it before; all the others take children and their mothers

for an outing down the harbor for a day only, while this one is equipped with permanent wards." Dr. Flexner makes an appeal for us based upon cogent facts, as follows: "Both permanent and transient wards are very crowded, and the work of the doctors, as well as the improvement of many of the patients, is greatly retarded by lack of space. Boston people ought to redouble their charitable efforts, and contribute enough money for another boat. It is a noble work, and worthy of the attention of everybody."

The various reports embodied herewith speak for themselves and furnish up-to-date information. It does not seem possible that the good people of New England, and more especially of Boston and vicinity, will compel us to lose the grand opportunity now presented of going on to larger things. We are just where we are doing our best work, and the present boat is so unfitted in every respect that an appeal for immediate contributions for the new boat becomes an absolute necessity. But while pressing for such contributions, we realize that we may jeopardize the contributions for current expenses. In giving, we beg to ask our contributors not to give to the new boat fund in lieu of an annual contribution for the work.

The managers gratefully acknowledge the generous support of the public given to this work in the past and confidently ask its continuance. Annually and with increasing heartiness we acknowledge, too, the uniform kindness of the press of Boston and its neighboring cities and towns, without whose hearty co-operation our success would be much less a source of satisfaction to the managers.

AN APPEAL FOR THE FLOATING HOSPITAL.



REPORT OF THE VISITING STAFF

For the Season of 1903.

THE gain in efficiency which has appeared in the medical work of the Hospital during each of the past years has not failed us this year. We were fortunate in having a most harmonious and intelligent force. Good hospital discipline and system were evident at all visits, made not only during the day but at night.

The house staff consisted of two senior and two junior officers, the former being resident on the boat; also an externe (in charge of the day patients) and eight medical assistants.

The nurses numbered thirty-two and many came from distant localities. Enthusiastic and conscientious service prevailed among them.

In addition to the above, a new department was in operation under the auspices of the Rockefeller Institute for Medical Research. The immediate work of this department was done by Mr. Arthur I. Kendall, with the assistance for a portion of the time of Dr. Paul A. Lewis, these gentlemen being under the supervision of Dr. Simon Flexner, of Philadelphia.

This work related to the newly discovered bacillus of dysentery, isolated by Dr. Flexner in the Philippine Islands and largely studied by him and by others since that time. By means of toxine developed by this bacillus a serum has been obtained corresponding to that used for diphtheria. This serum has been used in adult dysentery during several epidemics in Japan, and with strikingly good results. It has been proved to be in itself absolutely harmless.

In cases in which the bacillus was found, and in which

the disease was of a severe type, the serum was tried on our patients.

The bacterial study of the cases, in which Mr. Kendall was indefatigable, was very successful, in that the bacillus was found in nearly every case in which it might be expected to be present.

It is disappointing, however, to record that the serum injections were almost entirely negative in their results. Our experience was confirmatory of the fact previously known that no ill effect due to the serum can be detected.

There is reason to hope that with a serum of higher power, which will be available next summer, better results may be obtained.

It was a great pleasure for us to receive two visits from Dr. Flexner himself. He evinced much interest in our work in general, as well as in the special work in which he is the leader in this country.

The weather was (as during the season of 1902) so mild that a marked difference in the general severity of the epidemic was apparent, being less severe than in a hot season. The beds of the permanent wards were, however, filled in eleven days after the hospital opened, and remained so. It will be seen by the statistics that we had fewer patients than last year, but that the individual's stay in the Hospital was longer.

It may be said in general that the patients "did well." Many severe cases convalesced in the most satisfactory manner. The mortality rate is very low in view of the character of the cases treated.

Again we must record with great regret the large number of patients rejected for lack of beds. This year the number was phenomenally large, amounting to 351. Can any argument be more convincing than this in our appeal for larger and better accommodations for these little unfortunates? Many of the rejected cases were ill with severe types of

various diseases, but chiefly, of course, of the prevailing epidemic. Their return to home surroundings meant almost certain death, yet many could be saved by proper care.

The food department was efficiently supervised by Dr. Charles E. Buck, and not a little advance work on the preparation of food for infants has been done, especially in the matter of the predigestion of food.

Our milk was frequently examined, and found remarkably free from germs. It is to this purity of our milk that much of the benefit derived by our patients is due. A great deal depends, also, on the aseptic method of dealing with the milk during the preparation of the large number of feedings given out daily. In fact, the food department is to be regarded as one of the most important branches of the work.

Some idea of the magnitude of our work may be given by calling attention to the necessity of preparing *two thousand* infant's napkins daily. This requires 1,400 yards of gauze and 100 pounds of absorbent cotton-waste.

The educational side of the Hospital has received special Its departments are many. The mothers may first be mentioned. They are allowed free access to their children at all times, and seldom have abused the privilege. They have, therefore, the opportunity of seeing everything that is done for their children, and often assist in details. Besides this, and especially when a patient leaves the Hospital, the mother receives a card on which is given every detail of the preparation of the child's food, and she also has the method demonstrated before her. She is also furnished with a sterilizer and bottles at a very low price. She is told how much and how often to feed the child, and is urged to bring the child to the Hospital as a day patient, that it may be further watched. We may feel confident that, while much seed thus sown falls on barren ground, some will take root and fructify.

Our class of nurses was composed entirely of graduates, and was by far the largest in the history of the Hospital, numbering 25. These nurses received the following course of lectures, many of which were given to half the class at a time, so that the wards might not suffer:—

- 1. Introductory lecture.
- 2. Peculiarities in Anatomy and Physiology of Children.
- 3. Care of Premature and Sickly Infants.
- 4. Management of Digestive Disorders and Infant Feeding (two lectures).
- 5. What To Observe in Children (two lectures).
- 6. Therapeutics of Infancy and Childhood (two lectures).
- 7. Congenital Defects and Deformities.
- 8. Congenital Syphilis.
- 9. Diseases and Care of Skin in Children.
- 10. Feeble-minded and Backward Children.

Notes on the lectures were taken by the nurses, written over carefully and corrected by the lecturers. In addition to this the Superintendent of Nurses held several quizzes for purposes of review. At the end of the season a written examination was held (see appendix), and the nurses whose ward work and examination were satisfactory received diplomas.

The educational value of the Hospital to the young men of the House Staff, some undergraduates, some graduates of medicine, is very great. Brought into close contact with a large number of serious cases, they have an abundant opportunity to become familiar with infantile diseases and their treatment. But great as is the value of such an experience to these men, the value to the *community* is greater. The measure of skill and broad experience thus obtained will be received later by many people for many years to come. Our House Officers are given a diploma after serving during two seasons.

The Hospital season is of about ten weeks' duration. Much is condensed into that short period. The work is conducted at a pressure that could not be endured the year round. But those concerned seem to catch the spirit of it in a remarkable way. The unique character of the work appeals to them. The result is an intelligent enthusiasm that bears with it success.

THE REPORT OF THE RESIDENT PHYSICIAN.

To the Board of Managers: Gentlemen:

The season of 1903 extended from July 7, the first Tuesday after the 4th of July, to September 14 inclusive, a period of just ten weeks, as last year. The 57 cribs were all occupied on July 19, and from that time on until September 3, patients were rejected daily for lack of room. The demand was even greater than last year. You will remember that last year I reported 128 cases rejected for the season. This year the total is 351. This represents 160 individual cases. Some of these made application four or even five times, one even seven times, before a crib in the permanent wards could be assigned. This means that the cases in our out-patient ward were many of them more severe than has usually been true, for we always received the applications for permanent patients as day patients, if they applied in the morning.

Moreover, many of these patients came day after day and were treated in Ward E. So well satisfied were they with this treatment, that although evidently sick enough for admission they did not make application for that. All of this simply emphasizes in an extraordinary way the need of a larger Hospital, with at least 100 permanent beds. The summer was an unusually cool one, but the demand for our help far exceeded any previous season.

During these ten weeks we treated 210 patients in the permanent wards, a total of 3,708 days. This means that these little patients stayed with us an average of 17 2-3 days. Compared with last year we have had less patients who have stayed a longer period individually. The service we have

thus rendered constitutes an advance on last year, when we had 272 babies for 3,517 days.

