WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE The Polls Will Be Open From 12 A.M. to 6 P.M.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Columbia, in the County of Coos, in the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Columbia Town Hall on Tuesday, the 12th day of March, next, at 7:00 o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

- Article 1. To vote to bring in ballots for election of Town Officers to be elected by ballot for the Town of Columbia for the year ensuing.
- Article 2. To see if the Town will instruct its Selectmen to appoint all other Town Officers as required.
- Article 3. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for the support of Town Charges for the ensuing year.
- Article 4. To see what action the Town will take with reference to hiring the Colebrook Fire Department and the Stratford Fire Department for the purpose of extinguishing fires in said Town, and in the event of favorable action to make necessary appropriation for the same.
- Article 5. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for stand-by fire protection from the Stratford Fire Department.
- Article 6. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate to support the operation of the Colebrook Communications Center.
- Article 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise as a contribution for the support and services of the Upper Connecticut Valley Mental Health Service.
- Article 8. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate as a contribution for the support and services of the Ver-Shire Center.

- Article 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the Ambulance District A-1 services.
- Article 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Upper Connecticut Valley Hospital Association to help defray the cost of maintaining standby alert personnel to cover medical emergencies.
- Article 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for operating expenses and matching funds of the Northern Coos Community Health Association.
- Article 12. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the upkeep of cemeteries.
- Article 13. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the purpose of appraising buildings, mobile homes, land transfers, etc. to keep the Town at 100% valuation and to keep real estate records current.
- Article 14. To see what sum the Town will vote to appropriate as the Town's share for operation of the North Country Council for one year, beginning July 1, 1985.
- Article 15. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of the poor for the year ensuing.
- Article 16. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the Old Age, Blind and Disability Assistance and Nursing Care for the year ensuing.
- **Article 17.** To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for support of the Community Action Outreach Program.
- Article 18. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of summer roads and bridges.
- Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to take action regarding plowing or otherwise keeping winter roads open in said Town for the year ensuing, as in their judgment seem conducive to the best interest of the Town and appropriate money for the same.

- Article 20. To authorize the Selectmen to accept and expend \$30,072.95 (estimated) revenue from the State Highway Department (Block Grant Aid) for additional maintenance, construction and reconstruction of Class V highways.
- Article 21. To see what action the Town will take regarding Waste Disposal and appropriate money for same.
- Article 22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to contribute to the Colebrook Library.
- Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the with-drawal from Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against budgeted appropriations for the following specific purposes and in amounts indicated or take any other action hereon:

- Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to incur debts for temporary loans in anticipation of the taxes for the ensuing year, and to pay such debts out of tax money when same is received.
- Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, contract for, and accept aid relative to disasters and incur debts for temporary loans for same should the need arise.
- Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's Deeds.
- Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply any surplus remaining in their hands at the end of the fiscal year 1984 to the defraying of Town charges and appropriations for the year 1985 in order to effect a proportionate reduction of the amount to be raised by taxes.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to accept the reports of agents, auditors, selectmen, and all other officers and ratify and confirm the same.

Article 29. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

The past year all the schools in School Administrative Unit Number 7 were involved in a most extensive evaluation conducted by the New Hampshire Department of Education. On May 14-16, 1984, a team of State Department personnel evaluated all aspects of each school district's educational program including management, administration, elementary, secondary, vocational, Special Education, Staff Development, School Lunch, and Supportive Federally Funded programs. The purpose of the evaluation was to provide each School District within the S A U with an integrated and wide-ranging report which can be used for the purposes of planning and general improvement.

I am pleased to report, that for the most part, results of the evaluation indicate that our School Districts and individual schools within each district are doing a commendable job in providing sound and relevant educational programs. Program deficiencies that were reported, particularly in the areas of Art, Music, Physical Education, Guidance, Library services and Special Education services are now being addressed by the School Districts in which the deficiencies were noted.

Minimum standards for High Schools were recently revised by the State Board of Education. The revisions, adopted by the State Board on July 25, 1984, have an immediate effect on programs and services that must be provided by an approved high school. Under the standards, students graduating in June, 1989, must have a minimum of 19 3/4 credits to be eligible for a diploma. Programs that must be offered and available to students, in addition to the regular programs now offered, include Industrial Arts, Physical Education, advanced levels of English, two different offerings of Foreign Languages with at least a three year sequence in one of those languages, Computer Education, Career Education, and Arts Education including visual arts and the field of music.