On our upper deck, Ward E, we treated 498 patients. They made 1,665 trips; hence our average number of day patients was 30, three more than last year. The cool days limited this part of our work, but the relatively large number who returned to us day after day, and the manifest success which attended the work done in this ward, are evident proofs of the great value of this portion of our work. It should not be and I know will not be neglected, for in a summer of average severity I am sure that our highest number of patients in this ward, 72 this year, would be many times duplicated.

Patients have been sent to us this year by over 300 different physicians. This clearly shows how our work is appreciated by the medical profession. Moreover, we have this year been in closer and more healthful touch with other institutions than ever before, notably, The Infants' Hospital, Children's Hospital, Carney Hospital, Fayette Street Dispensary, and the out-patient departments of the Boston City Hospital, Massachusetts General Hospital and the Carney Hospital. The interest taken in us by physicians who attend at these and other hospitals and dispensaries of the city has been shown by the fact that one or more members of their staff have personally inspected our work. I need not say that this recognition of our standing has been peculiarly grateful to all the medical men connected with our staff.

The changes made in the boat and its equipment were in the main those suggested by me in my last annual report. I need not now rehearse them. The re-arrangement of the food department has proved most admirable, and the changes made in the senior house officers' room are strongly approved by them. We have had this year 32 nurses and 16 medical men on duty. The health of this working force has been better than on any previous year. At no time has it appeared that we had more help than was needed. Of their individual

work I will not here speak, save to affirm to you my cordial belief in their faithfulness from day to day, and in their enthusiastic and united efforts for the benefit of the patients.

Under the supervision of Dr. C. E. Buck, our food laboratory has attained near to perfection. With the space available I do not know how we could in any way improve upon the system which has been established by him. His report of the work done by him and his three assistants is appended to my report. To present its many details to you is impossible. In brief his work has been, with the aid of Drs. Place and Wheatley, to make daily tests, as many as the time and space In this way we established repeatedly the would allow. purity of our milk, cream, sugar, water, sugar solution and various forms of prepared foods. Moreover with the Babcock Machine we tested our milk, cream and prepared foods for fat. Nothing was taken for granted. The result was a series of facts which are useful not alone to us but to all medical men. An astonishing fact was the proven delivery to us five hours after the milking, by the Walker-Gordon Company, of milk which was almost entirely free from germs. In these studies we were much aided by Mr. Kendall, Mr. Keith, of Hood's Laboratory, and the staff of the Boston Board of Health Laboratory, and that of the inspector of milk and vinegar for Boston. Our thanks are due to them all.

The advantage to us of the presence of Arthur I. Kendall, bacteriologist, can hardly be estimated. While he was appointed by the Rockefeller Institute for Medical Research, primarily to determine the presence or absence of the Shiga bacillus in the cases treated in our Hospital, his enthusiasm as a scientist affected us all greatly. We cannot be too thankful to him personally, nor to the Institute which sent him to work with us. We are glad to be able in some part to return their courtesy by furnishing them 35 complete and exhaustive reports of cases.

Our atmospheric plant is working admirably. The addition of expansion valves accomplished just what our engineer expected, and made possible, not only the cooling and drying of Wards A and B and the maintenance of an even temperature every day therein, but also furnished cold for our food laboratory.


As last year, the urine and blood of every baby has been examined, many tests of microscopic analysis of blood and examinations of dejections made. Ten autopsies have been performed by our pathologist, Dr. E. E. Southard, or his assistants.

Very little change has been made in the system of records which was instituted last year. The record in Ward E has been somewhat simplified and the nurses' charts in the permanent wards slightly altered.

We have continued our typhoid precautions by excluding flies from the patients, disinfecting soiled bedding with formalin, and keeping hands and arms clean with cyanide of mercury solution. The lecture to the mothers this year has been given by the resident physician or one of the graduate physicians connected with the resident staff. This has made the work not a burden to any special man, and has given six men an opportunity to formulate their views on these important subjects.

The customary tables of patients, diseases, localities, etc., are herewith submitted.

My only recommendation this year will be an earnest appeal for a new boat. This is not merely because of the unprecedented demand for our aid. A new boat with 100 beds will not enable us to care for all who will apply in times of severe hot weather. But it is probably as many as we can wisely and safely care for on a barge. Nor will the added convenience of new arrangements of departments, which will allow as much space as is needed for each to do its work, be the chief reason for our new boat. We need one for *safety*.

Our hull may be safe and sound, but above the water line the conditions are not so good.

If used another year we must spend many hundreds, perhaps thousands, of dollars to make the boat safe even. Moreover, the inside of the hull down near the keel and the large saltwater tanks are in a condition not much better.

I sincerely hope that each member of this board will make personal vigorous efforts to secure the funds that will give us the new boat, which will be safe, convenient, and adapted to the purposes of a hospital.





SEASON OF 1904.

INTRODUCTION.

TRUE economy is to get all out of a thing that one can, and when it was found that, with necessary repairs, there was one more year of service in The Boston Floating Hospital, it seemed to the managers unwise to build the new one, much as it is needed. The arguments for the new boat are as cogent now as they ever have been, but the money for it is not yet available. If the public is disappointed, the managers are no less so; but we shall be compelled to conduct our work in the season of 1905 as in previous years. purpose to keep free from debt is commendable at any time and everywhere, and it surely is so in the case of The Floating Hospital. We do not want it to be so encumbered that at any time its usefulness will be endangered, and this year we shall need funds as perhaps never before. Please do not forget that this is a babies' hospital; that is where the strong appeal is made and why everything is done not only for the sake of the baby, but to instruct its mother that she may there learn to care for her other children. Mr. Anderson, in visiting the homes of our patients, finds the influence of the summer extending the year round, and sees children in good health who were taken on in a moribund condition, the hospital treatment having restored them.

Responding to inquiries frequently made, it seems proper here to explain again some of the features of the work. The question is asked if there are not some excursion features about the work,—a question we supposed had been sufficiently answered. Let it be emphasized now that, though this was true in a degree in the earliest years of the work, there came a time when these were all eliminated, and only the sick baby was admitted to the care of the hospital. It is necessary that an attendant accompany the baby brought for a day only; and, in the desire to save the life of the sick baby, when the mother is the attendant she is permitted to bring a child which cannot otherwise be provided for, if the recommendation is made by the physician sending the sick child to the hospital.

Again it is asked, "Do you take babies down for more than a single day?" We take the child for a day only if that will suffice; it can be returned several days in succession, going to its home at night, if that seems advisable; but what gives peculiar character to the work to-day is its permanent department, where children are received and cared for until there is some radical change in their condition. This may be a week, or a month, or two months. A work like that of The Floating Hospital is compelled to ask for larger contributions than formerly ecause of this very feature. In the first years of its existence it was cheaper to care for 300 mothers and their children than it is now to care for fifty permanent and a like number of day patients. A life in danger needs skilled care, and this is why only trained nurses are employed and physicians of experience are in charge.

The growth of the Hospital has been normal, and the seal of approval has been stamped upon it in all its departments. Its work is not limited even to patients within our own Commonwealth, and it has been very gratifying to hear from one State and another of cases we have cared for where very sick babies have been restored to health. For three years we have had unusually cool summers, and yet the calls upon the hospital have not been limited. With normal summer weather

we shall be overwhelmed, and this is why we ask now for increased contributions.

The price for Named Days and Nights will be the same as in previous years, a minimum of \$100, though the managers anticipate a necessary advance when the new boat shall be put in commission. The generous support given to the Hospital in its eleven years of history justifies the managers in the belief that the work will not suffer from lack of funds in the future, but our supporters must decide this matter.

We are increasingly grateful to the press of Boston and its suburbs for constant and valuable assistance in extended and sympathetic notices of the work, for which we bespeak their continued support.



REPORT OF THE VISITING STAFF.

For the Season of 1904.

THE writer almost feels his report to have received a mortal blow, so keen is his disappointment. It was expected that a new boat would be ready equipped for next season.

The plans for such a boat have been drawn and elaborated with the greatest care. The effort has been made to attain



the *ideal* boat for the work, one that will be adequate for some years to come. Anything savoring of extravagance has been omitted, and yet nothing really essential has been knowingly left out. The boat is planned for one hundred permanent patients. It is of proper size and gives proper room for the work to be done. We know what it is to have improper space for our work.

The difficulty has come with the financial aspect of the matter. The Board of Managers decided unanimously that it would be unwise to go into debt, however great the need, and however great the temptation to do so.

What would a boat entirely satisfactory in its appointments, fully equipped and furnished, and adapted for one hundred permanent patients and two hundred out-patients; cost? The building committee (of which the writer is one) estimate sixty-five to seventy thousand dollars. Is this an extravagant or unreasonable amount to expend for such a purpose? The building committee, after careful consideration of the

matter, feel that it is not. Can a fairly good boat be built for less? It can, but it would always be a makeshift.

Boston has thus far been the pioneer in Floating Hospital work with permanent wards. Our new boat will therefore attract much attention, and receive criticism from many engaged in work for children all over the country. An ideal and successful boat will lead to the establishment of others, thus enlarging the work many fold. It is our duty, we believe, to give not only those immediately about us, but to all who may profit by it, the benefit of our now considerable experience in this peculiar work. Therefore an inadequate boat would not only be unserviceable for our immediate uses, but would be a disgrace to all concerned.

About three-fifths of the needed money is available only. It is better, then, that we wait for the rest, and build with clear consciences, free from mortgage nightmares, and build something that we can present to our givers, our community, and the profession at large with confidence.


Last season's work sustained our contention (often repeated) that The Boston Floating Hospital is a safe place for sick babies to be cared for in the summer. Our present and past statistics of mortality are very favorable, and we believe are not equalled in any other similar institution. progress of our cases in the wards and in the out-patient department is good. It is ideal? No. Why not? Because of our crowded condition. Our nurses are seriously hampered in their work, often to the point of dissatisfaction on their The same is true of the medical staff, while the disadvantage to the patients is only too evident, especially in the increased risk of infection. It must not be inferred that a spirit of complaint is present on the hospital; such is by no means the case. The *morale* of the hospital force is excellent. Enthusiastic effort is the rule. The facts of the case must, however, be stated as they exist.


The season was somewhat warmer than that of 1903, and

though on the whole a cool summer, the slight difference led to a much larger attendance of out-patients than in 1903. This was satisfactory, as our out-patients, while under observation, seem to derive a great deal of benefit from the trips, even though they be few in number. The medical work was done by four visiting physicians, five specialists comprising the auxiliary staff, two senior house officers, two junior house officers, an externe, and eight medical assistants. The resident physician served as physician to out-patients, the externe being in charge under him. The visiting physicians made daily visits to the hospital during their month of service, and conducted most of the lecture course for the nurses, the remaining lectures being given by the auxiliary The senior house officers are resident on the boat, and are, with the junior house officers, in charge of the wards, under the visiting physicians. The medical assistants are busily engaged in clerical and microscopic work, and in assisting in carrying out the details of treatment. Our nurses numbered thirty-two, superintended by Miss L. A. Wilber, who has now served the hospital for nine seasons.

Twenty-three nurses took the course of lectures and instruction in the wards, and eighteen passed a satisfactory examination and received diplomas. Our graduate house officers, also, receive diplomas. The nursing service is a very taxing one, owing to the *constant* care required by small infants, and the very careful attention to minute details necessary to prevent infection. Were the season longer, it would require many more nurses to do the work. It is not too much to say that our patients receive an unusual amount of detail in treatment. No means of restoration within the knowledge of the staff has been neglected. That this has been possible has been due to the large interest and generous support of our friends.

The hospital still remains, so far as we know, the only one with cooled wards. To enter one of these wards on a hot and humid day is almost startling. The air is both cool and





invigorating, and, whatever the outside conditions, can be kept at a constant point of temperature and relative humidity. Strangely enough, since our plant has been in good working order we have not had a hot summer. It has not yet therefore fully demonstrated its value. The recollection to some of us is most vivid of the periods of intense heat in past seasons, during which whole wards of patients would be prostrated and many deaths would occur. We have seen enough of the workings of the plant, however, to thoroughly believe in its value. It is to be remembered that on occasion the same plant heats the wards.

Our patients are chiefly young babies, and we feel that our mission is principally to them, but we have some older children (the age limit is six years), especially in our small out-of-door ward of six beds. In this ward certain cases of chronic disease do so well that we hope to have a large ward of this kind on the new boat.

Our large rejection list shows that of worthy cases there is no lack. Nothing is more distressing than to have to refuse a baby, seriously ill, with a chance for its life on the hospital and none at all at its home. This experience is a frequent occurrence after the first few days of the hospital season.

The abuse of charity, of which so much is heard, we believe, is but little in evidence on the hospital.

Our efforts at the education of the mothers have been continued. The object-lessons of the wards are before them, and they receive special instruction, particularly in the preparation of food for their babies. They are also supplied with an outfit at a small cost.

It is generally stated that the objects of a hospital are:

- 1. The care of the sick.
- 2. The education of young men and women as doctors and nurses.
 - 3. The education of the medical profession.

To these may justly be added the education of the com-

munity, and especially that of those who, as mothers, sooner or later are the guardians of the health of us all.

Appended is a list of graduates—house officers and nurses—of the hospital, and also the questions given at the examinations for nurses for the season of 1904.

NURSES' EXAMINATION.

Post-Graduate School of the Boston Floating Hospital. 1904.

Express your meaning clearly. Re-read your answers.

- I. What points should be noticed about the intestinal discharges of infants?
- 2. (a) Describe in detail the preparation of a day's food for a well child to have six feedings, of eight ounces each, made up in the proportion of about eight parts of top milk, ten parts of boiled water, three tablespoonfuls of milk sugar, and ten per cent of lime water.
 - (b) State supplies necessary; how they are to be made ready and how kept, including apparatus.
- 3. Compare the relative development of the head, thorax and abdomen in the child at birth and at the age of five years.
- 4. Give some account of three affections liable to appear in the newborn child.
- 5. Describe the dejections in fermental diarrhœa and in ileo-colitis.
- 6. (a) What substitutes for milk are used in a case of ileo-colitis?
 - (b) Give full details for preparing one of them.
- 7. Give the treatment for umbilical hernia.
- 8. What would you do, if you were placed entirely upon your own resources in regard to the child, in an impending premature delivery?
- 9. What are the characteristics of the pulse and respiration in child-hood?
- 10. Tell what you know about the excretion of urine in the child.

THE REPORT OF THE RESIDENT PHYSICIAN.

To the Board of Managers: Gentlemen:—

The report which I present this year will be to a certain extent a summary of the work of the past three years, during which time I have been Resident Physician. The season of 1904 began July 6 and extended to September 15. As before, the 57 cribs were all occupied within two weeks, and from that time until after the first of September we refused patients every day for lack of room. This pressure was greatest during the two weeks August 1 to 14, when we were able to admit 75 patients.

During the season 279 patients were rejected (1902, 128; 1903, 351). Two reasons seem to account for our better ability to care for applicants this year than last. In the first place, there were more very sick patients; the number of deaths was larger, and consequently at the time of greatest pressure there were more vacant beds. In the second place, our Visiting Physicians moved patients along more rapidly.

Therefore our total number of patients this year is 290 (1902, 272; 1903, 210); but these patients only stayed 13 1-3 days on an average (1902, 12 9-10; 1903, 17 2-3). On the other hand, these 290 patients received 3,881 days' treatment (1902, 3,517; 1903, 3,708). These figures are explained by the reasons in the paragraph above.

We made 54 trips out. Probably largely because of the warmer summer, our out-patient ward "E" rendered a larger service; 652 patients (1902, 418; 1903, 498) made 2,484 trips (1902, 1,648; 1903, 1,665); our average number this year, therefore, on each trip in Ward E was 46 (1902,

27; 1903, 30). The number of patients we may be asked to care for on any really hot day during July or August is shown by the fact that on August 1, 1904, 105 patients were cared for in Ward E. This number was not duplicated on any other day, but we approached it on many days, as would be indicated by the totals shown above.