It is expected that students entering the ninth grade next September must carry a course load of five credits in order to meet the minimum of 19 3/4 credits required for graduation in June, 1989. Of the 19 3/4 credits required, each student must obtain at least 12 3/4 credits comprised of the following: Art Education-½ credit, Computer Education-½ credit, English-4 credits, Mathematics-2 credits, Science-2 credits (including one credit in a physical science and one credit in a biological science), Social Studies-2 credits (including U S and N H History and Government), Basic Business and Economic Education-½ credit, Physical Education-l credit, Health Education (including substance abuse,

venereal diseases, and nutrition)-½ credit. An additional 3 credits must be selected from at least two of the following fields that must be offered and available: Arts Education, Foreign Languages, Practical Arts (Business Education, Industrial Arts, and Home Economics) and Vocational Education. The remaining 4 credits required may be obtained from any of the school's other course offerings, i.e. Social Studies, Mathematics, Science, Foreign Languages, Arts, Vocational, Driver Education, etc.....

The revised standards will require additional staff and, in some instances, additional space and facilities. It is imperative that School Districts maintaining high schools plan now to implement the standards required as soon as possible in order that students graduating in June, 1989, can meet their diploma requirements.

A most serious and alarming problem now facing our School Districts and School Districts throughout the country is the availability of teachers to staff our classrooms. A shortage of qualified and certified teachers now exists in all teaching levels including elementary and secondary levels and specialized subject areas. This shortage is expected to continue for the next 4-5 years. A contributing factor to this problem is salaries that are being offered to 4 year graduates planning on entering the teaching profession and comparable salaries being offered graduates in the private business sector. There is awareness now that teacher salaries must be reasonably competitive and attractive if college graduates are to consider teaching as a profession and if present teachers are to be retained and discouraged from leaving the teaching field.

The process of maintaining approved public schools and also finding and retaining teachers to staff our classrooms will certainly not be easy. It must be accomplished, however, if our School Districts are to continue the responsibility of providing educational programs that adequately teach and prepare students for the future.

I again extend my thanks and appreciation to the members of the School Boards, Principals, Faculty, and also to the individuals who have volunteered to serve on the various educational study committees. It is through their dedication and commitment, often and for the most part requiring many long hours of arduous and at times frustrating work, that our schools perform and our students achieve.

COORDINATOR OF SPECIAL SERVICES REPORT

The need for the position was recognized by the five school districts in S A U #7 when it became apparent that an increasing number of identified handicapped children required specialized services both on a pre-school and in-school level. Presently, all school districts share the cost of this important administrative service and consideration is being given to having it become an established School Administrative Unit #7 administrative position.

Primarily the duties of the Coordinator are as follows:

- Arrange, coordinate and supervise all specialized services provided and administer and carry on the Special Education programs conducted in the local schools as well as at the pre-school level.
- 2. Arrange for the placement of handicapped students requiring services and or programs outside the local area.
- Alter, change, or improve existing programs in such a way as to keep students at school within their own district as well as to decrease the number of students placed outside of the local school district.
- 4. Assist in carrying out the referral process for evaluation, identification and placement of individuals between the ages of three and twenty-one who are considered to be handicapped and in need of special services and/or programs.
- 5. On a regular basis, inform and advise each School Board on the status of the local Special Education programs and services being provided. This also involves the process of preparing an annual budget that is required to carry out the Special Education programs within each district.

Much time and energy have been expended during the first year of this new position doing just what the title indicates - coordinating. Procedures and process have been made consistent throughout the Union. Programs and services have been brought much closer to within state and federal regulations. The quality of services provided to handicapped children within S A U #7 has significantly increased.

The 1984-85 school year promises to show even more growth and higher quality of services than ever before and presents a challenge to staff members involved and the Coordinator as their administrator.

COLEBROOK/COLUMBIA CHAPTER I REPORT

Most young children are eager to learn, and they look forward to school and to learning to read. Yet we see children who quickly appear to dislike school and do not want to go. Sometimes these children have not had an opportunity to become prepared for the social living and independent behavior required of a first grader, but more often it is the school's inability to provide them with individual motivation and understanding. Children who feel happy in school and who feel accepted and respected by their teachers and their peer group will be motivated to learn.

Many studies indicate that the method of teaching reading is less important than the child's individual personality and his or her attitude toward learning. The reasons for learning difficulties are applicable to him or her alone, although there may be other children with similar problems.

Readiness for reading at any level does not just come with age, but must be a process of stimulation and encouragement. Only success can bring further success.

In-D-Reading, the Federally funded Chapter I project, enables the Colebrook Elementary School to offer this much needed stimulation and encouragement. The major thrust of the program is aimed at helping children in grades 1-3 avoid failure in reading.

72 children from grades 1-5 participated in Chapter I supportive reading activities designed to not only communicate high and positive expectations, but to ensure continuing high achievement.

Spring evaluation data obtained from standardized testing indicated that 100% of the children increased their learning by 7 NCE's or more. The projected Project Mean Gain was 7. The Mean Gain obtained was 26.72.

Again this spring a 6-week Reading Readiness Program for preschoolers was well attended by 32 children who would enter first grade in the fall.