A much larger number (156) than in any previous year were cared for one or more days in Ward E, and subsequently admitted to the permanent wards. You will, therefore, see that my recommendation of last year, that we have at the earliest possible date a new and adequate Hospital, capable of caring for at least 100 sick babies in the permanent wards, is even more urgent.

While the season was hotter than 1903, it was not an unusually hot season. The amount of work done, as indicated by the figures already given, shows, I believe, the efficiency of the system now organized. I would by no means say that it is perfect, however, and presume that a new boat (which we all confidently anticipate) will necessitate many modifications.

The large number of day patients required the appointment of an additional medical assistant. I am glad to report to you the continued interest of the medical profession, as shown by the fact that 257 different physicians (1902, 231; 1903, 300) sent patients to us, and we were on terms of cordial helpfulness with the other institutions of the city.

Thanks are due from this Board—and have, I believe, been already sent by our efficient Chairman—to the Children's Hospital and the New England Hospital for Women and Children, to whom nearly 20 of our patients were sent at the end of the season; and also to the Boston City Hospital and to the Boston Emergency Hospital for the asssistance of ambulances at the time of our closing. We are grateful, too, to Tufts Medical School for the loan of two high-power microscopes.

Many medical men and women visited us, and in every case expressed cordial approval of our methods and success. The working force of the Hospital this year was much the same as last, with the exception that there was less bacteriological work done. One of the eleven House Officers, Dr. Sanford, resigned to take a position of assistant in the food department. His training there this year will fit him to have charge of the department next year. In his place I appointed, and the Executive Committee approved, Dr. Macdonald Wilkinson.

There was the same force of nurses under the efficient supervision of Miss Wilber. Of the work of doctors, nurses, and employees on the boat I can only repeat what I have before said,—that all worked most earnestly and faithfully for the welfare of the sick babies. The appointment of Dr. Charles E. Buck as director of the food laboratory was a success. Working under him, and in entire accord with him, Drs. Place and Sanford kept the work of the food department at an even higher level than it had before attained. Imperfections were quickly noted and promptly corrected. In the bacterial tests, which were daily made, of the various solutions, we were greatly assisted by reports rendered from the laboratory of the Boston Board of Health, and to Dr. Hibbert W. Hills special thanks are due. The milk stood the tests applied exceedingly well.

Very few changes were made in the structure of the boat, although, as I indicated in my last report, extended repairs were found necessary in the superstructure. A refrigerator was built, and the attempt made to keep it cool with our cold-air plant. This attempt was only partially successful, the demand upon the plant for cooling the wards and in the food laboratory being so great.

No change was made in our system of records. We attempted to substitute carbolic acid for formalin in the matter of disinfecting soiled clothes and bedding, believing it

to be more effective, and knowing it to be much less expensive; but the limitations of our space quickly demonstrated that it was utterly impracticable. We therefore returned to formalin.

The usual tables of patients, diseases, locations, etc., are herewith presented.

15 patients were taken home by parents against our advice. Of these 10 were relieved and 5 unrelieved.

Of the 88 patients who died, 24 were moribund at entrance and survived less than 48 hours.





SEASON OF 1905

INTRODUCTION

TF one recalls sickness in his home, he remembers the increasing expense as disease develops, until the daily attendance of the physician and the installation of the trained nurse are imperatively needed. It is only when one thinks of the desperate cases which The Floating Hospital takes that the seemingly large medical staff and corps of nurses is justified. A thing may be expensive and yet not an extravagance, and our present efficiency is due to the fact that we have the best possible service. The report of Dr. Breck, Chairman of the Visiting Staff, deserves to be studied, so fully has he set forth the many means which are employed on the Hospital to save baby life; but features which are of greatest value, like the effective work with the nurses and mothers, while incidental, add nothing to the expense of the work. It has been often remarked that ours is emergency work which cannot be carried on as cheaply as that which is largely routine. A greater incentive to more careful expenditures is thus furnished. Especial attention has been paid to the administration expenses this season, resulting in a material reduction; next year's report will show a still further While this is true of the administration expense, it is equally true that there has been an increase in the operating expense, because of the increasing demands of the Hospital, though the Treasurer's report shows a decrease in the total expense for the year.

Conducting the work as a trust, the contributions have been conscientiously expended. There was a day early in its history when quite a proportion of the help was volunteer; there came a day when we had no right to entrust the babies committed to our charge to any but skilled doctors and nurses; hence the rule that none but graduate nurses should be employed on the Hospital. It remains true, however, that no small part of the best service at the disposal of the Hospital is a labor of love.

The need of a new boat is too evident to discuss. As Dr. Breck has stated, "the new boat we believe is assured for next season."


This does not mean that the public can keep its pocketbook shut tight, for we are planning to build largely on faith that the needed money will be forthcoming. In this connection, as we read Dr. Breck's report and note the enlarged accommodations, we easily infer that this means increased expenses; and so it will not occasion surprise that the Trustees have decided for the present that the price of Named Days shall be \$150, and \$100 for Named Nights. Looking backward, with a quid pro quo in mind, it would seem as if no one could dissent from the conclusion that contributors for named beds on the old boat have had an equivalent for their money. We feel sure they will agree to this, especially in view of the fact that so much money will be needed in the future to carry on the enlarged work of the Hospital; but it is designed to give permanence to the new beds, and so the price has been fixed at \$250.

To meet the wishes of many friends of the work who desire a closer connection with it than by annual or intermittent contributions, the Corporation has established three grades of membership, as follows: First, persons paying \$100 or more, and requesting membership; second, persons paying \$10 for annual membership; third, an associate membership for children paying \$1.00 or more, and requesting annual membership.


During the eleven years of our history many contributions brought with them the thought of a memorial, and so on the new boat there will be special features which we hope may be made memorial gifts. One cause for regret is the seeming impossibility of installing a new atmospheric plant at present. When one considers that this came into being for special use in saving children *in extremis*, its effectiveness will be greatly missed. Is there not some one who will give us \$10,000 for the immediate installing of this plant? Other memorial features cannot be spoken of here, but facts respecting them will be furnished on application to the office.

Mr. Anderson has so graphically set forth the work in many places that from foreign parts even we have received substantial financial assistance, and he is prepared at any time to respond to invitations to tell "The Story of the Floating Hospital" to large or small gatherings.

The Trustees again acknowledge their great indebtedness to the press of Boston and its vicinity for repeated kindnesses and a sympathetic helpfulness, without which their work could not have been accomplished.

REPORT OF THE VISITING STAFF

TO THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

THE medical service of last season was organized as follows: Two visiting physicians were in daily attendance, — during the first half of the season, Drs. Breck and Fay, and during the latter half, Drs. Hastings and Morse. There were five house officers on duty, — two seniors, two juniors, and an externe. The seniors served during the season of the preceding year, and thus were able better to assume the responsibility of caring for the patients in the absence of the visiting physicians. The juniors are under agreement to serve during next season as seniors. The externe has charge of the day patients under the Resident Physician. There were also five medical assistants.

Our nurses were organized as follows: Superintendent, Miss L. A. Wilber; Night Matron, Miss C. A. Brown; three head nurses, one for each of the larger wards and also twenty-seven nurses on ordinary duty.

Our patients included many cases of extreme severity and were largely the product of the summer's epidemic which is so destructive in its attack upon young infants, especially among the dwellings of the poor. Many cases are brought to us too late for a possible recovery. It is to be hoped that the lessons of so many summers will lead to the earlier resort to the services of the Hospital in these severe cases. A great number of lives might thus be saved.

The very great influence which the weather has on our Day-patient Department was strikingly illustrated. July was unusually hot and sultry, and during that month all past records were broken by the large attendance. August was cool and rainy, and the number fell to below the average. The call for ward beds is not so much influenced in this way. The wards are always full after the first few days, and remain so during the whole season. The number of rejections was much the largest in our history, and this was almost invariably due to lack of room. How urgent the call is for relief, only those know who have seen for themselves, and have felt the pain of having to turn away these little unfortunates. It means to them death in many instances, for those who come to us with their infants are as a rule of the poorest class. The much-talked-

of hospital abuse is practically non-existent in The Floating Hospital.

The educational work of the Hospital has been carried out on the usual lines. The class of nurses who took the regular course of training numbered twenty-four. To these the following lectures were given:—

The class also received bedside instruction besides the practical value of the work in the wards. As in the past, the nurses were in full sympathy with the work, and after a hard day would assemble in the lecture room with eagerness to learn something of the theoretical and scientific aspect of the diseases and care of young infants. An examination was held at the end of the season, the paper presented being appended.

Twenty-three nurses passed a satisfactory examination, and also proved themselves capable in their ward work. To these diplomas were given.

Our graduating house officers also received diplomas.

Not the least important part of our educational work is that relating to the mothers of patients. They visit the Hospital with great regularity, as it is accessible to them at all times, except during the trips. And even then the mother may go if she so desires. It is remarkable that mothers have not abused their privileges in this respect. They thus obtain an object-lesson in neatness, punctuality, order, and in many details relating to the care of their children. Often they express their appreciation. They also receive definite instruction by talks and demonstrations, of the methods and materials used in preparing their children's food, and receive the apparatus with which to carry this out at home at a nominal cost. We believe that the seed thus sown bears fruit. The mother has it in her power to ward off disease in her infant if she can only

be taught, and efforts in this line assuredly strike at the root of the matter.

The new boat, which we believe is assured for next season, is the culmination of eleven years of diligent work. We hail its coming with joy, and we have aimed to make it ideal for the purpose to which it is to be devoted. In describing this boat, let us first consider the hull. It has been decided to make this of steel. This has many advantages in the way of durability, cleanliness, and safety, — the latter, as it is divided into seven water-tight compartments, which make it practically unsinkable. It is also much more roomy, which means a great deal to us.

Its dimensions are 170 feet by 46½ feet; that is, it is to be so broad that it will be a very stable structure. We shall feel no sense of danger in the heaviest of squalls. It also has a very flat bottom, so that in case of grounding it will not upset easily. It is to be so constructed that we can install machinery for self-propulsion in the way of twin propellers, though this may not be done at first on account of the increased cost.

In the building of the superstructure the question of fire has received first consideration. Various plans have presented themselves, such as the use of sheet metal for partitions, the fire-proofing of wood, etc. It has been decided that the best protection of the boat against fire, aside from her steel hull, is an efficient fire apparatus, and that the superstructure shall be built of wood.

The peculiar point of this superstructure is that it is built out almost to the sides of the boat, especially on the hospital deck. The least possible space is left for passageway, and this is only for the purposes of those who manage the boat. This is to give us the greatest ward space and the best light and ventilation.

There will be four decks. The one in the hull or lower deck will contain the machinery, for which ample room is given, and will include two large steam boilers with the necessary pumps for supplying water, hot and cold, to all parts of the boat, also for fire and to eject water from the hold. There will also be room for the refrigerating and ventilating apparatus, which, with the machinery for self-propulsion, may not be installed at first on account of the increased expense. All will be arranged, however, so that both these can be put in readily when we are able financially to do so.

There will also be on this deck a large dining-room for the mothers and well children, which will be well lighted and ventilated. This

room will also be used as a lecture room, being comparatively free from noise. On this deck also will be the mortuary and autopsy rooms.

On the next, or main, deck will be the dining-room for the house officers and nurses. The department for the preparation of the infants' food here receives commodious quarters, well lighted and with free access of air. It will be arranged with a due sense of its great importance. Besides this, there will be an extra ward, which is to be used only in case of emergency, also the clinical laboratory and various rooms and offices.

Above this is the main hospital deck, which, by reference to the plan, you will see comprises six large wards, giving in all one hundred beds for permanent patients. The four central wards are for the sickest patients, and each is so constructed that it can be fumigated without affecting the adjoining wards. These wards are intended to be refrigerated and ventilated by our machinery before referred to. But if this is not possible at first, we shall do as best we can with ordinary methods. It is earnestly hoped, however, that our friends will enable us to have this means of saving life at our command. It means much to desperate cases.

The ward in the bow of the boat will be devoted to convalescents, being admirably adapted to that purpose. The ward in the stern is an out-of-door ward. This ward we believe will be of great value in many cases, especially of chronic disease. Being situated in the stern, it will be sheltered from high winds and can be closed in if necessary.

On this deck will be the operating room.

The top deck is for the day patients principally, and will accommodate 150 to 200 patients. It is well sheltered, and patients will seldom have to be taken below, as has been the case on the old boat. An examination and treatment room is constructed, also abundant toilet and bath facilities. The bow room is set apart for the kindergarten, for the guests, and for a retiring room for the nurses. In the stern are quarters for the Resident Physician and the House Officers, also a room for the Visiting Staff, in which will gradually be formed a library.





REPORT OF THE RESIDENT PHYSICIAN

To the Board of Trustees of The Boston Floating Hospital: —

The season of 1905 was marked by more than usual difficulties. We were all disappointed not to have the new boat. Yet we took hold vigorously of the work and began to receive patients as usual July 6. In seven days every bed was full (1902, eleven days; 1903, thirteen days; 1904, fourteen days). This meant very hard work for doctors and nurses, not yet accustomed to their work, and indeed the resignation of two of our best nurses because of inability to stand the strain. This lack of nursing help was felt all the summer through. For we do not find it wise to employ inefficient nurses, and good ones cannot be found on short notice who will come for their board, pin money, and instruction. Large numbers apply early, and from these Miss Wilber makes her selection. It is not possible yet for us to have a waiting list. Good nurses not accepted by her, make other arrangements and are no longer available.

The medical force was never so busy at the very beginning of the season. During July 101 individual cases were rejected for lack of room, many of them several times (1902, 6; 1903, 42; 1904, 58). The upper deck, too, had a large attendance, — a total of 974 cases up to August 1 (1902, 356; 1903, 427; 1904, 749). And this, too, shared in the limited help available. Meanwhile we were frequently reminded that the Barge "Clifford" is old. There were occasional storms — fortunately few. Once it was necessary to send all the upper deck people below just at the time when dinner is served to mothers.

During the season of ten weeks, 279 patients were cared for in the wards (1900, 216; 1901, 269; 1902, 272; 1903, 210; 1904, 290). The less number this year is accounted for by the severity of the cases in July, and by the fact that the Visiting Physicians therefore did not move them along so fast. These patients received 3840 days' care (1900, 2693; 1901, 3390; 1902, 3517; 1903, 3718; 1904, 3881), an average of 13.76 days each (1900, 12 4-10; 1901, 12 6-10; 1902, 12 9-10; 1903, $17\frac{2}{3}$; 1904, $13\frac{1}{3}$).

For Ward E, the open ward — the top deck — the day patients, we made 50 trips (1902, 55; 1903, 53; 1904, 54): 620 patients were cared for (1902, 418; 1903, 498; 1904, 652) making 2374 trips (1902.

1648; 1903, 1665; 1904, 2484). Hence we carried out on this upper deck an average of 47 patients each trip (1902, 27; 1903, 30; 1904, 46). As reported to your Board, this Day Patient work was very large in July, and will always be on the hot days of summer. It far exceeded that of last year. But with the cooler and especially the wet days of August and September, the numbers fell off very much, giving the total above noted.

The demand for beds, especially in July, was never so great. During the season, 169 individual cases were rejected for lack of room (1902, 84; 1903, 165; 1904, 127). So great was this pressure—reaching 25 on July 18—that the Trustees authorized the Resident Physician to keep patients over night on the upper deck, when the weather conditions warranted and the demand seemed specially urgent. This was done on July 27, when curtains were hung, extra nurses employed, and twelve little ones kept over night. Thereafter the same combination of safe weather conditions and urgent demand did not arise, though several times only threatening clouds prevented.

We received the same friendly treatment from the Children's Hospital and The New England Hospital for Women and Children as before. Sixteen cases were sent to them at the close of our season, September 13. The urgent need of these little ones of the best hospital care is shown by the fact that several of them died before September 16.

Our own record of 92 discharged well, 73 improved, 23 not improved, and 91 dead is another evidence of the severity of the cases treated. The Boston Floating Hospital is the place of last resort in scores of cases. Parents and doctors told us so again and again. Small wonder is it then that 26 of these cases died within forty-eight hours after they were admitted. The joy of the service arises from the fact that occasionally one of these really desperate cases recovers, and that many received earlier in the course of the disease are prevented from getting thus dangerously sick.