I would like to thank all the mothers who volunteered to be teacher-aides each day and special thanks to Sheila Beauchemin, Jan Malloy, Jody Martin, and Lise Grandmaisson. Without their support this program could not have been offered. Thank you, Roger Pond, for fingerprinting the entire pre-school class.

Our Annual "Spring Fling" was also a huge success. An updated version of Snow White, Hello Dolly and the 6 Secretaries was presented by over 100 children displaying creative reading experiences through dance, singing, or acting.

Parent, teachers, aides, administrators, and children all worked together to make this project year a successful one.

Rosalie Hawes Chapter I Project Manager The Class of 1984 has 50% of its members accepted to post-secondary education. Twenty-six of the fifty-two graduates were accepted; thirteen (25%) in technical or two-year programs, and another thirteen in four-year programs. In the constantly changing job market of today, each student should set as a goal the obtaining of a saleable skill or demonstration of the ability to learn to an extent which would encourage an employer to hire and train them.

Colebrook Academy offers testing for our students which will aid them in preparing for further education and vocational training. The Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery (ASVAB) is offered by the Department of Defense to juniors and seniors who might be interested in entering the armed forces after graduation. The test is offered free of charge, and those students who take it are under no obligation. Aptitude tests in general measure developed abilities and are intended to predict what a person could accomplish given training or further education. In addition to predicting success of military occupations, ASVAB can be used in career guidance and counseling for civilian occupations with military counterparts.

The Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test/National Meric Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT) is offered in the fall of each school year at Colebrook Academy. Any student who is considering applying to a two or four-year college program should take the PSAT during their junior year. The PSAT is an indication of how each student compares with a nation-wide group of students on verbal and mathematical reasoning abilities. Scores from the PSAT/NMSQT can be used to estimate performance on the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT), required for admission to many colleges. The PSAT/NMSOT is also the route of entry into the Merit Program, a nation-wide scholarship competition administered by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation. The 1984 test was offered to some one million high school junior nation wide. In the spring of 1986, Merit Scholarships worth approximately \$20 million will be awarded to 5,500 academically talented students.

I encourage all parents to take an active part in their child's selection of courses. Selections made during all four years of high school should be directed toward a vocational or educational goal. In the student registration packet that each student receives prior to registering for the next year's classes, there is a section listing required courses for all programs, college preparatory and vocational. Both students and parents should review those requirements in order to insure that the student, at the end of four years will have

acquired either a saleable vocational skill or an educational background which will facilitate the acceptance and continuation of their education. In other words, the student should avoid a general mixture of courses which will not provide adequate preparation for post-high school years. When registering for the next year's courses, you should read the curriculum requirements and course descriptions in the registration packet, and if you have questions about the proper course selection, please contact the guidance office for further assistance. Parent-school communication is the key to enrolling the student in the proper courses to maximize the benefit they can derive from their education.

SCHOOL HEALTH REPORT

The school nurse is the staff member responsible for protecting and promoting the health of all students. The goal of the school nurse is to maximize each child's potential to learn and to grow by providing the best possible health care. Our school program this year attempted to meet this goal through the use of screening programs, physical examinations, assistance from state and community agencies, immunization clinics, dental programs and parental support.

Dr. Marjorie Parsons again provided professional medical advice as our school physician and was assisted by Mary Sasser, family nurse practitioner.

The Developmental Screening Program was made available on two different occasions for testing children ages three through five this year. The children were screened for fine and groww motor skills, concepts and communication.

Due to budgeting difficulties, the Family Life Education Program was not taught in the school setting this year, but every effort will be made for this to be offered next year.

Our district now has a drug and alcohol abuse program for the elementary students called ME/ME and one for the high school called Quest with the ultimate goal being drug and alcohol abuse prevention through improving self concept and decision making.

The State Department of Education required each child entering school to be completely immunized. This year showed a marked improvement and I would personally like to thank all the parents for a job well done.

Our pre-school vision and hearing clinic for children ages four through six was a huge success again this year. We were able to identify and correct many existing conditions. This clinic would not be successful without the help of all the high school students at the Academy. Not only do they do the posters and all the mailings, but they also do the actual screening at the clinic. We certainly have some great kids here in Colebrook and I would like to express my thanks to them.

I would like to remind the parents that the New Hampshire State Law RSA 541:A, regarding medications in school, requires:

- All medication must be in the original container properly labled with the student's name, physician's name, date of original prescription, name and strength of medication and the directions for taking by the student.
- Written statement from the prescribing physician detailing the medication to be taken including method, dosage and time.
- Written authorization (request) from the parent or guardian indicating that the said medication shall be given during school hours by the physician's orders.

Medication really <u>should not</u> be taken during school hours if it is at all possible to be taken at home. If the above steps have not been followed, the medication will not be given and will be returned home with your child.

In closing, parents, please feel free to call or visit the nurse's office anytime the need arises. Also, I would like to thank all those in the community who have helped me in any way this year.