The intimate relation between the day patient and the ward patient departments of the work is shown by the 103 cases admitted "from Ward E," and the many improved or even unimproved cases transferred from the permanent wards to the open-air day ward. For occasionally there are mothers who cannot bear to leave their little ones with us, and return day after day with a very sick baby in their arms.

Tufts College Medical School again loaned us two high-power microscopes, and Professor Dearborn gave us the use of one of his laboratories. Dr. Francis H. Slack of the Boston Board of Health Laboratory gave much help in the way of materials for bacteriological observations of our milk and other baby's foods, and himself checked up frequently the very careful work of Dr. Chas. E. Sanford done in this department. The Boston City Hospital and the Emergency Hospital again aided our work by the service of an ambulance each on September 13.

Cordial relations with the other public institutions of the city were maintained as heretofore. Special efforts to report to physicians the course of cases in the Hospital were made. Two hundred and twenty-three such letters were sent out by your Resident Physician to 68 different physicians. An additional card was used this year to notify physicians, when possible, if cases were refused for lack of room. This enabled some cases to be followed up which might otherwise have been neglected. No other change was made in our records or cards except a few verbal ones, with the exception of the case histories. These were kept on three sheets, in accordance with a plan suggested by the Visiting Staff. A far more complete record is thus possible.

All the departments were run on the lines already evolved in our previous experience. Doubtless the new boat will necessitate many changes, but none seemed desirable during the past season. Regular reports have been made and filed by your Resident Physician during the course of the season to the Board of Trustees or Executive Committee, who have held frequent meetings. To the schedules there presented and to the tables herewith appended you are respectfully referred for the detailed facts of the season's work.





A warning is given to the public to give to no solicitor or canvasser, as none are employed, and it is asked that all payments be sent direct to the Treasurer or to the Hospital office.

NAMED DAYS AND NIGHTS.

It has long been the custom of this Hospital to allow to individuals or organizations the privilege of giving a name to a day or night, either as a memorial or to specialize the donor's interest in the work. The price for such privilege is \$150 for a day, \$100 for a night, and where desired and possible the same date may be reserved by the donor each year.

MEMORIAL BEDS.

Persons or organizations desiring a more permanent form of memorial may avail themselves of the privilege of giving a name to a bed for a period of five years on payment of \$250; and this privilege is continued for a like term on payment of an additional \$250. A bronze tablet indicates the name of the bed and the donor, and forms a perpetual remembrance of the gift.

FORM OF BEQUEST.

I give and bequeath to The Boston Floating Hospital (incorporated) the sum of dollars to be applied to the uses of said corporation.

Season of 1906.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES.

THE Season of 1906, which began on July 11, was an eventful one in the history of The Boston Floating Hospital. As the New Boat was not ready as early as had been expected, it was found necessary, at considerable expense, to put the Old Boat in commission for temporary service. This involved many difficulties which could not be avoided. Although in a general way the work was carried on very much as in previous years, there were several changes which were of such importance that they should be especially noted. Of these the one which should be mentioned first was the transferring of the hospital to the New Boat, which practically put the work on a new and more permanent basis. The Bath Department and the City very kindly co-operated with the Trustees by giving them permission to dock the hospital boat at the pier at North End Park, an almost ideal condition, as regards location, fresh air, and saving in expense. We have been promised the use of this pier as a permanent berth for the Hospital Boat both summer and winter. The nurses instead of living in East Boston were provided with lodgings at the Franklin Square House at less expense, while at the same time their surroundings were much more desirable.

On Tuesday morning, July 2, 1907, the Hospital will begin its thirteenth season, we believe, under more favorable conditions than have ever before existed. Rapid and progressive strides have marked the development of the work, especially during the past year. It has been our chief aim, as Trustees, to establish the Hospital upon such a sound business basis as will meet with the entire approval of the public to whom we appeal for generous support. We are able to show that much has been accomplished already in this direction, though we are not yet satisfied with the result.

We wish to express our unbounded confidence in the value of the work which the Hospital does for the community in caring for the sick infants and


little children of the poor during the hot summer months when some of the other hospitals for infants are closed and when children's diseases are most prevalent. We wish to say also that this work is being so organized as to combine, to the fullest extent, discipline, co-ordination, and strict economy, and these are the essential principles which the Trustees intend shall govern the administration of the Hospital in every department of the work.

The New Boat went into commission on August 14, 1906. Thus immediately the service was practically doubled, as about twice as many patients could be cared for at comparatively small increase in cost. In anticipation of this larger work the corps of doctors and nurses were increased accordingly. It was also considered advisable by the Trustees to engage the services of a business man of considerable experience to act as Manager, and in Mr. Briggs they have found one entirely competent to manage the affairs of the Hospital wisely and efficiently.

The New Boat during its first season's service was not complete, as it was found impossible last spring to install the refrigerating plant, which is an essential requirement for the best results. This necessitated imperfect refrigeration by the use of a large quantity of ice, as owing to a strike the contract for this plant could not be completed in time. It was also impossible, both for want of time and money, to add the engines required to run the boat under her own power, which consequently involved the expense of towing. This season both of these disadvantages will be overcome, as the refrigerating machinery is now completed and being installed, as well as a second boiler; and due to the generosity of Mrs. L. G. Burnham, who in memory of her husband has presented the steam yacht "Pilgrim" to the Hospital, we are supplied with excellent engines and other machinery which will make the Hospital complete and self-propelling. This is but one of many generous gifts for which the Trustees wish to express their thanks and gratitude as well as to the press for its valuable assistance.

With this brief introduction the Trustees respectfully submit the following report in detail, trusting that it may so deeply impress upon those who read it the vital importance of the work that they will feel disposed to contribute towards it. The Trustees believe in direct appeal to the public for the support of this charity.



REPORT OF THE RESIDENT PHYSICIAN.

To the Corporation and Trustees:

The season of 1906, the fifth which it has been my duty and privilege to serve as Resident Physician of the Hospital, has been marked by changes. There have been the usual changes of *personnel* in the house staff, nurses, and employees, and the unusual ones of the administration and the opening of the New Boat. That it was a hard season, I believe all actively engaged in the work will admit. But amid all the difficulties I had the cordial cooperation of doctors, nurses, and employees, and the unvarying cordial support of your Board and the Manager.

I wish first to express my sincere appreciation of this uniform spirit of helpfulness. I assure you it is not to be found in all institutions of this kind.

Our season opened July 11, a little later than usual. The wisdom of your decision to wait no longer for the New Boat was proved by the fact that in six days all the beds were full and we were refusing permanent patients for lack of room. This reception of 66 permanent patients in these first six days meant a great deal of hard routine work for doctors and nurses.

The inadequate arrangements of the old boat were never more apparent, and we were glad indeed to move on to the New Boat on August 14, the transfer being made during the night, without the loss of a trip, and at a time when the weather conditions were bringing to the Hospital many new cases, so that in a few days our new accommodations, which were twice the capacity of the old boat, were completely filled.

After three days of sultry weather we were refusing admission to our crowded permanent wards. Under such conditions our only resource was admission to the Day Patients' Deck, with the return of the patients each successive morning. Finally, with a growing demand of new patients and weather conditions most unbearable, so that a return home meant almost certain death to many of the critical cases among the Day Patients, we decided to convert part of the Day Patients' Deck into a permanent ward until the strain lessened. Thirty cribs were used for children too sick to be sent home.

This arrangement was impossible on the old boat, for the risk of storm and rain was always too great, but on the New Boat, with tight roof, close canvas side curtains, and every convenience, it was readily possible.

The Externes under my personal direction, and the Day Patients' nurses,

organized the work, kept the records, and cared for the patients, though of course this sudden emergency required an appeal to other Hospitals for the assignment of night nurses who could be spared. Each morning the mothers came and helped care for these babies. It meant a great deal of hard extra work for doctors and nurses, but it paid. Eighty-three patients were thus cared for on this deck as permanent patients, and in the aggregate received a total of 466 days' care of twenty-four hours each day.

This is a new development of our work, made possible on our New Boat, and gives us, in the frequent dire necessity which must always come with sudden spells of severe weather, an opportunity, after our regular permanent wards are filled, to classify the worst cases among our Day Patients as permanent, and so not return them to their homes at times when it means almost sure death.

In other words, more and more does our Hospital develop on lines that clearly indicate our service to most desperately sick children,—children often given up by physicians who recommend the Floating Hospital as the last resort. And a review of last season's work shows plainly that we are rendering a very much larger service to the community than ever before.

This year's statistics of Permanent Patients are not as good as last year.

Two reasons seem to me to account for this: first, a more than usually severe epidemic during a specially hot summer, as fifty of these deaths occurred within forty-eight hours of admission; second, the failure of our atmospheric plant to render any service, as a strike prevented the installation of refrigerating machinery until this coming season.

Our Food Laboratory, under the efficient charge of Dr. Frederick H. Allen, was especially fortunate in having the active supervision of Mr. Frederic W. Howe, now a member of the Auxiliary Staff, as director of this department. Dr. Francis H. Slack, of the Boston Board of Health Laboratory, again kindly checked our work, and supplied much material for our bacteriological observations. The new equipment in this department works well.

In connection with this work there was more specially prepared food given away this year than ever before. It would be a great help to our Day Patients if mothers could take home each afternoon the food needed till the next day. If your Board approves, we can, for slight additional expense, develop this service, which this year was only allowed in extraordinary cases.

Special thanks are due to Tufts College Medical School for the loan of two

igh power microscopes; to the Boston City Hospital and the Emergency Hospital for the use of ambulances on September 15; to the Boston Children's Hospital and to the New England Hospital for the reception of fifteen patients when our Hospital closed. Mention should also be made here of the American Oxygen Company, which furnished us free with many hundreds, even thousands, of gallons of their oxygen, of inestimable value to scores of sick babies. No change was made in our records beyond the development necessitated by the sudden expansion of our Permanent Wards, to which I have already referred.

I believe I may here mention properly the great relief, from a medical point of view, of the freedom from the constant observation all day long of "guests." If this change in method has not seriously interfered with the financial support of the work, it is, from a medical and executive point of view, a distinct step in advance. It is, of course, right and proper that friends and supporters of the Hospital should visit and see the Hospital Boat and the work as it is conducted, but, when it is considered that the wards are filled with desperately sick babies and children, it will be recognized that the system worked out by Mr. Briggs so successfully last summer is preferable to having considerable numbers of persons taking the trip down the bay, when they can so much better, under his supervision, see all that they may wish at the North End Park Pier in the afternoon.


And, finally, from this same point of view, as to the New Boat: It is a success! Not perfect,—no hospital is. Some essentials are still lacking. Some money has already been given towards properly equipping the clinical laboratory. I trust some other kind friend will note and relieve the needs of the operating and sterilizing rooms. We need, too, a small power launch,—not an expensive one, but one capable of running swiftly and safely to Pemberton or to South Boston as often and whenever it is necessary. Such a boat should be in tow always for emergency.







NAMED DAYS AND NIGHTS.

It has long been the custom of this Hospital to allow to individuals or organizations the privilege of giving a name to a day or night, either as a memorial or to specialize the donor's interest in the work. The price for such privilege is \$150 for a day, \$100 for a night, and, where desired and possible, the same date may be reserved by the donor each year.

MEMORIAL BEDS.

Persons or organizations desiring a more permanent form of memorial may avail themselves of the privilege of giving a name to a bed for a period of five years on payment of \$250; and this privilege is continued for a like term on payment of an additional \$250. A bronze tablet indicates the name of the bed and the donor, and forms a perpetual remembrance of the gift.

VISITORS.

While the Hospital is in commission during the summer, the boat returns to the pier at North End Park every afternoon at 4.30 (Sundays included), when visitors are always welcome to inspect the Hospital and see how the work is conducted.

Season of 1907.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES.

THE season of 1907 began on Tuesday morning, July 2, and closed on Saturday, September 14. It was the first complete season on the new boat, which has proved a great success. Economies which were impossible on the old boat were put into effect, and during the coming season it is our intention to extend these economies in several of the departments.

Early in August a very primitive laundry was devised. A large part of the laundry work was done on the boat at considerable saving in money and materials. This season we are installing a complete laundry equipment, which we hope will pay for itself the first year, and which will enable us to do all the laundry on the boat,—an average of over 3,000 pieces a day. By using machinery there will also be quite a saving in labor.

Our expectations of the advantages and economies to be gained by running the boat under her own power were more than realized, and we again wish to express our gratitude to Mrs. L. G. Burnham for her valuable gift of engines. Towing the Hospital was very much more expensive.

The new refrigerating and cooling plant was a disappointment, for unfortunately it failed to meet the requirements. It was therefore decided after very careful investigation, in consultation with experienced engineers and our medical staff, to remove this plant, which had not yet been accepted or paid for, and to replace it with a plant of another system and of much greater capacity. The proper cooling and drying of the air, which is circulated through the permanent wards, is of vital importance, and we now have every reason to believe that the best results will be attained. This system is designed to cool and dry enough fresh air to provide an entire change in the wards every three minutes. It will supply refrigeration for the milk cooler and three large refrigerators, and will make all the ice needed for hospital purposes.

We wish to call attention to the statement of the Manager, showing the careful system of handling supplies to avoid any possibility of waste. So,

in every department of the work, business principles are employed with a view to efficiency, discipline, and economy.

Heretofore it has been customary to pay the nurses \$3.70 a week in addition to their board and lodging. The Hospital has now advanced to the stage where it offers such unusual advantages of training to nurses that the system is being adopted this year which applies in other established hospitals offering post-graduate instruction, of paying the nurses nothing in addition to their board and lodging.

In comparison with the season of 1906 it will be seen that the number of patients treated in 1907 was less, which is to be accounted for by the cooler summer. This does not mean, however, that there were vacancies in the permanent wards. On the contrary, we were continually obliged, much to our regret, to turn away patients. It is the number of day patients which is affected by cool weather.

The seventh ward for permanent patients, on the lower deck, will be used for the first time this year. This ward will provide for eighteen patients. The boat will afford accommodation this year for one hundred and twenty permanent patients. We wish to thank those who have enabled us to use this ward by contributing especially towards its equipment.

The Boston Floating Hospital will begin its fifteenth season on Wednesday, July 1, better ready than ever to render its merciful service in saving the lives of infants and little children during the heat of summer when emergency cases are so frequent. Regarding the importance of this emergency work we refer you to Dr. Morse's report. All that is needed to make the coming season the most successful in the history of the Hospital is the same sympathetic and generous support from the public which has always come in the past, and which we are again counting upon this year.

We deeply regret that Dr. Robert W. Hastings, after many years of faithful and efficient service to the Hospital as Resident Physician, feels obliged to discontinue his services in this position, but we are still fortunate in having the value of his counsel and assistance as a member of the Consulting Staff.

The Trustees gratefully acknowledge the many generous gifts which were received during the year, and wish especially to thank the press for its invaluable assistance.

It is the established policy of the Hospital to appeal directly to the public for funds, and we therefore ask that all contributions shall be kindly sent to the Treasurer.

REPORT OF THE RESIDENT PHYSICIAN.

The fourteenth season of The Boston Floating Hospital, which opened July 2, 1907, has been marked by no very notable experiences on the part of your Resident Physician. With Mr. McIver as Steward, Miss Goodwin as Superintendent of Nurses, Dr. Allen in the Food Laboratory, and Dr. Murray in the Pharmacy, who were familiar with the needs of those departments and the direction of their assistants, organization was rapid, and in a few days all was running as smoothly as possible.

The boat did not fill up as rapidly as last year. Our first rejection for lack of room was July 26. From that date till September 1 patients were refused daily. During the season we were obliged to refuse admission to 179 patients applying for permanent treatment, who could not be received for lack of room. Most of them were admitted as Day Patients, however, and were later received as Permanent Patients, as vacancies occurred. Reply postals were sent to 111 doctors, offering to let them know of the progress and outcome of the cases they sent in, and 62 accepted our offer. 227 such letters were sent to them.

It was decided by your Trustees that it was unwise to keep patients on the Day Patient Deck over night. Hence the number of cases this year treated in the permanent wards seems to be less than last year, 336 instead of 469.

It is true, too, that the demand upon us was less than last season, due, I believe, to the cool, dry summer. There were the same number of feeble babies with no vitality. But there were less very severe cases,—fewer babies who needed immediate emergency treatment.

This also partially accounts for the better results attained:—

Once more we had to work without our atmospheric plant. The machinery installed failed to deliver cool, dry air to the interior wards.

The cool summer has also affected our Day Patient work. The total number of patients, 555, is less than the 770 of last year. But the number of trips being larger, the total number of patients cared for on this Day Patient Deck has been larger than ever before.

The work done by doctors and nurses has been faithful and successful.

The new members of the Visiting Staff have shown much interest. The House Staff have worked unitedly. We have sometimes needed more helpers, because of the dropping out of one Externe and four Medical Assistants.

More food for the babies was given away than in previous years, but it was not found best to do this in many cases. Usually, the directions for home care were so definite and simple that the mothers had no difficulty in carrying them out.

Our Food Laboratory was most successful, due to the very efficient work of Dr. Fred H. Allen and his assistants. His work sets a high standard for his successor.

Besides his work as Pharmacist, Dr. Murray had charge of the Clinical Laboratory and has helped Mr. Briggs with the visitors. We have never had so many visitors as this year. Most of them have come at 4.30 P.M., when the boat returns to the pier. A few, usually those interested in naming the day, have come in the morning or evening or have come aboard at Pemberton. All of these have been most efficiently cared for by Mr. Briggs and his assistants. Notable visits by large bodies were that of the Convention of Trained Nurses and that of the Massachusetts Association of Boards of Health. Occasionally, one of these nurses or officials has spent the day in studying our work. Our Hospital is open to such inspection. But the custom of inviting guests to make trips on the Hospital has been eliminated. From a medical point of view we cannot be too thankful to the firm but courteous hand which has accomplished this.

The installation of limited laundry facilities has made possible the use of diapers which can be washed,—a method long desired by your medical staff, but not practicable heretofore, when it cost $1\frac{1}{2}$ cents each to wash them. Further development of this same laundry meets my cordial approval.

On the last day of our season I sent official thanks to the Boston Board of Health Laboratory for supplies and assistance, to Tufts Medical School for the loan of two high power microscopes, to the Boston City Hospital and the Emergency Hospital for the aid of ambulances on the last day, to the Massachusetts Homœopathic Hospital, the Children's Hospital, and the New England Hospital for Women and Children for kindly receiving several sick babies on that last day of our season, to the American Oxygen Association, H. K. Mulford & Co., Pureoxia Company, and Fairchilds Brothers & Foster for supplies, and to Frederick L. Briggs, undertaker, for assistance on many occasions.

All of these have aided us before, except the Homœopathic Hospital, from whom we received one case and to whom we sent five. The supply of Pureoxia water was specially welcome in our Food Laboratory.

Our new Hospital is now well equipped in most respects. It will always be possible, I suppose, however, to suggest improvements. In conclusion, therefore, let me enumerate a few things which I hope you will provide as soon as possible. It may be you will encounter individuals who will like to make these specific gifts.

I mentioned a power launch last year.

An operating table has been given us by the National Lancers Ladies' Auxiliary; but our Operating Room needs equipment, and even more do we need a sterilizer, with which might wisely be combined a still to furnish us with sterile water.

We have no place at all wherein to properly isolate a contagious case.

A local boat telephone system would save a vast amount of running about and time.

Personally, let me thank the Trustees for cordial support at all times and for the aid which made my last season as Resident Physician so much less laborious and more satisfactory.

STATEMENT OF JOHN LOVETT MORSE, M.D.

THE new boat has proved itself well fitted for the purposes for which it was designed. The babies have done much better on it than on the old boat. The care of the patients, both permanent and day, is carried out more easily and with less friction.

The public does not realize as it should that the Hospital not only takes babies for the day, but that it also has over one hundred permanent beds in which babies are kept for days and weeks at a time, as in other hospitals, and that the Hospital is equipped to give every care and treatment which can be given in any hospital. No one who is not familiar with hospitals and hospital management can realize what it means, starting each year with only a nucleus from the former year, to develop in a few days a routine such as is found in hospitals which are open all the year. That this is done shows how efficient the management is. Few realize, too, that the boat is equipped with a well-appointed modern milk laboratory, in which all the foods used for the babies are prepared.

It is not necessary to enlarge on the good work which is done in caring for the patients and on the number of lives which are saved, as this is self-evident. The good which is done in other ways and the influence which the Hospital exerts is, however, far-reaching and not generally appreciated. number of nurses, many of whom come from distant States, return every year to their homes and spread the knowledge of the care and feeding of infants which they have acquired at the Hospital. A not inconsiderable number of young men, already physicians or about to become physicians, are trained each year in the best methods of infant-feeding and in the care of sick infants. They go out to all parts of the country to apply the knowledge gained on the boat for the benefit of many other babies, both sick and well. Many other physicians, who come as visitors or as students of the Visiting Staff, also go away with new ideas and with new enthusiasm which cannot but be of use to their patients. The Visiting Staff, also, is constantly benefited by their study of the patients and rendered better able to take care of other babies themselves and to teach others how to take care of them.

While every one is endeavoring to do the best work possible for the patients, and to make the most of the advantages for the study and teaching of the diseases of infancy, the opportunities offered in these lines are not being utilized

as they might be. This Hospital is unique in many ways and offers possibilities for the study of the origin, bacteriology, and treatment of the diarrhœal diseases of infancy which are unequalled. They have not been taken advantage of for two reasons: the scarcity of specially trained men competent to make such investigations; and the lack of funds to pay such men, when found. Special gifts to defray the expenses of such original investigations are much needed and might well lead to discoveries of the greatest importance.

STATEMENT OF THE MANAGER REGARDING SUPPLIES.

The development of The Boston Floating Hospital from an experiment begun in a small way and with a boat not conveniently adapted to successful, thorough work, but proving absolutely the value of this agency for the relief of suffering sick children of Boston and the surrounding towns, has now reached a point where thorough, business-like organization and discipline will tell in the figures printed in our report of expenses.

Specialization of each department of the work is making possible a system and care in the handling of supplies and in the use of labor that has already shown results, and still gives scope for further perfection. In order to safeguard the purchase and issue of supplies a carefully devised system has been instituted. All purchases are made by the Manager on requisitions from the heads of the different departments. The actual purchase of the goods is made or confirmed by written order, a duplicate of which remains in the Hospital office for the purpose of checking up the bills: a triplicate goes to the boat, and must be signed by the head of the department calling for the goods. This insures, in the first case, that no mistake is made in the purchase; in the second place, that the person originally requesting the purchase receives what he asked for, both as to count and quality. After this is done, a systematic scrutiny is in force in every department for safeguarding the actual use of these supplies.

In the case of ship supplies, the captain, mate, and engineer are held strictly to account for the use of materials connected with the ship.

In the case of food supplies, laundry supplies, and cleaning materials, the steward is expected to have the closest oversight of everything in his department. He has a storeroom, with a storekeeper who never issues anything from his department out of the usual course unless on the approval of the

steward. This storeroom is locked, as are the refrigerators where are kept the meats, vegetables, fruits, and other perishable foodstuffs.

We have an efficient head of the Linen Room, a department to which no one has free access, and from the counter of which are given the supplies of linen, cotton, bed-clothing, children's garments, etc., only upon the written order of the head nurses. These orders are carefully checked by the Superintendent of Nurses, in order to be certain that nurses in the wards are not using material that will either be an unnecessary direct expense or necessitate undue work in our laundry department, which, of course, would be but another form of waste.

The Food Laboratory Chief is responsible for calculating as nearly as possible the amount of milk, cream, and buttermilk, and other food preparations to be used for the patients; and strict discipline in his department results in no waste where otherwise waste might easily be possible.

It is also planned that a degree of efficiency among our employees shall be maintained that will reduce, as far as possible, the number of persons who must of necessity be fed on the boat, thereby effecting another proper economy.







I have also examined the bonds and other securities in the hands of the Trustees for the Endowment Fund, and find the same to be as reported by them.




